Farmers Protest At Proposed Increases In Sheep Dipping Charges

Protesting farmers took to the streets of Dungarvan last Monday to voice their anger at proposed increases in sheepdipping charges to be introduced next month by Waterford County Council.

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About one hundred placard carrying IFA members, headed by Deputy President, Tom Parlon, picketed a County Council meeting and heard Mr. Parlon declare that "sheep farmers are not prepared to continue to prop up the current shambles of a sheep scab eradication programme longer."

Multi Million Pound Water Scheme For **Nest Waterford?**

unanimously this week to reactivate plans to provide a new multi-million pound regional water supply scheme in the western end of the county.

It is over thirty years since the idea of one major water supply scheme to cater for the entire West Waterford region was first mooted. Now the first tentative steps are to be put in place to bring the massive project to reality.

In a report to Monday's Council meeting, Co. Manager Dan Hurley said that for the most part the existing water supply infrastruc-ture in West Waterford is unsatisfactory.

"There is a clear need for a new regional water scheme which would supply the entire region from a single high capacity source and treatment plant and allow for the elimination of the existing fifty-three small schemes serving the area," Mr. Hurley said.

The Co. Manager said the proposed regional scheme would provide a major boost to the economic development of West Waterand would complement the efforts of the County Development Partnership Board, the West Waterford Partnership, Ardmore Development Co-op,

Mr. Hurley pledged that the Council will vigourously

pursue the promoters for the money — and through the courts if needs be. "We are owed the money and are determined to get it," the County Manager added.



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


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Some things to be doing during this month

SAD to say but the cooler weather is coming and it's time to start bedding down the garden before winter.

Thankfully, none of the chores is back-breaking but they still need to be done thoroughly.



LAWNS — ease up on mowing so that the grass can grow thicker and hardier for winter and then use a spring rake to remove the accumulated fibrous debris or 'thatch'.

Make any repairs by sowing seed or cutting and turning or transferring turf to worn patches.

The optional finishing touch is to apply a top dressing and fertiliser.

HEDGES — time for the final trim and make sure you clear all clippings and other debris which might allow pests to overwinter.

You can take cuttings from some varieties such as privet and use these to extend or repair your hedge.

FLOWER BEDS — many plants need lifting throughout September, starting with the most succulent and, therefore, most readily damaged by frost.

Exotic tuberous-type begonias are particularly prone so lift early and allow them to dry off before storing in peat-filled boxes away from frost. Fuchsias, geraniums and others can be potted up

and placed in a cool greenhouse, while dahlias can wait until last. The leaves might look a little sorry after a few frosty mornings but they are really quite tough.

Sow hardy annuals as well, such as pansies, larkspur, cornflowers and love-in-the-mist.

BULBS — snowdrops and crocuses flower earlier than other spring bulbs so get them in first and follow up with daffodils and narcissi, hyacinths and tulips, although these can even go in as late as early November.

TOMATOES — cooler nights put outdoor tomatoes at risk, so pick the lot and ripen green ones inside paper bags in a warm place such as the airing cupboard — they need warmth rather than sunshine to ripen.

VEGETABLES — make sure you lift and carefully store beetroot and carrot — choose somewhere dark, dry and cool and protected from mice and rats. Potatoes should follow after the tops have yellowed, but parsnips can stay in the soil until needed

GREENHOUSE — it now needs closing at night. If you heat your greenhouse over winter, check the heating system is in order and make any repairs. You can keep costs down by lining the glass with plastic bubbled packaging as a cut-price double glazing.

MAINTENANCE — with the weather still mild and the garden about to enter its dormant period you can rattle through the DIY chores such as creosoting, mending or building walls and fences, or path clearing and laying, pond-building and planting trees and shrubs.

Upsidedown Cake



The delicious fruit and caramel topping to this cake goes into the tin first. Covered with a light, spongy mixture, it is baked, then turned out upside down.

