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Attacked By Assailants In Early Morning Break In At Cappoquin Jeweller's

In the early hours of Sunday morning last Fives' Jewellery Shop in Main St. was broken into. A member of the family was set upon while asleep in bed and received injuries to his face. His assailants left empty-handed when surprised by another family member.

It was a very frightening experience for the people involved who must have suffered a great shock to have their home intruded upon in this manner in the small hours.

There have been a number of break-ins in the town in the past but this one would nature involving as it did an attack on the person.

Local people are becoming increasingly concerned at the prevalence of this type of crime in the area. Concern which was amply demonstrated by the large attendances at recent meetings of the newly formed Community Alert.

This latest crime is being investigated by the Gardai who deserve the help of ev-erybody in their task. Once again through the medium of these columns we urge everybody to be vigilant and make life as difficult as possible for those people who choose to operate outside the law of the land.

oung Kilmacthomas en Lose Lives In

Kilmacthomas and the mid-Waterford area in general were plunged into a pall of deep gloom when news spread of a road traffic accident which took place in Kilmeaden on last Sunday night and in which two young local men lost their lives.

at about 9.30 p.m.near the Matthews Cross junction at Kilmeaden on the main Waterford -Cork road, Killed instantly when their Peugeot turbo-diesel car went out of control, spun around on the road and struck another car were the driver, 20-years old Bill Kirwan, single and an electrician of Kilnagrange, Kilmacthomas and his companion, John Halley, also only 20 years, of Ballyshunnock, Kilmacthomas.

The two young men who were always very interested in racing cars had been watching some of the Circuit of Ireland Rally stages around the county on Sunday and were driving to the rally stop-over in Waterford City when the horror crash occurred.

It is believed that at the

The horror crash happened Matthews Cross junction their car skidded and glanced off another car travelling in the direction of Dungarvan before hitting a fence, throwing the two men out through the back window. A third person in the Peugeot, John O'Brien, Ballyshunnock, Kilmacthomas, was rushed to Wa terford Regional Hospital where his condition was later described as "comfortable.

The driver of the other car, a Mitsubishi, was David Mulvihill, 10, Dunford Close, Southways, Dungarvan who was not seriously injured.

Ambulances were quickly at the crash scene and the bodies were taken to Waterford Regional Hospital where post mortem examinations were carried out on Monday.

FF National **Director To Visit Waterford** Constituenc

Fianna Fail's national director of organisation, Seamus Brennan and general secretary Pat Farrell will pay a day-long visit on this Thursday to the Waterford constituency where the party suffered a disastrous setback in last November's election.

The loss of veteran Jackie Fahey's Dail seat still rankles and the party hierarchy is making no secret of the fact that the constituency is among its prime targets for seat gains in the next general election.

National executive representative, Cllr. Pat Leahy, has stated that Messrs. Brennan and Farrell will discuss every aspect of or-ganisation in Waterford where Fianna Fail holds just one of the four seats for only the second time in half

a century.
Cllr. Leahy, who is seen as a potential general election candidate, said there will be in-depth discussion on the campaign Fianna Fail conducted.

Cllr. Leahy said candidate strategy will also be on the agenda as will the geo-

graphical location of the candidates.

The Fianna Fail belief is that the party gave away its second seat rather than losing it to the PDs. FIERCE

CRITICISM

In bitter post-election recriminations there was fierce criticism of the decision to run only two candidates, outgoing TDs Brendan Kenneally and Jackie Fahey. Many favoured fielding three candidates, but party headquar-ters finally acceded to a demand from Deputy Fahey that only the two outgoing Deputies should stand.

"Everything will be on the table in our discussions with Seamus Brennan and Pat Farrell," Cllr. Leahy said. "We know mistakes were made on a number of

fronts and we are determined they will not be re-

Occupiers Liability — **Frustrating Neglect** Says ICMSA

Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, President of the ICMSA, said that the Association has sought a meeting with the Taoiseach, Mr. Reynolds, due to the lack of progress in the area of satisfactory changes in the legis-lation governing occupiers' liabilities to persons on their properties.

Mr. O'Dwyer said that this lack of progress is not acceptable to the ICMSA.
"It is evident that succes-

sive Ministers for Justice and the current Minister for Equality & Law Reform, Mr. M. Taylor, T.D., do not treat as urgent law reform in this area. This amounts to frus-trating neglect.

"In January of last year Mr. C. Haughey as Taoiseach gave a commitment to the CMSA that satisfactory reform to occupiers' liability legislation would be enacted by the end of 1993. The new Taoiseach, Mr. A. Reynolds, T.D., gave us an undertaking in March of last year to honour that commitment.

Despite letters to the Minister for Justice, and to the Minister for Equality & Law Reform we have failed to get evidence of progress towards honouring the commitments. I am not going to let this state of affairs continue," said Mr. O'Dwver

OCCUPIERS LIABILITY - MAJOR BEARING **WITH PESP**

Mr. O'Dwyer has recently written to the Taoiseach seeking a meeting to get an update on progress, if any.

"The ICMSA has succeeded in having occupiers' liability law reform included as part of the PESP. I am determined to make progress in this area. The outcome of our meeting with the Taoiseach will have a major bearing on our remaining association with PESP," he said.

or, failing this, the work to be sub-contracted to ensure that all map orders for the Cereal Aid Scheme are de-

livered in good time for the May 15 closing date.
Mr. John O'Mahoney, Chairman, Waterford IFA Grain Committee has said the Ordnance Survey Office have informed IFA that there is a seven week order backlog in the Office at present. This means that some farmers will receive these vital maps after the final date of application for aid and will consequently incur the penalties of late application through no fault of their own.

