tained in Waterford County Council's Road Works Scheme for 1993 prepared by the County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn, and made public last week.

The report has brought a warning from one of the Council's longest serving members that some county roads will collapse unless emergency repair pro-grammes are undertaken on

Mr. O'Flynn's report reveals that the County Council has available to it just over £9.5m. this year for expenditure on the road network — only 9% of which is funded directly by the Council itself. Of that £9.5m., however, only 25% has been earmarked for the county and regional roads, many of which are now in an extremely poor state.

Waterford's county and regional roads amount to 2.8% of the national total, but has received only 2.1% of the grants provided nationally for these roads in the current year.

The Co. Engineer, in his

erable emphasis on the ongoing deterioration of these roads and clearly pinpoints the cause — sustained underfunding from Government since 1978.

Mr. O'Flynn's report also confirms that yet again Waterford is one of a small number of counties who have been excluded from receiving a £5m. supplementary improvement grant for regional and county roads.

"This grant is now being given to counties whose roads deteriorated seriously, but it is being given at the expense of counties like

Waterford who strove to maintain a tolerable level of service in the face of continuing cutbacks. Our exclusion from this grant is disappointing," the Co. Engineer states.


Mr. O'Flynn is also highly critical of this year's grant of £86,500 for the surface dressing of regional roads. That's a reduction of 28% on the 1992 allocation and will only allow for 7.3 miles to be completed.

Put into perspective, that would entail a 28-year cycle to complete the entire network when in fact it should be completed over a sevenyear cycle.

Know Your Rights

Question - I would like to attend my GP during my pregnancy. Can you tell me what maternity services I will be entitled to and will I be eligible for a Maternity Grant, I don't have a Medical Card?

Answer - Since June 1991 all women are entitled to Maternity and Infant Care Services free of charge. An expectant mother can choose to be treated by any doctor who has an arrangement with the Health Board to provide these services. Most family doctors undertake this type of work.

Under this scheme you will be covered for 6 visits before the birth and one visit after the birth for yourself, and one visit for the baby during the first 6 weeks of life. Most Boards allow for additional visits where the GP considers them necessary.

The GP is entitled to charge non Medical Card holders for visits which are not related to the pregnancy.

It is necessary to apply to be accepted into this scheme before the visits start. The special application form MCA should be available from the GP or Health Board. When the approval comes from the Health Board the visits can start. Ideally these should commence around th week of pregnancy

The Maternity Grant of £8 which is payable by the Health Board is only paid to Medical Card holders.

In-patient and Out-patient services in public hospital in respect of motherhood are completely free and you don't have to pay the daily charges.

From the 1st July the Dept. of Social Welfare will pay a grant of £200 on the birth of twins. They presently pay a grant of £300 to £400 respectively on the birth of triplets or quads. These grants are paid automatically when the claim form for Child Benefit is sent in.

BOSNIAN APPEAL

Dear Editor,

I refer to Fr. Peadar O'Callaghan's letter which you carried in your letter page last week in connec-tion with the Bosnian conflict. In fairness to the people of Counties Waterford and Cork who have been, and continue to be, extremely generous in their aid to the victims there, I feel I must reply.

I am however only speaking on behalf of the Aine Burke Bosnia Aid Appeal of which I have been privileged to be one of the Irish Organisers, but I must immediately assure people

(a) The aid which they have given has all got through to the areas which we are trying to help, i.e. Mostar, Ulog, Zagreb, Suuja, to name but a few: (b) has been distributed on the basis of the community there; (c) only the cost of phone, shipping and land transportation, medical supplies and food is taken from monies collected.

I have travelled at consid-

erable risk to these areas in recent weeks to ensure the safe passage and proper distribution of aid, all my air travel expenses were taken care of by people who would prefer to remain anonymous, and who have been extremely generous to

I am not naive enough to think that in any war situation all sides are blameless - recent wars in Vietnam, The Falklands and the Middle East will show that. But the people usually are, and it is the victims of this war we are helping, regardless of creed or nationality.

Fr. Peadar O'Callaghan has been very selective in his quotations and it would be well to remember that it was the Serbs who started this conflict as they did in Croatia and Slovenia, when these states looked for independence. They have tried to expand their own area of domination and have perfected what has now become known as "ethnic cleansing."

