WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL

Telecom Mast A "Massive Monstrosity"

— SAYS COUNCILLOR

The decision by the Planning Department of Waterford County Council to grant permission to Telecom Eireann for the erection of a 53-metre high communications mast (pictured exclusively in last week's "Leader") at Cruchaun on the Comeragh Mountains over looking Dungarvan was slammed by several members at Monday's Council meeting in Dungarvan.

Cllr. Kieran O'Ryan described it as a massive monstrosity; Cllr. Billy Kyne said the public are outraged by its visual impact, while Cllr. Tom Cunningham expressed surprise that the planning application had "slipped through" the Coun-

cil without the knowledge of the members. The assertion, however, that anything had "slipped through" the Planning Department was vehemently rejected by the chief planning officer, Mr. Jimmy Shine, who said the "least worst" location had

been selected for the mast.

The County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, presented a detailed report to the meeting on the history of the submission of the planning application by Telecom Eireann. In it he disclosed that the Department of Communications was asked by the Council to consider a number of alternative locations because of visual amenity considerations.

"Four alternative locations were considered by the Department but all were

Lismore Former Railway Station A Rendezvous For Drink And Drugs

The former railway station building in Lismore has now become a late night drinking and drugs rendezvous, Fine Gael's Cllr. William McDonnell told Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council.

Calling on the Council to make a Compulsory Purchase Order in respect of the property, Cllr. McDonnell said it is now in a terrible state of disrepair. "It is being used for late night drinking as well as by drug users and abusers. Is there anything we can do about

it", he asked.

Mr. Brian J. McNally, county secretary said the property, which formerly housed an industry, is private property.

"Does that mean we are going to leave it as it is and allow it to continue to be used and abused as it presently is" asked Cllr. McDonnell.

The county secretary said the claims made by the councillor area matter for the gardai. He would, however, submit a report to the next meeting.

Waterford Foods Purchase Central Dairies

Waterford Foods plc. has completed the purchase of the Dungarvan based milk company, Central Dairies Limited.

The Central Dairies milk suppliers have an annual milk supply of 1.7 million gallons of which approximately half is retailed in Dungarvan and the surrounding area with the balance sold directly to Waterford Foods.

The business which has been most successful was privately owned by a group of dairy farmers in the im-

mediate supply area.

Waterford Foods considers this a most desirable acquisition as it further consolidates its position in the Liquid Milk Business where it already operates with its brands Premier, Snowcream and Castlelyons. Waterford Foods is the largest liquid milk producer in Ireland and its Premier Brand is brand leader.

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Know Your Rights

Question — Can you give me some details about the Shared Ownership Mortgage Scheme?

Answer — The Shared Ownership Mortgage Scheme is operated by local authorities and is aimed at people on low income who couldn't afford to buy a home with an ordinary mortgage.

Applicants choose a suitable property which the local authority purchases. You must pay a deposit of at least £1,000 to the local authority and arrange a mortgage to purchase a minimum 50% share in the property. Mortgages are provided by the local authority. You then meet the repayments on the mortgage over twenty five years and you pay rent to the local authority for the remaining half share.

The rent is set at 5% of the Local Authority share which is adjusted each year in line with inflation. At some stage within the 25 years, you must buy out the Local Authority share, in blocks of at least 25%, at its original value which will be increased annually in line with inflation.

A subsidy is available towards the rental portion for people with gross income of less than £10,000 in the preceding tax year. There is a sliding scale for this subsidy which ranges from £300 to £700 per year according to your income.

Those eligible under this scheme are:

1 tenants and tenant purchasers (irrespective of income) of local authority dwellings who intend to return their dwelling to the local authority and people on the housing list or in need of housing with income below £12,000 per year and people on the housing list or in need of housing with gross household income in the previous tax year of under £12,000.

Transactions under the Shared Ownership Scheme are exempt from stamp duty and legal costs are kept to a minimum. The house can be new or secondhand but it must be reasonably priced, free from structural defects and must be a suitable size and standard to cater for the applicants household.

PA CUNNINGHAM R.I.P.

AN APPRECIATION

It was with a feeling of shocked disbelief that I heard that Pa Cunningham, Knockeniska, Ballycullane had suddenly left us to go to his eternal reward. It is many years since I first met Pa and he seemed so indestructible that it is hard to imagine that we will never see him again. However, I am sure his passing was as he would have wished, without any fuss or bother, working in one of his own beloved fields.

