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## Ardmore En Fete For Unveiling Of Tidy Towns Plaque

Ardmore was en fete on Sunday last for the visit of Environment Minister Mr. Michael Smith, T.D., who officially unveiled a bronze plaque which marked Ardmore's great overall win in the 1992 Tidy Towns Competition.

The Minister also formally launched the 1993 competition which is the 35th of the series and which is expected to attract more than last year's 624 entries.

Thousands thronged the beautiful seaside town for the celebration and the summer-like weather also added to the splendour of the occasion.

In the course of his address Minister Smith told the gathering of his Department's intention to launch an all-out blitz on litter

which, he disclosed, is costing the nation a whopping £52m annually. Put into perspective, that almost equals the Department of the Environment's annual expenditure on Local Authority housing.

The Minister said that on May 31 he will launch a "Clean Up Ireland Week" promoted through a multimedia campaign to whip up public interest and support.

Referring to Ardmore's first overall victory in the Tidy Towns competition last year, Mr. Smith said the care and attention which the local people had so clearly lavished on their home place proclaims their pride in it. He hoped this memorable victory will serve always as a reminder to the people of Ardmore of the

## Appeal Against Mushroom Factory Is Valid

An Bord Pleanala has ruled that an appeal lodged against the decision of Waterford County Council to grant full planning permission for a mushroom factory in the western end of the county is valid.

However the "Dungarvan Leader" has learned that many of the original objectors to the proposed development, which will create up to thirty jobs in what is an unemployment blackspot, have now confirmed in writing to Bord Pleanala the withdrawal of their opposition to it.

Legal advisers for Mr. Thomas J. Murphy, who is proposing to set up the mushroom plant on his land at Headbrough, Knockanore, sought a ruling from Bord Pleanala that the appeal by a group calling itself "Friends of The Blackwater" does not, in reality,

exist and that no name had been supplied as secretary of the group to An Bord Pleanala.

Two names listed previously at different times as secretary have since withdrawn their opposition to the development.

In confirming to Mr. Murphy's solicitor that the appeal is valid, An Bord Pleanala has also indicated that it will not be made until mid July — a delay that has angered the developer and local public representatives who have given their undivided backing to the project from the outset.

## LETTER to the EDITOR

# Industrialisation Of Comeragh Mountains

Dear Editor,  
The Comeragh Mountains are about to be industrialised.

Waterford County Planning Department has received an application to erect a large microwave tower atop Seefin Mountain. The tower will beam microwaves toward Cork.

It will not be a slender mast, which would be bad enough, but a 7.8 metre tall, four legged monster, perched atop the highest point of the Monavullagh range. Then, to heap further visual degradation upon the site, it will be topped by a continual red beacon to warn airplanes. Three outbuildings, fencing, and a line of electric poles up the side of the mountain will service the microwave. From spectacular wild land to industrial light pollution source in one swift jump is just not an acceptable fate for this mountain top.

Department of Communications personnel told me that this site was chosen

because there was already a telecommunications site present. Which only goes to show why occasionally, the Dublin folks need to get out and see the lands they're talking about. To equate the visual impact of the present low blockhouse to a monstrous tower with a bright red beacon shows that the Department clearly did not inspect the site that they chose for this particular microwave link.

This is not just any hill in Ireland. This is the centre-piece which all of West Waterford views, the place that hundreds of bungalows are facing just to enjoy its wonderful scenery. From the drumhills almost to Ballymacarbry Seefin dominates the landscape. And this is the mountain where a beacon bright enough to penetrate the darkest nights will be placed?

What will the placement of this great ugliness upon the peak do to local tourism? From the Nire Valley to Dungarvan, how

many B & B's will be affected? After pouring money and effort into turning the local area into a tourist mecca, will tourism in this area be written off? How many jobs will be lost? How many future plans like hiking trails or more tourist amenities in the area simply won't happen because the Monavullagh's are suddenly an industrial landscape.

Reverend P. Canon Power, in his book "The Place Names of Decies" tells us that Seefin means "Fionn's Sitting Place." If this tower goes up, will any Irish child ever again be able to hike to its height and picture Fionn MacCumhaill watching over Decies countryside? Think, please think, before allowing the desecration of a spot so grand that Fionn himself might consider it a worthy throne.

## Medicine Chest Campaign Reaches Out

The Benylin Campaign in support of Carers in Ireland has begun with the distribution of collection boxes to pharmacies around the country. Called the Medicine Chest Campaign, the collection will run for a three month period in aid of the Irish Red Cross Society's Voluntary Carers Training Programme, and in association with Soroptimist International (Rep. of Ireland), as part of their work for carers.

The Red Cross Training Programme was set up in

Dublin in 1992 as a pilot project. Over a six month period, volunteers learn about nutrition, first aid, mental health, use of appliances, communication skills

and other topics. It is hoped that the Benylin Medicine Chest Campaign will enable similar courses to be set up in other areas throughout the country.

# New Ultra Modern 41-Unit Home For Elderly For Lismore

The Department of the Environment has come up financial trumps — to the tune of £430,000.

An allocation of that amount has been made to the St. Carthage's Welfare Home Committee in Lismore towards the funding of a new, ultra modern, 41-unit home for the elderly, work on the construction of which is expected to begin within a matter of months.

The Dept. has pledged a similar contribution next year with the final all-in cost likely to be close to £1m.

The existing St. Carthage's Home is the former District Hospital and was set up following the shock closure of the hospital some years ago by the South Eastern Health Board.

