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Magnificent New Fire Station Opened

The magnificent new £1 million headquarters of the County Waterford Fire Brigade Service were officially opening in Dungar-

van last Friday by the Minister of State at the Dept. of the Environment, Mr. John Browne T.D. The new headquarters are

one of the most imposing buildings of their kind in the county and are a striking tribute to the architects, Fehilly, Timony and Associ-

ates of Cork, and the main contractors E. O'Brien and Sons, Dungarvan.

Speaking at the official opening, Mr. Browne said that recent accidents at industrial plants in Cork, Dublin and Kilkenny had underlined the very important role which the fire services play in every community.

The Minister said fires like those he was specifically referring to in Cork, Dublin and Kilkenny require a response which embraces skill and training and the use of very specialised equipment. "They also require a good knowledge of what the risks are and how best to deal with them," he said.

One of the greatest hurlers never to have won an All-Ireland senior medal was remembered at the official opening. The original architect for the project was the late Galway-born, Cork-based, Joe Salmon to whom

"All Clear" Given For Microwave Transmitter

Cork Communications Ltd., has been given the planning "all clear" to erect a microwave transmitter and ancillary buildings on the Comeragh Mountains despite a vigorous campaign of opposition by local residents.

Within hours of the confirmation of last Friday's decision by the Waterford County Manager Mr. Dan Hurley, however, battle lines were being drawn, and the certainty is that the final adjudication on what has become a vexed issue in the county will rest with An Bord Pleanála.

The transmitter will be little more than twenty feet in height and will be sited at a location on the mountainside known locally as Seefin.

A total of nine conditions are attached to the planning permission, and these will, according to a Waterford County Council spokesman, completely eliminate any environmental threat to the scenic mountain range.

One of the conditions requires that the equipment room, standby generator and oil storage tanker will be placed underground.

Under another of the conditions a system of independent monitoring of radiation levels from the installation system will be undertaken periodically to ensure compliance with the International Radiation Protection Association guideline levels as may be set from time to time.

However a spokesman for the local group, the Comeragh Environmental Protection Association, which has stoutly opposed the Cork Communications proposal from day one, said that they were both shocked and angered by the Manager's decision.

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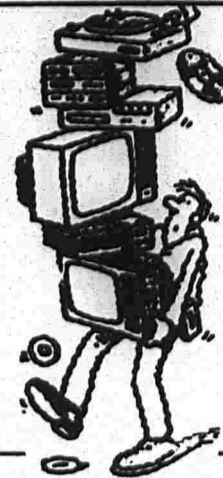
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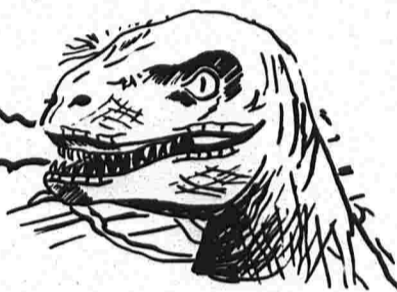


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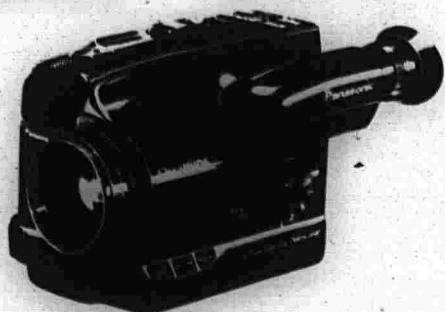
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Welcome For New Principal of Árd Scoil na nDéise

Billhooks, Slashers And Hurleys Used In "Frightening Spectacle"

Garda reinforcements were drafted into Lismore on Wednesday last to ensure that the burial of a local man wasn't marred by a repeat of the violence which erupted on the previous night when the remains were being carried into St. Carthage's Cathedral. Billhooks, slashhooks and

hurleys were used in what one local resident described as a "frightening spectacle." Several people were injured and one was removed to Our Lady's County Hospital in Cashel.

The violence erupted as the remains of Michael O'Connor, 17 Parks Road, Lismore were being borne

into the Cathedral. The body of the deceased — a father of thirteen — had been taken from the River Bride at Camphire near Cappoquin at the weekend.

