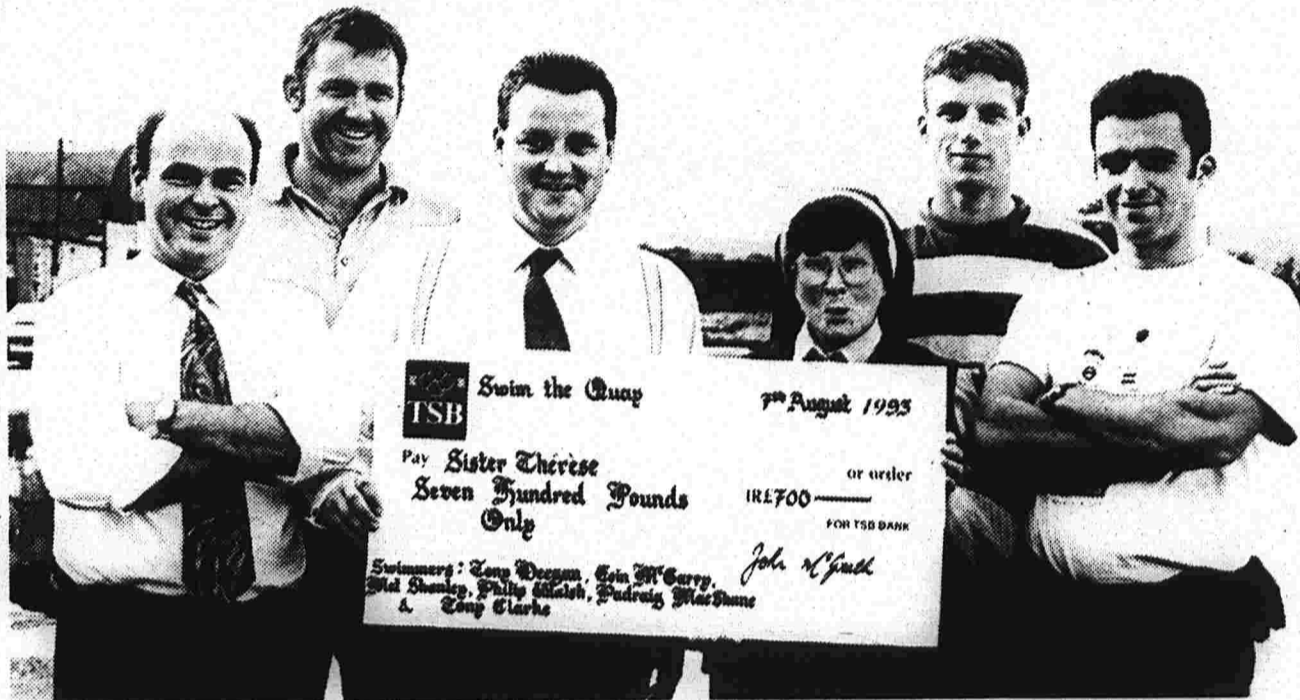


BRENDAN KENNEALLY

Major Exhibition In Dungarvan

On the evenings of Wednesday the 8th and Thursday the 9th of September the West Waterford Development Partnership will be holding a major exhibition featuring a number of the projects and enterprises with which it has been involved over the past two years, in the Park Hotel, Dungarvan.

The West Waterford Development Partnership was set up in 1991 as one of the twelve area based companies set up under the Programme of Economic and Social Progress to develop locally based responses to unemployment in specific areas. It is a local company, including on its board local representatives of Employers, Unions, Farming organisations, Community organisations and the State Sector.

Its aim is to address the unemployment problem through a broad range of initiatives which have been identified as having potential for tackling unemployment in the West Waterford area. The company aims to be dynamic in its approach responding to locally identified needs and opportunities. The fact that it is locally based means that it

can identify and respond to the issues of particular relevance to West Waterford. The emphasis in its activities is on flexibility.

GLOBAL FUNDING

At present the Partnerships activities are funded from EC GLOBAL funding and the Enterprise Trust, an organisation which was founded to provide support from the business community for local economic development strategies.

