Death of Michael C. Nagle Editor and Proprietor of "Dungarvan Leader"

The death occurred last Sunday at his residence after a comparatively brief illness of Michael C. Nagle, "Inis Ealga", Clonea Road, Abbeyside, Dungarvan, the esteemed Editor/Proprietor of the "Dungarvan Leader".

Aged 73 and a native of Tralee, Co. Kerry, the late Michael C. Nagle was one of the most outstanding journalists ever to serve in County Waterford. He began and ended his distinguished career in the "Dungarvan Leader" which his late father founded in 1938 after the family had moved to Dungarvan from Tralee eight years earlier.

Son of the late J. B. (Jack) and Teresa Nagle, Mick, as he was

most affectionately known to his legion of friends, was born to be a journalist. He had that unmistakable flair for writing, and the ease with which he compiled a story was conclusive proof that he was — in a word — a natural.

He joined the staff of the "Leader" as a cub reporter on its historic founding day, and until his recent illness forced him to stand aside he was the journalistic lynchpin around which the success of the weekly newspaper centred for all of fifty-four years.

He may have been a product of the old school of journalism, but in the modern era of specialisation he refused to be compartmentalised, and could, with the minimum of fuss or effort, cover all and every types of stories.

Though he had well passed what most regard as the retirement age of sixty five, he utterly refused to accept that age set any limitations on his activities.

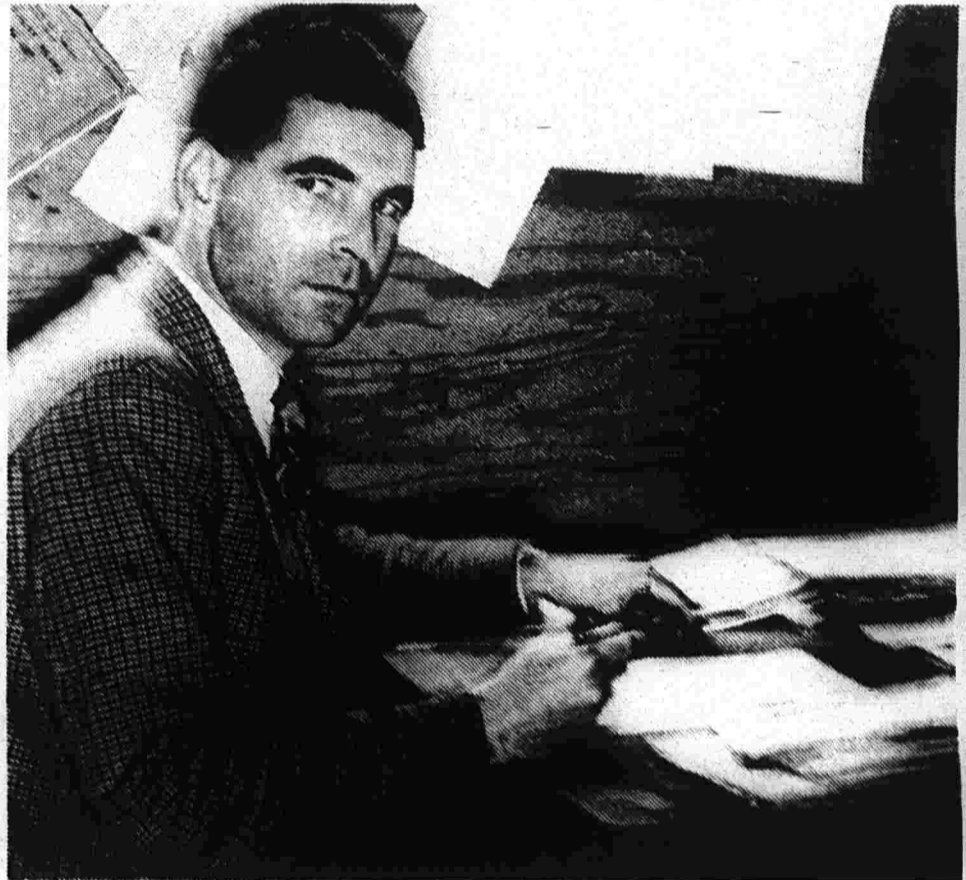
Apart from his in-depth coverage of District and Circuit Courts, Urban and County Councils, and the "hard" news stories that inevitably break during the normal working week, Mick will most probably be remembered best in a journalistic sense for his very popular "Behind The Spotlight" column which he wrote under the apt pseudonym of "Pensman."

It was a pungent, hard-hitting column that covered the most wide-ranging topics. The politicians and political parties sometimes incurred his wrath, but the fair and constructive manner of its presentation always ensured that the "Leader" readership eagerly looked forward to it.

There were few more versatile scribes than he, yet the "Behind The Spotlight" column is the one that will always be intrinsically linked with him. It was Michael C. Nagle at his journalistic best.

While his commitment to the "Leader" was always total, he served as West Waterford correspondent for the Dublin daily newspapers for many years. He also provided "cover" for the Cork Examiner group of newspapers, and in the Metropolis

and on Leaside he enjoyed the same respect that his journalistic colleagues in Waterford city and county always held for him.

He assumed the Editorship of the "Leader" a goodly number of years ago and then proceeded to carry out its many demanding and responsible tasks with the consummate ease of a true professional.

He presided over the most major decision the "Leader" has had to take in its fifty four year history. That was in December 1988 when it changed from a broadsheet to a tabloid newspaper. That was a challenging transition by any criteria, but it went

through with a smoothness that was due in very significant measure to the editorial leadership and direction it received from him.

Today the Nagle family tradition in the "Leader" is being maintained through his son Colm who worked with his father over the past 15 years and has shown in recent times that he is more than capable of continuing the high standards set by his Dad.

Away from the hustle and bustle of journalism, Mick will be remembered as one of the founding members of the old Dungarvan Swimming Club, and he was instrumental in having the

outdoor swimming pool built at the Look-Out. He was very much involved too in organising the many major swimming galas that attracted fans in their hundreds to the pool during the 1950's, and its eventual demolition some years ago because of its deteriorating structural condition must have been a painful, if inevitable, Urban Council decision for him.

A man who loved good music, he was one of the first to join the Dungarvan Musical

A Colleague's Tribute

The death of Michael C. Nagle has severed a friendship we shared for more than thirty three years as journalistic colleagues.

We met for the first time on a January Monday in 1960 when I made my debut as a reporter for the "Dungarvan Observer" covering a meeting of Waterford County Council. I was like a fish out of water, a canoeist without a paddle.

Mick quickly became aware of my distress, spoke encouragingly to me, and offered all the help and advice he could muster.

I got through that testing day thanks solely to the man who was to become my inseparable friend in the decades that followed.

From our first meeting I recognised in him the qualities and natural flair that made him a household name in Waterford journalism. I endeavoured to style myself on his brand of reporting and that, in the final analysis, is my supreme tribute to him.

We sat side by side at Council meetings, District and Circuit Courts, and on many other assignments for those thirty-three years. It will be difficult to adjust to journalistic life in the absence of his commanding physical presence.

As a friend and colleague there were none better. I will deeply miss him, but at least there's the considerable consolation of having a host of delightful memories to remember him by. Go ndeine Dia trocaire ar a anam dilis.

Know Your Rights

Question — We work a 40 hour week, how many days holidays are we entitled to? Is the 39 hour week compulsory now and who is eligible for same?

Answer — Under the Holidays (Employees) Act, 1973, you are entitled to 1.25 days annual leave for each calendar month in which you have worked 120 hours (110 hours if under 18 years). If you have worked for 120 hours in each of the 12 months of the leave year, you would be entitled to 3 weeks holidays. Alternatively, if you have worked for 1,400 hours (1,300 hours if under 18 years) in the leave year you would be due 3 weeks holidays. This is your legal minimum entitlement and it hasn't changed since 1973.

