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Brand New Health Centre For Lismore

Everything comes to those who wait. That may well be the general reaction in Lismore to the confirmation by the South Eastern Health Board that the picturesque Heritage Town is to be given a long overdue brand new Health Centre.

A tender for the proposed Centre, which will be located at Parks Road, has been accepted by the Health Board, and the expectation is that work on its construction will begin next month.

The new centre will incorporate a GP's surgery and a trainee GP's surgery, a dental recovery room and a dental store. A section of the centre will be exclusively used for psychiatric services and in addition there will be consulting rooms for clinics.

Local County Councillor, Ollie Wilkinson, who had vociferously denounced the absence of a properly equipped Health Centre in the town at several Waterford County Council meetings, has welcomed the decision of the Health Board to build a new, ultra modern centre.

"We may have had to wait, but at least it's better late

than never," said Cllr. Wilkinson.

The newly-elected Chairperson of Lismore Town Commissioners, Mrs. Mary Ryan, has also voiced her approval and said a powerful local lobby campaign had finally paid dividends.

Meanwhile the South East-

ern Health Board has also confirmed that it is to locate a cardiac ambulance in Dungarvan that will cater for the West Waterford region, including the towns of Cappoquin, Lismore and Tallow.

Dungarvan-based staff are presently participating in training courses to ensure they will be equipped to run the service. However, it may not be up and running until early in 1994.

Dept. Of Education Accused Of Undermining Vocational Education System In West Waterford

With relations between the Department of Education and the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee already strained, a prominent member of the

VEC has now accused the Department of attempting to undermine the whole vocational educational system in the West Waterford region.

The accusation has been levelled by Cllr. Nora Flynn of Cappoquin, one of the sixteen members of the VEC.

Cllr. Flynn said that over the years they had seen vocational schools in Cappoquin and Tallow closed down, and today Dungarvan Technical College remains the only educational establishment in the entire West Waterford region under the control of the Committee.

She said that for several years the VEC had been unsuccessfully endeavouring to convince the Department of the urgent need of a new school in Dungarvan. Student enrolment numbers at the technical college presently stand at a record high, and only through the provision of a plethora of pre-fab classrooms has it been possible to cope with the acute accommodation problems.

"Notwithstanding that, and the availability of a site purchased by the VEC from Dungarvan Urban

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Cllr. O'Riordan Now "Out On A Limb"

Dungarvan Fine Gael urban councillor Michael O'Riordan has acknowledged that he is "out on a limb" within the organisation in the Waterford constituency as far as his call for an amalgamation with the Progressive Democrats to form a new political party is concerned.

There has been mounting criticism of Cllr. O'Riordan's call for an FG merger with the PDs, and even stronger criticism of his suggestion that the newly merged party should be under the leadership of Desmond O'Malley.

In an interview on local radio in Waterford, last week he admitted that there is little or no support for his views within Fine

Gael in Waterford, but he remained adamant that there is a strong body of backing for the formation of a new political party with the PDs at all levels of Fine Gael outside Waterford.

Cllr O'Riordan said the party had lost ten seats in the last General Election, five in the election before that, and in little over a decade support among the electorate for Fine Gael has plummeted from 38% to 19%.

Tallow-based county councillor William McDonnell, who has been a member of Fine Gael for almost forty years, said last week that he is angered and outraged by the comments of Cllr. O'Riordan.

NOT REAL FINE GAEL MAN

Cllr. McDonnell said Cllr. O'Riordan was never a "real Fine Gael man" and alleged that he had been "pushed" into the party by the former Minister for Agriculture Deputy Austin Deasy.

"It was bad enough for him to suggest the Fine Gael should surrender its political identity and form a new party with the PDs, but his suggestion that the leadership of that new party should be given to Desmond O'Malley is the final straw as far as I am concerned," Cllr. McDonnell said.

He confirmed his intention to raise the matter at the next meeting of the Constituency Executive of Fine

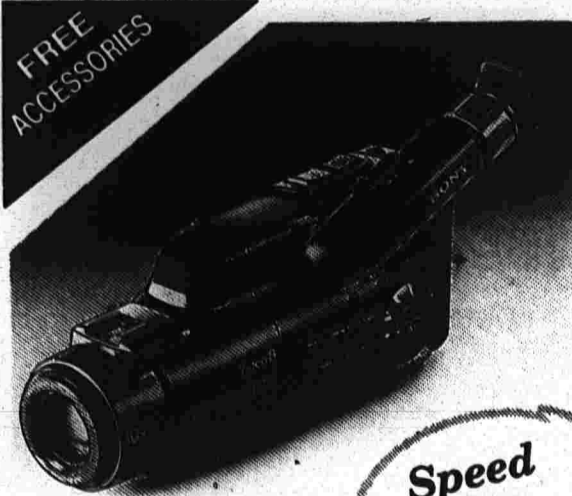


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Plant A Hedge To Attract The Birds

Everything looks tidy. The lawn is immaculately trim. The roses have gone blooming mad, the vegetables are laden with produce and the fences straight and true.

Still, something seems to be missing. The fact is that modern tools and more leisure time have made it easier to create an apparently perfect garden, only to find that by taming nature we have created something sterile.

Gone are the birds, wild flower varieties, butterflies and bees that perhaps gave a garden character. It's not the fault of the individual, but the environmental damage done

by pollution and building development. However the individual can help by taking a greener approach to managing his little piece of land.

To attract more birds and insects, plant a hedge — the extra work in trimming and clearing out below will be repaid by birdsong and the natural look of the hedge.

Hedges are the ideal refuge for timid birds such as wrens or less familiar town birds such as tits, wagtails and finches, which have brighter plumage than humble sparrows and starlings. In the case of ornamental rose hedging (*Rosa Rugosa*) the simple but abundant flowers and the deterrent effect of the thorny stems are a particular bonus. Encourage birds by putting up nesting boxes. These are made easily using scraps of timber, but find a reference book for dimensions and locations suiting different species. The size of the opening can also make the difference between creating a palace for a homely sparrow or a blue tit.

In case of difficulty, contact the RSPB (Royal Society for the Protection of Birds) at The Lodge, Sandy, Beds. SG19 2DL.