The 6" or 25" Ordnance

Survey maps are required to indicate precisely where their cereals are located when they are applying for the new cereal aid to compensate for the cereal price drop this Autumn. Late applicants for the scheme will lose 1% of their entitlement for each working day their application is overdue. After 20 late calendar days their applications will not be ac-

cepted.
The IFA man strongly urged any farmer who has not placed his map order with the Ordnance Survey Office to do so without further delay or to obtain spare copies of maps for their area from neighbouring farmers.

Curran Calls For 63,400 Premia To Be Allocated To Small Dairymen

Waterford IFA Dairy Committee Chairman, Gerald Curran said that the 63,400 premia which are available to the small milk producers should be allocated to these producers.

Mr. Curran said these additional premia were won by Minister for Agriculture specifically for small scale dairymen producers with quotas of less than 25,000 gallons are eligible and the quotas should be allocated to these producers until they have time to put beef breeds in place.

The Ring man added - it can be argued that small dairymen are not getting a

reasonable time to put beef breeds in place. With the demand for replacement Friesian heifers, the beef breeds are not on the ground at present.

Mr. Curran said that the Department are obliged to establish a national reserve of 1% to 3%. There may be a view that part of this 63,400 premia allocation should form the national reserve. If this happened it would rule out the need to take a percentage off existing suckler farmers. However, the small scale dairymen premia is a separate allocation and should be treated as such.





In 1991 almost 1,000 people died from accidental causes. One hundred of these were aged under 15 years. Causes included road cidents, falls and accidental poisoning. Juanita Ma-jury, Youth Director of the Irish Red Cross commented on these statistics saying: "More recognition of the Red Cross slogan "Safety — it's up to us" would lead to a reduction in accidents and their fatal consequences.

Since 1990 the Red Cross has been promoting safety in schools throughout Ireland, encouraging the active participation of children to give their contribution to making their schools "safe-

ty zones". In close collaboration with the principal and teachers, pupils can form "Safety Squads" and carry out activities and duties relating to safety in their schools. This approach pro-vides a vehicle for constant reinforcement of safety messages and educates the children from a young age to take responsibility for themselves and their companions. Underlying the programme is the fundamental message of Red Cross - "Care for all because we are all part of one worldwide family."
"Safety Squads" now exist

in 16 counties. As one principal said: "Both teachers and pupils feel that having a Safety Squad in our school has done an enormous amount to heighten general awareness of how accidents can happen and how they can be prevented by a little care."

Dungarvan **Assault** Case **Transferred** To Dublin

Michael Thole, no fixed abode, appeared in custody before Judge Esmonde Smythe at Waterford Circuit Criminal Court charged with assault occasioning actual bodily harm to John O'Donnell at Childers Estate, Dungarvan on December 22 last and with being in possession of a knife contrary to the Offensive Weapons Act on the same date.

On the application of Counsel for the defendant, Judge Smythe agreed that the case be transferred for hearing to Dublin Circuit Court and defendant was then remanded in continuing custody.

New School For Gaelscoil Garbháin Removed From Department's **Priority List**

Hopes that Gaelscoil Garbháin, the all-Irish school in Dungarvan, was at last to have a permanent home at a site which has been approved at Duckspool, Abbeyside were dashed last week by the shock revelation that it had been removed from the Dept. of Education's priority list for new schools in 1993.

Now the four-teacher Scoil Garbháin in Dungarvan, with a student enrolment of 112, is facing imminent closure because of this latest decision by the Department.

There is a cruel irony about that decision because the go-ahead for a new school was first given by the then Minister for Education Seamus Brennan. A site was purchased, planning permission was obtained and a contractor

But now the Board of Management has been given the shock news that the new school is no longer included on the priority list. It is a decision that has outraged parents and teachers who have accused present Minister Niamh Breathnach of going back on the firm commitment given by her predecessor.

The present Scoil Garbháin is located in the upstairs bedrooms of a private house on a town street. Classrooms are over-crowded, windows barred, there is only one toilet for 116 people and recreational facilities amount to the tiny backyard of the old house.

Ventilation is also a major problem as is the absence of natural daylight in three of the classrooms.

The primitive conditions have caused anger and concern to the parents and teachers who are supported in their case for a new school by the INTO, the Gaelscoileanna organisation, the South-Eastern Health Board and politicians of all parties.

HEALTH AND SAFETY HAZARD

They all agree that the present accommodation is not alone totally inadequate but is also a health and safety hazard. Yet the Dept. and the Minister no longer consider it worthy of a place on the priority list for a new school.

The Board of Management, teachers, and parents now fear that Scoil Garbháin may have to close at the end of the current school year unless there is ministerial intervention.

Last week the teachers met the Minister and forcibly made their case for a new school. An attentive Niamh Breathnach listened to all that they had to say but there were no firm commitments forthcoming from

Principal Siobhán Aghas, who is a native of the Dingle Gaeltacht, is deeply worried about the future of a school, which despite its lack of a permanent home, has proved to be an outstanding success.

"If we cannot move into a new premises in the near future then the very existence of the school will be in serious doubt," she said.

Scoil Garbháin's first home was the old Protestant Church in Convent Road near the seafront. Since then it has been almost a case of moving from "pillar to post."

But now closure stares Scoil Garbháin starkly in the face unless the Minister and her Dept. have a change




BALLYVOILE BRIDGES REBUILT



PONSIVAN MARGENON

Chamber Of Commerce And Dungarvan Traffic Management Study

of Commerce has, in recent months, carried out a study of the proposed Dungarvan Traffic Management Plan which has been drawn up on the recommendation of Dungarvan Urban Council and in a recent report stated that it agreed with the policy of the Council to promote development on a controlled basis to ensure that the visual character and natural setting of the town were enhanced.

