£1.64 Million Allocated For 1993 Housing **Construction Programme** For Co. Waterford

Local housing authorities have been notified by the Minister for the Environment Mr. Michael Smith, T.D. and Minister of State Mr. Emmet Stagg, T.D. of the financial allocations for their 1993 housing programmes.

The allocations total £94.7 million, an increase of £28.2 million or over 42% on the corresponding allocations for 1992 and will fund programmes including housing residential caravan parks for travellers, remedial works to existing local authority houses and the provision of bathrooms.

A sum of £818,000 has been allocated to Waterford Co. Council for housing construction while Dungarvan Urban Council has been allocated £229,000 for housing construction, £50,000 for the provision of caravan parks for travellers; £500,000 for remedial works and £50,000 for the bathrooms programme.

This brings the total allo-cation under the 1993 programme for Co. Waterford to £1,647,000.

Master McGrath died of pneumonia on Christmas Eve 1872 in Lurgan, Co. Armagh. During his short life he lifted the spirits of the Irish people in a time

In 1870 he was entered for a third time and he suffered his only defeat when he ran onto the frozen river Alt and went straight through the ice into the freezing waters and was nearly drowned. He was in such a miserable state that Lurgan vowed he would never run him again. However, in 1871 he returned and won the Waterloo Cup for a record third time and became a worldwide

The Civil War — **More Buildings** Burned

In early August the Free State Troops approached Dungarvan from Waterford. This blowing up of the bridges at Ballyvoile was one strategy used by the I.R.A. to impede that advance. The Republicans also evacuated from the barracks at Dungarvan Castle and set fire to all the buildings therein.

The Republicans also let it be known that they intended to burn the Coastguard Station at Ballinacourty where the Marines had been stationed during the War of Independence. Forcible representations were made to the I.R.A. to spare these buildings but to no avail. It was stated that the burning of the coastguard dwellings was a military necessity and hence they were burned on August 9, 1922. Only the walls and chimneys remained intact as can be seen from the photograph. This

building was later renovated by Dungarvan Golf Club and was their clubhouse for many years until it was accidentally burned down a few years ago.

The troops of the Free State Army entered Abbeyside and Dungarvan on the 16th August, 1922. The Republicans had evacuated completely beforehand and the people of the area were relieved when the expected battle did not come off.




Photo shows Ballinacourty Coastguard Station Burned

ROMANIAN BOUND

A County Waterford student is planning to travel to Romania this summer to put her speech therapy skills to work in an orphanage in the east of the country. Pictures of Romanian babies and children in orphanages after the fall of the Ceaucescu regime prompted many Irish families to adopt babies and to support charities which aimed at improving conditions in the many orphanages there.

Now Fiona Hegarty of Kilmacomma, Clonmel, hopes to be among the latest Irish volunteers to travel to Romania with the Dublinbased organisation "Babies of Romania" which runs two orphanages there.

Fiona is a final year speech therapy student at Trinity College, Dublin and intends to go to Romania with four fellow graduates after completing her exams in the summer, probably on July 5.

She needs to raise £800 to cover her travel expenses, her keep during the six to eight weeks she will spend at the orphanage in Necorosti and for vaccinations that she will need.

She plans to raise some of

the money at college but children, which Fiona and will also be hoping for support in Clonmel and she is beginning her fundraising efforts with a sponsored cycle during the next couple of weeks. Fiona decided to volunteer for the work in Romania after hearing a lecture in college from another volunteer who had just returned from there and where she heard that speech therapists were needed. She had always been interested in voluntary work.

There are 125 children in the orphanage in Nicoresti, many are orphans while others are handicapped children whose parents are unable to take care of them, or children whose parents cannot afford to look after them. Conditions in the orphanage are poor. It is crowded with no running water and limited electricity, and Fiona will experience very warm weather conditions when she arrives there in July.

The children need basic care as well as stimulation. Recently a speech therapist spent some time at the orphanage and started a programme of assessing all the other therapists hope to continue. She will learn some of the basics of the language on tape and will pick up more when she arrives in Romania.

The majority of the children themselves, aged between 18 months and 16 years, do not have high levels of language because they have been so institutionalised.

DONGWAN MARKES FOR

First Visit Of Asgard To "Dúngarbhán Na

A note from Donal Walsh, Dungarvan advises us that subject to weather and tidal conditions permitting, the Sail Training Vessel Asgard will make her first visit to Dungarvan on Friday next, April 23 and will remain in the harbour for approximately 24 hours during which she will be open to the public.

