

Opening Of New Facilities At Waterford Regional Hospital

Monday 19th July, saw the opening of several important new facilities at Waterford Regional Hospital and will mark the completion of another major phase in the development of the hospital as one of the most modern and best equipped hospitals in the country.

Entrance and Hospital Concourse, Out patient Clinic Suites, Radiology (X-Ray), Accident and Emergency, Central Admissions and General Administration.

The opening of these new facilities will involve some changes in procedure and access, according to Mr. Peter Finnegan, General Manager of Waterford Regional Hospital. "The most important change is that patients for admission (other than Accident and Emergency), most Out Patients and those attending for X-.

The new areas of the Ray will access the hospital 'Department. hospital which will open through the new Main Enon July 19th are: the Main trance", says Mr. Finnegan. Entrance and Hospital The hospital is circulating a colour brochure detailing the changes to all households in Waterford City and County in order to familiarise the public with the new facilities.

The Main Entrance will open from 7.30 a.m. to 9.00 p.m. every day. All patients coming for admission will report to the Central Admissions Department in the Hospital Concourse. All emergency cases and patients for admission after 5.30 p.m will enter the hospital by coming to the Accident .. and .. Emergency

The Accident and Emergency Department is situated at the southern end of the main hospital and has its own SEPARATE EN-TRANCE. It will be open and staffed 24 hours a day, 7 days a week

The Radiology Department is accessed through the Main Entrance.

All Out Patients Clinics, other than E.N.T. and Ophthalmic, will be accessed through the main entrance.

PARKING

Due to the phased development of the hospital, car parking adjacent to Main SET DOWN ONLY. This will apply until the end of 1993 when further car parking in the area will be available. Visitors are requested to use the car park on the left of the main entrance driveway.

The Hospital Concourse includes Reception and Waiting Area, Snack Bar and Shop. A policy of no smoking will apply in all areas of the hospital.

The building of Waterford Regional Hospital commenced in 1987 and is due for completion at the end of 1994. Costing £50 million, the new hospital has 470 beds, both public and private, and boast some of the most modern equipment and technology in the country.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION — Do you have to be working for your employer for a particular length of time before you are entitled to maternity leave?

Answer — There is, generally, no length of service qualification for entitlement to maternity leave. But, in order to fulfil the requirements of the Act (Maternity Protection of Employment Act) a woman must provide notice in writing to her employer of her intention to take maternity leave at least 4 weeks before the leave date. Regular part-time workers, who have worked at least 8 hours a week for 13 weeks for the same employer are entitled to the statutory maternity leave but can only give the 4 weeks notice when they have met

A District Court Judge, a representative of the legal profession, and a Siochana said they had almember of the District Court staff all joined in paying fulsome tribute to the late Michael C. Nagle, Editor/Proprietor of the Dungarvan Leader at last Wednesday's sitting of Dungarvan District Court.

Mr. J. P. Gordon, on behalf of the legal profession in the area, said the late Michael Nagle had been reporting, accurately and fairly, the proceedings of both the District Court and Circuit Court for many decades. In that, he fulfilled a very important function and his reports always gave a true and fair reflection of the proceedings.

"He could always hone in on all the important points

of a case," said Mr. Gordon. "He was too, at all times, most accommodating to the legal profession and our sincere sympathy is extended to his wife and family."

Judge Michael Pattwell said that he had heard of Michael Nagle's death with regret, and while he hadn't personally known him he

had heard all about him.

Judge Pattwell referred to how very well served the West Waterford region is by the local press and it must be a tribute to the quality of the local newspapers that so many of them can survive.

The Judge said he wished to be associated with the sympathy extended to Mr. Nagle's family and friends.

Youth (15) Charged With Sexual Assault On Nine Year

A 15 year old Co. Waterford youth who is presently serving eighteen months detention in St. Patrick's Institution, made a brief appearance in custody last Wednesday before Judge Michael Pattwell on sexual assault and unlawful carnal knowledge charges.