UPSIDE DOWN CAKE Ingredients: Topping

2 oz (50g) butter 2 oz (50g) brown sugar large can apricot halves Sponge Mixture

9 oz (250g) flour 4 tsp baking powder 1/2 tsp salt 2 oz (50g) butter 5oz (150g) castor sugar 1 egg 1/4 pt milk



Method:
Melt butter and brown
sugar together until mixture
bubbles.

Line a 20cm (8in) cake tin with baking parchment. Pour the sugar misture over base of tin.

Arrange drained fruit, cutside uppermost, over base in caramel mixture. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Soften butter, add sugar and well-whisked egg, and beat thoroughly until light

and fluffy. Stir in flour, alternating with milk.

Spoon mixture into tin and bake in pre-heated oven, 350°F, 180°C, gas mark 4, for 50-60 mins. Test with skewer. Turnout on serving dish.



From Wednesday, September 1st, new telephone charges will apply. The charge for a call will depend on its destination, time of day and duration. Lower charges apply in the evening and at weekends. Many calls will be cheaper, some will be dearer. Overall, customers will pay £15 million a year less.

Local calls

Local calls will be charged at 3 minute intervals during the day and 15 minute intervals in the evening and at weekends. Each interval is charged at 11p, down from 12p. Short local calls during the day will be cheaper, but longer calls will cost more.

National calls

On Saturdays, Sundays and Public holidays a new special weekend rate is being introduced. For 11p (reduced from up to £1.72) you will be able to call to anywhere in the country, including Northern Ireland, for up to 10 minutes. Last year major reductions in long distance call charges were also made.

International calls

The cost of international calls will be reduced by an average of 35%. Reductions of up to 50% will apply to some destinations. The charge for a 6 minute call to Britain at night and weekends will be £1.65, reduced from £2.46. A similar call to the United States at weekends will be £3.75, reduced from £5.65.

Freefone

Calls to Freefone numbers are not charged to callers. Many companies now offer Freefone services.

Telephone Bill

Commencing in September, more detailed information on local calls will be shown on your bill. This will enable you to monitor usage and get the best value from your telephone.

NEWSPAPER PORNOGRA 'Silence Of Clerg

Members of Waterford County Council have hit out at what they described as the "distasteful and disgraceful" Sunday tabloid newspapers that are flooding the homes of the country.

The "silence of the clergy" on the matter was alsoslammed, and parents were urged to refuse to allow the newspapers concerned into their homes at Monday's Council meeting in Dungar-

A notice of motion tabled by Fianna Fail's Cllr. Kieran O'Ryan asking that the Council "deplore the amount of pornography displayed in certain newspapers and magazines" was supported unanimously and will now be forwarded to the Minister for Justice.

Cllr. O'Ryan said he was referring specifically to the British Sunday tabloids and the Sunday World as well as certain magazines.

"I am not being holier than thou in making this protest", said Cllr. O'Ryan, "but the time really has come to cry stop as far as this distasteful and disgraceful pornogra-phy is concerned."

He said he was disgusted with the clergy whose si-lence on the matter has been deafening, and he called on all "responsible" parents not to allow the offending newspapers into their homes.

"I am not attempting in any way to interfere with the freedom of the press".

Cllr. Gary O'Halloran (FG) said he fully supported his colleague, and he would also voice his disapproval and concern of satellite television channels that are now beaming blue movies into Irish homes on as many as four nights a week.

Cllr. Billy Kyne (Labour)

said that in many instances journalistic and moral standards have dipped and sadly it is these newspapers that are often the market leaders.

We are all men and women of the world but the Government should take this issue on board," said Cllr. Kyne. "We are not seeking to be restrictive but rather to be responsible," he

Kilrossanty Water **Scheme Broke** Down 28 Times

The water supply scheme servicing Kilrossanty has broken down twenty-eight times in the first eight months of this year, Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council was told.

Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer, confirmed that statistic after Cllr. Oliver Coffey had moved a notice of motion asking that the Council consider laying a new watermain for the scheme — given the huge number of leaks and breaks that have occurred so far this year.

