Fine Gael's Cllr. Con

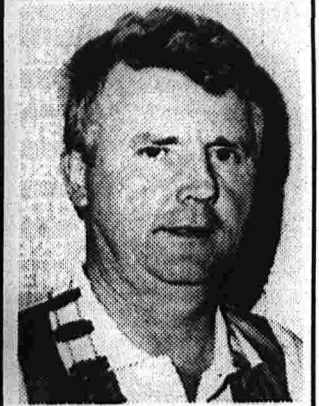
Casey took the chair with the support of the three Labour members, and with Fine Gael reciprocating the

Unbelievable Act Of Vandalism

Gardai in Dungarvan are following a definite line of inquiry into what they have described as "an unbelievable act of vandalism" carried out in the town in the early hours of Tuesday morning.

A jeep stolen eight miles away in Aghlish on Monday night, was used several hours later to demolish a total of twenty five orna-

mental trees which had been planted by Dungarvan Urban Council at Fr. Twomey's Road.

Two men were questioned

at Dungarvan Garda Station on Tuesday in connection with both stealing of the jeep and its subsequent use in the vandalistic attack on the trees.

They were later released without charge, but a garda spokesman confirmed to the "Leader" that a file on the incident is now being prepared and will be forwarded to the Director of Public Prosecutions.

Gardai are satisfied that the jeep was deliberately driven into the line of ornamental trees which run virtually the entire length of Fr. Twomey's Road. In all twenty five of them were damaged beyond repair.

"The jeep was used to demolish them one by one. I can only describe it as an unbelievable act of vandalism, one of the worst the town has yet encountered," the garda spokesman said.

Damage to the jeep has been put at more than £3,000 while the value of the trees that were felled is in the region of £800. A U.D.C. spokesman said it is the Local Authority's intention to initiate legal proceedings in respect of the damage.

Meanwhile the U.D.C. Vice-Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne, said the townspeople are appalled at yet another example of the wanton vandalism that is taking place with such recurring frequency.

ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE

Alzheimer's disease is an illness affecting 25,000 people nationwide. Yet it is only in recent years that it has become a high profile condition. Previously many confused and distressed families attempted to cope on their own, unaware of how commonplace the disease actually is. All that is now changing and the Waterford Alzheimer Day Care Centre is working hard to offer assistance and support to patients and their carers in a practical

way.

At present the Centre is open at the premises of Care of the Aged, Lady Lane (Spring Garden Alley entrance) each Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. and caters for both city and county and surrounding areas. The Centre is always pleased to hear

from any family or individual in connection with this problem.

A National Awareness Week commences on July 5, and a number of events have been arranged including a Coffee Morning on Thursday, July 8 in the Centre from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., in an effort to create

public awareness of the disease.

IN DUNGARVAN

In Dungarvan we are most fortunate to have a unit solely for Alzheimers sufferers in St. Joseph's Hospital where patients are cared for when they can no longer be looked after at

home.

We also have a support group which meets once a month. The group helps to support relations through difficult times. The group is made up of both past and present carers of Alzheimers sufferers.

If you are interested or require further information

there will be a short video about the onset of Alzheimers disease shown in Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan, on Tuesday, July 6 at 8 p.m. and members of the group will be available to answer any queries you have.

All are welcome. Alzheimer's Disease is a type of dementia or brain failure which used to be thought to affect a small number of people under the age of 65 (i.e. presenile dementia). But it is now realised that it is also a common cause of brain failure in older people. It is due to degeneration of brain cells and its cause is yet unknown. The first change you may notice is that your loved one may lose his or her way about the house, forget the day of the week or even mislay his or her belongings. Yet you may be surprised when they recall with clarity some event from childhood. The person may become irritable or show signs of aggressiveness even towards you yourself. These changes of behaviour are difficult to cope with but for the sake of your patient and yourself, do not hide it away or pretend all is well.

PROGRESSIVE

The condition is non-reversible and progressive but it should not be a cause of shame, alarm or hopelessness. Share the problem with your family, friends and neighbours. They will be only too willing to help and support you. Try to contact your local social worker and public health nurse. Your general practitioner may be able to help also.

Above all, keep the avenues of communication open at all times especially with your patient, as more than ever before he/she needs you even though they may be unable to tell you so.

Xantia The Family Hatch Like No Other

Car buyers, it's time to rejoice. Just when you thought all middle-size family cars had become unashamed clones of something rounded and very Japanese, meet the Citroen Xantia.

Refreshingly individual with its stubby tail, short rear overhang and wedge-shaped profile, Citroen's newcomer is welcome proof that some manufacturers still have the confidence to go their own way.

But then, as a replacement for that wackiest of mainstream motor cars, the instantly identifiable — and surprisingly popular — Citroen BX, the Xantia was

never going to be a clone of anything.

While appealing to as wide a market as possible, the new car has to be an obvious Citroen both in the way it looks and in the way it drives. The Xantia is certainly that. Whereas the smaller ZX hatchback, though neat enough, is a shade short on individuality, the Xantia is unmistakably Citroen in every respect, except for two. First, with its minimal, bustle-back tail, it looks like an abbreviated saloon rather than the hatchback it is. Second, the cars we've seen so far show a degree of quality and solidity

you'd never have found in even the best made BX.

SAFETY — MORE THAN JUST THE USUAL BIG CLAIMS

As is usual for a Citroen, the Xantia's looks are largely the work of Turin styling house, Bentone.

As such, there are several visual cues from other Citroen models, like the XM-style front grille and wheel-arch shape. But the side profile is smoother than an XM's, with a gently rising wedge shape and no awkward angles; and the bonnet contains a pair of feature lines extending rearwards from the grille whereas the bonnet on the XM is virtually flat.

Other distinctive features are the short bonnet and huge windscreen (like Ford's new Mondeo) plus an unusually short rear overhang. And under the skin, the Xantia shows yet more credentials as a car of its time.

For example, the body contains a large amount of corrosion-resistant, zinc-coated steel, and it's designed to pass the 35 m.p.h., offset frontal impact test that's fast becoming the industry norm.

The doors contain side-impact protection bars, and the front seatbelts have locking devices to prevent unwinding in a frontal impact. Airbags and pyrotechnically-activated front seatbelt tensioners will be available from next year.

