School Board Of Management \ Not Meet

The Board of Management of St. Joseph's Primary School in Dungarvan has turned down a request from the local Urban Council for a meeting to discuss the possibility of acquiring a strip of the school's playing ground for development as

a new parish graveyard.
In a letter to this week's Council meeting signed by the Chairman, Fr. C. Kelly, C.C. and the Secretary, Mr. Maurice Kearney, the Board of Management has pointed out that the land used by the school as a playing area is vital to both the school and to the young

people of the area.
"In the light of this we feel that any meeting concerning the rezoning of the land is inappropriate," the letter continues. "Nonetheless, we wish to thank the UDC for its kind invitation but we think any such meeting would be futile, though we hope that we can continue to work together in the future.'

The Chairwoman, Cllr. Nuala Ryan, told her colleagues that she and the Town Clerk had had a meeting with the Parish Priest of Dungarvan about the whole question of the provision of a new graveyard. She believed it to have been a very fruitful meeting and she would report more fully on it to the May meeting of the Council.

Clir. Ryan added that there are still grave spaces available in Dungarvan for up to the next three or four years.

The Dept. of the Environment has made provision for a further expenditure of £0.5m this year on the continuation of the refurbishment of the Cathal Brugha Place housing estate in Dungarvan, members of the Urban Council were told at last Monday night's meeting.

£0.5m is part of a total year of £829,000 of which £229,000 is for the provision of new houses.

Mr. White told the meeting that a sum of £50,000 has been included for the extension of the halting site at Shandon from seven to eleven bays.

The Town Clerk said a Roads Allocation of £56,000 in the current year is the same as last year and is "pretty well as expected."

"Rents in Dungarvan are the lowest among towns of comparable size in the country, while our housing expenditure is among the highest," Mr. White said.

On the proposal of Cllr. P. Power the new differential rents scheme was unanimously adopted.

Bus Driver "Terrified" Motor **Bikers**

Members of a Cork city motorcycle club told District Court Judge Mangan how a professional bus driver had terrified them as they drove home from a rally on the afternoon of

October 10 last. The 51-year-old bus driv-er, John Kenneth Begley, Marian Terrace, Stradbally, pleaded not guilty at oughal District Court last Thursday to dangerous driving at Grange, Youghal on that date.

One of five "bikers," Fabian McCabe, Friars Walk, Cork, told the court how the bus driven by Begley bore down on them like

Another witness, Linus Gaffney, Evergreen Street, Cork, said he was "terri-fied" by Begley's driving.

There were claims also that the bus forced some of the bikers onto the hard shoulder as it overtook them, while a female pillion

passenger said she could have touched the bus with her hand so close was it as it overtook the bike she was

Begley, a professional driver for 31 years denied the allegations against him. He alleged some of the motorcyclists were "messing" on the road and wouldn't allow him to pass. When he dropped back his speed they did likewise though eventually he overtook them on a wide section.

Judge Mangan convicted Begley of careless driving despite a plea by defence solicitor Mr. David Keane who said an endorsement of Begley's driving licence would cost him his job.

The defendant was fined £350 and ordered to pay £240 expenses.

The conviction was endorsed and he was disqualified from driving for three months. Recognisances were fixed in the event of an appeal.

BISHOP REDEDICATES 180 YEAR-OLD CHURCH

The doors of the newly-renovated Church of St. John the Baptist, Powerstown, Clonmel, were proudly re-opened to parishioners and visitors alike on Sunday for the rededication of the Church by Most. Rev. Dr. Michael Russell, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore. The 180 year-old Church shone like new, fresh from £275,000 worth of reconstruction and redecoration work, as Bishop Russell told parishioners it was a memorial to them and the people who came before them. The newlyrenovated church was a hymn of praise to the God they believed in and the Christ who died for them, the Bishop said, "It is a memorial to you and the people who came in the door during the last 180 years," he added.