It may sound odd, but wild flower seed is widely available in special mixes containing, for example, nectar producers to attract bees and butterflies. However, some can be expensive and you may not be pleased with the results — some "wild flowers" are regarded as weeds.

A halfway house is to sow herbs which attract bees. Those which also offer lovely fresh herbs for the kitchen are — marjoram, chives, fennel, thyme, mint — best sown in a tub or it will overrun everything else — rosemary, rue and sage. Some can also be dried for use during winter.

Bees also love poppies, yarrow and the big puff-balls produced by onions.

Butterflies have other preferences and one of the best known as buddleia. They also like the yellow blooms of the leathery-leaved senecio, though the plant does need a sunny spot.

Other butterfly "magnets" include — marigolds, dahlias, wall flowers, phlox and Michaelmas daisies.

Melleray Grotto Mission

Tourists, travellers and visitors to the famous Cistercian Monastery of Mount Melleray in Co. Waterford often pause to enquire as they witness the constant activity at a little wayside grotto, a mile from the Abbey, at the foot of Melleray Hill. Curiosity often leads them down the short avenue to the shrine where they kneel to pray and discover the heavenly peace that is the hallmark of

this holy place. A note of mild complaint can be detected in their oft repeated question: "why didn't we hear of this wonderful place before?"

It is eight years now since it all began and the pilgrim tide never ceases to flow. It matches the mood of the modest Monavugga stream which gushes past the shrine with constant regularity. Buses, vans and cars bring hundreds of pilgrims,

especially at weekends. Munster finals, Leinster finals, Connacht finals, Ulster finals may be on, but the traffic at the grotto never stops.

Saturday night vigils are very special and attract throngs from Donegal to Antrim, from Derry to Kerry. Many overseas visitors have heard of it and come to honour Mary at this modern Irish shrine.

HOLY MESSAGES

Our Lady gave many grave and holy messages at this shrine in 1985 to two young local boys, Tom Cliffe and

Barry Buckley. They echo the gospel, repeat what Our Lady said at Fatima and La Salette, and yet have a special Irish flavour.

A Novena of prayer at the grotto (August 16 to 24) is being organised by the committee to honour the 8th Anniversary. Prayers will be conducted every afternoon (3 to 5 p.m.) and night (8 to 10 p.m.)

A Taste Of Greece



This tasty dish will bring back memories of holidays in the sun. And it's really easy to cook.

MOUSSAKA

Ingredients:

- 2 aubergines
- 2 tbs (30 ml) oil
- 1 onion, chopped
- 5 tbs (750 ml) oats
- 12 oz (300g) minced beef
- salt and pepper
- 1/2 cup beef stock
- 2 tbs (30ml) tomato puree
- 4 tomatoes, skinned
- 1 egg
- 2 tbs (30 ml) milk
- 1 1/4 oz (30g) grated cheese



Method: Slice aubergines, fry lightly in oil. Drain well and arrange in base of casserole. Fry onion,

beef and oats until beef is browned. Spread evenly over aubergines, season well. Mix stock and puree and pour over meat.

Cover with a layer of sliced tomatoes. Beat egg, milk and cheese and pour over. Bake at 350°F, 180°C, gas mark 4 for 40-50 minutes.

The Right To Read And Write

In our previous articles on the subject of adult learning we looked at the practical and personal effects of problems with reading and writing and then we went on to examine the underlying causes and the extent of the problem in Ireland.

This week we will focus on the benefits of tuition and describe the experiences of the students themselves in their own words.

Irrespective of their intentions when they enrol, generally, students experience the benefits of tuition in a variety of ways. Tuition is a developmental process that affects all aspects of their lives. Many students are pleasantly surprised when they find that their new reading and writing skills enhance their self-confidence, broaden their horizons and give them a new way of looking at the world.

These benefits can be examined under three main headings — practical results, personal achievements and a sense of greater participation in the community.

PRACTICAL RESULTS

The need for literacy skills to fulfil parental roles was one of the most common reasons given by students for going into tuition. It is not surprising to find that these uses of reading and writing are among the most lauded and frequently cited benefits. Reading bed-time stories to children, helping them with homework and dealing with letters to and from school were all seen as important achievements.

"Now I'll sit down with the kids and read something for them. And I'll look at the word now, if it's a big word, and I'll get it. Eventually I'll get it you know. And for writing the note to the teacher, I'm starting now to try writing notes which I would never do before. I'd say to Jack 'You write it.' Now my husband says to me, 'No, you write it.'" (Ester, aged 27).

For Billy being able to read his daughter's storybook was the achievement he valued most. In part, the importance of this outcome was related to his perceived failure as a father in raising his eldest son.

"Well, I suppose the single most important thing for me was that I was able to pick up my little girl's storybook and read a story to her. That meant, you know, a hell of a lot to me. Before, I wouldn't even dream of doing it, but now, I would do it without even thinking. Where I should have done it was with the eldest lad. I'd have liked to be able. But I couldn't and I didn't. Now I'm trying to make up for it."

The importance of reading and writing skills as part of

overall parental skills is obvious as we read these accounts. However, among other practical outcomes is that students felt that tuition helped them — apply for the jobs they want; fill in forms; deal with business and legal transactions; shop more effectively; cook from recipes, order a meal from a menu. The practical benefits are numerous.

PERSONAL ACHIEVEMENTS

In a recent survey it was found that every one of the students interviewed acknowledged that coming for help with reading and writing had changed the way they felt about themselves. The sheer variety of ways in which students expressed their perceptions in this area is striking. Students reported that they now feel: greater self confidence/self-esteem; more independent; happy and relaxed in themselves; a person in their own right; able to face up to others and speak their mind.

As one student aptly put it: "I mean before I came here, I didn't think that I had any life. I was terrified. Now the little bit of reading has given me more confidence in myself."

It is interesting to note that for some students on the scheme, the decision to enrol coincided with other traumatic changes in their lives such as the death of a close relative or a prolonged period of unemployment. Although these personal issues were not addressed directly during tuition, many students clearly believed that coming to the classes contributed to their success in managing a demanding life transition. For example, Carmel spoke in these words:

"It made me realise that I am an independent person and I can get up and do things. I thought that I needed to lean on someone. As a matter of fact I didn't really need to. Now I can stand on my own two feet."