She will be skippered by Captain Tom MacCarthy of Cork who has given her ETA (estimated time of arrival) at Dungarvan Quay as 1800 hours which is approximately the time of high water in the harbour.

Asgard is owned by the State and is involved in the Sail Training Scheme operated by Coiste an Asgard. Under this scheme young people over 16 years of age are given the opportunity to go to sea on a traditionally rigged sailing ship. While on board they learn much about the sea and sailing and of course about themselves and their companions as during a cruise the trainees live together in the confined space of the vessel and share the many tasks and activities associated with the running of a sailing ship.

Every year from early Spring to late Autumn, Asgard carries out a programme of cruises' each of one to three weeks duration. Most involve visits to ports in Britain and France but during the Summer Asgard visits many more ports in Northern European waters and usually participates in the International Races of sail training vessels. Occasionally there are voyages to more distant shores. In 1985 Asgard visited the US and in 1988 she participated in the Australian Bicentenary celebrations 'done under.

On this the first visit of Asgard to Dungarvan, it is of interest to note the historic background of the original Asgard, a gaff rigged ketch, designed and built in Norway in 1905 which was the wedding pre-sent of Dr. and Mrs. Hamilton Osgood of Boston, USA to their daughter Mary on her marriage to Erskine Childers, father of the late President Childers. The name Asgard is an old Norse word meaning "Home of the Gods."

In 1914, Asgard with Er-skine and Mary Childers and four others on board, sailed to the North Sea to collect a cargo of guns which had been bought in Hamburg for the Irish Volunteers. After a difficult voyage the cargo was landed at Howth on July 26, 1914. Asgard was sold by Mrs. Childers in 1926 and passed through several

hands before being pur-chased by the Irish Government in 1961 because of her historical associations.

The new Asgard, a beautiful brigantine was designed specially for sail training purposes by the late Jack Tyrell and built in Arklow and commissioned there by former Taoiseach, Charles J. Haughey on March 7, 1981. This should put readers in

the picture when Asgard makes her maiden visit to Dúngarbhán na Seana-Bhád Seolta on Friday next and let us pray that conditions will be favourable enough to enable the visit to take

Who Are Our Champion Whingers!

Someone asked the other day during a private discussion on the present economic conditions in the country who the top whingers in our society were and the consensus was that the farming organisations were the champions but only a short head in front of the teacher trade unions.

There is no week that we don't hear the farmers complaining — even though the Central Statistics Office have stated that farming incomes have gone up by 16 per cent.
All last week the daily news-

papers carried detailed reports from conferences held in different parts of the country by the INTO, the ASTI and TUI. There were stories about teachers suffering from stress, about burnt-out teachers who sought to have their teaching activities reduced to 22 hours per week, and about teachers who were unable to cope with the pressures they had to deal with.

On reading all these reports one might be forced to wonder if teachers were the only people affected by stress. However, there's stress in every job and, worse still, can there be any greater stress than that brought about by unemployment and inability to get work which is, unfortunately, so commonplace nowadays. Even if teachers are as

stressed as they claim they are, they have, unlike the rest of us, plenty of holidays in which to recover!

And while on these problems enunciated at the various trade union teacher conferences last week we heard no comments on the results of that recent survey carried out by 150 leading Irish employaccording to which the vast majority of schoolleavers cannot communicate properly in writing. The survey carried out for the Irish Business and Employers' Confederation (IBEC) revealed that only one in every 10 employers was satisfied with the current standards of "written communication skills" of school-leavers. Isn't this a rather serious comment on our education system and something that should command more urgent attention than the effects the present teaching regime is alleged to have on those engaged in the profession.

What About Our Nesting Birds?

Passing through the countryside in recent weeks we noticed a good deal of roadside hedge cutting going on. It struck us that now that we're into the bird-nesting and hatching season it is not a very appropriate time for this type of activity.

This is the time of the year that our little feathered friends need peace and quiet as they build their nests in the hedgerows and not have the process of nature disrupted by the mechanical hedge trimming ma-

Perhaps it is a job that might be carried our earlier in future years before the bird-nesting season com-

"I was very surprised at the numbers who turned up at the meeting and, more importantly, offered to help", says Festival Director Jan Van Putten. Following the meeting, a small committee was set up and names were taken of all present who will be contacted nearer the Festival to become involved in staging what promises to be an exciting and colourful Festival.