The black bearded, black

beret Croations Fr. Peadar refers to are a Croatian guerrilla group.

I am not, and neither do I

think, are the fine groups of people in towns and villages around Waterford and Cork and other counties, who collect food, medical supplies, clothes and money for Bosnia, interested in either politics or military affairs in Bosnia Herzegovina, and do not support aggression. We are, however, interested in the hungry, dispossessed, orphans, widows and those who have been raped in the Serb concentration camps. I ask for aid in the name of God, and it is in His name it is given. It is distributed to help His people, all His people, and that is the way it will continue.

I have been petitioning the President, the Minister for Foreign Affairs and Government parties to accept more refugees in this country. Many of these will be Muslim, as are many of those who are resident in this country.

All our aid has got through to starving mouths and to the Mostar Hospital, where casualties of all denominations are treated. I wonder whether the international agencies have as good a record as this! After that I leave it to the generous people to decide.

Many further tributes were paid to the late Michael C. Nagle, Editor/Proprietor of the Dungarvan Leader by members of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night.

The formal vote of sympa-

The formal vote of sympathy to the Nagle family was proposed by Cllr. Declan Goode who said the familiar face of Michael Nagle was, sadly, missing from their meeting tonight. His death is a great loss to the town and the townspeople, he said.

Cllr. Goode said he hadn't always seen eye to eye with everything he wrote but everything he wrote was from his heart and was always fair and constructive. "He will be remembered with affection by all of us," said Cllr. Goode.

Seconding the vote of sympathy, the chairperson, Cllr. Nuala Ryan, said that through the death of Michael Nagle they had lost an excellent journalist.

Cllr. Ryan said everything about Michael's writing bore the hallmarks of a quality reporter and he was a credit to the profession of journalism.

Cllr. Ryan then proposed that their meeting be adjourned briefly as a mark of respect to him.

Cîlr. Richard A. Walsh described the late Michael Nagle as a "very fair" reporter, a first class journalist and newspaperman, and a man who was forever denouncing the vandals and their vandalistic acts. "His cutting pen will be greatly missed in that respect especially", said Cllr. Walsh.

"He was fair, sometimes controversial, but his integrity was always above reproach," said Cllr. Michael O'Riordan. As the words of the well-known song go "I did it my way", and that could always be said of Michael Nagle.

No Justification For Telephone Charge Increases

At a time when Bord Telecom is making substantial profits there could be no justification for the proposed "significant" increase in telephone charges, Cllr. Austin Hallahan told this week's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council.

Cllr. Hallahan was supporting a notice of motion moved by Cllr. Richard A. Walsh deploring the Govt. decision to sanction a "four fold" increase in local telephone charges.

Cllr. Walsh said it is mainly the poor, the elderly and those living alone that will be most badly hit by the proposed increases. He believed however that if there is strong enough nationwide opposition to them, the government will not go ahead with them, just as they had abandoned plans a few years ago to

close down rural post offices.

"With Telecom making £2m. profit a year, they have the audacity to seek more for our phone calls," said Cllr. Hallahan.

Cllr. Mary Dixon urged Telecom to forget about the expensive sponsorships the company has entered into and instead keep telephone charges at a reasonable

Fighting The Baddies In Your Garden

The Irish are not the only garden lovers who adore roses — the bugs do too!
June is when the 'ugly bug ball' swings to fast tempo and threatens to wreck showy displays in your rose garden unless you pick off the pests before they take



Rolled-up leaves are one warning sign that 'the ball' might be about to start — they indicate the presence of Sawfly larvae or Tortrix Moth caterpillars and should be removed and destroyed or consigned to the dustbin.

Nibbled buds and leaves may reveal the presence of caterpillars and any you find should be picked off and disposed of, but there are other pests which are more difficult to budge:

CHAFER BEETLES

The cockchafer can be more than an inch long and the garden chafer about half its size but both varieties can disfigure shrubs and trees.

If left alone they will also infest your garden with grubs which feed off the roots of border plants. You will need to spray to keep control over these serious pests.

RED SPIDER MITE

Red spider mite can be very persistent on the underside of leaves, especially during dry weather. Warning signs are yellowing and falling leaves and this pest can seriously weaken roses. An insecticide needs to be applied regularly but will keep aphids at bay too.