Cllr. Coffey said that during the month of July alone there had been thirteen or fourteen breaks in the scheme and that simply isn't good enough when people are paying £109 a year for water.

He said the local national school is served by the supply and with the children returning to school this week they, and the community generally, cannot be left without water for days on

Cllr. Tom Cunningham supported his colleague and warned that unless something is done to rectify matters the people may consider withholding their water

The Co. Engineer accepted that there is a problem and confirmed that there had been 28 breaks in the scheme in the first eight months of this year.

Mr. O'Flynn said however that it would cost £54,000 to replace the main and the Council simply couldn't afford that level of expendi-

ture.
"I cannot give specific undertakings at this stage," Mr. O'Flynn went on, "though I accept that 28 breaks in eight months is crazy."

Farmers Protest At Proposed Increases In Sheep Dipping Charges

"We are fed up with being cision to increase sheep dipripped off to the tune of £3 million annually in private dipping charges," he said.

The IFA Deputy President accused successive Ministers for Agriculture of ignoring the demands of sheep farmers over the past five years and allowing local politicians to perpetrate a sheep dipping scheme which has become "outdated and unnecessary."

Mr. Parlon called on the Minister for Food - Waterford Labour T.D. Brian O'Shea — to take control of the sheep dipping issue and regulate the scheme immediately.

The IFA National Sheep committee Chairman, John Elmore, Waterford IFA Chairman, Pat Murphy, Waterford Sheep Committee Chairman, James Coughlan and Jimmy O'Grady of the Waterford Sheepbreeders Association also took part in the protest.

NO CHANGE

Despite the big IFA protest however, and the efforts of a number of county councillors to rescind an earlier de-

ping charges this year, an uncompromising County Manager refused to budge on the issue when it was raised in the Council cham-

Mr. Dan Hurley reminded the members that the matter of sheep dipping charges was an executive function and there would be no change.

Earlier Cllrs. William Mc-Donnell, Kieran O'Ryan, Ollie Wilkinson, Tom Cunningham and Oliver Coffey all spoke in support of rescinding the price hike decision, but the Manager insisted that all he had done was to ensure a "break even" situation for the Council in the dipping of sheep. Last year the Council had subsidised the scheme to the tune of almost £10,000.

Cllr. Queally said there was no practical reason why County Councils should be involved at all in sheep dipping, and he was certain all responsible0 farmers would carefully look after their own sheep.

Bunjy Jumping In Stokes Field

Postponed on Pattern Sunday due to technical difficulties with the crane the spectacle of Bunjy jumping was witnessed for the first time by Abbeyside people on Saturday week last. The crane raised the jumping platform to a height of 115 feet above ground level. David Newcombe told me that Bunjy jumping originated in New Zealand and his double safety system complies with the strict safety code that exists in that country. There have been over 400,000 jumps in a period covering the last five years and thankfully there has been no accident as yet.

Each jumper is weighed and this information is recorded on to a card and from that on to a medical sheet. There are three types of bunjy cord — green, red and black with varying degrees of bounce and stretch suitable for people of different weights. One also noticed the new bunjy cords on the floor of the platform

as replacements for the cords currently being used when they become overstretched and begin to unrayel.

Up to 3 p.m. on Saturday 24 people had jumped and each had paid £40 for the privilege and this total included some girls who had jumped in the morning. David Newcombe maintained that the decision to jump was a big decision to make for the individual concerned. There was the element of fear to be overcome and the degree of positiveness involved was incredible but in the end of the day there was a lot of

As Shane Power entered the platform he stated he was slightly nervous. From the top of the crane there was a tremendous view of Dungarvan harbour and bay. As the safety line was attached he was instructed to keep his eyes open and enjoy the experience. As the moment approached the instructions were to look up

and out and at the end of the countdown (5-4-2-3-1) a big dive was needed. The traditional scream as Shane catapulted through the air was ear-piercing. Back at ground level Shane was animated and described the experience as brilliant - that it got the adrenalin going and that he would do it again. Brian Kirby described his jump as excellent - brilliant and that everyone should do it. Micky Power of Friars Walk jumped out backwards and claimed it was brilliant backwards — a great buzz - the blood rushed to the head. During the countdown he couldn't wait to go. Pat Organ jumped twice, the second experience costing him only