One of the joint treasurers of the St. Carthage's Committee, Ballyduff Fianna Fail County Councillor Jimmy Quirke, has welcomed the Department's "substantial" allocation. They would be meeting the architect very shortly, he said, and hopefully the proposed new home will then go out to tender soon afterwards.

Cllr. Quirke warned however that for the committee and other voluntary workers most of the hard work now begins. A sum of £30,000 must be raised locally, he said, and that will then be matched on a £ for £ basis by the South Eastern Health Board.

"We have already collected £8,000 so at least an encouraging start has been made," said Cllr. Quirke.

News of the Department's allocation was also welcomed by the St. Carthage's secretary Mrs. Mary Fenton-Morrissey T.C., who has been a tireless figure behind the setting up of the existing welfare home first day.

"It will certainly give us the encouragement and drive to go out locally and do what needs to be done," she added.

The new welfare home will be built on land adjoining the existing one. It is the property of the South Eastern Health Board who have donated the site to the local committees.

Unlike the present home all patients will be "housed" on the ground floor which is regarded as a major "plus" factor.

## Dungarvan Man Returned For Trial

A 25 year old butcher was returned for trial at Dungarvan District Court last Wednesday on charges relating to the death of a local man in the early hours of Christmas Day last.

Brendan Crotty, 23 Congress Villas, Dungarvan, is charged with (1) unlawfully killing Matthew Monahan at the Cathal Brugha Place/Hospital Road junction in the early hours of December 25 contrary to Common Law, and (2) at the same place and time unlawfully assaulting Matthew Monahan thereby occasioning him actual bodily harm.

Crotty, who appeared before the court on bail, was returned for trial to the next sittings of the Waterford Circuit Criminal Court, on July 6.

The accused was remanded on continuing bail in his own bond of £2,000 and two independent sureties of £3,000 each.

Mr. Gerry McCullagh, Solr. for Crotty, successfully applied to the court to be assigned the services of a junior and senior counsel at his trial under the Free Legal Aid Scheme.

Inspector John Howard

represented the Director of Public Prosecutions.

## Obstacles On The Roadways

During the time of the troubles roads to and from Abbeyside and Dungarvan were frequently rendered impassable on account of the obstacles placed across them in the way of felled trees and trenches. Railway communication was completely cut off from the town and village.

However two merchants, Messrs. K. Williams and Co. and Messrs. Moloney and Co. purchased cross channel steamships which were used to carry in supplies for the people. Williams owned the "Cargan", a steamboat capable of carrying 200 tons. One can imagine the excitement of the people of Abbeyside as

they lined along the sea wall to watch the "Cargan" enter the harbour for the first time.

Moloney's purchased the "Lady Belle" and this steamship too was kept going bringing cargoes of necessities to the people of the area. The people realised how beneficial it was that

they possessed a harbour which rendered them independent of road transport. Today too we should continue to regard our harbour as a valuable asset in both the commercial and amenity fields something we do not appreciate because of the helter-skelter of our daily lives.

## GRAVEYARD PROBLEMS

The old Abbey commonly known as 'The Clogchas' is seen in the photograph by Keohan. It adjoins the present Church and extends at right angles from it. The old ruin is in a dangerous condition. Some Abbeyside families have grave plots in the Clogchas and it contains many ancient tombs as well. The fact that 'The Clogchas' is in a dangerous condition poses problems for the families who have graves there as it may have

to be closed. These facts came to light at a special meeting at Abbeyside School on Tuesday, April 20. The meeting was called to discuss problems concerning the graveyard in general and there was an attendance of over forty. It is intended to have the ground mapped in detail and following that the graveyard will be landscaped. A deadline was set for people claiming unidentified graves so they should have

them marked within six months. A further meeting will take place and this will be held in the graveyard in the early summer.

As regards 'The Clogchas' some research is to be undertaken before any final decision will be made concerning its future. The McGrath's were benefactors of the old Abbey and the family grave is directly

under the ground at the entrance to 'The Clogchas' which is through the semi-circular opening. Abbeyside Pattern Committee erected a slab in 1990 stating that the slab below the arch bears the following inscription:

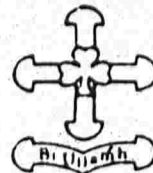
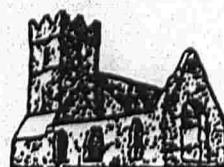
## FIRST COMMUNION

# "The Last Voyages Of The Waterford Steamers"

Christmas 1917, the Clyde Shipping Company's Steamers "SS Formby" and "SS Coningbeg" were torpedoed and sunk by German Submarine U-62 off the east coast of Ireland. Eighty-three people died, sixty-seven of these were from the City of Waterford and surrounding areas. "The Last Voyages of the Waterford Steamers" chronicles the terrible tragedy that ranks among the City of Waterford's greatest disasters. Not until the seventy-fifth anniversary of this war-time tragedy had arrived was the full tale told by Mr. Dick McElwee in his book which was published before Christmas.

Last Wednesday week Abbeyside Pattern Committee had the pleasure of bringing Mr. McElwee to Dungarvan to tell the fascinating tale of the ill-fated Formby and Coningbeg and the submarine and captain who sank them. These two ships travelled the Waterford to Liverpool route carrying passengers and general cargo. But on the 15th of December, 1917 the Formby was to depart Liverpool for the last time for later on that night she was torpedoed by the German submarine U-62. Likewise when the Coningbeg left Liverpool on December 17th, 1917 it was also for the last time as she too was to meet her fate with a torpedo from U-62. Of the two ships all that was found was the remains of two lifeboats; one washed ashore at Fishguard bay on the 2nd of January, 1918 and the other at Rosslare on the 7th of January, 1918.