EVEN BASIC XANTIA IS TO BE PACKED WITH EXTRAS

To begin with, there are SX and VSX trim levels. The 1.8 engine comes only with the lower specification, the 16v with the higher, and the 2.0 eight valve with either. The VSX comes with anti-lock brakes, Hydractive II suspension, a rear sunblind, electric door mirrors, a

height-adjustable driver's seat and more.

The option pack on the VSX adds electric seat adjustment, electric seat heating, and a passenger door mirror that tilts downward automatically when you're reversing enabling you to see the kerb.

All Xantias have power steering, electric front windows, a height adjustable steering wheel, high-security door locks with freely-rotating barrels (first seen on the XM and 605), remote central locking, a hinged cover for the built-in, theft deterrent radio and much else besides.

Radio equipment, electric rear windows and an alarm are optional on the French market. Apart from the windows, you can expect these to be standard in the UK along with an electric sunroof.

Cllrs. Object To Structure Of Proposed Co. Enterprise Boards

At the U.D.C. meeting on June 21 Cllr. R. Walsh raised the matter of the new Co. Enterprise Boards, and said he wanted to protest at what he called the continued downgrading of Urban Councils by the Government. This is a repetition of what happened, when the first structural E.C. plans were being considered, he said. The then Minister picked a figure out of the blue sky (15,000 population) and ordered that all towns below this figure, would have no say in the preparation of the plan. The Department insist on using the term "Local Authorities", when, in fact, they mean only Co. Councils. "I

think, he said, "it is grossly unfair that Dungarvan, the Co-Capital, with the only Urban Council in the county, should be excluded from any say in those new Boards."

The make-up of the Boards, Cllr. Walsh said, is as follows:— 4 local authority members (which in reality means Co. Council members), 8 Representatives, to be nominated by the Co. Manager, from the various Community Groups in the County. Again Dungarvan is being discriminated against, Cllr. Walsh says, as, we understand, that the most important and necessary of those groups, Dungarvan Chamber of

Commerce, are being denied representation because of some technicality. Regarding any enterprise they might come up with, it will hardly be sited on Cruachán, or on the Caim near Kiely's Cross; more than likely and hopefully, it

would be sited in Dungarvan and yet the town, or its representatives, will have no input in securing its coming here, he said. Cllr. P. Power voiced his strong support for Cllr. Walsh's protest, as did several other councillors.

When The Garden Is Thirsty

Watering must dominate your thoughts when pottering about the garden during 'Flaming June.'

Any lack of rain or watering can soon cause damage because so much of your garden stock will be newly-planted or newly-emerged.

It could be very expensive if you have just put in a lot of new bedding plants, and even established shrubs can suffer if a draught goes on.

HARD WORK

Watering is hard work and we should all conserve water as much as possible, whether or not there is a hosepipe ban in force.



So, help the soil stay moist in the first place by mulching with pulverised bark, chopped straw, old sawdust, lawn cuttings or even shredded newspaper.

This practice will also keep weeds down — another problem in at this time of year.

Having limited water loss, a variable nozzle on a hose or a watering can, fitted with a rose, can be used to create a fine rain which doesn't batter the plants.

The best time is in the cool of dusk or evening when the water has longer to soak in and reach the roots.

Sprinklers and sprinkler hoses obviously make life easier but they are wasteful unless used with extra care. Doing without them will help push the day of the hosepipe ban a little further away.

The watering can has one advantage over the convenience of a hose — you can add a soluble fertiliser to pep up the lawn and your plants.

SPECIAL CARE

There will be plants that need special care, such as tomatoes, dahlias or any large plant on well-drained soil.

These can be helped by creating 'reservoirs' for them, either by mounding earth into a little wall to create a circle around the stem.

You then water into this 'pond' which slowly drains into the ground.

The other approach is to sink a large flower pot into the ground close to the stem just after planting — leave it too late and you risk damaging roots to put the pot in place.

By and large you need to water thoroughly once a week during hot dry weather but you can check by scratching down into the soil at least three inches — water if the soil is powdery and dry.

When mowing the lawn you need to strike a balance between keeping it tidy but not so short that it becomes dry and scorched by the heat.

You can also spike or fork it to make the most of watering. — **ARTHUR HINES.**

Jet Service Arrives At Waterford Regional Airport

The first commercial passenger jet service to operate at Waterford Regional Airport touched down on schedule at 9.00 a.m. on Sunday week. The aircraft a 105 seater BAe 146 jet on charter to Harvey Travel carried a group of golfers from the UK to play at Waterford Castle.

Commenting on the new service Mr. Tom Sheridan Chairman Waterford Regional Airport plc said "The commencement of jet services marks a milestone in the development of the airport. Upgrading and improvements at the airport over the past year enable us to cater for this type of traffic and we expect significant growth in charter

services in the next couple of years opening up a whole new opportunity for trade and tourism in the

South East".

Meanwhile daily scheduled services to London and Manchester by Manx Air-

lines have exceeded the targets set by the airline and the airport and additional frequency on both routes is now under consideration. Direct flights to France are planned for next year.

CHEESY GARLIC BREAD



Italy's Mozzarella cheese, which is a traditional pizza ingredient, tends to be underrated. Easily available, as it is freshly made in this country, this

cheese has a mellow flavour and unusual texture that makes it ideal for all kinds of recipes. Like this one, for instance.



Ingredients:

2 Cloves garlic, crushed
4 oz (100g) butter, softened
4 oz (100g) Mozzarella cheese, grated
freshly ground black pepper
1 tbs fresh parsley, chopped
1 small crusty loaf

Method:

Mix garlic, butter, cheese, pepper and parsley. Make cuts down the loaf at 1 cm (1/2 in) intervals almost to the base. Spread the butter over each side of the bread slices. Bake at 400° F, 200° C, gas mark 6 for 15 minutes. Serve at once.

URBAN COUNCIL MEETING

Discordant Note As Tony Wright Elected Chairman

Eight years after he was first elected, Cllr. Tony Wright (Democratic Left) became Chairman of Dungarvan Urban Council at last Thursday night's annual meeting.

Cllr. Wright, who also won a seat on Waterford County Council in 1991, succeeds Cllr. Nuala Ryan (FF) to whom many outstanding tributes were paid on her successful year in office.