Pa was a hardworking and diligent farmer who loved every aspect of his work and, as his many grateful neighbours recalled to me, he was always more than willing to lend a helping hand in time of need. He was a big strong man but I suppose his greatest attribute was his gentle caring kindness. This was especially evident when he was in the company of children whose obvious joy in his presence was a pleasure to behold.

It was for his outstanding displays on the football field, however, that Pa will be best remembered by his legion of admirers. He played for Clashmore, Old Parish and the Brickey Rangers and represented his

county with distinction. It was with the great Old Parish team of the late forties and early fifties better known affectionately as the Electric Shocks that Pa showed his true worth. On that great team he was a man among men. They won the County Junior Championship in 1949 and were very unlucky to go down to the great Kilrossanty team of that era in the senior final of the following year. Pa also won a junior football championship medal with his native parish of Clashmore in 1962. Too soon God called you to him, Pa, old friend. You are sadly missed by your sorrowing family and by those of us who had the pleasure and the honour of knowing you and playing beside you in many a hard-fought game.

Festival Figures Not Yet Available For "Operation Clean-Up"

Precise figures for the "operation clean-up" in Tramore after the recent Fleadh Mhor were not yet to hand, county secretary Mr. Brian J. McNally told Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council.

Mr. McNally told Cllr. Michael Queally that they had reached agreement with the promoter for payment of a certain amount for the clean up but he

couldn't yet say if the figure comes within the actual cost.

Also before the meeting was a letter from Mr. James Tuohy of Tramore Failte

Ltd. congratulating the County Council and all its employees on the manner in which the public services were maintained in the town.

"It was a campaign of almost, military precision planned, well supported, and executed with thoroughness", said Mr. Tuohy. "There were considerable difficulties not least the element of not knowing what you were facing, but every contingency was covered to the extent that Tramore was back to normal by early Monday morning. I feel that the Council employees deserve a special word of thanks". Mr. Tuohy added.

Minister Slammed On Car Tax Decision

A decision by the Minister for the Environment to discontinue from October 1st the issue of quarterly car tax, was slammed by two Fianna Fail members at Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council.

Cllr. Paddy Kenneally described the Ministerial proposal as "radical and unfair" and is a move which will hit hardest the ordinary working people.

Cllr. Dan Cowman said it will either put people off the road or, more probably encourage people not to tax their cars at all.

It was agreed unanimously to ask the Minister to reverse his decision.

deemed unsuitable for technical reasons", said Mr. Hurley. "Having regard to the legal situation at the time, and that the proposal formed part of a public policy decision by the Government to improve the telephone system, it was considered that the site at Cruchaun was the least objectionable one even though there would be visual obstruction".

The County Manager said that in accordance with the Planning Act the County Council notified An Taisce, the Arts Council and Bord Failte and no objection was received from any of these bodies.

Cllr. Kyne, however, in a detailed submission to the meeting said it was with regret that he was not appraised of the development at a time when he was chairman of the Council. Neither was he approached privately by anyone who may have had reservations about it.

Cllr. Kyne expressed the belief that the application, first day, should have been more strenuously ques-

tioned by the Council's Planning Department which he believed failed in its role by not querying the real need for the development.

MASSIVE MONSTROSITY

"Not enough questions were asked" said Cllr. Kyne. "The need to erect the mast had not been proved and will always remain difficult to justify". Cllr. Kieran O'Ryan supported his colleague, describing the Telecom mast as a "massive monstrosity". If these type of developments are going to be allowed than the entire Comeragh Mountain range will be destroyed.

He said he had never been informed first day about the Telecom proposal and he believed they should now call on that body to dismantle the mast. "Telecom" he added "would be better employed trying to keep telephone charges down than building these monstrosities".

Cllr. Jackie Fahey said there is public hostility towards the development. He like all the other members, knew nothing about it, and it was regrettable that his efforts to have area planning committees set up had been thwarted. If these committees existed he did not believe the Telecom mast would now be erected where it has been.

The County Manager insisted, however, that there has to be some price paid along the line for the development of the telecommunications system.

Cllr. Austin Flynn agreed and said they must move with the times. Many people, he said, are dependant on their jobs through the

use of cellaphones, and while he was sad to see the mast where it now is he believed it is more important to create jobs and get Waterford into the 21st century.