Of the passengers and crews only one body was found. That was the body of Annie O'Callaghan, a stewardess on the Formby, who was washed ashore at Pembroke a month later. She was identified by her locket which contained her picture and name and address. She always wore this while at sea in case she was ever lost and had to be identified later. As she had originally come from Kilmacthomas, her body was brought back and buried in the cemetery at Newtown.

Mr. McElwee went on to tell how the final assault on the Coningbeg is recorded in the personal War Memoirs of Ernst Hashagen, the captain of U-62. The following is an extract from the same — "Under the coast near Holyhead are shadows slipping by. Towards midnight a vessel passes to the westward. We leave our station and creep nearer. She is a large deep laden ship, unescorted (Coningbeg). It is now so dark that, with the naked eye, only a vague mass can be made out beside us. It is rather dreadful to be steaming thus alongside one's

The horror of war silences us. Everyone of our orders, every movement, every turn of a wheel is bringing death nearer our opponent.

Below in the tower, Benning presses a tin nob — the electric firing gear for the torpedo. A silvery streak darts like a phantom over the water. Suddenly a gigantic tongue of fire in the night. Mighty it stabs the darkness. A powerful explosion follows. We see the ship break into two pieces with flames and smoke. The fore part goes down like a

stone. The after part heaves up, glowing and hissing. Once more the flames blaze up, then everything fades into darkness. A single light is seen upon the sea. It is the ships night life-buoy, which has released itself and burns now for a grave-stone above the unfortunate ship. No word passes between us. We knew we did our duty. Fate had completed our work and destroyed ship and men in a few seconds."

After the talk, Mr. Tom McHugh proposed a vote of thanks to Mr. McElwee on behalf of all present, for coming to Dungarvan to tell the fascinating yet sad tale of the Last Voyages of the Waterford Steamers.

# Motorist Convicted Of Careless Driving

Damage in excess of £5,000 was caused to two cars involved in a collision in Dungarvan last October, Judge Michael Pattwell was told at the local District Court last Wednesday.

One of the motorists, David Connors, Springmount, Dungarvan, was convicted of careless driving at Sexton Street, Abbeyside, on October 2. He had pleaded not guilty.

There was a complete conflict of evidence between the defendant and the other motorist involved, Catherine Dolan, Seapark, Abbeyside, Dungarvan. Ms. Dolan told the court that she had driven through the

traffic lights at Abbeyside and was driving along slowly along Sexton Street on her correct side of the road when the defendant's car "shot out" of King Street, crossed to its incorrect side of the road and crashed into her.

Witness said that the defendant's car actually went up on the bonnet of her vehicle. He also admitted responsibility for the accident and said he was insured.

Two independent witnesses also stated that they saw Ms. Dolan driving on her

correct side of the road, while Garda J. Duggan said at the scene he found the greatest concentration of glass and mud on Ms. Dolan's correct side of the road. He further claimed both drivers agreed the point of impact which would have put it on Ms. Dolan's side of the centre white lines.

The defendant, David Connors, however, said that he stopped when he came to the junction of King Street and Sexton Street and checked carefully for pass-

ing traffic. When he saw the main road was clear he came out slowly and had made half his turn to the left when he was struck by Ms. Dolan's car on his correct side of the road.

Judge Pattwell however convicted Connors and imposed a fine of £100 with £20 expenses, and in addition the conviction was endorsed on his driving licence.

Recognisances were fixed in the event of an appeal. Inspector John Howard prosecuted.

# Teagasc Guide To Filling Area Aid Form

A step by step guide to completing the 1993 area aid application has been produced by Teagasc and is now available in all Teagasc offices. The guide, which is accompanied by an example of a completed form from an actual farm, provides farmers with a logical step by step approach to ensure that the form is completed accurately and in a manner which will ensure maximum CAP benefits.

It provides practical tips on preparation and marking maps and on calculation of actual areas available for aid. It will be of significant benefit in helping farmers to structure their application in a way which will guarantee maximum payments of tillage aid and suckler, male cattle, sheep and extensification premia.

The guide also contains worksheets which can be used to carry out preparatory work and calculations before filling in the actual

form. This will be of great assistance in calculating that the form is completely accurate.

### BRIEFING SESSION

A series of briefing sessions are being held by Teagasc in every county in order to ensure that all farmers are familiar with the complexities of the Area Aid Application. Priority is now being given to farmers whose applications must be submitted by May 14th. Once the needs of these farmers are serviced, the emphasis will switch to

all-grass farmers who have a later closing date for application.

### CONSULTANCY

All 100 Teagasc offices are reporting a huge demand for personalised professional advice on CAP reform benefits and on completion of Area Aid Applications. Because of this, farmers are requested to contact their local Teagasc office in advance to make an appointment. This will ensure a more effective and speedy service.

### Superlevy Refund For Waterford Suppliers

The Board of Waterford Foods has carried out a preliminary assessment of superlevy liabilities, with immediate benefit for a large number of suppliers, especially those with quotas under 30,000 gallons.

Arising from distribution of Waterford's flexi milk pool, the vast majority of small suppliers will benefit from reduced superlevy bills or in some cases none at all. They will now receive refunds on monies retained for over quota supplies.

There is a limited but significant relief for larger suppliers, but this situation is likely to improve when the Department of Agriculture's flexi milk pool is distributed at a later stage.

Maurice Nelan, Assistant Chief Executive, Waterford Foods said: "We have acted quickly and positively on this matter because we fully understand the hardship of deduction from the monthly cheque."

ed the immediate pay out of outstanding Special Beef and Suckler Cow Premium payments owed to Waterford livestock farmers.