No one is quite sure what sparked off the trouble, but many people ran for cover, such as the viciousness of it.

Afterwards there were all the visible signs of what had taken place, including several pools of blood in the church grounds.

A garda source stressed that there was no involvement in the fracas by any members of the dead man's family.

Wednesday's burial in St. Carthage's cemetery went off without incident. The garda presence, while discreet, was nonetheless very visible throughout.

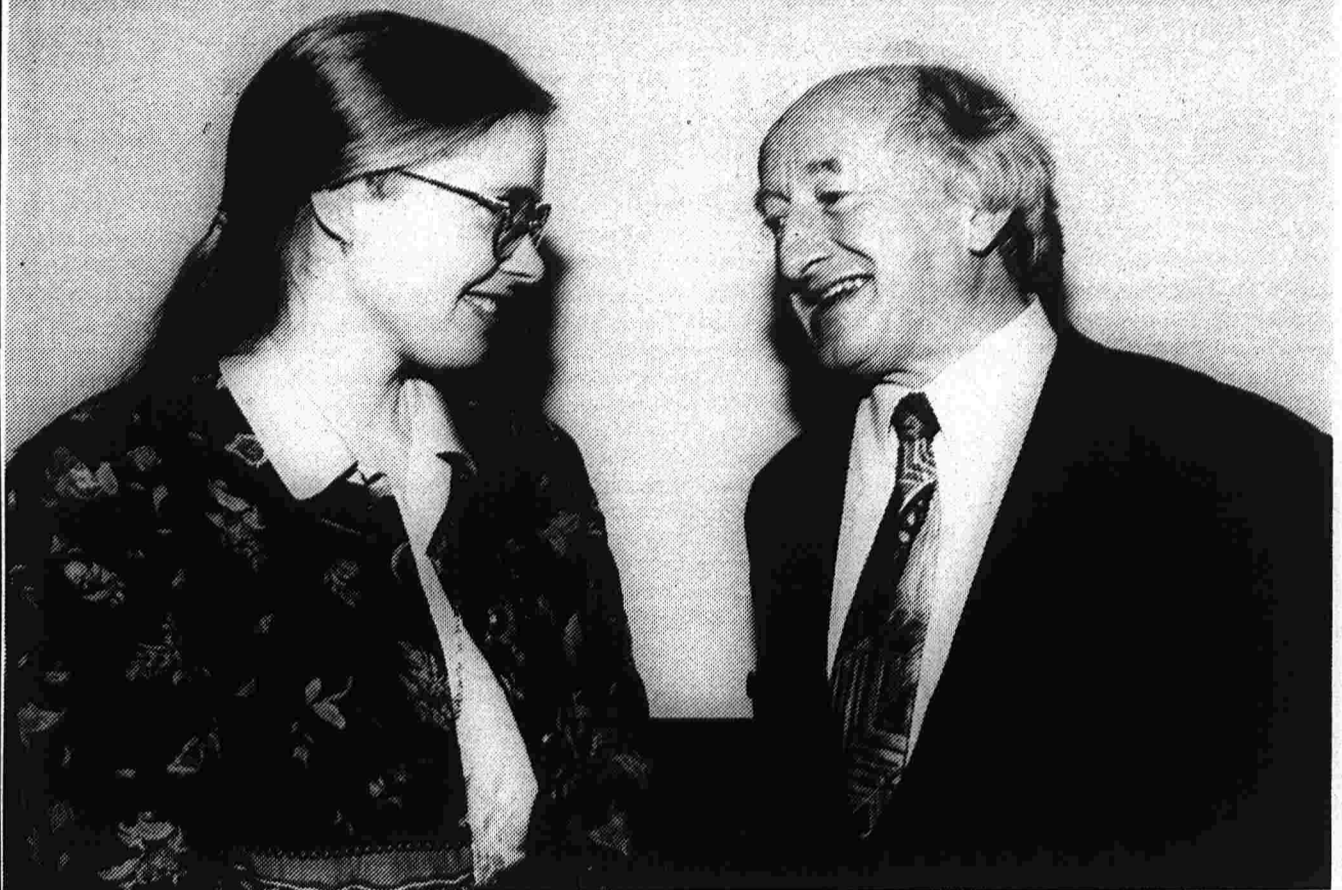

Presentation Of Certificates For Video Production Courses

At a presentation ceremony in The Park Lodge Hotel, Spiddal, on Thursday night of last week, the Minister for Arts, Culture and the Gaeltacht, Michael D. Higgins, T.D. presented certificates to a group of young Gaeltacht people who completed a Video Production training course organised by Udarás na Gaeltachta. Fifteen young people from Gaeltacht areas of counties Donegal, Galway, Kerry, Cork and Waterford accepted certificates, having completed the 15-week course which covered aspects of video production including production, editing, camera work, sound and script writing. The Minister also presented certificates to 5 other young people who completed a Technicians Course, which concentrated on camera skills, sound and editing.

The two courses were organised by Udarás na Gaeltachta with invaluable assistance from RTE, who provided equipment and instructors. A show-reel de-

scribing examples of the work done by the students during the course was shown at the presentation.

COURSES ARE VITAL

Speaking at the presentation ceremony, Minister O'Higgins praised both Udarás na Gaeltachta and RTE for their work in this area, saying that these courses are vital to the audio-visual industry in general and as a foundation stone for Teilifís na Gaeilge in particular. The Minister also stated that his Department is expecting a further allocation of EC Structural Funds which will be used for the benefit of the audio-visual industry as a whole.

At the ceremony the Minister also officially launched the training and careers guidance video "Sin Mise!" produced by the Training Services division of Udarás na Gaeltachta. This video gives an overview of the training and job opportunities available to young Gaeltacht people through the services of Udarás na Gaeltachta and associate

companies. The Minister praised the professional production and said that it showed the wide range of

training and job opportunities which are open to the young people of the Gaeltacht today.

£10,000 Paid By Concert Promoters