The three days in Lismore will be packed with music from the Middle Ages, the Renaissance and the Baroque - not only in the cathedral and in the beautiful Glencairn Abbey, but also on the streets and in the pubs. The school children have not been forgotten ei-

The Douglas Gunn Ensemble are prepared to visit schools in the area to give a concert specially geared to young people and Douglas will explain the various instruments, outlining their

There will be three main concerts in Lismore Cathedral. The concert on Friday 18th June will be given by the Douglas Gunn Ensemble. The Saturday features Malcom Proud and Susan O'Regan, harpsichord, and the Cork Consort with music by Johann Sebastian Bach. The final concert on Sunday will be given by the Lismore Choir with six vocal soloists and orchestra. They perform "Music for the Kings of France", with Campra's moving Requiem as the main work.

TRALEE C.B.S. BOYS CHOIR

On Thursday last 15th April Lismore Cathedral was the centre stage for Tralee C.B.S. Boys Choir who gave a recital before a large and appreciative audience. The choir consisting of 28 boys were on a short Easter tour and earlier in the afternoon gave a recital at Mt. Melleray. The boys stayed over night in Lismore in the homes of parents of primary boys at Lismore C.B.S. before continuing their tour the following day to Cahir Castle.

The Choir was formed in 1982 by its conductor, Aidan O'Carroll, M. A., B. Mus. Presently there are 28 boys ranging in age from 10 to 14 years.

The boys have performed at secular and sacred functions at home and in Europe.

Their repertoire of over 80 pieces is performed entirely from memory in Latin, Irish, English, German and French. The choir have performed at the International Choral Festival in Neerpelt, Belgium and in Antwerp Cathedral, and in Douai, in France. In January 1990 they sang High Mass in St. Peters Basilica and sang for the Holy Father. Closer to home, the boys have performed Benjamin Britten's Missa Brevis in D in Liverpool, Dublin, Tuam and Galway.

At Christmas in 1989 the choir sang on the Gay Byrne's "Late Late" television Show and in recent weeks they sang on Gay Byrne radio programme, which was broadcast live from 100ft below the ground in Crag Cave in Castleisland, Co. Kerry. In July 1992 the boys performed with distinction in Westminster Abbey, Westminster Cathedral, Canterbury

Cathedral, St. James's Piccadilly and St. Martin-in-the-Fields. Many of the boys are proficient at various musical instruments.

The Choir is also in regular demand for Weddings and other functions. The Choir is run by an elected Committee and the boys themselves help funding by doing sponsored walks over the Kerry mountains to Dingle. Charitable performances are also given. The Choir has hosted "Les Petits Chanteurs de Douai", "Antwerps Kathedraalkoor", "Kölner Domchor", Kilkenny C.B.S. Boys Choir and North Monastery Boys Choir of Cork. Plans are afoot for a tour to France in 1994.

Tralee-born, Aidan O'Carroll, studied music at University College, Cork, under Dr. Aloys Fleischmann and was the first male graduate awarded First Class Honours in the Department's History. He later took a Masters Degree in Composition.

Since returning to Tralee, he has established four choirs, for whom he has written many works. In 1981 he established the Kerry School of Music which now caters for over one thousand students annually. Out of this school have come three orchestras, two choirs and numerous ensembles and soloists.

He has been very active as a promoter of concerts, masterclasses, summerschools and enjoys a very busy schedule as producer, accompanist and soloist and, above all, teacher. His stage productions include My Fair Lady, H.M.S. Pinafore, Fiddler on the Roof, The King and I and The Sound of Music.

Nicholls, Choirmaster and Organist of St. FinBarre's Cathedral in Cork will give an organ recital, the Choir of St. Mary's, Cork, will sing during Mass in St. Carthage's Church and there will be an Evensong in Lismore Cathedral with the choir of St. FinBarre's Cathedral, also from Cork.

One of the highlights of the Festival will be a staged 17th century wedding on the Sunday. This pageant will start at Lismore Castle and finish outside of Lismore Cathedral on the Mall. Plans are afoot to have eighteen Morris Dancers present from England, trumpeters and recorder players from Waterford, town criers and, of course, all the "wedding guests" will be in cos-tume. On the Mall an Arts and Craft Fair will take place, with a floral show and an exhibition of "early" musical instruments and it is planned to offer visitors to Lismore the choice of a variety of hot and cold food which can be eaten on the Mall while enjoying the free entertainment.

None of this could take place without the active help and support of the Lismore Dramatic Society who will be urging just about every resident to get into costume. The food is being taken care of by yet another committee and in the coming two months all the planning will knit together into one big Festival.