Mr. Donovan said: "The Minister for Agriculture, Mr. Joe Walsh, must move immediately and insist that these vital support payments are issued over the next two weeks. Up to 5,000 farmers nationwide are awaiting Special Beef Premium payment since June 1992 and the remaining 85,000 suckler and beef producers made their premium application

last December, or 4 months ago. Not one of the December applications have been paid to date."

Mr. Donovan added: "With an average farm income of £2,333 in the dry-stock sector, it is vital that livestock farmers receive their premium compensation on time, for the price cuts imposed on the sale of their cattle under CAP. In the majority of cases premium and headage payments now represent close on 100% of net farm income for livestock farmers."

## Area Aid Meeting In Cappoquin

The correct completion of Area Aid forms is vital for farmers wanting to get their full livestock and arable aid entitlements under the CAP Reform package, but the complexity of the forms is a major problem for farmers.

With this in mind, an I.F.A. joint meeting of Melleray/Cappoquin IFA branches is being held on Thursday night, May 6, 1993 at 8.30 p.m. in The

Parochial Hall, Cappoquin to offer advice to farmers who are anxious about the forms.

Willie O'Donoghue, Chairman, Melleray IFA Branch and the main organiser of the meeting, insists that farmers must make themselves as aware as possible about the forms if they are to maximise the benefits to themselves, as well as avoiding problems in the future.

## Waterford ICMSA News

The ICMSA announced on April 16, that it has lodged a case in the EC Court of Justice challenging a new Regulation on milk quotas which came into effect on April 1, 1993. The case lodged this week marks the final stage of the ICMSA legal challenge to the EC Council against the mistreatment of Irish dairy farmers rights.

The ICMSA President, in whose name the Case has been taken, is challenging EC Regulation 748/93, which was published on March 1, 1993 and which continues to suspend part of milk quotas without compensation for a further year. Mr. O'Dwyer and three other farmers have already challenged a previous EC Regulation which withdrew part of their quotas for 1992/93, again without compensation, on February 8, 1993.

Announcing the ICMSA action, Mr. Dwyer said that he was confident all legal aspects of the 4.5% case were now comprehensively covered.

Meanwhile, County Chairman John Cusack, said farmers should be very careful when filling in the EC Area Aid application forms and should seek the professional help of Teagasc if in doubt. He also advised cereal farmers to remember that the closing date is May 14 and for livestock farmers it's the 1st July. Failure of farmers to return these Area Aid forms could result in the loss of all premiums.

## IFA Welcomes Opposition Support In Dail For Urgent Legislation On Landowners Liability

IFA Industry Committee Chairman, David Butler, has welcomed Fine Gael T.D., Jimmy Deenihan's Private Members' Bill seeking to introduce urgent new legislation to protect farmers and other landowners from claims by trespassers and other entrants. He said the opposition party's move has highlighted the protracted and indefensible delays in changing this outdated law. He called on the Government to deal with this issue by either supporting Deputy Deenihan's bill or bringing forward its own reforming legislation as a matter of urgency.

## Suckler Cow Scheme for Small Scale Milk Producers Applications for Special Reserve Quota

The EC has agreed to two important changes in the above Scheme:

- the milk quota limit for eligible producers has been increased from 12,819 gallons to 25,638 gallons.
- the 10 cow limit per producer had been abolished.

Ireland has been granted a special reserve quota of 63,400 Suckler Cows to cater for these changes. This quota will be allocated in the first instance to producers with a milk quota of less than 25,638 gallons on 1 April, 1993 who have not applied previously for the Suckler Cow Scheme or who, if they have applied previously, were limited by the 10 cow rule. To be eligible, producers must have held on 1 January, 1993, Suckler Cows of beef breeds which are surplus to their requirements to produce their milk quota (based on an average milk yield of 844 gallons) and must maintain the same number of Suckler Cows in their herd until 30 June, 1993. Furthermore, producers who have already established entitlement to Suckler Cow quota but were limited by the 10 cow rule are required to keep both the Suckler Cows on which their quota was established and the Suckler Cows which they are submitting for the Special Reserve Quota in their herds until 30th June, 1993.

Application Forms for an allocation from the Reserve Quota from producers who meet the conditions outlined above will be available from the local offices of the Department from Friday 30 April, 1993. The closing date for receipt of applications is 17 May, 1993.

Any unused quota will be retained in the national reserve and producers who have a milk quota of less than 25,638 gallons but did not have eligible cows on 1 January, 1993 may apply at a later date for an allocation from the reserve quota. These applications will be subject to such conditions as the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry lays down for the allocation of the national reserve quota.

Letters are being issued to flockowners informing them of their ewe premium quota entitlements. All flockowners who have an automatic entitlement to a quota, should receive their notification by 10 May, 1993.

The quotas being notified to flockowners do not take into account any leasing/transfer arrangements entered into by flockowners. Notifications of such arrangements submitted to the Department are being processed and flockowners will be notified of their new quotas in due course.

## Closing Date for Notification of Transfer/ Leasing Arrangements

The closing date for notification of leases and transfers of ewe premium quotas has been extended to 28 May, 1993. Flockowners are reminded, however, that the premium will not be paid on ewes in excess of the numbers declared on their application forms or on ewes not in their ownership and possession at the time of application for the premium.