Fr. Sean Nugent, the parish priest, and the committee had worked on the parish's behalf, Bishop Russell said, but they could not have done the work without the generosity of the parishioner's "hearts". The homily was preached by Mon-signor Michael Olden of Kilsheelan, who described the day as Powerstown's own special Easter, the confident proclamation that Christ had risen and they would rise with him. This beautifully renovated church would remain a solemn sign of resurrection and hope to the people of this parish and passersby, he said. Today was a day of congratu-lation and celebration. Outsiders admired and envied the work which had been accomplished and knew, he said, they were witnessing something very special — the lead-ership of Fr. Nugent and the co-operation of the people. But they could, he said, never know the headaches and heartaches involved. "To day", he said, "we salute with profound sincerity your sacrifice and generosity." Mon-signor Olden spoke recalled the long tradition of faith in the parish. It could go back as far as St. Patrick himself, and over the centuries it built as many as 13 churches in the parish and the remains or ruins of most still existed, he said. The 13 churches came 200 or maybe 300 years be-

built them, lived on and was handed on for 1,500 years. The main custodians and executors of that faith were the countless fathers and mothers who, over the centuries reared their children in home where God was central, he said. "Many men and women went to work for Christ beyond the frontiers of the parish", he said "including in this century, the Augustinian Bishop Patrick Dalton of Yola, Nigeria, whose home is in Ballyvaugh-

Monsignor Olden also spoke

of the building of the present church, which is the sixth oldest in the diocese of Waterford and Lismore. The Parish Priest at the time, in 1808, was Fr. Felix Clancy. There were then only ruined or makeshift churches in the parish and it was not easy for a priest in 1808 to ask his people to consider building a church nor was it easy for the people to respond. The people had, he said, never seen anything but ruined churches and knew no laws but the Penal Laws, while Catholic Emancipation was only a vague dream. But the people of Powerstown did respond to the call of Pr. Clancy. Armed with a courage and faith that could be called miraculous they built this church Monsignor Olden told Sunday's congregation.

The decision to rebuild it was not so much a matter of bricks and mortar and money but a matter of faith, he said. It was a profound testing time for the community and whether the faith of 1808 was still alive when Fr. Sean Nugent made his plan in 1989 and the people of Powerstown had said "Yes". "You the people and priest of Powerstown have," he said, "bonded to-gether to rebuild this church of

Fr. Sean Nugent said at the conclusion of the Mass that he was very happy to have this opportunity to say a few words of thanks all round. He thanked all those who had made the great day possible for the parish of Powerstown and Lisronagh. It would be

and went, but the faith which fore a Parish Priest would stand at the pulpit again to speak on such an occasion, he said. He thanked the Presentation Sisters, Limerick, for donating the side altar to Our Lady and the Stations of the Cross and also thanked Jerome Lennon, a parishioner who erected the altar and did the stonework outside the church. Fr. Sean Nugent also thanked Bishop Russell for coming to the ceremony and for his great support all along the line. He thanked Mon-signor Olden for his eloquent sermon, Fr. Padraig O'Bryne, Master of Ceremonies, and all the other priests who at-

Two of South Tipperary's top "blazing saddles", Barry Meehan of Clonnel and Stefan Grace of Ardfinnan are off to Florida this Sunday to begin a 500 mile cycle in aid of the National Council for the Blind. Stefan, who is blind, and Barry, will be one of 12 pairs cycling on tandems during the cycle from Orlando to Fort Laud-erdale in which 105 cyclists are taking part altogether. The biggest problem facing the South Tipperary pair was the lack of a tandem, but that obstacle has been overcome by the local branch of the National Council for the Blind, who have presented them with one. Stefan, who is a well known singer and musician in South Tipperary and West Waterford, is a veteran of long distance cycles because he also took part in the 1992 event from Los Angeles to San Francisco. Barry Meehan of Willow Park, Clonmel, is a very experienced cyclist, with many competitions behind him. He is a member of Tipperary Crystal Wheelers and has competed in Ireland, England and the Isle of Man. Ruairi Walsh of Clonmel was Stefan's co-cyclist in last year's event, which was successful in raising a great deal of money for research, mobility, training for blind people and computer training. The "Manor" of Dungarvan embraced the same area with the Union of Dungarvan and consisted of three parishes — Dungarvan West, Ballinroad and Abbeyside. There were fairs appointed and tolls fixed. A Royal Commission inquired into the levying of tolls from time to time. The tolls of the fairs were paid to Mr. John Kelly of Strancally. The Duke of Devonshire obtained a patent for two

new fairs.