The new Vice-Chairman is Labour's Cllr. Billy Kyne who is the only one of the nine councillors not to have been elected Chairman in the life of the present Council which began in July 1985. He had, however, served as Chairman for the term 1984-'85.

Cllr. Wright's election was not without its discordant note, however, and veteran Fianna Fail member, Cllr. Declan Goode dissented and insisted that his dissension be recorded in the minutes.

Cllr. Goode accused Cllr. Wright of having "misbehaved" on the Council, citing his opposition to water charges which he insisted had caused the Council trouble and had also cost it financially.

Cllr. Wright was proposed by Cllr. Kyne and seconded by Cllr. Mary Dixon and except for Cllr. Goode received the support of all the other councillors.

Having first paid generous tribute to the outgoing Chairman, Cllr. Kyne in proposing the Democratic Left member, said that while they had their politi-

cal differences they are both striving to serve the community as best they can.

"Cllr. Wright is presently the Vice-Chairman and for the reason of fair play and in the interests of political harmony I am proposing him. It is his turn," said Cllr. Kyne.

Having been declared elected, Cllr. Wright thanked his proposer and seconder and the other members who had supported him. He told Cllr. Goode that he need not have any hard feelings but he would refrain from responding to his (Cllr. Goode's) comments.

The new Chairman said he had not canvassed for the job. "That is not my form," he said. He regarded his election as chairman as a great honour and would face up to the extra responsibility the position would bring.

Cllr. Wright pledged to project the town in the best possible image. There would be no favouritism, and when they leave the Council chamber their political differences will be left behind.

Referring to the outgoing chairman, he said Cllr. Ryan had done an excellent job and the town and the townspeople appreciate the great work she had done.

VICE-CHAIR

Cllr. Kyne's election as Vice-Chairman was unanimous on the proposal of his party colleague Cllr. Paddy Power and seconded by Cllr. Austin Hallahan (Ind.)

First elected to the UDC in 1979 following the death of his father Thomas A.

Kyne, Cllr. Kyne relinquished the chairmanship of Waterford County Council at last Monday's meeting.

Acting County Manager, Mr. Brian J. McNally congratulated the chairman and vice-chairman and assured them of his support and co-operation in the year ahead and that of all the other Council officials.

PROGRESS

At the outset of the meeting the retiring chairperson, Cllr. Ryan reflected on a successful year in office and highlighted many of the Council's achievements of the past twelve months.

Cllr. Ryan, to whom many generous tributes were paid by all her colleagues, referred to the continuing refurbishment of Cathal Brugha Place, approval for a new 15-house scheme at Stephen Street which will commence next September, the provision of bathrooms in houses at Congress Villas and the laying of new footpaths at Grattan Square.

Cllr. Ryan also referred to the successful introduction of the pay car parks at Davitt's Quay and Friary Street which had also enabled the Council to create extra jobs.

She referred to the historic first visit to the Council chamber of the Minister for the Environment last October and added that "all in all it has been a good year."

Concluding, Cllr. Ryan thanked all the senior UDC officials and staff — indoor and outdoor — her UDC colleagues, and her own husband and family "for putting up with me."

Delay In Constructing Sea Wall "Threatening Bounds Of Reasonableness"

The McInerney Construction Company is to be

asked by Dungarvan Urban Council to fulfil its commitment to construct a proper sea wall alongside its private housing estate at Sea Park in Abbeyside.

July, the reason given being the difficulty in getting suitable rock surfacing due to the very wet weather.

Cllr. Billy Kyne told last week's Council meeting that the final design of the sea wall has already been agreed and will be built under the supervision of the Council's Consultant Engineer.

Cllr. Kyne said he has been assured now that McInerneys have engaged a contractor to do the work and mid July is the target date beyond which they should not go.

"Despite contact by me with McInerney Construction on behalf of some of the Sea Park residents, the work on the sea wall — promised on many occasions — hasn't yet started," Cllr. Kyne said.

"I have said before that I have always found McInerneys reasonable to deal with but the delay in constructing the sea wall is threatening the bounds of reasonableness," he said.

"The last promised date was early June but it has now been put back to mid-

Cllr. Kyne added that everyone has been more than patient today. It is now up to McInerneys to keep their side of the bargain and start the work by mid July.

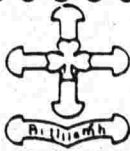

“Significant Progress” On DAS Scheme

Waterford IFA Western Committee Chairman, Bill Lane, has stated that negotiations between the Association and the Department on the Disadvantaged Area Scheme has led to significant progress on the criteria for reclassification which had become a barrier to the inclusion of the maximum number of eligible people appealing to enter the scheme.

Mr. Lane pointed out that the income eligibility clause which required that incomes in the area under appeal must be less than 40% of average farm income was clearly far too severe. IFA had sought that the income criteria be raised to 70% and after negotiation the Department of Agriculture were now prepared to offer a 60% rate which Mr. Lane described as “significant progress.”

Farm incomes are so low at present that 60% of a very low level will mean an income that is not viable.

The IFA man added that the Department negotiators

also accepted that there must be scope for those marginal cases above 60% to use soil classification as further evidence of their eligibility in making a case for inclusion in the Extremely Disadvantaged Areas.

Mr. Lane pointed out that one of the most fundamental difficulties the IFA negotiating team had encountered was that the Department had based its policy on the extension criteria on a 50% sample of farms outside the Disadvantaged Areas that had been surveyed in 1989.

“It is now clear to all sides that at that time labour units had been understated by farmers as they had not realised their significance in calculating eligibility. We now know that a single decimal point is the difference between inclusion and exclusion and the Department of Agriculture have agreed to an IFA proposal to examine the anomaly that the understating of labour unit has caused and to look for solutions to this problem.

FARMING LEADER

Slattery Calls For Flexibility In Suckler Cow Quota Scheme

IFA's National Dairy Chairman, Mr. Michael Slattery has this week called on Farm Minister Mr. Joe Walsh to allow small scale milk producers who have purchased beef cows at any stage on or before August 1, to be eligible for quota from the 63,400 suckler cow premiums in the Special Reserve Quota. The IFA man said that if the Minister agrees to this request it will confirm eligibility for quota and premium payment at £79.09 per cow in 1993.