This exhibition will give local people the opportunity to see a wide variety of projects in which enterprising local people are establishing businesses. This list includes Light Engineering, Furniture, Horticulture Landscape Gardening, Food, Clothing,

Ideas which can be made into successful enterprises are not always the most obvious ones, one of the keys to small business involves success coming up with products which serve new markets well or old

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markets better. A number of the featured businesses are developing new and innovative products including custom designed office furniture, chemical analysis and an aquatic weed harvester. Other projects involved build on the strengths of the Waterford area some of which are unique to the county. Droleen Glass for example is a small business turning the areas tradition of glasswork into a new range of decorative flat glass. The areas mild climate also means that it is possible to develop products unique to the area such as for example West Waterford Vineyards, Irelands only producing vineyard. The tradition of agriculture in the area is also being built on in the fields of herb and landscape gardening.

As an area which is developing as a tourist centre visitors to the area will be an important outlet for some of the products on display, these include businesses such as Celvik Heritage who laminate pictures and do Photoglasing, and some of the craft products on display, such as Martin O' Riordans woodcarvings and Dungarvan candle supplies.

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Despite the importance of the tourist industry and outside markets it is hoped that local people will gain a greater knowledge of the services and products which are available locally, local support is essential for the success of most of the businesses involved in this exhibition and it is hoped that in the future local people will make the enterprises on display their first port of call when doing business. One important aspect of the marketing of the products on display is the role that local businesses can play in supporting these products, local retailers for example and local companies may be able to identify products which are locally made and which they can bear in mind for the future.

LINKS WITH LOCAL INDUSTRY KEY TO THE PARTNERSHIP APPROACH.

The West Waterford Development Partnership was set up in 1991 as one of the twelve area based companies set up under the Programme for Economic

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and Social Progress to develop locally based responses to unemployment in specific areas. It is a local company, including on its board local representatives of Employers, Unions, Farming organisations, Community Organisations and the State Sector. From its inception the company has enjoyed the active support of a number of the large local employers. The support of Waterford Foods in particular was instrumental in setting up the company. The company operates a broad range of initiatives which have been identified as having potential for tackling unemployment in the West Waterford area. Local industry representatives such as Partnership chairman John Moloney of Waterford Foods and Michael Holland representative of the sponsors of this exhibition Waterford Glass play an active role and give considerable time to the operation of these initiatives by the Partnership.

LINKING IN THE AGENCIES.

The role of the partnership also involves work and co-operation with a number of agencies including FAS, Teagasc, Bord Failte, Department of Social Welfare. Bord Glas and the County Development Team. In many cases the Partnership work involves reffering people to one of the above mentioned agencies rather than direct assistance. As with industry close links with other state agencies is vital to the development of the area.

It is hoped that as many people will be able to attend on Wednesday the 8th and Thursday the 9th to see what the hard work of local entrepeneurs is achieving in the area.

The Enterprising Waterford Exhibition has been made possible by the Waterford Glass.

As well as agreeing to support the exhibition Waterford Glass is also giving three awards to local enterprise at the exhibition. Winners will be announced during the exhibition itself.

Telecom Mast **Should Be Fenced Off**

controversial telecommunications mast erected on Cruachán Mountain outside Dungarvan by Bord Telecom should be fenced off for security purposes, members of Waterford County Council insisted at Monday's meet-

Cllr. Oliver Coffey proposed that Telecom be asked to provide a security fence around the mast which now stood at a height of 164 feet. He had been informed that the mast is being climbed by people and that can only create a hazardous situation.

However, the County Engineer, Mr. John O'flynn said the construction of the mast has still not been completed and when it has, the company will be erecting a protective fence around it.

