

It Pays To Re-cycle All **Your Rubbish**

Everything in the garden seems to burst into life during May, encouraged by the warmth and , hopefully, just enough rainfall.

But what do you do with the sudden glut of 'green stuff' - lawn mowings, hedge clippings, spent spring flowers and so

It's not a problem if you have a garden compost heap. You will be positively rubbing your hands with glee at the prospect of re-cycling all this debris and using it to condition and fertilise the soil when the winter digging season starts. The unglamorous heap is also very environmental and does away with the cost of fertilisers or searching out farmyard manure, which is unpleasant stuff to move around even if it is excellent for the garden.


Anyway, farmers are tending to make more use of this resource themselves as the argument against artificial fertilisers gathers strength.

such as processed chicken manure from battery farms — though I'm not sure I like the idea of helping to support that method of egg production - compacted seaweed, processed bark, mushroom compost and others. But they all involve cost and transport when your own garden can provide the

The heap doesn't have to be an eyesore either - you can buy ready-made compost containers, usually of wire mesh or plastic and in sympathetic shades of green or brown, or you can make your own out of scrap timber. The ideal shape is a 4-5 feet square

soil nourishment for free.

about four feet high. This is sufficiently wide to create a little furnace' in the centre where



You will need four stout corner uprights - I have used old fence posts which were still serviceable after cutting away the rot at the base. You then nail or screw batten crosspieces to the posts. spacing them 3-4 inches apart so that the air can pass into the heap.

Make the lower battens removable on one side, to enable you to get at the fully rotted compost when you need it. Give the structure a good soaking in wood preservative and then position it on a raised base of stout mesh resting on bricks or old fence posts, again to ensure good circulation

But remember you must also keep heat and moisture in, so the top of the heap does need cover - polythene sheet or plywood are fine.

When you lift this cover to add more garden rubbish — vegetable scraps from the kitchen will also do - check the moisture of the material beneath. If it is drying out due to warm weather, water it thoroughly to get conditions back to

You can also accelerate decomposition by adding a proprietary 'compost maker' but this does, of course, add to cost and contradicts the environmental argument. -Arthur Hines.

Ardmore Men Fined £200 On Firearms Charges

Guns believed to have been the property of a deceased Old IRA veteran were the subject of charges against two Co. Waterford men at Youghal District Court last Friday.

Brendan Griffin, a 38 year old unemployed father of three of Main Street, Ardmore pleaded guilty to selling a single barrel pump-action shotgun, a 45 revolver and

two 45 bullets to John Farrissey, 8, College Road, Ardmore, without being a registered firearms dealer.

Farrissey (44), who is serving a prison sentence, also pleaded guilty to having possession of the guns and bullets on October 8 without having a firearms certificate.

Supt. Maurice Murray told the court that the guns

are believed to have been the property of Griffin's father-in-law, a most respected Old IRA man, now deceased.

The Supt. said Griffin came across them while clearing out a shed and he subsequently agreed to sell them to Farrissey for £270. He eventually did so for £250.

Supt. Murray said Farrissey took them to a firearms

dealer to have then valued and subsequently tried to sell them.

Mr. J. P. Gordon, solr. for Farrissey, said that the guns were possibly over 100 years old. Farrissey purchased them with the intention of reselling them as antiques but he ended up losing the £250 he had paid Griffin for them.

Judge Michael Pattwell accepted that the case had no subversive connotations. He fined each defendant £200.





THE HERMITAGE

The condition of the house in Abbeyside known as the "The Hermitage" has been a subject for discussion at a number of Urban Council meetings. Cllr. Mary Dixon stated "it is only fit to be demolished. I hope that is done before there will be a tragedy there."

This house was built in

the early 19th century with later additions in the mid 19th century. The main entrance is of two storeys and three bays, on the ground floor is a porch with projecting bay windows on each side, the porch along with four pillars supports an iron work balcony. To the South is a small round tower attached to the house

- it has small blank pointed windows and crenellations and is built of brick.

On the North-East side is a wing built in the mid 19th century. It is of two storeys and two bays and has a larger tower with pointed windows which holds the stairs. The house originally had two circular gatelodges and was owned in

the 1830's by W. H. Barron Esq. Dungarvan Town Clerk Mr. Bertie White stated that what has been taking place at the building is pure vandalism. The owner had put up a security fence but it was breached. Now the Urban Council will have to consider serving a dangerous building notice on the Owner.

ABBEYSIDE — William Fraher in his book 'Dungarvan An Architectural Inventory' states - Abbeyside was a heavily wooded area when the Augustinians founded their Abbey in the 13th century. It probably grew up around the Castle of the McGrath's. The erection of the Abbey in 1290 added further to the cultural and economic development

of the area.

An open strand existed from the Causeway to a small cove opposite the Look-Out known as "Cúl a' tSailín" where these was a ferry crossing to the town.

In 1816 Abbeyside was joined to Dungarvan by a Bridge and Causeway erect-ed by the 5th Duke of Devonshire. William Thackeray described this area in 1843 as follows:— "In former times before His Grace spent his eighty thousand pounds upon the Causeway this wide estuary

was called "Dungarvan Prospect" because the ladies in the country, walking over the river at low water took off their shoes and stockings (such as had them) and tucking up their clothes, exhibited what I had never seen and therefore cannot be

expected to describe . . ."







Point Saved For Ireland





Ireland's battling qualities are still there to be admired and acknowledged — the point saved by Niall Quinn's 10th international goal preserves Ireland's chance to gain a points advantage over the group leaders Spain and Denmark.

In my preview of this game, I warned against giving the Danes a goal start, I questioned Aldridge's fitness and Bonner's form.

That goal start, the Danish tactics and some below par performances almost cost us dear.