The Manor of Dungarvan was granted in the reign of Henry VIII to a member of the Ormonde family. It was bestowed on George Thornton by James I at the yearly rent of £20 and it afterwards passed successively to the Earl of Cork and the Duke of Devonshire.

Those Long Local Cosy 'Phone Chats Are Going To Cost A Lot More

Those long local cosy telephone chats between family relatives, friends and neighbours which have been so much part of the social life of the community in the past and which were charged at a rather nominal rate are going to cost a lot more in the future.

Local rates which cost a flat rate irrespective of duration up to 18 months ago are now to be charged on a five minutes basis, or 15 minutes in off-peak periods.

It was in December, 1989, that Telecom Eireann made

public the proposed change despite an announcement earlier that year that the Company had turned in a 300 per cent increase in profits. At the time there were quite a number of objections raised and protests voiced. Among the strongest objections raised pointed out that if the Telecom plan was sanctioned those who would suffer most would be those to whom the 'phone was neither a luxury nor a business aid, but an essential social amenity which allowed them to keep in touch with family, relatives

and friends. This is a category that embraces many thousands including the elderly, the isolated, the lonely and the house-bound.

Responding to these pressures the then Minister for Communications, Mr. Seamus Brennan made some pleasantly reassuring statements, but within a matter of weeks, the government's capitulation to the Telecom proposal was announced by Mr. Brennan with the explanation that trunk calls would be rezoned as local ones in some areas, leading to considerable savings, especially in rural areas; that 'phone bills would be reduced by an average 7 per cent overall and that the cost of overseas calls would drop by 10 per cent.

At that time the then Minister for Communications also made considerable play that the time limit for local calls would be increased from 5 minutes to 15 minutes as proposed by Telecom Eireann and to 30 minutes in off-peak periods. But it hasn't turned out like that and the 15 minutes promised by Mr. Brennan has been chopped back to five.

So now it has happened and much more quickly than the thousands who use the telephone could have imagined. And the peculiar thing about it is that we haven't heard one voice of protest! The end result of the new system will be that those long local cosy 'phone chats will in the future cost far more than they have in the past!

Remembering An Heroic Franciscan Missionary From Dungaryan

Close by the footpath that runs through the peaceful cemetery of St. Mary's Parish Church, Dungarvan across which the sea-winds from Dungarvan Harbour blow stands a monument to a Sister of the San Franciscan Missionary Congregation about whom little if anything is now known in her native Dungarvan. Her remains are not buried in St. Mary's but rest beneath the merciless jungle of Equatorial Uganda in North East Africa.

Sister Mary Solano, OSF who was one of six pioneers who left Ireland in 1905 to set up their mission in Uganda died a martyr's death eleven years after the commencement of her work in the jungle. She was 21 years old Pauline O'Shea, daughter of Edmund and Hannah O'Shea, The Hermitage, Abbeyside, Dungarvan when she sailed from London on a bleak December evening in 1903. She was in the company of five other Franciscan Missionary Sisters, among them Mother Kevin who later became Mother-General of the Order.

It was in 1904 after the Missionaries had hacked their way through the jungle and established their Mission in Nagalama, Kampala, that Sister Mary Solano was professed thus becoming the first nun to be professed in Africa.

There were no motor vehicles in those days and few of the many other aids to progress that are available to missionaries nowadays. Always it was a bitter struggle to survive the cruel torments of the jungle.

