C Committee row Down

A defiant Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee threw down the gauntlet to the Minister for Education last Friday by appointing a temporary acting CEO to take up duty on September 1.

The appointment, however, will require the sanction of the Minister, Niamh Breathnach, and that isn't at all certain to be forthcoming.

The Minister has already indicated in writing to the VEC of her intention — as a temporary measure — to hand over the administrative affairs of the Committee to the present City of Waterford Chief Executive Offi-

That decision has been strenuously opposed however by the committee, and Friday's decision to go ahead and appoint a temporary CEO could well set the scene for a head-on confrontation between the Minister and the VEC.

The decision to appoint a temporary CEO was pro-posed by Cllr. Lar Hart and carried on a 11-5 vote.

Earlier Cllr. Paddy Kenneally had proposed that before making any appointment they should request a meeting with the Minister whom he felt had

been unjustly criticised at

their last meeting. Cllr. Kenneally said that if they met the Minister they might well avoid the con-frontational situation that is clearly looming.

Cllr. Hart however, said they been "pussyfooting" around over the appointment of a temporary CEO for far too long, and it was time they went ahead and made the appointment.

There were five applicants for the post, but two of them, Paudie Geary and Austin Flynn (both members of the VEC), withdrew

In the end it boiled down to a straight vote between the present principal at

Dungarvan Technical College, Mr. Kieran Heffernan, and the Committee's senior staff officer Ms. Margaret McGrath.

In the subsequent vote Mr. Heffernan was appointed by nine votes to seven.

Cllr. Nora Flynn welcomed the fact that a decision had finally been taken to make the appointment. "I sincerely hope the Minister will now sanction it", she

LACK OF ROAD MAINTENANCE

Dear Sir,

I have recently returned from a short holiday in Ireland, having decided to take the scenic route from Youghal to Cappoquin via the Blackwater and the surrounding countryside. Having been to Ireland on previous occasions I was appalled to note the total lack of maintenance of the narrow roads, margins and grass verges; to such an extent that the beauty of the area was scarcely visible, and the roads were dangerous due to the difficulty in determining where the road was leading. To encounter another vehicle resulted in either one or the other of us being placed into the hedgerow or nearly into a ditch.

This particular area of Ire-

land, although little known to the "tourist," is one of the most beautiful and the welcome of the people one of the most friendliest. It is a shame to find the authorities are neglecting their heritage and do not appear to encourage the "tourist" who seeks nothing more than to rest, relax, savour the countryside and spend their money!

I noted that the major roads were being improved with the help of the European Economic Community but it would be shortsighted to do this unless access from them into the countryside is also taken account of. A road that leads to nowhere is no road at all.

If I return to Ireland I would hope to see the situation improved so that the

people who live and work in the area as well as the "tourist" will be able to go about their business in safety and with less concern for the safety of their children.

Little Wonder We All Enjoy These **Plants**

August is a great opportunity to take geranium cuttings and dramatically increase your stock for next year.

These versatile plants, more correctly known as pelargoniums, are proba-

bly second only to fuchsias as the most commor plant found in Irish homes and gardens.

It is not hard to see why, when they have so many advantages:

- * A huge range of colours and types of bloom.
- * Often strong leaf markings or variegations.
- * Easy to propagate through cuttings or, increasingly, seed.
- ★ Can bloom all year in a sunny indoor location.
- ★ Tolerate some neglect overwatering is worse than forgetting to!

The regal varieties, with their large showy blooms, have become particularly popular recently, though they are less durable and tend to prefer the green-

lvy-leaved types have less striking flowers but their trailing nature, delicate blooms and sometimes variegated leaves, make them ideal for boxes and hanging baskets - they are the frequent choice for 'tucking through' the base of baskets.

Despite poor blooms, scented geraniums have gained popularity lately through the lovely fragrances given off by their leaves.

They are just as easily grown, but conservatories are the best locations to make the most of their scents during warm weather.

The plants tend to be sold by more specialised garden centres and nurseries where you will find the scents range from common fragrances such as orange and lemon, to spicy ones such as nutmeg. So, geraniums seem perfect, but they have a weakness — overwatering.

Water thoroughly when the soil or compost is reasonably dry and then leave them until they dry out again.

