SEEFIN MOUNTAIN

I am writing to oppose proposed developments on Seefin Mountain in the Comeraghs. Apart from the ruination of an environment unchanged for centuries, there is every possibility that this site will be used for the purpose of relaying the multi-microwave television distribution system. Although the company says it has "no plans" to install such a system, there appears nothing to prevent them from doing so if permission for a large and ugly tower on Seefin is granted.

Such a monstrosity would be clearly visible across County Waterford and South Tipperary and on those grounds alone should be opposed. How long would it be before Seefin is bristling with antennas and

dishes? However, there is a deeper issue here. The MMD system regarding the transmission of television is prohibited across Europe due to fears over microwave radiation. In the words of one researcher "The Irish people are exposing themselves to a naexperiment." tional doubts exist over long term exposure to microwave radiation and until such doubts are put to rest, there should be no question of installing such a system here.

In the light of proven technology, such as cable and satellite, there can be no justification whatsoever in exposing the Irish people to what other European countries regard as dirty technology.



CLIMBING plants are available in containers for planting all-year round but May planting is ideal.

Jobs you might have in mind for climbers are decorating walls, fences, trellises, pergolas or eyesores like old tree stumps or run-down sheds.

Some types such as ivy and Virginia Creeper need no help clinging to surfaces, but others may do, especially

Fortunately, shops and garden centres can supply special fixing nails, trellis or green netting needed to give them a

Another consideration for some varieties in site aspect — the less hardy prefer to be south-facing while the tougher will stand a northern outlook.

Once this is settled you should then prepare the location carefully because the plant could be there many years and also be quite expensive.

Double-dig (the depth of two spades) to break up the subsoil and aerate the topsoil before conditioning with well-rotted


If you haven't already chosen, you then need to consider what to plant. There is plenty on offer at garden centres and the better ones will have advice labels on each specimen, but here are a few wellknown climbers worth considering:

IVY - perhaps the toughest and easiest to grow, it can cling to most surfaces and withstand northern chill and shade, though the more attractive variegated types need more light.

It also grows quickly if you are keen to see a result, but established plants need ruthless pruning in May and June.

CLEMATIS - a real favourite due to delicate flowers and dainty tendrils, which

enable it to cling to wood or wire trellises. Varieties offer blooms of different sizes and colour and it thrives in most soil



HYDRANGEA — specifically Hydrangea Petiolaris, can cling and thrive even on a north wall. It needs pruning in spring and produces attractive bright green leaves as well as delicate white flowers.

ROSES — no shortage of climbing varieties and they look superb decorating walls, fences or pergolas.

However, don't forget that they are just as prone to greenfly and other pests as the familiar types so keep an eye out for

WISTERIA - a real favourite with its beautiful mauve flowers. It needs a sunny and fertile location but requires lit-

VIRGINIA CREEPER — a strong climber with attractive green leaves which turn rich red in autumn. NASTURTIUM — if you need fast results

then try this humble candidate, but the soil needs to be on the poor side if you wan blooms rather than a glut of green-

RUSSIAN VINE — able to cover eyesores with dense foliage and creamy flowers at the rate of 15 feet a year but a last resort because it is so rampant.

Available from May 31 to June 4.

All local authorities have been requested by the Department of the Environment to draw up action plans this week. Waterford Co. Council's action plan has been prepared and forwarded to the Department of the Environment. Among the activities contained in this plan are the following:

1 — Free access to Waste Disposal Sites for any voluntary group or organisation wishing to dispose of waste from the clean up of any public area.

2 — Free disposal of abandoned vehicles. The County Council will dispose of any such vehicles subject to the vehicles being adjacent to the public roadway for ease of collection.

- Start by cleaning, washing and painting your own home.
- 9. Give your garden a clean and tidy up. Don't forget the footpaths around the house.
- 3. Organise a neighbourhood clean up. Trim grass verges, hedges and clean up open spaces and unsightly areas.
- 4. Organise a clean up of your local river, stream or beach by removing rubbish and litter.
- 5. Shopkeepers: Keep the areas outside your shop swept and tidy.

 Put a bin near the door and make sure the exterior is kept clean and painted. Collect old trolleys lying around.
- 6. Make your factory, office, shop or farm a nicer place to work by cleaning out rubbish and litter.
- 7. Never throw litter around bin it or bring it home. And this includes motorists. Your local authority will give you advice on safe disposal of anything and are always glad to hear from you about illegal dumping.
- **8.** Schoolchildren. Start by cleaning up the school grounds and then adopt a local area that needs cleaning up.
- 9. Restore a local feature like an old water pump or monument.
- 10. Pet owners. Get a poop-a-scoop and always clean up after pets in parks and public places. Keep dogs inside on bin day.