Last month the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, disclosed that the Council had not yet been paid by the promoters who owed a sum of in excess of £10,000. He pledged to pursue every possible avenue — including court proceedings if necessary — to get the

money owing to the Council.

The County Secretary, Mr. Brian McNally, told yesterday's meeting that the promoters had now come up with an interim payment of £10,000. A further sum is still outstanding and they will be billing the promoters for that balance.

"All Clear" Given For Microwave Transmitter

However the County Council spokesman said that the decision had only been arrived at after the most careful and detailed consideration of all the factors involved.

"Reports from the Coun-

cil's planning and environment officers, together with the opinions and views of the five elected public representatives for the Kilmacthomas electoral area have all been fully taken on

board," the County Council spokesperson said.

Contrary to earlier reports there was not unanimity of opposition among the five county councillors to the Cork Communications planning application.

CO. COUNCIL MEETING

Councillors Attack Manager's Decision

In granting planning permission to Cork Communications Ltd. to erect a microwave transmitter and ancillary buildings on the Comeragh Mountains, Waterford County Council had slammed the door in the faces of 1,400 local residents, Cllr. Tom Cunningham told Monday's Council meeting in Tramore.

Both Cllr. Cunningham and Cllr. Oliver Coffey attacked last weekend's decision of County Manager Mr. Dan Hurley to give the planning all-clear to Cork Communications. However the Manager insisted he had only given his decision after the most careful consideration of all the factors.

"Whatever decision I arrived at I would have been wrong in somebody's view," said Mr. Hurley. "This very emotive issue was always going to end up before Bord Pleanala," he added.

The vexed matter was raised by Cllr. Oliver Coffey who said the local public representatives had been inundated with telephone calls from angry residents since confirmation of the County Manager's decision to give planning permission

for the transmitter.

"People are up in arms," said Cllr. Coffey. "The opposition expressed to this development by 1,400 people has not been taken into consideration.

Cllr. Coffey said feelings are running very high against the County Council, and he was virtually certain that the decision will be appealed to An Bord Pleanala.

Cllr. Cunningham was even more emphatic, stating positively that an appeal will be lodged. Given that there were mixed views on the planning application among the five councillors for the Kilmacthomas electoral area he believed the Manager should have refused it.