Sister Mary Solano was always cheerful and kind-hearted and within a very short period she had won the close friendship of their many converts.

The nuns of Nagalama were up at about 5.30 a.m. every morning and Sister Solano, the young and enthusiastic worker never spared herself. She cooked when necessary, she taught in her little school, played their valued organ and time after time tramped through the jungle to a post 28 miles away to bring the services of her far-famed dispensary to those so much in need of them.

Then came 1914 when one Tuesday morning at the end of October, Sister Mary Solano went as usual to her class-room. With her many tiny pupils she said the morning prayers and so began the day's work. She was not able to continue her classes for long. At 10.20 a.m. that morning the young nun couldn't carry on any longer and collapsed—a tragic victim to the dreaded Blackwater Fever.

On the eve of All Saints Day Sister Mary Solano died peacefully as three Irish priests prayed at her bedside. She died a martyr's death far from the shores of Ireland and her native Abbeyside to which she had never returned since that day way back in 1903 when she left to set off on her heroic missionary work.

Newsmakers From Dungarvan

Last week two Dungarvan born women, or to be more precise before we get our knuckles wrapped, Abbeyside born women were featured in the national media — one in print, the other on radio.

Mary Dowling Maher, a graduate of University College Cork is to become the sixth woman president of the ASTI (Association of Secondary Teachers of Ireland) it was announced at the ASTI Easter Conference held in Galway. As President elect she also automatjoins Association's powerful 15member Standing Committee. In what was generally described as a surprise move and by union sources as a "palace coup," five or-dinary lady members of the Association were elected to the Standing Committee which had only one member last year.

Mary Dowling Maher who now teaches in Dublin is daughter of Mrs. Kathleen Dowling, Knockateemore, Abbeyside, Dungarvan and of the late Joe Dowling who for many years was the very popular and highly respected Secretary of Waterford County Council.

gramme one morning last week Sister Leonore Quealy of the Medical Missionaries of Mary was interviewed on the situation in regard to the many orphanages in Romania where she has been working for the past few years caring for the little children who have no parents and have to be looked after in the hundreds of crowded orphanages all over Romania.

Sister Leonore pointed out that with world attention now focussed on Bosnia, Somalia and the Sudan, they were being forgotten in Romania and much of the financial assistance and other help that flowed into Romania in previous years had now unfortunately ceased. There were as many orphans as ever to be looked after and cared for but "what can we do without money and help," she asked.

Sister Leonore is sister of Mrs. Vincent Byrne, New Line, Abbeyside and daughter of the late Paul and Mrs. Quealy, Sexton Street, Abbeyside. Perhaps with this little reminder, some of the many people concerned might think up some project which might assist Sister Leonore in the wonderful humanitarian work in which she is engaged out there in

The eastern champions then hit a purple patch and notched up a goal and three points to take a commanding five point advantage entering the final quarter. But Lismore refused to panic and Alan Dunne, operating at corner forward reduced the arrears with a point before Ballygunner regained the initiative with a quick reply. In the 50th minute a hitherto well marked Shanahan cut loose and changed the course of the game with a well-taken shot which ended up in the back of the opponents net. Daly reduced the deficit to the minimum two minutes later but the 'Gunners' replied to go two points up once again and the ex-changes were fast and furious. Lismore were awarded a free just on the 65th minute and Kieran O'Gorman, playing a blinder at centre-back, walked up to send it sailing over the bar to make it 1-11 to 1-

12. With five minutes remaining Séan Daly broke loose to equalise and then take the lead with another great point. Alan Dunne increased the lead with a further point in the 57th minute before Daly put the icing on the cake, but spoiled the party for Bally-gumer, with a point in the dying seconds.

VEC Lashes 'Savage' VAT Rate On Newspapers

The 'savage' rate of VAT on newspaper and paper products was denounced at the monthly meeting of the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee in Dungarvan.

Cllr. Declan Goode said the almost penal imposition of VAT on newspapers and all paper products is threatening many jobs.