APHIDS

Aphids not only disfigure plants and cover them in sticky honeydew but also weaken them and carry other disease. If infestation has already taken hold then surgery will give you a good start before applying insecticide.

Dewy evenings can also encourage fungal infections which need to be controlled by application of systemic fungicide.

Having brought the main pest under control you can then enhance the health of your roses by foliar feeding, working rose fertiliser into the soil above the root area, and regular wearing — saturate the soil if dry weather

A mulch of crushed bark or something similar will help retain moisture in the soil and keep weeds down. If you wish to cut blooms for display then make a clean cut just above an outward facing stem bud. Infected or dying flower heads must be cut away.

There are basically five rose categories: hybrid tea — known for large showy blooms, floribunda — less showy but more plentiful blooms, miniature, shrubs and ramblers/climbers.

The first two are most popular and hybrid teas can be made even showier by disbudding — gently pinching out side buds on shoots producing more than one bud. It produces spectacular single blooms but does not work for other rose types.



VICTORIAN BEEFSTEAK PIE

THE Victorians certainly knew how to cook delicious, filling dishes like this pie.

It's the sort of pie that was lovingly prepared by all the "Mrs. Bridges" in big old kitchens we saw in TV's popular Upstairs Downstairs series. Your family will love it. Ingredients:

11/2 lb (700g) chuck steak 1/2lb (225lb) carrots, cut into chunks 2 onions, sliced 1 tbs flour



11/2 lbs beef dripping
1/2 pt pale ale
1/2 tsp thyme
1 bay leaf
salt and black pepper
Suet Crust
8 oz (225g) self raising flour
4 oz (110g) suet
1/4 tsp thyme

Method:

Cube steak and toss in flour together with vegetables. Melt fat in a saucepan and brown meat and vegetables. Stir in pale ale. thyme, bay leaf and seasoning. Simmer gently for 2 hours, or until meat is tender. Make up suet pastry in usual way. Place meat filling in a pie dish, roll out pastry to cover. Garnish with leaves cut from pastry trimmings, and glaze with egg or milk. Make a hole for steam to escape and bake at 425° F, 220° C or gas mark 7. for 30 minutes. Serve with creamed potatoes — Serves 6.

The fort refers to McGrath's Castle. Before the bridge was built, the river was fordable at low tide and there was also a ferry at 'Cúl a tSailín' opposite the castle.

UNITED FARMERS ASSOCIATION

United Farmers Association welcomes that part of E.R.S.I. report which recommends that headage payments should be paid on a family income basis rather than on acreage and livestock numbers basis. This concept is in line with U.F.A. policy of tiered price and subsidy payment in order to maintain maximum numbers on the land. It is most inequitable and immoral that very large operators within the agricultural arena can acquire land and quota at will, while small farmers at the other end of the scale are being forced out daily because of lack of income. It is unconstitutional that the means of making a living from the land should be up for grabs in this fashion. U.F.A. calls on our government to implement the E.S.R.I. recommendations with regard to family farm incomes for the weaker section of agriculture and also to extend the concept to price support. The vast majority of milk suppliers are in the small to medium category and need a tiered price system if they are to continue in farming.

Farmers Remain Sceptical On **Beef Premium** Centralisation

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan has warned farmers that despite major IFA reservations, the Department was determined to proceed with centralisation of the Male Beef Premium Scheme. Mr. Donovan said: "Farmers are understandably sceptical about the Department's attempts to overhaul the Beef Premium Scheme, considering the un-satisfactory record of long payment delays in the past. Only speedier delivery of payments will change farm-

ers' minds in this regard."
Mr. Donovan said that in response to IFA objections to the retention by the Department in Dublin by BTE cards, the Department had "agreed to facilitate farmers who need cards quickly for testing by returning the cards to farmers following a

request by telephone."
The IFA man said that the Department had also agreed that there was no need for BTE cares to be held for the full 60 day retention period. The Department has given IFA a guarantee that cards will in fact be returned to farmers within one month following receipt of applications by the Department in Dublin."
"The Department has con-

firmed to IFA that all local Livestock Offices will be computerised and linked to the central computer by the end of this year." Mr. Donovan said this was "a critical step in speeding up pay-ments and enabling local offices to resolve query cases on the spot."