Never mist them, cover or subject them to humid conditions either or you risk stem rot and infectious leaf mould such as botrytis. In the case of stem rot or black leg, there is no cure and the plant must be

The latter can be cured by removing diseased leaves, easing up on watering, creating more air around the plants and spraying with fungicide. Underwatering is less serious and usually gives due warning when leaf edges stiffen and start to

When taking cuttings, you can pot up lots of small ones providing they are sturdy and healthy. You don't need rooting hormone.

After overwintering, be ready to pinch back the young plants to keep them bushy. You should also delay repotting until the plant shows signs of becoming pot-bound.

Geraniums are mostly propagated from cuttings but more gardeners are using seed - F1 hybrids are particularly popular.

Sow in January or February and maintain a temperature of around 22C for germination and they will flower the following summer.

When it's too late for breakfast, and not nearly time for lunch - try these tasty dishes out on the family.

BACON

Ingredients:

8 oz (225g) smoked bacon, from a joint or back rashers, roughly chopped.

1 large potato, boiled and mashed

1 egg, lightly beaten 2 tbs parsley, chopped 1 small onion, finely chopped

salt and freshly ground black pepper oil for frying



Method:

Mix all the ingredients together and either mince or place in a food processor for 10 seconds. Form into six cakes and shallow fry gently for 10 to 15 minutes until golden browne and cooked through. Serve hot. Serves 6

BRUNCH LOAF Ingredients:

8 rashers bacon



1 small French bread stick

2 oz butter, softened 1 tbs parsley, chopped 1 clove garlic, crushed

Method:

Mix together the butter, parsley and garlic. Make eight equally spaced cuts into the bread, leaving the base crust uncut.

Spread parsley butter in each slice and reshape the loaf. Wrap securely in foil and place in the oven, at 375 degree, F (190° C) gas mark 5, for about 20 minutes. Meanwhile, grill or fry the bacon rashers. Unwrap the bread and place a rasher between each slice. Serve immediately.

Waterford Foods plc, Ireland's leading dairy group, is to raise IR£15m through the issue to Preference Shares. It has also applied for admission to the Official List of the Stock Exchange in both Dublin and London.

Waterford proposes raising IR£15 million through the issue of 15 million Preference Shares at IR£1 per share. The Preference Shares will carry the right to a fixed annual dividend of 9 per cent and will have

a final maturity of 21 years. The Preference dividend

may be varied by Waterford from the 7th and 14th years and investors will have the option of requiring Waterford to redeem or purchase the Preference Shares in these years.

The Preference Share issue, as part of shareholders' funds, will improve the Group's borrowings to shareholders' funds ratio and will not dilute ordinary shareholders' interest in the Group.

AIB Capital Markets has procured institutional investors for the issue and is also an investor itself.

The Preference Share issue, which has been ar-

ranged by AIB Corporate Finance through Goodbody Stockbrokers, is subject to the approval of Waterford's shareholders at an Extraordinary General Meeting on 17th August 1993.

Waterford has applied to the Stock Exchange for admission of its A Ordinary Shares to the Official List in both Dublin and London. Dealings are expected to commence on 26th August, 1993. While rural development schemes are essential and necessary, it is only by protecting and further developing main stream agriculture that rural areas will be saved, concluded Mr. O'Dwyer.

Resumption Of Beef Exports To Iran Will Boost Cattle Prices

The Chairman of the ICMSA Livestock Committee, Mr. Nicholas Ryan has welcomed the agreement for a resumption of beef exports to Iran. This trade was worth over £140m. in 1989 and has been a major loss to Ireland since its suspension in 1989.

"The resumption of this important export market for Irish beef comes at a critical time for Irish cattle producers with just one month before the commencement of the peak cattle slaughtering period. With access to intervention curtailed as a result

of the CAP Reform the resumption of this market should provide a boost to the cattle trade during the autumn period," said Mr. Ryan.

He concluded by calling on Irish meat processors to actively pursue contracts in the Iranian market which would be available to provide a much-needed outlet for Irish beef over the coming months and thereby reduce our dence on beef intervention.

