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New Telephone Charges Are Outrageous

A Fianna Fail member of Waterford County Council, Cllr. Kieran O'Ryan, led a chorus of criticism at Monday's meeting on the proposed new telephone charges which he described as "outrageous."

Cllr. O'Ryan said the speed with which they are being rushed through both Houses of the Oireachtas compounded a very great wrong.

"They cannot be justified under any circumstances

and they will mean that many people living in remote parts of the country will have to surrender their 'phones because of their inability to pay the new charges," he said.

Cllr. William McDonnell

(FG) seconded Cllr. O'Ryan's proposal that they protest in the strongest possible manner at the increased charges. He said he was shocked that the Labour Party had gone along with them and he sug-

gested that was not the kind of Labour Party so many people had voted for in last year's General Election.

Political party affiliation was set aside as the proposal condemning the increased charges was passed unanimously. The Council will now forward in writing its opposition to them to the Government.

Council Tributes To Late Michael C. Nagle

Many generous tributes were paid to the late Michael C. Nagle, Editor/Proprietor of the "Dungarvan Leader" by members of Waterford County Council at Monday's meeting.

In a further tribute the meeting adjourned briefly as a mark of respect to the journalist who had been covering meetings of the Council for fifty four years.

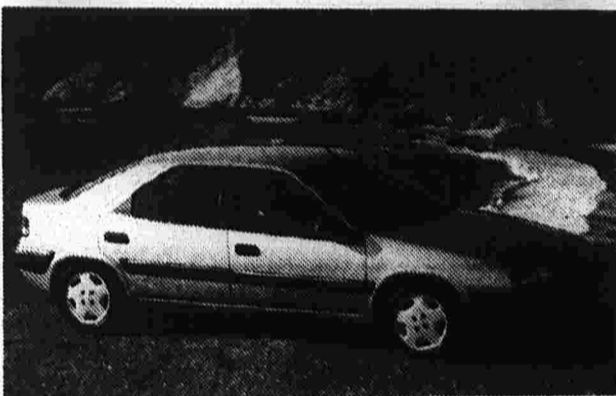
The Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne, said the occasion was a sad one because the man they had come to know as "the senior scribe" had always been supportive of the Council and the members.

Cllr. Kyne said Michael Nagle was a man who had his own firm views and while he often took the councillors to task he always did so in a fair and constructive manner.

"His death came as a great shock to us all to whom he was so close," said Cllr. Kyne. "He did a great public service for more than half a century and will be sorely missed."

County Roads Will Become Inaccessible

SAY COUNCILLORS

Members of Waterford County Council warned on Monday that some county roads will become completely inaccessible unless a programme of hedgecutting is soon undertaken.

They reacted angrily when told by Acting Co. Engineer, Mr. Eamonn Mansfield that because of the financial situation it was not planned to carry out any hedgecutting along county roads this year.

Cllrs. Gary O'Halloran

and Nora Flynn were scathing in their criticism of that decision, with Cllr. Flynn claiming that it has seemingly been forgotten that people still live in rural Ireland.

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Know Your Rights

Question — A friend's house was extensively damaged in a fire. She is in her seventies and wouldn't be able to cope with having the house reconstructed. Would she be entitled to the New House Grant if she bought a new house or apartment?

Answer — As a general rule a person wouldn't qualify for the New House Grant if they or their spouse have ever previously purchased a house here or abroad.

The fact that a person inherits a house would not disqualify them from getting this particular grant. In certain circumstances special exemptions from the requirement that a person must not have bought or built a house previously are granted. These exemptions are:

1 If your house has been damaged by fire, explosion or Act of God and where it would be more reasonable to buy a new house rather than restore the damaged one.

1 If you are separated from your spouse under a Court Order of deed of Separation and you were in need of housing.

1 If you are disabled and you have to buy a specially designed or adapted house because your existing house is unsuitable.

In all cases there is a requirement that refusal of the grant would cause undue hardship. Each case is decided on its merits. In the case of a fire they would look for evidence that the house is uninhabitable and that the insurance would be less than the cost of rebuilding or building a new house.

I had the pleasure of knowing Michael for many years, through my involvement with organisations such as the I.C.A., etc. To date many tributes have been paid to Michael but no mention has been made of the great work he did for handicapped children in the catchment area of West Waterford.

Michael, with me, and a number of like minded people, was a founder member of St. John's Association for Handicapped Children, twenty nine years ago in

October 1964.

For a period of eleven years he was an energetic member of the Committee which worked tirelessly to get a special school in West Waterford where special education would be taught.

The Department of Education was slow to move and in 1968 a deputation of committee members travelled to Dublin consisting of the late Dr. O'Neill, late Norman Walsh, late Canon D. Byrne, late Horace Dowd, late Michael Nagle and myself, Ann McGrath.

In 1973 the Department gave the go ahead and the foundation stone for the new school, St. John's, was laid. In 1976, the Annual General Meeting of the Association was held for the first time in the new St. John's School.

Furnishings and equipment cost £100,000, and the Association had to pay £15,600, a huge amount of money at that time. Michael, through his popular paper, the Dungarvan Leader, and his own column "Pensman" kept the public informed all through the years, of the good work,

and they responded with the collections and fund raising.

It was such a pleasure to work with Michael. He is now gone to his eternal reward and I extend my sincere sympathy to Mrs. Nagle and family on their great loss.

May he rest in peace.

Father And Sons Convicted Of "Savage Assault"

A witness told Judge Mary O'Halloran at Dungarvan District Court last Wednesday that she saw blood "pouring out" of a man as three members of the same family savagely assaulted him.

Ms. Susan Nolan, Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan, said John Daly, also of Cathal Brugha Place, could hardly get up off the ground as he was struck "from every angle."