(1) that between October 1 and December 25 1992 at Childers Estate, Dungarvan, he sexually assaulted a nine year old girl contrary to Section Two of the Criminal Law Rape Act 1990, and (2) between the same dates he had unlawful carnal knowledge of the nine year old girl contrary to Section II of the Criminal

The youth is charged with Law Amendment Act 1935.

He was returned for trial to the next sittings of the Waterford Circuit Criminal Court on November 16.

The youth was granted free legal aid including counsel.

Inspector Michael Blake represented the Director of Public Prosecutions, and Mr. Niall King, Solr., appeared for the accused.

ACCESS TO CLONEA STRAND CUT OFF BY TRAVELLERS

Public access to popular Clonea Strand via what is known locally as the "back road" has now been all but cut off by travellers, it was claimed by members of Dungarvan Urban Council this week.

Cllr. Austin Hallahan told the monthly meeting that there are caravans, horses and dogs all over the road and people simply cannot pass in safety to get to the

Demanding that they call on Waterford County Council to take whatever measures are necessary to get them to move on, Cllr. Hallahan said he knew of a local woman who had gone to Clonea for a swim and could not then return because of animals wandering all over the road.

"This is very unfair and in the height of the summer season is totally unacceptable," said Cllr. Hallahan. "Waterford County Council

must act to remove them and provide the free access the public are entitled to on this road.

Cllr. paddy Power supported his colleague and said what is presently taking place on the road is disgraceful.

He claimed that the travellers had even taken their horses onto the strand at Clonea and people had to scatter all over the place.
"These people have no re-

gard for the rights of other people or their safety," Cllr. Power added.

It was unanimously agreed to demand County Council action to move the travellers out of the area.



A bright encore for summer

IT may seem grim to look forward to the end of summer but even that can bring garden colour if you act by planting autumn-flowering

They will give you a bright encore to summer colour



Well-Drained

Most prefer sunny and well-drained sites in order to withstand the colder and wetter autumn conditions, but fussiness is probably not the reason why many gardeners have not bothered to check them out. It is more to do with confusion - autumn bulbs have been stuck with some odd labels.

Take Autumn Crocuses. Some are real crocuses and belong to the iris family, but others are Colchicums — a group producing cup-shaped and mostly pink-coloured flowers.

The most interesting are probably the Speciosum, which usually have rich mauve flowers although there are hybrids producing white and lighter shades of mauve.

Plant them now or during August, about three inches deep and six apart in well-drained soil - they will also endure partial shade.

But if you thought that was the end of the Autumn Crocus/Speciosum story, you should also be aware I that there is another variety called Crocus Speciosis - a true crocus with mauve flowers!

This should be planted in July about three inches deep.

No less confusing are the Belladonna and Diamond Lilies — South African natives which actually belong to the amaryllis family.

Investigating

Belladonna Lily is worth investigating for its large pink and creamy blooms produced on stems as high

Plant in August, about four inches down and a foot apart in a warm spot such as the base of a wall. Insulate the bulbs against frost with a layer of mulch over the soil and the plants will survive and keep their greenery through winter until 'sleeping' in sum-

Diamond Lily, more correctly known as Nerine Bowdenii, also requires planting in August in a warm well-drained spot at the same depth, but bulbs can be clustered as close as four inches apart.

Crowned

The 18-inch stems are crowned by delicate pink flowers.

The drawback with some of the above suggestions is that they need space which may be currently occupied, so the alternative is to select autumn plants which can thrive beneath or close to your fading summer plants and shrubs.

Try the hardy miniature version of Cyclamen, Hedorifolium, which can be planted next month in shallow scoops three inches apart to create a colourful carpet of delicate blooms.