Area Aid Shock For Beef Farmers

Mr. Nicholas Ryan, Chairman of the ICMSA Livestock Committee said that he would not comment on what he called "pure speculation." He was referring to a report in this week's issue of the Irish Farmers' Journal that EC Farm Commissioner, Rene Steichen, wants area aid payments instead of premiums in the beef sector.

He said that the ink is hardly dry on a CAP Reform agreement, which was only pushed through after many months of hard negotiations and he would not expect the Commission to be so short sighted as to seek radical changes immediately.


"From our contacts with senior Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry staff I believe there is absolutely no foundation to these rumours," said Mr. Ryan.

Welcome For Ewe Premium Repayments

The Chairman of the ICMSA Sheep Committee, Mr. Eamon O'Rourke, has welcomed the announcement by the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Mr. Joe Walsh that the payment of both the first and second instalments of the ewe premium began on Monday, July 26, 1993. He complimented the Minister for the speedy payments which he said would be most welcome for sheep farmers.

Farmers outside disadvantaged areas will receive £11.74 per ewe while those inside disadvantaged areas will benefit from the rural world premium of £4.83 per ewe bringing the total payment to £16.57 per ewe.

Mr. O'Rourke warned farmers that the second advance was being paid early this year and that they will not get another payment until the final payment is made in the second quarter in 1994.

The Right To Read ____And Write ____

CAUSES AND EXTENT In last week's article we focussed on the practical and personal effects on

reading and writing difficulties. This week we will take a closer look at what are the underlying causes of these

difficulties and the extent of the problem in Ireland.

Research has consistently highlighted a correlation between limited reading and writing ability and other factors such as poverty, unemployment and social class background. However, research also shows that those with reading and writing difficulties tend to blame themselves rather than the system which caused and re-inforced their problem. Many of them said that they contributed to their problem by "mitching" and "messing" at school.

Some thought of themselves as "slow," while others said that extreme shyness and a retiring personality had held them back from learning during their years at school.

Yet when we look more carefully at their accounts of their years in the formal education system it soon becomes apparent physical punishment, large classes, the lack of special attention and "being left at the back of the class" were the real causes. While some missed a considerable amount of time in school through illness or truancy, many were at pains to emphasise that they were regular attenders. "I never mitched a day" is a comment which is often repeated. Their accounts reveal a tremendous amount about the way in which the education system fails to cater for children with special learning needs.

When considering those who missed attending school for considerable periods, it is now generally accepted that health problems are the usual causes. Prolonged or repeated illness can result in the loss of schooling for months or years. On its own, such absences are not necessarily catastrophic, but combined with non existent or inadequate remedial services, it meant that for many people they fell further and further behind those of their own age. As one person commented, "Once you're one step behind, a year later

you're two steps back."

LACK OF SUPPORT

Another reason which is often cited for non-attendance is the lack of family support. For example some children are taken out of school at an early age in order to mind other children because one or both parents were ill, out working or otherwise absent from the home. In addition to the issue of attendance, the lack of parental support was experienced with regard to

perienced with regard to homework and additional help with lessons.

Some parents showed little interest because they were unsure of their own reading and writing abilities

skills. Whatever the causes, the results are all too frequent. Recent estimates for the country as a whole suggest that between 100,000 and 400,000 Irish adults encountered some difficulty when confronted with everyday tasks that involve reading and writing. The latest survey of reading and writing providers reveals that just over 4,000 of those who might benefit are actually receiving some form of tuition in a variety of settings, including voluntary literacy schemes, VEC schools, youth training workshops, and ReHab cen-

National Bat Survey

— Dispel The Myths!

The months of July and August normally conjure up images of long lazy days and short nights and a period when most people take their annual holiday. But for those involved with collecting information for the National Bat Survey, it is the busiest time of the year.

This is the ninth year of the bat survey which is organised and conducted by the officers and rangers of the National Parks and Wildlife Service of the Office of Public Works.

The aim of the survey is to locate roosts of the seven species of bat that occur in Ireland, including two species that are common in this country but rarely recorded elsewhere in Europe.

All seven species of bat found in Ireland are protected under the 1976 Wildlife Act, and anyone planning to carry out repair work on a building with bats, and if the intended work is likely to affect the bats, then the National Park and Wildlife Service should be contacted.