RETIREMENT PACKAGE

Mr. Anthony Ryan, Knockalisheen, Ballymacarbry, Chairman, Waterford F.A.A. Rural Development Committee insists that while IFA welcomes the announcement of Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh's proposals to the EC Commission on the Early Retirement Scheme for farmers, the aid must be indexed to inflation to ensure that the value of the pension in not eroded over the ten year period of the scheme.

Mr. Ryan said that IFA will also be making a

the maximum payment to reflect the recent 10% devaluation of the Irish Punt. This will increase the maximum payment from £8,771 to £9,648 per annum. It is absolutely necessary that Ireland get the maximum level of funding available for the Retirement Scheme which is 75% funded by the EC, he said.

The Rebellion Of 1641

from our school history when Thomas Wentworth, Earl of Strafford came to Ireland as Lord Deputy 1633-1639. One of his main aims was to raise money for King Charles 1. He got large sums of money from Catholics in return for which he promised concessions called "The Graces."

In 1640 there was much unrest in Ireland, caused by:

(1) Memories of the Ulster plantation;

(2) The Catholic faith was forbidden by law;

(3) The refusal of the King to grant 'the Graces'.

A Rising against the English took place in 1641 throughout Ireland. The Catholics under Richard Butler of Kilcash near Carrick-on-Suir attacked Dungarvan. He entered the town without any trouble but the castle was held resolutely by its garrison and some refugees from the countryside. The castle however was eventually taken by a stratagem. The garrison was informed that the ladders in the town were better off in the castle and were delivered. While the bearers bore them through the gateway, they stopped and blocked the gates from being closed, while assailants rushed through to







Know Your Rights

Question — Are you allowed to do part-time work while you are get-ting the Pre-Retirement Allowance?

Answer — No, you cannot draw this allowance if you do any

The Pre-Retirement Allowance is a meanstested payment which can be paid from age 55 to those on long-term Unemployment Assistance. In effect it replaces Unemployment Assis-

tance and instead of having to sign on at the exchange you are paid by way of Pension Book. One of the conditions for getting this payment is that you consider yourself as retired.

So, if you do any work you break this condition and must return the book and resume signing on at the exchange for the days you are unemployed.

Your means would be re-assessed to take account of your earnings. A certain amount of your earnings will not be counted. At present the amount disregarded is as follows:

From your nett earnings (after tax and PRSI) subtract the daily rate of Unemployment Assistance for each day worked, plus £15 per day (was £120 per week prior to 6 April, '93.)

Question — Is there any tax advantage in

getting married in March? Answer - Special tax rules apply in the year of marriage. For all of that year both spouses are taxed as single people. Then, after the end of that tax year, they can have their case reviewed and if they have paid more tax than they would have paid if they had been taxed as a married couple, they would get a refund which would be paid in proportion to the period of the year they were married.

Whilst there is generally no tax advantage in getting married at a particular time of year where both spouses have sufficient income to use up all their tax free allowances and rate bands, there could be a tax advantage in getting married before the 6 April if one spouse was unem-ployed or likely to be made redundant or on a low income and not able to use all their tax free allowances or rate bands. In this case they could arrange to transfer their unused tax free allowances from 6 April whereas if they married after 6 April they would have to wait until the following 6 April to do this.







WEEK-END GAMES

Full Resumption Of Senior Football Championships

With the senior hurling team gone from the championships at this early stage, more time will be available to play the club championships this yea and as a step towards reaching an early finish, the fixtures committee have decided to bring forward round 3 of the football championship and play all games on next week-end.

The emphasis from now on will be mainly on football and with the seniors and under 21's and juniors all in Munster finals, the selectors will be keeping a close eye on what happens on the football scene during the next couple of weeks. For a number of senior football clubs, we are now approaching the situation when the results will begin to determine their future as far as progression or elimination is concerned in the present championship.

DUNGARVAN v. GAULTIER

Most people who saw Dungarvan beat Kilmacthomas at Learnybrien have sent them into the winners enclosure for their four in a row even at this early stage, but they have a long road ahead of them and some though games to come before they get to another county final. One of these will be on Sunday next when they play Gaultier at Kill on Sunday. Gaultier considered themselves a bit unlucky to have lost by a couple of points to Kilrossanty recently and had some fine championship wins in last year's championship. They will push the champions further than Kilmac' did. Still Dungarvan should win. This game is timed for 7.30 p.m. at Kill.

RATHGORMACK v. STRADBALLY

Two of the strong contenders for Dungarvan's title, these teams are certain to serve up some spectacular football at Kilmacthomas on Sunday evening. Rathgormack's three games against Dungarvan gave them a very high profile on the list of top clubs, but Stradbally's record against Dungarvan is almost

I have been told that St. Saviours have notions of taking the title this year and if they are speaking that confidently, they must be a bit better than they were last year. BALLINACOURTY v. CLASHMORE

Clashmore have played two games and have won one, giving themselves two points while Ballinacourty have played and lost one match.