The exhibition is intended to give some of the projects and enterprises with which the partnership has worked the opportunity to boost their profile in the area. It is hoped that by highlighting what has been achieved the exhibition will foster an awareness of the role of the Partnership in the economic life of the area.

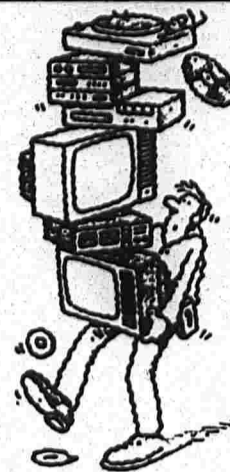

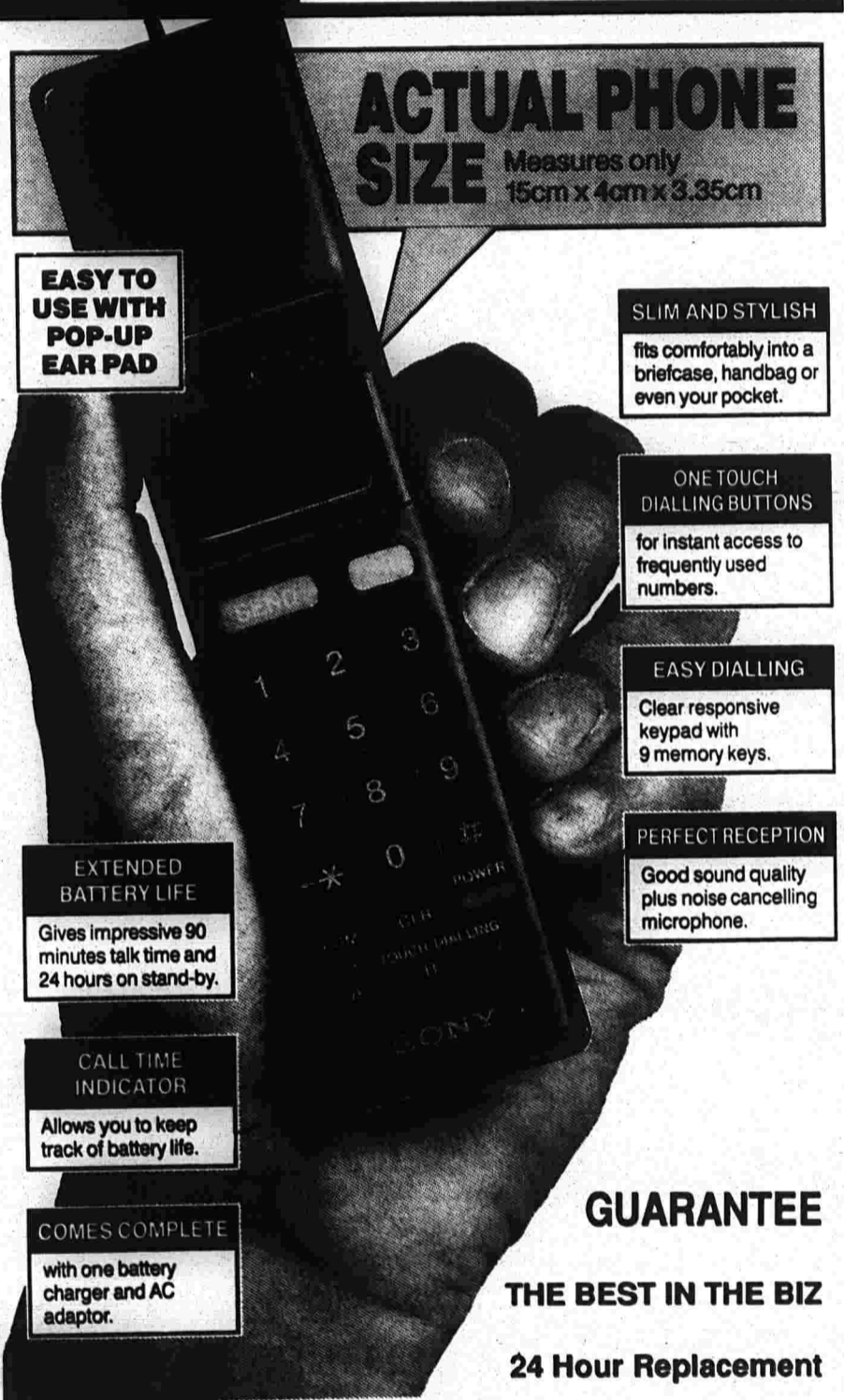

Your Job List In The Garden This Month

Gardeners stuck into the winter digging often dream about sitting out in the garden in August — the chores are done and the weather is fine.

The reality is that there is still plenty to do when the garden is at its peak and, in truth, the keen gardener loves it!

One of the most rewarding jobs at this time is taking cuttings, not only because of the satisfaction of growing new plants for next year's pots, boxes, baskets and beds, but also saving money.

To take a cutting from a suitable variety, make a clean cut across a sturdy shoot just below a leaf joint and strip off the lower leaves before neatly firming into a tray or pot of cutting compost.

You don't have to use rooting compounds but beware of over-watering and moist conditions — mould and rot can soon set in.

Place the cuttings in a sunny and airy spot and they should soon take.

Apart from this on-going job for the month, there are many other 'pottering' jobs:—

DEAD-HEADING — cut away spent blooms on roses, dahlias and chrysanthemums to ensure a constant supply of new buds and blooms.

CLIPPING — keep hedges neatly trimmed and end the month with a final neat cut before autumn.

AUTUMN PLANTING — it is depressing to think summer will soon be gone but don't let it put you off preparing sites and locations for autumn planting. Non-container grown shrubs and trees will need thorough site work.

BULB PREPARATION — spring bulbs need to go in soon, so prepare the ground as you lift hip-peastrum and lily bulbs at the end of their flowering season.

VEGETABLES — planting of brassicas-brussels, broccoli and cabbage — should be completed. Onions should be about ready for lifting and, once thoroughly brushed clean of soil and dried, can be plaited and hung in the kitchen until needed.