Another important aim of the survey is to help the public with any problems they may have with bats, as well as dispelling the many myths that surround these animais (they are not blind and do not get caught in people's hair). Indeed, it is easy to promote bats as environmentally friendly as they eat millions of insects over the summer and so control insect numbers, even their droppings can be recycled as the perfect organic fertiliser!

The County Board still expect that a pressure-programme to be launched shortly will ensure that lost time is made up and the championship will conclude on time, more or less.

After what happened to Waterford's two representatives, (Dungarvan, football and Ballygunner, hurling), last year, the county fixtures committee were rapped on the knuckles. Let's hope that this does not happen again.

Thankfully we have a good enough programme of Western Board matches fixed for the coming weekend and all three matches on the Cappoquin field programme'should be worth seeing, even though the afternoon games will have to compete with television as the All-Ireland hurling semi-finals are being shown live.

SENIOR FOOTBALL

The Nire team got off to a flying start in the senior football championship last week-end when they resumed after a fourteen weeks break. They now feature in two of the three matches listed for the coming week-end and will be favourites to win both and guarantee their place in the

knockout stages.
On tonight (Wednesday) at Kilmacthomas they play Gaultier and while they cer-tainly wont find it easy, they should collect the points to bring their numbers of league table points to 6. That figure will be increased to 8 after they have played Tramore on Tuesday next week. I cannot recall a championship game be-tween the Nire and Gaultier over the past four of five years (for some strange reason they have avoided meeting), but last year when the Nire played Tramore the result was 2-14 to 1-2 in favour of the Western team.

Fishery Officer Knocked Unconscious In Violent Confrontation

taken by ambulance to the Waterford Regional Hospital. One was subsequently released but the other was detained in the intensive care unit.

The incidents are the latest, and most serious yet, in a number of physical confrontations that have taken place along the West Waterford coast in recent years involving Southern Regional Fishery Board officers and fishermen.

Garda Inspector Michael Blake told the "Leader" that fullscale garda investigations into both incidents are now under way, but he insisted that, as yet, there is nothing to directly link them.

The violence in which the two fishery officers, Michael Hickey and John Flynn, were injured, erupted around mid-day. Six officers in two patrol boats under Inspector Edward Haley were operating in an area known as Muggorts Bay when they approached three Helvick-based fishing trawlers.

The fishery officers alleged that they met with

strong resistance when attempts were made to board them. Fishery Officer Hickey was knocked unconscious from a blow of an iron bar while Fishery Officer Flynn received hand injuries.

He toppled over into the sea and had to be rescued by colleagues and taken into one of the patrol boats.

The officers have claimed that they were then stoned, and with an already tense situation becoming more potentially explosive with every passing second they backed off.

The trawlers then made their way back to Helvick but were trailed at a distance by the patrol boats. A number of uniformed and plain clothes gardai were at the harbour when the trawlers berthed but the situation was reported then to be calm.

À day of drama began at 3 a.m. when an eighteen foot salmon fishing boat was seen blazing in its berth in Helvick harbour. The alarm was raised and a unit of Dungarvan Fire Brigade was quickly at the scene. Dungarvan gardai were also alerted and a number of officers hurriedly made their

way to the harbour

Despite the prompt arrival of the fire brigade the boat was then ablaze and there was nothing the firemen could do to save it.

The boat, which is owned by Pascal Callaghan, 71 Mountain View, Carrick-on-Suir, Co. Tipperary, was unoccupied at the time.

"It was completely destroyed and the damage has been put between £6,000 and £7,000", Inspector Blake said.

STARTED MALICIOUSLY

The Inspector confirmed that the garda belief is that the fire was started maliciously but admitted that the are not, as yet, following any definite line of inquiry.

Inspector Blake said they have not yet established a

link between the two incidents, but promised the fullest possible garda investigations.

On the previous afternoon officers of the Southern Regional Fisheries Board also boarded a trawler two miles off Helvick and seized a quantity of monofilament nets. That seizure however was completely without incident.

Last Wednesday's violence highlights yet again the explosive situation that has existed between fishery officers and fishermen operating along the West Waterford coast for a number of years past.

During this time there have been jailings, fines totalling many thousands of pounds, while several fishermen have had their licences suspended.