HAM & CHEESE BRUNCH

Ingredients: Filling


> 4 slices cooked ham 2 slices Swiss cheese 4 slices bread, brown or white Sunflower margarine

100ml (4fl oz) milk (semi-skimmed could be used)

1 size 3 egg salt and black pepper

Method:

Spread the margarine on one side of each slice of



bread. Place 2 slices of ham on top of one slice of cheese, cut in half. Stack together so that the ham is in the centre and the cheese on the outside. Place on one slice of bread and press the other

slice of bread on top. Re-

peat to make other sand-

Mix together the milk, egg and seasoning in a large dish. Place the sandwiches in the mix-

Leave for one minute, turn over and leave for a further minute or until liguid has been soaked up.

Brush a non-stick frying pan with a little oil. Heat, add the sandwiches and cook over a medium heat for 2-3 minutes each side. The bread should be golden and crispy and the cheese just starting to melt.

Cooking time approx. 5 mins.

Mr. White went on to say that financially the Council is doing "alright." "They have been minding the halfpennies, we are getting the work done and there is no danger of going into liquidation," he added.

The abstract of accounts were unanimously adopted on the proposal of Cllr. Paddy Power.

Labour Minister. There was "no way" they could continue effectively without their own chief executive officer and they should not aid or abet the Department in any way to bring that situation about.

Mr. Jimmy Byrne (Labour) said the Minister should be totally ashamed of herself. "She is a disgrace to the Labour Party, she has made blunder after blunder and should be renamed the Minister for Blunders."

Cllr. Kyne said the letter, given to them just minutes before the meeting, was a "bombshell." It behoves them now more than ever, to appoint a temporary CEO to take over from Mr. Kelleher on August 31.

"This is the first step to downgrade the Co. Waterford VEC," said Cllr. Michael O'Riordan (FG). "We have always had our own CEO and it would be a very backward step to have the City and County VECs administered by the one official."

Cllr. Paddy Kenneally said they should convene a special meeting to consider "this bombshell."

ACRIMONY AND VERBAL EXCHANGES

Subsequently the members went on to consider the situation that will apply after the retirement of the existing CEO at the end of next month.

It led to acrimony and verbal exchanges and there was even a ten minute adjournment to enable some members discuss, in groups, what steps should be taken in relation to making a temporary CEO appointment.

There were a number of proposals including two that named existing employees of the Committee be appointed on a temporary basis. Eventually, however these were not put

because all the terms governing such appointments under Standing Orders were not being complied with.

It proved too much for Cllrs. Nora Flynn (FG), Paddy Power (Labour) and Mr. Byrne who staged a walkout in protest at the course the meeting was taking.

Finally it was agreed (6-3) on the proposal of Cllr. John Carey (FG) seconded by Mr. Noel O'Doherty that a special meeting be convened on July 30 to appoint a temporary CEO from within the Committee's own teaching and administrative staff. Each will be written to by registered post notifying them of the impending vacancy.

That, however, is in conflict with the Minister's decision to make the Waterford VEC's chief executive officer responsible for the affairs of the Committee from September 1.

The stormy meeting ended on yet another sour note with the Chairman, Cllr. Kyne, speaking of the "great torment" he had to go through in recent months over what should have been a straightforward appointment of a temporary CEO.

Clir. Kyne said he felt that the Committee had been reduced to the level of a Ballymagash in relation to what he termed "this critical

appointment."
The CEO, Mr. Kelleher however insisted that all the correspondence in relation to the matter from the Department of Education had not been of his making. He had merely fulfilled all the obligations that governed his position as CEO.

Tenant Purchase Scheme A Disaster

The new Local Authority Tenant Purchase Scheme recently announced by the Junior Environment Minister, Emmett Stagg, was described as "an absolute disaster" by the Chairman of Dungarvan Urban Council at this week's meeting.

Cllr. Tony Wright said that in the last scheme launched in 1988 there was a purchase discount of up to 50%, but this latest one has a maximum discount of only 30%. In addition tenants will have to organise their own mortgages under the scheme.