The sides have met on a number of occasions in the championship in Ardmore over the past few years, so both are reasonably well accustomed to the venue which seems to be growing in popularity over the years.

In their last two meetings at the same venue, Ballinacourty have won rather comfortably scoring 2-13 to 0-10 in '91 and 1-16 to 1-9 last year. However, Clashmore's very fine performance against Rathgormack in the first round and their deserved four points win over Butlerstown two weeks ago show that Clashmore are an improved team and here it could be third time lucky against Ballinacourty, who in their only match so far were beaten by Stradbally. Nevertheless Ballinacour-

Kilmacthomas have lost their first two matches and will need to start winning now if they are to say in touch on the league table. They have had two of their toughest assignments over but still have a number of difficult challenges to be faced in Sliabh gCua, Gaultier and Kilrossanty.

Their easiest matches will be against Dunhill and Tramore (even though neither will be overcome without a tough fight). On Sunday they play Dunhill who have also lost their two first round games and who will be fighting for their lives here.

Against the champions, Dungarvan, the Kilmac' squad were certainly not fully fit and were made look leg weary by a superbly fit opposition. They could be without midfielder Ned Power on Sunday as he is unlikely to have fully recovered from his shoulder injury which forced him to retire early in the game at Learnybrien.

It is a game that Kilmac' will need to treat with caution. They haven't met for three years in the senior football championship, but when they did last meet, Dunhill looked good value for their 1-7 to 0-7 victory. They are renowned battlers and are never done until the last whistle blows. Kilmacthomas should win the game as if they don't their chances of being involved at the closing stages of the championship are almost gone.

KILROSSANTY v. TRAMORE

Tramore's two goal win over Dunhill two weeks ago will have boosted their sagging morale and prove to be a motivating factor in getting them to perform well against Kilrossanty in the feature game at the Kill venue on Sunday. Kilrossanty have won their two matches to date, but their supporters feel that their victories lack decisiveness as in both cases they have, more of less, only "scraped" through. Supporters' expectations are that the Comeragh team, with a back-up from the current under 21 county champions team, would perform better. However, as long as they continue to win, their followers must be satisfied and maybe the best is still to come. They should win here.

As will be seen from the list of fixtures published elsewhere, the matches down for decision are mostly second string games and are not likely to arouse any great excitement outside the respective clubs.

The Ecstasy And Agony At Walsh Park

KERRY 4-13 WATERFORD 3-13

All the sportswriters will give it different headlines, but it will all mean the same thing. We were beaten by Kerry on Sunday and are now out of the Munster championships in three grades of hurling for another year. I don't know how the juniors will fare against Kerry at Lismore tonight, but even should we win, a victory at this level is not likely to set the world or our supporters on fire with excitement.

Having conditioned readers for a possible defeat when previewing the match last week, I suppose it would be wrong for me to describe the result as a shock or a disaster, even though it was more of a disaster than a shock. Kerry had failed to beat one of the five Munster teams in the senior championship since 1905 and so it was understandable that their achievement was given banner headlines on Monday and tremendous exposure on television on Sunday night.

No one can say that Kerry did not win deservedly or that Waterford were unlucky. No one can for a moment deny that the better team won on the day. Their tremendous hunger for victory was evident from the throw-in and apart from a ten minute period in the beginning of the second half, they exerted enormous pressure on Waterford and this tactic, allied to their greatly improved skill, won them the game.

Waterford, fielding without Johnnie Brenner, Tom Fives, Jimmy Beresford and Tony Browne were just not good enough on the day against a team who are certainly blossoming into a top-class hurling outfit. As I wrote last week, gone are the days when Kerry were in the hurling champi-onships just to make up the numbers. Loads of very hard slogging has gone into their development over the years and the resurgence which began at juvenile level, is now beginning to pay dividends.

This year the panel took part in just 100 training sessions and had Clare down in Kerry for a weekend of hurling early in the season. When they arrived at Clonea Strand Hotel on Saturday evening last they were very confident of making this historic breakthrough. What it all meant to Kerry was clearly illustrated in the ecstatic scenes which followed the final whistle and hundreds of wildly excited supporters and officials rushed on to the field to greet their players who were heroes all. At the same time the agony of the Waterford followers was plain to be seen. Some were numbed into silence while others gave expression to their disappointment.
Kerry had made no secret

PLAY

Kerry won the toss and decided to play against the strong breeze. An early attack by the visitors was repelled and in a Waterford attack Eamon Cullinane crossed the ball to the incoming Paul Flynn and we were a goal up after just 90 seconds. A tonic start that delighted a big Waterford following in the 3,000 crowd. A minute later Tony Maunsell pointed for Kerry and we brought one back when Damien Byrne sent all the way from a 100 yards free in the 4th minute. The very accurate D. J. Leahy pointed a Kerry free a minute later and within another minute the same player had another point. Paul Flynn sent a 50 yards free wide, but Paul Prendergast scored a fine point after making a long run from outfield. Liam O'Connor sent wide, but Paul Flynn made no mistake when sending over a delightful score to leave the situation 1-3 to 0-3 in the 9th minute.