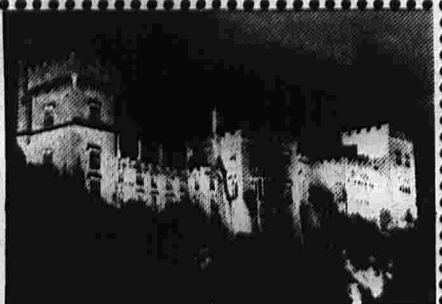

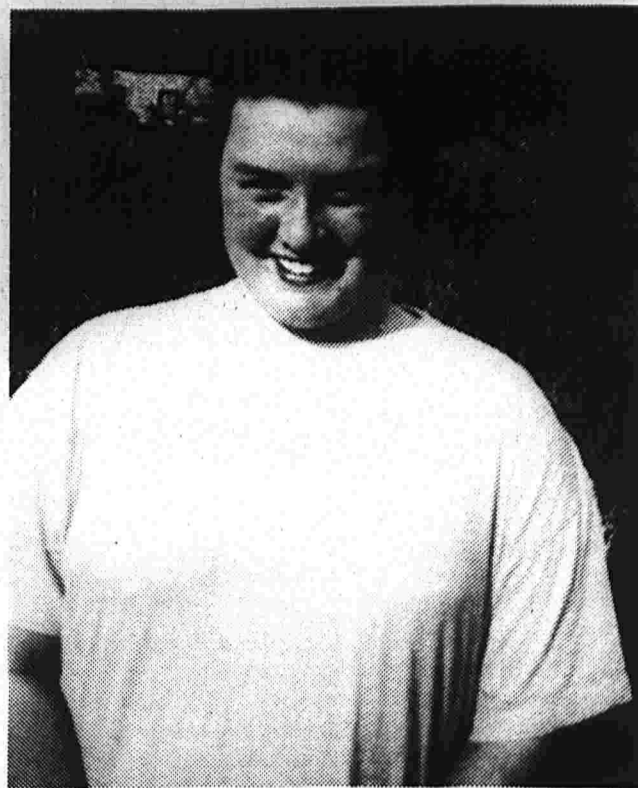

Sausages made from turkey meat are surprisingly tasty and are appearing in a growing number of supermarkets. We've baked them in cheesy scone 'blankets' — ideal to take on a picnic, served with salad. They are also delicious eaten hot.

### TURKEY 'BLANKETS'

#### Ingredients:

8 turkey sausages  
4 tbs (60ml) pickle or

#### chutney

12 oz (350g) self-raising flour

1/2 tsp salt

3 tps baking powder

3 oz (75g) butter

4 oz (125g) cheddar cheese, grated

1/4 pt (150ml) milk

celery sticks to garnish

#### Method

Brush sausages with pickle and cook near top of oven at 450° F, 230° C, gas mark 8 for 20 minutes. Sift flour, salt and baking powder together,

rub in butter until mixture resembles coarse breadcrumbs. Add half cheese, stir in milk and remaining pickle to form soft dough. Divide into eight balls and roll into circles.

Remove sausages from oven, place one on each circle and roll up. Place on baking tray with seal beneath and sprinkle with remaining cheese. Bake at top of oven for another 12-15 minutes, until crusty and golden.

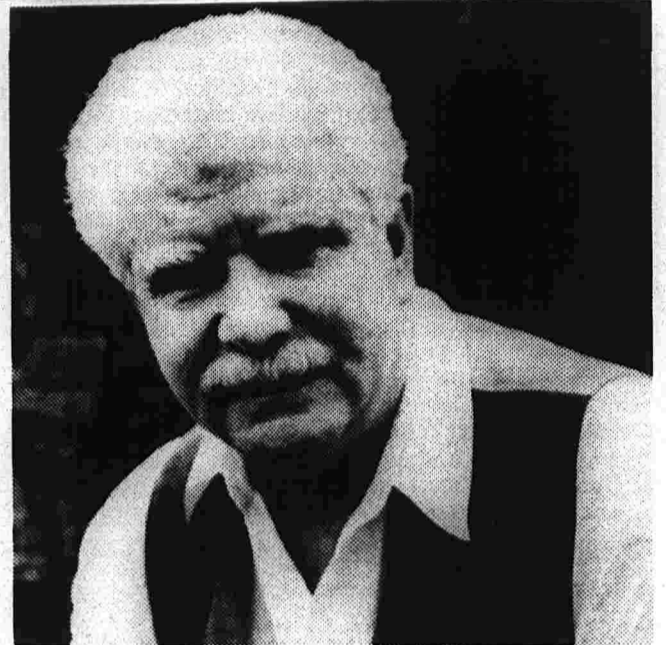
# "Goodbye To The Hill" At Park Hotel

Lee Dunne's play "Goodbye To The Hill" is breaking box office records on its 16-week tour which began in Cork on March 2 and has enthralled audiences at the Everyman Theatre for one week and at Mallow, Limerick, Ennis, Castlebar, Ballina and Waterford. Such has been the response that an extra seven performances have been arranged for Cork, four extra for Limerick and an extra show for Ennis.

"Goodbye To The Hill" which is Ireland's longest running play, having run for two-and-a-quarter years, 701 performances in Dublin, is proving a huge hit with country audiences. After the opening night in Cork, Lee Dunne addressed his cast: "Look folks, this is the opening night of the tour. After what we saw here tonight, it cannot get any better in the weeks ahead."

The play was first performed at the Eblana Theatre, Dublin, in 1978. Audiences flocked to see the stage version of one of Ireland's all time favourite books. Moving between Eblana and the Oscar Theatres, "Goodbye To The Hill" ran for a total of 26 weeks. This was regarded as a phenomenal run at that time.

