The Right To

Most of us who can read this paper have never had firsthand knowledge of not being able to read and write. But for those who do find reading and writing difficult, not being fully literate, has shaped their lives and coloured their perception of the world and their place in it.

It is generally assumed that where a person's reading and writing skills are low that they will be at a disadvantage when certain tasks have to be performed.

some disadvantages are often underestimated.

For some, the drawbacks of being unable to read and write are of a practical na-

However, the effects of ture, e.g. in terms of limited prospects of employment or advancement in their jobs. Others are affected at a much deeper and personal level where their fear of exposure and feelings of inadequacy have been internalised. For them it is very private and very much a personal problem.

In a recent survey, students who were taking part in an Adult Learning Scheme cited the following as the significant effects of their reading and writing problems. Students reported that

Could not apply for certain jobs; had worries coping with the demands of a job; gave up career aspirations; had to turn down a job or promotion; felt stuck in a poorly paid job; couldn't take a night course; couldn't help children with school homework; couldn't read stories to children; had difficulties filling in forms; couldn't read or write a letter; had problems with shopping or with ordering a meal.

When it came to speaking of the personal effects of their disability, students reported that they: felt terrified and panicked in situations involving reading and writing; felt inferior; felt shy and withdrawn; maintained defensive barriers; constantly felt "under a shadow"; felt bitter, angry and hurt.

Nowadays, it is generally accepted that there is little or no connection between a person's level of intelligence and their ability to read and write. What is at stake here is that many people are suffering as a direct result of their reading and writing problems.

The purpose of this series of articles is to alert the local community to the nature of this problem and to the fact that whatever the difficulty with reading and writing, help is available locally, in the hope and belief that this message will be passed on in a sensitive manner to those who can benefit from the various courses, etc., which are on

In later articles we will examine the causes of reading and writing difficulties, the extent of the problem and the types of services which are available to heip.

Father And Son Appeal Against Severity Of Sentences

A 48 year old unemployed labourer and his 24 year old son, who were involved in a vicious assault on a neighbour at a Dungarvan housing estate in the early hours of March 17th last, appealed against the severity of six month prison sen-tences before Judge Diarmuid Sheridan at the local court on Tuesday.

The appellants were Tony Riordan snr. and Michael Riordan, both of 40 Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan, who were sentenced to six months at Dungarvan District Court for assaulting John Daly 21 Cathal Brugha Place.

Both appellants, the court was told, have been in custody for the last seven

There was evidence that a hurley and a pool cue were used in the attack on Daly, and that a third family member, Tony Riordan jnr. who is presently in custody, was also involved and was the instigator of the inci-

Garda Helena Foley said the victim was removed by ambulance to Waterford Regional Hospital where he was detained for one week.

Tony Riordan snr. said the incident had been sparked off by reports that his three year old grandchild had earlier been attacked by Daly. His son Tony jnr. went to sort things out with Daly but he (witness) had only tried to break up the row that developed.

Judge Sheridan, however, spoke of his total dislike of punishment squads" and also that Tony Riordan snr. has previous convictions "the length of his arm" dating back to 1961, including several for assault.

He affirmed the six months sentence on Riordan snr. but said he would be given credit for the seven weeks he has already been in custody.

Commenting that Michael Riordan had played a relatively minor part in the attack, and given that he did not have previous assault convictions, Judge Sheridan granted him his own bail of £300 and adjourned the appeal for twelve months on his undertaking not to go near John Daly or any member of his family during that time.

APPEAL ADJOURNED FOR TWELVE MONTHS

year old casual farm labourer breached a barring order and attempted to set fire to the family home on June 19th last.

Terence Condon, 14 St. Martin's Terrace, Dungarvan appealed against the severity of prison sentences totalling twelve months which had been imposed on him in the District Court on June 23rd arising out of the incident.

Condon was sentenced to six months for being in breach of a Court Barring Order in respect of a house at Car-

twelve months for committing damage, by arson, to the house on the same occasion.

Garda John Fleming told the court that Condon, who has been in custody since June 23rd, went to his wife's home at Carriglea on June 19th, threw petrol into a bedroom and set fire to it. Only a portion of the bedroom, however, was damaged to the extent of about £400.

Sgt. David Sheehan said Condon has a severe drink problem but is most remorseful about this incident.

When the appellant gave an undertaking to the court that he will stay away from the family home and from his wife, and that within one year he pays £400 compensation for the damage caused, Judge Diarmuid Sheridan adjourned the appeal for twelve months and remanded Condon on his own bail of £500.