IFA Leader Welcomes Law Reform Body's Report On **Occupiers** Liability Law

Following a preliminary examination of the Law Reform Commission's 150 page report on the Occupiers Liability law, IFA Deputy President, Tom Parlon wel-comed its acknowledgment of the widespread problems the farming community face and the urgent need for re-form of this outmoded law. However, the IFA leader expressed serious reservations about some of the main recommendations of the Commission's report which proposes that all entrants onto land should be classified into two categories, namely visitors and trespassers, and that a special duty care must be owed by Occupiers towards children. He said: "Farmers and

other landowners may now be faced with the dilemma of refusing entry to persons they formerly welcomed in order to reclassify them as trespassers, thereby reducing their legal liabilities where a lesser duty of care

is owed by the farmer."
In addition, the Law Reform Commission's report proposes that children, who have been at the cutting edge of the law in this area, should be provided with a special duty of care by landowners. The IFA Deputy President expressed concern, however, that farmers would unreasonably be expected to act as "guardian angels" for children entering their lands without either their permission or parental control. He said: "Parents must have the ultimate responsibility for the supervision and safety of their own children. Why should farmers and landowners be forced to accept this role when it is clearly a matter for par-

Deise Faith Walk Through The Diocese of Waterford

A seven day Faith Pil-grimage celebrating the Faith, history and culture of the Deise People since the coming of St. Declan in the fifth century, will commence at Ardmore on Sunday next. June 27. The walk will link the ancient Cathedrals of Ardmore and Lismore with the present Cathedrals of Waterford, Christ Church and the Most Holy Trinity (which is cele-brating its bi-centenary and is Ireland's oldest Catholic Cathedral in use).

The thirty pilgrims will also visit many of the holy wells and historical places. They will traverse some of the ancient highways of the Saints — St. Declan's Way, Bohar Na Naomh, St. Carthage's Way and Riain

Bo Pádraig. In the ancient Christian tradition, the parish and people of Ardmore will provide hospitality and refreshments. This will be repeated in the other resting places over the week. The local people will join the pilgrims in prayer and in celebrating the history and culture of the area.

On the Sunday, at Ard-more, Bishop Michael Russell will celebrate the 11 a.m. Mass at St. Declan's Church. The pilgrims and people will then visit Ardmore Cathedral and Round Tower, An Beannachan (St. Declan's Oratory and burial place) and, at Dysert, St. Declan's Well (the site of his first monastery).

At 1.30 p.m. the pilgrims will follow St. Declan's Way to Aglish (via Grange, Toor Holy Well and Mount Stewart) where they will stay overnight in the parish

MOUNT MELLERAY On Monday the pilgrims will walk to Mount Melleray (via Cappoquin and Lismore). On Tuesday to Ballylooby, Co. Tipperary

(via The Vee). On Wednesday to Glencomeragh, Co. Waterford (via Patrick's Well and Clonmel). Thursday is the Feast Day of St. Oliver Plunkett and the pilgrims will travel to Kilcash (where the Saint once took shelter). Bishop-elect, Rt. Rev. Monsignor William Lee will join the pilgrims for Liturgy at Kilcash.

On Friday to Carrick-on-Suir (via Ahenny of the High Crosses). On the Saturday the pilgrims will walk to Waterford (via Mothel and Portlaw). There will be a prayer service at Christ Church Cathedral and, at 7.30 p.m., there will be a Youth Mass.







er's shot went over the bar. Paul Prendergast sent over the final point of the game in the 58th minute to leave the winners a deserving nine points clear of their rivals.



Another Disappointment At Walsh Park

With home ground advantage in so many of our championship games this season, big things were expected from a number of our county teams and that makes our disappointments all the greater when we see our senior and junior footballers failing in the same way as our senior and under 21 hurlers at our principal county ground.

Tipperary were the better team and deserved to win this semi-final clash but had we taken the few good chances which came our way and not made the blunders that cost us vital goals, the result might have been differ-ent and we could have gotten to a Munster final next month. Over the hour Tipperary had a total of 15 wides as against 5 for Waterford and while that is an important factor in showing the measure of their superiority, Waterford, because of their greater accuracy, notched up 13 points which was a respectable enough tally over the 70 minutes. Both sides were very fit and if anything, Waterford lasted the 70 minutes better and were doing all the pressing in the final ten minutes, but could not penetrate Tipperary's rock solid defence. On three occasions in the early part of the game, we missed what looked to be certain goals, before the ball went amazingly wide with the keeper out of position.

