# Hang the herbs ready for winter

IF you have a herb garden you will certainly be cooking with the fruits of your modest labours.

But how many herb gardeners will also be starting to dry them for winter use?

While not as good as fresh herbs, home grown dried herbs still seem to have more life left than those sold in shops and more satisfying too!

Pick tender undamaged non-flowering sprigs and shoots on a dry day and bind into small bunches before washing and then draining on newspaper in the shade.

Then hang them in the airing cupboard for a couple of weeks before storing in an airtight con-

Alternatively, you can hang some of your favourites in the kitchen to scent the air.

If you haven't got a herb garden then start planning one now for planting next spring. You can perhaps interest the kids, as most varieties are easy to grow.

Herbs can be very decorative and need not take up much space - some people grow useful ones in kitchen window boxes or on the balcony of

Choice of location is more important than space as most herbs like lots of sun and well-drained fertile soil, enriched before planting by a good dressing of well-rotted garden compost.

The cook in the household will want a say in the location too - it will need to be close to the kitchen door.

This is why a large tub, window box or even a grow-bag have appeal, even if some of the suggestions are not too pleasing to the eye!

If you are using a patch of ground then remember you will harvest from it frequently, so plant nothing more than an arm's length from the path. If the patch is going to be more than five feet square then small gravel walkways or some stepping stones will be needed.

Despite the practical purposes of the feature, make the most of it visually as well by planting taller varieties at the back.

Some useful and attractive varieties to start with

Marjoram — sown outside in spring to produce pretty flowers and foliage about now. Good for Continental dishes.

Parsley — rich green foliage is very useful for flavouring and garnish but can be difficult to start unless soil is warm.

Fennel — lacy foliage is attractive and the aniseed-like flavour is good for salads and cooked dishes.

Chives — a firm favourite for all cooking and salads and an eye-catcher for the herb garden thanks to its mauve 'puffball' blooms.

Mint — can be a nuisance unless confined to its own pot or box, but a must if you are also growing potatoes.

### **OLD-FASASHIONED** TRIFLE

Ingredients:

8 trifle sponges 1/4 lb (125g) red jam 1x285g can fruit cocktail in fruit juice 1 tbs (30ml) sherry 1 pt (500ml) pouring custard 1/4 pint (125ml) double cream

2 oz (50g) flaked almonds, browned

Split sponge cakes in half lengthways, spread with a thin layer of jam and glace cherries and anigelica sandwich together. Cut

into 1 cm (1/2 in) slices and arrange over the base of a shallow glass dish. Pour over fruit cocktail and sherry. Make custard

and pour over fruit cocktail while warm. Allow to chill. Whip cream, swirl over custard, and decorate as Serves 6 - 8 shown.





# The World Athletics Championships 1993

The opening weekend of Mozamdique's Maria Mutola the fourth IAAF World Athin the Women's 800m final. letic Championships in Stuttgart was a scintillating one. At the age of 33 Linford Christie became the oldest sprints World Champion ever; Merlene Ottey found herself pipped at the post by Gail Devers in a tight womens 100 metre final; and Sonia O'Sullivan became the latest victim of China's rapidly improving athletes — she won't be visiting many Chinese restaurants in the near future, that's for sure! The top athletics festival was to produce more top action to excite the Stuttgart crowd.
MONDAY, AUGUST 16
(DAY THREE)

With 1,000 metres of the Men's 5,000m final behind him, 18 year old Kenyan Ishmael Kirui decided to make his big break, and in a wave of emotion, he stayed away to win, avenging the controversial defeat of his brother, Richard Chelimo, at the hands of Moroccan Khalid Skah in last year's Olympic 10,000m final. Kirui said afterwards that the whole of the Kenyan team had plotted their revenge on Skah ever sice that infamous Barcelona night, when — to the ringing boos of the 80,000 watching fans - Skah appeared to receive illegal help from a lapped team-mate. Revenge was sweet for the Kenyans and Skah finished in fifth

TUESDAY, AUGUST 17 (DAY FOUR)

