Dail Query By Deasy On Dungarvan Castle

Deputy Austin Deasy has asked the Minister for Finance when it is proposed to complete work on Dungarvan Castle, so that it can be opened to the general public for viewing as a national monument.

The following written reply was received from Minister of State at the Department of Finance, Mr. Dempsey:

"A major scheme of conservation and partial restoration works is required before Dungarvan Castle can be fully opened to the public.

"It is planned to include this work in the next phase of the EC Structural Funds and it is hoped to commence work in 1994. The first step of the project will be an archaeological excavation and this will be followed by a five year programme of conservation and restoration works. It is planned that parts of the castle will be opened to the public on a phased basis over the period of the works."



Know Your Rights

QUESTION — I have been receiving Disability Benefit for 5 years. In addition, I have a pension from my job. Three years ago I was offered Invalidity Pension but declined it because it was taxable. Now that Disability Benefit has been taxed my job pension has been reduced by almost £20 pw. So I would be better off on Invalidity Pension. Can I change this?

ANSWER — Yes, you should ask to be transferred onto Invalidity Pension which is paid at a higher rate than Disability Benefit and there are also the additional benefits of Free Travel and Free Electricity, Free B/W TV Licence and Free Telephone Rental, if you meet the other conditions.

This may help in some way to offset the tax you now have to pay. It would be in your own interest to let the tax office know that you have been granted the Invalidity Pension so that your tax free allowances can be reduced accordingly.

The Dept. of Social Welfare notify the tax office when you have been on Disability Benefit for 12 months but they don't inform them that you have transferred onto Invalidity Pension.

THE BOSNIAN CONFLICT

Dear Sir,
Since the Bosnian conflict started a number of aid groups have come into existence with Bank and Building Society account numbers for donations and deposits for aid. Some of these aid groups are associated with Medjugorje which is now in a war-zone controlled by Bosnian Croat military chiefs.

Strong feelings about the Balkan conflict and unquestioning faith in the events of Medjugorje should not blind us to established facts about our co-religionists in Bosnia.

Andrew Hogg, the

"Times" correspondent in Mostar saw black-bereted and black-uniformed young Croats give fascist salutes to a "cleansed column" of Muslims accompanied by armed Croat guards leading them to a military prison camp outside their city (The Sunday Times, May 16).

To attribute Nazi-like atrocities only to Serbs and also to ignore the Catholic Croats who massacred the children in the village of Ahmici (The Catholic Standard, May 28) without a word of protest or condemnation from recently formed aid groups suggests the conditioning of con-

sciences to conform to Croat aspirations.

So as not to fall victim to the many propaganda machines serving the Byzantine world of Balkan politics and pan-Slav nationalism, our aid and donations should be channelled through long established and multi-war experienced international and impartial aid organisations.

A middle-aged Muslim woman before being silenced by her armed Croat guard pleaded in whispers to Andrew Hogg: "Call the Red Cross. Please call the Red Cross. Tell them what is happening." May her whispers be shouted from the rooftops.

Mushrooms for a start



IF you are looking for something a little different to serve as a starter for a rich meal, you couldn't do better than try a tangy mushroom salad. It's so simple and quick to make, too.

TANGY MUSHROOM SALAD

Ingredients:
 6tbs (90ml) olive oil
 2tbs (30ml) lemon juice
 1 garlic clove, crushed
 salt and pepper
 1tbs (15ml) chopped

parsley
 8oz (225g) button mushrooms
 add water to mix

Method:
 Mix together the oil, lemon juice, garlic, seasoning and parsley. Pour dressing over mushrooms and toss well. Chill before serving.

Low Prices For Quality Wool

The Chairman of the I.C.M.S.A. Sheep Committee, Mr. Eamon O'Rourke, has highlighted the fact that Irish farmers are being paid ridiculously low prices for quality wool.

Mr. O'Rourke said that wool prices have fallen by over 75% in real terms since 1989.

He said that four years ago sheep farmers received 75p/lb for wool, compared to a price of 20p/lb this year.

"In the last four years woolen garments have increased in price leaving an increased profit margin for those engaged in the wool industry beyond the farm gate. "If it was profitable to pay 75p/lb in 1989 then surely large profits are being made by the woolen industry today," said Mr. O'Rourke.

He said that the majority of Irish farmers take great care to ensure that wool fleeces are presented in a clean and tidy fashion despite the fact that wool is being sold at a giveaway price.

He concluded by advising that farmers should seriously consider storing their wool rather than selling it for what he called, scandalously low prices.

Time To Create Patterns & Colour

By the first week in June we can safely assume that harsh weather is behind us for a while and get our bedding plants in smartly.

The term is used to describe a loose collection of half-hardy annuals and perennials, which can be used to create splashes of colour and patterns around even the most modest garden.



SPECIMEN

They can also complement a specimen shrub or tree — bedding Begonias or Busy Lizzies are ideal as they can tolerate the shade of a larger neighbour. However, most bedding plants like the sun and also need a bed which was well dug early in the year and pepped up with well-rotted garden compost. A week before buying or transferring your bedding plants you will need to give it another light turning, before raking fine and level and marking out any special designs.

DIFFERENT

There are many permutations you can try using the different colours and heights of the many varieties available.

But there are basic rules: always give height in the middle of 'island' beds and at the rear of beds against walls or fences, while planting edges with lower varieties.

Beds then look more balanced and colourful, even at a distance.

The range of possible plant choices is wide but here are some favourites:

Alyssum — A neat ground-hugging plant best known for its tiny white flowers and suitability for edging or planting in gaps in rocks and slabs.