Cllr. Wright said that while Minister Stagg is on record as saying that he wants as many people as possible to own their own homes, the scheme he has come up with is not in tune with the people at all.

He added that he did not see many people taking up the scheme, so disappointing is it overall.

Cllr. Mary Dixon also expressed reservations about the new scheme and said it could in no way compare with the last one in 1988.

However, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan said that despite all its warts, he welcomed it and he hoped there will be a good response to it.

It was agreed to circularise all details of the scheme to the Council's eligible tenants.

Teagasc Income Report "Sorry And Sordid Reading"

The results of the Teagasc National Farm Survey published on July 12, which showed that more than half those surveyed had an annual income of less than £5,000, make sorry and sordid reading, according to the Chairman of the ICMSA's Rural Development Committee, Mr. Dan McCarty.

Mr. McCarthy said that the results of the Teagasc report highlighted the need for a farm income supplement as applies to the PAYE sector.

He said that the continued denial of a family income supplement; the absence of a land use policy; the fact that there is no off farm income limit for the payment of headage and that there is no worthwhile attempt to channel milk, suckler cow or ewe quotas to small scale producers, indicates the level of Government disinterest in the weaker sector of the farming community.

FARMING LEADER

Gallons Of Milk Quota Must Be Carefully **Allocated**

The Chairman of the ICMSA Dairy Committee, Mr. Con Scully has stressed that the 5.3 million gallons of milk quota which is to be allocated free of charge to small scale producers, must be distributed to producers with less than 30,000 gallon quotas who are committed to dairying and who are dependent on dairy farming for their livelihoods.

Mr. Scully said that this 5.3 million gallons would be a life line for a number of farmers if properly allocated. The ICMSA view is that farmers who (a) are at a lower end of the production scale, (b) who have demonstrated a commitment to dairying, in that they have filled, or almost filled, their quota entitlement in the past and (c) small scale farmers who depend on dairying for their livelihoods, should receive priority in the allocation of this quota.

O'Rourke Warns On **Excessive Margins** For Vet Supplies

The Chairman of the ICMSA Sheep Committee, Mr. Eamonn O'Rourke has criticised some suppliers of veterinary products to sheep farmers for taking excessive margins.

Mr. O'Rourke cited the price of sponges and PMS for controlled breeding in ewes, as an example where there is a large variation in price from one region of the country to another. He said that his experience shows that prices vary from below £2 per ewe to over £4 per

"At the higher end of the scale suppliers are obviously taking an enormous margin per ewe," said Mr. O'Rourke.

Mr. O'Rourke said that with more farmers using controlled breeding methods to have lambs ready for the market early in the year, suppliers should be able to reduce price due to larger volumes of sale.

SHEEP DIPPING SCHEME

On the issue of sheep dipping Mr. O'Rourke criticised the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry for not making any changes to the sheep dipping scheme for this year. He said that the present scheme is expensive to comply with and is not having the desired effect as evi-denced by the increasing incidence of sheep scab in recent years. In 1985 49 cases of sheep scab were reported while in 1991 134 cases were reported.

Mr. O'Rourke said that he received a commitment from Minister Walsh last year that the scheme

year but this has not happened.

He concluded by calling for immediate action to ensure that an effective system of eradicating sheep scab would be in place for 1994.

Historic Photo-Archive Exhibition Opens At Dungarvan Museu

The recently elected chairman of Dungarvan U.D.C. Mr. Tony Wright was guest of honour at the official opening of the Richard Edward Brennan Photo-Archive Exhibition at Dungarvan Museum on Monday 12th July. Welcoming the large attendance of local councillors, representatives of Heritage Societies in Waterford, Youghal and Carrick-on-Suir, guests and society members museum president Mr. Matt Connolly paid tribute to the generous donation of the recently discovered glassplate negative collection of over 350 photographs, the work of Richard Edward Brennan (1846-1917) by Mr. Donal Lynch, South Terrace, Dungarvan.

