## **Egyptian Ambassador** Visits Ireland's New Oyster Capital In Dungarvan

Last Sunday morning was certainly a red letter occa-sion in the developing progress of Dungarvan Shellfish Ltd whose production of Pacific Oysters in Dungarvan Bay has grown so rapidly that Dungarvan has now become one of the most important oyster production areas in Ireland and has, in fact, literally made Dungarvan the new oyster capital of Ireland.

The directors of the Com-pany, Mr. Jim Harty, Gortnadiha, Ring and Mr. Michael Quealy, Monang, Abbeyside, who pioneered the venture in 1984, have seen their project grow over the past nine years to the extent that in conjunction with their French partners they have now engaged in a major expansion pro-gramme under a new fish culture license provided by the Dept. of the Marine and with grant support from Bord lascaigh Mhara.

Last Sunday morning, Mr. Harty and Mr. Quealy played hosts to Mr. Patrick J. Keogh, Deputy Chief Ex-ecutive BIM who was later

joined by the Egyptian Ambassador to Ireland, His Excellency Hussein Mesharafa who was accompanied by his wife Dahlia in a tour of the 50 acre oyster farm. All were most impressed by the layout and location of the development.

Speaking at a Press Conference later, Mr. Pat

Keogh said that the BIM 'Programme for Job Creation in Aquaculture' launched by the Minister for the Marine last November aimed to increase aquaculture production nationally from £40 million to over £100 million over the next five years and in the process to create over 1,100 jobs

around the coast. One of the farmed fish species whose production had grown most rapidly was Pacific oysters and here in Dungarvan Bay had become one of the most important oyster production areas in Ireland.

### **Vintners Drive To Curb Underage Drinking**

Calls were also made for the introduction of ID cards in the city and county and its extension nationwide if possible.

While many publicans stressed that the problems of underage drinking are no greater in Waterford than in any other part of the country, there was unanimity among them that every possible effort should be made to try and curb it.


Cappoquin publican Nora Flynn said the co-operation of the schools, the parents and the Garda authorities will be of paramount importance if their campaign against underage drinking is to succeed. The successful introduction of an ID system would be a major step forward.

### **KNOW YOUR** RIGHTS

Question — Can you tell me the circumstances under which it is possible to claim a refund of PRSI?

Answer — PRSI which was correctly payable in the first place is never refundable. However, there are a number of situations in which PRSI or the two levies may be refunded. These are:

 If your employers deducted the wrong class of PRSI, e.g. if Class A was deducted when it should have been Class J.

Apply for refund to: Dept. of Social Welfare, PRSI Refunds Section, Gandon House, Amiens Street, Dublin 1. Tel. 01-748444.

 If you were employed by two or more employers concurrently and your total earnings went above the ceiling for PRSI. You could claim a refund of the PRSI deducted in excess of the ceiling. Apply for refund to: The Collector-General, PRSI

• If you were over the prescribed age when you first started to pay PRSI, e.g. if you were over 55 and couldn't have qualified for a Retirement Pension or if over 56 and you couldn't have qualified for a Contributory Old Age Pension, you may be due a refund of the pension element of your PRSI that went towards these pensions. If you are awarded a Non-Contributory Old Age Pension the PRSI element you paid towards a Contributory Old Age Pension will not be refunded as this will be taken as a payment towards your Con-Contributory Old Age

### 1993 Tidy Towns **Campaign Launched** in the South East

The annual Tidy Towns seminar organised by South East Tourism to launch the 1993 Tidy Towns Competition in the South East, was staged in the Minella Hotel, Clonmel.

The National Tidy Towns Competition is sponsored by Super Valu Supermarkets. In the South East Region alone, in excess of 2,500 people are active in the movement where over 100 towns and villages will this year be working to secure once again top honours and prizes in this keenly contested national competition.

Opened by Regional Tourism Manager Joe Palmer, the seminar heard national Tidy Towns adjudi-cator Anne O'Leary outline the steps involved in the creation of a long term (3 to 5 year) programme for centres. She stated that the existence of such an overall plan is a prerequisite to success.

The value of trees, shrubs and flowers in the better presentation of towns and villages was the topic addressed by Doctor Christy Boylan of Dublin. A past President of Trees Ireland, Dr. Boylan is the recognised expert on the selection, siting and care of trees.