Mr. Slattery said that the quota is currently allocated in the first instance to pro-

ducers with a milk quota of less than 25,638 gallons on April 1, 1993 who have not previously applied for the suckler cow scheme or who if they applied previously, were limited by the 10 cow rule. Producers to be eligible must have held on January 1, 1993, suckler cows of beef breeds which are surplus to their milk quota (based on an average milk yield of 844 gallons) and must maintain the same number of suckler cows in their herd for a retention period of 6 months.

The IFA Dairy chief pointed out that flexibility

is needed to ensure that a sizable number of the 63,400 premia are not left idle in the national reserve. Each premia is worth £79.09/head and it is vitally important that the maximum of the asset is utilised in 1993.

IMPERATIVE

In relation to the temporary leasing scheme, Mr. Slattery said it was imperative that quota leased into

the temporary leasing scheme would not be counted with the lesser for stocking rate purposes. The IFA man pointed to the success of the temporary leasing scheme adding that without this amendment to the regulation many farmers would be forced into land leasing arrangements thus depriving the temporary leasing scheme of substantial quantities of milk.

Co. Waterford ICMSA News

County Chairman, John Cusack said that while ICMSA welcomed and approved the principles of a retirement scheme, it has a fundamental objection to the requirement that each farm must be enlarged before the retiring owner could be eligible for a pension.

“Farms which are currently viable should not be required to increase in acreage. Those which are not viable should be assisted to obtain additional acreage or quota, whichever is the limiting factor.

“If the forced enlargement of viable holdings were removed, then the basis of a good Retirement Scheme would exist. If it is not removed then Ireland is officially taking on a Scheme to formally reduce the number of viable family farms,” said Mr. Cusack.

The ICMSA delegation which met with the Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry recently, suggested improvements to the proposed Scheme which the Department agreed to take on board and endeavour to have accepted at EC

level. These improvement include: (a) allowing the younger spouse to be the applicant for the Scheme; (b) Increasing the age (presently 45 years) of eligibility for the takeover of land; (c) Removing the maximum 66 years age limit for a two year period to facilitate all those presently over the proposed age to qualify and (d) allowing the retiring farmer to plant forestry and still be eligible for a pension.

Mr. Cusack said a Farm Retirement Scheme is necessary but it must be designed and implemented in a manner which preserves viable family farms rather than remove them and which helps unviable family farms reach viability in the most economical and practical way.

“We need a common sense approach to the Farm Retirement Scheme and we should not be hide-bound by bureaucrats in Brussels who are far removed from the reality of the real problems at farm level,” concluded Mr. Cusack.

Gillis Expresses Optimism On Structural Funds

Following a major meeting between the farm organisations and the Taoiseach, Mr. Reynolds in Dublin last week, the IFA President, Alan Gillis said he was now quite optimistic that as a result of the meeting the Government was committed to rural development and headage payments and that he was convinced that the Taoiseach himself was in charge of the situation on Structural Funds.

Mr. Gillis said he restated rural Ireland's demand for an 18% “fair share” of Structural Funds and that he was now more optimistic that the Association would now succeed in achieving that goal. He pointed out that the Taoiseach himself had dismissed the ESRI report as “misguided” and said the Government was committed to a fair balance between rural and urban areas.

The IFA leader said that

further cause for his optimism came from the Taoiseach's statement to the meeting that while unemployment and job creation was a priority for the Government, job maintenance was also vital.

However, commenting on the Programme for Economic and Social Progress, Mr. Gillis expressed disappointment to the Taoiseach at the lack of progress being made by the Government on key PESP commitments, in particular EC funding for Ireland's Disease Eradication Programme, Disadvantaged Areas Scheme, the National Milk Agency, Probate Tax and Occupiers Liability. The IFA delegation sought and was granted an urgent meeting with the Minister for Finance, Mr. Ahern for the Alliance Against Probate Tax which the Association has co-founded with the Law Society.

He spoke of his election to the chair as "an honour second to none" and said he was following in the footsteps of many eminent people who had served as chairman, among them members of the present Council.

Cllr. Casey paid generous tribute to the outgoing chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne, and said he was carrying on a very fine family tradition in politics.

"I want all of us to work together for the common good and betterment of county Waterford during my term as Chairman," Cllr. Casey added.

Many other tributes were also paid to Cllr. Kyne, who in a resume of his year in office said there had been many ups and downs for the county during the past twelve months.

County Roads "Have Gone To Hell Altogether"

—Says Councillor

While millions of pounds of EC money are now being poured into the main roads of Waterford, many of the county roads are on the verge of collapse, members complained at Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council.

After a protracted, and at times acrimonious discussion, it was agreed to request the Minister for the Environment, as a matter of urgency, to receive a Council deputation which will press the Council's case for funding to enable vitally necessary hedgecutting on 1,000 miles of county roads to be undertaken.

In a report before the meeting from the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, it was disclosed that only minimal financial provision had been made in this year's estimates for hedgecutting on county roads.

Mr. Hurley said the Council could now decide to borrow £50,000 for that purpose, but given the present overall financial position, he considered that to be a "non runner."

They could also decide to cutback by six miles on the surface dressing of county roads, or they could consider dropping labour.

Cllr. Nora Flynn said that

whatever course of action they are to take the hedgecutting of the county road will have to be undertaken. If not, she said, people will be killed.

Cllr. Kieran O'Ryan said that even in the last few weeks some county roads "have gone to hell altogether." Some are virtually impassable because of overgrown hedges, others are in a state of virtual collapse.

Proposing that they seek an immediate meeting with the Minister for the Environment, Cllr. O'Ryan confidently predicted a satisfactory outcome to such a meeting.

"There is an outcry all over the county at the state of the county roads", Cllr. O'Ryan continued. "The numerical strength of our outdoor staff is completely inadequate."

Cllr. Gary O'Halloran agreed that they should seek to send a deputation to the Minister. Inadequate funding from Central Government is the main cause of their road problems, and the entire county roads network is now being very seriously threatened. "It is," he added, "disturbing to see them going to rack and ruin."

Acting County Manager, Mr. Brian J. McNally, said he didn't think there is scope to transfer money from other programmes to county roads simply because all other programmes are already insufficiently funded.

