Late Night Disturban Discussed

Late night disturbances in Dungarvan last weekend have brought calls from local be late night "chippers."

"I would prefer to live beside a brothel than beside chip vans," Cllr. Tony Wright told the monthly meeting of the Urban Council.

Cllr. Austin Hallahan referred to disturbances in the town in the early hours of Monday morning last when a number of business premises had their windows broken. He said they should all be concerned about the situation and felt chip shops should not be allowed to remain open until all the hours.

The Chairwoman, Cllr.

Nuala Ryan said the chip shops are open late only at weekends, but Clir. Hallahan disagreed and said every morning of the week the clean up of the town has to begin at 6 o'clock.

Cllr. Mary Dixon said all the chip shops should be made close at a reasonable hour. She referred to one such outlet and described it as a "death trap" at week-

"It is high time," said Cllr. Dixon, "that legislation was introduced that will compel such premises to close their

doors at a reasonable hour just like public houses."

Cllr. Declan Goode however said it is not the "chippers" that are at fault for the late night disturbances but the people who frequent them. The chip shop owners are earning an honest living and it is the people going into them that are causing the trouble.

Cllr. Paddy Power described the disturbances in the town last weekend as "deplorable." He believed that if there were no late night discos there wouldn't "The damage caused around the town last Monday morning was a dis-grace," he said.

VANDALISM

Cllr. Goode also referred to vandalism and said the problem is "worse than ever" as far as Dungarvan is concerned.

He said he couldn't understand the mentality of those who engaged in wanton vandalism which there seems to be no end to in the

"We must not, however, throw in the towel, we must try to assert our authority," Cllr. Goode said.

Irish Wildlife Mobiles produce a range of 13 different handpainted timber mobiles depicting the wildlife of

Ireland. Each mobile comes complete with a description of the natural history of the animals and individual pieces can also be purchased. The mobiles are marketed throughout Ireland in craft and gift shops and are also exported to Great Britain, Continental Europe, the US and Japan.

RIGHTS

QUESTION — We are a non-marital couple with three children. I am presently unemployed and receiving Unemployment Assistance of £129 per week. I have been offered a place on a Social Employment Scheme for which I would be paid £145 per week. I want to work but understand that this payment will be liable to tax. Can you clarify the position?

ANSWER — Payments under the Social Employment Scheme (SES) are liable to tax. If you were a married couple and your SES was your only income, then your tax exemption limit would be £8,250 per year (£158 p.w.) and you would be exempt from tax.

However, in your particular case you would be taxed as a single man, your basic tax free allowance would be £57 p.w. and you would be liable for tax of £23.76 p.w.

Unlike a normal job where you are paid a wage for the job, the Social Employment Scheme or a Social Welfare Payment pays you according to your family size. So, there is a strong case to be made that only the personal rate of your payments should be taxed and the increase for adult and child dependents should be treated as their income. In this event they would be exempt from tax as their own personal tax free allowances would cover their part of the pay-

We understand that a case in relation to the taxation of the child dependant portion of a Social Welfare Widows Pension was successfully appealed to the Appeals Commissioner, but this has now been referred to the High Court by the Revenue Commissioners.

Conflicting Evidence In

A Circuit Court Judge has commented on the two "absolutely conflicting accounts" he had been given of a violent two-car crash on the main Lismore-Cappoquin road in the early hours of December 9, 1990.

Dungarvan District Court heard how one of the cars driven by a 25 year old East Corkman, Paul O'Brien, Killeagh, had continued on after the impact and demolished a low wall before ending up on its roof on the incorrect side of the road.

O'Brien appealed against a District Court conviction for dangerous driving, while three of his passengers also appealed against

convictions for failing to give appropriate informa-tion to a garda officer at the scene of the accident.