Among the comments it submitted, the Chamber felt that the parking problem in the town was that which required immediate attention. It agreed that a high proportion of central area parking should be restricted to short-term in the interest of commercial activity and long-term parking at Davitts Quay and Scanlons Yard car parks should be dis-continued as soon as suitable parking was made available. The suggestion in the Traffic Management Study for a 200-car park behind the Fire position here should be tack-

The Dungarvan Chamber Station could be an alternative in this regard. It added that every effort should be made to supply short-term car parking for the O'Connell Street area where it felt businesses were at greatest

The Chamber report then states: "Clonmel and Waterford City are the town's biggest competitors for shopping. The Chamber feels we should adopt a similar strategy as them with one hour free parking on streets and introduce pay-meters in the car parks. This would also be a prerequisite to introduce the culture of free paying car parking in these areas prior to the introduction of the multi-storied car parks."

The Commerce Chamber recommended that the proposed roundabouts included in the Traffic Management Study should be proceeded with. Referring to the Coolagh Road junction in Abbeyside it stated that the led as a matter of urgency as local residents felt that a roundabout here would be far safer than the present arrangement. A roundabout at the Park Hotel junction on the by-pass road would also be most desirable as it would reduce the present accident rate at this junction.

The existing roundabout at Springmount should be enlarged, the Chamber report recommended "to prevent through traffic on the N25 (by-pass road) going through it at speed which is happening at the moment."

With reference to the proposals for Grattan Square contained in the Traffic Management Study, the Chamber of Commerce agrees that the Square and indeed the town should have a focal point. However they claimed there was strong opposition to the proposed loss of up to 100 car parking spaces as set out in the new proposals. The deal with this very vexed and Chamber report points out most controversial matter.

that the Square as it is at pre-sent utilised demonstrates an obtrusive car scape and allowing cars to back out on to the main thoroughfare was undesirable. In this regard it has considered many compromise plans with a view to establishing an acceptable focal point, retaining a maximum number of car parking spaces. It recommended the introduction of shrubs to screen the carscape and to channel traffic by the use of recommended road mark-

The Commerce Chamber report also deals with oneway traffic system proposals, areas of pedestrianisation and areas of acute traffic congestion in O'Connell Street and the top of Friary Street.

All the above matters and the entire problem of parking and traffic management in the town will come up for consideration shortly when the Urban Council are arranging to hold a special meeting to

Litter Louts Must Be Made Pay

It would appear that the public appeals, no matter how often they are repeated are having absolutely no effect on the proliferation of litter that destroys not only the streets of our towns but the roads and fields of our coun-

Week-ends are particularly bad times in these towns as chip containers and soft drink cans are discarded willynilly by home-going night revellers as the pubs and discos close down. Week-days during school periods are equally as bad as the young boys and girls from the out-side areas avail of the take-away facilities in the towns

to provide them with mid-day meals. It is a sad commentary to say that despite direct appeals made to the school authorities — in Dungarvan at any rate — the students continue to ignore the basic rules of hygiene as they pile litter around the streets in the form of burger boxes and soft drink wax cups. Every school day, once these students return to their schools after the luncheon recesses, all this litter is there to see. They just throw the containers on to the streets once they have consumed the contents. And in most cases the conglomeration can be found in the vicinities where public litter bins and baskets are provided which, of course, makes the position all the worse.

What then can be done to put an end to this litter problem once and for all? Appeals have failed utterly to have any result so it would seem that as a last resort the litter louts must be hit where it hurts most — in their pockets.

Last week we noted where a young man in Wales was fined a massive £1,500, yes, fifteen hundred pounds, when he was convicted on a charge of throwing a crisps package from a car in the car park. Even to us, this penalty seemed to be far too harsh but the young man was seen to say on the television news subsequently that as a consequence he certainly would not be doing anything like that again!

Nearer home a young man was fined £50 at Tralee Court last week for throwing an empty chip carton and fork on a footpath, thereby creating litter. This would seem to be a more realistic approach to the problem than the incident in Wales, but it does seem to be the only way now left to deal with litter louts.

We are now on the threshold of summer and foreign visitors will be coming to spend their holidays here. Let us make one final effort to project our environment as clean and litter free.

Problem Brewing Over School Buses

A major problem about school buses and the number of children which they may legally transport to and from their schools is brewing between the Department of the Environment and the Department of Education which operates the free school transport scheme.

Under present regulations, pupils can be carried on the basis of three children to two adult seats. Now, however, the Department of the Environment have put forward proposals which, in effect, slash the number of school children allowed to travel on each bus.

On the basis that under the existing rules, school buses are subject to overcrowding, the Department of the Environment is proposing to put an age limit of 14 years on the three children to two adult

seats regulation. This, however, would have the effect of reducing the carrying capacity of the buses which in turn would create the need for more buses and consequently increase the cost of operating the school transport scheme by a considerable amount.

Officials from the Department of Education who operate the scheme for the 164,000 pupils nationwide, have strongly opposed the proposals. spokesman for the Department has denied that there has been overcrowding in any of their buses and has stated that only the proper number of tickets are issued for each bus and they were not aware of any accident because of overcrowding.



EC EWE PREMIUM SCHEME

Establishment of Entitlement to Quota

EC Regulations provide that a producer who inherited or took over the holding of another producer who received the EC Ewe Premium in 1991 but did not apply for the premium in 1992, may be granted the quota which the retired producer would have received had he/she applied for the Ewe premium under the 1992 Scheme.

Any producer who inherited or took over a holding in these circumstances and who submitted an application for the Ewe Premium Scheme in 1992 should write to the Quota Section, Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Michael Davitt House, Castlebar, Co. Mayo outlining the circumstances involved and, in particular, stating the name and address and, if available, the herd/flock number of the retired producer.