Employees in certain sectors may be entitled to more than 3 weeks leave. If your employment is covered by any of the Employment Regulatory Orders you may be entitled to additional leave e.g. Hairdressers employed in Dublin and Cork are entitled to 20 days leave (4 weeks). Construction workers are also entitled to four weeks.

Part-time workers who regularly work for the same employer for at least eight hours per week are entitled to six hours paid leave for every one hundred hours worked after they have been working for that employer for thirteen weeks.

The number of hours per week you work is negotiable and it isn't covered by legislation. So, the 39 hour week is not mandatory.

If you are not getting your holiday entitlements or if you want to know if there are any Registered Joint Labour Agreements for your particular employment you should contact — The Dept. of Labour, Adelaide Road, Dublin 2. Telephone 01/6765861. There are about 17 of these Agreements registered with the Labour Court.

Dungarvan Man "On Temporary Release" Convicted Of Assaulting Gardai

Hours after his temporary release from Spike Island a 19-year-old Dungarvan man assaulted three gardai and had to be bodily lifted into a cell in the local garda station, Judge M. Pattwell heard at Dungarvan District Court last week.

The Judge said the behaviour of Michael Hallahan, Childers Estate, on the occasion brought into question the judgment of those who gave Hallahan his temporary release.

Hallahan was convicted of assaulting Gardai Sean McMahon, Don Brennan and John Sleator in the early hours of May 14 last. He

had pleaded guilty only to the assault on Garda McMahon.

The defendant was also convicted of being drunk and disorderly and attempting to get into or onto a motor car not his property at Childers Estate.

Garda McMahon told the court that after being taken to the garda station Hallahan became very violent and aggressive and it took four gardai to restrain him.

"He lashed out with his feet, hands and head, and threatened he would get me and burn my car," Garda McMahon added.

Hallahan, however, said he was only resisting arrest because he had been wrongly accused earlier in relation to the car.

FORMIDABLE LIST

After the court heard of Hallahan's "formidable" list of previous convictions dating back to 1987, Judge Pattwell imposed sentences totalling ten months on the defendant to be served in St. Patrick's Institution and to commence on expiry of the six months he is presently serving on Spike Island.

Inspector Michael Blake prosecuted.

Roadside Traveller Prosecuted Under Litter Act

A garda officer who brought a prosecution under the Litter Act against a roadside traveller was congratulated at Youghal district Court by Judge M. Pattwell.

The Judge commented that it was the first prosecution he had in respect of what he termed "these desperate sites."

"I want to congratulate you, well done," he told Garda Dermot Moloney.

There was no appearance before the court of Andrew Cash, who was charged under the Litter Act arising from the condition of his campsite on the main Cork-Waterford road at Burgess, Killeagh.

Garda Moloney, who produced photographs of the campsite which he had personally taken, said he had given Cash several previous warnings about cleaning the site up. "If anything, however, the condition of the area, had worsened," the garda added.

Judge Pattwell imposed a fine of £800 on Cash, the maximum permissible under the Act. He also directed that it be paid forthwith and in default that the defendant serve a one month prison sentence.

Later Cash's wife appeared in court but the Judge refused to vary his order.

Recognisances were fixed in the event of the appeal.

and Choral Society on its foundation, and took part in a number of its concerts in the early 1960's.

He wasn't slow either to trot out a song in a social environment, and his unquestioned "party piece" was "An Poc Ar Bhuile" which he always rendered with invigorating gusto.

He was an active member of the Dungarvan Lions Club since its inception and took considerable personal satisfaction from the outstanding work the organisation is doing for so many local charitable causes.

In his youthful days he was an athlete of immense ability and garnered many honours at athletics meetings far beyond the confines of County Waterford.

One of his greatest achievements came on June 2, 1935 when he captured the 220 yards national intermediate title at the All-Ireland Youths and Colleges Championships in Croke Park. He was representing Dungarvan C.B.S. that day, and his time of 24.02 seconds set a new championship record which stood for several decades to come.

With Kerry blood flowing through his veins it was inevitable too that he would excel at the football code. He played for both the Kilgobinet and Dungarvan G.A.A. Clubs and was as manly and sporting as he was talented.

In his outlook he was unashamedly nationalistic and everything Irish was near and dear to him. Nothing more so however than the language which he spoke with a fluency

that was a delight to listen to. In fact one of his favourite ways of whiling away a few hours of leisure time was to take himself to the hostleries in the Ring Gaeltacht and discuss the news and views of the day "as Gaeilge" with his many Gaeltacht friends.

He also loved his garden, and at weekends in particular took a great delight in pottering about, mowing the lawns, trimming the

hedges and generally keeping his "green finger" active.

Very much a family man, he was a kind, considerate, and loving husband and father. The welfare of everyone in the family home was always paramount with him.

Tributes to him, as generous as they are deserved, have literally poured in since news of his death broke. They speak, more tellingly perhaps than anything that will appear in the printed word, of what the

community as a whole thought of him.

He will be remembered with affection in a world that has been left infinitely poorer for his passing.

He is survived by his wife Nancy; Michael (United States) and Colm, Dungarvan (sons); Marion Mulcahy Nagle, Abbeyside, Raedeen Power, Waterford (daughters), John Nagle, Waterford, Patrick Nagle, Dublin (brothers); Mrs. Maureen Barron, Clonea and Mrs. Breda Copplestone, Mallow

(sisters); Jillian and Shirley Mulcahy, Tanya, Sinéad and Cailín Power, Jonathan Nagle and Brendan Nagle (grandchildren), nephews, nieces, sons-in-law, daughters-in-law, and a wide circle of other relatives.

There was a vast concourse accompanying the removal of the remains from the family home to St. Mary's Parish Church on Monday evening. It was also hugely representative and reflected the immense esteem in which Mick was held.

The remains were received at the Church by Fr. Peter Ahearne, C.C., Abbeyside, assisted by Very Rev. R. Doherty, P.P., Monsignor P. Lannen, Very Rev. J. O'Sullivan, Fr. Liam O'Donnell, O.S.A., Fr. Pat Moran, O.S.A. and Fr. J. Kiely, C.C. Dungar-

van. Members of Dungarvan Lions Club shouldered the coffin through Mary Street to St. Mary's Parish Church on Monday night while other Lions Club members formed a guard of honour in an impressive, and fitting, tribute.

This morning (Wednesday) Very Rev. Fr. R. Doherty, P.P. was the chief celebrant of Concelebrated Mass at 11 a.m., assisted by a large choir of local and visiting clergy. Fr. Doherty also officiated at the graveside when Mick was laid to rest in the adjoining cemetery.

Pilchards For A Big Picnic



It's always difficult to think of something different for a picnic. To ring the changes try our easy-to-make pilchard picnic loaf.

PILCHARD PICNIC LOAF

Ingredients:

8 oz (200g) self raising flour
4 oz (100g) soft margarine
1/4 pt (125ml) milk
1 large can pilchards in tomato sauce
3-4 Cheddar cheese slices

Method:

Preheat oven to 425°F., 220°C., gas mark 7 and grease an 11 ins by 7 ins (27.5cm by 17.5cm) baking tin.

Sieve flour into large bowl, add margarine and rub in with fingertips until it resembles fine breadcrumbs. Add



milk and mix to a soft dough. Press dough into tin, making a slight rim around edges.

Drain pilchards and split each down the middle into two. Reserve sauce. Line pilchards down centre of tin and coat

with sauce.