The three appellants were O'Brien's 27 year old brother Martin, Richard Geaney, Dungourney, Co. Cork and Patrick Barron, a 28 year old farmer of Fountain, Knockanore, Co. Wa-

Kieran O'Brien of Midleton, Co. Cork, told the Court that he was driving from Cappoquin towards Lismore when he saw the full lights of an approaching car. It was on its incorrect side of the road and though he pulled in towards the hard shoulder the oncoming car crashed into the right front of his car and carried on into a wall and ended up on its roof.

Garda O. Croke said he arrived at the scene at around 2.50 a.m. and spoke to Geaney, Barron and Martin O'Brien. They wouldn't give him any assistance about who the driver of their car was and were not co-operative.

Garda Croke said he searched nearby fields using a torch but still could not locate the driver. Eventually Paul O'Brien turned up at Cappoquin Garda Station at 6 a.m. in the company of his father and freely admitted he was the driver.

Paul O'Brien in evidence said he was driving on his correct side of the road when he saw the strong lights of an approaching car. He was on his correct side of the road but suddenly there was a "big bang" and he remembered nothing

O'Brien said he must have wandered from the scene

though he had no recollec-tion of it. He rang his father sometime later from Lismore and he came and took him to the Garda Station.

The other three appellants denied that they had not cooperated with the Garda at the scene of the accident and Martin O'Brien said he told the garda that the car was driven by his brother Paul.

Having commented on the total conflict of evidence, Judge D. P. Sheridan said that while Paul O'Brien did not do himself any good by leaving the scene, at least his father soon put paid to

that.
"Given the conflict of evidence, the dangerous driv-ing case against Paul O'Brien has not been proven beyond all reasonable doubt," said Judge Sheridan, who upheld O'Brien's appeal against the District Court convic-

Judge Sheridan however adjourned until today his decision on the appeals by the other three appellants.

Seven Day Sentence For **Youghal Man**

An unemployed labourer who appeared in custody before Tallow Court was given a seven-day sentence by Judge M. Pattwell. Patrick Duggan, Sarsfield Terrace, Youghal, pleaded

guilty to causing malicious damage to a plate glass win-dow to the amount of £288 at "Ye Olde Dungarvan Oak" licensed premises, O'Connell Street, Dungarvan on August 7 last.

Supt. Ray McAndrew said Duggan had been put out of the licensed premises following an argument. He returned later and was refused admission and smashed the window with his fist. The Supt. added that Duggan had a long list of previous convictions

going back to 1984. Mr. J. P. Gordon, Solr., said most of Duggan's convictions were drink-related. There was no realistic hope of compensation being paid.

Judge Pattwell imposed the seven day sentence on Duggan to commence at the termination of a six-month sentence he is presently

Greenhouses are heaven for diseases


LAST month, I was urging people to go out and buy a greenhouse in which to raise earlier and healthier flowers and vegetables.

Many people will be planning ever more ambitious cultivation under glass such as vines, stunning begonias, aubergines and exotic varieties that need careful all year round care. But there is a downside to greenhouse cultivation if you don't take reasonable precautions. Those same warm and calm conditions that the plants love so much are also heaven for pests and disease.

Tips to beat them are:

- 1 Cut out diseased areas on plants, such as mould, rust and middle and be ready to spray, dust or paint on treatment to prevent its return
- Remove and clear up spent flowers and leaves quickly before they rot and attract disease
- 3 Keep stagings and floors swept and clean to prevent pests and dis eases making themselves at home
- 4 Pluck out weeds as soon as they appear. They look scruffy and will compete more strongly than your plants for any food and moisture in the compact soil medium to be found in the greenhouse.
- Keep checking plants for problems and especially under leaves where insects love to congregate
- 6 Spring clean scrub everything down with a weak solution of disin fectant and don't forget to include plant pots, boxes and canes
- 7 Follow later in the season with a proprietary smoke treatment. You close the greenhouse, light the cone and the deadly smoke seeks

out pests.

WHITEFLY — a particular nuisance because it is so easy to miss. The flies are so tiny they look like fine dust on the plant and when disturbed, yet they quickly ruin fuchsias. Like greenfly, they leave honeydew on leaves.