EC ARABLE AREA PAYMENTS AND **AREA AID APPLICATIONS**

APPLICATIONS

Area aid applications and explanatory leaflets are being posted at present to all farmers with herdnumbers and flocknumbers. They are also being distributed to this Department's local offices and Teagasc offices so that they will be available to tillage farmers who have neither herdnumbers nor flocknumbers.

If you do not receive an area aid application form by Wednesday, 21 April, 1993, please contact one of the offices mentioned. Continuation sheets also will be available in these offices to any farmers needing them.

The form is a declaration of land use which must be completed by all farmers applying for area-linked payments in the tillage and livestock sectors. For tillage farmers it is the actual application for aid. For livestock farmers it is the declaration of forage areas for the purpose of calculating stocking density for certain livestock schemes and for checking livestock aid applications.

Farmers applying for arable sector aid (whether or not they are declaring forage areas for livestock) must forward maps with their area aid applications showing the plots and blocks of land on their holdings in respect of which they are claiming aid. The maps form an integral part of the application and must accompany it.

Farmers not applying for arable sector aid are not obliged to show on maps the blocks or plots of land being declared for forage area under the livestock aid schemes or for other uses not related to arable sector aid. If they can do so, however, they should forward maps appropriately marked so as to facilitate processing of their livestock aid applications later.

WHERE TO SEND COMPLETED AREA AID APPLICATIONS

Tillage farmers and farmers applying for both tillage and livestock payments should send or deliver their applications to:

Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Cereals Division, Floor & East, Agriculture House, Kildare Street, Dublin 2.

They should mark such applications 'Tillage' in the top left hand corner of the envelopes in which they are enclosed.

Applications for arable area payments under the general and simplified acheme must be lodged with the Cereals Division of the Department by 5p.m., 14th May, 1993.

Farmers who are submitting forage area declarations, other than those in respect of land which has been permanently under grass since 1 January 1987, must lodge their area aid applications with their Local Livestock Office by 5p.m. on 14 May, 1993 also.

Applications submitted after 14 May, 1993 but up to and including 3 June, 1993 will be accepted subject to reduced rates of aid.

Livestock farmers, who are declaring only forage areas and all of whose land has been permanently under grass since 1 January 1987, may however, submit their area aid applications with the first applications for livestock premium or Disadvantages Areas Schemes which are being forwarded to the Department after 14 May, 1993 but in any event not later than 1 July, 1993. These applications should also be submitted to their Local Livestock Office.

Edmund Rice For Sainthood

Wherever education is discussed the name of Edmund Rice stands out. Edmund Ignatius Rice was born in Callan, Co. Kilkenny in 1762. Having received a sound education in his own home, he went as an apprentice businessman to his uncle Michael Rice in Waterford in 1779 and while still a young man amassed considerable wealth, such was his flare for business.

his wife died tragically, leaving him with a retarded daughter Mary, whom he took care of with his sister's

Although his business was thriving he turned more and more towards God and the

poor of Waterford city.

He eventually abandoned his wealth and founded free schools for boys. Other young men followed his example and in 1808 Bishop Power allowed them to pronounce vows and under the

Married at the age of 23, care of the destitute and Bishop's guidance the Society of the Presentation was founded.

In 1820 Pope Pius VII granted recognition to Edmund and his followers as a pontifical institute — thus was founded the Congregation of Christian Brothers. In 1844 Edmund Rice died at Mount Sion, the first school he founded.


Over 150 years later the Brothers are continuing his work by providing Catholic education for youths and adults throughout Ireland and the world. Today the congregations he founded — Presentation and Christian Brothers — have 2,560 brothers working in over 30 countries, while in Ireland 60,000 students attend schools managed by the Brothers in special primary and secondary categories.

The formal cause of

Canonisation of Edmund Rice was opened in Dublin in 1961 and transferred to Rome in 1979.

Last week the Vatican approved the first stage in a process which could lead to Canonisation by declaring the founder of the two congregations to be "Venerable" recognising that he lived by the Gospel and practised Christian virtues to an heroic degree.

I refer to your letter of 31st March last concerning the provision of a bus shelter at Tallow for school

The erection of bus shelters is a costly undertaking and could only be justified where continuous use might be made of the facility throughout the day. Accordingly, the proposal to erect a bus shelter for school children would be difficult to justify as it would be in use at one period of the day only.

As well as some money, their wages included what were termed "perquisites" such as quarter of an acre of garden (potatoes) or perhaps more sometimes, a daily supply of milk (though some of these workers usually had two goats then) and a quarter ton of coal.

Probably when the cottage schemes came into being it changed the system, but Lady Day was a big day in the life of the migratory farm worker when he would be moving from one tenant's house to another with his wife and family and belongings. Stir sugar in pan over moderate heat until dissolved and caramel colour. Remove pan from heat at once and add water and vinegar (be careful, because liquid will cause sugar to boil up).

Return to heat and stir to dissolve caramel. Stir in stock. Cut orange peel into thin strips and add to liquid. Simmer for 20 minutes. Blend cornflour with or-

Blend cornflour with orange juice, stir into sauce, bring to boil and cook for 1 minute.

Fry onion in 1tbs oil until soft. Add mush-rooms and fry a further 2 minutes. Stir in parsley and seasoning. Flatten escalopes between two sheets of greaseproof paper. Divide mushroom mixture between escalopes, roll up and secure with cocktail sticks.

Fry in remaining oil for about 15 minutes turning occasionally. Reheat sauce and serve.

1993 Water Safety Awareness Campaign Begins

The Minister for Defence and the Marine, David Andrews, TD, has launched the 1993 Water Safety Awareness campaign, to coincide with the traditional commencement of the water leisure activity season.

Commenting on the increasing number of lives lost in boating tragedies every year, the Minister said that he was greatly concerned at the number of

such incidents which were attributable to a general lack of awareness of basic safety practice.