Bake for 30 minutes at top of oven until golden brown. Cut each cheese slice into two triangles and place on each pilchard. Serve hot or leave until cold and cut into fingers for a picnic.

What A Pity That Weeds Also Like The Warm Sun!

Shift into top gear during May or garden chores will leave you far behind as greenery bursts out all over. Worst of all are weeds. Keep them at bay with prompt and selective control using your hands, the hoe and a paintbrush dipped in weedkillers.

The paintbrush method is about as safe and environmentally sound as you can get without doing away with chemicals altogether.

It is good against particularly troublesome weeds such as dock and bindweed which always seem to leave a root and come bursting up again.

The last resort for lawns is a selective weedkiller, but be careful to spray on a still day, cover bare skin and keep clear of children and pets.

Tulips need lifting if you want their beds for summer blooms.

They can be re-planted elsewhere to allow the greenery to wither naturally, before again lifting the bulbs for storage.

Any other bulbs which have bloomed indoors may also be planted outside for 'finishing' before storage, but remember they have become outdoor bulbs and need to be replanted in autumn — bulbs specially raised or 'forced' for indoor blooming can only 'perform' once. Don't neglect some early outdoor bloomers either — those cheerful little primroses will be healthier and gain more blooms for next year if you lift and divide the clumps. But don't be tempted to seek new space for them in sites prone to dryness and direct sun.

Looking ahead, you can boldly plant biennials such as Sweet William, wallflowers and Canterbury Bells.

They should resist any lingering frosts, but you need to stand by with cloches or newspaper to protect half-hardy annuals and dahlias on cold nights.

If you are caught out, remember you can sometimes save frosted plants by watering them with tepid water first thing in the morning, using a fine rose on the watering can.

This prevents them suffering from the contrasting heat of the sun so soon after the touch of frost.

It is also not too late to establish conifers and evergreens. Simply soak the root ball overnight before planting in soil enriched with moist peat or good well-rotted garden compost. Then make sure they are well-watered every day if the weather is dry.

Don't forget to check your roses either. Cut away any pest or disease damaged parts before they turn into major damage. Rip out sucker shoots too — the pale and thornier ones which sap the strength of the bush. Some hedges such as privet may be growing quickly and need gentle trimming and shaping. The lawn may also be patchy and in need of a cut, but avoid trimming new lawns unless the blades are about two inches high. — ARTHUR HINES.



Defendant On Fishery Charges Claimed He Was Lamping Rabbits

A man found on a river bank with a powerful lamp and waders up to his chest told Judge M. Pattwell at Dungarvan District Court that he and his friend were out lamping rabbits.

Sean Lucas (19), 1a, Caseyville, Dungarvan and 20-year-old William Fraher, 44 Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan, were prosecuted by the Southern Regional Fisheries Board for illegal salmon fishing on the River Colligan on December 5 last.

The court heard that fishery officers took possession of a powerful lamp from Lucas and subsequently they found a strokehaul attached to a fishing rod in the river. A third man made his escape.

LAMPING RABBITS

Both defendants, however, insisted under oath that they were out lamping rabbits. Lucas claimed he had chest high waders on to get across the river at a low point into another field.

"Lamping rabbits in chest high waders," exclaimed Judge Pattwell, who was told both defendants had previous fishery related convictions.

Fraher was fined a total of £200 and ordered to pay costs and expenses amounting to £136. Lucas was fined £150 and also ordered to pay £136 costs and expenses.

"If either of you are in this kind of trouble again a prison sentence is more than likely," Judge Pattwell told the defendants.

Bishop Michael Russell Retires

— New Bishop Appointed



DR. WILLIAM LEE appointed Bishop of Waterford and Lismore.

The resignation of the Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, Dr. Michael Russell, was announced in Rome on Thursday, May 27 by the Holy See and by the Papal Nuncio in Dublin. The Pope has appointed Father William Lee, President of St. Patrick's College, Thurles, to succeed him. He will be only the sixth Bishop of the diocese in this century.

Dr. Russell, who is 72, has been Bishop of Waterford for over 27 years. He suffered a heart attack while on a visit to the Holy Land in 1985. He is the longest-serving member of the Irish Bishops' Conference. When he was appointed in November 1965 he was, at 44, the youngest bishop in Ireland.

His appointment came four weeks before the end of the Second Vatican Council, but, although he was not ordained a bishop until after the Council ended, the fact of his appointment meant he was able to attend its final month. With his retirement the last direct link between the Bishops' Conference and the Second Vatican Council is severed.

Fr. Lee, who is 51, has been President of the Thurles College since 1987. He worked for 15 years with the Catholic Marriage Advisory Council and began his priestly ministry in the large North Dublin parish of Finglas West.

On hearing of Fr. Lee's appointment as the new bishop, Dr. Russell assured him of a true welcome from the priests and people of Waterford and Lismore.

He said today: "I came to

Waterford in 1965 with much trepidation but the generous-hearted people of this diocese soon made known to me the genuineness of their welcome. Now, having one so young in heart and spirit to lead them, they will give him every cooperation in facing up to the challenges of the coming century.

"I can assure the faithful of Waterford and Lismore that their welcome will not be misplaced."

Fr. Lee himself said he was "very surprised" when he was informed by the Papal Nuncio a week ago that the Holy Father wished to appoint him to Waterford and Lismore.

"I am deeply honoured and profoundly humbled," he said. "Bishop Russell's warm welcome to me is a source of great encouragement. He has given outstanding and committed service to the diocese for almost three decades. I am deeply conscious of how much I will depend on the loyalty and support of the priests, religious and faithful of my new diocese. I can assure them that all my energies will be committed to their service as, together, we continue the work of building up the Kingdom of God in the ancient Church of Waterford and Lismore."

BORN IN NEWPORT

Fr. Lee was born in Newport, Co. Tipperary, on 2 December, 1941, the eldest of five children of the late John and Delia Lee, who ran a public house and auctioneering business in the town.

He received his early education at the local Convent of

Mercy and Boys' National Schools and later went to Rockwell College. He studied for the priesthood at St. Patrick's College, Maynooth and was ordained for the Cashel and Emly Diocese on 19 June, 1966.

He did post-ordination in Canon Law at Maynooth, receiving a doctorate in 1969. He then served for two years in the large parish of Finglas West, Dublin. He also studied for a time at the Georgian University, Rome.

He was appointed Professor of Philosophy and bursar at St. Patrick's College, Thurles. For 15 years he was Director of the Catholic Marriage Advisory Council of Cashel diocese. He also served on the Cork Regional Marriage Tribunal.

Fr. Lee has two brothers and two sisters — St. Patricia Lee, Mercy Convent, Doon, Co. Limerick; Mr. John Lee, Newport, Co. Tipperary; Mrs. Eileen McDonagh, Bruree, Co. Limerick, and Dr. Patrick Lee, Ballyclough, Limerick.

BISHOP RUSSELL

Bishop Russell was born into a farming family in Loughmore, Co. Tipperary, on 10 December, 1920, and grew up beside the Holy Cross Abbey. He was educated at Thurles Christian Brothers' School and studied for the priesthood at St. Patrick's College, Maynooth.

Ordained priest on 17 June, 1945, he served on the staff of St. Patrick's College, Thurles, for 17 years and was

also for a time secretary to the Archbishop of Cashel.

Appointed Bishop of Waterford and Lismore in succession to the late Dr. Daniel Cohalan on 9 November, 1965, he was ordained Bishop at Waterford Cathedral on 15 December. The ceremony was notable because the Taoiseach, Mr. Sean Lemass, read the epistle. This was the first time a lay person took an active part in the ceremony of episcopal ordination following the liturgical reforms of Vatican II.