SCALE — another honeydew producer, it is extremely difficult to spot because it looks like a natural lump on the leaf or stem. It can be particularly difficult to eradicate. If you can, try to wipe off as many as possible before spraying.

Other pests to watch out for are mealy bug, red spider mite, thrips, leaf miners and ants.

Unfortunately, some pests are so persistent that even the most environmentally-minded gardeners find it hard not to resort to the arsenal of expensive sprays, dusts, smoke treatments and washes available to combat the pests. When using any of them, always:

- mix to the correct strength
- never use on vegetables and fruit before harvesting
- never spray in a draft or breeze
- beware of inhaling chemicals in confined space such as a greenhouse
- cover bare skin and use gloves especially.

Twelve Month Custodial Sentence For Teenage Drug Pusher

A teenage drug pusher was given a twelve month custodial sentence by Judge M. Pattwell at Dungarvan District Court.

The 16-year-old youth pleaded guilty to having a quantity of cannabis resin in his possession on October 27 last. He pleaded not guilty to a second charge of having the cannabis in his possession on that occasion for the purpose of supplying it to others.

Inspector M. Blake told the court that the teenager alighted from a bus in Dungarvan where gardai had him under observation. They saw him discard something on the roadway which they took possession of and it was subsequently analysed as cannabis resin.

Inspector Blake said quantities of cannabis were

removed from the youth's clothes and the total amount seized would make 234 cigarettes.

Sgt. D. Sheehan said some of it was pre-wrapped making them believe it was for sale.

Defence Solicitor, Ms. M. Ronayne contended that the youth had purchased the cannabis in Waterford intending it for his own use only.

Judge Pattwell commented that the amount of cannabis the youth had in his possession must have cost him at least £200. "Where does a 16 year old get that kind of money" he asked.

Convicting the youth on

both charges, Judge Pattwell rejected all pleas not to impose a custodial sentence.

Sentencing him to 12 months detention in St. Patrick's Institution, Judge Pattwell said he knew of only one way of dealing with drug pushers.

"In this case I am not

going to ignore the fact that he was a drug pusher in a comparatively small town," the Judge added.

The youth was also given one, three and six-month concurrent sentences on other charges of burglary, malicious damage, taking a car without consent and uninsured driving. He was also disqualified from driving for twelve months.

Recognisances were fixed in the event of an appeal.

Introduction Of I.D. System Being Mooted By Vintners Association

The introduction of an I.D. system for licensed premises is under consideration in Dungarvan and is being mooted by the Vintners Association, Garda Inspector M. Blake told Judge M. Pattwell at the local District Court.

Inspector Blake said they are also considering the involvement of the schools and every effort will be made to make the scheme, if it was eventually introduced, a success.

The Inspector was responding to comments made by Judge Pattwell about instances of under-age drinking he had encountered in Dungarvan through the court.

The Judge warned that publicans convicted of serving drink to underage persons might encounter

difficulties when it came to applying for the renewal of their licences.

Inspector Blake said the I.D. scheme had been introduced in other parts of the country but had been abused to the point where it had become unworkable.

However, if it is introduced in Dungarvan every effort will be made to ensure it is effective.

Cappoquin Pork & **Bacon Blackwater Cycling Club Notes**



Members of Waterford County Council at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan on Monday week extended congratulations to Michael McGrath and family, Main Street whose abattoir has now reached the exacting standards of the Abattoirs Act, 1968.

"Michael McGrath's Abattoir in Lismore has just recently reached licensing standard under the Abattoirs Act, 1988, the first of nine local authority abattoirs supplying the domestic meat trade in Co. Waterford to do so.

The Abattoirs Act 1988 was drawn up so that the high standards demanded by EC legislation of export meat factories would also apply to abattoirs supplying the domestic market.

Two more of the nine abattoirs should reach licensing standard in the next few months, and by the end of 1993 I estimate that six of the nine abattoirs will be fully licensed. The remaining three abattoirs should be up to standard in early 1994.



If he plays to his best form between the posts he will probably prove himself to be the best that we have got for this problem position.