"We are still looking for some sponsors", explains Jan, "particularly one or two companies who are prepared to sponsor one of the main concerts of the Festival".

Jan is loud in his praise for the practical help he and his committee have already received from the Lismore Heritage and Experience companies, the West Waterford Development Partnership Ltd. and promises of help from the Waterford County Manager. 



PILGRIMAGE





The demolition of the former Quigley Magnesite Plant at Ballinacourty, Dungarvan is going head at full sped at present and our photographer was on hand to record the end of one of the biggest features of the plant — the giant oil storage tank — which stood at the extremity of the plant site close to the Ballinacourty Lighthouse which can be seen in all of the pictures.

The storage tank soared to a height of 90 feet (see man bending at base to right of first picture for comparison) and when the plant was operating to full power in the 1970's, had a capacity to hold one million gallons of oil.

Messrs. John Loftus, Plant Hire, Civil Engineering and Demolition Contractors, Cork, who have been engaged to clear the site, tackled the job of removing the giant structure by first cutting around the base and then splitting the tank in

the giant structure by first cutting around the base and then splitting the tank in halves. Steel hawsers which had been affixed to the top were then attached to JCB's and first, one half of the huge fuel container was pulled down, followed by the other, half. Thus, one of the main features that silhouetted the Quigley Plant on the seafront at Ballinaeourty-for ever-20 years has disappeared.

in breadcrumbs and season with salt and pepper. Fill apples with mixture and put round joint. Bake for 40 sbasting once with pan juices from the pork.

FARMING LEADER

EC Must Improve Animal Health Protection Measures

Waterford IFA Animal Health Committee Chairman, Ned Murphy, said that the EC Standing Veterinary Committee must close off all the veterinary loopholes which allowed the dreaded foot-andmouth disease to be imported into Italy.

Mr. Murphy welcomed the decision of the European Commission to ban all im-

ports of live animals, meat, milk and dairy produce from the Eastern European countries until May 7, 1993 as a temporary safeguard measure.

Mr. Murphy added "the foot-and-mouth disease is still spreading in Southern Italy, with two more confirmed cases in the last week, even though movement controls have been re-

inforced in the sixteen provinces where the disease has been confirmed."

He said the EC Veterinary Fund must be immediately increased to enable adequate veterinary controls to be implemented throughout the Community in the fight against animal diseases which cause economic losses to farmers.

Changing Times

Changing economic conditions in the Farm Machinery Trade have imposed serious hardships on dealers. Coupled with a contracting market, they have to cope with the high costs of spares stocking and of labour.

Traditionally many farmers looked to the Trade for long credit terms and in the past, under different conditions, some firms were in a position to wait until the "harvest cheque" came in.

This is no longer the case and The Farm Tractor and

Machinery Trade Association say that farmers may expect to find dealers unable to provide extended credit terms, particularly if they also expect the trade to continue to provide the service so essential to the farming community.

Putting plants on the pill

YOUR fading spring flowers could benefit from an aspirin pick-me-up!
An old wives' tale? Perhaps, but many people swear that dropping an aspirin into vase water will extend the life span of 'daffs', tulips and other cut flowers.
One theory is that the drug closes the pores of cut plants and prevents water

Whatever, the reason, there are many people who will try it — after the bleak winter months we cut or buy lots of blooms to bring some colour into the home.

Unfortunately, even if you have turned the central heating off or left the fires unlit, this breath of spring is quickly spent unless you can help out.

One obvious way is to avoid cutting or buying tired-looking stems or fully open blooms in the first place.

Other ideas can sound like a leg-pull but here are some tips:

• Angled Cuts — cutting the stems at an angle definitely helps because the stem then rests on a point, allowing more water to be drawn up by the stem than if it is cut at right-angles and rests flat on the base of the vase.

 Clean Cuts — use a sharp knife or secateurs rather than scissors and you do less damage to the stem fibres and allow more water to be drawn up to the blooms.

It does, of course, make nonsense of traditional advice that you should pulverise and crush the base of the stems to improve water flow. This actually impedes water



flow and encourages slime to grow and make matters worse. THEORY

 Bleach! — a bit drastic perhaps but the theory is that a teaspoonful per vase will restrict the production of gas given off by some cut flowers such as

carnations.

Feeding — there is strong evidence that feeding can help and there are sachets and tubs of powder on the market which feed or preserve cut flowers while reducing slime and smells building up in the water.

