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# **Decision On** Microwave **Transmitter To** Be Given Wit

Members of the Comeragh Environmental Protection Association who are vigorously opposed to plans by Cork Communications Ltd. to erect a microwave transmitter on the Comeragh mountains, picketed the offices of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Friday during a meeting between the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley and the five councillors from the Kilmacthomas electoral area.

All five councillors are backing the campaign of opposition to the transmitter by local residents.

Now a decision on the application by the company is imminent, and in fact the "Leader" learned authoritively in recent days that it is likely to be given within the week.

When the company submitted its original planning application the County Council sought further details in relation to it. These

were subsequently supplied and last Friday's meeting between the County Manager and the area councillors was to discuss the current up-to-the-minute position in relation to the application.

News of the meeting was leaked to the Comeragh Environmental Protection Association however and the golden opportunity of highlighting their continued opposition to the Cork Communications planning application was seized by

the placing of pickets on the Council offices.

Opponents of the proposal to erect the transmitter fear that it will be a health hazard as well as an environmental blot on the mountain. A spokesman for the Association said there is a complete lack of evidence to show that the proposed transmitter is

"In fact, there is a substantial and growing body of evidence that microwave radiation causes increased risks of cancer, blood abnormalities and other diseases,"

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














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
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# These bulbs will help to brighten your **Christmas!**



WE suspect that Christmas shopping starts earlier and earlier, but I don't mind shops and garden centres reminding us now about festive

These create extra colour indoors apart from the rich reds and greens of the Christmas tree and holly.

But you need to buy specially prepared 'forced' bulbs. They can be more expensive than normal spring bulbs and deteriorate if not planted immedi-

The secret then us to 'plunge' them into cool and dark conditions, fooling them into believing they have gone through winter.

The ideal temperature is about 40F and the usual method is to bury them in a dormant bed in the gar-

Choose a shallow and durable container which can later be cleaned easily or dropped into a decorative

It can be filled with either bulb fibre or potting compost, but the latter helps feed the bulbs for replanting in the garden next autumn — they can never be forced for indoors again.

Place a moist layer of potting medium in the base of your bowl before placing the bulbs but do not hamper root growth by crowding or 'screwing' them

Then firm material around the bulbs to leave tips showing and half an inch between the surface and the container's rim.

The bowl or pot should then be plunged into a hole in a dormant bed and covered with an insulating layer of about four inches of peat or wrapped in plastic sheet before burial.

The conditions can also be created indoors if you fear you might forget your bulbs or simply haven't got a garden or the space.

Simply cover the bowel with black plastic or several layers of newspaper to exclude all light. Then store in a cool place — a garage or shed is ideal — but make sure there are no warm periods or the method will fail.

If you want the bulbs to bloom for Christmas, you need to unearth or check them at the end of November or when shoots are an inch high whichever come first.

Then move into a shady and cool room for five days before placing the bowl or pot near a window to strengthen the leaves.

When flowers develop, move the container to a spot for display. It should be bright but out of direct sunlight, away from draughts and heaters and ideally around 60-70F.

Turn the bowl regularly to promote even growth and watch for yellowing leaves - a sign of draughts or poor light. Overwatering can cause rot. Cut away spent blooms but continue feeding foliage so that the bulbs can regenerate before lifting out, drying and then replanting next autumn.

# Colligan Lady **Ends Show** Jumping Season On **High Note**

Louise Moloney ended her showjumping season on a high note. After qualifying in the Egan Spectacle Sportsman Amateur Quali-fier at Millstreet, in 2nd place, Louise went on to the Egan Spectacle Sportsman Amateur Final, where she was just edged out of first place by a fraction of a second. Two second places at the Millstreet Show was a great achievement.

Over 80 jockeys competed in the qualifying rounds, where clear rounds were hard to come by, when rustic fences in the main national rounds accounted for a good number of penalties. 12 qualified for the final and Louise, riding her horse Apache Creek, held the lead with an excellent clear round, clearing the line in 34.54 seconds. It took Gerry Dillon, from Galway, the last jockey to ride, to beat her by a fraction in 34.51 seconds.