Throughout his ministry as bishop, Dr. Russell has been essentially a pastor to his large and rapidly growing diocese. Waterford and Lismore has 130,300 Catholics in a general population of 131,800. That is an increase of about 35,000 in the last 30 years. The diocese, which includes all of Co. Waterford and part of south Tipperary, has 45 parishes, served by 111 priests and about 540 religious. There are about 2,000 baptisms each year.

Bishop Russell, who has always adopted a low media profile, has been an active pastor in the diocese. For

many years he has been regular confessor at the Cathedral and also offered one of the Sunday morning Masses there. He is a particularly gifted preacher.

He has said that the greatest plague facing Waterford is the sense of hopelessness caused by unemployment. "Poverty on its own is bad enough," he has said, "but poverty which gives people such a sense of

hopelessness is the worst of all."

Waterford diocese as originally established included only the city and the territory east of a line running roughly from Portlaw to Dunabratton Head. Lismore diocese covered by far the greater part of what is now Waterford and Lismore, which was formally united as one diocese in 1363.

St. Mary's Parish Dungarvan

We wish our Bishop a happy retirement after 27 years as Bishop of the Diocese of Waterford and Lismore. Bishop Russell will be remembered for his Confirmations and Ordinations of many priests of the Diocese and elsewhere: blessings and openings of a great variety of projects: attendance at functions and meetings with people: his generosity and understanding and faithfulness to his episcopal ministry. We pray that he may have peace and good health in his retirement.

We welcome Mons. William Lee to the Diocese as our Bishop and offer him our support in his arduous task.

Fr. Jerry Hickey leaves the Friary soon after 8 years here to take up duty in the Augustinian Friary in Cork. His contribution to the pastoral ministry here has been enormous and distinguished, and we will miss him greatly. May he have God's continued blessings on his ministry in Cork.

Another to depart from the scene here shortly is Bro. Noel Keane, O.S.A. He has left his mark on youth work, ministry and organisation.

His witness and prophetic vision will be missed. We wish him well in his new ministry in Dublin with the Provincial Council of the Augustinians.

The celebration of the First Holy Communion of pupils of St. John's, Glenbeg and Carriglea Schools will be on June 5, at 11 a.m. in St. Mary's Church.

Richard Geoghegan, St. Thomas' Terrace, will be ordained priest on Sunday next, June 6, in the Cathedral, Waterford at 12 noon by Bishop Russell. He will celebrate his first Mass in St. Mary's Church on Monday, June 7 at 7 p.m. Anyone is welcome to attend. Our congratulations to him, his parents, family and friends.

THE REBELLION OF 1614

(Cont.)

Last week we described the capture of Dungarvan Town and Castle by the Catholics under Richard Butler of Kilcash. The

Catholics made an attack on Lismore Castle in late February, where Lord Broghill, son of the Earl of Cork, defended it stoutly and used a cannon that was

made in Cappoquin. A rumour that an English army under Sir Charles Varasour was on its way to Lismore caused the short siege to be raised.

Broghill now decided to go on the offensive, so he sent a body of troops to Dungarvan. They captured the town without much difficulty and then burned the thatched houses. Next they pursued the people fleeing across the water to Abbey-side in the low tide and burned all the houses there. The towerhouse of Mc-Graths near the old abbey was attacked, while some other soldiers hanged and killed people indiscriminately, about 50 in all.

The towerhouse surrendered and the garrison was allowed to march away but without their arms or

colours or any property. An attack was now mounted on the castle in Dungarvan and it surrendered the next day. In this case the garrison marched out like soldiers, their colours flying on their bagpipes before them. About 200 people were killed in Dungarvan or thrown into the sea before Broghill's troops marched back to Lismore.

This is the era of the Confederation of Kilkenny, the battle of Benburb and the coming of Cromwell in 1649. History of Waterford City and County, Patrick Power.

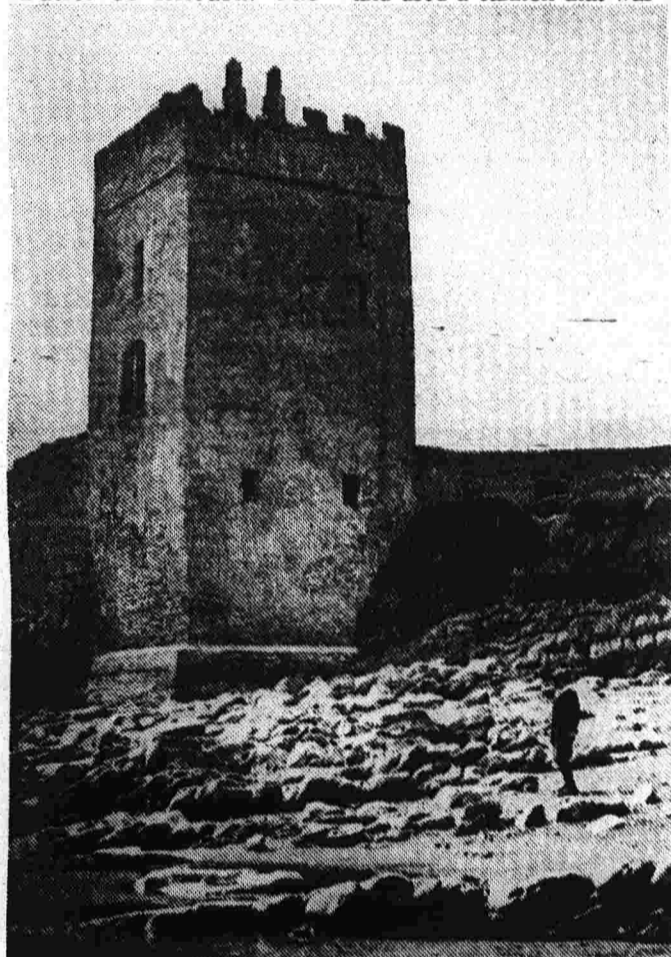
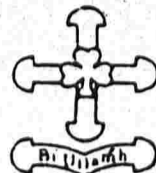
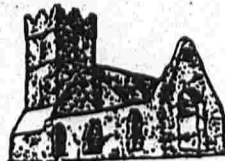

UFA MEETING ON AREA AID

Mr. Paddy O'Grady, Chairman, presided at a meeting organised by Nire/Ballymacarbray Branch of United Farmers Association to help inform farmers on proper filling of Area Aid Forms, in Old Nire School on Thursday, May 27. The well-attended meeting was taken over the course of map assessment and form filling by Mr. Gerry Kingston of Teagasc in a very capable, clear-cut manner.

Mr. Kingston also displayed a slide showing the calculations necessary to enable farmers to arrive at the proper livestock density in relation to forage acres prior to completing applications for headage and premia. He pointed out that in some

cases a farmer would come out better financially by reducing the number of livestock in his Headage of Premium application and thereby qualify for the Extensification Premium. He mentioned the alternative of renting or leasing extra land to increase forage acres.

Mr. Paddy Phelan, Nat. President of UFA stated that this scheme is again open to exploitation by large operators who are already in hot pursuit of all available forage acres around the country, leaving small farmers who need extra money to survive, confined to their own boundaries.

A vote of thanks was passed to Mr. Kingston for his assistance and Mr. Pat Phelan, Secretary, expressed the wish that the CAO would visit the area soon again.

Mr. Tom Queally of Kilbrien addressed the meeting in connection with the campaign to prevent the erection of an MMDS (micro-wave) television transmitter in the Comeraghs. Objections to the project are based on possible health hazards and despoilation of natural scenery. Those who would like to add their voice to the objection are invited to write a letter or sign a petition. ^

RETIREMENT SCHEME CONFUSING

The announcement of proposals for the application in Ireland of the EC's Early Retirement Scheme for Farming made recently by the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry, needs further clarification, South Tipperary/North West Waterford Deputy Theresa Ahearn says. "We need to be assured that a retiring farmer who has previously made a partial transfer to another family member will qualify under the scheme.