Clir. Urges **Deferment Of** Abandonment Plan

Members of Waterford County Council were told at Monday's meeting of plans by the Fishguard and Ross-lare Railways and Harbours Co. to make an Abandonment Order in respect of twenty five miles of the former Dungarvan-Waterford railway line.

A copy of the notice of the company's intention was presented to yesterday's meeting indicating that the line between Garrynageragh outside Dungarvan and Kil-culliheen in Co. Kilkenny would be abandoned.

However Cllr. Oliver Coffey urged that they seek a deferment of the abandonment plan for one year. He indicated an interest in acquiring sections of the line by some local people who may be able to come together to convert the land into a tourist attraction. "It would be a great pity to allow the line to be abandoned," he said.

Cllr. Kieran O'Ryan agreed and said the line should never have been closed first day.

The County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, said the Council should try to insist that if the line is abandoned that it would then come into the Council's possession.

He also suggested that they enter into discussions with Iarnrod Eireann in relation to the Council acquir-

ing it. Cllr. Billy Kyne felt the Council should certainly endeavour to take over the stewardship of the land and try to make the best possible use of it. The fact of the matter is that the line is long since been abandoned and what is now happening is that the legal process is being put in place.

Cllr. Pat Leahy said there are many scenic areas along the route of the line that could, with development, become popular tourist attractions.

Cllr. Paddy O'Callaghan said the Council must, if at all possible, retain the land along the rail line in its en-

Kyne Launches Attack On O'Shea Hotel & Leisure **And Kenneally**

A Labour Party member of Waterford County Council has accused his party colleague in Government, Minister for Food, Brian O'Shea, of a silence on the issue of Higher Level Education Grants that gives a whole new meaning to the "silence of the lambs."

Cllr. Billy Kyne launched a blistering attack on Minister O'Shea and the Waterford Fianna Fail T.D. Brendan Kenneally at Monday's County Council meeting for their inaction in seeking a change in how people are assessed for eligibility under the Higher Education Grant Scheme.

Cllr. Kyne said nett rather than gross income should be the determining factor for these grants, but under Labour in Government, nothing has yet changed in this regard.

"It is common knowledge that this is a bias against the PAYE sector, yet the Labour Party in Government has done

nothing in Government about it," said Cllr. Kyne. "This continuing insult and injustice should not be forgotten just because Labour is in Government."

Cllr. Kyne said speeches made when in opposition must be matched by action in Government. "The si-lence of Minister O'Shea and Deputy Kenneally in Waterford gives the "si-lence of the lambs" a whole new meaning," he said.

It was agreed unanimously to again call on the Minister for Education to make nett rather than gross income the determining factor in all future Higher Education Grant Schemes.

forestry and fisheries/aquaculture in the area as well as creating much needed sustainable employment.

Mr. Hurley said the most likely source for the scheme is the river Blackwater and the abstraction point would be upstream of Lismore.

The Blackwater is a designated salmonid river under EC Freshwater Fish directive and is of good quality. The proposed abstraction would have minimal impact on the river flow," he said.

The County Manager added that the proposed area to be served by the scheme has a population of 25,000 and is currently served by fifty-three separate schemes with a current daily demand of between two and three million gallons. He said that while Dungarvan town has its own adequate water supply the proposed regional supply would also have the capacity to provide Dungarvan if needed.

Mr. Hurley estimated the overall cost of the scheme would be £36m, and would run to over £40m, if it was to cater for areas in midcounty. The project would be carried out in stages so capital expenditure would be phased over a considerable time period.

The County Manager urged the members to agree to put the proposed scheme to the planning stage and they should now accept in principal that the scheme should be proceeded with. He did not anticipate any cost implication for the teen months.

On the proposal of Cllr. William McDonnell, seconded by Cllr. Jimmy Ouirke, it was unanimously agreed in principal to go ahead with the scheme and to initiate the planning of it.

Cllr. Nora Flynn also agreed and said many of the existing fifty-three schemes now serving West Waterford are now outdated.

"The regional scheme will be a very big undertaking but we are well capable of doing it," Cllr. Flynn added.

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