Mrs. Margaret Brady, Sec-retary of Keep Kilkenny Beautiful Committee, over-all national winners in 1985 and current Best Large Town in Ireland, stressed the usefulness of area and sectional competitions in the larger centres.

The Seminar was also addressed by Mrs. Caroline Bowen-Walsh, Chairman of Ardmore Tidy Towns Committee, who are current national winners. She gave details of how Ardmore achieved success in the competition.

During the afternoon the upwards of 40 delegates from the larger tidy towns centres in Carlow, Kilkenny, Wexford, Waterford and South Tipperary visited lo-cations in Clonmel. Problems encountered by Tidy Towns Committees and how they are being overcome were discussed on site.

Delegates from smaller centres and villages were taken on a tour of Kilsheelan, also a former national winner, where they were met by the local Tidy Towns Committee who later entertained their visitors.

quota year to coincide with calendar year. The present system of assessing milk quota from April to March may suit bureaucrats but does not suit Irish dairy farmers. Lactating cows cannot be turned on and off like water taps and cows in early lactation have to be maintained in full milk if maximum production is to be achieved. A calendar year quota assessment would allow the dairy farmers to dry off his cows towards the end of lactation if the penalty of Super Levy loomed and would give him the choice of milking on if quota was available to be

Much hardship has been foisted on Irish farmers because the politicians are content to go along complacently with Brussels bureaucrats while countries like Italy have gained by being less than one hundred per cent compliant.

For the moment though thoughts of white beaches and Caribbean sun are being put well and truly in the background as McKinstry and Philpott prepare their assault on this year's Circuit of Ireland Rally.


After the disappointment of last year when having led for 32 stages before a broken turbo forced him out with just six stages to complete, McKinstry is determined that this problem will not happen again this year. ### The Civil War — Train **Wreckage At Ballyvoile**

Two weeks ago we described how Ballyvoile Railway Bridge was blown up on August 4, 1922 and last week we detailed how the rest of the Bridge collapsed over a period of two weeks.


The railway bridge was not rebuilt until June 1924. Surprisingly we have two photos by Keohan showing train wreckage at Ballyvoile on January 31, 1923.

We do not have any information to hand as to why a train approached the collapsed bridge. Could any of our readers supply us with this information? The only details to hand which were printed underneath the second photo is as follows:

'Train Wreckage At Ballyvoile January 31, 1923. Owing to the rails not going the full way, the wheels stuck in the mud and the engine fell over, the coupling breaking leaving the carriage suspended over the chasm. This photo was published in illustrated papers throughout the world.

This weekend marks the 63rd Circuit of Ireland Rally organised by the Ulster Automobile Club. The rally will start from the Slieve Donard Hotel in Newcastle, Co. Down at 2.30 p.m. on Friday and go through 5 stages locally before overnighting in the Rally HQ in the Slieve Donard Hotel.

On Saturday morning there is an 8.15 a.m. restart for the 72 drivers who then move down the east coast before arriving in Waterford at Jury's Hotel at 6 p.m.

On Easter Sunday the 1993 Circuit sees competitors embarking at 12.30 p.m. on a new feature - an extended Sunday/Monday run. This will allow those competitors who have dropped out up to Saturday evening the opportunity to re-enter the event at no extra cost and compete for a further two days. There will be seven separate stages on the Easter Sunday loop through the county with centralised servicing at Dungarvan. The first cars are due back in Waterford around 6.15 p.m.

The drivers will leave Waterford at 10.45 a.m. on Easter Monday to begin the long run home via Limerick and Galway and then the rally will finally end on Tuesday where it began five days before in Newcastle where the winner is expected to arrive at 12.30 p.m. to a hero's welcome.

Clerk of the Course, Tom Watson, speaking on behalf of the organisers had high praise for their many sponsors but as always stressed that Rally safety was a top priority. He appealed to spectators to act sensibly, obey the marshals and to consider the dangers involved. "If they do this then we can all enjoy an exciting weekend's rallying," he said.