Mr. Hurley said several conditions have been attached to the planning permission to ensure there is no negative environmental impact, and after considering all the technical and expert advice given to him, and listening to the views of the councillors, he had acted in the best interests in arriving at his decision.

Cllr. Nora Flynn however said she isn't at all satisfied that these microwave transmitters are not a health risk. "The country is now under a blanket of microwaves," she

added.

SKYLINE RUINED

Cllr. Paddy Kenneally then referred to the erection of eight standards on the mountainside at Toor near Clashmore very recently and said the whole skyline had been ruined by them. "What is happening out there. Has planning permission been granted for them," he asked.

Cllr. Gary O'Halloran supported his colleague and said the standards are now plainly visible from the main Cork-Waterford road.

Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer, said E.S.B. pylons are to be seen along the skyline in every county in the country. They may not be the nicest things in the world but there are lots of precedents for them.

"Would the Round Tower in Ardmore be given planning permission if someone now applied to build it," Mr. O'Flynn asked.

The County Manager said he would get a report on the eight standards at Toor referred to by Cllr. Kenneally, though if planning permission has been granted for them there is little the Council can now do about them.

Mr. O'Flynn said that if planning permission had not been granted in respect of all eight of them they would move with an Enforcement Order.

Later in the meeting Cllr. Billy Kyne said the councillors should be fully informed about all masts and transmitters erected around the county. There is something inherently wrong with their planning department, he said, if they can be erected without planning permission.

"Do we have the technical expertise to consider all the possible implications of these masts and transmitters", he queried. "They are haphazard developments that will cost this Council more and more trouble, and I am very concerned about them," Cllr. Kyne added.

The County Manager undertook to prepare a detailed report for presentation to a future meeting and said it would be as well also to have a policy document on masts

Purchase Scheme Given Thumbs Down

The latest Tenant Purchase Scheme introduced by the Department of the Environment was given a huge thumbs down at Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council.

Cllr. Billy Kyne (Labour) predicted that it will not have a big uptake in county Waterford; Cllr. Richie Walsh (F.G.) said it was considerably less attractive than the last one, while Cllr. Gary O'Halloran