Cllr. Tom Cunningham's assertion that the planning application had been allowed to "slip through" the Planning Department was strongly denied by the chief planning officer, Mr. Jimmy Shine, who assured the members that nothing had been swept under the carpet and nothing had been decided "behind closed doors".

"None of us like what is there" the County Manager said. "But of all the options the site chosen is the least detrimental. It is unfortunate that it is obtrusive but it is not as obtrusive as it might be in other locations" he added.

Cllr. Fahey said it is the system that is wrong, and he sensed a divide building up between the Council's Planning Department and the councillors.

Now The Fuchsia Looks Good

JULY marks the start of prime time for fuchsias — an import from Mexico and now an established favourite with all gardeners.



It appeals because it is not fussy about soil.

Growing cuttings is easy and there is an incredible range of types for different jobs as well as colour combinations.

There are trailing varieties for hanging baskets, others can be over-wintered outdoors, and yet more are good for growing as bushes or standards.

Peak flowering is from now until October — time to take cuttings and note down varieties you want to grow for the future.

I add a plea here from professional gardeners — don't swell your own collection by helping yourself to cuttings from public displays and hothouses. It causes damage and spoils the displays for everyone else.

Instead, you will find plenty of cheap deals in shops or mail order sections in popular papers and magazines.

If you already have plenty of stock or have friends and relatives willing to do swaps, two-inch cuttings take quickly in a cold frame or well-aired greenhouse or conservatory.

As a special and rewarding project, you could start training an established plant or a cutting to produce a standard — a long stem crowned by a heavily blooming bush — as an excellent stand-alone plant for a key site or a tub.

- choose an upright variety with a single main stem
- pinch out side shoots but leave side leaves until the 'crown' forms
- train the main stem straight by tying to a cane every few inches
- keep potting on as roots fill the existing pot
- wait until the stem is at least 2.5 feet high before pinching out the growing tip to encourage side shoots and make a dense head for maximum blooming.

Half-hardy fuchsias need over-wintering once frosts threaten. Cut the plant down by two-thirds and move under glass or indoors.

If you opt for the house keep them slightly moist and undisturbed at around 40C but don't throw them out if they look dead — they should revive in spring.

As for hardy types such as *Riocartonii* and *Gracilis*, they tend to have less spectacular blooms but can survive in most parts of the country. You can help by setting the plant deep down in the soil and covering the surrounding soil with an insulating mulch.

Frost can disfigure and destroy the foliage but part of the plants appeal is its fast-growing nature — it will surge up in spring.

In milder parts of the country, hardy fuchsias can even be trained into a smart hedge — it beats privet any day! — **Arthur Hines.**

MINI BURGERS

Ingredients:

Basic recipe

- 450g (1 lb) minced beef, lamb or pork
- 1 small onion, very finely chopped
- 50g (2 oz) fresh breadcrumbs
- 1 size 3 egg, beaten
- salt & black pepper
- flour to shape oil

BURGER VARIETIES

SPICED LAMB & BANANA

- 2 x 5 ml sp (21sp) mild curry paste
- 1 banana, chopped



PORK & PEANUT

- 4 x 15 ml (4 tbsp) crunchy peanut butter
- 100g (4 oz) sweetcorn
- 1 x 5 ml sp (1 tsp) soy sauce

BEEF & BEAN

- 225g (7 oz) can barbecue baked beans

Method:

Choose one variety of burger from above. In a large bowl add these ingredients to the basic burger recipe. Add sufficient egg to bind. Using floured hands divide mixture and make into burgers.

Cover and chill for 15 minutes in a refrigerator. Brush the burgers with a little oil and grill or barbecue for 5-6 minutes each side. Serve in bread rolls with salad.

Makes 10-12 burgers
Cooking time: Approximately 10 minutes.

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“Dream Comes True” As West Waterford Golf Club Is Officially Opened

The magnificent new West Waterford Golf Club's 18-hole course at Coolcormack, three miles outside Dungarvan, was officially opened by 84 year old Eddie Hackett last Friday.

In the presence of a distinguished gathering, Mr. Hackett, who also designed the new course, spoke of a “dream come true” for Pat and Nora Spratt whose 150 acres of agricultural land have been turned into a truly resplendent course set in the most delightful picturesque surroundings.

It was a day of extraordinary climatic contrasts, but not even the torrential rain which cascaded down at intervals during the afternoon could mar a memorable day for the Spratt family.