Before the court were Tony O'Riordan snr., Tony O'Riordan jnr. and Michael O'Riordan, all of Cathal Brugha Place, who were charged with assaulting Daly in the front garden of

his own home in the early hours of March 17.

Tony O'Riordan jnr. pleaded guilty to the assault and to causing malicious damage to a glass in the front door of Daly's House. O'Riordan snr. and his son Michael however pleaded not guilty to assaulting Daly.

During lengthy evidence it was claimed that Daly was savagely beaten, had a pool cue broken off his back, and was subsequently taken by ambulance to Waterford Regional Hospital where he was detained for a week.

John Daly told the court that the window of his front door was smashed around 1 a.m. on March 17 and when he went out to see what had happened he was attacked by Tony O'Riordan jnr.

Mr. Daly said he was caught by the hair, pulled to the ground and kneed into the face. He was struck and kicked several times after being dragged into the garden.

Witness said Michael O'Riordan then came on the scene and jumped on him and struck him with his fists a number of times. He was subsequently struck and kicked by Tony O'Riordan snr., who also struck him on the back with a pool cue. As a result of his injuries he spent a week in hospital.

Breda Fraher, a sister of Mr. Daly, said she saw all three defendants attack her brother. His hands were held and they were banging him off the wall of the house.

A neighbour Susan Nolan said she saw Mr. Daly being hit by Tony O'Riordan jnr. "from every angle." Mr. Daly could hardly get up off the ground and she saw Tony O'Riordan snr. strike him with a pool cue and eventually he broke it off Mr. Daly's back.

"The blood was just pouring out of Mr. Daly and it went on for 25 or 30 minutes," she said.

Garda Martin Shanahan told the court that when he arrived to the scene he found Mr. Daly in "a fairly bad state." His right eye was completely closed, the left one was black and blue and his face was covered in blood. A doctor was summoned and he was taken by ambulance to hospital.

Michael O'Riordan and Tony O'Riordan both denied assaulting Mr. Daly. Michael said he saw his brother Tony and Mr. Daly fighting and only went to pull them apart. Tony snr. said that while he had a cue with him he swung it at his son Tony but missed him. It was then the cue broke off the ground.

O'Riordan snr. said he pulled them apart eventually and then hit his own son Tony.

Judge Mary O'Halloran, however, convicted all three of assaulting Mr. Daly and sentenced each to six months. Tony jnr. was given a consecutive two months on the malicious damage charge.

Recognisances were fixed in the event of an appeal. Supt. Ray McAndrew prosecuted.

Malicious Damage To Public Telephone Booths

A 19-year-old youth handed £775 into court in Cappelquin last Friday as compensation for malicious damage he caused to public telephone booths at Mount Melleray and Cappagh on the night of July 1 last year.

Jamies Bray, Shanbally, Cappelquin, was ordered by Judge Mary O'Halloran to undertake 150 hours community service in lieu of a six month detention sentence in St. Patrick's

Institution.

Bray had been convicted at a previous sitting of the court of causing malicious damage to the amount of £726 to the telephone booth at Mount Melleray and £55 damage to the booth at Bherwillin, Cappelquin.

Bray, the court had heard, had dumped the damaged telephone equipment from the Mount Melleray booth into the river Blackwater.

Supt. Ray McAndrew prosecuted.

Don't Let Gardening Damage Your Health

What is the 'Sound of Summer?' Birds singing in the trees?

Sadly, it is probably the clatter of garden gadgets — mowers, 'trimmers,' trimmers and saws.

Never has the gardener had so many labour-saving, yet potentially dangerous tools at his disposal. As the mowing and trimming season gets into full swing it is time to remember a few safety tips. The best of all is to invest in a residual current device — RCD for short.

Many modern household wiring systems have these super circuit-breakers built in but you should be able to buy a simple version for less than £20 and it could save your life.

It goes into the wall socket and you then plug your mower or other power tool into the RCD, creating a sensitive barrier between you and the mains.

The RCD automatically monitors the circuit and, quicker than any fuse, cuts the power if there is a leakage or short-circuit — typically when the mower or hedgetrimmer accidentally cuts through the power cable.

If you use a lot of power tools in the garden or garage it could also be worthwhile fitting an RCD-protected socket.

A waterproof socket specially designed for use in the garden must have an RCD fitted as well — waterproofing is no protection against cutting a cable. And even when you have an RCD fitted and cut a cable, don't rely on it for absolute protection — it might not trip if the current has not actually been interrupted, yet there might be an exposed wire which could be deadly.

In this case, unplug from the mains before checking cable damage.

OTHER GARDEN SAFETY TIPS

- | Unplug from the mains when checking, adjusting, cleaning or repairing a power tool.
- | Unwind extension leads fully before use and check they can handle the power rating of the machine being connected.
- | Do not use electrical tape to join or repair cable — but a proper connector.
- | If you have pronged connectors on any leads or appliances, make sure that the pronged half is fitted to the appliance end and not the mains end or you risk leaving the pronged half exposed while live. You might remember the danger, but someone else, such as a child, might not be aware.
- | Work away from you when mowing or trimming and, with trimmers, keep both hands on the machine handles. Trail or clip the lead over your shoulder and behind you to keep it well clear of the blades.
- | Wear protection when using a chainsaw — stout clothing, gloves and goggles — and follow the maker's instructions.

A publican was confronted by an "onslaught" of GAA followers into Cappoquin last March for the National Hurling League, a solicitor told Cappoquin District Court.

Mr. Neil Twomey was representing David Power, Mill Street, Cappo-

quin, who pleaded guilty to a breach of the licensing laws at 2.30 p.m. on Sunday, March 21.

Supt. Ray McAndrew said Gardai found the pub "packed to capacity."