HERBS — if you grow your own then start gathering on dry days for bunching and drying on newspaper or hanging in an airing cupboard.

Turning to more major jobs, this is a good time to repair the lawn either by patching or cutting and turning damaged sections, or by re-seeding bad sections.

A new lawn can also be seeded providing the area has been broken up, laced with well-rooted compost or manure and then raked thoroughly a few weeks before sowing.

Sow the seed to the recommended density of the mixture you have chosen and then lightly rake the soil over them.

Most seed is treated with bird repellent but foil strips and netting are advisable.

1 1/2 cups celery, thinly

sliced
3/4 cup dairy sour cream
1 tbsp lemon juice
salt and pepper to taste
chow mein noodles

Method:
Cook rice according to package directions. Set aside to cool. Blend all ingredients and chill at least two hours.
Serve on spinach or ice-

berg lettuce. Top with chow mein noodles.
Combined preparation and cooking time: about 50 minutes.
Chilling time: 2 hours.

Ballymac' Man Traces Footsteps Of Our Lord



Martin Moore from Ballymacarby was among a group of 100 Irish people who have just returned from the experience of a life time in Israel and Jordan where they traced the footsteps of Our Lord in the lands from where our faith first sprang.

The 9-day sponsored walk in aid of the Irish Wheelchair Association in the Middle East marked the culmination of long months of fundraising in which each participant had to raise a grand total of £2,850 for the Wheelchair Association.

The group of Irish pilgrims came together at Amman, just outside the city on Mount Nebo where Moses received the Ten Commandments, where they had their first Mass.

The following day the group travelled to Israel where they visited the Mount of Olives and the old city of Jerusalem.

The following day it was Tiberias, the Sea of Galilee and the following day they visited areas again in the old city of Jerusalem. Here they saw the Western Wall, the Tomb of the Holy Sepulchre, Calvary and via Dolorosa, followed by a trip to Bethlehem and the Chapel of the Nativity.