Harty, Gortnadiha, Ring and businessman Michael Quealy who runs the Esso Filling Station at the Burgery, Dungarvan for the manner in which the initiative they showed nine years ago when they went into oyster production in Dungarvan Bay has begun to hit the headlines as a major success venture. limited degree agriculture. Aquaculture, of which

oyster production is one of the main operations along our south and western coasts, has a special development significance. It is located in peripheral rural areas where outward migration and emigration are undermining the very survival of local communities. There are few alternative sources of livelihood but fishing, seasonal tourism and to a

Aquaculture is a low import cum high value added sector in that inputs are locally sourced; it is labour intensive and the product is sold at premium prices. There is the additional spin off in jobs created in sup-ply/service industries, packaging/processing, sales and distribution.

Aquaculture as an indigenous natural resource based

industry, is welded to the local economy. The cost per job in aquaculture, at approximately £8,000 has been shown by the ERSI to compare very favourable with other sectors within the economy.

Jim Harty and Michael Quealy took their courage in their hands when they launched their oyster production project in Dungarvan Harbour just off the Cunnigar in 1984. They have been the pioneers of what has turned out for them to be a most successful undertaking. They are to be congratulated and we wish them further success in the future.

Waterford pharmacists last week joined the Government's national call to support indigenous industry with the objective of creating more jobs. This is, as far as we know, the first time that the profession has combined nationally to actively recommend to the public to purchase when possible, Irish manufac-tured non-prescription medicines (including veterinary medicines), toiletries and cosmetics.

A spokesman for the pharmacists pointed out that the Irish are the worst in Europe for supporting home produced goods. "We spend 60p out of every pound on imported goods, and yet we continue to complain that unemployment is at an alltime high," he is on record as saying. In this regard it is reckoned that well over a billion pounds worth of imports could be sourced here and in light of what Minister for State at the Department of Trade and Industry, Mrs. Mary O'Rourke stated recently, that if just an extra 10p in every pound was switched from foreign to Irish goods thousands of new jobs could be created, it is a matter to which the most serious consideration should and must be given.

The buy Irish initiative in pharmacies has been taken up by the Irish Pharmaceutical Union and it has now AUGSTON CONTROL V. 103 14

The very modern Sterling Winthrop factory in Dungarvan was built in 1987. It has recently received the highest grading of all factories within Sterling world-wide. It had the added distinction of winning the 'Q' Supreme Quality Award during 1992.

Sterling in Dungarvan manufactures Bulk Granulate for such well known products as Panadol, Actiprofen, Andrews Liver Salts, Paracetamol etc and these are exported to companies within the Sterling Winthrop influence. Additionally, they manufacture and export bulk tablets for Panadol, Hedex, Actiprofen etc. Packaged products on the Irish market include: Panadol, Panodil, Actiprofen, Andrews Antacid, Mejorultra. 97% of the production in Dungarvan is exported. The company employs 155 highly qualified staff and has an annual turnover in the region of £40 million.

The other Co. Waterford listing in the "Made In Ire-....

land" booklet is Pinewood Healthcare. This was set up in Ballymacarbry in 1976, has grown substantially in recent years and now employs 85 people. It is 100% Irish owned.

In 1992 the company opened a new warehouse and distribution centre at Naas Road Industrial Park in Dublin. This enabled them to offer a more speedy delivery service. The company also provided a free phone facility to enable pharmacists place their orders. The company is currently engaged in an £0.5 million extension to the manufacturing plant and this will increase production capacity and employment over the next two years. In 1991 pharmacists invested £1 million in a Expansion Business Scheme in Pinewood.

Its manufacturing facility in Ballymacarbry includes tabletting and capsuling, production of oral liquids, creams and ointments. ### CENTRE

The idea of a purpose built Community Centre was first mooted back in the mid 1980's. Being the largest organisation of its kind in the area the local G.A.A. club officers and committee of the time decided to lead by example and undertook the task of providing this much needed facility for the people of the town and surrounding areas.

Following a fruitful meeting with Lismore Estates a prime location for the building was generously provided at the western approach to the town. A fund raising venture was initiated and the club became involved in the "G.A.A. Clubs Development Co-op Draw," the proceeds from which were earmarked for the construction of the Centre.

Site clearance commenced in 1989 and the steel superstructure was erected the following year. 1992 saw the completion of blockwork and roof, and the ex-ternal doors and windows were then fitted. The subfloor in the main hall was laid shortly afterwards and this was to account for the remaining available funds.