GREATER PARTICIPATION IN THE COMMUNITY

It may not be so obvious, but one of the results of participation in tuition is that students comments suggest that they are now taking a more active role in their dealings with both the people around them and their physical environment. It appears that students place value on their achievements not only because they feel better in themselves but also because they feel more at ease in particular social settings.

"I'm able to go shopping with my mates now. I'll go down town and have a look around the shops. I can look at the prices and see whether it's nylon or cotton — you need to know all these little

things that people take for granted."

"I can go into the bookies at my ease. If the lads say 'what do you think of the chances for that horse,' it's great to be able to take up the paper and give my opinion. It's not that I learned in order to back more horses. But before, I was terrified and the wife had to place the bets for me."

"I was never interested in politics and current affairs and all about local groups and organisations because I could never read about them. Now I'm the first to grab the paper when it comes in and when I'm out for a drink, my friends say that they can't stop me talking and are always asking me to explain things and give my opinion."

Tutors on the schemes are always heartened when they hear of the many success stories. Considerable numbers of students find that they can socialise more easily, do things and visit places that they had previously avoided, and take an interest in a broad range of issues. For many, a willingness to try things and "give

it a go" was seen as an example of the positive impact of literacy learning. These successes may not appear spectacular, but for many people tuition has given them a whole new lease of life.

In next week's article we will take an in-depth look at the services which are available locally.

OUR LOCALITY

Last week we stated that the building of Ballinacourty School began in 1884. When the schoolhouse was opened the first teacher was Mrs. O'Brien whose husband was a sailor and was drowned at sea. She was a sister of Mrs. Crotty who was the principal teacher at Garranbane School in later years. The teacher's salary at that time was approximately £28-5s. per quarter.

Mary Cashin was appointed principal on September 1, 1905. She had been trained in Our Lady of Mercy College, Baggot Street, Dublin. Mrs. Margaret Maher was appointed principal on January 1, 1916. She was trained at Our Lady of Mercy in Blackrock, Dublin in 1904/06. She retired on November 30, 1934. Miss Ellen Power had been appointed junior assistant on October 1, 1924.

Muiris Brennock was appointed principal on December 1, 1934. He had been trained at De La Salle College in Waterford. He left in October 1943 to take up a similar position at Coolnasnear School. Mrs. Catherine Brennock was appointed to the school in November 1943. Margaret C. Browne moved from Garranbane to Ballinacourty on November 22, 1965 and remained there for a couple of years before retiring. On February 1, 1967 Miss Susan Cashman replaced Miss Power and in September of that same year, Mrs. Joan Mansfield came as principal and after a short spell she moved to Abbeyside. Miss Cashman was then temporary princi-

pal with Miss Babs Kiely as temporary assistant until the amalgamation with the Abbeyside schools in 1969.

ABBEYSIDE — A TOWN

In last week's issue having remarked that Abbeyside is not in any way marked by way of a signpost we notice that in the Dungarvan Tourist directory published by the Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce and Industry, Abbeyside is given the status of a town. We quote: "Dungarvan is an ancient and unique town. In fact it is two towns, Dungarvan on the south of the Colligan and Abbeyside to the north now joined by the Causeway and the Devonshire Bridge across the Colligan River flowing into Dungarvan harbour and bay!"

This takes a little effort by way of mental adjustment as historically we have always regarded Dungarvan as being the town and Abbeyside the village. This could have been to our advantage to some extent as being the smaller of the two we received a certain amount of sympathy and not so much was expected of us, achievement wise. Any attempts we made at self-expression were praised and this was enough to provide us with an inner sense of contentment and well being. To be classified as a town upsets that little apple-cart.

It is a fact that the population of Abbeyside has increased dramatically over the years. The 1991 census shows that Abbeyside (No. 2 Urban Dungarvan) had a population of 2,632. The rel-

evant figures for Dungarvan (No. 1 Urban Dungarvan) are 4,288.

However, despite the fact that the population of Abbeyside has mushroomed, there is a tendency to retain the notion that it is still 'The Village.' The term 'the village' reflects a sense of romance about our locality and provides a sense of historical continuity that ensures the identity we always had.

To most of us Dungarvan is still 'The Town' where we go to our workplaces or do the big shopping for the household. All in all, I think Abbeyside people will continue to cleave affectionately to the notion that we live in a village.

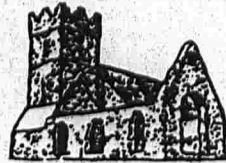
Pattern News

FARMING LEADER

Winter Barley Margin Forecast Down By 40%

IFA Grain Committee Vice-Chairman, John O'Mahoney has dismissed speculation that 1993 may not be such a bad year after all for tillage farmers because of the effects of the Green Pound devaluation earlier this year and the additional prospect of area aid payments.

What people fail to realise is that Mr. O'Mahoney is that tillage farmers' incomes could drop considerably if the forecast for yields decrease in line with Pre-Har-

vest Forum predictions and Teagasc advice. "For instance, he said margins from Winter Barley crops could be down by up to 40% as a result of below-

average yields, with many farmers failing to break even. Very few farmers have exceeded last year's average yield of 3 tonnes/acre with many top growers failing to reach 2.5 tonnes/acre."

The situation is also not very promising for other cereal sectors where margins could fall by 15% on 1992 levels as a result of poorer yields being forecast for this year's harvest, following months of poor winter conditions.

Mr. O'Mahoney concluded by saying that "after some very difficult Winter Barley harvesting conditions and with Winter Oats and Spring Barley harvests expected to begin in the South this week, weather conditions over the next month will play a very important part in cereal growers' incomes this year."

With the Winter Oats harvest expected to begin in the South this week, the Tallow farmer has said that he expects a very strong

trade for quality oats this season. According to Mr. O'Mahoney, good quality oats should be making a minimum of £110/tonne again this year. Already, some growers have been offered £107/tonne.