"The requirement that transferees increase their total farm areas by 10% and by at least five hectares also needed further clarification. This seemed to imply that the transferee must already have at least 50 hectares or 120 acres for the transfers to come within the terms of the scheme. If that was the case, very few transfers here would qualify.

"The proposal that transferees be given up to two years to meet the necessary enlargement and educational/skills requirements was unclear. Did this mean that a transfer would qualify if the transferee subsequently purchased or leased nine times as much land as was transferred? If it took the transferee up to two years to get all the right conditions in place, would the transferor's pension rights date from the date of transfer or from the later date?" Deputy Allen asked.

"The answers to these questions would determine how valuable the scheme will be."

FARMING LEADER

IFA Gets Solution To Confusion Over Winter Beef Premium Application

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan, has said that following negotiations between an IFA delegation and senior officials at the Department of Agriculture, the two sides had agreed a workable solution to the problem that had arisen over cattle identification numbers on beef factory dockets used to accompany the Winter Beef Premium applications. Under the formula worked out be-

tween IFA and the Department, factory sales dockets and invoices once stamped and validated by the factory itself and the Agriculture Officer, will be accepted for the purposes of the Beef Slaughter Premium, even though the prefix letters on the animal's ear-tag may have been omitted. The IFA had taken the issue up with the Department following a growing number of complaints from

farmers that local Dept. of Agriculture Offices had refused to accept the Premium applications because factory sales dockets did not have the complete cattle identification code.

Mr. Donovan said that he was glad the issue had been satisfactorily resolved, given that up to 40,000 cattle farmers could be applying for premia on almost one quarter of a million cattle in time for this week-end's deadline.

£26.5 Million Special Beef And Suckler Premium Owed

In welcoming the payment of £8 million to 21,500 livestock farmers for their December 1992 Special Beef and Suckler Cow Premium applications, Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan said that these farmers have been waiting on this money for close on 6 months.

Mr. Donovan said: "Allowing for this week's announcement from the Minister for Agriculture, there are still up to 65,000 farmers waiting on payments of £25 million from last December applications. In addition there are up to 3,500 farmers waiting on June 1992 Special Beef Premium payments worth

£1.25 million." Mr. Donovan added that this is an intolerable situation that these farmers have been left waiting almost a full year for the vital premium compensatory payments. "In interest alone, these farmers are out of pocket to the tune of £200,000 or over £60 per farmer."

quality Irish lambs in the upper end of the Supermarkets trade in France and should be a major contributor to a vibrant market for the next few weeks."

I.F.A. Man Slams Increase

Waterford IFA Grain Committee, John O'Mahoney, has slammed the EC Farm Council's decision to increase cereals set-aside by 5% for farmers opting for permanent set-aside in place of the current rotational scheme. He said: "this is an underhand move by the EC after proposing a 2% increase earlier in the week."

Mr. Coughlan said: "To-date this year we have slaughtered an additional 200,000 head of lambs when compared with last year and this will leave numbers tight over the coming weeks, resulting in a continued strong price."

Mr. Coughlan added that CBF had already launched Irish light lamb on the Spanish and Portuguese markets in preparation for this season's exports which are expected to begin in early July. "These markets provided a vital outlet for our light mountain lambs last year. Exports increased by 35% and prices remained strong, giving a much-needed income boost to hill sheep farmers."

He continued: "Permanent set-aside would suit farmers who want to produce longterm non-food crops on their land. The crops could be of great benefit to the environment, in providing cover for wild-life and producing alternative energy materials. It would also give farmers the far more preferable option of growing something useful on good arable land rather than reducing it to a redundant patch of fallow ground."

Following on recent discussions with the Department of Agriculture, Mr. O'Mahoney said farmers would be anxious to participate in a permanent set-aside scheme but this is now in jeopardy as they are forced to increase their set-aside to 20% of their arable area.

Dungarvan Man Fined For Illegal Possession Of Cartridges

Nineteen shotgun cartridges were found by the garda at the home of an Englishman now living in

Dungarvan, Judge M. Pattwell was told at the local District Court. Alan Lucas, 1A,

Caseyville, Dungarvan was convicted of having the cartridges in his possession on April 10 last without being the holder of a Firearms Certificate.

Inspector M. Blake said Gardai searched the defendant's home on a warrant issued under the Misuse of Drugs Act. In a bedroom they found the cartridges.

Lucas, who is unemployed, said he had come to live in Ireland five years ago and didn't even know the cartridges were there until the Gardai found them. He was fined £25.

Know Your Rights


Question — I am an insured worker and when I broke a tooth recently I went to my dentist who had been providing dental treatment under the Social Welfare Treatment Benefit Scheme. He took an x-ray but preferred to refer me to a second dentist to have a crown fitted. The second dentist took a further x-ray for which I was charged and he quoted me a price I couldn't afford for fitting a crown. (Another dentist has quoted a much lower price). Am I entitled to the cost of the second x-ray and how do I claim it?

Answer — To avail of dental treatment under the Treatment Benefit Scheme you must attend a dentist on the panel. If the second dentist is on this panel you would be covered for the x-ray and any other treatment available under this Scheme. Crowns are no longer covered.

Most dentists are on the Social Welfare Panel and it is unfortunate that you were referred to a dentist not on the panel.

The procedure, if you attend a dentist on the Social Welfare Panel, is that you should always apply to the Dept. of Social Welfare before starting the treatment and if you are referred to a second dentist she/he should also forward an application form to the Department.



COUNTY WATERFORD I.C.M.S.A. NEWS

"It is unacceptable that a number of farmers are still awaiting premium payments for applications lodged last June", said John Cusack Chairman, County Waterford Executive of I.C.M.S.A.

Mr. Cusack said that while he welcomed the fact that payments under the December 1992 Special Beef and Suckler Cow Schemes are underway, he is concerned at the length of time it takes

the department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry to make full payments.

"It is a ridiculous situation that farmers are still awaiting payment almost a year since the time of application. This delay is not always caused by farmers making incorrect applications, but in many cases by mistakes which arise within the Department itself at the time of entering information on the computer. This caus-

es a major delay as forms have to be returned to local offices for a recheck. I am not complaining about errors arising because we are all human and prone to errors, but rather the enormous delay in resolving these errors, said Mr. Cusack.

He said that a certain number of staff should be specifically assigned to sorting out problems which arise in the system rather

than leaving such problems aside until all other cases have been dealt with.

The I.C.M.S.A. view is that it is simply unfair to leave a farmer waiting for a year for payment because of a mistake made when inputting data on a computer.

I.C.M.S.A. are calling on the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry to ensure that all premia payments are issued as quickly as possible, concluded Mr. Cusack.