In excess of £120,000 has

pose area to cater for large or small gatherings is also envisaged. Adjoining the Centre, two

hard tennis courts have been provided through the good offices of the Co. Manager and funding from the National Lottery, and will serve to complement the range of activities available within the complex.

When completed, the Centre will be handed over to a special committee, representatives of all local organisations, which will manage and run it for the benefit of the community at large.

However an estimated amount of £60,000 presently separates the dream from the reality and the current economic climate is anything but conductive to this kind of grant-aiding or fund raising. As if to compound the problem the G.A.A. committee are faced with the dual responsibility of financing the activities of their highly successful club teams which must take precedence over all else. and this means a reliance on the generosity of the very same public who are continuously being asked to "dig deep" to support a wide range of worthy causes.

Rather than sit back and await "Manna From Heaven" the committee has instituted a programme of harnessing voluntary help from within the community and already it has become apparent that despite the scarcity of monetary resources there is an abun-

dance of goodwill. Several offers of practical help have already been received from local tradesmen willing to give of their time and skill in an effort to complete the Centre and make it functional. As a result it is envisaged that work can recommence over the next few weeks and slowly but surely the dream can become a reality that everyone can be proud of.

Successive committees, not least the current group, to be compliment their perseverance and determination to do something worthwhile for a community which has given wholehearted support to G.A.A. activities over many years. When completed (and let there be no doubt about that) it will stand as a classic example of local initiative and community spirit.

All offers of help in this regard will be gratefully re-ceived by club chairman, Michael Quann, Secretary, Rev. Bro. Dormer or any committee member.

In the New Hebrides, there is an Easter Hill on an island called Whit Sunday. Easter Mountains can be found in Germany and it is custom here for the young people of the district to climb the mountains on Easter Sunday morning. Large bonfires are lit around which they dance and sing their traditional songs. Their music and song is heard for miles around, bringing Easter cheer to the countryside.

Mr. Murphy stressed that eradication of the Italian foot and mouth outbreak was now the ultimate responsibility of the European Commission, working closely with the Italian authorities. He also emphasised, however, the importance of absolute vigilance by the Irish Department of Agriculture, especially in the disinfection of trucks and containers originating in Italy, to prevent the scourge of foot and mouth reaching Ireland with disastrous conse-

### Roll Up For A Ham Sandwich



Warm from the oven and smelling heavenly, these ham "sandwiches" don't beat much resemblance to the railway station variety! We've made our bread dough extra moist by adding milk. There's enough to make a seeded plait too. HAM 'ROLLS' Ingredients

4oz. (100g) ham spread, 2 level tbs (30ml.) French

1oz. (25g) butter, melted 6oz. (170g) can evaporated

1 egg beaten 1lb. 40z. (567g) packet white bread mix extra evaporated milk poppy seeds to finish Method — Blend ham spread with 1 tbs (15ml.) mustard. Combine rest of mustard with melted butter and pour into 18cm. (7in.)

Make up evaporated milk to 14fl. oz. (400m.) with hot water and add with egg and bread mix. Mix thoroughly to form a dough and knead on



lightly floured surface until smooth and elastic for about 5 minutes. Divide into two. For "sandwiches" roll dough out to 30.5 by 22cm. (12 by 9 ins.) and cover evenly with ham spread. Roll up along the long side like a Swiss roll and cut into nine pieces. Arrange cut-side down in prepared tin and cover with cling film.

dough into three and roll each into a rope. Plait together, place on a baking sheet and cover with cling film.

Allow both doughs to rise to double their size for approximately 1 hour. Brush with evaporated milk, sprinkle plait with poppy seeds and bake both at 375deg. F., 190deg. C., gas mark 5 for 30-35 minutes until golden. Serve while still

### Try aerial strawberries

Divide second half of

Try aerial strawberries We all question whether some gardening jobs are worth it but nobody could begrudge the preparation and care of hanging baskets. Results are usually spectacular and they can brighten the most confined spaces, such as a balcony of a flat or a tiny backyard.

Of course, hanging high where wind and sun can quickly dry their soil, the plants need watching and watering, but they seem to repay extra effort by putting more into their displays. And the medium is versatile too — you can plant herbs such as sage, thyme, chives and parsley or even have an

aerial strawberry patch.