The sun shone with brilliance when Mr. Hackett performed the official opening of the par 72, 6,771 yard course.

However long before the celebration day was over the links were carpeted in hailstones. Bravely those participating in a two day golf classic in aid of charity battled on and thankfully the mercurial weatherman finally relented. It mattered not that some of the time schedules were ever so marginally disrupted.

The rain held off however to enable a huge assembly to enjoy the official opening which took place in brilliant sunshine.

For the first time in his distinguished career Eddie Hackett was being accorded the signal honour of performing the official opening ceremony at a course he had personally designed.

Prior to cutting the tape between the 300-year-old pillars which lead to the first tee, Eddie drove off the first ball — suitably inscribed — to launch the

golfing development on its way. “I will always treasure this day,” said the veteran golf course designer who added that when he first walked around the 150 acres of agricultural land he was delighted to have been asked to design a golf course “out of a farm.”

Mr. Hackett spoke of the delightful surrounds in which the course was enveloped — the Comeragh and Knockmealdown Mountains, the Drumhills, and the winding Brickey River.

Having lauded the enterprise of the husband and wife team of Pat and Nora Spratt, he also praised the efforts of their children, Tom, Austin, Nora and Margaret who had done everything right down to the picking of the stones.

Mr. Hackett said that instead of counting cattle on the “old” land, Pat Spratt could now start counting the score on his golf card.

“We have had a miracle in two short years,” Mr. Hackett added. “In that time a magnificent new golf course has been created and I am personally delighted at the way it has turned out.”

TRIBUTE

Mr. Pat Spratt paid tribute to the many people who had helped “turn the dream into reality” and he thanked especially Bord Failte and the South Eastern Regional Tourism Organisation for the grant-aid they had provided to help bring the facility on stream.

Other speakers included Waterford County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, Mr. Joe Palmer of the South Eastern Regional Tourism Organisation and Mr. Bernie Hynes representing the Golfing Union of Ireland.

Also present was the Chairman of Waterford County Council, Mr. Con Casey, the Acting Chairperson of Dungarvan Urban Council Cllr. Nuala Ryan, Austin Crowe, Chairman of the South Eastern Regional Tourism Organisation, Pat Suttle, Agronomist, who was responsible for the soil layout at the course, and Simon Tarmey of Bord Failte.

The neighbouring Dungarvan Golf Club, which will also shortly officially open its new 18-hole golf course at Knocknagranagh, was represented by its captain Michael Kelly, President Cyril Power and Lady Captain Rose Prendergast.

The magnificent new two-storey clubhouse was constructed by the Dungarvan firm of C. Healy & Sons Ltd., which was represented by Mr. Jimmy Healy. The Architect was Mr. Damian Dillon who was also present, accompanied by his wife Anne.

Waterford Foods On Target For Further Expansion

Waterford Foods is on target for 20 per cent per annum growth to a turnover of £1.4 billion in 1997. This was stated by Stephen O'Connor, managing director, at the annual general meeting in Dungarvan on Thursday, last July 8.

He recalled that Waterford Co-op had launched its public limited company in 1988 when turnover was running at £238 million per annum and the capital valuation of the company was £41 million. At present, turnover is close to £700 million per annum and capital valuation is £233 million. The 69 per cent still owned by farmer shareholders is currently valued at £167 million, having more than quadrupled in the five year period.

Waterford has now completed its strategic plan for the next five years and it is clear that the £1.4 billion figure can be reached

through continuing growth in Ireland, the UK, the United States and Europe.

As announced at the release of the preliminary results, Waterford Foods plc completed 1992 with new records in sales volume, profits and cash flow. Turnover of £551 million clearly establishes the Group as Ireland's leading dairy business, with brand leadership in many aspects of the home market. It has also achieved significant market share in dairy and food-related business in the U.K. and U.S. August 1992 saw the achievement of Waterford's most exciting ac-

quisition to-date, Virginia Milk Products, Express Foods Northern Ireland and Premier Dairies which were purchased from Grand Metropolitan plc.

Turnover for 1992 at £551 million represents an increase of 30 per cent on the previous year. This record level of turnover was achieved with only 5 months sales contribution from the Express acquisition.

Profit before tax at £20.41 million broke the £20 million barrier for the first time in the history of the Group. This represents a 29% increase on the 1991 profits of £15.86 million. Profit be-

fore goodwill amortisation stood at £22.31 million, or an increase of 41 per cent over 1991.