Mr. Twomey however said Waterford and Clare were playing in the National Hurl-

ing League at the local venue that afternoon and the publican was taken by surprise by the onslaught of followers who descended on his pub. The offence was only half an hour beyond closing time.

Convicting Power, Judge O'Halloran imposed a fine of £200.

Ginger Up The Gammon



Trouble free, yet quite spectacular roast gammon makes a super main dish for a party. We've given ours a flavoursome glaze with honey and ground ginger.

GINGER GAMMON

Ingredients:

- 1 whole gammon (weighing approx 18lb (8.1 kg))
- 4 tbs thin honey
- 1 tbs ground ginger
- whole cloves
- 1 orange, sliced for garnish

Method:

Place the gammon in a large roasting tin with a little water, cover with butter foil and bake at 325° F, 160° C, gas mark 3, for 7½ hours, basting occasionally. Remove the foil and gently



pull the gammon rind away from the joint, using a round bladed knife. Make deep diagonal cuts through the fat to form a lattice pattern.

Mix the honey and ginger, then spread over the gammon fat. Stud with olives at the cross of each cut.

Return to the oven and bake for a further 30-45 minutes until outside is a rich golden brown.

Remove from the oven and leave to "rest" for 20 minutes in a warm place prior to carving. Garnish with orange slices before serving.

Serves 20-25 people.

Wooden Stakes And Bottles Used In Late Night Assault

The story of how a number of people from the Modeligo area were confronted by a local group armed with wooden stakes and bottles outside a late night "chipper" in Dungarvan in the early hours of May 16 last, unfolded at a lengthy hearing before Judge Mary O'Halloran at Dungarvan District Court last Wednesday.

A total of fourteen witnesses gave evidence in a case which went on for more than three hours and at the end of which three young Dungarvanmen were convicted of assault.

The court heard how one member of the Modeligo group was left unconscious on the ground after being struck on the back of the head with a wooden stake. There was also evidence that one of the three accused before the court had been thrown bodily through the plate glass window of Corals betting shop at Grattan Square and that four people in all had to be taken by ambulance to Waterford Regional Hospital.

Before the court were Michael Hallahan (19), 101 Childers Estate, Dungarvan; Danny Nagle (19), 29 Childers Estate and Sean Lucas (20), 1A Caseyville, Dungarvan.

Hallahan was convicted of three charges of assault and of being in possession of an offensive weapon (a bottle).

Nagle was convicted on two counts of assault, possessing an offensive weapon (a bottle) and causing malicious damage to a

plate glass window, at Corals betting shop, Grattan Square, to the value of £190.

Lucas was convicted of one assault and possessing an offensive weapon (a wooden stake).

Fourteen witnesses, including the three defendants, gave evidence in a case which lasted three and a half hours.

During the hearing there was evidence that a number of men from the Modeligo area of Co. Waterford were confronted by a group of locals when they emerged from a chip shop around 3 a.m. on May 16. Two of the locals were armed with bottles and two others with wooden stakes measuring four feet in length and three inches in diameter.

One witness, agricultural contractor John Hickey, told the court he was struck on the side of the head with a bottle by Nagle and when he put up his arms to protect himself he was struck again and received three stitches in a head wound and five stitches on his arm.

Hickey denied he bodily threw Nagle through the betting shop window.

Nicholas Troy told the court he was struck on the back of the head with a stake and remembered no more, while his brother Pat said he thought his brother was dead when he saw him lying unconscious on the ground.

All three defendants claimed they had been attacked and acted in self-de-

fence. Nagle said he was thrown through the betting office window and sustained 14 stitches to a wound in his ear and 8 stitches to a cut in his leg.

He claimed John Hickey was one of those who threw him through the window. That, however, had been emphatically denied in evidence by Hickey.

Judge O'Halloran convicted all three defendants, but when told that Lucas had no previous convictions he was given a three months suspended sentence and ordered to enter a bond to keep the peace and be of good behaviour for two years for assaulting John Hickey.

Lucas was given a two month suspended sentence for having an offensive weapon in his possession.

Nagle was given concurrent three month sentences for assaulting John Hickey and P. J. Hickey and a further concurrent two months for causing criminal damage to the betting shop window.

Hallahan, who is currently in custody serving 16 months, was given a total of four months when convicted of assaulting John Hickey, P. J. Hickey and Eamonn Power, and having in his possession an offensive weapon.

Judge O'Halloran, however, directed that the four months be served by Hallahan on expiry of the sentence he is presently serving.

Supt. Ray McAndrew prosecuted.

NEW CEMETERY BLESSED

The people of Newcastle were described recently as the epitome of everything good in Irish community life. Paying them a warm tribute, Michael Fitzgerald (F.G.), Chairman, South Tipperary County Council, said that there was a level of community spirit in the village that would have made Muintir Na Tire founder Canon Hayes proud. Councillor Fitzgerald was in the picturesque South Tipperary village to open two new developments undertaken jointly by the local authority and the community and which between them has cost £80,000. First he cut the tape on a new cemetery at Mullough that cost £50,000 to provide and then he moved down to the village to declare open a new tennis/basketball court and changing rooms. The court is already in use and the previous night Newcastle had won the Co. Tipperary Under-16 Community Games basketball final defeating Nenagh for the title.

Newcastle's new cemetery has not yet been put to use but it's a facility that the Village has been waiting on for close on 20 years. Various difficulties over the years have thwarted plans but the development finally got underway when local landowner Michael Morrissey, Mullough, donated one acre of land to allow work to proceed. Mr. Michael Morrissey was a special guest at the opening when the Secretary of the Community Council Mrs. Margaret Fenton made a presentation to him to mark his generosity. Also present on the occasion was Mr. Morrissey's brother Clogheen/Burncourt Parish Priest Very Rev. Fr. Tom Morrissey who himself celebrated the Golden Jubilee of his ordination recently. He joined in the blessing of the new cemetery along with Very Rev. Fr. Edmund Tobin, P.P., Fourmilewater/Newcastle, Rev. Fr. Con Kelleher, C.C., Fourmilewater/Newcastle and Church of Ireland Rector, Rev. Iain Knox.