"The seas, lakes and rivers of Ireland are a magnificent natural resource and I am pleased by the extent to which they are used for boating, fishing and other leisure activities. But I'm afraid that our love of the water is not always matched by a sense of respect for its potential dangers," said the Minister.

This year's campaign will be a determined effort to raise public consciousness of the need for safety on the water. For the first time it will involve: an extensive advertising campaign on national and local radio; a Department of the Marine freephone service (1800 393 392) from Wednesday to Saturday of Easter Week, offering useful information and advice on water safety.

The awareness campaign will be intensified and extended later in the year through advertising, safety events, leaflets and posters.

"We must make the words "water" and "safety" synonymous in everyone's mind if we are to reduce the number of lives lost every year," Mr. Andrews said.

Never let a weed see a Sunday!

IT'S WAR! If you don't make that declaration now then garden weeds will have you on the run for the rest of the summer.

The only answer then is lots of weedkiller and tedious weeding and hoeing.

The former is not very 'green' and potentially hazardous to humans, pets and other plants, while excessive weeding and hoeing is just a waste of your gardening time.
Better to make a stand before April warmth allow weeds to 'dig in' for a long summer campaign.

CAREFULLY

In the case of tenacious weeds such as nettles and dandelions, carefully pull them out by hand when the soil is damp and weed roots have less to cling to.

Then use a stout hoe for beds, borders and the vegetable patch, for a few minutes every few days to keep the problem under control — remember the old country saying: 'Never let a weed see a Sunday.' If you must use weed killers — paths often need 'purging' — then try to be accurate with the applica-

tion. Either use a small hand spray or brush on a liquid or gel weedkiller.

Apart from hoeing you can also mulch to keep the weeds down.
Mulch is basically an inert organic material such as well-rotted garden compost, grass clippings, pulverised bark, weathered sawdust or even shredded newspaper.

Peat is often suggested but there is an argument about whether it is environmentally sound to change peatlands by cutting out what is also not a renewable resource.

Whatever your views, it is probably cheaper to use one of the previous alternatives.

Lay the mulch an inch deep around shrubs, bushes and small trees after a careful weeding. This layer will allow water and nourishment through to the plant roots, but weeds will be starved of light and

A mulch will also keep moisture in the soil at a time when, despite socalled April showers, weather records show we are entering a dry period of the year.



In fact, gardeners should start watering where necessary to ensure that vigorous early plant growth in the warmer weather is not held back by lack of moisture.

But beware too of late frosts. Delicate plants need protection using glass or plastic cloches or homemade 'tents' of hessian or polythene sheet.

Some risk can be avoided by choosing higher sites for frost-prone plants and using the garden's low-lying 'frost pockets' for tougher customers.

FROST DAMAGE
Fortunately, there is also a remedy to frost damage if you act before they are felled by contrasting day-time temperatures: water frosted plants with tepid water to bring their temperature to a level more compatible with the sunshine.

Another April tip is clipping ivy close to keep it tidy or from spreading further on walls. You can also trim holly, laurel, yew and box hedges and begin mowing the lawn more frequently — adding a soil conditioner after a thorough session will help it grow lush.







A 29 year old Dungarvan man was sent to jail for four years when he appeared be-fore Judge Esmonde Smyth at Waterford Circuit Criminal Court on eight charges involving burglaries, malicious damage and larceny.

Before the court was Joseph Coward, 56 Congress Villas, Dungarvan who faced the following list of charges:




came on the stroke of half time. Timmy Kiely was fouled on the left side of the area and the free kick by Michael Donnelly was inch perfect for Micheal

Matters From Congress

During the discussions on RTE and their contribution to Gaelic games, it was announced that the Sunday Game will be shown on 20 Sunday nights from May 1 up until the All-Ireland football final Sunday.

Both the under-21 hurling

and football All-Irelands will be shown live on tv this year (I understand that the high quality of the fare in last year's finals was a factor in bringing about this decision).

Last year a total of £800,000 was paid out in Accident Scheme Grants. Reference was made to the

number of bogus claims made against this scheme and club officials who handle the documents were asked to be vigilant in the matter.

In discussion, a motion re-lated to the "Buy Irish" campaign revealed that the ratio of imported goods sold in our shops was 60p in the £. Last year (1991) a total of 29 players were suspend-ed by the Games Administration Committee (National League and interprovincial championships). This year (1992) the number more than trebled to 97. Of the 97, a total of 52 were suspended for football offences and 10 for hurling. The other 35 were for a variety of other offences.

A motion which was referred to Central Council will open up a debate on the appointment of county coaches/managers from out-side counties. Many coun-ties are not happy about the inordinate delay in dealing with this matter and it is likely that pressure will be put on the committee now investigating the matter to finalise their recommendations. If the rumours concerning the huge payments to some of the top football coaches are right, it is high time that immediate action

be taken.

When Association President, Peter Quinn spoke about the achievements of 1992, he singled out Done-gal, Clare, Eire Og of Car-low and Waterford's minor and under-21 hurlers for special mention and referred to the under-21 All-Ireland as a hurling spectacular.

Speaking about the lack of matches at club level, he said 'if our games pro-gramme is centred round the availability of county team panellists, we will diminish the morale of the majority of our players, puncture their enthusiasm and ultimately lose their interest.'

County Team News

The news circulating around the county over the weekend was the decision of county senior hurling selector, Senan Cooke, Dunhill to retire from the selection committee. Senan has emphasised very clearly that his reasons are personal and in no way connected with the recent poor performances of the county team in the concluding matches of the league.

He had made his intentions known before Christmas but was prevailed upon to remain as part of the committee until after the league. Senan was a very astute selector and will not easily be replaced.