Earning per share rose to 10.04p, an increase of 8 per cent on the previous year's 9.27p. Again, earnings per share before goodwill amortisation stood at 11.08p, showing an increase of 20 per cent.

Operating profit was £29.07 million, an increase of 47 per cent, and operating margin increased to almost 5.3 per cent against 4.7 per cent in 1991. This contributed handsomely to cash flow of £35.8 million, an increase of 40 per cent on 1991.

BEST YEAR SO FAR
Commenting on the results, Stephen O'Connor,

managing director, said: "This was obviously the best year so far in achieving the strategic objectives of the Group. If I were to highlight any one factor I would single out the improved profit margins as the highlight of the years performance. The return on sales of 5.3 per cent is as good as you will find in the industry. Even more encouraging is the continued trend in margin growth - up from 3% in 1987 - and reflecting the benefits of our market strategy. This is a major source from which future progress will flow. In addition, the operating profit of almost £30 million and cash flow of £35.8 million, puts the group in a very strong financial position.

Eight Charged Following "Free For All"

The streets of Dungarvan will be made safe for decent, law abiding, people to walk in, a District Court Judge has pledged.

Judge Michael Pattwell made his pledge at the end of a lengthy hearing at a special sitting of the local District Court last Wednesday when eight people, all with Dungarvan addresses, appeared before him arising out of a "free for all" at O'Connell Street in the early hours of March 12 last.

Six of the defendants, among them a 27 year old mother of three, were given sentences ranging from one to six months, and Judge Pattwell said that what happened on the streets of Dungarvan that night, and is still continuing, was "out of all order and reason."

One garda officer told of the pandemonium that lasted for almost three quarters of an hour when up to thirty people were involved. Another told of the personal fear he felt for this life such was the aggression displayed towards them.

There was evidence that what started out as a vicious row between two factions ended up with them joining forces in recognition of the gardai as "the common enemy."

There was further evidence that one defendant — the 27 year old mother of three — was knocked unconscious and was removed by ambulance to Waterford Regional Hospital where she was detained for two days.

Before the Court were — Thomas Fraher (23), 6 St.

Patrick's Crescent; John Cawley (30), Halting Site, Shandon; Martin Duggan (25), 20 Caseyville; Catherine Duggan (27), Cathal Brugha Place; Tony Riordan jnr., Cathal Brugha Place; Martin Keenan (23), Halting Site, Shandon; Frankie Keniry (22), Cathal Brugha Place and Veronica Duggan, 85 Childers Estate.

Garda Pierce Galvin told the court that gardai were summoned to the scene of "a battle" at O'Connell Street at 12.05 a.m. It had started out as a row between twenty, or more, people over a woman and at one stage it seemed everybody was on top of everybody else on the ground.

"Fists and boots were being used in what was a free for all", said Garda Galvin. "They then turned hostile on himself and another garda and so aggressive and threatening were they that I feared for my life and my personal safety."

Garda Galvin told of being struck on the shoulder and in the chest several times by Thomas Fraher who was dancing around the road "like Mohammed Ali", and inviting him to fight. He had also been struck by Catherine Duggan.

He said they were all drunk and had no respect whatever for the garda presence. "They knew they had us outnumbered and they continued on with the insults and abuse."

UNCONSCIOUS

He added that he saw Catherine Duggan lying unconscious on the ground and an ambulance was summoned and she was removed to Waterford Regional Hospital.

Garda Galvin also told the Court that Cawley had told the gardai that they had no business being there and to get back into the patrol car and leave.

Garda William Talbot said everyone of about thirty people seemed to be fighting when he arrived at the scene. He had to draw his baton when Cawley became very aggressive and Cawley said he had a knife under his shirt and would use it unless he (garda) put the baton away.

"I put the baton away and Cawley then took off his shirt and invited me to fight him," Garda Talbot went on. "Eventually we got him into the patrol car and took him to the Garda Station and placed him in a cell."

Garda Galvin said when he returned to the scene things were just as bad and Tony Riordan went to attack him but he only received a glancing blow.

"The whole fracas lasted between half and three-quarters of an hour during which there was complete pandemonium on the street", said Garda Talbot.

"While it began as a fight among themselves we then became the common enemy when we arrived on the scene", he added.

Six of the eight defendants gave evidence and denied any direct involvement in the fracas. Some of them claimed to have been mere onlookers, others said they had got involved to try and break it up.