The collection, he said Fr. Brown, S.J., collection was a unique record of life in Dungarvan and environs at the turn of the century and its importance was comparable to that of the Lawrence collection in the National Archive and the

recently the subject of a national tour, sponsored by Allied Irish Banks.

U.D.C. chairman Cllr. Tony Wright thanked the museum society for its invitation and extended congratulations on its work over the last decade in providing, as a voluntary organisation, a highly successful museum for the town and district and its many tourists.

The provisions of this ser-

vice and the summer guided walking tours made a major contribution to tourism in the area, he said, and is much appreciated when heritage and history are now of great interest to all. He had, he said, much pleasure in declaring "The Richard Edward Brennan Exhibition" formally open.

LOCAL

PHOTOGRAPHERS Mr. William Fraher, or-

ganiser of the exhibition. spoke on the numerous photographers who have captured the streetscapes and people of Dungarvan over the years. He stated that the first of these photographers was George F. Power who had "The Na-tional Studio" in Main Street. He was active from about 1875 to 1900. More familiar is the name of Edmund Keohan who came from Tramore in 1875. He started doing photography on a professional basis after 1890. In 1924 he wrote the first history of Dungarvan. Another photographer was George J. Hughes who had a studio at Park Terrace in the early 1900's. In more recent times Tom Tobin (1926-1989) recorded the places and personalities of the town and county in the 1950's. The museum hopes to mount an exhibition of his work in the near future.

Mr. Fraher then gave a brief sketch of the Brennan family. Richard Edward (1846-1917) was a son of Edward Brennan who was post master and lived at Devonshire Square (Grattan Square). Edward made an important discovery of mammoth and other remains at Shandon caves near Dungarvan in 1859.

His son Richard Edward became postmaster in turn. In 1873 he set up his own painting works and later acquired the building on the square now occupied by Curran's Furniture. In 1882 he printed a monthly maga-zine - "The Dungarvan Journal and General Advertiser".

Among his many interests was cycling. In 1869 he founded the first cycling club in Ireland - "The Dungarvan Ramblers". In the same year the club ran a 4 mile bicycle race, the first cycle race for a challenge cup in the British Isles. The cup was presented to the Museum by Father Columba O'Donnell, O.S.A. and is on display in this exhibi-

INTERESTING PRINTS

The exhibition reveals another of Brennan's many talents that of photographer. This exhibition consists of a selection of the more interesting prints taken between 1900 and 1910. Included are views of Dungarvan Square and Quay and interior views of the old post office. There are excellent views of Abbeyside Castle and a beautiful view of "The Hermitage" in Abbeyside, once the home of Sarah Purser (1848-1943).

Also included are sporting groups, country houses and views of Ring, Stradbally, Ardmore, Carrick-on-Suir etc. There is an interesting group of photos taken at the Cork Exhibition 1902/1903.

Brennan retired as postmaster in 1913. His son David was manager of the labour exchange in Dungarvan.

He was also interested in photography and took several of the photos in this exhibition.

Mr. Fraher ended by thanking his colleagues -Donal Lynch, William Whelan, Valerie Beresford and Bernadette Sheridan for their help in preparing the exhibition.

FAS SCHEME

On current Museum affairs the president, Mr. Connolly, informed attendance that the society was presently engaged in a Fás Scheme researching the records of Dungarvan workhouse in the great famine period, recording the genealogy of old Dungarvan families, documenting its entire collection for computerisation whilst providing five day museum opening, daily town trail walks and off-season tourist information service. He thanked society member Mr. Andy Kelly, Kilmacthomas who processed the photographs from the glassplates and exhibition organiser, Mr. William Fraher.

The society, he said, was delighted at the placement of two late 18th century cannons from Dungarvan castle in the museum forecourt and congratulated town clerk, Mr. B. White and the U.D.C. on this initiative. As president he was particularly pleased to con-gratulate the Mulcahy family, Abbeyside on being awarded "The National Spar Retailer Of The Year 1993" trophy and thanked them for providing the reception for the exhibition opening, the third successive year the society had benefited from the generous patronage.