Good Time To Be A Supergrass

If you plan to sow a lawn then August is a good time to do it — and July is the last chance for the groundwork.

Preparation is vital to ensure that the lawn establishes well before winter and endures the years ahead, come snow or drought.



You should actually begin preparation some six weeks beforehand but a bit of extra effort should claw back some time.

DIGGING

The site needs digging over to one-spade depth, which is going to be hard after warm weather, but don't be tempted to use a mechanical digger — they tend to spread weeds and compact soil.

If you are fortunate and the ground is wet, you still need to avoid treading down the soil — use a broad plank to stand on as you work.

While you are digging, work in well-rotted compost or manure before raking the newly-turned site into a fine crumbly consistency. Then leave it for a few weeks, apart from removing new weeds.

TYPE

Meanwhile, you should also decide on the type of lawn you need — what you have pictured is probably in the bowling green class and the required mixture will be something with fescue and bent varieties.

However, you need to be realistic if you have a family and pets who are likely to give the lawn a pounding — choose a coarser rye grass mixture which will establish and recover from damage quickly.

Of course, there are 'shades' between both extremes and you will find many mixtures in shops and garden centres — check the package or ask for more advice there.

ACCURATELY

At least by sowing a lawn rather than laying turves, you can more accurately dictate the type of lawn you end up with.

Once the seed is chosen, wait for a calm day when the soil is moist — a course of watering beforehand will help — and sow around an ounce and a half per square yard unless there is a recommended density for the particular mixture.

Gently rake the soil to cover the seed and protect from birds. Use fine netting and string out some foil and other debris to flutter in the breeze — don't rely on reassurances that the seed has been treated with repellent!

RANDOM

Cats can be put off digging the soft ground by laying canes and sticks at random over the site — the fussy felines will find somewhere with fewer obstacles.

When the blades of young grass reach 1.5 inches high give them a light rolling in dry conditions, but do not

mow until they reach three inches.

Once the lawn is established, look after it by never cutting it short in dry weather, keeping it well-watered and occasionally adding a liquid feed. — ARTHUR HINES.

Cllr. Mary Dixon said the discontinuation of the quarterly car tax is an attack on

the working class and will lead to a dramatic increase in the number of untaxed cars.

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan described the move as "a retrograde step" that is designed to make life easier for civil servants who are not exactly overworked.



Ring Oyster Festival Ready To Roll

Five Days Of Action Packed Festivities

The only Oyster Festival to be held in an official Gaeltacht is ready to role in Ring from this Thursday to next Bank Holiday Monday.

Details of the five-day festival, of which Guinness Group Sales are the main sponsors, were outlined at a press conference at Tigh An Cheoil in Baile na nGall last Monday evening by its organiserin-chief Frank Cooney, who has strung together five days of action-packed festivities.

The official opening takes place on Friday evening and will be jointly performed by former world oyster opening champion, John Cummins from Clarinbridge, Co. Galway and John Hales, Guinness Area Sales Representative.

though the other Gaeltacht hostelries will also be providing music throughout the

festival.

Other highlights include a sea angling competition on Saturday sponsored by O'Brien's of Clonmel, an oyster opening championship on the same afternoon, the crowning of the Oyster Festival Queen on Sunday evening followed by a gala concert featuring many of the top traditional musicians in the country.

At present the old and infirm have to negotiate a difficult, steep stairway, just in order to visit their local GP in the local community hall, and there are no proper existing remedial services available.



Ballinroad School was the first national school in the parish and according to information handed down it was in existence for about fifty years before closing down in the late twenties. Its official name was the Garrynageeragh School House. It was a oneteacher school and although education was not compulsory then, many of the parents sent their children to school there.

The first teacher here was Mr. Murphy who was eventually replaced by Mr. Paddy Cahill, who was a brother of Mr. John Cahill a well-known figure in Abbeyside in the twenties and thirties. He was followed by Mr. Paddy Cashin who remained until the closure of the school. It was a mixed school and there was some interchanging of pupils between Garrynageeragh and Ballinacourty. The opening of the new school in Garranbane in 1923 heralded the end of Garrynageeragh school which served as an unofficial parish hall for many years afterwards. Mike Veale's grandmother supplied welcome cups of tea to those participating in the many events staged in the hall for many years. I'm sure they were very much appreciated.





COUNTY BOARD MEETING

Eamon Murphy, Chairman, presided at last week's meeting of the Senior Board, which was held in Dungarvan.

BALLYGUNNER MOTION

The motion from the county champions club, took a most unexpected turn when after a 50 minute debate it was withdrawn by the sponsoring club.