Success at Millstreet was the climax of an excellent season on the Munster Circuit for Louise and Apache Creek. They won four 1st places at Killeagh, Middleton, Glengoura and Charleville, and 2nd place at Ballyhooly and Mill-

Louise's success will be no surprise to those who know her. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tony Condon, one of the best known horse connections in Munster and sister to Michael Condon of Cappagh. While Apache Creek takes a well earned rest, it's back to work for Louise

who with her husband John owns and runs the Colligan Equestrian Centre. Situated in the beautiful Colligan area in view of the Comeragh Mountains, it is an ideal place for riding lessons and hacking.

Our version is quick and easy cook, and this makes an ideal dish for a buffet style meal. Serve it with lots of fluffy boiled rice, and mango chutney.

**HOT TURKEY** 

Ingredients:

2 tbs (30ml) oil 11/2 lb (750g) onions 2 tbs (30ml) curry powder 1/2 tsp (2.5ml) ground ginger 19 oz (540g) can condensed cream of celery soup, undiluted 1 pt (500ml) water 2 oz (50g) sultanas 4-5lbs (60/75ml) mango chutney irry Favour With 4 lb (2kg) cooked turkey (or chicken) salt & pepper 10 fl oz (250ml) soured

Method:

Heat oil in a large saucepan, add onion and cook slowly for 10-15 mins until tender. Sprinkle curry into pan mix well and cook for 2-3 minutes.

Add soup, water and sultanas, mix well and bring to the boil. Add chutney and season to taste. Cut turkey (or chicken) into strips and add to sauce. Cover pan and leave on a very low heat for 15-20 mins. until turkey is very hot.

Add soured cream and heat but do not boil. Serve immediately. **Serves 12-14**

# **Dungarvan Castle Courtyard Recital To Mark National Heritage Day**

Sunday next, September 12, has been designated National Heritage Day by the Office of Public Works, as custodians on behalf of the nation, of all national monuments. To mark the occasion, Dungarvan Museum Society is delighted to present a public recital by Dungarvan Brass Band at 3 p.m. in the courtyard of Dungarvan Castle.

One of a series of defensive castles built by Prince John on his first visit to Ireland in 1185, it has had in its 800 year existence a colourful history, both military and political and was also in the summer of 1882 the scene of a musical recital by a band of the Kings Own Borderers who were then stationed in Dungarvan and performed in the castle for the townspeople. Now, 111 years later, Dun-

garvan Brass Band will provide the music for the recital to mark National Heritage Day.

The band, which was started in the 1870's and disbanded temporarily during World War 1, reformed in 1922 to mark the cessation of hostilities of the War of Independence and the handing over of Dungarvan Castle from the Royal Irish Constabulary to the Republican Army on 4th May, 1922 when the tricolour was first raised over the castle.

This Sunday the colour party heading the band parade via Bridge Street, Grattan Square and Main Street, will again parade the national flag into Dungarvan's ancient national monument.

Following the band recital a guided walk of the castle will take place with local author and historian William Fraher as guide. All are welcome and admission is free.


#### COMMUNITY CENTRE COMMITTEE



# REMEMBERING GENERAL

# LIAM LYNCH

It is now 70 years last April since General Liam Lynch was fatally wounded on the slopes of the Knockmealdown Mountains close to Goatenbridge. A round tower on the mountain side marks the place where the Chief of Staff of Republican Forces fell in the final weeks of the tragic Civil War. His death shocked former comrades who fought with him in the War of Independence almost as much as Michael Collins death shocked people on both sides eight months

On Sunday, September 12 at 3 p.m. Liam Lynch will be remembered in ceremonies held at the monument to his memory on the Knockmealdowns close to Goatenbridge and also at Kelchumper near Fermoy where he is laid to rest.

His death came at a time when the Republican Forces were finding it difficult to find an honourable way to end a conflict that was destructive potentially and economically as well as having a legacy of bitterness and suspicion that is now thankfully almost gone.