In 1985 the play ran for 8 weeks at Dublin's 1,200-seater Olympia Theatre. "Goodbye To The Hill" had arrived and confounded the critics. More spectacular success was around the corner. In September 1998 "Goodbye To The Hill" opened at Dublin's Regency Hotel and after a full two-and-a-quarter years, 6 nights a week ended the

record-breaking stint on December 5, 1992. Having observed the large number of people who had travelled to see the play nightly from different parts of the country by car and specially hired buses, Lee Dunne set in motion plans to take the play to the country people in their own towns and villages. Producer James Cafferty was the man to set the ball rolling and a 16 week tour was organised.

#### PLOUGHED AHEAD

Despite being turned down for a touring grant from the Arts Council, Dunne and Cafferty ploughed ahead with their ambitious plans and already their labours are bearing fruit.

The first weeks of the tour have been a resounding success. Even though the play is set in Dublin, rural audiences can identify with the content of the play —

poverty, struggle, love, unemployment and inevitably emigration.

The all-star professional cast includes some of Ireland's best known performers — Padraig Murray, brother of BBC's Bryan, Claire Mullan, Ann O'Driscoll, Frank Melia, Brendan Morrissey, Aoife Lawless, Jennifer Gibney and Declan Finn.

Stage Manager is Paul Winters who was involved in the eight week performance of "Goodbye To The Hill" at the Neptune Theatre, Liverpool in September/October 1992.

## Light Up Your Garden With Some Electrifying Bulbs!

Dame Edna Everage's favourite blooms — the good old gladioli — can be just the job to take over the colourful duties of the now faded tulips and daffodils. Like Dame Edna, gladioli are very showy and a perennial delight but they do need a warm dry spot if they are to be left in all year — gardeners in northern areas are advised to lift, dry carefully and then store the corms in autumn.

Despite the Everage patronage, they are actually natives of South Africa rather than Australia.

The main drawback with gladioli is lower blooms coming out and fading first. Stems can look scruffy by the time the higher blooms are making their show. This explains why they are often cultivated mainly as cut flowers raised alongside the vegetables rather than as part of the border.

But if you are set in a garden display, the smaller Primulinus and Butterfly hybrids look much less ragged.

Irises are a similar favourite also preferring well-drained and sunny sites yet rewarding the gardener with a good show of sword-like foliage from their rhizomes, before they even produce a bloom.

Colours are usually deep and superb, ranging from violet through red, pink and yellow to white. There are even colour combinations such as the gold and maroon and maroon Staten Island.

Lilies are another bulb family worth investigating, particularly as there are so many different varieties. But mulching is important as the bulbs are more like a se-

ries of scales with the stem emerging from the centre of the cluster and often needing to be close to the soil surface.

This means they can dry out quickly and be damaged easily by frost — hence the need for a moisture-retaining and insulating mulch layer.

Winter cold can be a particular danger for the 'leggy' Spire Lily, which produces lines of white bells.

Rather showier are the well-known Tiger Lily, less familiar Madonna Lily and the golden-rayed types from Japan.

For the warmer parts of the country you could also try Amaryllis Belladonna — not to be confused with the popular indoor bulb, Hippeastrum.

It produces bright 'trumpets' which also give off a marvellous scent on late summer nights.

Another type worth checking out are the Alliums, which produce large, colourful and showy 'footballs' up to a foot across and sometimes suitable for drying and use as indoor decorations.

If they sound familiar you may not be surprised to learn that they are related to onions or chives, which produce wonderful mauve puff-ball flowers if left to their own devices.



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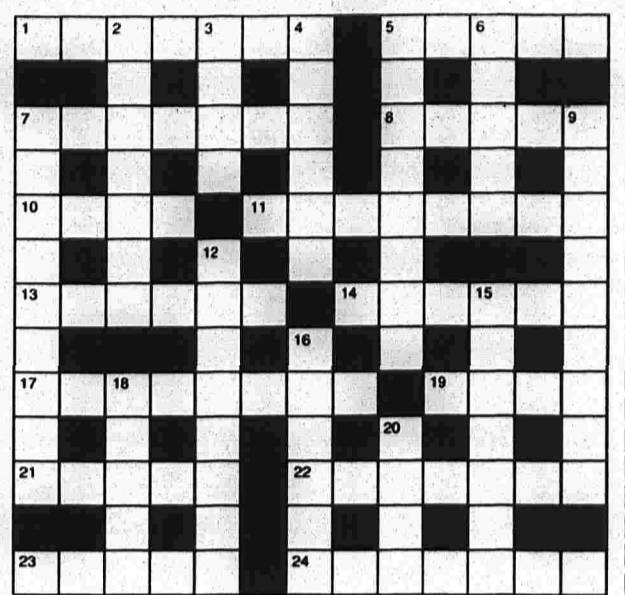

## DUNGARVAN PREMIER PIGEON CLUB NOTES

### Pigeon Racing — What It's All About

On Friday night our members with their pigeons come to the Marking Station. A rubber ring with numbers on it is placed on the pigeons leg, and the number is recorded on a special race sheet which every member has. The pigeons are then put into special hampers and put on a pigeon transporter which brings the pigeon to the race point. There, if the weather is good, the pigeons are released.

When the pigeons arrive home the owner takes off the rubber ring and puts it into a thimble that is placed in a special pigeon clock.

The time of the pigeon is then recorded. The clock is then brought to the Marking Station where the clock paper with the time of the pigeon is taken out. The race data is then programmed into a computer which will give the velocity of the winning pigeon.

### KNOCKNAGRANAGH

This week we start the back nine in Knocknagrangh with three outstanding holes 10, 11 and 12.