The selectors will meet this week to name a 24 man panel of players to go into training for the Munster championship game against Kerry at Walsh Park in June.

BALLYGUNNER V. PASSAGE

Last year, Passage were strong challengers for the title and their match against neighbours and rivals, Ballygunner, was one of the highlights of the championships and which was eventually won by Ballygunner at Dungarvan in November.

Ballygunner, the club with Ray Whitty, Nial Warren, Fergal Hartley, Stephen Frampton, Paul Power, Paul Flynn, Billy O'Sullivan, Darragh O'Sullivan, Sean Lyons and company will be favourites to retain their title for a fifth time. Passage went close but faded in the closing stages of their 1992 clash and eventually lost by 4-14 to 1-12. Ballygunner are the choice here.

MOUNT SION

LISMORE

This could have a Fraher Field setting but goes to Cappoquin on Sunday afternoon. It will be their first clash since the epic county final of 1991. They were seeded last year in the draw and Mount Sion again qualified for the county final, whereas the champions faded out before the concluding stages of the championships.

County minor goalkeeper, Alan Robinson, Under-21 captain Tony Browne, Brian Greene, Ger Fitzpatrick, Paraic Fanning, John Meaney, Shane Ahearne, Tom Browne, Peter Walsh, etc., will be included in the Monastery club's lineout and will provide very formidable opposition for the Western team whose side will include Seamus Prendergast who captained the champions in '91, Brendan O'Gorman, Sean and Paul Prendergast, Michael and Mark Sullivan, Declan Landers, Brian O'Gorman, Paddy O'Donnell who captained the county minor team last year, Brendan Lawton, Brendan Ormond, Dave Barry and company who will hope to make a successful start to a season which they hope will bring them back into the headlines as champions of 1993. There is a golden jubilee reason for Mount Sion to win. They won the senior hurling title in 1943. They are my

fancy to win here.

TALLOW V. DUNGARVAN

When they met in the 1991 championship, Tallow proved themselves to be the better team, but were not as good as the 4-9 to 0-10 scoreline seemed to indicate. Dungarvan have to an extent been involved in a clash of interests in attempting to win both the hurling and football senior titles in the same year.

Mount Sion achieved this distinction on four or five occasions around the middle of the century when championships were played on a knock-out system and we had less teams playing. With the pace and pressures of the presently structured championships this is now far more difficult and I doubt if it is within the compass of any of the present clubs to achieve.

Tallow were a bit unlucky to have missed out on a chance to play in the knock-out stages last year and if reports that they have organised themselves a bit better this year are true, then they could get the two points in this one.

BALLYDUFF V. DUNHILL

Both these teams will have suffered from retirements and will be at long odds in the betting for the championship title. Both are renowned battlers and their rating with the gamblers won't prove a deterrent to their ambitions to win every game. This is the kind of spirit that has kept many a club alive.

Ballyduff had five points to spare when they clashed at Dungarvan last year, 2-12 to 1-10, but a few of their stalwarts having retired, it is impossible to assess the chances of either one. It's an open game, but maybe the Cappoquin venue will help Ballyduff to get off on a winning note.

COLLIGAN V. PORTLAW

Both will be playing hurling for the first time in Leamybrien which will be the venue for quite a number of hurling games this season. This will be a close contest Jimmy Beresford led intermediate county champions, Colligan having another try at winning a senior title. They didn't fare all that well when playing in the grade a few years back, but are a more mature team now. I don't believe that they will win the championship (I believe the same about a number of other teams also), but I do expect to see them fare better this time. Portlaw did very well in getting to the knockout stages last year and are an

improving team with lots of good talent coming to maturity. They will be a big force in club hurling within a short time and might even do well this year. I think they will win here.

ST. SAVIOURS V. DE LA SALLE

Another local derby game that is sure to be contested vigorously and with not a lot between them at the end. They met last year and Saviours had eight points (4-8 to 0-12) to spare after a game that was very much in the balance until the final ten minutes.

The Tony Corcoran led St. Saviours might again come out on top but they will do well to remember that De La Salle are on the way back as a hurling force in this grade.

INTERMEDIATE CHAMPIONSHIPS

Running this championship in conjunction with the senior hurling is a very good idea as it helps to ease possible confusion in clubs who have to play hurling and football on alternate weekends. There are a number of attractive clashes in prospect and hurling fans will be well entertained if they select the right venue.

ST. MARYS V. CLONEA

Clonea having been relegated from senior status following their poor showing in '91, were strong favourites to win the intermediate title last year and were certainly heading in that direction until they came up against a rampant Colligan outfit in the final. They will again be strongly fancied this year. When they played St. Marys at Fraher Field in the first round last year they were helped by a couple of lucky goals in beating off an unexpected challenge. They won the match by 4-7 to 1-9, but there wasn't all that much difference between them. They will probably win here again but it might be even closer.

TRAMORE V.

The same teams met exactly a year ago in the first round in Stradbally and all the other intermediate teams in the county got worried when the result came through. It read Cappoquin 4-8, Tramore nil. The winners didn't turn out to be the wonder team which the scoreline indicated but as the championship progressed Tramore fared very poorly and the onesidedness of the Stradbally game became understandable. Cappoquin might not find it as easy again but they will be expected to come, home

with the points again on Saturday night.

STRADBALLY V. AN RINN

This will be a good one and if it is a re-run of their 1992 meeting on May 5 when they each ended up with 2-6, it will be an hour of very exciting hurling. For days after that game, players from the Gaeltacht club were asking themselves why they failed to score after being given so many fine chances.

Both clubs won their next match but were run out of the championship later. Both will be in contention for a good distance in the championship this year but they have yet to prove worthy of inclusion on the short list for the title. An Rinn may start slight favourites here. This game will be played at Fraher Field.