BONUSES AVAILABLE

Mr. O'Mahoney continued by saying that most private merchants are now quoting between £90-£95/tonne for Feed Barley with many bonuses being available on moisture and transport. According to Mr. O'Mahoney, a minimum of £95/tonne with up to £100/tonne in deficit areas is now justified as barley imports into Ireland are costing a minimum of £120/tonne.

With a number of the large buyers, including the Co-ops, expecting to announce their barley prices this week, Mr. O'Mahoney called on them to pay a minimum of £95/tonne at 20% moisture. He also advised growers who are drying their own grain not to sell it at too low a price off the drier. He added that anybody selling dried grain should not take less than the 1993 intervention price of £114.16 tonne.

Welcome Relief For Cattle Farmers

The Chairman of the ICMSA Livestock Committee, Mr. Nicholas Ryan welcomed the decision by the Minister for Agriculture, Food & Forestry, Mr. Joe Walsh, to accept to introduce the sales docket concession and thereby enable farmers sell cattle earlier than normal.

He warned farmers however that this concession only applied to the Cattle Headage Scheme and that farmers must not sell cattle which they entered for the Special Beef Premium Scheme until the 2 month retention period has expired.

Mr. Ryan said that this decision was a practical one given the difficulties facing farmers due to a shortage of grass and feed arising from the bad weather so far this

summer. He complimented the Minister for his understanding of the issue.

EXTEND CONCESSION TO LIVE EXPORTS

However, Mr. Ryan was critical of the fact that cattle sold directly for live export were not facilitated under the concession. He said that the live export trade has resumed as a major force in the market for cattle and he called on Minister Walsh to extend the concession to live exports.

He said that he had been in contact with the Department on this issue and he advised farmers with cattle suitable for live export and which were not part of an application for beef premium in June this year to contact their local DVO and to make arrangements for live export.

Reduction In Export Funds — Retrograde Move

The Chairman of the ICMSA Committee, Mr. Nicholas Ryan has criticised the decision taken by the EC Commission to reduce export funds on beef by 5 per cent.

He said that he has great difficulty in understanding the logic of the EC Commission which on the one hand is trying to encourage less use of intervention while at the same time cutting export refunds on beef exported outside the Community.

"Given our heavy reliance on intervention in the past this decision is a retrograde step for Irish cattle produc-

ers. This is particularly so given that Ireland has just re-opened trade with Iran which was worth over £140 million in 1989," said Mr. Ryan.

He said rather than cutting export refunds for beef the EC Commission should be actively encouraging the marketing of beef outside the Community as a means of removing some of the surpluses which currently overhang the market.

He concluded by calling on the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Mr. Joe Walsh, to intervene with the EC Commission and to restore the export funds to their former level.

Agri-Environment Scheme Welcomed By ICMSA

Following a meeting to discuss the Agri-Environment Scheme with the Minister for Forestry and Rural Development, Mr. Liam Hyland, the Chairman of the ICMSA Farm Services Committee, Mr. Maurice Harvey said that the Scheme could have enormous benefits for rural people and the rural landscape.

"Everything that is humanely possible should be done to keep people living in rural areas, and schemes such as this, while it is certainly no substitute for core agriculture, can help to provide extra income for rural dwellers," said Mr. Harvey.

He said that the Scheme should be organised so that it operates complimentary to commercial agriculture and does not place undue restrictions on farmers. Many farmers are already farming in a way that respects the environment and the incentives offered under the Agri-Environment Scheme should add further

impetus to this.

FUNDING FOR CONTROL OF FARMYARD POLLUTION ESSENTIAL

Whilst mindful of the fact that much of the finer details of the Scheme have yet to be agreed, Mr. Harvey said that one of the most important actions which the Minister could take on behalf of the environment would be to obtain funding to relaunch the Control of Farmyard Pollution (CFP) Scheme. "Much work has already been done to control farmyard pollution but there is still a huge amount outstanding and the sooner the CFP Scheme is adequately funded the safer our environment will be," said Mr. Harvey.

"Many farmers will simply not be able to avail of the Agri-Environment Scheme unless they have an acceptable pollution control scheme in operation on their farms," concluded Mr. Harvey.

IFA Makes Progress With EC Commission

Waterford IFA County Chairman, Pat Murphy says that significant progress has been made with the EC Commission on what he described as "Key principles in IFA's Charter of Farmers' Rights to CAP compensation payments. Mr. Murphy said: "The EC Commission has accepted the principles of prompt payment of premium, headage and tillage aid, as well as the need for absolute confidentiality and simplicity in the administration of the various schemes."

The IFA Deputy President, Tom Parlon led an IFA delegation at a meeting in Dublin with a top official from the Commission's FEOGA Division, Mr. Martin Newman.

At the meeting the Commission acknowledged the importance of prompt payment and recognised the

cash flow problems which delays in payment create for farmers. In response to these problems, Mr. Newman said the Commission was examining how payments to applicants could be speeded up. IFA proposed that farmers should receive 90% of premium payments due in the year of application rather than 60% as at present.

At the meeting, the Commission also stressed that Member States must at all times ensure confidentiality and respect the right of individual applicants. In response to criticism from some quarters of cheque-in-the-post CAP compensation payments, the Commission said that the compensatory premiums were farmer entitlements and must always be placed in the context of price cuts and support reductions under CAP reform.

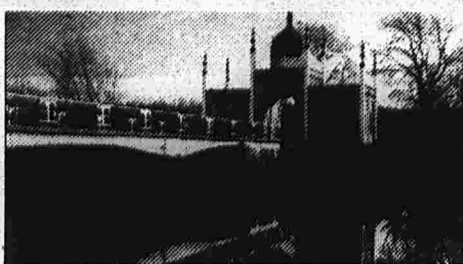

Mr. James (Jim) Baily



With sadness we record the passing of Mr. Jim Baily which sad event occurred suddenly at his residence Mitchel Street, Dungarvan on Tuesday, July 20. A native of Tralee, he was educated at the CBS, The Green, Tralee and during the Emergency Years from 1940 to 1943 he served as Lieutenant with the 4th Infantry Battalion in Fermoy.