Fuchsias — Expensive to use freely but they can be stunning as specimen plants at the heart of a bedding or container scheme.

QUICKLY

Antirrhinum — Better known as 'Snapdragons,' these come in a range of colours, grow quickly and fit nicely behind 'front tank' edging such as alyssum and lobelia.

Lobelia — Comes in a range of lovely blues and makes a neat and fast-growing border for beds.

Marigolds — The French variety can be planted close together to give a rich yellow display between edging and into the middle of borders. The taller African variety can be used to give colour at a higher point of the display and for a fraction of the cost and trouble spent on dahlias or chrysanthemums.

CREATING

Salvia — Spectacular red spiky blooms make them useful for creating a tight centrepiece or clearly defined parts in a geometric display.

Geraniums — Popular in pots, boxes and baskets, the blooming stalks of geraniums can also be useful as part of a bedding scheme.

Petunias — Though the trumpet-shaped blooms are fragile, they are plentiful and come in many colours, making petunias one of the cheapest and most effective 'components' in any bedding scheme.

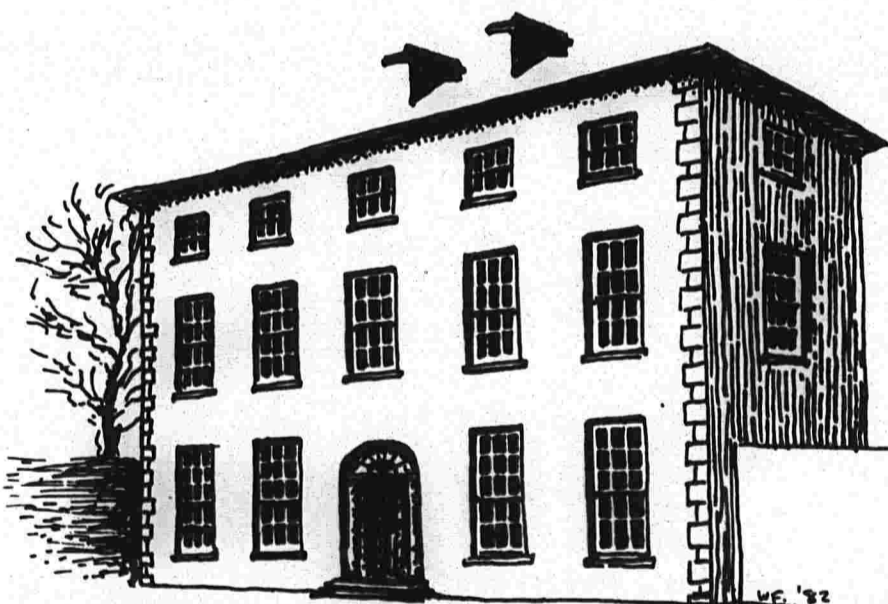

OUR LOCALITY

Duckspool House



The house is an elegant three storey five bay building, rendered with hipped roof and a round-headed doorway. There are two large rooms on each floor and an annex at the rear. The house is marked on Taylor and Skinner's "Road Map of Ireland 1776" as the residence of Mr. Boate Esq. The latter was George Boate an agent of Sir Charles Nugent Humble of Cloncoskeran House. Boate lived in the house until his death in 1812. The family

then moved to the nearby Tournore House. An advert appeared in the Waterford papers early in 1814 offering the house and demense of Duckspool to let for 13 years. The next tenant was John Matthew Galwey.

On July 25th, 1830 Daniel O'Connell gave an election address at Duckspool. It was the only house in the county from which O'Connell issued an election address. O'Connell again stayed in the house in 1832.

The house was lived in by

P. C. Howley, Resident Magistrate in 1847. In 1852 it passed to Richard Hudson, The Duke of Devonshire's Agent. In 1858 the Boate Estate was sold under the Encumbered Estates Act. At the sale Duckspool and Tournore with 140 acres were bought by Roger Baker who lived there until 1868. After that it was vacant for 40 years. It was finally bought by the [Dungarvan An Architectural Inventory by William Fraher]

Stop The Bloody Slaughter

After 24 years of bloodshed you'd think the so-called soldiers of this country would have had enough. Already, in those 24 years 3,000 people have been killed. How many more innocent lives have to be coldly snatched away from the warmth of their loved ones before we realise that violence is not the way. Violence never achieved anything for anyone, it adds blood onto blood and pain onto pain. My vision of Ireland is not the stereo type of luscious green fields and crystal clear waters, I see Ireland as an island almost submerged in the blood of innocent people.

The violence has only succeeded in creating a deeper divide between the people of the South and the people of the North. What has all this war been for? What have the I.R.A. or the U.V.F. or the U.U.F. achieved? Besides causing for the broken hearted mother many a sleepless night through grief for the son she's lost or the heart-break of a father whose wife happened to be in the wrong place at the wrong time or the confusion of all

the parents who can't explain where their spouses have gone because they don't understand it themselves, or for the lovers separated by death. What is to be their compensation for comfort when life is so callously and carelessly stolen from them.

Was it for this the wild geese spread
For this that all the blood was shed,
For this Edward Fitzgerald died,
And Robert Emmett and Wolfe Tone,
All that delirium of the brave?

It shouldn't matter whether a person is catholic or protestant, everyone has a right to life. Yet almost everyday we hear of another bloody slaughter of the innocent solely on the base of their religion. As Thomas Davis once said "There should be room for everyone, it shouldn't matter at what time their forebears gained this sod". We are Irish by a mistake of birth, many others are Irish by inclination or by choice.