He referred to some newspapers having their backs to the wall with the threat of going out of business because of VAT levels. He said that VAT on paper products is also costing the VEC a very significant sum

each year.
Cllr. Goode's proposal, seconded by Cllr. Nora Flynn, that they call on the Government to lower VAT levels on newspapers and all other paper products, was supported unanimously.
MORE TEACHERS

NEEDED

Meanwhile, the Committee is to appeal an allocation of 45 teachers for its schools in Dungarvan and Kilmacthomas for the coming school year to the Department of Education.

The decision was taken unanimously at the meeting when the CEO Mr. Donal Kelleher said student enrolments at both schools are again set to rise in the 1993-

94 school year.
Mr. Kelleher said they would need an additional 7.59 teacher units to cope with the project enrolment increases and he firmly believed they should appeal their allocation of 45 teachers in the coming year between the two schools.

It was also agreed to ask the Dept. to sanction the conversion of a number of temporary teaching posts into permanent ones for the coming year.

Ingredients: 4 large tomatoes 12oz (375g) cottage cheese 3oz (75g) butter or margarine white pepper chopped chives and parsley (optional) 3 1/20z (100g) tin tuna fish, drained and flaked shredded lettuce celery leaves.

and gently hollow out centres with a teaspoon. Mix together cottage cheese and butter or margarine. Season and add parsley or chives, if used. Stir in tuna. Fill tomatoes with mixture. Chill. Serve on a bed of lettuce,

Give Your Garden That Touch Of Glass

Heat in the greenhouse will be building now as the sun's power increases and the weather warms generally.

So check that your plants under glass are not being burned and dried by the heat and, when watering avoid leaves the sun rays can scorch wet leaves. With the above cautions observed, the green house gardener can welcome the extra heat for the benefits in early seed sowing and raising plants which would

otherwise struggle in our climate. Greenhouses are certainly not expensive and can be bought in either lean-to or stand alone form in various sizes to fit in with your house and garden layout. Even if you avoid the obviously flimsy ones on the market and opt to pay a lit-

your investment. The simplest way is by starting asparagus, celery, cucumbers, runner beans, marrow and courgettes, sweetcorn and

tle more, you will soon get a return on

tomatoes, for later planting outside. This will trim the grocery bill at a time when shop prices seem to rise the more we are told to eat fresh vegetables. BASKETS

It is also excellent for plants later required for hanging baskets such as the delicate tuberous begonias, which make such excellent centrepieces for baskets and boxes but can be so troublesome to grow. You can also use the greenhouse to cul-tivate colourful plants for cutting and showing inside the house such as freesias and campanula.

And it is also the ideal place about now for growing lots of cuttings from the likes fuchsias, dahlias and **Busy Lizzie** This can save pounds

which would otherwise be spent at the nursery on stocking your beds and borders for the coming summer.

Perhaps best of all, the greenhouse can raise more exotic produce such as aubergines, peppers, cucumbers, melons and generous varieties of tomato such as Money Maker.

And don't think you need lots of work and space in your greenhouse.

You can dig out and plant the borders but this is time-consuming and regular use of the same soil allows disease to build up in a confined area.

Of course you can dig out the borders and replace the soil but it makes no sense when you can buy grow bags so cheaply and re-cycle them afterwards simply dig the contents into your borders to enhance or re-condition the soil. WARM-UP

After buying the bags, leave them in the greenhouse for a few days to warm up and then soak before planting individually through slashes in the polythene. Then simply keep the plants watered and supported until they crop, the signal to start feeding too.

Don't just stick to tomatoes. Try aubergines and melons and you'll wonder why you bothered buying them before. — ARTHUR HINES.







Two Championships —



The Irish Connection



Ireland against European champions Denmark is almost a backdrop to another championship battle, — can champions elect Manchester United win their final two games and deny Aston Villa — a question many Irish supporters are asking.