From the army he joined the Gardai at the Depot in Phoenix Park and after a period in counties Kilkenny and Waterford he was promoted to Thurles in 1952 with the rank of Sergeant. He was appointed Inspector in 1960, the youngest Inspector in the Force at that time. He did duty at the border and spent 14 years in Limerick as Inspector. In 1968 he was promoted to the rank of Superintendent and served in Castlecomer, Macroom and Cahir until his retirement in 1979.

An avid GAA player and supporter, Jim won his first county senior championship medal as a seventeen year old with John Mitchels in Tralee. He held the very unusual distinction of winning five senior football county championships in five different counties — Waterford, Tipperary, Kerry, Westmeath and Cork. In 1938 he was a member of the Kerry minor team which won the All-Ireland final that year. Many outstanding footballers were numbered among his teammates and he played in the same club as Joe Keohane, Tadgh Healy, William Kennerly and Paddy Bawn Brosnan.

During his training at the Depot he represented the reformed Garda Boxing Club in the heavyweight class at the National Stadium where he won the two bouts he contested.

While serving in Limerick he developed an interest in sailing and there he constructed a Bermuda rigged petrel which he sailed in Foynes, and later in Dungarvan bay as a member of Dungarvan Harbour Sailing Club.

He was a member of Castletroy Golf Club in the sixties and this interest in golf was translated on his retirement to great enjoyment in the game of pitch and putt which he played in the Cunnigar Club in Dungarvan.

Jim was a member of a prominent Kerry family who were involved in farming, the legal profession and business and who also participated extensively in the social and sporting life of Tralee. They were identified with the struggle for national independence and an uncle, Lieut. James Baily, was killed in action by the Black and Tans at the Headfort Junction Ambush in 1921.

Since his death, Jim's family have received many cards and letters from people in the towns where he was stationed, telling of kind things and good deeds he had done for them during his stay with them.

His immediate family of ten comprise: Fr. Michael, CSSR; Denis (retired meteorological officer), Jimmy (a national school teacher), Paddy Joe (farmer and businessman), Bridie Holton (a teacher in England), Sheila and Betty (who predeceased him), Margaret Twomey (a

publican) and Mary Jenkinson (formerly a civil servant).

Jim was married to the former Joan Costin Curran of Dungarvan in 1946 and he has three children Majella Dolan (Solicitor), Jermaine O'Connell (Public Relations Executive with Diners Club International) and Thea O'Shea (National School Teacher). He is survived by eight grandchildren.

Following his retirement Jim spent many happy years in Dungarvan and travelled extensively on holidays to visit friends and relations in the US and Europe with Joan. Though always a Kerryman at heart, he had also developed a soft spot for Joan's native Dungarvan where he was a familiar figure at the pitch and putt club and in the library. He had made many good friends there who will miss him sadly now that he is no longer among them.

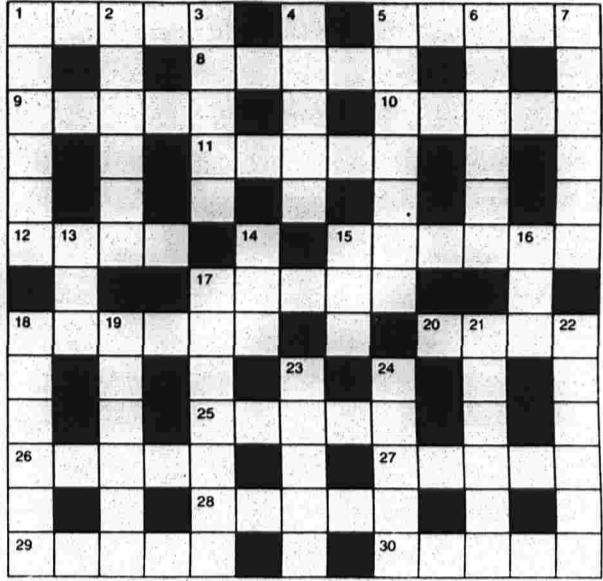

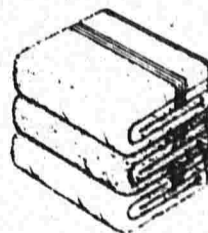

Death of Well Known Cappoquin Woman

LATE MRS. GRACE O'CONNOR

The death took place at a Cork hospital on Saturday, July 31, of Mrs. Grace O'Connor, The Square, Cappoquin. Nee Walsh, Grace was a member of a well known and highly respected local family. Her brothers, the late Norman and James Walsh, were esteemed members of Waterford County Council and both had the honour of being elected to the Chair of that body.

Grace herself took an interest in politics but was unsuccessful in a bid for co-option to the Council following the death of her brother Norman.

She was wife of the late Michael O'Connor who was the founder of the Poultry business now known as Cappoquin Chickens.

Since her husband's death in 1966, Grace involved herself in a number of voluntary bodies, most notably perhaps the Widows' Association. She was a founder member of the West Waterford Branch and was in fact a member of the National Executive of that body up to the time of her death.

She was a founder member and treasurer of Lismore Golf Club and also had the honour of being chosen as Lady Captain. By coincidence, she was also a founder member and treasurer of the Lismore Bridge Club.

She had a great interest in the Credit Union movement and was instrumental in having a branch of the Lismore Union opened in Cappoquin. She spent a considerable amount of time transporting handicapped children to the Sesame School in Dungarvan and was also involved in the running of St. Carthage's Old People's Home in Lismore.

Despite her huge involvement in social activities, her main interest always was her family and their welfare. She was an excellent neighbour and friend and could always be relied upon for a bit of advice or a word of encouragement and could discreetly help out those in need.

Following Rosary which was recited by Fr. Scanlon, her remains were removed from St. Carthage's Mortuary, Lismore to St. Mary's Church, Cappoquin, where they were received and blessed by Very Rev. Canon Phelan, P.P. A guard of honour by members of the Lismore Golf Club was formed outside the church.