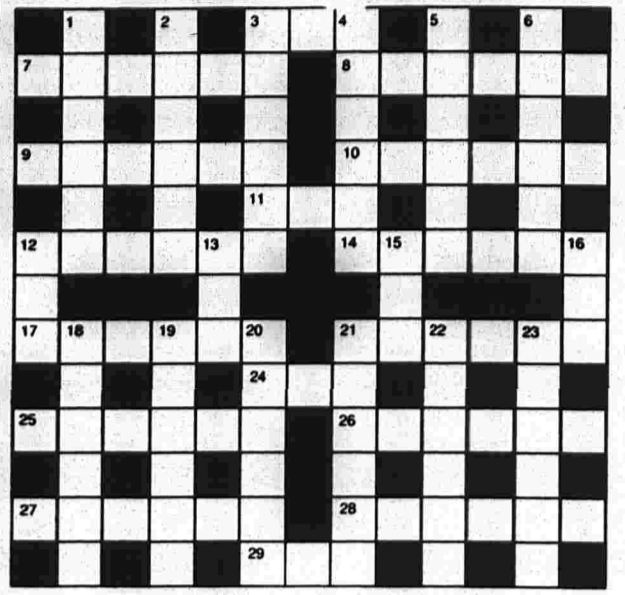

One Month Prison Sentence For "Blatant Offender"

"You are a blatant offender with no respect for the law and the law enforcement agencies," Judge Michael Pattwell told 26-year-old Anthony Daly, 1 St. Patrick's Crescent, Dungarvan, when he sentenced him to prison for one month at Dungarvan District Court last week.

Daly was sentenced for having an unlawfully captured salmon in his possession on the banks of the River Colligan at Ballinamuck, Dungarvan, on December 16 last.

Inspector Edward Casey of the Southern Regional Fisheries Board told the court that when he confronted Daly he and a number of others ran. He

gave pursuit but fell over a pit bull terrier and Daly escaped. In the bag dropped by the defendant was a fresh salmon and a monofilament fishing net.

Inspector Casey said that he called to Daly's home shortly afterwards and was told by his father to "f... off" and that he was only a tramp.

Daly, however, denied he was anywhere near the River Colligan that afternoon. He had been in a local pub with a friend.

Sentencing Daly, who had several previous fishing-related convictions, to one month, Judge Pattwell told him "I have to show how the court regards offenders like you."

RAS NA RINNE SA CHOINIGÉAR

Race No. 2 in Dungarvan Athletic Club's Summer Tour of local distance events will take place over the popular and historic Cunnigar peninsula on Tuesday June 15th starting from outside Colafste na Rinne at 7.30 p.m. A non competitive walk over the Cunnigar course will begin at 7 p.m. from the car park with the proceeds going to Scoil Naisiúnta na Rinne while prizes will be raffled among all the walk participants.

AN RAS

The Cunnigar has for many generations of people proved an attractive escape from the world around it and the odd runner has been spotted trailing the out and back route over the years. On June the 15th Rás na Rinne will provide a testing and enjoyable challenge for local runners. Fast finishing times will be a rarity as this is a demanding course and the last mile of it on the road presents a steep climb up through Maoil na Hoirne to the finishing line at Coláiste na Rinne. As the Marine climb met with overall approval the Rás will be staged on the same basis, that is, a team race. There will be different team captains on this occasion with prizes once again for the first three teams of five and individual prizes for the first three finishers. The overall distance of the Rás is six miles approximately. An after race social evening will be held in Murrays, Helvick during which the presentation of all prizes will be made. Entry fee to the Rás is £3 agus £2 don siúlóir.

AN COINIGÉAR

Meaning a rabbit warren and also called "An Cois", it had an area of forty acres at the turn of this century. It extends across Dungarvan Bay, South from Ring end and North towards Dungarvan. It's main feature is the well known sand hill to which boat loads of locals were ferried over a long number of years by such as Paddy MacNamara, Captain Veale, Lord Duggan and the Kennallys.

THE GOLF CLUB

With the opening of a number of new golf courses in the area this year it is interesting to note that a golf club was established in the Cunnigar in 1922. An expert from Dublin laid out the links and a fine pavilion was erected in 1924. The Golf Club left the Cunnigar in 1928 and moved to Clonea.

THE PARTON

As the competitors in Rás na Rinne make the return journey from the point of the Cunnigar the wreck of the schooner the "Parton" will be visible on their right and it's sad fate is captured suitably in verse by Pilib Ó Dugáin, Dún Na Mainistreach.

THE "PARTON"

The schooner "Parton" plied the winds
Between the ports of Wales
And our hometown of fair renown
For sailormen and sails

Familiar was the sight of her
Tied up beside the Quay,
Her rigging sound, her hull tight-bound,
Defiant of the sea.

How often had she braved the waves
To channel ports afar
With foresail high, 'mid seagull cry
Above each mast and spar?

'Tis fifty years and more since last
She left Dungarvan Bay,
But a cruel stroke her stern broke
At Milford Haven quay.

The last of all our sailing ships
Was slowly towed back home;
Engulfed by waves and whipped by gales
She ne'er again would roam.

And all aboard were glad that day
As homeward she was bound,
But did they know that soon she'd go
To Western Bay aground?

For there they took this crippled ship
And stripped her of all sail,
No timbers left but Keel bereft

This ship of days gone by.
50 Mile Run
Imagine running Rás na Rinne eight times in the one

day. Well, on Sunday September 8th 1985 the last and most demanding distance event in the Ring area took place when Seamus Ó Droma successfully completed a fifty miles run from the Railway Station Cork to Helvick Head in six hours and thirty four minutes to raise money for renovation work in aid of Seipéal Naomh Nioclás sa Rinn.

The event also proved to be a great social event with massive crowds present in Helvick to witness this unique achievement and welcome home the popular "Drummy". Eight years on Seamus is still to the good, running wise, and he will take the starting line on June 15th. This shield will also be presented annually to the winner of Rás na Rinne.

BRIDGE AND CAUSEWAY

From the 1870's onwards considerable interest in the linking of Dungarvan and the Cunnigar was shown from practically every quarter but at the end of the day and after much hard work the failure to secure a grant saw the idea being shelved around the year 1907. If the project had been completed the history of the Cunnigar would most certainly have taken a different course.

Time The County Board Got Serious

A chara,
Those who are still shell-shocked after Waterford's loss in the Munster hurling championship to Kerry may not be aware that less than half the panel were turning up for training on a regular basis since Christmas, including the run-up to the championship. On occasions, less than ten players were present for training sessions. This is hardly surprising, given that attendance at training had no bearing on who got selected for matches. When one adds in the lack of any coherent and consistent approach to "team building" and the bizarre selections made for virtually every game, it is not surprising that morale among the players was very low going into the Kerry game.

Even if morale in the camp had been good, it was always going to be difficult to motivate the players against this particular opposition. In this respect, the typical minimum-effort approach to the game on the part of the County Board was no help whatever. There was no band and no prematch parade to help build a sense of occasion.

The match "programme" was a single-sheet handout. I also believe that the supporters club were refused permission to sell colours inside the ground, which would have helped generate some atmosphere.

A further problem was that, with its high grass and bumpy surface, the pitch was simply not fit for championship hurling and threw away any advantage Waterford might have had as regards ground striking. What a contrast with the beautiful surface I saw in Thurles the previous day.

On top of all this, we had another repetition of the sideline bungling which cost us last year's championship match against Limerick. It is astonishing that, with the team struggling badly in the last fifteen minutes, several very experienced players were left on the sideline. As with the aforementioned Limerick match, it is reported that sensible changes proposed by George Leahy were over-ruled by the selectors. We are going nowhere with this kind of set-up.

It is high time the County Board got serious and appointed a manager for a minimum three-year period with the power to nominate his own selectors and mandate to build for the future. Such an arrangement would presumably constitute a culture shock for those prima donnas who are more concerned with exerting their own power than in working for the common good of Waterford hurling.

We have seen last year what can be achieved through proper organisation, coaching and leadership. The same standards must be demanded at senior level if we are to achieve anything at inter-county level. We have the players to make a genuine championship challenge. What we now need most of all is unity of purpose and vision. If the County Board is not up to the task of providing this, then the supporters will have no option but to vote with their feet and their pockets.

Ireland Recover Once Again

Despite the worries about the dangers of a lead goal for Albania, Ireland did recover from Demollari's shock early strike to win two invaluable points that keep alive our American Dream.