Sean Daly and Kerry's Brendan O'Sullivan exchanged points, as did Joe Walsh and Paul Flynn to leave the situation 1-5 to 0-5 in the 18th minute. Then J. P. Hickey had his first point for Kerry and in the 20th minute Paul Flynn blasted home a great goal from a free to put Waterford five points clear in the 20th minute.

Within another minute Brendan Sullivan shot Kerry's first major from a

melee and Tony Maunsell had a point to narrow the gap before Kerry went into the lead for the first time when D. J. Leahy goaled in the 24th minute. Already the alarm bells were sounding around the ground with the visitors playing into a strong breeze and leading. Crowley and Brendan O'Sullivan exchanged points and in the closing minutes of the half, Liam O'Connor sent over to leave it 2-8 to 2-7 in favour of Kerry at half time.

The signs were ominous and the tension was obvious among the home supporters in the crowd. It was not Kerry's lead so much as the standard of hurling being played by them that was worrying when the sides came back on the field for the second 35 minutes.

WATERFORD IN CONTROL

Within two minutes of the restart Liam O'Connor pointed to put us level and after a couple of Kerry wides Noellie Crowley had what can only be described as a fantastic point to give us the lead again. Another great run by Paul Prender-gast saw the Lismore man send over a relieving point in the 5th minute of this

Waterford were motoring very well now and Sean Daly having come out for the ball, was brought down when racing through and Paul Flynn blasted home the resultant penalty to give us a clear five points lead that was increased to six when Liam O'Connor, operating in the half forward line, sent

At this stage one could feel the confidence creeping back. We were completely on top and the great Kerry challenge looked to be over. The next four scores were all for Kerry and the most agonising of these from a Waterford point of view was in the 32nd minute when a D. J. Leahy free was deflected by Pat Tobin past Ray Sheridan for a Kerry goal that made history for the Kingdom and spelt disaster for Waterford.

During the ensuing 4 min-utes and 36 seconds Waterford threw everything they knew at Kerry who man-aged to hold out bravely for a win that will be spoken and written about for longer than we have been about our win over their footballers at Walsh Park in

to see any senior team activity until the panel get together in preparation for the National League which be-gins in October. We will play in Division One of the league and unless we can show a lot of improvement we will find it difficult to survive.

WHAT NOW?

It is not the end of the world or the end of hurling in Waterford by any means. It will take time to recover from the awful disappointment of the beating, but in a year or two we should be in a position to challenge the best again if our minors and under 21's of last year mature as we all expect. We do have an abundance of good talent on the way and properly handled and properly disciplined these young hopefuls can be moulded into as good a county team as there is around.

We have certainly come through a very bad patch in recent months with beatings by Clare at Cappoquin, Dublin in Croke Park and a hammering from Cork in Thurles and now Kerry in the championship. It must all add up to something being very wrong and an examination of the position in the county is certainly warranted, but I don't believe that anything drastic should be contemplated in a hurry.

We will have to give the usual "knockers" time to let off steam and in this connection there is a very interesting story circulating about how a certain loud mouth was appropriately dealt with on the embankment at Walsh Park when we were losing on Sunday.

"My information from a most authoritative and reliable source is that the twenty-seven County Committees of Agriculture will be back in business before the end of this year," said Cllr. O Riain.
Since their abolition he has

ploughed an almost lone furrow in his campaign to have the Committees restored. "I am absolutely delighted that they are now going to be," he said.

Cllr. O Riain described the abolition of the Committees as "a step in the wrong direction" and taken at a vitally important time for Irish farmers. "In one fell swoop," he said, "democratically elected public representatives were replaced by faceless bureaucrats in Brussels and in Teagasc who were not answerable to anyone."

Pressed to reveal the source of his information that the Committees are going to be restored by the Minister, Cllr. O Riain said he could not do so "at this stage." He repeated however that Minister Smith had given a "firm commitment" that they will be restored by the end of this

A spokesperson at Teagasc Headquarters in Dungarvan said on Monday that they had not received any official communique either from the Minister or his Department about the restoration of the Committees.