On Monday the principal celebrant of the Solemn Requiem Mass was her cousin Redemptorist priest, Fr. Gerald Crotty. Flanked by a guard of honour of the Widows' Association, her coffin was borne shoulder high through the town and then taken for burial to St. De-

clan's Cemetery in the presence of a huge cortege, many of whom had travelled long distances to say their final farewells. It was a fitting tribute to somebody who had devoted a lifetime in the service of her fellow man.

Sympathy is extended to her sons Michael, John, Vincent, Aidan and Kieran, daughters Kay (O'Donovan), Brenda (Fives) and Deirdre (Quirke), her sister Carmel (Scanlon), sons-in-law, daughters-in-law, grandchildren, great-grandchildren, nephews, nieces, sisters-in-law, cousins, relatives and friends. Club athlete Derek Hayes, Parklane, Abbeyside, displayed his around athletic ability at the Waterford Regional Athletic Track last weekend to capture the National combined events under-16 championship, an unique title in which the athlete takes part in eight different events over a tough two-day period of competition.

Derek Hayes' around ability has been well documented at county championships over the past few years but last weekend provided the real test of his ability as he was pitted against ten of the best versatile competitors in the country, some with perhaps better times and distances in a number of events, but none, as events proved, were able to match his scores in eight very different competitions.

In travelling down from Derry, Northern Ireland, champion Shane Donaghy showed that he was well prepared for the championships, while Derek's great rival in the high jump, Kenneth Treacy, Middleton, was also in the field. Eight hundred metre speedster Larry Morrissey was the other Waterford athlete to keep the Decies flag flying.

An athlete's score depends on his times and his distances, not on his individual placings and in this regard Derek proved to be a most worthy winner of his National title as he won by a whopping 576 points from his nearest rival, the Derry athlete Shane Donaghy, on a 4926 pts to 4350 pts. scoreline, with Ken-

neth Treacy, Middleton third on 4250 pts.

His individual marks were as follows: High jump 1m. 86 cms.; javelin 45 metres, pole vault 2 metres 60 cms., shot putt 11 metres 30 cms., 1000 metres 3 mins. 7 secs., 100 metres 11.7 secs., 100m. hurdles 13.5 secs. and long jump 6 metres and 21 cms.

This has been a very successful season for the Abbeyside athlete. In addition to his national title he represented Ireland in the high jump at the International Schools Championships in Dublin last month.

WORLD ATHLETICS CHAMPIONSHIPS PREVIEW

Sonia O'Sullivan represents Ireland's best chance of a World Athletics Championships gold medal since Eamonn Coughlan stormed to victory in Helsinki in 1983. O'Sullivan has been in storming form recently winning 3,000m races in Oslo, Nice, Copenhagen and Zurich, making herself favourite for the 3,000m in the process. And even though she was beaten in the 1,500m in Monte Carlo on Saturday, she still managed to become the first ever Irish woman to run the "metric mile" in under 4 minutes, and set her fourth Irish record of the year. Her sternest opposition is sure to come from defending

World champion Tatyana Dorovskikh, Olympic Champion Elena Romanova and European Champion Yvonne Murray in the 3,000m. These championships are coming in the middle of "world record season".

Last month, the men's 10,000m world record was broken twice in the space of 5 days. First, by Richard Chelimo (the athlete who found himself "boxed in" by two Morroccans in last year's Olympics), and then by Kenyan Yobes Ondieki, who was running his first race at this distance for 10 years! Javier Sotomayor, the men's high jump world record holder, must have been jumping for joy last week when he jumped a height of 2.45 metres

(about 8 and a half feet) which increased his own world record. Moroccan Khalid Skah also set a new standard, at the 2 miles distance. Linford Christie has managed to get the better over Carl Lewis twice in the last two weeks over 100m, but Christie will be the first to tell you that it's in Stuttgart where the "real business" will be settled.

So, with Irish hopes being pinned mainly on Catherine McKiernan, Aisling Mollloy, T. J. Kearns, Terry McHugh, Frank O'Meara and, of course, Sonia O'Sullivan, the World Athletics Championships get underway in Stuttgart next Saturday. Will we be celebrating Irish gold for the second summer in a row?

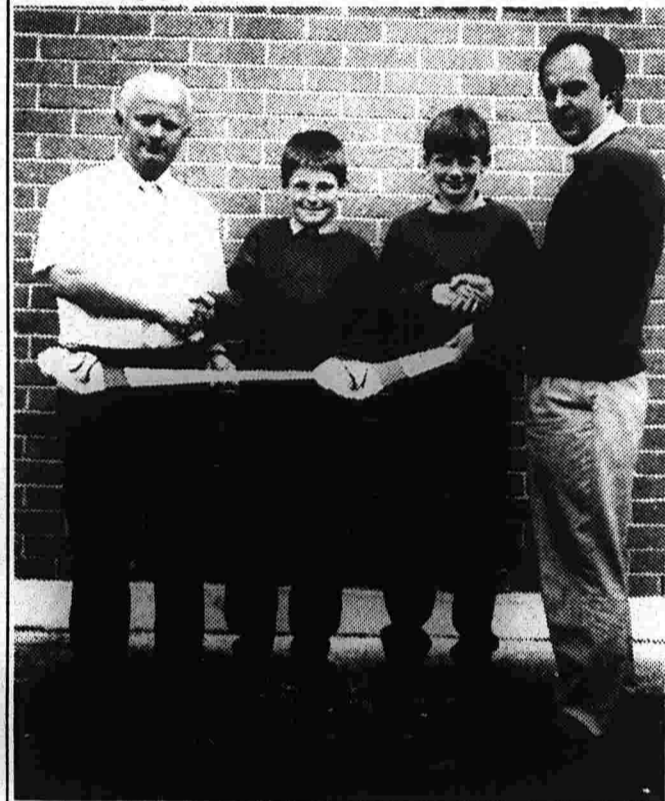

Attendances Up

For some strange and unknown reason, the attendances at the national football league games all over the country were almost doubled in 1992/93 and as a result all counties will benefit considerably. This is good news for Waterford and some other counties who normally get very little from that competition.