It was then back to Jordan on the following day for the final days of the trip spent in Aquaba where the group took their final walk to Petra, an ancient Roman Village. This tough walk culminated with a special Mass, all of the group vowing to return some day to once again savour the delights of these exotic lands.

The Right To Read And Write

Over the last few weeks we have taken a look at the problems which some adults encounter when it comes to reading and writing and have described the type of help which is available to them. In this, the final article in the present series, we will take a more detailed look at the type of help which is at hand locally.

When an adult realises that they need some help with their reading and writing skills, very often they share this awareness with a friend or family member. Encouraged to make the first step, they get into contact with the local Adult Learning Centre where they are made most welcome and a range of options are presented to them.

The most important point to remember here is that there is no fixed curriculum or no set work that any student has to cover. The way it works is that each student works at their own pace, no matter how slow, and works on the skills which they themselves wish to develop.

When a student first comes for tuition they are matched with a suitable tutor. The tutors on the scheme are generally local people and all of them have been specially trained to

help the student assigned to them work at his/her own pace. Over the weeks tutor and student work on a one to one basis and generally get to know and trust one another. This trust is well founded because each tutor is committed to ensuring that all their work with the student is confidential.

Much of the work takes place at the Adult Learning Centre which is based in a number of rooms adjacent to the Courthouse in Dungarvan. The one to one work continues for about one hour every week and tutors make every effort to arrange times which suit the student.

The type of learning depends entirely on the student. For example, some like to develop skills in reading the local papers or introductory books, others like to spell the days of the week and their family names, while others still wish to learn how to write letters to their loved ones abroad.

The type of work which goes on at this stage can be broken down into three broad categories: (i) Basic reading and writing for beginners, (ii) Spelling, reading and writing for improvers, (iii) Writing for advanced students.

The initial stages of this work can be done on a one to one basis or a small group. After working with their tutor for a while, some students like to move on to this group tuition and this is an option which is available locally. Some students stay with their group for quite some time and advance to Certificate Courses such as (i) Communication Skills Certificate Course, (ii) Foundation level for beginners, (iii) Levels 1, 2 and 3 in Wordpower for improvers, right up to advanced students.

It must be stressed that at all times it is the students who determine the pace of tuition. There is no pressure whatsoever of exams or tests.

CLEAR ILLUSTRATION

It is interesting to note that some of the writings of the students of the local Adult Learning Centre have been published in a number of editions entitled "Words from the Deise." The scope and insight of these writings are a clear illustration of the confidence and skill which these students have developed through their participation in the work of the Centre.

Indeed, the tutors them-

selves speak of the benefits which they gain from being involved. As mentioned earlier, tutors are local people working with and for local people and as such the work of the centre is truly community-based. The service is free of charge and voluntary. Tutors are recruited and trained, usually around October of each year. Further details about this will be published in or around that time.

The purpose of this series of articles is to alert the local community to the nature of this problem and to the fact that help is available locally, in the hope and belief that this message will be passed on in a sensitive manner to those who can benefit from the various courses etc. which are on offer.

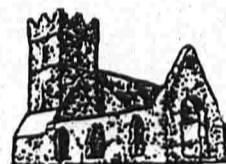

FUTURE FOR MILK SUPPLIERS

United Farmers Association calls on politicians of all parties to take note of the findings of the recent Co. Clare study on milk suppliers.

This study showed that almost one third of milk producers have dropped out since milk quotas were introduced in 1984, that 86% of remaining suppliers have quotas under 20,000 gallons and that two thirds of remaining suppliers are likely to quit milk production unless corrective measures are taken.

The Clare study can equally well be applied to the whole country and speaks volumes for the real attitude as distinct from the professed attitude of our Co-ops, large farmer organisations and agricultural establishment generally towards the plight of the low income farmer.

There has been no accountability in the area of milk quota movement and there has been no genuine effort to reallocate quota to

the most needy.

A free-for-all, with cheque book power the inevitable winner, has been allowed to prevail in an area that is vital to the survival of many families in rural Ireland and thereby to the survival of rural Ireland itself.