Many Irish people, recently, have been campaigning against abortion claiming that the unborn child has a

right to life, indeed we even had a referendum on that subject. So now we are to be hypocrites as well as "honourable murderers", the foetus had a right to life but many of our fellow human beings don't? We no longer judge people by the colour of their skin so why do we persistently judge by their religion. Unfortunately, too many Irish people are of the one mind as D.P. Moran was. He believed that to be Irish you had to be gaelic speaking and catholic.

FARMING LEADER

Businesses, Lawyers And Farmers Launch Attack On Probate Tax

The Law Society and the IFA joined forces with other business and farming interests to launch a campaign of opposition to Probate Tax in Dublin recently.

Following a meeting of ten national organisations, an Alliance Against Probate Tax was formed with the issuing of a joint declaration from the meeting. The tax was described by representatives of rural women's groups present at the meeting as "anti-women, anti-family and anti-enterprise."

The ten organisations forming the Alliance are: The Irish Farmers' Association, The Incorporated Law Society, Macra na Feirme, The Irish Creamery Suppliers' Association, The Irish Countrywomen's Association, The Irish Auctioneers and Valuers Institute, The Small Firms' Association, RGDATA, The Licensed Vintners Association and

the Vintners Federation of Ireland.

Following the meeting, IFA President, Alan Gillis, said: "Opposition to the new Probate Tax is clearly intense and is continuing to grow. Family businesses and farmers have been targeted with this obnoxious tax which will result in serious hardship and legal diffi-

culties for families at a time of bereavement and sadness. This tax is being levied on the tools of our trades. I cannot understand why government continues to insist on imposing crude taxation measures on family businesses and farmers, the primary wealth generators within the community. Not alone will tax target family businesses and farmers, it will also attack individuals irrespective of their level of income."

Objections To Early Retirement Scheme

Following a meeting of the ICMSA Rural Development Committee in Limerick, the Chairman of the Committee, Mr. Dan McCarthy, warned that unless modifications are made to the Scheme, viable farms may be

forced out of business.

Mr. McCarthy said that the ICMSA Rural Development Committee absolutely rejects the enlargement criteria as it is being proposed.

"Under the enlargement criteria, farmers have to either lease or buy land in order to comply with the Scheme. Where is the sense in making it a requirement for a 200 or 300 acre farmer having to further enlarge his or her farm? This policy is going in one direction and one direction only, and that is the enlargement of large farm units to factory scale and the devastation of family farms as we know them.

Government Warned That Land Access Campaign Will Be Intensified Unless Law Changed

The President of the ICMSA, Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, warned the Government on June 1 that the campaign initiated by the ICMSA advising farmers to restrict public access to their lands, will be intensified unless there is satisfactory change in the legislation governing occupiers' liability.

Mr. O'Dwyer and Mr. Donal Murphy, General Secretary of the ICMSA, were present in Dail Eireann for the discussion on the Private Members Bill on the reform of the legislation on occupiers' liability.

"The ICMSA have a firm commitment in the PESP and from the Taoiseach, Mr. Reynolds, that satisfactory reforms to occupiers' liability legislation would be enacted by the end of 1993. However, the government is dragging its feet on this important issue which is of concern to not alone farmers, but all property owners and to all of those who like to avail of country life," said Mr. O'Dwyer.

RIGHTS TO TRESPASSERS

He said that the Government should stop playing politics on the issue by deferring a decision until the publication of the Law Reform Commission report. Mr. O'Dwyer said that there are sufficient reports already published on the matter and that it would be simple for the government to change the present position which gives undue rights to trespassers.

"In 1967 the then Advisory Committee on Law Reform undertook a study on the law relating to liability of occupiers' of property, to enable it to make decisions as to the reforms which were desirable.

"The Report of the Advisory Committee on the Reform of Law of Occupiers' Liability in Ireland was finally published by the Government in November 1974. No law reform resulted.

"ICMSA does not want another lengthy report. Direct and urgent action and performance were required. The present heavy burden of responsibilities must be lifted from farmers and from other property owners and from occupiers," concluded Mr. O'Dwyer.

IFA Get Commitment From Four Main Political Parties On EC Structural Funds

Following a series of top level talks in Dublin recently, IFA has won an important commitment from the Fianna Fail and Labour Agriculture Committees and the main opposition parties that Agriculture and Rural Development must get its fair share of the £8.4 billion of EC Structural Funds over the next 6 years. All four parties expressed concern over media reports that Agriculture and Rural Development was in line for a one-third cut in its allocation over the next 6 years compared to the first National Development Plan

ICMSA - Teagasc Family Farm Environment And Safety Competition Is Announced

Following the success of the first ICMSA-Teagasc "Farm Environment and Safety Competition" in 1992, the Secretary of County Waterford ICMSA, Mr. Tom Hickey, this week announced that both the ICMSA and Teagasc are to repeat the competition this summer.

According to Mr. Hickey, last year's winners — Michael and Suzanne Hannon from Lismore illustrated the high standard set by the competition and provided a much-needed positive platform for farm families in the county.

The competition is not so much efficiency orientated as to encourage farmers to promote a quality image of their farm houses, their farmyards and more importantly their farm products.

The overall appearance of the farm, particularly the farmyard and entrance, are important considerations for the judges when selecting an overall winner. Factors such as the maintenance of farm buildings and the care taken to protect any historical buildings or field monuments, as well as the safety aspects of the farm will be taken into account.