Sites must be chosen carefully, with light but away from strong winds. Anchor the basket well too - it will also be holding soil and water as well as plants. Use a masonry drill to make holes to take screws and rawplugs of a decent iength and buy brackets large enough to suspend the baskets without them touching the surface behind.

Large baskets are best because they dry out more slowly between waterings. You may also want to consider alternatives to the traditional mesh basket lined with sphagnum moss.

This type of basket, now usually coated with plastic to prevent rust and deterioration, allows trailing plants to be poked through the moss lining.

But the moss can be hard to come by. expensive and does allow the basket to dry quickly - for all of these reasons,

many people now often use green or black plastic to line the basket. TRAILERS

Small cuts can be made in the plastic to accommodate trailers but many people prefer the traditional style and reduce water loss by hid-

ing an old plate between the moss and the soil.

A halfway house is a hardened peat fibre liner which looks natural and can be holed to take trailers.

Finally, there is a lazy man's option the plastic bowl with drip tray. It doesn't look pretty and trailers have to cascade from the top, but they do retain water well and this may be crucial if you go away a lot.

Use a good quality compost — it needs to support a lot of plants and retain

You can make filling and planting traditional baskets easier by resting them on a bucket or round bowl. Don't forget the plate or saucer on top of the moss or plastic to help retain water.

If you are planting trailers then ease their roots in from underneath before adding compost and other plants.

The plant arrangement is logical - larger and bushier plants such as fuchsia and tuberous begonia in the centre, with lower types such as Busy Lizzie, pansy and lobelia at the edges.

But there is nothing to stop you planting all one variety - how about dwarf nasturtiums for a riot of rambling colours? Arthur Hines







I have written before about the gaps in standards, but in recent matches the gap in skills is becoming more obvious. In our last two games we saw Waterford players in possession of the ball, being unable to deliver because of being hooked, blocked down or crowded out. On Sunday our forwards got quite an amount of possession but were unable to get clearance to strike. We also had a couple of mis-hit sideline balls and occasions when players were badly caught out of position.

Many of these faults can result from frustration and in that sense may, to some extent, be forgiven, but when they occur at times when there is no reason for being frustrated, questions must be asked. One of the questions being asked after the game on Sunday, related to the belief in some quarters that in the preparation of the team, there is over concentration on the physical side to the detriment of the skill training. Whether or not this is so, no one will deny that our skills badly need improving.

The first thing that must be done is to have the selectors and trainer/manager sit. down and carefully study a video of the game a few times in analysing the failings and shortcomings that are holding back the team's progress. New players may have to be taken on board and the goalkeeping posi-

tion will have to be looked at before the panel goes into serious training for the championship.

THE GAME

Waterford fielded as se-lected while Cork showed a number of changes from the team listed on the programme. Johnnie Brenner had cried off the panel because of examinations, etc. Fergal Hartley who came on as a sub. against Dublin was retained at centre back and there were other positional changes on our side. I am not going to write about the game in any detail as from our point of view the story of the match makes depressing reading.

Cork were 3 goals and five points in front before we opened our account with a point scored by John Meaney in the 22nd minute but minutes later Paul Callaghan hit back for his second and Cork's fourth goal to put the game out of our reach even before half time sounded and the All-Ireland runners-up of last year leading by 17 points on a 4-8 to 0-3 scoreline.

Cork were again in rampant form in the second half and added a further 1-8 to their half time tally while Waterford scored 1-3 even though aided by the breeze. Our goal came in the 56th minute when Paul Prendergast's shot deceived Tom Kingston in the Cork goal. At that point we were 25 points down and there was general relief when the final whistle was sounded, despite our disappointment. Things are now bad at this level and I suppose they won't be helped when the "knockers" get to work. This is not the time to desert the team and the cause when support is most needed. Waterford have the talent and the ability to bounce back. It will take a bit more time.

They won on a score line of 6-14 to 4-11 and this was described at the time as a most flattering tally.

Last year, with what was a super team by any standards we won the Munster title after a replay against Tipperary on a never to be forsitten July evening at Pairc Li Caoimh.

We return to the scene of our historic victory on tonight with a much different team and against a far different opponent. This time our opponents, trained by Jimmy Barry Murphy will have the advantage of hav-

ing trained at the venue.