Cllr. Paddy Kenneally described as "obscene" the millions of EC funding now being poured into stretches of their main roads which were already in excellent condition. "It is," he said, "a stupid policy."

Cllr. Pat Leahy (FF) said he had no hesitation in laying the blame at the door of the Minister for the Environment. He has failed to give them the funding needed and as a result rural Ireland is being decimated while everything is being channelled in the direction of the bigger towns and cities.

Acting County Engineer, Mr. Eamonn Mansfield, said £6 million of EC funds are being spent on the strengthening of the main roads of the county this year. When the work is completed Waterford will have a very fine main roads network. Mr. Mansfield said none of that money could be transferred to county roads, so if they didn't want to avail of the £6 million the only alternative was to say "no" to the EC. "That would be very unwise", said Mr. Mansfield who added that their main roads as yet are not up to European stan-

dards. Cllr. Willie McDonnell however warned that they will be uproar if a hedgecutting programme on the county roads is not proceeded with. "We may as well all leave this chamber," he said.

There were a whole series of different proposals from the floor of the chamber, before finally Cllr. O'Ryan's proposal that they request the Minister for the Environment to immediately receive a deputation was unanimously agreed to.

The hope is that the meeting can take place in advance of the next Council meeting on July 12 when the whole issue will again be considered.

CIVIC RECEPTION

On Friday night last June 25th a Civic Reception was hosted by Lismore Town Commissioners to honour the achievements of Rev. Bro. Dormer C.B.S., Lismore and Miss Valerie Barry, Lismore Athletic Club. Mrs. Mary Fenton-Morrissey chairperson Lismore Town Commissioners welcomed all to the reception. She outlined the achievements of both Bro. Dormer and Valerie Barry and then presented the recipients with a scroll each to commemorate the occasion.

In her address and referring to Bro. Dormer first Mrs. Fenton Morrissey said:

"Since his arrival in Lismore some fourteen years ago. Bro. Dormer has gained the respect and admiration of all those who have come in contact with him. He was a dedicated and thorough teacher, and as Principal of our Primary School, was respected and liked by both pupils and staff alike.

"Immediately, on his arrival, he became deeply involved in the affairs of the G.A.A. in Co. Waterford, and in particular the Lismore Club. His belief, in nurturing and promoting hurling with the young, was the start of a resurgence of under age hurling here.

"Having promoted the game at under age level, he then had the satisfaction of seeing the results of his efforts bear fruit when Lismore won their first official senior hurling championship since 1925. Who will ever forget that performance against Mount Sion at Walsh Park? And it did not rest there, it is recognised that Lismore's players played a vital role in the successful 1992 Waterford minor and U-21 teams.

"Not content to working with the players on the field, Bro. Dormer took an active role in administration, and is currently the Secretary of the Lismore Club. His organisational skills in this area are well known. For some years now, he also has been secretary of the Primary Schools Board where his great understanding led to new and exciting changes.

"It was not alone the Schools and the G.A.A. who benefited from Bro. Dormer's time here in Lismore. In 1987, when the decision to close Lismore District Hospital was made, he was a tireless worker as secretary on the "Save the Hospital Committee". We have a lot to thank Bro. Dormer for, as without his services and encouragement we might have a different

tale to tell and not the success story St. Carthage's House is today.

"It is however, Bro. Dormer's success with our under age players that we will best remember him. His coaching ability, and his way of instilling the basics of hurling into young players will be his legacy to Lismore. His leaving us will be a big loss to Lismore and even more so to our local G.A.A. club and especially the young boys who he taught and coached.

"Finally, I would like on behalf of everyone present here tonight to wish Bro. Dormer every success for the future and he should know that we will all remember his stay amongst us".

Referring to Valerie Barry then the Chairperson said:

"It is indeed very seldom, that the commissioners honour someone so young as our next guest. But in Valerie Barry's case, her achievements have not gone unnoticed. When ever the topic of athletics and Lismore is mentioned, then the name of Valerie Barry springs to mind.

"Valerie has been involved in running since an early age. She first came to prominence in Community Games winning a silver medal at U-12 over 600m. I believe that she has represented Waterford every year since the tender age of 10 at the Community Games Finals in Mosney.

"Her prolific success at County level, from a young age has always marked her out as a special talent and the local Athletic Club was not slow in realising the potential on their doorstep. It was not too long before success was coming at Munster Championship level. These early victories gave her the appetite and desire to succeed at a higher level.

"As in any sport, discipline and training are paramount. Behind success lies hours of dedication and hard work. Training for her begins during the long winter months, mostly in the dark, and generally unseen. A 4 to 5 day training week is common. It is not hard to understand therefore, that with such commitment success was to follow.

"I could not possibly list here her achievements to date, however, a list of her current titles will give some indication of her victories at 400 metres both indoors and on the outdoor track. She currently holds three records over various ages and distances. When I say that last year, she ran the 14th fastest time ever by a woman in Ireland for 400 metres shortly

after her 16th birthday, you can see why she is so highly thought of by those in her sport.

"At the end of this season, she leaves the juvenile ages and will begin to compete in the Senior ranks. It is indeed fitting then, that we in the Town Commissioners should honour such a fine ambassador for Lismore. We admire her dedication and commitment which shows what can be achieved even with minimal facilities.

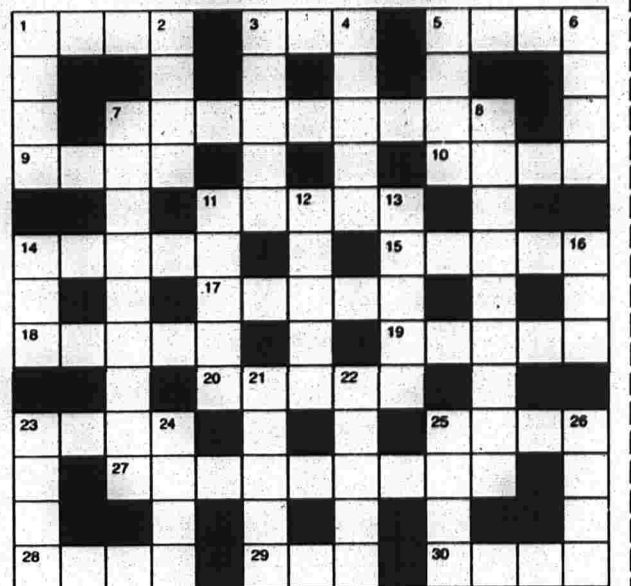

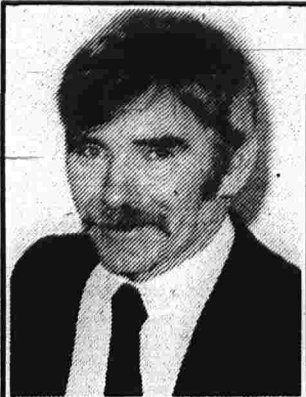

G.A.A. NOTES

Senior Hurling Situation

With the league section of the hurling championship now entering the second half we take a look at the position in which 14 teams find themselves.