Tony Riordan pleaded guilty to a charge of assaulting Garda Talbot and did not go into the witness box, while Martin Keenan was not in court though he was professionally represented.

HAVE ENOUGH TO DO

Judge Pattwell said that while there was denials all round no one was prepared to say who they saw fighting that night. The gardai, he added, have enough to do without having to deal with drunkenness and with being physically attacked.

Cawley was sentenced to six months for assaulting Garda Talbot, a concurrent one month for drunk and disorderly and riotous behaviour, and was bound to the peace for two years.

Thomas Fraher was sentenced to six months detention in St. Patrick's Institution for assaulting Garda Galvin, a concurrent one month for being drunk and disorderly, and was also bound to the peace for two years.

Catherine Duggan, who had no previous convictions, was sentenced to six months imprisonment for assaulting Garda Galvin, and was bound to the peace for two years.

Tony Riordan, jnr., who is presently serving a prison sentence, was sentenced to three months for assaulting Garda Galvin, and a concurrent one month for being drunk and disorderly. These will be served by Riordan on the expiry of the sentence he is now serving.

The Judge added that he had imposed three months for the assault because of the defendant's guilty plea and his subsequent apology to the garda.

Martin Duggan and Martin Keenan were each sentenced to one month for being drunk and disorderly and guilty of riotous behaviour. Both were also bound to the peace for two years.

Frankie Keniry was also bound to the peace for two years, but a charge of being drunk and disorderly against Veronica Duggan was dismissed.

In all cases recognisances were fixed in the event of an appeal.

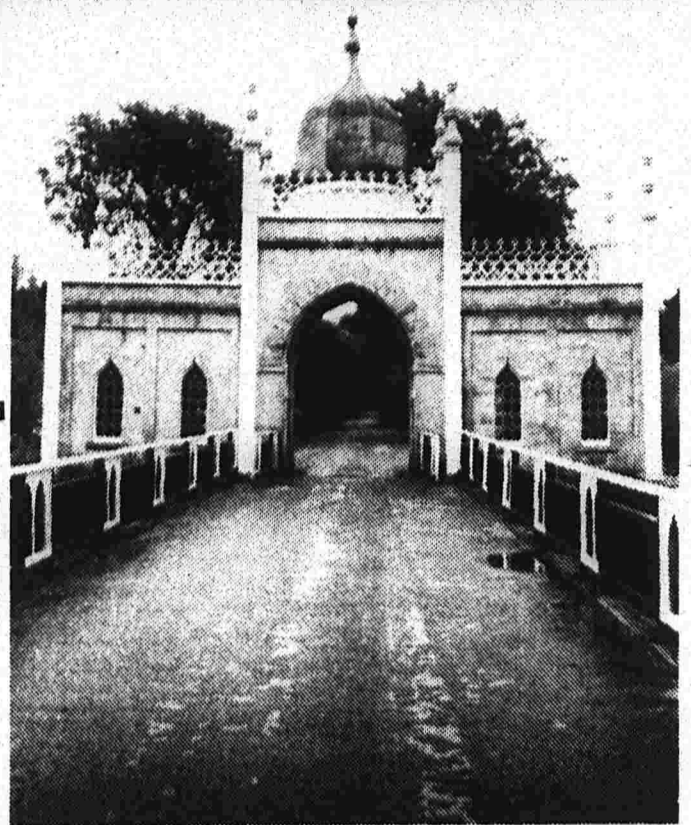
PAST RACES

Villierstown Victory

VILLIERSTOWN

When John, Ray and Liz Treacy burst on the athletic scene in the 1970's the name Villierstown was new to many at the time but in the intervening years all three have brought great honour and respect to their birth place and it's entirely appropriate that Thursday week's race is closely connected with "An Baile Nua". Geoff and Liz Bullen are on the race committee and are supervising the Villierstown end of the race.

The Village of Villierstown which celebrated it's 50th anniversary last year, originally consisted of 24 houses, a school and a chapel and was built by John Villiers-Stuart. It is an unusual village in that it

was purposely built rather than evolving in a haphazard fashion. The original idea behind the village was to establish a linen weaving industry and families were brought down from Northern Ireland to start it off. Unfortunately, this enterprise only lasted a few years before being abandoned and most of the weavers and their families returned to Armagh. Over the years many of the old houses were demolished and new ones built but the Village still manages to retain a peaceful charm of it's own.