General Liam Lynch was a man who played a major role in preventing earlier conflict between pro and anti-treaty forces and only with great reluctance did he bring his men into the conflict. His record as a leader of men on the War of Independence from 1919 was most impressive. He was recognised by Michael Collins and Dick Mulcahy as one of the top leaders in the field during the war.

The capture of Lynch and his men of General Lucas and other high ranking British officers near Fermoy made national headlines and set the balladeers to work. As the tragic Civil War broke out direct-

ly as a result of a wildcat action by Rory O'Connor and some of his followers who took over the Four Courts against the wishes, if not the orders, of those leaders opposing the Treaty. This action played into the hands of Winston Churchill and other anti-Irish members of the British Cabinet who had lost their friends and the greatest enemy of all to Irish Independence, Field Marshal Sir Henry Wilson, who the I.R.B. executed on the orders of Michael Collins. The attack on the Four Courts took place to demonstrate to the British Government that the Provisional Government acting under the terms of the Treaty were in control of affairs in Dublin. As a result emotion replaced common sense and British intelligence exploited petty jealousies that existed due to tensions that developed for multiple reasons including personality clashes between the leaders who together achieved so much in a relatively short time.

The Civil War sides were infiltrated by British agents on a large scale and within weeks of its outbreak their two top enemies in Ireland, Michael Collins and Harry Boland were dead.

Liam Lynch was slow to enter the fray, but once involved he found it hard to surrender. His leadership qualities as well as his careful selection of the people he surrounded himself, contributed to his escape from earlier capture. His death came in a manner that was similar to Michael Collins at the hands of men who believed they were fighting for the cause Lynch believed he was defending.

He lived for several hours after his fatal wounding and when brought down by Free State Forces from the mountains. He spent sometime waiting in Nugent's Newcastle Village for transport to Clonmel Hospital. The couch on which he was placed is still in the Nugent family.

The monument that marks the spot where he was fatally wounded was erected by a dedicated group of people in the 1930's. Foremost among them was the late Jamesie McGrath of Newcastle, a man who played a prominent role in the fight for freedom and in the promotion of the Irish language.

On Sunday, September 12 on the Knockmealdown mountain side, at the Liam Lynch Commemoration, let us divest ourselves of views formed in the aftermath of happenings that shed lustre on no one responsible for the Civil War. Instead let us remember Lynch and Collins for the great achievements under theirleadership Ireland gained. Most of all let us remember them for their patriotism and their generousity to Ireland. With the passing of time their names and their deeds live on and will live on through countless generations yet to be born.

# Noticeable Absence Of British Buyers At Tallow Horse Fair

Not even the mighty tradition which has been so sterling an ally of Tallow Horse Fair down the decades could come to its rescue on Friday last on a day when it seemed that only the threecard trick merchants made a financial killing.

All the trappings so uniquely traditional of the country's leading horse fairs were in abundant evidence. The streets of the crowded town were lined with all kinds of traders and one could purchase anything from a needle to the proverbial anchor.

The snag was, however, that most people were there simply to look rather than to purchase and one extremely disgruntled clothes trader who packed up early described the day for him as a "washout"

But while there were horses aplenty on offer it was largely a case of quantity, and the very noticeable absence of British buyers resulted in relatively few big deals being done.

The Waterford Foods sponsored Gain Lunging Championship, which had a prize fund of £500, did ensure the presence of several good quality three year olds, but other than that, most of the equine experts were at one in giving the thumbs down to the overall standard of the horses on offer.

One veteran of the country's horse fairs, Joe O'Shea of Lismore, said the Tallow fair, like that as Cahirmee before it, was "full of culls" after the sales where the best of the horses had been sold.

"The three year olds were good, but the standard overall was nowhere near what it used to be," said Mrs. Bowly. "All the good quality horses are now going to the Goresbridge sales and the leading fairs are suffering as a result."

The brothers Joe and Liam O'Donoghue of Mount Prospect, Tallow, insisted that the absence of buyers from Britain had also hit the fair particularly hard this time. "The depressed situation there has had a major negative impact on business," they said.