The photographs on exhibition have created great interest following the official opening and already a number of events and persons which had been unidentified have now been dated and identified. It was in Four-Mile-Water Parish that Fr. Joseph established himself as more than a bit of a songwriter, soon to become renowned for his musical talents. In 1968 his composition "Ar An Sli Go Cluain Meala" won the Castlebar open competition and subsequently he wrote may





Coaching News

This is an excellent official publication which appears every quarter and is edited by Waterford's Pat Daly at headquarters. The summer edition which is now out contains a number of particularly interesting articles by the experts in whatever field of activity is being covered.

An article with the Caption 'Rewarding Fair Play', is on a subject which is very dear to me and to which I have referred many times. It reads:

Rewarding Fair Play

"One of the significant growth areas within the Association has been the great increase in presentation awards of one nature or another, since they were first introduced in the late 1950's, (sponsored by Texaco), for the outstanding player in the All-Ireland finals.

"There are those who believe that these awards result in increased profile for the recipient, the sponsoring body and the games in general. There are others who contend that the awards. particularly when made to individual players, are the complete antithesis of what team games are supposed to be all about. They, apart from questioning the sponsors' motives, would claim, with some considerable conviction, that it is very difficult, if not impossible, to single one player out

above another when there are no standard or objective criteria for doing so. For example, is the goalkeeper who makes a crucial last minute save more of a "man" (of the match) than the player who secures victory with the last kick/puck of the ball. And what about the midfielder who seldomly, if ever, gets an opportunity to make a spectacular save and who is more likely to be involved in setting up the scores than scoring himself.

"The reality is that it would be eminently fairer, as well as making much more sense to reward fair play on either an individual or collective team basis. It would be relatively easy to establish the number of frees conceded and by whom they were conceded as well as recording match cautions and sending offs. It would surely be within the ambit of some far seeing sports editor to initiate such

a scheme.

"The recipient wouldn't necessarily be man of the match (as currently understood) but he definitely would be a man apart. There is no reason either why the sponsors of such a scheme should have their motives questioned because the game would be the ultimate benefactor. And that, in the final analysis, is the only thing which really

than Cappoquin, as the Western venue would attract a bigger following and have a better atmosphere for a football game. The facts are that the selectors and trainer felt that Walsh Park would, for some reason, give the team a better chance. They may have had in mind the fact that when we last had a home game against Kerry (1991) we ran them very close and with some luck might have stole a march on the then All-Ireland champions at Walsh

Park where it was played.

Kerry come here as strong favourites, they being the reigning champions for the past three years and having beaten Cork in the provincial semi-final which was their first game of the season. Trained by the great Paudie O'Shea they are going for four in a row and for a crack at maintaining their unbeaten record against Waterford.

Waterford selectors, building on a strong minor side of three years ago, and engaging All-Ireland medal winner Larry Tompkins as trainer, have brought Waterford to a high standard of Under 21 football and reaching the provincial final, the hard way.

Our match against Limerick was good and it aroused countywide interest in the teams potential. Our semifinal match against Tipperary at Walsh Park was a game of two contrasting halves, with Waterford having to fight back to steal a draw after playing great stuff in the first half.

The replay showed a similar pattern at Clonmel when again, we had to fight to earn the draw which sent the semi-final to extra-time. In this period we surpassed all that had happened before and satisfied our growing number of supporters that we have talent and teamwork good enough to challenge the best when we get it right on the day.

Since the win in the semifinal the panel have continued their strict training programme and have played a couple of useful challenge matches which produced encouraging results. The players realise that this is their biggest test of all and that beating the mighty Kingdom team will take a mammoth effort on the part of every single player combining in one great team effort to win and to salvage our flagging intercounty record for 1993.