Opening the cemetery Councillor Michael Fitzgerald said that if there were more people like Michael Morrissey then South Tipperary would be a better place. It was his civic spirit and generosity that had made the development possible. The work on the cemetery started in early '92 and was now completed at a cost of £50,000. The cemetery has 360 spaces, 170 of those have already been developed. "My message tonight is that it should not be left to the voluntary committee to tidy up the graveyards. Everyone who has someone buried in a graveyard should maintain the grave and ensure that it is kept tidy. The onus is on all of us," he said.

South Tipperary County Council also provided the £30,000 tennis court and changing rooms in Newcastle but it was the local community's idea and it was they who first started the work. Fr. C. Kelleher, C.C. said it was realised that not every child played hurling and football and that a court for both tennis and basketball would be an important facility. While the parish started the work itself with a F.A.S. Scheme, it was decided to ask the County Council for its help and now the parish has a court it could be proud of and one as good as any in the county, "you could build a skyscraper on the foundations," Fr. Kelleher remarked. Councillor Fitzgerald described the new court as just the latest addition to a marvellous selection of community facilities in the village. "You are doing more good work here than I have seen in a village for sometime," he said. While the court was provided by the Council with a F.A.S. Social Employment Scheme, there had been a significant contribution from the community and the finished product was an example of what could be achieved by this partnership, he said. "We are proud of our sportsmen in County Tipperary, people such as Sean Kelly, Michael Kinnane and Charlie Swan, but perhaps because of tennis courts like this we will also have our Steffi Grafs and Boris Beckers in a few years time," remarked Councillor Fitzgerald. Paying tribute to the people of Newcastle, he said that they had always done so much for Irish music, dance and culture and they were continuing that tradition to day with the Village's Irish Summer School as well as the many set dancing titles won by Newcastle dancers. "The Irish culture is part of what we are and we must never lose it," he said. During his visit to Newcastle the Council Chairman and the other guests were also invited to St. Mary's Parish Church grounds to see the work carried out there. He was particularly impressed with the new toilet and storeroom which were provided by a F.A.S. Scheme. The attractive stonework building has blended in perfectly with the church grounds.

According to Archdall (Monasticon Hibernicum - Dublin 1786) a Leper Hospital is supposed to have existed near the Abbey. There seems to be some basis for this theory as we find the name "Leperland" mentioned in the Civil Survey of 1654.

The main road to Waterford was called "An Bóthar Mór."

In Abbeyside was an area known as "The Burgery" where the Burgery Ambush

took place. The Burgesses (parliamentary representatives of a borough) of Dungarvan owned land here. In 1300 a Clonmel inquisition refers to the "Burgesses of the Villa of Dungarvan." In the Civil Survey we find

mention of MaCraghs Burgery, Nugents Burgery, Geoghes Burgery, John Hore-FitzMichaels Burgery, FitzHarris Burgery etc:

(Dungarvan An Architectural Inventory by William Fraher).

SCHOOL HOLIDAYS

At ten shillings a day plus meals it was a valuable way for many to save up for the two weeks camp with the Abbeyside Scouts. Others turned their hand to 'picking winkles' on the beaches around Abbeyside while the really lucky ones obtained a summer job in the Creamery with 'overtime' for working on Saturday. Because of mechanisation and the unemployment situation such summer work is no longer available.

Pastimes are more important than ever. Many teenagers spend a lot of time playing golf or tennis. Others like to swim and if the weather is not suitable they can avail of the leisure facilities and swimming pools in the Clonea and Park Hotels. While the G.A.A. for their own reasons like to finish their championships while the pupils are still in school, the growth of the summer camp idea where the skills of hurling/camogie and football boys/girls are imparted by trained coaches is a welcome addition to providing supervised pastimes for our children. One such camp for young people between the ages of 8 and 14 will take place at the Abbeyside/Ballinacourty G.A.A. Grounds. The soccer and rugby organisations have yet to respond to the need of providing occupation for our teenagers during the long summer holiday. All in all times are changing and society has a duty to change in respect of the needs of our young people. Let us hope the challenge will be met in full.

TROOP MEETING

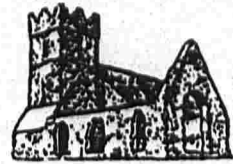

It is with deep and sincere regret we chronicle the passing of Mr. John Joyce, Sarsfield Street, Abbeyside and formerly of Clonbur, Co. Mayo, which occurred on Saturday, May 29, at the District Hospital, Dungarvan, after a period of failing health and fortified by the Rites of Holy Church.

Council's "Modest" Over-Expenditure

Waterford County Council's nett over-expenditure last year was a "modest" £205,000, Monday's meeting in Dungarvan was told.

Presenting the abstract of accounts for 1992, the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, said that while the £205,000 over expenditure only represented 1.13% of their total expenditure, it was nonetheless a serious problem given the overall

unsatisfactory state of their finances.

Mr. Hurley said finances are a problem facing many Local Authorities, particularly those with low rate bases. The dilemma of choosing between lowering standards and reducing employment numbers will continue until Government tackles the problem of local finances.

The Manager stressed the urgency of eliminating the

debit balance on their Revenue Account over the next two to three years and start to build up some working capital. "The absence of working capital is the main reason that our interest charges are so high," he said.

On the proposal of Cllr. Lar Hart, seconded by Cllr. R. A. Walsh, the meeting unanimously adopted the Manager's abstract of accounts.