Also this year the attendances at senior intercounty football championship games in Munster have reached an all-time high this year and the total figure is given at around 93,000. This is a record and may have something to do with the introduction of an open draw. (There have been higher figures in years when we had a draw-such as in 1976 when the Cork/Kerry replay brought a record crowd of 50,235)

It is interesting to record that the record attendances for All Ireland finals can never be equalised as even when the redevelopment of Croke Park is completed it will not hold crowds similar to the football final of 1961 when Down played Offaly

before an official attendance of 90,556. In the previous year the down versus Kerry All-Ireland final attracted an official attendance of 87,768. In hurling the record was established in 1954 for the Cork/Wexford final played before an 84,856 crowd.

It is interesting to note too, that when the record for a national football league was being established, Down county were also involved. Themselves and Dublin attracted a 70,125 attendance in 1964.

The record for a Munster hurling final was established in 1961 when a crowd of 60,177 saw Tipperary play Cork at Limerick.

Finally, the record attendance for a county hurling final is held by Pairc Ui Caoimh when the 1977 Cork hurling county final between St. Finbarrs and Glen Rovers brought an official attendance of 34,151 to the venue.

Readers need no reminding that the Meath/Dublin saga broke all attendance records for a provincial final, two years ago.

At Croke Park

With only one championship game in process during the televised programme from Croke Park on Sunday, practically all our members were tuned in to the 'box' to see what the semi-finals had to produce. The fare was poor and very disappointing and many who stayed at home will be glad at not having made the journey to headquarters. Tipperary's defeat was a shock as until they met Galway they looked an unbeatable team. Galway's vigorous and aggressive style of hurling had the overpowering effect that the Galway people had predicted, but to which no one

seemed to listen. From our point of view the result will considerably lessen the demand for All Ireland tickets, and this is one blessing that will make some officials happy.

FRAHER FIELD

Although it may be some time before the project begins to take shape it is good to know that work has commenced on the building of the stand at Fraher field. Last week the contractor, John Kiely and his workers were laying the foundations for the stand which, when completed, will seat 5,000 spectators.

NEXT WEEKEND

Double Round Of Senior Football Championship

Lismore And Mount Sion Meet In Senior Hurling Play-Off

There are a number of very important intermediate and junior football championship games listed as well as this huge weekend programme that is designed to wipe out some of the backlog of fixtures that has accumulated over the summer. It is a make of break period for a number of clubs who will know their fate as far as the championships are concerned, after Tuesday evening next.

The only hurling game listed will decide whether Mount Sion or Lismore will head the table in their group and qualify for the semi-final or which will have to play a quarter-final match against Ballygunner.

The round of under-21 hurling games scheduled for this evening (Wednesday) will set this knock-out championship in motion and it will mean that a number of players will play championship games three times within a week. This is part of the price that has to be paid for the Board's decision to put off matches that should have been played.

MOUNT SION V. LISMORE

Both sides will try hard to win this won in order to avoid an additional game later on. There is prestige at stake as well. The hurling should be the winner here as with not too much at stake and no great pressure to worry about, the players from both clubs will play their best hurling.

So far, Lismore and Mount Sion have failed to produce the kind of top-class hurling that delighted the crowds at the county final two years ago and in their matches to-date in this championship, each side has failed to convince anyone that they are going to take the title.

This might be the game that will show both teams back in form. There is precious little between them as it is a match that can go either way.

SENIOR FOOTBALL

RATHGORMACK V. BALLINACOURTY

This game is scheduled for Tuesday evening next at Leamybrien and it will come

as something of a big shock if last year's county finalists fail to win as the challengers will be forced to field without two of their outstanding regulars Ian Kiely and Sean McGrath who are out of bounds since last Sunday.

Last year when the teams met in the second round at Stradbally, the game ended in a draw after both sides had missed chances.

Rathgormack went on to qualify for the final and the rest of their story is history. Ballinacourty have undergone a minor transformation in that a number of younger players have been introduced and while they are playing very well as a unit, they lack the experience of Rathgormack, who are bang in form, as we saw in their disposal of Stradbally recently.

CLASHMORE V. ST. SAVIOURS

Clashmore will see this as their final chance of getting to the knockout stages and like Ballinacourty their prospects are considerably reduced because of the non-availability of a couple of their best footballers, Pat O'Halloran and Michael Hynes, who are out of bounds for a while.

Saviours defeated Clashmore by 3-13 to 1-6 last year and I'm sure that things have not changed all that much. Without these players, Clashmore have very little chance of winning here. They are doing very well in hurling and will now likely concentrate on this. Saviours and Ballinacourty look to be the two sides who will battle it out for the third place in this group.

BALLINACOURTY V. AFFANE

This is listed as the opener at Ardmore on Sunday and with Ballinacourty's two top players missing from their lineout, Affane will see it as their chance of winning their first two points since graduating to senior ranks last year.

A defeat for Ballinacourty could spell the end of the road as far as this year's senior football championship is concerned and this could prove to be the motivating factor to inspire a great effort. Despite their handicap,

they can still win.

DUNGARVAN V. KILROSSANTY

On paper this looks to be the most attractive game of the weekend, but there is no guarantee that it will be the best match on the programme. When they last clashed every scribe who previewed the game gave it "match of the day" status and it turned out to be a bit of a flop, with Dungarvan, the champions, running out very easy winners by 0-18 to 0-6 on a windy day in Stradbally in the 1991 championships.

After that, Kilrossanty ended up scoring almost twice the number of goals scored by any team and in the end of the league section they finished runners-up to Dungarvan on the scoring charts.

At the moment the teams stand side by side on top of the league table and unless this one ends in a draw the result will separate them and send the winners to the top of the table.

Dungarvan are playing terrific stuff and in their three matches to-date have scored an unusually high total of 10-46 and with only 3-16 being scored against them. There is the perception about however that the quality of the opposition encountered so far has been so poor that the champions have been made look falsely impressive and when the going gets tougher that they won't find winning all that easy.

Tuesday's clash with Kilrossanty looks like being a "made to measure" test for the champions and this could be the match to prove or disprove that they are as good as they appear. There are rumours that both sides may be missing a couple of players because of holidays, etc. Dungarvan will have to play without Dermot Callaghan and while this dynamic forward will be missed, the club have excellent substitutes to choose from.