The Danes played hard and used the long ball, with Schmeichel rarely throwing the ball to start attacks. This role reversal almost threw the Irish, whose quest for the equaliser wasn't helped by French referee Harrel.

The goal by Kim Vilfort has been replayed and analysed with most of the blame being directed at Paul Mc-

I'm an admirer of Pakie Bonner but in his performance against Northern Ireland he seemed stiff, unsure, not confident, reluctant even to come off his line. This I feel is the root cause of the goal — the header was poor but Bonner's call must be questioned, his reaction or lack of it once McGrath made contact with the ball said it all. Jack Charlton has always insisted the goalkeeper must come off his line, control the penalty area. Bonner hasn't done this recently, the unease between the back four and the goalkeeper is testament to that.

Outfield Ireland were like the curates egg — good in patches — Denis Irwin had a poor game by his recent high standards for Ireland and Manchester United. Had he something on his mind? Like Eddie Eddie Mc-Goldrick he stuck with it. Despite being booked the Crystal Palace defender slotted in well and his control on the ball was an advantage on the few occasions he got forward. Despite the nature of the goal conceded, McGrath and Kernaghan did well. Kernaghan made a vital if questionable tackle on Lars Elstrop to keep Ireland in the game in the second half. Also McGrath searched at every opportunity to redeem that soft lead goal forcing the cor-

ner that brought Quinn's equaliser. Our midfield were disappointing, especially Townsend and Keane who, despite their honest effort, did not match Staunton's and to a lesser extent Houghton's success against a teak tough and tactically correct Danish midfield. On the credit side Ireland's midfield fought all the way. This spirit was vital in what was an uphill battle that

none shirked from.

Form and match fitness are vital for every footballer especially strikers, John Aldridge's return to international football confirmed my fears about his recovery from an operation following a serious stomach injury. The fact that Tranmere United have qualified for the promotion play-offs can help him get the fitness his role for Ireland demands. No such worries for Niall Quinn, his 3rd goal this season against his Manchester based rival Schmeichel capped a great performance that I believe deserved the man of the match award. Tony Cascarino's introduction by Charlton for Aldridge did not surprise me, although the omission of David Kelly (Newcastle) from the panel did. Cascarino made an immediate difference and he contributed to the pressure that finally saw the Danish defence crack for Ireland's well worked and deserved

That early goal upset Ireland's game plan and unlike some national football pundits I never felt that the European Champions were going to lie down and die just be-

cause they had to play in Lansdowne Road.

Richard Moller Nielsen's side are back in form, a combination of skill, strength and tactical awareness, that confirms Ireland's resilience in saving a point against the

Three away games now give Ireland a chance to gain points on Denmark and Spain who have dropped points against Latvia and Lithuania.

Full points away to Albania, Latvia and Lithuania is asking a lot, if Ireland got 5 points at best, 4 at worse, they are still on course for America, anything less will be a serious setback.

T.V. OR NOT T.V.

The Albanians always keen to make a killing sold their T.V. rights to a Dutch company, whose original fee was deemed too high by R.T.E. Brilliant Display Helps Waterford Qualify For Munster Semi-Final

The second half of this exciting and very entertaining under-21 Munster Championship first round game at the Fraher Field on Friday saw Waterford play to a high standard of football that we have not seen at under-age for many, many

They played with spirit, commitment and style in giving a display that de-lighted the huge crowd who turned up to see the game in brilliant sunshine.

After the game, Cork's Larry Tomkins, who is assisting with the training of the panel, expressed his satisfaction at the manner in which the team performed, especially in the second half when they took complete control and afforded their well-prepared opponents no chance of getting back into the game. The decision of the selectorial team to acquire the services of Tomkins created a great buzz around the county and hence the unusual interest countywide in the game.

Remembering that last

year we were hammered by Kerry who had a 28 points winning margin against us in the first round, we must feel very satisfied at having brought a £3,000 crowd back to see us play the 1993 first round and win into the bargain. The morale of this is, that if you do the right thing, success is bound to come sooner or later.

The victory gave the county morale a welcome shot in the arm and being achieved only 24 hours after our spiritless performance in the minor game at Clonmel, it could not have

happened at a better time. Still, it would be foolish to read too much into this win as a lot of hard work has still to be done before we play Tipperary in the Munster semi-final on Friday, July 2. The game is fixed for Dungarvan but will have to be switched to another venue within the county. PLAY

In the second minute after Fergal Cunningham had been fouled going through, Waterford were awarded a

free which was converted by David Whelan to give the home side a lead which they were to hold all the way. Both sides had wides, before a Waterford breakaway, saw Kieran Whelan pass to Eamon Crotty who shot home the first of our goals in the 4th minute. After this round the football championship will be suspended until the weekend of June 26/27, but the hurling championship, which is also being suspended will resume two weeks earlier.

The resumption date for the football championships is now likely to be affected by the training for the Under-21 semi-final on July

AT LEAMYBRIEN

It is going to be a very busy weekend for Kilrossanty club who play at Colligan against Sliabh gCua on Saturday and then host no less than three senior football championship games on Sunday.

The afternoon double header will feature the Dungarvan versus Kilmacthomas second round match which must be described as one of the two big matches of the weekend. The county champions were in devastating form against Dunhill in their first game while Kilmac' were just pipped by the Nire after wasting many chances against them on the

Dungarvan will again be the favourites here, but it will be a totally different ball game with Kilmac' as the opponents. Leamybrien is one of their favourite and lucky venues and they rarely play a poor game there, so the mid-county club must be given some chance here and if they play to their best form anything can happen. Dungarvan are now on a 'high' having come back into contention in hurling last weekend and with notions of the elusive double in mind, they will try their mightiest to avoid any slipup that might injure their present profile. 