Family Row Ends Up In Court

What began as an argument between a father and son eventually involved most of the family and garda assistance had to be summoned, last Friday's Cappoquin District Court was told.

Before the court was Thomas Bray, Twiggob, Cappoquin, who was charged with being drunk and disorderly at Main Street, Cappoquin on the night of April 4. There was also an application to bind him to the peace.

Earlier in the court, Michael Bray, in his absence, was fined £300, endorsed and disqualified from driving for three months when convicted of uninsured driving on May 1. He was also fined £25 for a driving licence offence.

Fined And Banned From Driving

Fined For Driving "Without Due Consideration"

A violent impact on the main Cork-Waterford road outside Dungarvan resulted in a patrol jeep being virtually written off and £12,000 damage done to the two-litre Mercedes Benz car, Judge Mary O'Halloran heard at Dungarvan District Court.

Before the court was the driver of the jeep, James Maher, Cloncoskraine, Dungarvan, who pleaded not guilty to careless driving at Cloncoskraine on January 23.

There was a substantial conflict of evidence in the case, but after a lengthy hearing Judge O'Halloran convicted Maher on a reduced charge of driving without due consideration for other road users.

Nicholas Crosby, driver of the Mercedes, said he saw the jeep emerge from a gateway and stop. The driver looked at him and as witness

drove on the jeep came straight out into his path and there was a violent impact.

Crosby said he was travelling at about 50 miles an hour and denied in cross examination that he was doing nearer 100 than 50 miles an hour.

Maher however denied that he had come from a gateway and said he was almost out on the centre of the road when the Mercedes bore down on him. "I never saw a man coming faster in a car in all my life," he added.

Judge O'Halloran convicted Maher on the reduced charge of driving without due consideration for other road users. When told he had never been involved in an accident in forty-six years of driving, the Judge imposed a fine of £70.

In particular this tax will ultimately be anti-women as women will face the full brunt of this tax at a time of severe emotional

"There is no attempt whatever to conceal conferences from the members," said Cllr. Carey.

The Co. Manager said it is the Whips who decide on representation at conferences and they work within the budget set aside in the estimates for that purpose.

Cllr. Gary O'Halloran said that Waterford is by far the most responsible County Council in the country in its attitude to conferences. "We spend far less than any other Local Authority in the country on them," he said.