DETAILS OF COMPETITION

ARDMORE MAN HONOURED

There was a distinguished gathering in the Atrium, Trinity College Dublin, on Monday, May 24 on the occasion of the launching of "Reconciliation" by the Columba Press. "Reconciliation" is an anthology of papers by scholars from all over the world, presented as a 'festschrift' to Michael Hurley on the occasion of his seventieth birthday" (quote from foreword of the book.)

Among the many distinguished persons present were Garrett Fitzgerald, Sean Mac Reamon and the Leaders of the six man Christian churches in Ireland, Catholic, Anglican, Methodist, Presbyterian, Lutheran and Quakers. Cardinal Daly and Dr. Eames, as well as other speakers, spoke in glowing terms of Michael's work for Ecumenism.

Michael is a native of Ardmore and received his secondary education in Melleray. At the tender age of 17 he entered the Jesuit Order. In 1945 he obtained a degree in Latin and Greek at U.C.D. He taught at Mungret College and studied Theology in Louvain where he was ordained in 1954, by Cardinal Suinere. In 1961 he obtained a Doctorate in Dogmatic Theology at the Gregorian University, Rome. He later became interested in Christian Unity and in 1970 founded the Irish School of Ecumenism.

His teachings in Milltown Park and the I.S.E. was supplemented by many lectures and speaking engagements in Ireland and indeed world wide. An example of his engagements would be — Reykjavik, Rome, Ottawa (Canada), New Orleans, Melbourne and Minneapolis.

During a sabbatical year 1980-81, in the course of which he travelled extensively in Africa and Asia, he conceived the idea of establishing an inter-church residential community in Northern Ireland. On his return to Ireland he spent two

years on a study exploring the possibilities and consulting widely with the main churches in Ireland and Britain. As a result of this he founded the Columbanus Community of Reconciliation in Belfast. It was formerly inaugurated in 1983, on the Feast of St. Columbanus.

Ardmore can be very proud of her son and his world wide work.



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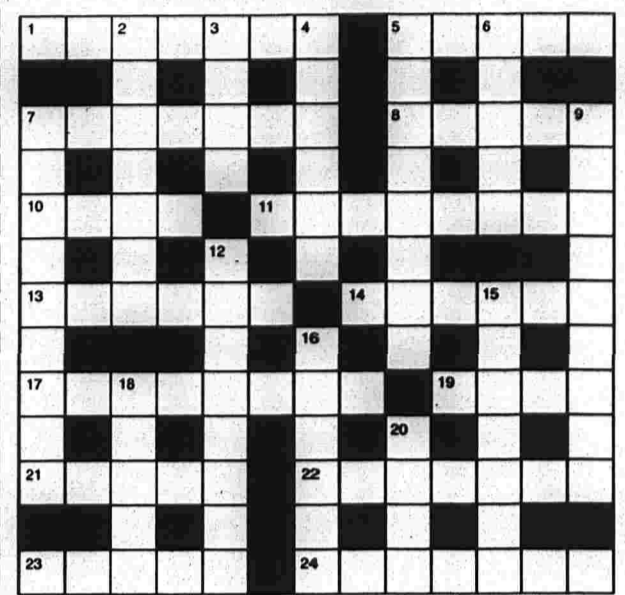

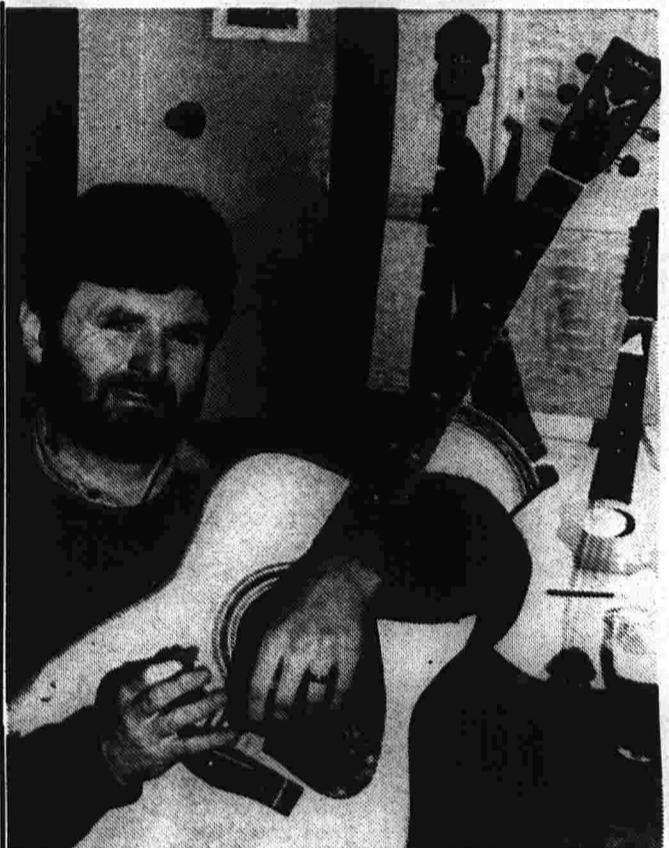
The Stunning To Top The Bill At Conna

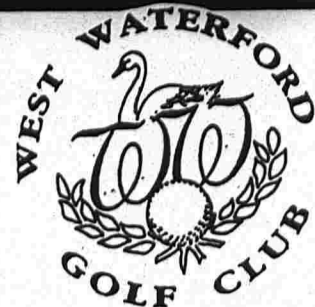

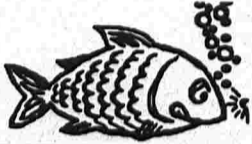

COUNTDOWN TO CUNNIGAR RACE

FAVOURITE INJURED

Rás na Rinne sa Choinigear takes place this Tuesday June 15th over a distance of six miles and local athlete Kieran Maher (Ring /Old Parish A.C.) who had been installed as race favourite following his fine second placing in the Marine Climb to former National Marathon champion, Pat Heffernan (Tipperary), has been forced to withdraw from the race due to a persistent ankle injury.