UNITED — THE IRISH CONNECTION

Most people believe Ireland's love affair with United is linked to the Munich air disaster but it started before then

Johnny Carey was not the first Irishman to play for Manchester United but he was one of their greatest Irish signings. In 17 years at Old Trafford he won almost every honour in the game. In 1948 he became the first Irishman to lift the FA Cup and in the 1951-'52 season as club captain he led United to their first league championship in 40 years.

His superstar status was confirmed by being selected as footballer of the year in 1947 and sportsman of the year in 1950.

On the international front he played for both the North and Republic of Ireland and was captain of the Rest of Europe XV against a Gt. Britain XV at Hampden Park in 1947. He also captained Ireland in that historic 2-0 defeat of England at Goodison Park.

Liam Whelan arrived from Home Farm in May 1953 and made his debut for United at Preston North End aged 19 years in 1955. As one of the Busby Babes he played 96 times, scoring 52 goals before becoming part of Irish soccer history in the Munich air disaster in 1958. But before his career was tragically cut short he won 2 league championship medals in 1956 and 1957 and that year he was the club's leading scorer.

Noel Cantwell continued the Irish link and returned United to winning ways as captain of the 1963 cup winning team who defeated Leicester City 3-1. Johnny Giles and Tony Dunne were Irish internationals on that team. Giles left for Leeds, but Dunne remained on to be part of Matt Busby's greatest victory.

Tony Dunne — Signed from Shelbourne in April 1960 for £5,000 and made his debut for United in October 1960. He became a first team regular when he replaced the injured Cantwell in 1961. He remained at Old Trafford for 13 seasons playing over 500 games, winning two league championships, an FA Cup medal and made up the full back pairing of Dunne and Shay Brennan when United defeated Benefica 4-1 in Wembley for the European Cup in 1968.

The Irish connection remained in the 70's and 80's—Mick Martin, Ray O'Brien, Gerry Daly, Paddy Roache, Ashley Grimes, Liam O'Brien and Paul McGrath all came from Dublin League of Ireland clubs at a total outlay for United of £154,500. When you add Kevin Moran's arrival for a nominal fee and Paul McGrath subsequently being transferred for £400,000 (a profit of £370,000) United's Irish link has served the club well.

Denis Irwin, a £650,000 buy from Oldham Athletic, continues that Irish tradition, but will the link with Tony Dunne, who won the last championship medal at full back, continue? Their ability to win two games against Blackburn Rovers and Wimbledon, and Aston Villa's results against Oldham Athletic and QPR, stand between them and the end of their 26 year wait.

As the championship is played out, most non-United supporters are citing Aston Villa's Irish connection of Staunton, Houghton and Paul McGrath in their newfound loyalty to Ron Atkinson's team. That, and the fact that Alex Perguson sold Moran, Whiteside and McGrath adds spice to watching the tv finale to the inaugural Premier League Championship.

With a recently formed Manchester United Supporters' club in the area, I should make my position clear. I always followed United, being in the fan club "The Manchester United Review" in the mid '60's, but in recent years almost enjoyed their ability to get things wrong.

Ferguson, love him or hate him, has turned things around and he can lead United to European greatness on

Whelan's return from injury and to form has contributed quietly and effectively to Liverpool's climb up to 5th place in the Premier league. Allowing for doubts over Aldridge's fitness, I feel Whelan will shade it over McGoldrick and I think Charlton's selection will be: Bonner, Irwin, McGrath, Moran, Staunton, Keane, Townsend, Whelan, Houghton, Aldridge, Quinn.

Co. Board Meeting

REFEREEING

With so very many games being played in both divisions on weekends, one wonders how the Board officials are able to cope with the resultant referee problems. At the recent County Board meeting, the Chairman of the Referees' Committee reported that only two new referees had been added to the panel this year, despite appeals to all clubs.