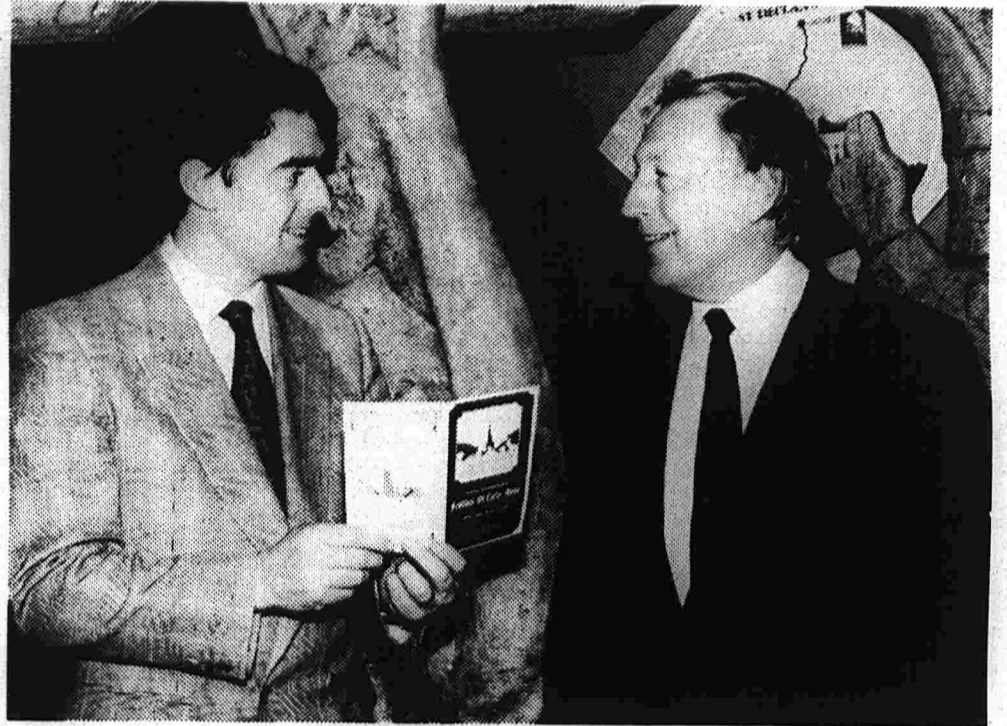

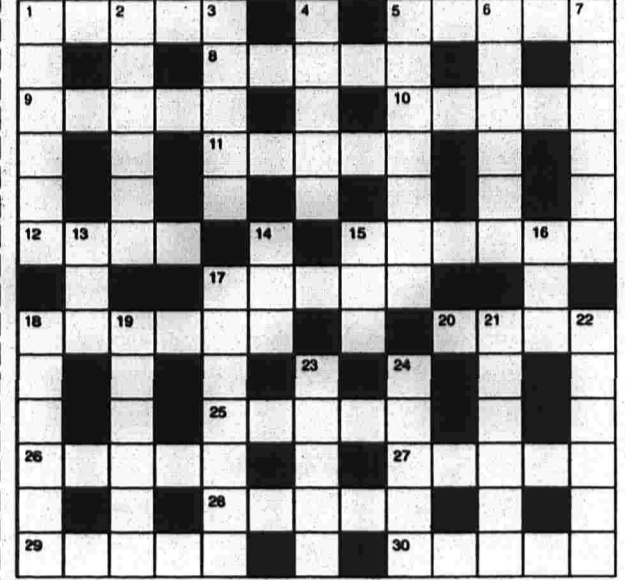

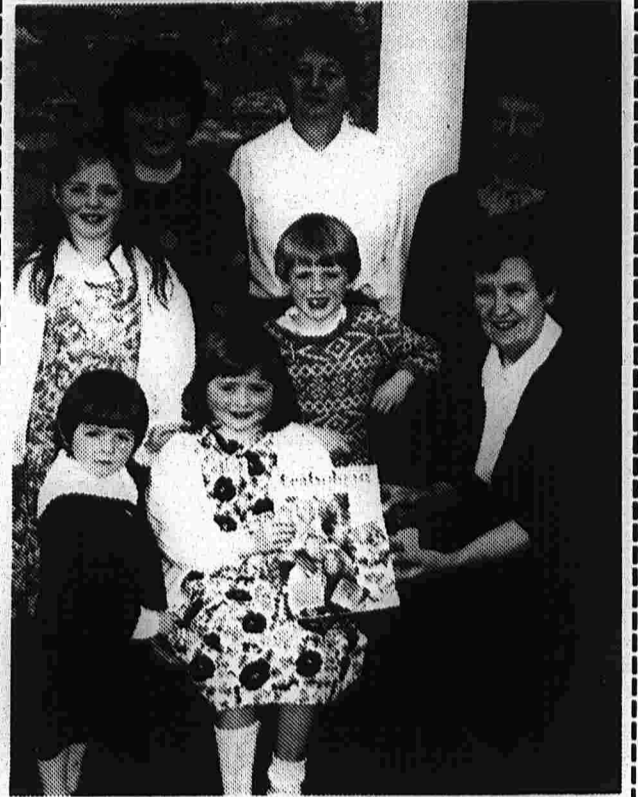

Ballyduff Driver In World Hot Rod Finals

Tom Casey works for Telecom Eireann and is based in Youghal. Tom began his hot rod racing on grass in the Araglen Festival in 1979 with a Volkswagen car and a Lancia engine. He came second in the All-Ireland in 1982 and raced on grass until 1983.

Ireland's only purpose built tarmac oval racing track is in Rosegreen Cashel, Co. Tipperary. Tom started racing there with an Escort in 1984 and won the All-Ireland in 1984 in the 1300 CC Class. In 1985 he moved on to the 2 litre Class and with a Ford Escort won the Overall Driver of the Year in 1987.

In 1989 Tom moved classes again, this time to the National Hot Rod class, and in 1989 and 1990 raced in the showgrounds in Cork. While racing in Cork he won the race of champions and the All-Ireland in 1989 and 1990.

Back in Rosegreen in 1991, Tom moved on from the Escort to the new breed of hot rod car the Peugeot 205 powered by a 2 litre

Ford race engine. The '91 season was devoted to building this new car. Tom won the All-Ireland in 1992 and also the Overall Driver of the Year which covers all racing classes.

In the close season of '92-'93 the operators of the Rosegreen Track became affiliated to the Oval Racing Council which is a body based in England which is responsible for hot rod racing all over the world.

On the resumption of racing in March of this year, the qualifying rounds for two drivers to represent Ireland in the World Championship in Ipswich took place.

It is the first time that representatives of the Republic of Ireland will be in the World Championship.

The qualifying rounds for the World Championship finished on June 12 and first place in the points, on 45 points,

went to Tom Casey, second place on 33 points to Sean Murphy, Cork and 3rd place on 28 pts to Neville Stanley, Rathdowney, Co. Laois. As Sean Murphy couldn't take part in the World Championship due to business commitments, the two to go forward are Tom Casey and Neville Stanley.

The race will be run over 75 laps on the weekend of July 3/4. It is estimated that to compete in this event will cost in excess of £2,000 and as a result a fund raising dance will take place in the Blue Dragon Inn, Kilworth on Saturday, June 26.

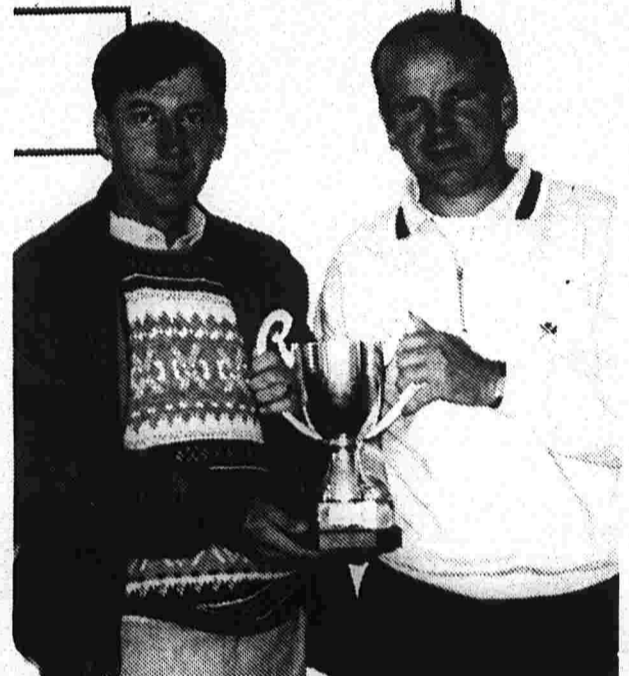

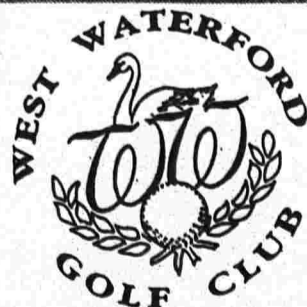

DUNGARVAN ATHLETIC CLUB NOTES

Passing Of Former Irish Sprint Champion

One of the strongest links with our local athletic past was severed recently with the death of Michael Nagle, Clonea Road, Abbeyside, the Editor of the Dungarvan Leader Newspaper.