TALLOW

They have lost to Lismore and Mount Sion and have won three games to give them 6 points. They have just one match left to play and if they beat Fourmilewater in this, they will have 8 points and will be sure to qualify. On current form this is unsure and if they lose they can find themselves in a play-off situation which is not what they expected some weeks ago.

MOUNT SION

They too have six points having defeated Lismore, Tallow and Fourmilewater. They have two matches left and should get a least a couple of points from their remaining matches with Portlaw and Colligan, and seem certain to qualify. Mount Sion are favourites in the betting. This is overrating their prospects.

DUNGARVAN

They have played three games and got two points for beating Mount Sion. They have three to play and may get some more points after playing Colligan,

Fourmilewater and Lismore. Six points may be their best at the finish and this could win them a play-off engagement.

COLLIGAN

They have played three and have just one point for drawing with Portlaw. Next on their list are Mount Sion, Dungarvan and Fourmilewater. The odds are against them qualifying this year.

PORTLAW

They dropped a point against Colligan and gained two when winning against Dungarvan. They now have three points and game to

play against Mount Sion, Lismore and Fourmilewater. They will certainly finish close to the top, but will need to beat two of their three remaining opponents to qualify. They have a chance, but I wouldn't bank on their qualifying - at least not without a play-off.

FOURMILEWATER

They have no points after two matches, but because of the kind of form they have been showing, it is certainly too early to count them out. They have Tallow, Colligan, Portlaw and Dungarvan to play before they finish and they look to be as good, at least, as any of that quartet. The standard of hurling which they displayed against Mount Sion when losing by a single point, could be good enough to defeat any of the four. I give them a slight chance of qualifying.

QUALIFIERS

The fancied ones are Mount Sion, Lismore and Tallow, but being well pushed by Dungarvan and Portlaw.

GROUP 'B'

ROANMORE

They are the present leaders in the title race and have 8 points from 4 matches. Their unbeaten run should continue when they meet Dunhill, but their final match against Passage will be a tight one. They are sure to qualify for the semi-final.

PASSAGE

Unbeaten in their three matches which included a win over the champions Ballygunner. They have 6 points from 3 games so far. With St. Saviours, De La Salle and Roanmore next on their list, they will be sure of a couple

of points that will ensure their place in the K/O stages.

DE LA SALLE

They have 6 points also, but they have played 5 games and have but one left. This is against Passage and on present form, their chances are not great. They could become involved in a play-off for K/O place.

BALLYGUNNER

The reigning county champions were given a rude awakening when beaten in their first two matches of the championship. They came back to win points against Dunhill and De La Salle without being very impressive. They will need to win both their remaining matches against St. Saviours and Ballyduff to make sure of qualifying. If they lose both they are out of the race, while winning one would give them a chance of qualifying.

BALLYDUFF

They have 4 points but have just one match remaining and this is against the champions, Ballygunner at Cappoquin on July 25th. If they beat the 'Gunners' - and this is possible - they can still manage to get into a play-off with De La Salle and Ballygunner.

DUNHILL

They have played four and with no wins, they have no points and are now out of the 1993 championship. They

play Roanmore and St. Saviours in their remaining matches, but the results won't alter their situation.

ST. SAVIOURS

They too, have no points after their three games, so their chances are gone unless they show a very big improvement and beat Dunhill, Ballygunner and Passage. Most unlikely.

So this group should see Passage and Roanmore into the K/O stages with the champions Ballygunner or De La Salle, or Ballyduff filling the third spot.

At this stage it is a very wise man who could confidently predict the final result of the title race as there are still about six or seven well in contention. From what I have seen so far, I do believe that the standards are as good as in previous years and this makes it all the more open. To-date 12 of the 26 senior hurling championship games played, have been decided by a single score while 11, or less than half have been won by more than 5 points.

What I have found disappointing in the fixtures which I have seen so far, is the lack of excitement generated by the matches that produced close finishes. It is certainly not as intense as it has been in recent years. In a league system competition the practice of being less concerned eventually becomes a habit and perhaps this is something that the championship planners might take on board before deciding to remain permanently with the league which doesn't seem to be answering all our hurling or football problems.

Punters who might fancy a small wager on the outcome of the championship might be rewarded by keeping an eye on Passage and Roanmore. Both will be there, or thereabouts.

Refreshing Display By Juniors In Exciting Replay At Cappoquin

There is always a wonderful feeling about being a witness to something that never happened before, or at least not for a very long time, and this is how very many Waterford people felt at the Cappoquin venue on Sunday evening when our juniors very decisively beat Tipperary in the replay of their junior hurling semi-final before a record crowd who watched the game in glorious sunshine.

Playing with pride, passion and fierce determination the home team took the game to the visitors from the moment of the throw-in and made it obvious to all and sundry that they were not going to let this one 'get away' from us.

Needless to say, the result was hailed as a tonic for supporters and demonstrated that there is not so much wrong with our hurling standards, after all, and the win must have done a lot to lesson the despondency that hit the county after the defeat by Kerry at senior level four weeks ago.

Tipperary, who shot a total of 16 wides as against 3 for us, will long bemoan their inaccuracy but it must be said too that many of their 'wides' resulted from pressure being exerted on the strikers by Waterford defenders.

There was some confusion about the official starting time and very many of the crowd who paid £7,800 at the stiles, arrived for a 7 p.m. start as notified in the local papers. The facts are that the game was officially fixed for 7.30 p.m. but was changed back to 7 p.m. and later moved to 7.30 p.m. Cappoquin Club handled the fixture very efficiently and the field was in beautiful condition.