**Hole 10** — 388 yards, par 4. This hole runs down hill to a lake 285 yards from the tee; from these the ground rises gently to a large green which is guarded by bunkers right and left; out-of-bounds on the left extends the entire length of the hole from tee to green with a large fairway bunker on the right.

**Hole 11** — 389 yards, par 4. This hole requires a perfectly hit tee-shot to clear the lake — a carry of about 165 yards — leaving a long second shot, up-hill into the prevailing wind, to an elevated green; two large bunkers guard the entrance of the green; undoubtedly one of the best holes on the course.

**Hole 12** — 506 yards, par 5. This hole dog-legs to the left after the tee-shot with out-of-bounds on the left all the way from tee to green; the long hitter will need to play two great shots to reach this green while the average player will be left with an approach shot of 150/160 yards to make the green in regulation; bunkers on the left and a mound on the right await the wayward approach shot while the sloping ground at the rear of the green may also cause problems.

Conventional wisdom is that these three holes will separate the "boys from the men" thus deciding the outcome of many competitions.

Flashing Street, rather surprisingly, was a clear favourite to win his first handicap under top weight, but a mistake a mile from home put paid to his chances under Tony Martin as Francis Woods on Son of War appeared to have poached a winning advantage after the third last.

Fissure Seal, though, never surrendered tamely, and answered Bradley's urgings and by the time they reached the final fence there was little to separate the principles with Jassu the only other runner in contention.

To the delight of dentists Sheila Kenneally, Richard O'Hara, Sean McCarthy and Con O'Keefe who formed the Delton Syndicate, de Bromhead's stable star proceeded to claim his seventh victory from ten outings this season and book a possible crack at the

French champion hurdle.

"At least today things worked out well after I found out only at noon Mark Dwyer would not be riding for us," said trainer de Bromhead.

These mishaps left the front running Ballyvooney in command under young Paul Carberry and they had both the runner up Spur of the Moment and the favourite Sylvia Fox beaten before the final turn on ground that rode rather tacky if somewhat faster than on Tuesday.

# Under-21 And Minor Footballers In Action In Munster Championship

## Club Championships Continue On The Home Front

Although the club championship matches listed for the weekend are of great importance to the participants, the main focus is on the inter-county scene where our Under-21 footballers take on Limerick at Fraher Field on Friday evening and the minor footballers play Tipperary at Clonmel on to-morrow, Thursday evening. Both are first round games.

### U-21 FOOTBALL V. LIMERICK

At the request of the county selectors this game has been switched from Leamybrien to Fraher Field, as they obviously feel that the Dungarvan venue would give them the better chance. The decision certainly could not have been out of consideration for our opponents, as we have decided not to do that thing any more following all the controversy that followed our trip to Milltown where we got the mother of all beatings from Kerry (it was 5-

19 to 0-6). The figure of 320 miles round trip for some of our players was mentioned at the following County Board meeting.

Cork's Larry Tompkins has been helping out with the training of the panel of players and this decision by the selectors has given a great boost to the lads who feel that they can take Limerick on this occasion.

I have not heard the team at the time of writing, but it is very likely to include many of the team which played Limerick in the minor championship in a draw and replay three years ago. Limerick, too will have quite a number of these players in the lineout. In this game the sides drew at Fermoy and we lost the replay by a single point (0-13 to 0-12) after we had missed a couple of very good chances of winning.

This would indicate that there is very little between the counties at this level, so for either side the game is there to be won. Hopefully

the venue and crowd advantage will mean enough to Waterford to make the badly needed breakthrough. The selectors certainly have not spared themselves in searching out the best talent, playing trial and challenge games and doing everything possible to boost the confidence of the players — the team was due to be selected on Monday night.

### SENIOR HURLING CHAMPIONSHIP TALLOW V. COLLIGAN

With two wins to their credit, Tallow will go all out to make it three and plant themselves at the top of the table and nicely poised for an assault on Ballygunner's title, this year. They played good hurling against Portlaw and if repeating this against Colligan, who have just one point from two games, they will win.

Dungarvan did very well against Tallow and have considered themselves a bit unlucky not to have won. They have a lot of skillful hurlers and cannot be taken for granted by any of the teams in the senior championship. While pushing themselves to win their fourth football title in a row, they are by no means neglecting the hurling side of their activities. Mount Sion never find it easy to beat Dungarvan and when last met (in the 1991 championship) Dungarvan were closer than the scoreline of 3-12 to 2-7 might seem to indicate. # County Board Meeting

With the May County Board meeting coming so soon after the resumed April meeting, there can be very little business to be transacted apart from the usual committee reports.

The matter of charging all officials to gain entry to matches under the auspices of the Board and the proposal that all clubs give an interest-free loan for two years of £1,000 are subjects that will be discussed by delegates.

Whatever about the interest-free loan, it is most unlikely that delegates will vote in favour of everyone having to pay going into the grounds. It is going a bit far to expect people who are giving of their time and money in the promotion of the games to have to pay while a considerable portion of patrons regularly gain admission free under some pretext or other.

An interest free loan from every club in the county would yield £57,000 and would considerably reduce the present overdraft, but as one delegate remarked, many of our clubs have overdrafts too.

## DEVELOPMENT PLANS

Final permission to proceed with the planned development of Fraher Field was granted to the Field Committee at last week's meeting of the County Board and it is expected that work will commence within the next few weeks. The overall cost of the development which will include a covered stand to accommodate 3,000 patrons, movement of the embankment and railings to bring the playing area in approximately 25 metres towards the Showground side will be £411,000.

The development of Walsh park is not expected to commence until early next year as plans are not yet fully formulated and planning permission is not applied for. The estimated cost of the development at the city venue may be similar to Fraher Field.