Sweeten The Dose — as one of the usual ingredients in the above 'plant elixirs' is sugar, I'm inclined to believe that they actually act as a preservative for the flowers.

So, why not save some money and simply add sugar to the vase water. One lump or spoonful should do! However, whichever method you favour to try you will have to dispose of your faded blooms and there is one sure method of extending their useful life even then — by not binning them but adding them to the compost heap.

They will quickly break down and become useful compost for new plants and blooms to come. Arthur Hines





Seven Senior Football Games Down For Decision

The action swings to football over the coming weekend when fourteen of the fifteen senior club teams will be in action in first round matches. All but one of the seven will be played at Western venues and even though development work has not yet begun, Fraher Field is not included on the list of venues published. Stradbally is the only venue with a double-header. Two matches are fixed for Learnybrien on Sunday but one is in the afternoon and one in the evening. There may be an explanation for

DUNGARVAN v DUNHILL

This is the first of the two matches at Stradbally on Sunday afternoon and should see the county champions get off to a win-ning start for their ambitious four-in-a-row as their opponents, Dunhill are more than a shade behind in football standards. Their meeting at the same venue on June 6 last year when the champions won by a single goal (1-10 to 0-10) after a great Dunhill effort, would seem to contradict such a rating, but Dungarvan had a casual approach to this game. They will meet the challenge with a changed attitude here and should come back with the points.

RATHGORMACK v. **CLASHMORE**

This is listed as the feature game at the venue (Stradbally) and patrons will have a chance of seeing how both the county finalists have reered from the epic earlier in the year. Rathgormack play Clashmore and they will also line out as favourites, even though Clashmore are not a side to be written off all that easily. Last year at Fraher Field. Rathgormack had six points to spare at the finish (1-11 to 0-8) but I can recall the game being far closer than it seemed on the scoreboard. I don't expect Clashmore to start off their campaign with a shock result, but there won't be a lot in it at the finish.

KILMACTHOMAS v. THE NIRE

This will be one of the most open matches of the entire week-end and the result can go either way. There has never been a lot between them and both play a lively and attractive brand of football. Both have a number of county players on their side and both, according to reports have prepared well for the game. So it should be a good one and a very close contest also. What a pity that this is clashing with so many others.

KILROSSANTY v. GAULTIER

This is the only senior match listed for an Eastern venue so it will command good support in that area of the county. Kilrossanty are by tradition slow to take off in the championship and don't turn on the style until the season is underway. Doing things this way has had the Comeragh Club in trouble on a couple of occasions when they found themselves having to catch up on the points table. Having won the under 21 county championship only a couple weeks ago, they find themselves a little more prepared than usual and able to take to the field the fitter team. On the last occasion on which they met, Kilrossanty won on the rather odd scoreline of 4-11 to 1-11. They must be given the vote to win here.

BUTLERSTOWN v. AFFANE

This is one of a number of games that should be fitted n at Fraher Field. No of fence to Abbeyside field which is in excellent condition, but is not yet railed. As far as I can recall these are the only teams who have not met in a senior football championship before. Affane are the county intermediate champions and while they are unlikely to win the senior title this year, they are a very committed young side who can make an impression. I believe that Butlerstown won only one match in the championship last year and didn't impress me out the way I am predicting,

Principals of Microchem are husband and wife team, Dr. Ciaran Geoghegan, M.Sc. and Ph.D. Thesis at the Pasteur Institute in Paris and Dr. Anita Geoghegan who has a Doctorate in microbiology and experience in areas of hygiene and disease control in food and pharmaceutical industries.

COMPANY BACKGROUND

Dr. Anita Geoghegan received her doctorate in mi-crobiology in 1983. While preparing for her doctorate she established a consultancy geared to the emerging fish farming industry in the area of hygiene and disease control. On completion of her studies she joined O'Reilly's Irish Foods as Operations Manager. Due to family commitments she resigned this position in 1986 and set up, from home, a microbiology screening business. The business grew such that in 1989 she moved to commercial premises in Dungarvan and began the process of attaining ILAB accreditation - an internationally recognised lab standard and one which was increasingly in demand from her clients. In 1991 a limited company - Microchem Laboratories (Ireland) Ltd — was estab-lished and she and her husband began putting in place the elements of a development plan.

Significant progress has been achieved and the com-pany now employs 13 and expected to rise to 30 over the next three years. Over £1m in sales are projected from their existing client base coupled with displac-ing identified products and services which are currently being imported from abroad and by competing internationally for contract lab work and the supply of bacteriological media.