In making the case for the payment of a £10 fee for all matches refereed under the auspices of the County Board, he said that Waterford is the only county in Munster and in South Leinster where a fee is not paid to the referees. During the course of a discussion on the subject, it was pointed out that the total cost to the Board would not greatly differ from the amount paid to referees by way of travelling expenses last year. This was a factor in getting unanimous agreement. The referees also requested that a member of their committee be appointed on the county fixtures committee for the purpose of appointing referees for all games. This is already a requirement under general rule and was approved. Jim Landers will be their representative on the fixtures committee.

HOME AND AWAY!

The home and away arrangement which we hold with some counties is to be re-examined, probably at the next ordinary meeting of the Board. The matter was raised by John Lyons when complaints were being made about the condition of Pairc Ui Caoimh for the minor game against Cork recently. There was a general feeling that Waterford minors would have fared better at a different venue.

REPORTS

The senior hurling report told of their disappointments since their activities resumed in the new year. After a break they will now name a panel to go into serious training for the first round of the championship.

The under 21 football report requested the fixtures committee to give the panel nine clear days from club championship games before they play Limerick at Leamybrien in the first round on this Friday week.

There were also reports from the senior and minor football committees and from the minor hurling committee.

As briefly reported last week, the finances of the Board were discussed and ways and means of having our £78,000 overdraft reduced were talked about. Joe Byrne's suggestion that all clubs advance a £1,000 interest free loan to the

Board for a two year period got some support, but obviously delegates did not wish to commit their clubs to a matter such as this without first being mandated to do so. It will be discussed at the next meeting. A proposal that all people including officials, etc., etc. pay for admission to our games got some support, but certainly not enough to indicate that the proposal will be accepted when it is debated later when put on the agenda.

Nioclas Mac Craith suggested that clubs might forego their share of gates for a year of two likewise did not get a lot of support.

Two Delegates For North/South Housing Conference

Despite some opposition, it was decided at Monday night's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council to send two delegates to a North-South Housing Conference in Dublin Castle this weekend.

The main opponent of sending delegates was Cllr. Tony Wright of Democratic left who said it would be a "waste of money" and he pointed out that the registration fee alone for each delegate is £195. "I see no benefit — good, bad or indifferent, for the town from this conference," he added.

Cllr. Declan Goode said that in the past he had always been against sending delegates to conferences because of the cost factor and because he believed the money could be better spent. However, this upcoming conference was a North-South one and be-

cause of that he would not object to sending a dele-

Cllr. Mary Dixon vehemently rejected the assertion that these conferences are a waste of money. She was supported by Cllr. Paddy Power who proposed that they send a delegate to the weekend conference.

Seconding the proposal, Cllr. Austin Hallahan said there is a lot to be learned from being represented at a housing conference such as the weekend one.

It was finally agreed that the Chairwoman Cllr. Nuala Ryan and Cllr. Mary Dixon will represent the Council at the conference.

Cannons To Adorn Library Building

Two canons, believed to be centuries old and having been "salvaged" from the local King John's Castle, will soon adorn the frontage of Dungarvan's modern library at Lower Main Street.

That was decided on at Monday night's Urban Council meeting when members were told that the cannons have been completely refurbished.

"They will now be cemented into the ground in front of the library building, formerly the Town Hall, so that they cannot walk away," Mr. B. White, Town Clerk, told the meet-

Mr. White disclosed that they had successfully resisted efforts by the Board of Works to have the cannon taken to Athlone to be put into that town's castle. They have been looking for an appropriate "home" for them and had decided that the ideal site would be in front of the library which was also the "old" Town Hall.

"That is also as near to King John's Castle as we can get," the Town Clerk added.

Cllr. Paddy Power asked what will now become of historic King John's Castle. People can no longer gain access to it and it borders on the disgraceful that the public cannot visit what is undoubtedly a great asset to the town.

Mr. White said the castle is a national monument and is the property of the Board of Works. The UDC, as such, doesn't have a function in it.

There was unanimity, finally, on placing the cannons in front of the library and Mr. white also indicated his intention to approach the Towers of London to try to get an idea as to how old they are.