The Waterford lineout which was published last week shows that only eight of the 1992 championship panel are still eligible and this included five of the players who were on the actual team. Gone are Patrick Haran (goalie), Tom Morrissey, Paddy O'Donnell (capt.), Tom Feeney, Tom Kiely, Fintan O'Shea, John Fitzpatrick, Ray Ryan, Paul Foley and Paul Flynn and of the subs only Alan Robinson, Darrah O'Sullivan and Brendan Ormond remain.

The 1992 players on the team are James O'Connor, Derek McGrath, John Joe Ronayne, Anthony Kirwan and Ger Harris.

The training this year was as good as that which was put in last year and several good challenge games were played. The selectors have obviously gone through the clubs with a fine comb in their search for talent and no fewer than sixteen clubs are represented on the 25 man panel. Full marks to the selectors too, for having selected and announced the team well in advance of the game. This is how it should be done

The Wednesday of Holy Week is not a good date for a championship game. Once upon a time, fixing a game for such a time would be unheard of. So it's no marks to the Munster Council for this fixture.

We will again have very big support at the venue and hopefully their dedication and support will be rewarded. ### Western Board Meeting

Ollie Wilkinson, Chairman, presided at this very well attended open meeting of the Divisional Board at the Park Hotel on Thursday last.

#### **CONVENTION MATTERS**

A few matters left over from Convention were discussed and the Chairman told delegates that the outstanding ticket money which has been the subject of some controversy over the past couple of years, has now been collected and accounted for, with the exception of a small sum, which will be cleared up by the June meeting of the Board. He said the matter has been cleared up following a meeting with the Board's Auditor and practically all the outstanding ticket money had been paid by the members, etc., who had purchased the tickets in the years referred to.

The matter of the £1,800 which was shown on the balance sheet as having been paid to the County Board was also cleared up when the County Treasurer James Walsh explained that the figure should not have been shown as an expenditure without having been listed on the income side. This meant that instead of there being a loss of approximately £1,500, there was a profit of approximately £350 on the year's working.

Some delegates felt that the outstanding ticket money (approximately £500) should be paid over to the County Board by the Western Board and then recouped, but this proposition was defeated on a vote.

#### REFEREES' REPORTS

The Chairman stated that as this was the first occasion since assuming office that he had to impose suspensions, he would avail of the opportunity of saying something on the matter of discipline. He said it was not a happy situation for the Board to find themselves suspending four players at this early stage of the year, and before the 1993 championship had begun. With Fraher Field due to be closed for the season, very many of our championship games would have to be played on unrailed venues and this could lead to problems. He appealed to clubs to exercise strict control over players and over their members when games were being played at these venues during the year.

Suspended were O. Power, A. Fitzgerald and R. Ryan, Naomh Bríd and M. Murphy, Shamrocks, all for rough play and they were given 2 weeks each from the date of the game.

A delegate asked if a record was being kept of the names of players sent off over the previous two years in order to ensure that players reported for repeating an offence within that time would be dealt with in accordance with the rules. The Secretary, Anthony Walsh said that such a record was being kept.

Another delegate asked about the definition of rough play, as practically everyone sent off is reported for rough play. The Chairman said that the referee is the adjudicator in such cases and if rough play is reported, the offence can only be dealt with in this way.

Correspondence between the Cappoquin Club and the Officer Board resulted in a recommendation being made to the meeting that the club be given permission to play in the minor hurling 'B' championship because of their poor standard at this level at the moment. Having debated the matter for some time, the recommendation was accepted on a vote. They had been graded 'A' at the previous meeting.

1992 TICKETS

It was revealed in the course of the meeting that the total amount paid for tickets for the various semi-finals and finals last year was £92,000. It was reported that all these tickets had been paid for.

TRANSFER RECOMMENDATION

Following a discussion at a previous meeting, the Officer Board reported that they had examined the matter and were recommending that in future all transfer applications must be in the hands of the Board Secretary on the Friday before the announced date of the transfers meeting. Also that transfer applications not properly completed when received by the Secretary of the Board, will not be entertained. In a situation where the secretary of the club from which the player is transferring refused to sign, then the applicant may go before the Chairman or Secretary before the Board meeting, to declare his intention. The recommendations were accepted unanimously.