SOCCER LEAGUES KICK-OFF

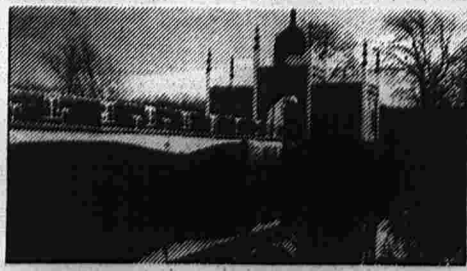

Br. Dormer's Contribution To CLCG Lismore

Lismore's success in winning the senior hurling championship title in 1991 was the culmination of many years (not months) of hard work by very many people who were willing to give of their time and talents in coaching our youngsters in the art of wielding the caman.

The majority of the panel attended the local C.B.S. schools where they were first introduced to the greatest field game in the world. Languishing in the doldrums before the late 70's and early 80's, hurling at under age level took a giant leap forward thanks to the initiative of Brothers Sheehan and Malone who laid the ground work for a special juvenile committee.

In 1981 it bore fruit when the Under 14 hurlers won both the Western and County championships and also had the distinction of winning the very first Under 14 County title. The mentors on that occasion were Denis Buckley, Richie Ormonde and one Bro. James Dormer who had recently come to Lismore.

Little did they know then, but the foundation had been laid for a remarkable string of successes at under age level which is unlikely to be equaled for a long time to come.

The crowning glory came in 1990 when the Lismore/Ballysaggart combination won all county under-age titles i.e.; Under 12, Under 14, Under 16, Minor and Under 21, and were voted Club of the Year in Co. Waterford.

Looking back over that decade and the unique achievements of that golden era, let us not forget the men who put so much time and effort into coaching, training and motivating our youth which culminated in the ultimate success - the Blue Riband of Deise hurling in 1991.

While time and space does not permit to mention individual names it is incumbent upon us to single out one man who has made an enormous contribution to the promotion of hurling in the Cathedral Town - the aforementioned, Bro. James

Dormer.

It is self evident that the revival of under-age hurling in the area coincided with the arrival of Bro. Dormer fourteen years ago and his boundless energy and infectious enthusiasm has been largely responsible for making Lismore the premier club in the county. He somehow managed to combine his onerous duties of teaching Principal and Superior, C.B.S., with those of Club Secretary both at Senior and Under-age level, Oifigeach Gaeilge on Waterford County Board together with more mundane matters such as providing transport to and from matches, repairing hurleys etc. etc. - the list is endless.

The recent successes of our teams at adult and under-age levels are tinged with sadness at the news that the "good brother" is about to be transferred to Doon C.B.S. To say that he will be sorely missed is an understatement. His contribution to the cultural, sporting and social life of the region has been immeasurable and was eloquently chronicled by Mary Fenton-Morrissey, Chairman of Lismore Town Commissioners, on the occasion of a recent civic reception accorded in his honour, and I quote —

"Since his arrival in Lismore some fourteen years ago Bro. Dormer has gained the respect and admiration of all those who have come in contact with him. He was a dedicated and thorough teacher, and as Principal of our Primary School, was respected and liked by both pupils and staff alike.

Immediately, on his arrival, he became deeply involved in the affairs of the G.A.A. in Co. Waterford, and in particular the Lismore Club. His belief, in nurturing and promoting hurling with the young, was the start of a resurgence of under age hurling here.

Having promoted the game at under age level, he then had the satisfaction of seeing the results of his efforts bear fruit when Lismore won their first official senior hurling championship since 1925. Who will ever forget that performance

Then she prostrated herself on the ground and prayed: "Lord, look on us your poor servants for I cannot guard them." Then a voice of wonderful sweetness said: "I will always defend you." St. Clare then prayed for the city of Assisi: "Lord, be pleased also to defend this city for it supports us for love of you." And again the same sweet voice answered: "The city will suffer many dangers, but will be defended." In an instant the attackers were overcome by fear and fled. The Sisters and Assisi itself were saved through St. Clare's ardent faith and trust in the Holy Eucharist.