But if the fair itself failed to measure up to expectation, its organisation was a splendid triumph for the local committee.

Both major awards of the day, sponsored by Guinness Group Sales, went to Co. Cork owners.

Patrick Noonan of Ballybride, Conna, captured the award for the best ridden hunter with his magnificent 16.2 four year old gelding by Nellgondie who was ridden by Larry Murphy of Fermoy, while the award for the best led horse likely to make a hunter went to Con Hayes of Glanmire with his equally impressive three year old gelding by Trimmingham.

The Gain Lunging Championship sponsored by Waterford Foods attracted a huge entry and was won by the three year old gelding Regular Clover by Regular Guy, who was shown by Michael Condon of Cappagh, Co. Waterford.

It was handsome compensation for Condon who showed the runner-up in last year's inaugural championship. This year's runner-up was Heat Cliff by Golden Cliff shown by J. P. Houlihan of Lismore.

## Donnelly Demands Start On Reclassification

IFA's representative on the Disadvantaged Areas Appeals Panel, John Donnelly, has called on Agriculture Minister Joe Walsh to issue immediate instructions to the Appeals Panel to start work on processing the classification appeals for inclusion in the Severely Handicapped Areas.

John Donnelly said that "Patience has run out among the 37,000 farm families in 7,000 townlands throughout the country who have appealed for reclassification to Severely Handi-

capped status."
"The legitimate case which these farmers have has been held up for far too long. I am calling on the Minister to give the Ap-

peals Panel the go-ahead to get to work straight away so that the benefits of reclassification will apply in 1993," Mr. Donnelly stressed.

The IFA man said that 700 groups covering all or part of 19 counties had applied for reclassification. A total of 2.2 million acres is under appeal including the remainder of Counties Cavan, Monaghan, Galway, Kerry, Clare, West Cork, Offaly and Laois as well as significant parts of other counties," John Donnelly said. Altogether 66% of the existing Less Severely Handicapped areas are covered by the 700 groups which have lodged appeals with the Department of Agriculture.

# German and French Agreement on Re-Negotiation of Gatt Described as "Breakthrough" by Gillis

The Waterford IFA Co. Chairman, Pat Murphy has expressed his support of Alan Gillis' statement what he described as "a breakthrough on the GATT threat to EC agriculture."

"The Irish Government has been given a great opportunity to press at EC level for a renegotiation of the worst elements of the GATT proposals on agriculture, following the meeting between the French and German Prime Ministers recently."

Mr. Gillis welcomed the joint statement from Mr. Balladur and Mr. Kohl in which Germany has acknowledged the French Government's objections to certain elements of the Blair House agreement.

Mr. Gillis stated: "The Taoiseach should immediately inform the other EC Member States that Ireland has major objections to the proposed export refund cuts in the beef sector and the non-payment of refunds on beef exports to Japan.

There also are problems for the cereals, pigmeat and dairy sectors."

"Now that the two leading Member States of the EC have come out in favour of renegotiation of parts of the Blair House agreement, it is time for the Taoiseach to launch an Irish diplomatic initiative in advance of the key "Jombo" EC Council meeting of Agriculture and Foreign Trade Ministers on September 20, specially arranged to deal with the GATT issue."

# ICMSA Opposes New Phone Charges

Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, President of the ICMSA, said recently that the increase in local call charges which came into effect on September 1 is an anti social measure as it will result in even greater isolation for people living in isolated parts of the country and most especially for elderly people living alone.

Mr. O'Dwyer said that unlike in towns and cities where there is a great amount of social contact, people living in rural areas depend largely on the telephone as a means of social interaction.

"It is quite clear to me that rural people are being asked to subsidise the cost of overseas calls for the business community. This policy of robbing Peter to pay Paul is not an acceptable solution to the problems of any sector," said Mr.

# 76th Lions International Convention

[Minneapolis, Minnesota — July 5-9 1993]

The centre for the convention this year was Minneapolis — St. Paul's — better known in America as the "Twin Cities." This is the biggest annual event in world Lionism, bringing together upwards of 35,000 delegates who represent 1.4 million Lions in 172 countries and territories.