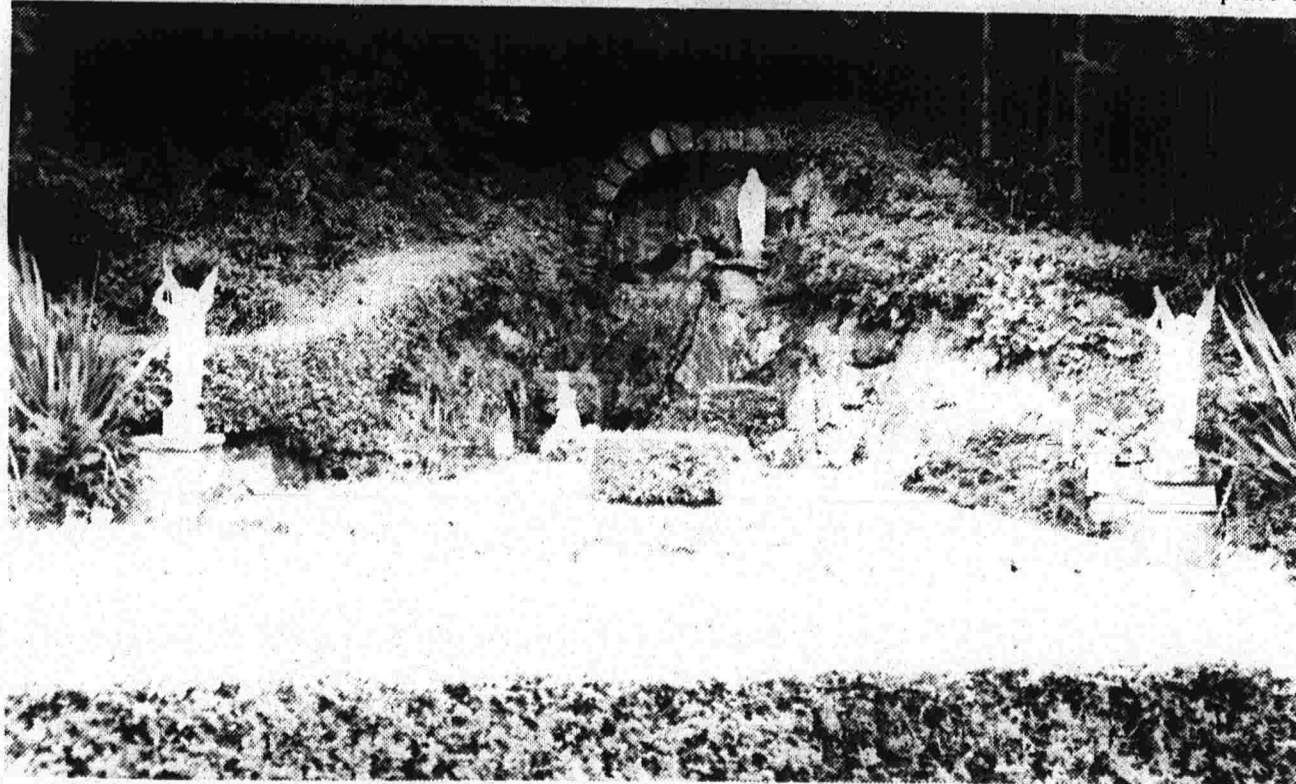
PRETTY WEDDING AT NEWCASTLE

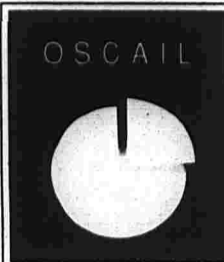

From 1945 onwards he was a member of the Ballynoe Race Committee in its formative years, and some years afterwards he was a staunch supporter of the Gaelic League Branch in Ballynoe and made his debut on the stage with them in their production of the Irish play "Ridire An Bhóthair" agus ba mhaith an sás chun disteóirachta an fear chéadna é. Continuing his term on the stage with the Ballynoe Dramatic Class he played important roles in the plays "The Dark Stranger", "Paid In His Own Coin", "The Money Doesn't Matter" and the hilarious comedy "Johnny's Breeches", and in the sixties he excelled himself with the Conna dramatic Class in a leading role in the J. B. Keane play, "Many Young Men Of Twenty". He also participated in plays organised by the St. Catherines Hurling Club and the local Pioneer Branch of which he was a member. An outstanding supporter of Gaelic games he was a regular attendant at games since the establishment of the Kilcronat Hurling Club in 1939 and eventually St. Catherines in 1946. With the latter he held some administrative posts and was President up to the time of his death and fittingly his coffin was draped in the St. Catherines colours at the Requiem Mass in Glengoura and his

coffin was borne on the shoulders of club members on its way from the church to the hearse. Saturday on the previous evening a guard of honour composed of club members was formed at the church door in Glengoura, as the coffin bearing John's remains entered. The choir too with Mary Mulcahy at the organ paid a final farewell to John, where in that church, as Fr. Stritch mentioned in his homily at the Requiem Mass that John was a most diligent member of the community, regarding his participation in readings, collections and other commitments. His great neighbourliness and wit were features of the man and allied to that he was an exemplary husband and father and while we regret his passing we feel happy in the sense that we knew and shared his company so often and memories of that will live with us always. Our sincere sympathy is extended to his wife Bride, daughters Margaret, Mary, Catherine, Angela, Noreen, Betty and Veronica, brothers Ownie, Billy and Jimmy, nephews, nieces, cousins and friends. 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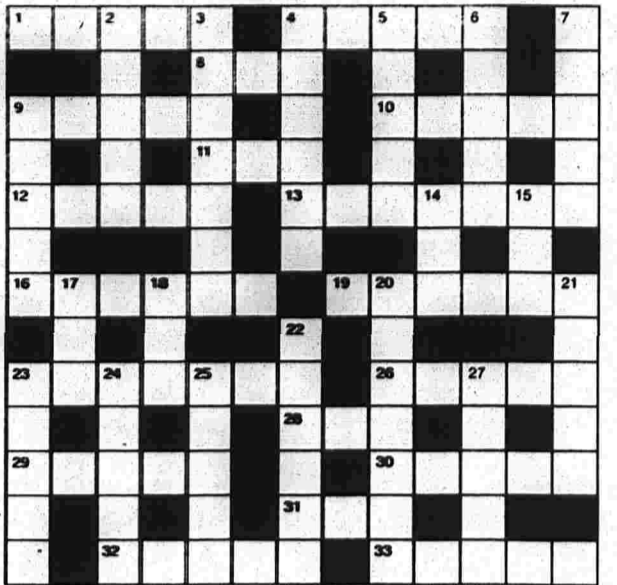