The motion, which sought to have the county senior hurling selectors and manager removed, was moved by Frankie King who outlined his club's reasons for putting the motion. He said that when a business or an undertaking of any kind was doing badly, as was our senior hurling fortunes at the present time, it became an inevitable consequence that changes would be called for to put the matter

When the Chairman called for a seconder there was no response for some time and the motion looked like going by default when Fiona McDonnell, popular young secretary of the Tallow Club seconded the proposition.

Joe Byrne, Erin's Own, made a very strong case against the motion, as did other speakers who included Phil Fanning, Jimmy O'Gorman, S. O'Brien, etc. and with practically no support for the motion, the mover agreed to withdraw it, and the second motion from the club on the understanding that a motion relating to the appointment and the role of county selectors, appointed in the future, would be debated by the County Board later in the

The outcome of the motion was surprising in that it had been very strongly rumoured that it might receive the necessary two-thirds majority. Most clubs had discussed the motion at committee level and many, according to information, had pledged support. This most certainly was not reflected in the tone of the discussions at the County Board meeting. What was also surprising was the number of absentees from

the meeting. When Jimmy O'Gorman, Chairman of the County Selection Committee, rose to speak after the matter had been decided, the Chairman said that the discussion was closed and he would not allow further contributions. Jimmy persisted in trying to speak and when he refused to resume his seat, the County Chairman declared the meeting adjourned.

Justin Spratt, former county and Brickey footballer who chaired the special committee set up to run the golf classic was present at the meeting to hand over a cheque amounting to more than £10,500 which were the proceeds of the very successful venture.

Justin expressed the wish that our county teams would soon start winning again this was what the public generally and our loyal supporters in particular wanted to see. He also informed the Board that a sum of £1,000 had been handed over to ladies football.

The Co. Chairman thanked the committee on behalf of the Board and said that the financial help was greatly appreciated.

ITEMS NOT DISCUSSED

Because of the abrupt ending to the meeting a number of items were not discussed. These included the election of minor and under-21 hurling selection committees

and a report on the progress of the championships and leagues. This latter item would undoubtedly have aroused an amount of heated discussion, given the widespread dissatisfaction at the way that the senior and intermediate championships are moving.

SPECIAL CONVENTION

At the next meeting of the Board, delegates will hear a motion from the Tramore Club asking for the holding of a special convention to deal with the organisation of the 1994 county championships.

This, I understand, will include a discussion on championship structures, proper synchronising of our competitions and proper regulagoverning postponements, cancellations and refixtures, etc. Very many clubs will welcome such a motion which may be the cause of streamlining our activities, etc.

APPEALS

The appeal by the Kilrossanty Club against County Bord na n-Og which was deferred from the previous meeting, was again deferred to give all concerned a chance of resolving the matter. The Chairman warned that if a resolution of the problem was not reported within a couple of weeks, he would rule on the matter.

An appeal submitted by Tramore Club against the awarding of their football county final to Stradbally, was similarly dealt with.

Fantastic SALE Ordination Of Bishop William Lee

The new Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, Father William Lee, was ordained Bishop by his predecessor, Dr. Michael Russell, assisted by the Papal Nuncio to Ireland, Dr. Emmanuel Gerada, and the Archbishop of Cashel, Dr. Dermot Clifford, at the Cathedral, Waterford in the presence of a huge gathering on Sunday last. Cardinal Cahal Daly presided and gave the homily at the ceremony.

The Holy Trinity Cathedral, Waterford, is this year celebrating its 200th anniversary. The building is a unique treasure of the Irish Catholic Church. It was the first post-Penal cathedral built in the country. Its architect, John Roberts, had earlier designed the city's Church of Ireland cathedral, Christ Church. As an Anglican, his ideas of church architecture would have been drawn mainly from that tradition. This probably accounts for the classical simplicity of the design and the inclusion of gal-leries, which makes Holy Trinity unlike any other Catholic Cathedral in Ireland.

The ordination ceremony followed immediately after the Gospel of the Mass.

An Taoiseach, Mr. Albert Reynolds, led the representation by the State, which also included the Minister for the Environment, Mr. Michael Smith, and the Minister of State at the Department of Agriculture, Mr. Brian O'Shea.

A strong ecumenical repre-sentation included the Bishop of Cashel and Waterford, Rt. Rev. Noel Willoughby; the Dean of Waterford, Very Rev. W.B.A. Neill; the Dean of Lismore, Very Rev. Cecil