Kilrossanty had close calls in all their three matches and a kick of the ball could have made a difference in all three. They beat Sliabh gCua by a goal, Gaultier by two points and Kilmac-

thomas by a single point. On the face of things they will need to improve on this form if they are going to record a win over the reigning champions.

DUNHILL V. KILROSSANTY

Kilrossanty will be very strongly fancied to win this one and regardless of how they fare two evenings later, the result against pointless Dunhill will keep the Comeragh team in close touch with the leaders. This is fixed for Sunday and will be the opening game in a double-header at the Kill venue.

KILMACTHOMAS V. TRAMORE

This is the feature game on the programme at Kill on Sunday and while the result will probably put Kilmacthomas above their opponents on the league table, it is not sure that the extra two points will bring them back into contention.

They are surely the hard luck side in the championship, having suffered a lot from injuries and then losing by just a single point to both the Nire and Kilrossanty.

Tramore have defeated Dunhill and their draw with Sliabh gCua brought their total of points up to three. Kilmac' lost a place in the 1992 county final by a single point when going under to Rathgormack on an 0-8 to 0-7 score.

DUNGARVAN V. THE NIRE

When the Nire and Dungarvan clashed in the quarter-final at Leamybrien last year the game generated considerable excitement and aroused interest far and beyond the respective club boundaries. The game eventually turned out to be something of a flop with Dungarvan running out the easiest of winners on a 4-13 to 0-7 scoreline.

The Nire had been doing very well up to that point so their failure was difficult to understand. This year in their two games they have beaten Kilmac' by a single point and ran riot with a 2-20 to 1-2 score against Dunhill.

If we can discount the one-sided Dunhill game and regard their display against Kilmac' as being their best form, it could not be very easy to make a case for them beating Dungarvan, who had a 21 points victory over the same opponents.

The Ballymacarbry based side can be very unpredictable at times. They have individual footballers as good as there are in the county, but somehow they don't always manage to put it together as a team very often. Dungarvan must start favourites to win here, but the Nire can afford a defeat and still be sure of qualifying.

BUTLERSTOWN V. ST. SAVIOURS

With Butlerstown already gone out of the championship, the result of this is of no importance to them, but it is very important to St. Saviours who are struggling to stay in contention for the third place in their group. Saviours should win and with something to spare.

NIRE V. SLIABH gCUA

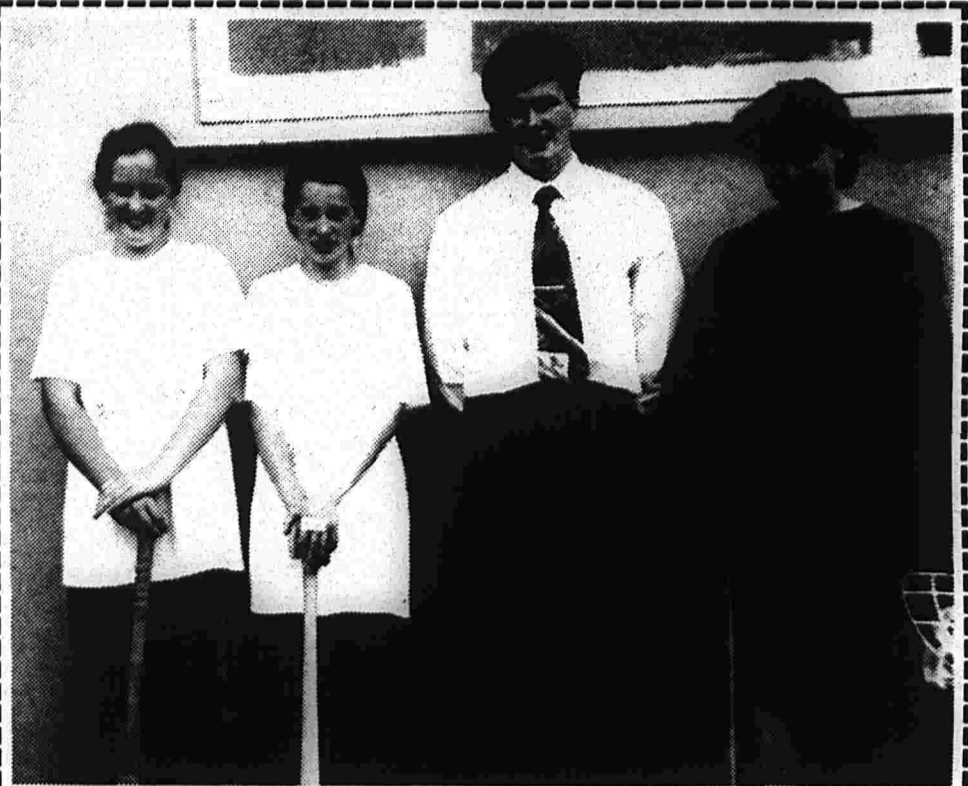
Nire Win Extraordinary Game

Council, all overtures for a new school have to date encountered a wall of Department of Education resistance," she said.

Now the already tenuous relationship between the Department and the VEC has taken a further turn for the worse by the announcement by the Minister Niamh Breathnach that she intends to place the administrative responsibilities of the committee under the control of the City of Waterford VEC's chief executive from September 1.

"How can such an operation work successfully," asked Cllr. Flynn. "The CEO of the Co. Waterford VEC is a member of the West Waterford Development Partnership which is presently drawing up a programme that will qualify for Leader funding. If there is no such officer after September 1, does it mean that position will also be lost to us on the West Wa-

terford Development Partnership?"

Cllr. Flynn said she doesn't know what the Department is up to as far as vocational education is concerned in West Waterford. "It seems to me that at best, the Department wants to undermine the whole vocational education system in the region. At worst it may even want to wipe it out."

Meanwhile, Department approval is awaited by the County VEC for the recent decision to appoint a temporary CEO which was in defiance of a ministerial directive not to do so.

Some members, at least, of the Committee, fear the Minister may give their decision an emphatic thumbs down, and that could well be the spark that will ignite a head-on confrontation between the Department and the Minister on the one hand and a very angered Co. Waterford VEC on the other.