The Mahers are synonymous with running on the Cunnigar over the years and this would have been a decided advantage to an athlete who was such a vital link on the Waterford team that won the All-Ireland Intermediate Cross Country title last February. We wish Kieran a speedy return to full fitness.

The issue is now wide open and athletes hoping to become the first winner of Rás na Rinne include Alan Whyte, Ballmacarby; Gerry Cantwell, Larry Kennedy, Waterford; Michael Murphy, Cappoquin; Michael Roche, Liam Clinch and John Joe Wright. There is a strong possibility that Ray Treacy (Villierstown) due home on holidays from the U.S.A., will compete along with his sister, Liz Bullen, who has recovered from injury, and if this is so it will be interesting to see the current form of the Providence College Athletics Coach.

On the night there will be prizes for the first three teams of five from the race entries and this will be one of the main attractions of the event. Two of the captains, Paddy Lannon and Dan Dineen have been watching progress of local athletes in recent weeks but they are non committal to date about which athletes they would prefer to have in the line ups.

The race starts at 7.30 p.m. from outside Coláiste na Rinne and the entry fee is £3. A social evening will follow in Tigh Mhuirthe, Helvick which will include the presentation of prizes. B'f linn, Más féidir.

THE CUNNIGAR (BY WILLIAM FRAHER)

One of the earliest references to the Cunnigar appears in the Sheriffs Accounts for the Honor of Dungarvan 1262-1263. It refers to a rent "of the

pound" of the issues of the Conyngar".

A document of 1537 presented to the Royal Commission by the tenants and burgesses of Dungarvan noted that — "a certain lande and a warreyn of conyes, called Congary pointe, is with holden by the said Gerald Fitz John, containing the lengthe three quarters of a mile, and in bredthe one boweshot, well replenished with conyes.

In 1809 a Welshman, Lewis W. Dillwyn, a botanist and naturalist visited Dungarvan. In his diary he described a visit to the Cunnigar — "Monday July 10th I rose this morning at six and employed myself till breakfast in laying out my plants etc. Soon after ten we took a boat and crossed the river to an island called Conygare on which Gladiolus Communis in Gough's Camden is said to grow but tho' we hunted over every part of the island we saw nothing like Gladiolus nor any other plant which can be considered as at all rare except Juncus Acutus, Viola Lutea and one specimen which Woods gathered of Carex Divisa. Mr. Leach found a single shell of Venus Pophia and Macra Lutraria was extremely abundant about high water mark.

In 1861 John R. Dower purchased the Cunnigar at the sale of the Duke of Devonshire's Dungarvan

Lands for £910 on behalf of Dungarvan Town Commissioners. However, the Commissioners refused to take the land and Dower was left with it on his hands. In 1912 his son offered it to the Commissioners for the same price. The land contained 44 acres and eight perches.

In 1916 the tenant Bridget Mahoney put up for sale her interest in the lands. "The tenant and her late husband Lawrence Walsh insisted of parties frequenting the Cunnigar paying a toll for some years past. They further obstructed fishermen and others from Ballinagoul who had a right of way along those Cunnigar lands".

There was a plan to build a bridge to the Cunnigar and reclaim Western Bay. This idea was first suggested in the late 1820's and in 1926 Dungarvan U.D.C. were asking the local Government Department to sanction the payment of £20,000 promised by the British Government for construction of the Cunnigar bridge. However, the money was never granted to Dungarvan. Part of the scheme, the reclamation of Western Bay was still being discussed in the 1950's.

In 1922 a golf course was laid out on the Cunnigar and a golf pavilion constructed. Players were brought by boat from the look out by John Duggan or "The Lord" as he was popularly called. The golf club moved to Clonea in 1929.

THE CUNNIGAR RACES

The Cunnigar was also used on occasion for horse racing. The Waterford News of August 1910 carried a report on one of these meetings. The first race had three horses - M. Ryan's "Full Back", M. Sinnott's "Miss Anne" and F. Stephen's "Tommy". The judge, James Hayes, declared the race void, as none of the horses had run the entire course.

The second race was for farmer's horses — M. O'Brien's "Crookstown", L. McGrath's "Le Neve", J. Christopher's "Harmony Hall" and N. Moloney's "Lisfennel". Crookstown was the winner. The third race was won by M. Sinnott's, Miss Annie.

The fourth race was an open pony race with nine entries. M. O'Brien's "Little

Nell", M. O'Brien's "May Boy", James Barrett's "Miss Florin", William Ryan's "Little Jim", J. J. Harty's "Gray Lass", N. Veales "A.B.C.", E. Dunphy's "Little Pickinny", T. Sinnott's "Miss Olive" and P. Ryan's "Topsy". Miss Olive won the race.