There have been varying conclusions and comments of this win, are Albania really a weak side, Ireland looked jaded — where was McGrath?

The bottom line was, and is, 2 points, won in the most problematic environment and 4 more to be played for. Without doubt the long English league season is effecting our players as this extract from Andy Townsend's article on last week's "Sunday Tribune" confirms:

"The game that Jack likes us to play, and the amount of running it entails, was always going to be a problem in that heat. The two week gap since the end of the season didn't help.

It's Catch 22 really — you get to the end of a hard season needing a rest, content with just a half a dozen runs to keep you fresh but don't realise that it's the daily sessions with the team that keep you sharp, give you the edge. Personally, while I surprised myself generally with the way I coped with the heat, I felt I was a good half a yard short — indeed, I think we all were. We certainly weren't at our best."

Our defence had its problems especially in the first half. Kushta's goal once again reflected uncertainty with most reports suggesting Kernaghan and Bonner as the main culprits. I would query the absence of at least one full back to give extra cover when Ireland were on attack, a basic requirement even at junior level.

As against Denmark the midfield battled their way back into the game with Townsend leading by example and doing his chances of a transfer from Chelsea no harm. Staunton for his goal was ahead of Houghton with Keane again only showing in one or two runs and strikes at goal. Niall Quinn continues his fine form for Ireland, a remarkable return in effort and skill while my doubts about Aldridge's fitness are proving regrettably correct. Aldridge's place in the starting line up against Latvia must now be in doubt.

CHARLTON LUCKY OR INSPIRED!

Is Jack Charlton lucky or inspired but the return he has got from introducing Tony Cascarino to help Ireland's cause takes beating.

Against the Danes last month he proved his return to fitness and contributed to Ireland's equaliser. His 11th goal in 42 internationals was just reward for a striker that has had a nightmare season at club level with Chelsea. When you allow for the cat that his early appearances for Ireland were as a 3rd division player in the pre Charlton era, and since then he has often come on as substitute, his international tally of a goal every 4 games is even more impressive. Paradoxically his managers assessment that he is more effective when introduced as a substitute against a tiring defence may prevent him starting against Latvia.

So much for those that were at the Que-

mal Stafa Stadium but most attention was focused on the one player that wasn't, Paul McGrath.

Much has been made of this episode but the manner of how his absence was passed to the Irish manager is the main point of contention. McGrath due back in Ireland on Thursday or Friday, can only be protected for so long by Jack Charlton. While the doubts remain about his actual fitness McGrath must build bridges and will find his manager sympathetic to his problems.

But with the Irish squad due to gather in Dublin on Sunday, June 6 before flying to Riga for the game against Latvia on Wednesday, June 9 there is little scope for further non appearances.

Time and tide it's said, wait for no man — Jack Charlton can only wait so long even for Paul McGrath.

Waterford hurlers gained some compensation for their senior defeat by Kerry at Walsh Park on the previous Sunday, when we deservedly beat their junior team by a couple of points at the Castle Farm Grounds, Lismore on Wednesday evening of last week. Because of the atrocious weather conditions of the previous two days it was expected that the game would be cancelled, but after the Lismore club declared the grounds playable, the Provincial Council decided to go ahead with the fixture. Remarkably the small crowd who braved the elements to see the game, found that the field was in reasonably good condition despite the torrential rain of the previous 48 hours.

The game produced an excellent contest with both counties displaying great determination and commitment from start to finish. Waterford raced into an eight points second half lead and Kerry pulled them back to two points in the closing, exciting minutes of this most enjoyable hour's hurling.

Waterford fielded as selected, but the Kerry team which included Christy Ross and Gerard Hussey who were on the substitutes bench with the seniors at Walsh Park, showed changes from the programme.

The Waterford team which was, to a great extent, untried, hurled well as a unit and sent over some delightful scores. Kerry too had a number of good hurlers who were obviously bent on impressing their mentors with a view to being brought on to the senior panel for the senior semi-final.

PLAY

Ger Hussey opened for Kerry with a 1st. minute point and Noelle Kelly replied for Waterford a minute later. A 7th. minute Ger Hussey free sent Kerry a point in front, but Pad Dunford made it level pegging in the 8th minute. A converted free by Pat Bennett gave us the lead in the 9th., but Joe Kennedy made it all square again in the 12th. Then came Kevin

Walsh's spectacular 15th minute goal when he doubled on an air ball and sent all the way to the net. In just another minute Pat Bennett goaled to give us a clear two goal lead. John Hallinan had a point, but Kenneth Boyle brought one back for Kerry. In the 21st minute goalkeeper, Pat Haran made his only mistake of the hour and the umpires signalled Pat O'Mahony's goal for Kerry. Two delightful points by midfielder Fintan O'Brien were followed by a good point by his Stradbally clubmate Paul Foley to restore our six points lead just before Ger Hussey had a last minute score for Kerry to leave the state of play, Waterford 2-7, Kerry 1-5 at half-time.

SECOND HALF

Within a minute Fintan O'Brien had his third point of the game and again we were six up. A free to Kerry was brought forward for dissent and Gerome Sullivan's long range shot went over. The very accurate Pat Bennett pointed two frees and we were seven up by the three-quarter stage. Sullivan pointed a Kerry free and Noel Kelly replied with two nice points in the 46th. and 59th. minutes and this ended the scoring for Waterford. But not for the visitors who obviously did not see the situation to be beyond redemption and fought back with the kind of spirit that we saw at Walsh Park on the previous Sunday. Michael Hennessey pointed twice before Ger Hussey had his 58th minute

goal to reduce the leeway to just a goal. Waterford defended very determinedly to withstand the onslaught as Kerry threw all their forces into attack. Ger Hussey had a 59th. minute point to reduce the gap to just two points until the final whistle brought relief to a worried Waterford. Ger Hussey, who was on the substitutes bench with Kerry in Walsh Park was their outstanding player and will likely be given a call-up for the semi-final next Sunday. The Waterford team had one or two weak links but apart from this it was a balanced side who performed very well on the night.

JUNIOR HURLING CHAMPIONSHIP MUNSTER SEMI-FINAL

Waterford Play Tipperary At Thurles

Favourites Tipperary Have Home Ground Advantage

If we had beaten Kerry in the senior game, both matches against Tipperary would have been played at Pairc Ui Caoimh, but the Munster Council's decision to keep the hurling semi-finals on the same programme means that we must travel to Thurles where we will figure in the curtain-raiser to the senior semi-final between Tipperary and Kerry.

Waterford have a poor record in the junior grade and next Sunday's venue has been the scene of defeats for us, year in and year out for many years. Last year we fared badly and failed to score in the second half against Clare. In the previous year, also at Thurles we played well against a good Cork team and lost by 2-15 to 1-12. Earlier we had beaten Kerry by 3-22 to 0-5 in the first round in Killarney. On these and other occasions we were fielding our second best teams and that is not so anymore as we are now compelled to play junior and intermediate players. Tipperary, like Cork have

never been allowed the facility of playing their second best and have always fielded non seniors in this grade. Following our win over Kerry there was speculation that Tom Fives would be drafted in but up to the time of writing there was no definite news on this. The team was due to be selected on Monday evening after training at Dungarvan club grounds. It is not expected that there will be more than one or two changes on the line-out as it will likely be the policy of the selectors to stick with the players who have co-operated in training and shown commitment over the weeks of preparation for the Kerry game. It is a sad situation when some players who were judged good enough by the selectors to be brought on to the panel, declined for one reason or another. If players turn out for their clubs, they should have some pride in the county jersey at whatever level. The selectors will have to make-do with the talent at their disposal and since these are the most commit-

ted players, then they are the best people to wear the county jersey.