"LOVE HIM TOTALLY WHO GAVE HIMSELF TOTALLY FOR YOUR LOVE" — These words of Clare in her letter to her friend Agnes of Prague sum up Clare's own life of loving contemplation of Jesus her Lord, lying in the crib, suffering on the Cross, hidden in the Eucharist. It was love which made her prayer of intercession for others so powerful. It was love, too, which led her to see the features of God's face in all the beautiful things of creation, and like St. Francis, to be filled with thanksgiving and praise: "She admonished the Sisters that they should praise God for every beautiful green and flowering plant that they saw; and that for every human being they saw, and for every creature always and in all things God must be praised." Truly, Clare, imitating the Blessed Virgin Mary, is a model of every virtue, a book of life. — E.K.

The World Athletics Championships '93

The fourth IAAF World Athletics Championships were opened on Friday night with a gala ceremony at Stuttgart's Gottlieb-Daimler Stadium. Five years ago when this venue was called the "Neckerstadion," Ray Houghton covered himself in glory by heading in Ireland's winning goal against England in the European Football championships. Will Ireland have more to shout about in Stuttgart on this occasion?

SATURDAY, AUGUST 14 (DAY ONE)

Finland's Sally Essayah became the first athlete to be crowned World Champion for 1993 when she walked to victory in the Women's 10km. Walk. I don't think she'll be doing much walking during the next few months. The prize for each competitor who becomes world champion this year is a brand new Mercedes-Benz car!

The other car winner of the day was South African born Mark Plaaties, now of the USA, who overtook Namibia's Luckert Swatbooi with half a mile remaining to win the Men's

Marathon. Sonia O'Sullivan came first in the semi-final of the Women's 3000m., bringing her dream of becoming World Champion another step closer, and American Andre Cason declared his intention of taking the Men's 100m. crown by recording the fastest time in the world this year (9.96 secs.) in his second round heat.

SUNDAY, AUGUST 15 (DAY TWO)

It took Linford Christie 9.87 to silence the last of his critics and capture the Men's 100m. title in the second fastest time in history. For the first time ever, Carl Lewis failed to finish first in a 100m. World Championship final as he was left trailing in the wake of Christie who set a new European record in the process. Andre Cason and Dennis Mitchell, both USA, finished 2nd and 3rd respectively.

While Christie was celebrating his triumph, Heike Dreschler was sharing her glory with the partisan home crowd. Dreschler was just 18 when she won the first ever Women's Long Jump world title in Helsinki in 1983. Now 28, she won her third long jump

world title. There was also delight for Nigerian, Mary Onyali, who set a new African record for the Women's 100m., thanks to a scintillating performance in the heats.

MONDAY, AUGUST 16 (DAY 3)

The hopes of Ireland were firmly pinned on Sonia O'Sullivan's shoulders going into the Women's 3000m. final, the event in which she finished fourth in last year's Olympics. And following a calculated break by the three athletes representing China, she finished fourth again. It was a clean sweep of the medals for China, with Yungxia Qu taking the gold. This is the second time in a year that Sonia has finished fourth in a major final, as Eamon Coghlan said once, if there's one thing worse than finishing fourth in a major final, it's finishing fourth twice.

And Jamaican Merlene Ottey wouldn't have been in a happy mood either as she was pipped by 0.01 of a second by the USA's Gail Devers in the Women's 100m. final. At the age of 33, it looks as if the woman dubbed "The Bronze Queen" will never win a major title.

GAA To Introduce New Suspension Procedures

By "Commentator"

Following the decision of Annual Congress to experiment with a 'match ban' to be introduced in conjunction with the running of the 1993/94 National leagues the following recommendations were approved by Central Council at their meeting on Saturday last.

Regulation 1 — Any player suspended for any period up to one month shall miss the next game in that competition, should that game not be played within the period of suspension.

Regulations 2 — Any player suspended for a period greater than one month and not more than two months shall

miss the next two games in that competition should these games not be played within the period of the suspension.

Regulations 3 — Any player suspended for a period greater than two months, shall miss the next three games in that competition, should these games not be played within the period of suspension.