The article ends with the following comment:

"Though the days racing was a grand experience, yet very many longed for the old Killosera course, where the arrangements are not restricted by the tide. Had the meeting been held at Killosera we have no doubt but there would have been an exceptionally large attendance". (William Fraher)

THE CUNNIGAR WALK

In tandem with Rás na Rinne a non competitive walk over the distance of four miles on the Cunnigar will take place from 7 p.m. onwards starting at the beach car park. With our summer weather due to improve a large number will be expected to "inhale those balmy breezes from the Cunnigar blowing down" and to "gaze with rapture o'er the scene of dear Dungarvan town". Admission to the walk is a nominal £2 and all proceeds go to the local Scoil Náisúfnta na Rinne. A number of prizes will be raffled among the walkers in Tigh Mhuirthe Helvick afterwards. What better way to spend a pleasant Summer's evening.

What's Wrong With Waterford Hurling

I would be obliged sir, if you would allow me some space to express my feelings towards a terrible situation which has come about in Waterford G.A.A. affairs in a short 6 months.

WHAT IS WRONG?

I am writing this in the hope that it may rectify what has become a very sad state in Waterford's hurling fate in a brief 6 months. I intend to list a number of points which clearly beg the question above to be answered in a proper fashion and so hope that in so doing we may rectify our appalling situation which we find ourselves in at present. Just over 6 months ago we contested a minor hurling All-Ireland (unlucky to lose) and won a magnificent U-21 All-Ireland (in a replay) and a little bit earlier contested a senior semi-final (again unlucky) and now 6 months on we are gone out of all these competitions. Now with that in mind it surely begs a lot of questions, which I do not want to go into detail about, but would make a suggestion, that an open forum (questions and answers session) be held in both divisions in the county (East & West) to clarify really what is gone wrong and to find out where we are going, as we are in a most dreadful situation for our future outlook. This letter is not intended to offend anybody but I feel I am writing it for several thousands more Deise supporters and followers who are saddened and indeed sickened in the last 6 months. I am using the term 6 months a lot but that is to emphasise what has happened in such a short

space of time. If the ship is in deep water and in trouble then it is the captain's duty to get his crew to rectify the situation and if this fails, then it stays off course until the crew find a new captain to steer that ship out of troubled waters. I must make that quick picture to highlight the following points, which surely does signify the ship to be well off course.

- A — That training prior to Kerry game was badly attended (12-14 players at some sessions).
- B — That at one particular session two prominent players became involved in a punch-up.
- C — That internal differences between selectors led to the best 15 not being picked.
- D — That prior to the Kerry game a prominent

member of that panel was quoted as saying "that this was the worst ever prepared team, physically and mentally to play for Waterford."

- E — That commitment from star players of just six months previous wasn't there.
 - F — If this was known by senior personnel within the County Board and was left to continue, why was it not rectified.
 - G — Why then with the above points was the ship left to go so far off course that we had to end up with such a sad, sad result 3 weeks ago.
- As I said at the outset I hope all these points are rectified for the love and the good of Deise affairs. We are in the process of developing county grounds, but surely we are doing our-

selves an injustice if we are putting the cart before the horse. There isn't much point in developing county grounds if we cannot develop our county teams and it does indeed beg the question — Whither too Deise affairs? What is wrong?

I hope what I have written is an offering to solving this major problem now, and not to let it linger on into '94 when, hopefully, we will be better prepared for our first round encounter. Again, as I've stated, I wish to offend nobody, but facts are facts and the truth is always bitter.

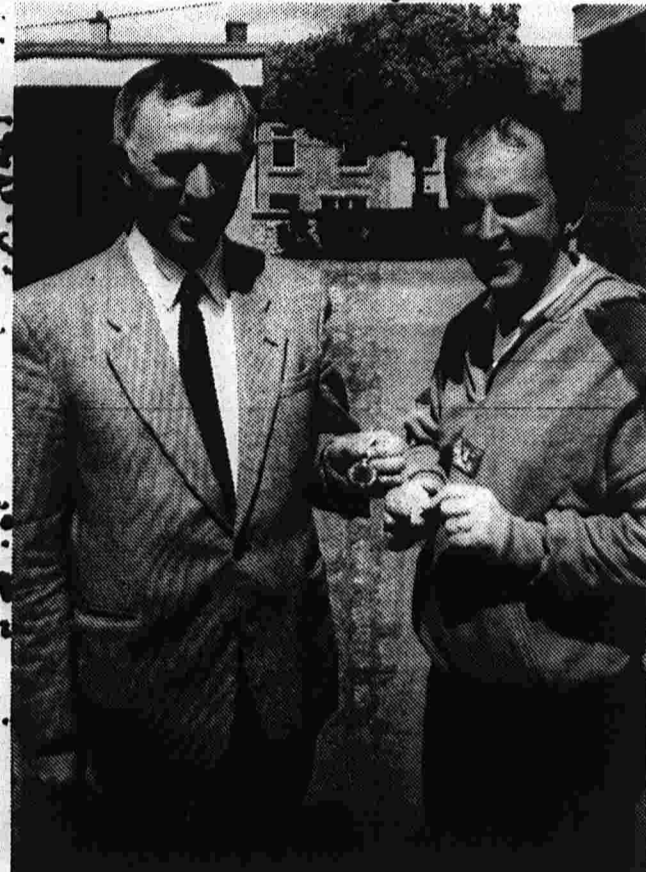

Adult Hurling Championships Resume

— But Programme Is Curtailed

Two Munster senior football semi-finals at Walsh Park on the following Sunday means that a number of senior and intermediate club matches cannot be played over the coming week-end, but half a dozen matches in senior and intermediate hurling that are not affected, are programmed for venues around the county. Few hurling enthusiasts will quibble if I name the Mount Sion/Tallow clash at Cappoquin on Sunday afternoon as the choice match of the entire week-end. It is the feature game at Cappoquin on Sunday and will attract the biggest crowd to the venue, this season. Ballyduff versus Roanmore will also be quite an attraction too, and luckily for patrons both are being played on the afternoon programme. The other two senior championship matches will be at Walsh Park.