Mick Nagle was a talented sprinter in his younger days, enjoying his greatest success on June 2, 1935 when he won an Irish Colleges title as a sixteen year old. On that day he represented Dungarvan C.B.S. at Croke Park where he set a new Intermediate record for the 200 metres with a time which was recorded as 24 1/2 secs. and which stood unbroken for several years.

The young Mick Nagle, on his athletic debut entered a thriving local scene with such as Ned Power, Mount Odell, Martin and Stephen Curran and Johnny McGrath, Two Mile Bridge, Mons. Lannon, Fr. Jim Sullivan, Dec Goode, Joe Power, Bakery, Willie Brien and John and Jimmy Murphy, the Sweep, Willie Claxton, Ballyneety, Davy Galvin and Christy O'Connor all established athletes under the leadership of Mr. Nolan, Chemist, Main Street, at Willie Curran's training field Lisfennell.

Though junior to many of this group the young Nagle's sprinting ability didn't take long to surface and he was soon included on the trips to the various sports meetings. Transport to the sports in those days was via the bicycle and Ned Power, Mount Odell remembers ferrying the future Irish champion to a meeting in Lismore on the bar of his bike. Despite a tumble in Cappoquin both athletes went on to record successes in Lismore.

Mick Nagle ran many races but he will be remembered especially for one — the winning of his Irish title over 200 metres. He once recalled that at that time athletics was not a priority with his school and a great part of his challenge was to persuade his "Alma Mater" to allow him run in Croke Park as it was near the annual exam time. He went to Dublin frowned upon and he came home a hero. Incidentally, a further Irish title was brought back to the C.B.S. last Saturday week in that same grade by sixteen year old Jamie Costin (Ring/Old Parish A.C.) when he won the Intermediate Walk title at the championships in Tullamore.

CLUB CHAIRMAN

Mick Nagle was elected Chairman of Deise A.C. (Dungarvan/Ring) in October 1968 and of Dungarvan A.C. in November 1969. His fellow officers in those days were President — Con

Senior & Junior Footballers Play Tipperary in Munster Semi-Final At Walsh Park

For almost sixteen months the county footballers have played in the shadows of the hurlers, but now with three of the county hurling teams dismissed from the championships the spotlight is on the big ball game and at Walsh Park on next Sunday thirty Waterford footballers will be given the chance to grab the headlines by qualifying for a place (or places) in the provincial final against Cork or Kerry on July 5.

For the senior team this is their biggest chance since we lost to Limerick by a couple of points two years ago and there is an amount of confidence in the camp as the count-down begins and those who are managing the panel, believe that we can emulate the feat of Clare last year, by getting to the final.

Tipperary are our opponents in both matches and as can be seen from the record sheet which I have produced hereunder, we have had mixed fortunes in our clashes with them in the past decade.

At senior level, there has never been more than a kick or two of the ball between the sides (except on one occasion in Thurles) when we met in championship or league.

Last year when the counties met in the championship at Clonmel, a couple of unfortunate incidents led to the two goals which gave Tip-

perary the victory which brought them to the Munster semi-final.

This year they qualified for the semi-final by beating Limerick 3-18 to 3-8 in the first round at Thurles and a month earlier they had qualified for the McGrath Cup final by beating Waterford at Clonmel by a couple of points. So on Sunday, Tipperary come to Walsh Park as the form team and as favourites to get to the provincial final against Cork/Kerry a couple of weeks later.

Their ten points win over fancied Limerick in the championship came after a very good display of very fast, open football, but Limerick bemoaned the fact that all three Tipperary goals which came in the closing fourteen minutes, could have been prevented. The fact that they weren't illustrates Tipperary's ability to exploit weaknesses in defence. They

did the same against us in the championship last year. Twelve of the team which beat us last year were in action against Limerick and this shows how consistent the selectors are in developing a side that can challenge for the provincial crown. Their strong players include Peter Lambert who is their leading scorer over the past two years, Anthony Cross who normally plays centre half forward and who made such a successful debut with the Tipperary hurlers against Kerry two weeks ago, Brian Burke, Derry Foley, Philly Ryan, John Owens, Declan Hassey, etc.

They will come here with 'the bit in their mouths' so to speak and fiercely determined to take that one extra step that will bring them to a Munster final after years of waiting and hoping. They will certainly be a very difficult team to beat.

WATERFORD'S CHANCES

Although we did not have the benefit of a match since the league (except the McGrath Cup), Waterford will field a very fit side following months of hard training. They have probably trained harder than any period in the past few years. Pat Condon has been doing the physical three nights every week and the panel had the benefit of a session with Donegal's Martin McHugh who is the Texaco Award winner and was man of the match in last year's All-Ireland. They did have some injury problems and players tied in with other county teams, etc., but these have been overcome and they now have a full panel available for selection.

Tom Brennan, the regular keeper, will be in goal and Tom Walsh will man the full back position. Others who may figure in defence will be Fintan O'Brien, currently starring with the junior hurlers, Martin Sheehan, Peter Queally, Michael O'Brien, Ger Power etc. In the middle of the field we will see Derek Lyons and Dan Casey or Liam Daniels. So few of the players who have been played in attack

have held their positions for any length of time, that it is very difficult to say who will be placed in any particular spot in the forward line. Jim Maher, Peter Ferncombe, Pat Walsh, Ger Walsh, John Power, Derek Kiely, Pierric Whyte (if not included in defence), Liam Dalton (if not included at midfield), Pat Hynes are the group from which the six are likely to be selected, but don't be surprised if players not named above are in the line out. The team when selected will appear elsewhere.

JUNIOR FOOTBALL v TIPPERARY

As can be seen from the records of the past decade, our footballers have not fared all that badly in recent years and with a bit of luck could have progressed further in the championship. They showed supporters last year how close they were to causing a shock against Kerry in the Munster final.