For administration purposes Lions structures are divided into districts and multiple districts. The Convention this year was hosted by Multiple District 5M and the opening remarks by Mr. Robert Lieb (Chairman of the host committee) in his welcoming address gives some idea of the size of our organisation - he greeted us on behalf of the 28,000 plus members of his multiple dis-

This was a big-adventure for me as it was my first time to visit a large U.S. city with no contacts and reservations. However, I had correctly anticipated that there would be Lions from the host club at the airport on the lookout for strangers like me. The one I met arranged accommodation in a very nice hotel on the official list. This meant we had a shuttle service to the Convention which mainly took place in the newly-built Minneapolis Convention Centre which is without doubt the largest building in terms of floor area that I have ever seen. One whole side was allotted to Registration which was divided into geographical areas. I found "Europe" where there were about six queues, one of which I joined. The man at the desk had considerable linguistic trouble with the two gentlemen in front of me. Although he spoke German and French he had to call in two more interpreters who finally managed to sort them out. I think they spoke some Eastern European language.

When I gave my name and nationality he said, "thank God for someone speaking English." In no time at all I had registered and took my place as a fully accredited delegate.

The Convention proper opened that morning with a parade of the nations which began at 9.45 and continued until 3 p.m. which means that it took nearly 6 hours to pass the reviewing stand. It is estimated that nearly 15,700 people took part. The parade included some of the most beautiful and striking floats I have ever seen. There was a huge one from New York carrying a replica of the Empire State Building and some glittering ones

from the Caribbean and the South Sea Islands. The current Miss Universe who is from that area rode in state on a magnificent throne accompanied by her ladies-in-waiting and a five-man cycle from some mid-Western state towed a trailer on which was mounted a life-size wooden Lion attired in Lions colours.

Another major attraction was the presence of many marching bands. Many of those were High School Bands. They are indeed a treat to watch because as well as their precision marching, the bands have highly trained acrobatic teams, who, at various street intersections, gave displays of their acrobatic prowess, to the great delight of many thousands who thronged the over 1 mile long route.

Multiple District 105 (Britain & Ireland) was well-represented in the parade. Among the Irish contingent I noticed our new District Governor and friendly Cork neighbour Lion Gerry Horgan and his charming wife Maura. Also prominent was the legendary George Glendon, plus, of course, our cameraman Lion Don Sweeney and his wife Valerie (nee Comerford from Dungarvan). All those I have mentioned are dedicated and hard working members of the team who manage and run what is fast becoming the number one Lions project in Ireland, the Annual Lions Holiday project for senior citizens at Mosney.

The first plenary session got underway at the second main Convention Centre at 10 a.m. on Wednesday morning. It was called to order by Donald E. Banker, past International President from Rolling Hills, California and the first welcoming address was delivered by the Mayor of Minneapolis. We then received a spirited address from the current International President, Lion Rohit C. Mehta from Ahmedabad, India. He was accompanied by his wife Asha.

In the afternoon the second plenary session mainly

dealt with the various candidates seeking election to the International Board of Directors, or for third Vice-President. We then had an informative address from Liv Ullman, film actress and Goodwill Ambassador for UNICEF, which appealed for help from the Lions.

The third plenary session began on Friday at 9 a.m. and consisted mainly of the installation of the government of Lions International for the coming year.

As this is the year of Campaign Sight First the main theme of the convention concerned the scourge of blindness. This is a huge problem as it is estimated there are 40,000,000 blind people in the world of which 80% or 32,000,000 can be cured or can have preventative treatment. In 1925 the great Helen Keller challenged the then fledgling Lions organisation to take up the year we had decided to try to raise 130 million dollars for it. I would urge our loyal supporters in this area to help us raise our share. 13 million dollars have already been allocated to nearly 40 Sight First Projects since the decision was taken in St. Louis in 1990.

Another aspect of the Convention was the getting together of the America MD's and quite a few of the Continentals for community breakfasts.