Las Sunday's drawn match

at Thurles will not effect any of the fixtures as the replay has gone back to the end of the month.

MOUNT SION OR TALLOW

Last year the same clubs looked to be heading for a county final meeting as they both progressed well in different sections of the league. They each got to the semi-finals where Mount Sion beat Passage 1-15 to 3-6 and Tallow lost out to Ballygunner by 2-13 to 2-7. That wasn't Tallow's best game last year and had they survived the Ballygunner challenge, they would have looked forward to avenging their heavy defeat by Mount Sion (2-15 to 1-6) when they last met in the 1991 championship. To-date both have met Dungarvan with Tallow considered lucky to survive by a couple of points and Mount Sion going under by a single point to the Old Boro team. This would indicate that Tallow and Mount Sion are now fairly equal in standards and I'm sure that the result here will show how little there is between them. I have a slight fancy for the chances of Mount Sion to take the points and stay level with Tallow on the league table.

BALLYDUFF V. ROANMORE

With victories over county champions, Ballygunner and De La Salle, Roanmore have been showing a return to their best form and must be strongly fancied to beat Ballyduff in the opening game at Cappoquin. The Western side have lost a few key players in the past two years, but nevertheless have enjoyed wins against Dunhill and St. Saviours already this year. Their one defeat was against De La Salle who managed a single point win in their second round match.

A win for Ballyduff would do a lot to boost their morale, but to me, it doesn't seem to be on the cards.

PASSAGE V. ST. SAVIOURS

Passage, like Roanmore have defeated Ballygunner

already this year and this kind of form should be good enough to take care of the challenge from St. Saviours in the curtain-raiser at Walsh Park on Sunday. Saviours have already suffered two defeats, by Ballyduff and De La Salle.

BALLYGUNNER V. DE LA SALLE

This is a very important match for both clubs. The "Gunners" will need a win if they are to remain in contention to hold on to their title as they have already lost two games. De La Salle have two wins to their credit and another victory will keep them in contention for a place in the K/O stages.

When they met in last year's championship, Ballygunner scored a twelve pointer victory, so unless De La Salle have come on a lot in the meantime, it would be foolish to write that they have a good chance. Ballygunner should take the points here.

ABBEYSIDE V. ST. MOLLERANS

Mollerans have applied for a postponement of the game because of examinations but this is likely to be turned down and the match will likely go ahead at Leamybrien as planned. At the moment, Abbeyside have 4 points from three games and Mollerans have 2 points from two matches. Overall, Abbeyside may have shown the better form, even though they have been fielding without three or four of their regulars for a variety of reasons. Abbeyside may just about scrape home again here.

ST. MARYS' V. AN RINN

This is fixed for Colligan at 7.30 p.m. on Saturday and it should be a close call for both teams. They have not met in the hurling championship since An Rinn were promoted from junior status, so it is difficult to make a comparison. If the game goes as I expect it

The remainder of the matches in the junior grade are involving second string teams.

RESULTS

In the junior hurling championship games played last week-end, Clashmore had a two-goal win against Modeligo in a match which saw some delightful points being scored on both sides.

Kilrossanty had a five points victory over Geraldines in their tie and a surprise result in the Sgt. Cup quarter-final saw Passage score a big win over Lismore at Cappoquin.

To Referee Munster Semi Final

Abbeyside/Ballinacourty referee Pat Moore has been appointed by the Munster Council to handle the junior hurling semi-final between Cork and Clare at Limerick on next Sunday. It is the curtain-raiser to the senior semi-final between the same counties. John M. Kelly will act as linesman at both games.

Waterford are the only county in the province who do not have a member listed on the panel of top referees (referees who are considered competent to handle senior championship matches) so hopefully this situation will change in the near future. We do have a number included on the supplementary list.

Fraher Field Work Started

The digger is in and the work of the removal of the embankment at the town side has begun. Bad weather delayed the start of this work which is expected to be completed in a week or two. When finished the erection of the covered stand will commence, but this is such a big undertaking that it is now sure that the field will not be able to take the county football finals which are due to be played there this year. The field committee are hopeful of being ready for an official opening in the Spring of 1994.

Work on the development of Walsh Park is not expected to commence before the end of the year as plans are not yet completed. Planning permission will be applied for within a couple of months. The Board feel it is important not to have both county grounds closed at the same time.

Distribution Of Equipment To Schools

The promised supply of playing gear and equipment for schools in the county will happen on this Thursday night at the Park Hotel, Dungarvan, when all primary schools will be issued with whatever equipment they have requested, following official notification of their entitlement.

The value of the equipment to each particular school will be proportionate to the extent of the local club's involvement with the county development draw. This means that where there is large membership in a club, the benefits to the local school will be all the greater. Over the years (and if the draw holds up as well as it is at the present time) an amount exceeding £20,000 will be spent on playing gear and equipment for the schools throughout the county. The distribution will commence at 9 p.m. sharp.

Won Medal In Ulster

Former Lismore player, Anthony Tinnelly was one of the key players in Down's victory in the final of the Ulster junior hurling championships three weeks ago. The well-known Lismore man who has won championships in every grade of hurling with his club from under 14 to senior, captained his club to a minor victory in '91 and the county minor hurling team in the same year.