Some of our selectors saw Kerry beating Cork in their semi-final game and were impressed with Kerry's high standard, but at the same time, reckoned that they are not unbeatable. A lot will depend on the attitude of the players going into the game and their belief in their ability to beat their opponents, regardless of who they are or what happened in other matches against the same county.

At the time of writing the team to do duty has not been named, but it is not likely to differ much from the side which defeated Tipperary in the replay at Clonmel on July 9th.

This will see Ciaran Cullinane in goal again and few can complain about the young Affane player's good goalkeeping to date.

We have a strong defence in Bobby Lyons, Darrell Donnelly and Francis Cullinane in the full line and Vincent Murray, Michael Fitzgerald and Dan Crotty outside them. It was out of defence that our final attack was mounted to earn us a draw on two occasions. Ml. Fenton and David Phelan have set up a good midfield partnership and if Phelan is recovered from the injury sustained in the semi-final replay her seems sure to hold his place.

In attack we have top scorers, Anthony Fitzgerald, Fergal Cunningham, David Whelan, Eamonn Crotty, Pat Brazil and Kieran Whelan. We have also a formidable back up group on the substitute bench should their services be required during the final.

THE OUTCOME

Most of our supporters see it as a 'now or never' challenge as we are not likely to have as good a side together again for a long time.

Kerry, we know, are good and the proof is there for everyone to see, but no team is invincible and favourites and reigning champions have fallen before. There is growing confidence in our county that this Under 21 football team is good enough to beat a team as highly rated as Kerry, so with a might effort on the part of everyone concerned, huge support at Walsh Park and a little bit of good luck we might see the footballers emulating the feat of their counterparts in hurling last year, by tak-ing this title. We wish them the very best of luck.



Stinging Criticism Of An Post's Counter **Facilities At Dungarvan**

There was stinging criticism of the counter facilities being provided by An Post at Dungarvan's main Post Office at this week's meeting of the Urban Council.

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan said the long queues that are now a regular feature at the local Post Office are a disgrace and are humiliating for the people who have to take their places in them.

"All that is required is that an additional counter window be opened during busy times", said Cllr. O'Riordan. "The public are entitled to a better level of service than they are getting and we should voice our strongest possible protest to An Post.

Cllr. Nuala Ryan agreed and said they had previous-ly been told that all four counter windows are being operated at peak times. That, however, is simply not true.

Cllr. Mary Dixon said last Friday two out of the four windows were closed down while at the same time there was a lengthy queue of peo-ple waiting to be served.

"That isn't good enough and An Post must be told so," she added.

The Chairman, Cllr. Tony Wright said everyone in Dungarvan will back up the criticisms voiced by the members.

It was agreed to formally protest about the level of services to An Post and to demand that all available counter windows be manned during peak times.

Visit Of National Youth Information Co-Ordinator

A recent visitor to the Dungarvan Youth Information Centre was Ms. Frances Newman who is the National Co-ordinator for the youth information service. This service consists of a national network of youth information centres whose main aim is to provide a free, comprehensive and confidential information service for young people and those who work with them. Ms. Newman's role is to co-ordinate and develop the service throughout the country. In November 1992, the National Youth Information Monitoring Committee be-came the Irish member of ERYICA (European Youth Information and Counselling Agency) which strengthens the links between the centres in Ireland and their counterparts in

other European countries. Locally, the information service is a project of Waterford Regional Youth Service with information centres located at Dungarvan, Waterford and Clonmel. Plans are at an advanced stage to open a new centre in Carrick-on-Suir in the near future. A unique feature of the service locally is that it is provided almost exclusively by volunteers who are trained and supported by a fulltime officer of the Regional Youth Service. As such, the service is truly "community based" and voluntary in character and this model of youth information provision has aroused much interest at national level. During her visit Ms. Newman congratulated the volunteers on their dedicated work and praised the local youth service for the way in which limited resources are being used to bring a vital infor-mation service to as many young people as possible.