Ireland's Terry McHugh didn't fare too well in Monday's Javelin final, which turned out to be a frustrating event for the Limerick man. But in Tuesday's Discus final it was a different story for Nick Sweeney, who hurled the solid plate out to 61.66 metres. This throw earned Sweeney seventh place, which is the best performance ever by an Irish ath-World lete in a World Championship field event. Nick Sweeney could be a name well worth remember-

ing for the future. The story of the Womens 100m final wasn't over yet. Merlene Ottey of Jamaica was sure that she had won, and rival Gail Devers thought the same when both crossed the line on Monday night. When Devers was announced the winner, the winning margin was given at 0.01 seconds, the tightest margin possible. But early on Tuesday morning, the IAAF had announced that both athletes time had been revised, and that both had clocked the same time of 10.82 seconds. Both of them now hold the Championship record, but despite this, Devers still got gold and Ottey silver. Ottey received a tremendous reception as she went up to receive her medal. And at the age of 36, Russian Liubov Gurina became one of the oldest world medalists ever when she finished runner-up to in the Women's 800m final. THURSDAY, AUGUST

19 (DAY FIVE)

Following the rest day, the batteries had been recharged and everyone was raring to go again. With one hurdle left, the flamboyant Sandra Farmer-Patrick (USA) led the Womens 400m Hurdles final take the title. But Britain's Sally Gunnell surged forward and pipped Farmer-Patrick on the line with a new world record time of 52.74 seconds. Farmer-Patrick was also inside the old mark with 52.79. This was the first womens world record on the track since 1989. Like Sally Gunnell, Merlene Ottey had a lot to be joyful about as well. She finally captured her first major individual gold medal by winning the 200m final despite a late surge by American Gwen Torrence. Ottey. who now has the world title she deserves, ran 21.98 seconds and Torrence ran dead on 22 seconds.

It was a good day for Ireland as well. 110m hurdlers T. J. Kearns and Sean Cahill made it through to the semifinals in fine style, though they were knocked out in the semis and Niall Bruton finished third in a physical fourth heat of the Men's 1,500m. Catherina McKiernan also had a fine day, by qualifying for the Womens 10,000 m final.

FRIDAY, AUGUST 20 (DAY SIX) Another world record was

witness by the Gottlieb-Daimler Stadium crowd when Britain's Colin Jackson left the rest of the field and his tag of "nearly man" - behind to take not only the Mens 110m Hurdles world title, but a new world record of 12.91 seconds as well. Behind the Welshman in second place was his team mate Tony Jarrett. The record he beat was that of American Roger Kingdom, who ran 12.92 in August 1989. Gail Devers won the womens equivalent, becoming the first athlete ever to be crowned World Champion at both the 100m sprint and 100m hurdles. The Carl Lewis era was effectively ended when he finished third in the Men's 200m final, behind Namibian Frankie Fredericks and Britain's John Regis. Fredericks set a new African record time of 19.85 seconds, and becomes Namibia's first ever World Champion. Namibia earned full independence from South Africa only a few years ago. Sonia O'Sullivan won her heat in the 1,500m and progressed through to the final. In the Mens 1,500m semi-finals, Nial Bruton was eliminated, while Dan O'Brien, a man whose adoptive parents were Irish, won the Decathlon just as he did in Tokyo to once more prove that he is the world's greatest all-round athlete.

**SATURDAY, AUGUST 21** (DAY SEVEN)

Since these championships were inaugurated in 1983, the Mens 4 x 100m Relay has always been won by the U.S.A, and in this year's semi-final they rocketed out a warning to all their relay rivals by winning their semi-final in a time of 37.40 seconds, which and looked like she would equalled their own world record. If the U.S.A. were passing the baton beautifully, then the Cuban womens 4 x 100m team were doing the opposite. A poor change over sent Cuba's golden baton clanging onto the track and their chances went with it. To boos and jeers, Chinese 18 year old Yungxia Wang powered to victory in the Womens 10,000m final. While others collapsed just after crossing the finishing line, Wang and second place Zhang did a lap of honour. In Cuba, though, they've developed another way to celebrate. Immediately after her victory in the Womens High Jump (during which she had stayed very unemotional), Cuban Ioament Quintero dived headlong into what can only be described as a disco dancing routine with second place team mate Silvia Costa. If Cuba ever needs entrants for the World Disco Championships . . . they'll know who to call.