This year the panel have trained seriously and a look at the names of players available must satisfy supporters that we are in this one with a very good chance. With one or two exceptions, the players have senior club championship experience, some have inter-county senior experience also.

The team will be named after training on Monday night and will appear elsewhere in this issue, but most of the following players are certain to win a place on the first fifteen:

David O'Connor (goal), Eddie and David Burke, Dermot Dee, Bobby Lyons, J. J. Ferncombe (all Dungarvan), David Kirwan, Liam O'Brien and Pat Curran (Stradbally), Michael Kavanagh (Dunhill), Brendan Curry (Rathgormack), Derek Wyse (St. Saviours), Eddie Rockett (Kilmacthomas), Carthach Mac Craith and Eddie Crotty (An Rinn); Noelle and Kieran Whelan (Bonmahon), etc.

With so many top quality players on the panel, we just must expect to win.

OVER IN KILLARNEY

It is more than a little surprising that such a big number of people have applied to the County Board for tickets for the other Munster semi-

final involving Cork and Kerry at Killarney on Sunday, when two of our own teams are in action in the championship here at home. Obviously our standards are not good enough to satisfy those people.

We need all the support that we can muster at Walsh Park. It is our big chance and support will count a lot.

It is also the big chance that the players have been waiting for and the chance to wear a Waterford jersey in a Munster football final might not come again for a long time. Everything possible has been done to make sure that their preparation went smoothly, so it is now up to the players to prove themselves.

Cancellations

A number of fixtures on the programme for last weekend were called off for a variety of reasons. A number went by the board because teams involved included players who were on the county junior football panel for next Sunday.

Among the games that were cancelled for this reason were the St. Marys versus An Rinn intermediate hurling championship game which was fixed for Collihan. The only other intermediate hurling game fixed for last weekend was also axed because the pitch at Kill was declared unplayable on Saturday evening. Abbeyside protested very strongly at this cancellation and offered to play it at a number of other venues. I understand that they also inspected the pitch on Sunday.

Other matches that were off because of the involvement of junior players were the St. Saviours v. Passage senior hurling tie billed for Walsh Park and the Ardmore v. Kilrossanty junior hurling game.

Two weeks previously the

entire programme of senior football fixtures was called off because of weather conditions, but only to find that many of the venues were playable on the Sunday.

There is a feeling around that the Fixtures Committee are very much inclined to panic when weather conditions are bad coming up to the weekends. It is a worrying situation when so many games have to be called off for weather reasons in mid-summer.

They are the outsiders here but they are not without a chance.

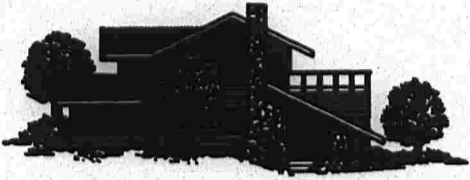

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Co. Enterprise Board To Be Established

While it was unanimously agreed at Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council to establish a County Enterprise Board under the terms set down by the Minister for Employment and Equality, Ruairi Quinn, the members were also at one in deciding that they should retain their own active — and successful — County Development Team.

Mr. Dan Hurley, County Manager, said the twelve member County Enterprise Board will include four County Councillors and he did not intend to nominate them himself. "I will leave that particular task to the parties themselves," he said.

The Manager said he was also strongly recommending that they retain their own County Development Team to continue the outstanding work it has been doing since its inception. It could, he added, supplement the work of the new Enterprise Board.

Cllr. Pat Coffey supported the Manager and spoke of the many industrial projects the County Development Team had attracted into the county and the many jobs these had created.

Cllr. Billy Kyne, Chairman agreed and said that while it behoves them to support the concept of County Enterprise Boards, they must retain their County Development Team.

"The County Development Team has brought many major industries into the county, most recently Michelle Leathers in Portlaw, which was a major coup for the Team," said Cllr. Kyne.

"We have in fact led the way as a County Development Team which has en-

couraged people to successfully set up their own businesses.

It was agreed that the names of the four councillors to serve on the new County Enterprise Board will be conveyed to the County Manager within one week.

Cllr. William McDonnell described the late Michael Nagle as a "superb scribe" and the "Dungarvan Leader" which he guided is widely read throughout West Waterford. "To me he was like the old schoolmaster, and I never once saw him make a mistake. He was the type of person you would look up to", Cllr. McDonnell added.

Cllr. Kieran O'Ryan said Michael Nagle has been reporting County Council meetings long before he came onto the Council almost forty years ago. His death marked the end of an era and he was a journalist who always gave excellent and fair coverage.

"He was", said Cllr. O'Ryan, "a perfect gentleman."

Cllr. Jackie Fahey recalled that when he came onto Waterford County Council in 1950 Michael Nagle was then reporting the meetings and he had continued to do so down the decades that followed.

Cllr. Fahey said Michael Nagle was trustworthy, well respected and never hesitated to be critical or to express his views. He was a friend to every member of the Council.

Cllr. Richard A. Walsh said he and Michael Nagle had been neighbours for many years and was a top-class journalist for all that time.

All the other members associated themselves with the tributes as did the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley and the other Council officials.

The meeting then briefly adjourned as a mark of respect.

Dan Hurley however reminded the members that it was they who had deleted financial provision for hedgecutting from this year's estimates. There was no point, he added, coming back crying now because the work is not being done.

Cllr. Jackie Fahey however said that if a supplementary estimate is required then so be it. Hedgecutting will have to be carried out because if not, several roads will be virtually closed by August.

The Co. Manager said he will endeavour to undertake a "crash programme" within their budgetary restraints, but insisted that a supplementary estimate is "out of the question."

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