Anthony now plays his club hurling with Ros-trevor and plays at right half forward on the Down junior county team. Here in Waterford he also played in the Tony Forrestal Tournament in 1987.

With Down seniors coming very much to the forefront at senior level, we could be hearing a lot more about Anthony in the future.

MUNSTER JUNIOR HURLING CHAMPIONSHIP

Exciting Semi-Final Ends All Square

WATERFORD 3-10 TIPPERARY 2-13

This was undoubtedly one of our best displays in the junior hurling championship for a long time and all credit to the fifteen players who certainly gave of their all against hot favourites Tipperary and deservedly qualified for another meeting that will bring them to Cappoquin for the replay on June 27.

It was the kind of performance which would seem to justify the decision of the higher authorities to refuse Waterford permission to field their second best team and on pondering on this point as the match progressed, I wondered if we would have done as well if we had been allowed our "second best."

The Waterford team showed four changes from the side which defeated Kerry at Lismore ten days previously. Pat Curran, Stradbally, in goal, replaced Patrick Haran, Tom Fives was on at midfield with Peter Queally moving to left half back to replace Michael Dunford. Donnagh Cummins, Cappoquin, was on for team mate Martin Power. John Byrne replaced Tommy O'Sullivan at left corner back.

Both sides missed many good chances, particularly in the early stages before the real pressure came on and also in the closing ten minutes when both teams had near misses. Needless to mention, there was a big difference in the standard of this game and the match which followed, but few will dispute the fact that the junior game was by far the better of the two contests and provided the better entertainment for the 12,000 crowd who came to Semple Stadium.

PLAY

Tipperary played with the strong breeze, but Waterford were first to attack and Pat Bennett pointed. Pat Curran saved brilliantly at the other end a minute later and after a further three minutes we had our second score which was a point by Paul Foley. Tipperary had three wides before James Cahill opened their score when he pointed an 80 yards free in the 7th minute. Joe Harrington had another for Tipp to make it level pegging, but the accurate Pat Bennett put us back in front with a well taken 9th minute free. Tipp got a free and Sean Nealon levelled again.

Paudie O'Keeffe put the

home side in front with a point in the 12th minute and they went two points up in the 14th minute before the first goal of the match came in the 16th minute when Liam Stokes sent an unstoppable shot past Pat Curran who was unprotected at that particular moment. Pat Bennett and Ger Ryan exchanged points to leave the state of play 1-6 to 0-4 in Tipp's favour by the 21st minute. A 23rd minute free to Waterford, taken by Pat Bennett, was passed to the unmarked Paul Foley who shot to the net to give the goalie no chance. This was as fine an opportunist score as one could wish to see. It was delightfully executed by the quick thinking duo and could be described as one of the highlights of the match.

In the 23rd minute Kevin Walsh sent wide and my notes tell me that this was our first wide of the match. In the 25th minute Pat Bennett goaled to give us a single point lead, which was brought back when the Tipp full forward pointed in the 26th minute to leave the scores level at 2-4 to 1-7 at the half time whistle.

SECOND HALF

Harrington pointed Tipperary in front in the 31st minute and this score was followed by a couple of Tipp wides before Bennett struck for our third goal to restore the lead again. Stokes and Maher had points to leave it level again in the 40th minute. We went two points up when Tom Fives and Noelle Kelly scored. Paudie O'Keeffe and Eamon Kelly brought the home side back on level terms in the 49th minute.

Then came Eamon Kelly's goal that looked to have put paid to our chances, but back came Waterford with three points without reply — Cummins and Bennett (2). With time running out Tipperary went a point up after a doubtful free and when Pat Curran's puck out was fouled, Pat Bennett sent over to level the game in the 61st minute.

It is worth noting that 3-8

of our total of 3-10 was scored by the full forward line of Pat Bennett (our man of the match), Paul Foley and Noel Kelly. Pat Curran certainly justified his selection in goal and made a number of fine saves. The full back line held out very well with John Dunford in the middle doing everything required of him, young Alan Ryan, playing brilliantly, saving some dangerous situations in the final quarter, and on the other side Kilgobinet's John Byrne justified his selection.

Liam Dalton's 80 yards dash on a solo run in the 45th minute deserved the applause it was given and with Pat Dunford and Peter Queally completing the half back line, we had little to complain about. Tom Fives and Fintan O'Brien played their hearts out in the middle of the field and set up a number of attacks and in the half forward sector Kevin Walsh, John Hallinan and Donnagh Cummins contributed their share to a great effort that deserved victory.

REPLAY

At a meeting of the Munster Council held later on Sunday evening, the replay was fixed for Cappoquin on Sunday, June 27 at 7.30

p.m. Extra time will be played if it ends level again. The winners will meet Cork or Clare in the final on a date to be fixed. The original date for the junior hurling final was June 23 or 25.

DISAPPOINTING

It was very disappointing to find so few Waterford people at Thurles on Sunday and the extent to which we were so outnumbered was clearly felt in the crowd response when Waterford scored. Hopefully, things will change for the replay at Cappoquin.

The Chief Fire Officer, Mr. Tony O'Flynn, replying to the second question said that a previous proposal had been sent to the Dept. with a costing of £250,000 for a new station in Tallow. This was refused and a new proposal and costing was then sent of £150,000. This he said was the bottom line on cost, as anything less would

not comply with the requirements and regulations of a modern Fire Station. They were now awaiting

this funding from the Dept. and work will commence, he said, when this receives the O.K.