The Church in Villierstown was a Protestant place of worship up to 1955. It is now owned by a trust and is used as the Village Community Centre. It was visited in

1974 by the late Erskine Childers and last September the church had it's second presidential visit when Mary Robinson opened a festival of flowers.

After leaving Villierstown the road to Cappoquin passes through Dromana Woods. This 960 acre forest was once part of the Dromana Estate and was owned by the Villiers-Stuarts, who lived in Dromana house on the edge of the river Blackwater. At the other end of the estate is the famous Dromana Bridge gateway, which was modelled on the Brighton Pavillion and is the only structure of it's kind in Ireland. It was recently restored and provides a popular stopping point on the road to Cappoquin.

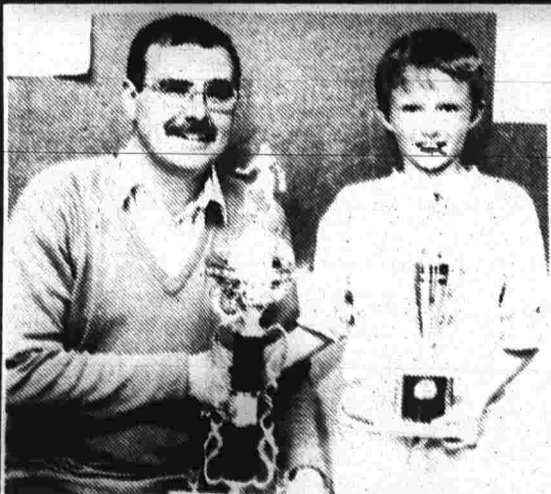

MUNSTER U-21 FOOTBALL SEMI-FINAL

Brilliant Waterford Win Hectic Replay After Extra Time At Clonmel

**WATERFORD 1-14
TIPPERARY 0-12**

Fergal Cunningham's goal ninety seconds from the end of normal time in this very exciting replay of the Under 21 Munster football semi-final brought the match to extra time when Waterford's superior fitness proved the deciding factor in resolving the issue after one hundred and fifty minutes of splendid football.

The game was played on a greasy sod and heavy showers fell during the match, but in the excitement of the contest the supporters of both teams became oblivious to the elements and stood their ground to enjoy this thriller just as much and perhaps, more than the drawn match at Walsh Park on the previous week. Waterford fielded exactly the same side as that which lined out for the drawn match, but Tipperary made two changes in personnel, bringing on Michael O'Mahony for Graham Lonergan and Conor Gleeson for John Dwyer. They had a total of six positional changes.

THE PLAY

Anthony Fitzgerald who scored our first and last point in the drawn match was on target with a 3rd minute free to give us a point lead that was turned into two when David Phelan sent over in the sixth minute. We were three points up when Fergal Cunningham pointed from play in the 9th minute and the lead was increased to four points without reply from Tipperary when Anthony Fitzgerald pointed his second score from a 40 metre free in the 11th minute. A

minute later, the home side opened the scoring with a Mark Sheehan point to leave it 0-4 to 0-1. Very heavy rain fell then for a period and underfoot conditions became slippery and no score came for a full ten minutes until Kevin Coonan sent all the way from a sideline kick and a delightful point in the 22nd minute. Then Fergal Cunningham ended the scoring for this half with a 23rd minute point and just before half-time Ciaran Cullinane made a brilliant save from a rocket like shot. It was 0-5 to 0-2 in favour of Waterford then.

DEVASTATING STYLE

Tipperary began in devastating style and for a period dominated the play. Four points without reply from Waterford gave them an 0-6 to 0-5 lead by the 38th minute. Their points came from Kevin Coonan, Mark Sheehan (2) and Gerry McGuire. Waterford drew level with the conversion of a free by Anthony Fitzgerald but Tipperary went ahead again when David O'Neill had a 43rd minute point. Two further points gave the home side a clear three points lead in the 52nd minute and the position was unchanged after David Whelan and McGuire exchanged points to leave the state of play 0-10 to 0-7 in favour of Tipperary and with time running out.

It was then that the real character of the Waterford team became exposed when their determined fight back began deep in our defence with Donnelly and Lyons getting the ball upfield and Cunningham receiving a real precision pass from Eamonn Crotty and sending it all the way to the net for the first and only goal of this 150 minute marathon and leaving the sides level in the 59th minute and bringing the game to extra-time.