PLAY

In the 2nd minute, Pat Bennett pointed a free and in a splendid score from play, Kevin Walsh made it 0-2 in our favour and gave us a lead which we held until Sean Nealon pointed Tipperary's free, he having missed two in the minutes before that. Two minutes later (12th) Martin Murphy had a point and Pat Bennett had another from a free in the 13th minute. Two Tipperary points by Eamon Kelly reduced our lead to a single point. Joe Harrington pointed for Tipperary and Tom Fives brought one back when he made no mistake with a '65'. The next three scores were from Tipperary per Sean Nealon (2) and Eamon Kelly. Shamrocks/ Tourin 1968 Final Again

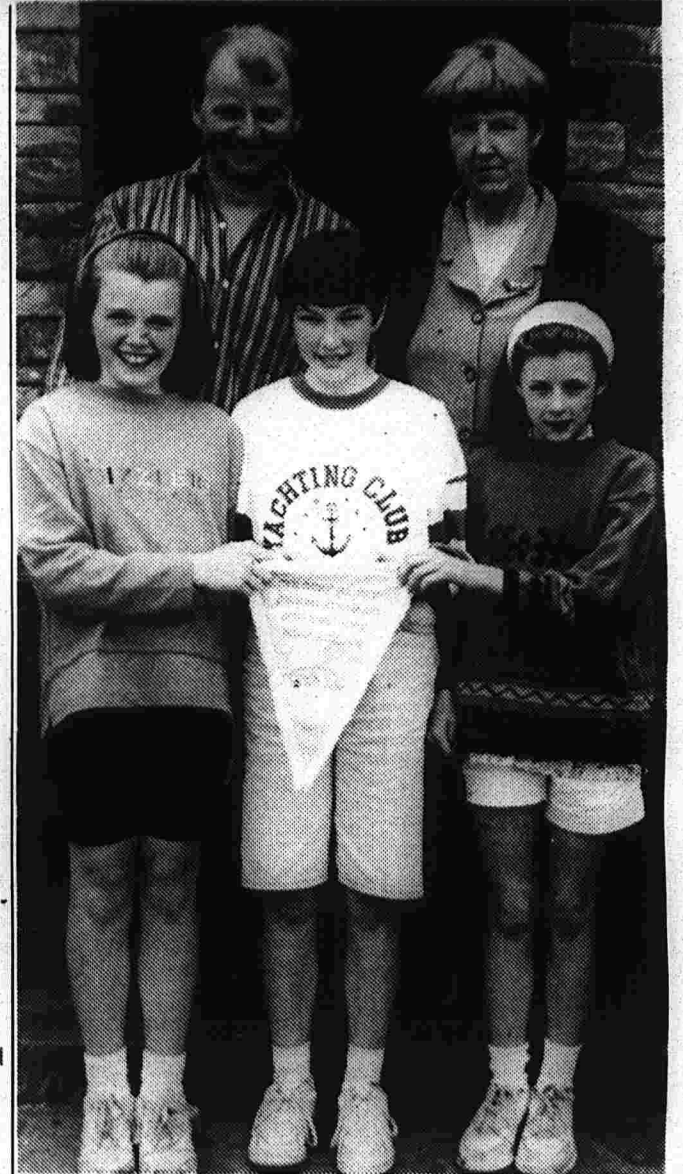
Twenty-five years ago the above clubs met in the Western junior hurling final and the result gave Shamrocks their first championship in the grade.

NEXT WEEK-END

Big Programme Of Club Championship Matches Down For Decision

The match at Walsh Park at 8 p.m. on Friday is certainly the highlight of an exciting weekend's activity and having beaten Tipperary in the hurling semi final at Cappoquin on Sunday last, hopes are high that we will make it a double here. Tipperary have already

beaten us in senior, junior and minor football championships this year and now that we have begun to reverse the matters with our neighbours, it would be wonderful to see the change continue.

On the home front there is a big programme, but following the Cappoquin result, a hurried meeting of the fixtures committee decided to cancel a number of matches where players on the junior hurling panel are involved.

Readers will note that a number of senior games are listed for Tuesdays and this is helping to erase the backlog of fixtures, while at the same time placing a severe strain on some clubs with 'away' players and whose players are out again on the following weekend, sometimes in a different code.

Among the published games which have now been cancelled are:

S.F. — Ballinacourty v. Rathgormack, Stradbally v. Butlerstown and Passage v. St. Saviours. S.H. — Colligan v. Dungarvan. The only junior game affected is the football game between Kilgobinet and Lismore.

SENIOR FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIPS

With no fewer than 34 adult team playing championship games for the County and Western Boards over the coming week-end, clubs and officials face their busiest weekend in recent years.

Saturday evening and Sunday will see an almighty assault being made on the football championships in the three adult grades with no fewer than 26 matches to be decided. As the three football championships are still at an early stage and a whole lot of teams on equal points, more or less on the table every game is important. It will be from here on that the gaps will begin to widen as teams begin to fall behind. The week-end results could therefore determine where clubs are going in the battle for qualification.

S.F.C. — DUNGARVAN v. KILROSSANTY

No one will argue if I describe it as the match of the

weekend in the S.F. championship and it is certain to draw a huge crowd to the Stradbally venue on Sunday evening. They have not met for two years and when they did it was again at Stradbally where Dungarvan defending their newly won crown, scored a runaway win over the Comeragh side (0-18 to 0-6) in a rather boring match.

Dungarvan's tremendous form against Kilmacthomas again installed them as hit favourites to retain their title and it will be interesting to see if they can do as well here? Kilrossanty will be much better on this occasion, but it is doubtful if they are good enough to beat the champs.

AT LEAMYBRIEN

Two of the four games at the weekend will be at Leamybrien where an interesting programme will attract a good crowd.

In the first game, Sliabh gCua and Kilmacthomas will clash as they did at the same stage of the championships last year when Kilmac' really 'went to town' on the Touraneena based side, winning by 1-12 to 0-3. Sliabh gCua have drawn with Tramore and lost by 3 point to Kilrossanty this year and that form is far and away better and surely good enough to trouble Kilmac', who have already lost to Dungarvan and Nire. Kilmacthomas are given the vote to win.