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Blistering Attack On Proposals For Salmon Drift Netting

Controversial proposals under consideration by the Minister for the Marine in relation to salmon drift netting came under blistering attack from all sides of the political divide at Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council.

Cllr. Gary O'Halloran (FG) said he deplored the brutality of what the Minister and the Government is now contemplating in relation to salmon driftnetting.

Cllr. O'Halloran said it seemed that every small business is now coming under the hammer from the FF/Labour Coalition, and fishing families that have been there for generations will now be put out of business overnight if the latest proposal goes ahead.

Cllr. Billy Kyne (Labour) supported his colleague and said the small driftnet fisherman must be protected. In Co. Waterford these driftnet men had already been badly done and he warned that if an extension of an already very punitive driftnet fishing policy comes into effect

it will seriously hit many small time fishermen.

Cllr. Paddy Kenneally (FF) said the measure being proposed by the Minister is "regrettable" while Cllr. John Carey (FG) said the Minister should be looking at extending the salmon fishing season.

Cllr. Carey said driftnet salmon fishermen cannot earn a shilling with bailiffs all over the place and they must be given a chance of earning an honest living. Presently there was never so many salmon around but the official season is closed.

Cllr. Geoff Power agreed and said salmon are more plentiful right now than they have ever been. "Yet they cannot be fished for because the season is over", he added.

FOUR BAYS

The resplendently impressive new headquarters comprise four bays, a maintenance garage, drill yard, training tower, offices, lecture room and a workshop and stores. Additionally they house the administrative offices for the entire fire service in the county.

The headquarters will accommodate fourteen part-time firefighters together with a full time staff of five.

The Minister said the new H.Q. is the latest in a series in Co. Waterford over the past decade. In that time, he said, almost £2 million had been spent on the building of new stations in Cappoquin and Dunmore East and the purchase of nine new fire appliances and equipment.

Mr. Browne said it is in all their interests that the personnel of the fire service should have the facilities to enable them to do the best possible job on behalf of the community. "In this new headquarters the firemen can engage in full and regular training in surroundings that ensure efficiency and boost morale," he said.

The Minister said successive Governments have made a major contribution to the improvement and modernisation of the fire services. "Since 1981 the

Exchequer has provided £68 million in capital funding and improvement of eighty one new or reconstructed fire stations, together with the purchase of 280 fire appliances and other equipment, he said.

Other speakers included Waterford County Manager Mr. Dan Hurley, Waterford County Council Chairman, Cllr. Con Casey, and Mr. Vincent O'Brien, Managing Director of E. O'Brien and Sons.

The Minister of State was greeted on arrival by Co. Waterford's Chief Fire Officer Mr. Tony McCarthy, while local fire brigade personnel under Assistant Chief Fire Officer Mr. John Shanahan provided a guard of honour.

The new headquarters was ecumenically blessed by Very Rev. Dean Gregory Power P.P., Dungarvan and the Rev. Dean Cecil Weekes, Church of Ireland, Lismore.

The attendances also included Mr. Sean Hogan, Fire Adviser to the Dept. of the Environment, Mr. Brian J. McNally, Waterford County Secretary, Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer, Mr. Paul Clerkin, Financial Controller, Mr. Bertie White, Town Clerk, Dungarvan, Mr. Tony Wright, Chairman Dungarvan U.D.C. Mr. Austin Deasy T.D. and members of Waterford County Council representing the Dungarvan electoral area.

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