The main election each year is that of third Vice-President but it did not take place in Minneapolis because the effectiveness of the campaign of one of the five nominees caused the others to withdraw. The new third Vice-President is Augustin Saliva from Brazil.

Overall it was a great experience and I was delighted to be able to represent Dungarvan Lions Club at this top level Convention.

# **New Evening Class Programme At Waterford** Regional Technical College

Not all the part-time courses on offer are "imported", many of them are designed and delivered by the College itself. Such courses are referred to as ACCS courses and offer part-time learners the opportunity to gain the same nationally recognised qualifications as school leavers attending the Col-

Examples of courses in this category are the Bachelor of Business Studies, the Diploma in Electronics, the Certificate in Maintenance Technology, the Certificate in Legal Studies, the Diploma/Certificate in Commercial Computing, the Diploma in Science (Quality

short courses run under the heading "Small Business Enterprise Development" have been approved for certification by the NCEA in recognition of their importance for improving the performance of businesses and the consequent job creation.

The importance of having skills in languages for both business and social purposes must be obvious to everyone nowadays. To mark out their language achievements, the language students in WRTC are encouraged to enter for the examinations of the Royal Society of Arts which are based on oral and aural skills for everyday life. Examinations help students to keep their motivation and give them a goal towards which to aim; the Certificates are also an impressive addition to anyones CV.





A crowd of almost 33 turned up to view the progress being made with the development at Fraher Field and those who accepted the invitation to inspect the grounds were pleased with the progress being made.


The foundations are already in place for the Stand, which, when completed will seat 1,500 covered and a further 1,500 uncovered. The overground work had already commenced also on the project. The banks on the North, East and West sides of the ground are also in place and are higher and wider than before. During the viewing, a work model of the development was on view and this gave a clear idea of what the finished product

Afterwards a crowd of approximately 200 were present at Lawlor's Hotel where a briefing on the total development programme was given and explained in detail. Nioclas MacCraith, Secretary of the Field Committee, told those present about the extent of the development, the time-scale and the accommodation facilities of the fin-

Greg Fives, Treasurer, spoke on the financial aspect of the development and gave details of the Munster Council funding for the project and the financial input from the proceeds of the Deise Development Draw.

Eamon Murphy, County Chairman, congratulated all concerned with the development and paid a special tribute to the clubs for their support for the monthly draw, which was the main source of income for the development at both our county grounds.

Liam O'Donnell, member of the Walsh Park Field Committee, gave details of their proposed development and said that with their time-scale they should be applying for planning permission by December and all going



well they could begin work in early summer and finish by December. When their development is completed, Walsh Park will accommodate approximately 22,000 which will include 5,000 in a covered stand.

Michael Horgan, Architect, for the development at both grounds, also spoke and expressed himself very pleased with the progress being made in both fields.

The following is an update on the Fraher Field:

Playing Area — The playing area has been moved twelve feet towards the old showground side thus providing more spectator accommodation at Curran's boreen. The turves, which were lifted from Curran's boreen side of the pitch, have been relaid on the showground side. The pitch has been lengthened and widened to meet the Association's specifications. The surface on the newly laid turves and existing ground is in excellent condition and has been mowed twice already.

Spectator Accommodation — The grass bank on the showground side has been transferred to Curran's boreen side and will provide open air standing accommodation. The foundations have been dug and the concrete base completed for the new stand which will be situated at the showground side of the field. In view of the prevailing weather conditions, this was the most suitable location for erecting the stand. Covered seating accommodation will be provided for 1500 spectators and uncovered seating for an additional 1500. When completed, spectator capacity will be 12,000.

FINANCE

The bulk of the finance for the development of both our county grounds comes from the Deise Development Draw and it is to the credit of the 14,000 plus members that this project is underway. Whilst the development of both grounds will cost in the region of one million pounds, an enormous sum, we feel sure that the effort will be worthwhile and some comfort and shelter will, at long last, be available to our long suffering spectators. To all the people who have joined the draw and to many others who have assisted in various ways, we extend our