Tipperary had obviously

benefitted from their first round match with Limerick and were physically stronger in many sectors.

PLAY

In the opening five minutes Tipperary were awarded five frees, four of which were sent wide from scoreable positions and it wasn't until the 9th minute that the scoring was opened when after a fine run, Liam Dalton sent over for our first score of the game. A Tipperary free (it was their seventh) was sent over by Peter Lambert in the 11th minute, but Waterford went in front again with a splendid score by Peter Queally in the 13th minute but sixty seconds later we were on level terms again with a Mark Sheehan point. The venue was in good condition and the club had cancelled other games in order to allow the county fixture to go ahead. He said the County Board were informed that the venue was playable. Brendan Tobin, St. Mary's Club, complained about the cancella-tion of their intermediate hurling game with An Rinn. The Chairman informed him that this game was cancelled because players were included on the county junior football panel for the following Sunday. Passage Club also complained about a postponement involving their club.

MINOR SELECTORS STAND DOWN

The county minor hurling selectors who brought the team to the All-Ireland last year, having completed their term, notified the Board that they were not seeking re-election to the committee. They stated, however, that they were available and willing to take over management of the 1994 county under 21 hurling side as the outgoing selectors in that grade were not seeking re-election. The selectors are Jim Green, Mount Sion, Jack Laffan, Portlaw, Billy O'Neill, St. Saviours, Eddie Cunningham, Tallow and Pat 'Tyler' Walsh, Fourmilewater.

It was decided to appoint the under 21 hurling selectors at the July meeting. In relation to the appointment of the county minor selectors for next year, County Bord Na nOg submitted five nominees of their choosing, as agreed at the previous meeting of the County Board. There were no other nominations. All clubs will have two weeks in which to submit nominations for the under 21 committee.

SENIOR HURLING REPORT

Since this was a notice of motion for the July meeting, it was not discussed.

County Roads On Verge Of Collapse

CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1 MORE SERIOUS

The situation relating to the surface dressing of the county roads is even more serious according to the County Engineer's report. Bluntly he states: "that for the seventh successive year no Council funds are available in 1993 for this work."

A total of 1,150 miles of county roads — 89% of the network — have not now been surface dressed since 1978. And because of the current financial situation only thirty miles will be treated this year.

A final, dramatic warning is contained in the report from the Co. Engineer. There has been a reduction in the viability and operational efficiency of the Council's machinery fleet. A continuation of this trend could devastate our capacity to respond to emergencies, Mr. O'Flynn states.

The Co. Engineer's concern over the deteriorating state of the county roads especially is shared by the councillors.

One of the longest-serving of them, Cllr. Kieran O'Ryan told a recent Council meeting that he had never known many of the county roads to be in such a poor state as they presently are.

"Many of them will soon be inaccessible if something isn't done," he said.

Council To Seek **Retraction Of** Erroneo wspape

Dungarvan Urban Council is to seek a retraction by a Dublin daily newspaper of a report which recently claimed that Clonea beach had not received a Blue Flag this year because of the quality of the water.

Angry members of Dungarvan Urban Council spoke this week of the serious damage the "erroneous" newspaper report could do to tourism in both Clonea

and Dungarvan this year. Cllr. Austin Hallahan said Clonea beach had not received the Blue Flag this year on a technicality that had nothing whatever to do with the quality of the water.

He said a leading Dublin daily newspaper had carried a report which claimed the Blue Flag had been lost to Clonea on water quality and this could have extremely serious repercussions for the resort and for Dungarvan this year.

"We should demand an apology and a retraction of that report," he said.

Cllr. Billy Kyne said Clonea beach had missed out on the Blue Flag this year through an administrative mistake made in Dublin which had nothing whatever to do with Waterford County Council.

"It is regrettable that some sections of the media were so quick to put the boot into Clonea, especially when the Blue flag was lost purely on a technicality," Cllr. Kyne said.

Cllr. Paddy Power warned of the possible "irreparable damage" the newspaper report could have done as far as this summer is concerned in Clonea. "This Council should forcibly get out the message that the quality of the water at Clonea beach is of the highest," he said.

On the proposal of Cllr. Hallahan it was unanimously agreed to seek a retraction of the report by the newspaper concerned.