ABBEYSIDE V. BALLYDURN

Ballydurn failed to win a game in the championship last year but will not accept that they were beaten by Erin's Own after the controversial score of 1-9 to 1-8 gave the points against them. Abbeyside scored a very big win against Ballydurn and had fourteen points to spare at the end of their second round match last year.

Abbeyside will be compelled to field without a few of their 1992 team and will not find it as easy in getting to the semi-final stage where they went out of the championship last season when losing to Clonea at Kill. Little is known about Ballydurn this year but no one could be so foolish as to write off a side led by Peter Queally and Michael Hubbard without seeing them in action this year.

Abbeyside will be favourites and must be fancied.

SHAMROCKS V. BALLYSAGGART

Setting out in quest of an intermediate county title, the new junior champions, Ballysaggart, would welcome a less formidable oposition than Shamrocks for their baptism of fire in the higher grade. Ballysaggart were the most popular winners of the junior championship in a long number of years, but now in rougher waters won't find the going all that easy until they have played a few matches. I have no doubt but that they will give a very good account of themselves, without beating Shamrocks who have been doing well, but not well enough in this grade over the years. They were beaten (Shamrocks)

by Mollerans, Clonea and Cappoquin last year, but had a couple of good wins against St. Marys and Tramore. This is a game that many followers would wish to see as I'm sure it will be one of the weekend thrillers. Shamrocks are given a hesitant vote.

ST. MOLLERANS V. ERIN'S OWN

There cannot be a lot between these sides, both of whom fared disappointingly last year. Mollerans were the more consistent of the two and may just about take the points.

Waterford v. Limerick At Walsh Park

It seems such a short time since we won the Under-21 All-Ireland hurling title, and now, almost suddenly, we find ourselves faced with the threat of surrendering it before the new season is really underway. That threat faces us at Walsh park on Friday evening next when we take on Limerick in what is expected to be a very tough and close encounter.

Wearing the tag of All-Ireland champions puts that little bit of extra pressure on the county, even though a good number of our top players have gone from the panel because of the age qualification.

Having to play on "foreign" territory will also prove a motivating factor for Limerick who last week defeated Tipperary in what they both treated as a fullscale dress rehearsal for the championship. Three years ago Waterford lost to Limerick by a point in extra time in the Munster minor league and in the same year we lost to Cork by 6-14 to 4-11 in the championship at Walsh Park. Both Limerick and Waterford will have a number of the 1990 minors in action here on Friday evening. The Waterford selection will include a number of last year's team and a number of promoted minor players.

The team was due to be named on Monday night and while there is the usual speculation about placings, we must leave it until the selectors have deliberated and made their final choice.

The panel includes many

names that have now become familiar to supporters because of their involvement at either minor or under-21 level. These include Tony Browne, Owen Dunphy, Anthony Fitzgerald, Michael Hubbard, Kevin McGrath, Fergal Hartley, Kieran O'Gorman, Michael Dunford, Paddy O'Donnell, Paul Foley, Paul Flynn, James O'Connor, Damien Cliffe, Tom Feeney, Seamus Keating, Pat Harnan, Colum Cunningham, etc.

MINOR HURLING

Admiration And Disappointment As Champions Go Down

CORK 2-12, WATERFORD 0-12

While there is no virtue in defeat, the hearts of the huge crowd of supporters from Waterford at Páirc Uí Caoimh on Wednesday night last went out to the fifteen players who played themselves to a standstill against a splendid Cork side who are now favourites to take the provincial title.

There was very little between the teams standardwise or in the matter of fitness and courage and the feeling was pretty general after the game that had the match been played at a neutral venue, then Waterford could have won or shared the spoils on the night. Pairc Ui Caoimh certainly meant a few scores for the home side who had trained there under the direction of all-star Jimmy Barry Murphy. We cannot complain on that score as I am sure that Cork could respond that Walsh Park meant something to Waterford last year when we pipped them in the under-21 semi-final. But it must be written that the surface of the pitch at the Cork stadium is not all that it should be and it certainly did not lend itself to ground hurling — a skill on which there had been a lot of concentration by the Waterford team in their months of training. I don't want to give the idea that there are any sour grapes in our match report, as Cork are a fine side and were just about deserving of their win and which did not look to be on the cards until the final ten minutes.

After the game it was nice and consoling to see the crowd give the players a standing ovation and to hear our very loyal and dedicated supporters express their admiration and praise of the skill and courage of our players who, in spite of their disappointment, must feel proud of their contribution to a great game of top-class minor hurling.

Once again a huge crowd of Waterford supporters travelled to Pairc Ui Caoimh and made their presence heard throughout the game. It meant something to the players who responded magnificently and played themselves to a standstill in a courageous effort to save the day and the title which they won after a replay against Tipperary at the same venue last July.

There was no breeze of any consequence and the game began with Waterford playing into the Blackrock end goal. It was just ten

minutes on when Cork had the first of those eleven first half wides, but from the puck-out Waterford at-tacked and Tony Carroll recorded our first score and we had our second point two minutes later when Dwain Moore sent over the first of his five points to leave Waterford 0-2 to nil in front in the 4th minute. Cork had a series of wides. Tremendous covering by our backs affected the accuracy of the Cork forwards, otherwise a number of their shots could have been scores. When Cork opened their account against the champions in the 11th minute, Eoin Coleman was the scorer of their point from a free. Ironically, Eoin, who was their top scorer on the night, has very strong Waterford connections. He is grandson of Mrs. Josie and the late Mick Curley, Tallow who was Waterford's net minder in our first senior All-Ireland final appearance in 1938.