The funding of both projects is presently under discussion between the Coisde Gnótha, Finance and Development Committee and the Field Committees. Negotiations with the Munster Council are completed and the Council Officers, having visited both venues and familiarised themselves with the situation, have agreed to make a total of £240,000 available over the next two years by way of grants and loans. The Council money is to be shared between both grounds and will become available when work gets underway.

Other means of generating finance to make up the considerable shortfall are now

being examined as the County Development Draw, while it is outstandingly successful, will not meet the shortfall.

## DISCIPLINARY COMMITTEE

The new Disciplinary Committee appointed at last week's meeting of the Senior Board, shows only one change from the committee whose term of office ended last week. The committee is Joe Byrne, Erin's Own, Denis McGrath, Affane, Rev. Bro. Dormer, Lismore, Tom Drummy, Eire Og and Eddie Cunningham. Tom Drummy replaces P. J. Ryan who did not seek reappointment.

Joe Byrne who was the outgoing Chairman, warned clubs that there would be no leniency for offenders who are reported for offences against the referee.

## HURLING SELECTORS REQUEST

A report told of injury and examination problems and requested a closedown of hurling championships on the weekend of May 8. County Selector, Jimmy O'Gorman spoke in favour of the request as did some other members, but just the same quite a number were against granting the favour. The matter was referred to the fixtures committee.

A request from the Kerry County Board for a change of date for the junior hurling first round match was not approved. The meeting felt that the junior game should be a part of the announced programme for May 23. It was also pointed out that Kerry will be able to play their second best team while Waterford were refused the same facility by Central Council.

## GAELTACHT SCHOLARSHIPS

The County Board has approved of the granting of the usual twelve scholarships open to girls (4) and boys (8) to Colaiste Na Rinne for the period July 22 to August 12. Nioclás Mac Craith, Oifigeach Gaeilge suggested that because of the special year (the centenary of Connradh na Gaeilge) clubs might consider sponsoring a member for the course.

The cost to the club would be only £20 and if sponsorship was obtained or there was a sharing arrangement the cost would be considerably reduced. All clubs were requested to discuss the matter and if interested to get back to the Oifigeach Gaeilge within the next two weeks.

Application forms for the Board Scholarships will be available from the Board secretaries within the next week or two. Interviews at Lawlor's Hotel at 3 p.m. and Portlaw Hall at 11 a.m. on Saturday, March 22.

## SCOR

The Chairman, Eamon O Murchú who presided at the resumed County Board meeting congratulated Bonmahon and Seana Phobail on having qualified for the All-Ireland finals of Scór and wished them well in the finals on behalf of the County Board.

The national finals will take place at Millstreet Centre on May 22. He told the meeting that 200 tickets were available to Waterford supporters and these could be obtained from Mrs. Liz

Murphy or Monnie Hallahan.

## STRETCHERS

A modern Field Ambulance stretcher which has recently come on the market and which is most suitable for use at our venues, was demonstrated by County Development Officer, John Fraher at the resumed County Board meeting.

The Chairman recommended that clubs who have venues where championship games are played, would purchase same.

## THE HANDPASS

Speaking to a fairly well known retired player at half time during a recent game, I was told that the officials of the G.A.A. were allowing players to ruin the game of football. He said that referees were just as much to blame as they were now ignoring players who picked the ball 'clean' off the ground and taking not notice when players throw the ball instead of doing a proper handpass. He asked me to watch the number of times the ball would be thrown from player to player during the 'second half. He

was right. We lost count of the number of times it was thrown. I had known it already. Like thousands of others I have seen it happen at club and inter-county level for the past couple of years. It is doing harm to the game which is becoming less and less like football and more like volleyball or basketball. In the Referees' Guide to the Playing Rules, the handpass is described as follows — 'When in possession the ball may be struck with the open hand or fist-provided there is a definite striking action,

with the striking hand not being in contact with the ball before delivering the strike.

In a two-handed pass, the ball may be struck off the holding hand by the other hand, or released and struck. In a one-handed pass, the ball shall be released from the hand before being struck by the same hand. The releasing of the ball, when used, shall be considered an integral part of the hand/fisted pass. This is not happening and no one should fool himself into believing that it is.

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# Appeal Against Mushroom Factory Is Valid

"We cannot even prepare the site until we know for certain that we have the planning go-ahead," Mr Murphy said. "Everything is held up and the delay is costing a lot of money."

He stressed that he accepted the democratic right of anyone to object to a development, but he insisted that questions must be asked the way the campaign of opposition to his proposed mushroom factory has been waged.

"Here is an environmentally friendly project that will create jobs in an area where jobs are urgently needed," said Mr. Murphy. "I am both disappointed and disgusted with all the carry on."

The number of objectors however has been slashed in recent weeks by the withdrawal of several of the original signatories opposing the mushroom plant.

These withdrawals have been confirmed in writing to Bord Pleanála, and one of those involved said that she felt angered at the way her support had been obtained by those most active-

ly campaigning against the project.

"Once all the facts were made clear to me I had no hesitation in withdrawing opposition to it," she said.

The planning application for the development was lodged with Waterford County Council on June 25 last year. Many discussions followed however between the developer and officials of the Planning Department, and permission wasn't finally given until February 10 last.

The developer had originally sought permission to provide a total of forty two mushroom tunnels but this was cut back to twenty in the planning decision. A number of conditions were also attached to the permission.

Within a month however the "Friends of The Blackwater" had been set up and an appeal against the County Council decision was lodged.

Now the final outcome to what has become a very vexed issue in West Waterford is very eagerly — and anxiously — awaited.