ST. SAVIOURS v. CLASHMORE

This is listed as the feature game, for reasons best known to the fixtures committee. When they met at this venue last year Saviours had the easiest of victories winning by 3-13 to 1-6 against the off-form Western side.

This year, Clashmore showed very good form when beating Butlerstown by four points after losing to Rathgormack by four points. So with an improved Clashmore this game could take an unexpected twist.

NIRE v. TRAMORE

Anything other than a decisive win for the Nire would cause a big surprise, even though Tramore have 3 points from two matches which they played against Dunhill and Sliabh gCua, with whom they draw. Nire played good football against Kilmac' in their only match so far and despite the narrow win, they showed very good form. They should win this one.

GAULTIER v. DUNHILL

Dunhill have played two and Gaultier one game so far and neither have a point. Gaultier played well when losing to Kilrossanty by just 2 points and they will be regarded as the form team to win here.

INTERMEDIATE HURLING CHAMPIONSHIP CAPPOQUIN v. CLONEA

They each have played two matches and have three points apiece. Both played a draw and had a win as well. Geraldines and Dungarvan will clash in the second string section of the junior football championship at Bushy Park on Saturday and Dungarvan should win here.

INTERMEDIATE FOOTBALL

Two are down for decision and thankfully both are on the same programme at Cappoquin on Sunday afternoon.

Brickeys and Geraldines meet in the opening match and with each having won and lost a game, they both

have it all to play for. When they clashed last year, I recall writing about it being an outstanding contest which was won by the Brickeys by a couple of points (2-8 to 2-6). If it is as good again, the neutrals will be satisfied, regardless of who wins.

In the feature game, Ballinameela and An Rinn will entertain the crowd. Both can play very good football and sometimes, as we have seen, both can play very poorly.

Subject to correction, this will be their first meeting in this grade and that makes it an interesting contest. UNDER-21 SEMI FINAL

Waterford Can Reach The Munster Final

After the very exciting first round match against Limerick on May 10th in the final game played at Fraher field this year, our under 21 football side has won a lot of support and are certain to have a very big following when they line out against Tipperary at Walsh Park on Friday evening next.

Their high standard display in the first round was a breath of fresh air for our football people and there is great confidence around that they will make it to the provincial Under 21 football final for our second time since the championship was inaugurated. One has to go back 22 years to find a game in which we beat Tipperary and that was in the provincial semi-final in Carrick in 1971 when we came out on top on a 2-11 to 0-12 scoreline before going on to play Cork, the holders, in Fermoy. I'm sure many supporters will recall that particular game, which by any standards was a memorable final with Waterford leading all the way until Cork were awarded a dubious free which resulted in the score giving them a narrow 1-10 to 2-5 victory.

More has been done to bring football in this grade up to a high standard, this year and the introduction of Larry Tompkins to train the team was a great idea and his work with the players seems to have done wonders so far.

One of the mentors told me that Larry has succeeded in getting the players to believe in themselves and in

their ability to take on all comers—regardless of their reputation. This in itself is an achievement and getting their attitude right, is a big step forward and could be the factor in swinging the game our way on Friday. Certainly the selectors have spared nothing on preparing the panel and if we fail after so much training over almost six months, then it is very difficult to know what the answers to our problems are.

The team has not been named at the time of writing, but it is not likely to show much change from the team which scored the nine point win over Limerick eight weeks ago. This would see Ciaran Cullinane of Affane in goal and Bobby Lyons, Darrell Donnelly and Frank Cullinane of Gaultier in the full-back line with Vincent Murray, Rathgormack, Michael Fitzgerald, Kilrossanty and Dan Crotty also of Rathgormack in the half back line. Michael Fenton of Clashmore and David Phelan of the Nire seem to have done enough against Limerick to retain the midfield partnership. Five of the six forwards shared in the scoring against Limerick and the fact that no substitutions were made in that game,

probably reflected the selectors satisfaction with the display of the sextet who are Anthony Fitzgerald, Gaultier, Pat Brazil, Kilrossanty who was the captain, Eamonn Crotty, An Rinn, Fergal Cunningham who were our goal scorers, Kieran Whelan, Bonmahon and David Whelan, Sliabh gCua. The substitute bench is likely to show a couple of changes. One to be replaced will be Raymond Ryan, Sliabh gCua, who is presently in the U.S.A.

Very little is known about the strength, or otherwise, of the Tipperary team who had a first round bye, but we do know that their minor football team of three years ago was beaten in the first round by Kerry (2-13 to 2-5) and in the same championship, Limerick beat us in a replay (0-11 to 0-10), both matches at Fermoy. Home ground advantage meant nothing to us in the senior and junior championships, against Tipperary three weeks ago, so here we will have to rely on the skill, courage and fierce determination of the team to see us through.

As will be seen from the record list, hereunder, our record in the provincial under 21 football is not good and in the past decade we have won only three matches. Interestingly all our wins have been against Limerick and in all cases after winning we have failed

to go any further. Our nine points winning margin against Limerick in the first round this year, was our biggest ever score in this grade.

If we win here on Friday evening, we play in the Munster final on July 23rd against Cork or Kerry, who also meet on Friday next at Pairc Ui Caoimh.

Ardmore Growers, as a group, now employ thirty people full-time and expect an annual turnover in the inaugural year of between £500,000 and £750,000. All the produce is for the home market.

The logo has been designed by Ms. Karen Nolan, while new bags have been specially printed to facilitate group marketing.

Ardmore Growers have been working in close conjunction with the West Waterford Development Partnership and FAS in developing an effective structure and business plan.

In launching Ardmore Growers and the new logo, the Minister said it is such groups that have a vital role to play in the full realisation of the potential of vegetable growing in this country. He pledged that his Dept. will be available to offer every possible support to the group.

The Minister stressed that a priority with Ardmore Growers should be the establishment of a brand name for a top quality produce. But he also warned of the possible pitfalls and said that an absolute requirement is "growers loyalty" among the eight growers who comprise the group.

Other speakers included Colm Warren, An Bord Glas — and a leading member of the Dublin-Meath Growers; Ms. Margaret Carr, An Bord Glas and Mr. Liam Lynch, Chairman of the Ardmore Growers.