It is interesting to recall that it was Tom Cunningham (Fergal's father) who sent over the dramatic last minute point in '57 when Waterford beat All Ireland champions, Kerry at Walsh

Park.

EXTRA TIME

Tipperary made two changes bringing on J. Roche for C. Gleeson and G. Lonergan for M. Coen; Waterford came back on the field with the same team.

Tipperary went ahead with a Kevin Coonan point but Waterford equalised with a 7th minute point by M. Murphy, (Shamrocks) who had replaced the injured Kieran Whelan in the second half of normal time. Anthony Fitzgerald, in great form with his free taking, sent over a point from a 13m free in the 9th minute and when Tipperary levelled with a 16th minute score it marked the end of their scoring for the game and left them with a total of 0-12. In the remaining twelve minutes Waterford's greater fitness saw them take over the game and add on a further five points without reply.

Our scores came from A. Fitzgerald (2), P. Brazil, W. Cusack and F. Cunningham to leave the final tally 1-14 to 0-12 and a deserved victory which was understandably greeted with great jubilation by our big following of delighted supporters.

G.A.A. NOTES

COUNTY BOARD MEETING

This meeting which was scheduled for last Monday was deferred until next Monday because the county secretary was ill. Seamus is now recovered and is back in harness. The circulated agenda lists the matters for discussion and they include the hearing of the appeal lodged by Kilrossanty against the County Bord na n-Og decision to award the county Under 14 final to Roanmore. This was deferred from the previous meeting in order to allow the clubs a chance to get together and try and resolve the matter. It is not known if any such meeting has taken place and if not, the matter will be finalised on Monday night.

The Financial report will give an update on the money situation, but with so few matches having been played since the last Board meeting, the position is unlikely to have changed much.

SELECTORS

The minor and Under 21 hurling selectors will be appointed. This matter was deferred from the previous meeting. The minor selectors are recommended by County Bord na n-Og and the retiring minor selectors from the two previous years, have indicated their interest in being appointed to the Under 21 grade. The outgoing Under 21 selectors are not going forward for reappointment.

BALLYGUNNER MOTION

This motion which seeks to terminate the term of office of the present manager and selectors of the senior hurling county team and to have the officers of the County Board examine the situation and come back to the County Board with recommendations by the end of July, has aroused considerable interest countywide and beyond. According to well founded rumour many people seem to agree with the proposal and think that we should have a change, while others are questioning the logic of the request from the county champions which comes midway through the agreed term of office of manager and selectors.

In submitting this motion, Ballygunner are seen to lay the entire blame for our dismal performances fairly and squarely on the shoulders of the people who have been in control of the players this year.

The committee of the Ballygunner senior hurling club are perfectly entitled to sponsor a motion calling for the sacking of the manager and selectors if they so wish. They are part of a democratic association and have the right to make positive proposals which are designed to improve the running of the affairs in the field of intercounty hurling or whatever.

At the same time, others can feel that Ballygunner should be more positive about what they are at-

tempting to do. Sacking the present committee without naming replacements is not going to solve the problem. Expecting the principal County Board officers to come up with a solution, is a bit much. Selectors, and managers don't grow on trees, anymore than players and there is no reason for supposing that the recommendations of the county officers will make everything in the garden rosy again.



Last year it was great, winning two Munster finals and an All-Ireland title in underage hurling. But having come so suddenly, did the success go to our heads and were we, to some extent, responsible for some of our young players becoming swelled-headed? Not being accustomed to that degree of success, maybe we could be forgiven for not having been able to cope with winning.

I think we should be experienced enough as a county, to be able to cope with losing and not let the recent failures go to our heads either.

Everything that is bad about our senior hurling situation happened since the turn of the year, as up to Christmas we seemed to be

flyng. The cause or causes of our collapse should be examined and debated but at the same time we should not rush into anything and make decisions that we may later regret. To dispose of the selectors and manager in mid-stream could undermine the stability and confidence of future selection committees who would be working in the knowledge that a series of defeats might put them out of office before their term of appointment ended.

Success comes slowly and I feel that it will take two or three years more before we can hope to reap the benefits of the maturity and development of last year's crop of Under 21 and minor players. It does not seem now as if the present panel of seniors are going to make the headlines in the championships, or league. I think we must be patient.

— Councillors Welcome Decision To Uphold Planning Permission