SUNDAY, AUGUST 22 (DAY EIGHT)

Sonia O'Sullivan may not have to wait as long as Merlene Ottey for the medal she wanted, but Sonia finally put those Barcelona and Stuttgart 3000m near misses behind her to clinch her first major championship medal. The 1500m wasn't rated as her best distance coming into these championships, but following the "Chinese take-away" in the 3000m, she was spurred on to greater things at the shorter distance. China's Dong Liu led with 200m to go and was being booed heavily (as have the rest of the Chinese), but a huge roar went up when the Chinese in second place, Yi Lu, was overtaken first by O'Sullivan and then by Boulmerka of Algeria. As Dong Liu raced away for gold, O'Sullivan sprinted past Boulmerka, the defending champion, to take the silver in a time of 4 mins. 03.48 seconds. Boulmerka took the bronze.

Elsewhere, the U.S.A. won both the mens relays, with the 400m sprint team setting a new world record of 2:54.29; Russia pipped the U.S.A. in the womens 100m relay; Kenya's Moses Tanui lost his 10000m gold chance when he lost his shoe in the last lap; and Ireland's Nick Sweeney was elevated to 6th place in the discus following the disqualification of Romas Ubartas who dope tested positive. But, Sunday was Sonia's day, the first time that a female Irish athlete had won a World medal, and also the first time in ten years that Ireland won a medal.



# **CHAMPIONSHIP** WITHDRAWALS

A Chara

It was sad to read of the recent spate of withdrawals by clubs from various championships in County Waterford. One also noted with concern a report from one particular senior football club that they did not have a competitive game for 14 weeks at the height of summer. These reflect both how fragile the club structure is in many parts of the county and how unsatisfactory the competitive structure is at all levels. These two are not unrelated.

It is worth comparing the situation in Waterford with that in Kildare. Both counties are very similar in size, population, and the number of GAA clubs. However, they could hardly be more different when it comes to competitive structures,

All but one of the 45 adult football clubs in Kildare participate in the senior football league which is divided into three divisions. This means that there is an average of 15 teams in each division, giving each team 14 league matches in all. The league starts in February with Sunday games every fortnight, and them switches to fortnightly games on Tuesdays in April, continuing through the summer into autumn. Postponements are very rarely allowed and are not allowed at all where players are involved in training for county teams. The leagues run very smoothly every year: by the end of July this year, most teams had already completed at least 10 games.

In addition, there is a junior football league of 57 teams divided into five divisions, i.e. an average of 11 teams per division. All clubs in the senior league have at least one other team in the junior league, and no less than 12 clubs have two teams in the junior league. How many clubs in Waterford would be capable to putting our three adult teams on a regular basis throughout the GAA season? By the end of July most teams in the junior league had played 9 or 10 games.

The football championships in Kildare are played on a knock-out basis, which generates great spectator interest. These are various grades to cater for over 100 adult teams in all. As senior level, group teams (not necessarily made up of neighbouring clubs) provide extra competition and interest, and allow good players from weaker clubs a higher stage on which to express their talents. Being knocked out of the cha...pionship at an early stage is not the end of the world, as the highly competitive leagues continue to provide plenty of action. Championship matches are always played on weekends, which allows clubs to bring back players living away from home. And although Kildare were involved in the Leinster senior championship until the final, the county championship is also now (mid-August) also at the final stage.

Because of the limited number of senior hurling clubs in Kildare, the championship is played on a league system, as in Waterford. This has no real impact on public interest, which is limited as far as hurling is concerned. However, there is also a separate senior hurling league of two divisions (plus a two-division junior league).

Comprehensive league structures also operate at under-age level in both football and hurling, with knockout championships. A master fixture list for all league games at all levels is issued in February, which allows both clubs and players to make advance arrangements (apart from the championships, which are unpredictable after the first round). As far as I can make out, this system works extremely well and gives plenty of competition to most players. Regular competitive fare, of course, also attracts players, thereby strengthening the club structure.

One final point: Kildare manages to get on fine without dividing itself internally into divisional boards. One wonders what function the divisional boards in Waterford serve (apart from increasing the number of officer positions to be filled). At underage level, it means that the same four of five clubs in both east and west play each other every year. Would not a county-wide championship greatly increase the interest of both the players and the public alike? With no two parts of the county much more than an hour's drive apart, this should not be too difficult to arrange.