The same player had Cork level in the 13th minute and it was he who edged them in front with another pointed free in the 15th. Cork had two further wides before our first over came from the stick of Fergal O'Brien. In the 23rd minute Cork struck for the first of their two goals when corner forward J. O'Flynn met a rebound and blasted the ball to the net to stretch their lead to four points, but Dwain Moore brought one back with a very well taken score in the 24th minute. Brendan Ormond pointed and in the remaining minutes the sides exchanged points per Dwaine Moore and Kieran Morrissey for Cork. This left the half-way tally: Cork 1-4, Waterford

The second half was to see the match decided by the wonderful goalkeeping of Cork's Brian Hurley who must have been inspired to save the three rocket-like shots that denied Waterford what should have been certain scores. Moore and Sullivan pointed for Waterford in the first five minutes and the sides were level at 1-4 to 0-7 and the match was now being fought out at a blistering pace and the Wa-

terford roar becoming dominant in the 3,000 crowd. Coleman was again on the mark and Cork were one up but Tony Carroll rectified the situation and we were level again in the 8th minute.

Full forward Kieran Morrissey put the home team back in front with a fine point, but at the other end, our full-forward Darragh O'Sullivan brought one back to make it level pegging in the 10th. Morrisson pointed for Cork and Dwaine Moore brought one back to make it again level pegging in the 12th. Pressure from the Waterford backs made scoring difficult for Cork who shot over three successive wides midway through this half. Then came disaster for Waterford when Cork's Sean McGrath found himself standing alone on the edge of the square to receive a ball which he shot to the Waterford net for their second goal. Within a minute Brian Hurley brought off his second great save for Cork.

In the 25th minute only two points separated the sides (2-8 to 0-12) and the exchanges became hectic, with both sides fighting for their lives and throwing caution to the wind. In the final minutes Waterford yielded a little to the soft underfoot conditions and tired. Cork's final two points came in time added on to leave the final score: Cork 2-12, Waterford 0-12.

As I have written, every-one of our 15 players can hold their heads high and feel proud of their contribution to a thriller that will be remembered for a long time. Alan Robinson cleared some great balls and could not be blamed for the two which passed him. Seamus O'Connor, Liam Patridge and Anthony Kirwan in the full back line and John J. Ronayne, Ger Harris and Alan Kelly in the half back line all gave a very good account of themselves, with Harris in particular being outstanding and was our man of the match on the night. Dwain Moore and his partner Fer-gal O'Connor both played exceptionally well against Cork's Pascal Sweeney and

Tim Coffey at centre field. Four of our six forwards shared in the scoring, but all six, Barry Walsh, David Burns, Derek McGrath, Brendan Ormond, Darragh O'Sullivan and Tony Carroll tried their hearts out and could not be faulted for the goals that were saved.

I cannot pass from the game without complimenting the five selectors, Jim Greene, Eddie Cunningham, Pat Tyler Walsh, Jack Laffin and Billy O'Neill on their great work done with the panel in the two years in which they have been in control and on lifting our standards in this grade. It goes without saying that all the members of the panel will be seen many times again wearing the county

County Hurlers' Spineless Non Efforts

A chara,

Since Christmas, I have travelled on four occasions to see Waterford's hurlers in action. Including entrance charges, petrol, meals and a couple of pints, I reckon that I have run up a bill of close on one hundred pounds as a result. I know of entire families who have been at all these games, and for whom the cost must have been considerably more than this. What we have got in return for this expenditure have been three spineless non-efforts in Croke Park, Cappoquin and last Sunday in Thurles against Cork, and one struggling victory against a mediocre Dublin side the previous Sunday.

Most of the large number of supporters who attend all these games have also contributed handsomely, in many ways, to financing the ford team. I think it is about time that we demanded value for money. A lot of expense has been incurred in obtaining the services of a coach whose job is to inculcate skills and craft among the players. Last Sunday against Cork it looked as though most of the players had not handled a hurley since Christmas. They lacked the basics of ball control and repeatedly took the wrong options when in possession.

We are also supposed to

have secured the services this year of a specialist physical trainer. Far too many of the team last Sunday were out of condition, with several clearly carrying excess weight. Then there are the four selectors who also cost money, and who are supposed to put their collective hurling experience into effect in making their selectorial decision. I wonder if they fully realise the extent to which they have been reduced to a laughing stock by their recent series of weird decisions. A random selection includes:

(i) The placing of Damien Byrne at centre forward against Clare;

(ii) The selection of Sean Daly at corner forward against Dublin;

against Dublin;
(iii) Having Shane Ahern
run up and down the sideline like and idiot for virtually the whole of extra time
against Dublin, while the
exhausted Johnny Brenner
and Pat Walsh, who had
been reduced to passengers,
played out the game in the
corner forward positions;

(iv) Not giving a third substitute a run when the team was being annihilated by Cork.

One wonders, if the selectors are the subject of such mockery by the supporters, how they are regarded among the players? What I found much more alarming last Sunday was the way

the players were being ridiculed by the Waterford supporters all around me. I have seen Waterford hurlers being hammered many times before, but this is the first time I have experienced such a level of contempt among their own supporters. This is not good for hurling in the county.

I have heard it said that the Waterford management did not wish to put too much emphasis on the league this year, as they want to concentrate on the championship. If this is true, then it would have been nice if they announced it in public, which would have enabled me to save both my pride and money. More disturbing are the rumours of internal dissent in the camp. The huge drop in the level of performance

compared with the pre-Christmas period certainly seems to bear this out.

It is the responsibility of the management to ensure that all the best players are available, and that all are united in the common goal of furthering the cause of Waterford hurling. For a start, Pat Curran should be brought back onto the panel and the Johnny Brenner "problem" should be re-solved. If the team management are incapable of discharging this responsibility, then they will have betrayed the trust of some of the most loyal supporters to be found anywhere.