Note — The existing penalties outlined in the disciplinary code in the official guide will continue to operate. The above regulations are an experiment for a two-year period. Congress next year may decide to further extend the penalties.

New Insurance Scheme

As announced over the weekend, a mandatory insurance scheme is to be introduced into the Association and will become operative from January 1 next year. As decided by Congress it will become compulsory for all clubs to participate in the innovation which replaces the old accident scheme which last year paid out £803,000, but was nevertheless limited in many ways, as it provided for payment to an injured player for only four weeks.

The new insurance packet will require a payment of £100 for all teams. The present payment is £60. Youth teams (all under 21) will pay £50.

The benefits for loss of earnings to an injured player will be £100 per week (married and single the same) and this will be paid for a period of 26 weeks. Dental benefits will increase from a limit of £400 to £1,000 (with a £50 excess). The capital benefits for death, permanent injury, loss of a limb, etc. have all been very considerably increased.

National Football League

The format of the National Football League which was introduced last year is to discontinue and the make up of the competition will revert to what it was in previous years. The leagues will therefore be played in divisions which are dictated by standards. This was decided on a vote at Central Council on Saturday, much against the wishes of all the weaker football counties.

London, who have been allowed to play in the league for their first time, will be in our group and the other counties will be Wicklow, Carlow, Sligo, Limerick, Westmeath, Kilkenny and Longford.

The football league will commence on October 10 and the hurling league on the following Sunday, October 17.

Waterford are in Div. I of the hurling league with Kilkenny, Tipperary, Galway, Cork, Limerick, Wexford and Down.

SENIOR 'B' FOOTBALL

The draw for this competition which was recently announced, has been scrapped and a new draw with five extra counties has been made as follows:— Wexford v. Tipperary, Sligo v. Fermanagh, Limerick v. Laois, Monahan v. Longford and Leitrim v. Westmeath. Antrim, Waterford and Carlow received a bye.

The preliminary rounds will take place on the weekend after the All-Ireland football final.

Football Championships Continue

Results To Decide The Fate Of Many Clubs For 1993

There are a number of very important intermediate games listed as well and most important of these is the St. Mary's v. An Rinn clash which will decide the make-up of their intermediate hurling group.

On the senior football scene the line-up for the concluding stages is beginning to take shape and by the weekend after next the final groupings will be known and the county fixtures committee can proceed with their arrangements for the quarter finals.

SENIOR FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP DUNGARVAN v. TRAMORE

It is only a formality and with no disrespect to Tramore, the outcome of this one is just a matter of adding a further two points to Dungarvan's total on the league table. The county champions will have just one more game to play after this one and at the moment (before they play Kilrossanty last night, Tuesday) they look like going to the semi-final unbeaten.

CLASHMORE v. AFFANE

Both these teams are gone from the championship and it is now a matter of playing out the remaining matches. This one could be important in that a win for Affane would bring them level on points with Clashmore (who have 2). This could be important when relegation time comes around. Clashmore played well against Stradbally last Sunday at Ardmore and will be favourites to win here.

KILMACTHOMAS v. GAULTIER

There is an outside chance that both those clubs could be chasing the third place in the group and with that in mind both will go all out for a win at Dunhill on Saturday evening. Kilmacthomas have suffered a series of

narrow defeats and don't seem to be getting value for their efforts. Presuming that they will have beaten Tramore last night, they will have an equal number of points with Gaultier and this should ensure a great contest, and one that either side can win.

Last year the sides drew at Stradbally, with Rathgormack going on to contest the county final with Dungarvan. I don't know if Ballinacourty's progress has kept pace with Rathgormack. This game will answer this question. Rathgormack will be the strong favourites to win.

INTERMEDIATE FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

No less than six teams will be in action in this championship and for a few of these the results will seal their fate as far as 1993 is concerned.

This championship in the West is resolving itself into a battle between four teams for the three positions on the league table. Lismore might just about survive in a close finish.

In the second semi-final, Ballyduff who scored a 4-16 to 1-3 win over Tallow will play an untried Abbey-side team at Lismore. Like Lismore Abbeyside had a