Patrick Haran, the 1992 county minor goalkeeper played very well in Lismore and is certain to be retained as the keeper again. The fullback line of Alan Ryan, John Dunford and possibly Pat Hallinan, of St. Mary's who replaced Tom Sullivan at halftime in the Kerry game, Liam Dalton, Pat and Michael Dunford may form the halfback line, but we could see a change here if Tom Fives is available.

Fintan O'Brien gave a great display at midfield and his point from a sideline cut in the second half, was one of the highlights of the win at Lismore. He had two other points also. Peter Queally, who has been training with the county football team and was carrying an injury up to a few days before the game, played very well in the circumstances. Either himself or Fintan O'Brien will be moved (O'Brien to defence or Queally to attack) if Fives is on.

Although the six forwards have a total of 2-9 between them in the first round, it was felt that we could have done a bit better on the scoreboard if all our chances were taken. Kevin Walsh took his goal very well, Pat Bennett had a total of 1-3, Noelle Kelly impressed with his three points, Paul Foley, Martin Power and John Hallinan also helped to keep the Kerry defence under pressure.

TIPPERARY FAVOURITES

It would be foolish to view the match in any other way. On home ground and with a far more experienced team, most of whom have already played in All-Irelands in the junior grade, they must be very strongly fancied. Tipperary went out

in the early stages of the championship last year, but in the two previous years they did exceptionally well. In 1990 they lost in the final (4-21 to 2-11) to Kilkenny and in 1991 they hammered Kilkenny (2-13 to 0-10) in the home final before doling out a 4-17 to 1-5 beating to London in the All-Ireland final proper at Croke Park. Nevertheless, Waterford will go all out to win and giving a very good display as they did in Lismore, a surprise result is by no means out of the question.

What Odds

All counties in the province participate in a total of eight Munster championships and by some twist of fate Waterford and neighbours Tipperary were destined by clash in five of the eight this year. They have already beaten us in minor football and now there are four to go, senior and junior football as well as under 21 football and junior hurling. By another act of fate, the four coming up are all Munster semi-finals and while it is possible that we may lose all four, it is also possible that we may win all four and qualify for a record four Munster finals in the same year.

That may not be a likely bet, but we should at least get through in one or two (or the devil entirely will be on us, as the saying goes).

The Post Mortems

The Kerry game is still quite high on the list of G.A.A. topics being talked about around the county and beyond and I suppose it will remain a hot subject for a good while to come. With rumours and counter rumours going the rounds, it is difficult to sort out the facts about the why's and the wherefores of the whole affair. At the moment, people hold opinions, depending on the source of the information, but until we have a report read to the County Board meeting on next Monday week we should be slow to express opinions. Of course, this report must be clear, honest and factual and confirm or deny the rumours about poor attendances at training, wrong attitudes, some incidents of indiscipline, that are supposed to

have been contributing factors to our defeat. Then having heard and discussed the report from the selectors, the board must discuss it fairly and decide what must be done to put the situation right (if the members of the Board feel that it is not alright now); The county senior hurling team will not be in action again until the third of fourth Sunday in October, so the matter is not one of great urgency. The team manager Georgie Leahy spoke about resigning when interviewed immediately after the match and he gave as his reasons, the amount of abuse to which he, and the other selectors were subjected to coming off the pitch after the game against Kerry. Those were the moments when every Waterford man (and woman) was devastated

and disgruntled and in the mood for 'giving out', so I feel it would be wrong of Georgie to resign, just on that account. At the same time it behooves him and the other four county selectors to consider their situation. They, no more than everyone else, will not deny that the team has had a rotten run since the league resumed in the Spring. We were beaten by Clare, Dublin, Cork and Kerry after playing a draw with Cork and Wexford, and beating Galway in the league in our matches before Christmas.

The logic of the whole affair may be that,

(i). The manager and selectors are no longer able to manage and control the players;

(ii). They are able to manage and control the team, but the players are not up to inter-county standards

(iii). they are able to manage and control the team and the players are up to inter-county standards, but their attitudes (players) are all wrong and a number of them feel that they cannot be done without.

Whatever the cause, something is wrong and whatever that something is, it must be put right, but as I wrote last week, it is not something that should be rushed into. Let the County Board hear a full report before any changes are contemplated.

About a year ago, I received a letter from a retired Board officer suggesting that the county teams should all be handled by a manager, who would be given the authority to name his own two selectors to work with him. Also that the manager be given the power to appoint the team captain in all cases and dispense with the present practice of allowing the county champions to decide who will lead the county teams. Team captains, the letter said, have major roles to play and should be players with leadership qualities. (Dublin are an example of doing it this way). It was further suggested that each managerial crew should have a finance officer from the county executive attached and he would be responsible to the Board for all expenses, etc. and required to produce a balance sheet whenever team activity in his grade, ceased. I refer to the letter here because the writer asked me last week, why I did not publish it.

I feel I will be referring to the above subject again in the weeks to come.

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Situation In Dungarvan Worse Than Anywhere Else Says District Justice

A District Court Judge's warning that he intends to replace monetary penalties with prison sentences in Dungarvan, which, he says, is now "gone daft," has been giving the unequivocal backing of Urban Council Chairwoman, Cllr. Nuala Ryan.

At a sitting of Dungarvan District Court last Wednesday, Judge M. Pattwell asked what has gone wrong in Dungarvan where he has had so many examples of "savagery."

"The place is gone daft," the Judge said. "The situation in Dungarvan is now worse than anywhere else in my district."

Judge Pattwell said he sits in Dungarvan twice a month and it is the same thing every time. The vast majority of the townspeople are quiet, decent, hard-working and law-abiding,

but it is the same small minority that keep cropping up in my court."

He urged members of the legal profession and the garda authorities to try and get together and reach agreement on a reasonable hour for the conclusion of functions for which drink exemptions are given.

The Judge described the present situation in Dungarvan as "shameful," then issued a clear, no-nonsense warning to those who will engage in violence and assaults.

"Instead of monetary penalties jail sentences will in future be imposed," Judge Pattwell said.

The town's first citizen, Cllr. Nuala Ryan has welcomed the Judge's comments and said he would have her support and the support of all the town's elected public representa-

tives.

Cllr. Ryan paid tribute to local Supt. Ray McAndrew and all the gardai in Dungarvan who, she insisted, are doing their very best to curb crime and violence.

"I would urge every member of the community

to support and assist them," said Cllr. Ryan, who admitted to being "distressed" that the situation had deteriorated in the town to the point where Judge Pattwell saw fit to comment as he did this week.

Eleven Month Sentence For Welshman

Four people were removed to hospital following a serious fracas in Dungarvan in the early hours of May 17 last, Judge Michael Pattwell was told at Cahir District Court when he sentenced a 20 year old defendant to a total of eleven months detention in St. Patrick's Institution.

Vincent Chambers, a native of Newport in Wales, with an address at 1A Caseyville, Dungarvan, was convicted of assaulting Nicholas Troy at Grattan Square, thereby occasioning him actual bodily harm.

Chambers, who is unemployed, was also convicted of having an offensive weapon, a wooden stake, in his possession and with

being drunk and disorderly.

Sgt. Tom O'Grady told the court that the wooden stake which Chambers had measured four and a half feet in length and was 3 inches thick. The fracas was a very serious one and four people were removed to Waterford Regional Hospital with injuries.

He added that Troy sustained head and facial injuries.

On a separate charge of stealing a pair of sunglasses from Dougan's Opticians, Main Street, Dungarvan, on May 7, Chambers was sentenced to ten days to be served on expiry of the eleven months.

Inspector Michael Blake prosecuted.

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
