MICROWAVE TRANSMITTER

Comeragh Committee Determined To Fight On

Cork Communications Ltd. has been accused of "running scared" and not having the courage to come face to face with people who are implacably opposed to their proposal to erect a microwave transmitter and ancillary buildings on the Comeragh Mountains in Co. Waterford.

The accusation was levelled this week at the company by the chairman of the Comeragh Environmental Protection Association, Mr. Michael Murphy, who presided at a marathon public meeting in Coolnasmear last Monday night when scathing criticism was voiced at the decision of Waterford County Manager Mr. Dan Hurley to give the planning go-ahead to Cork Communications.

The company failed to take up an invitation from the Comeragh Environmental Protection Association to attend the meeting, and Mr. Murphy made no attempt yesterday to conceal his disappointment and that of the Association in general. **CONTINUED ON PAGE 32**

Opening Of Magnificent New £1.6m Golf Course

Dungarvan's magnificent new £1.6 million 18-hole championship golf course at Knocknagranagh was officially opened last Sunday by the President-elect of the Golfing Union of Ireland, Mr. John O'Reilly.

Appropriately the greatest day in the life of the club coincided with the final day of the Ryder Cup when Europe and the United States were locked in a titanic battle at the Belfry for the most coveted prize in world golf.

The course, which lies in a resplendent sylvan setting off the main Cork-Waterford N25 route, is the fourth home of the Dungarvan club since it was founded in 1924.

In performing the official opening, Mr. O'Reilly predicted great times ahead for the club and the course. "I would envisage many of the G.U.I. Cups and Shields being staged in Dungarvan, and even some of our major championships may be

played on this superb course in the coming years," he said.

Mr. O'Reilly said that during the seven decades the club has been in existence many milestones have been passed. "None more important than the one that has been reached today however," he added.

The Chairman of Dungarvan Golf Club, Mr. Barry Foley, outlined the history of the club since its foundation in 1924, and recounted that the development of a new 18-hole championship course to replace their nine-hole course at nearby Ballinacourty was first mooted in 1987.

Tallow Tidy Towns Report 1993

Tallow's marks in the 1993 Tidy Towns Competition total 147, six more than the 1992 total. Tallow gained one mark under each heading and while there is a long way to go, the signs are encouraging.

The following is the adjudicator's report, 1992 marks in brackets:

Effort (25) 26 — Your comprehensive submission accompanying the questionnaire was most helpful during adjudication, particularly the map. It was encouraging to note further improvements to the overall standard of Tallow again this year. The more people who become involved in the enhancement of the town the more rapid will be progress in the competition. It is suggested that you commission a plan of action which would set out detailed objectives for every building and open space, together with timescale against which progress can be assessed and measured.

Tidiness (24) 25 — Litter control is obviously good as there were scarcely any papers to be seen except for some peripheral areas. However, areas of dereliction and untidy yards and laneways were responsible for an untidy appearance in their respective areas.

Presentation Of Buildings (27) 28 — Dereliction continues to be a problem, particularly the old grain store on Convent Street and some former houses on West Street. The renovation of three houses on Barrack Street is indeed highly commendable. The standard of commercial buildings varied somewhat from the very drab and otherwise neglected to the freshly painted.

Also, the standard of frontages including signs was inconsistent. Every effort should be made to rid the town of outdated plastic signs. Keniry's Bar on Convent Street looked very well, also the shop adjoining except for the large window advertising.

Some stone buildings such as Devonshire Arms and Tallow Enterprise Centre were admired. The post office was in need of repainting but its simple presentation is most appropriate. It was particularly a shame to see a community building such as the community centre not being properly cared for. Bride Valley Stores as

usual was presented to a high standard. The entrance to the RC church would have been better if kerbside weeds had been cleared away.

Presentation Of Natural Amenities (21) 22 — There is clearly great interest in this section of the report considering the many hanging baskets, tubs and incidental areas of planting around the town. The grotto was neatly presented. It was good to see that you are continuing your tree planning programme. It is still considered that the riverside could be more convincingly presented as a true amenity; after all, the river is the prime natural amenity of the town. Grass had been cut by the bridge on West Street but there were tall nettles at the river's edge.

Appearance Of Approach Roads (28) 29 — It is most important that all the approach roads to the town are presented at a high standard as it is on the initial approach that a visitor of course gains his/her first impression. Grass verges had generally been roughly cut and many stone walls looked fine. It is considered that all such walls could be brought to the same standard with relatively little difficulty.

Quite a few of the plastic litter bins were dirty. Some of the older direction signs needed attention, including the Youghal sign at the grotto. The Tallow Area Credit Union is to be especially commended for its sponsoring of new street namesigns; these look very smart in white lettering on black background.

Presentation Of Residential Areas (16) 17 — The green and new planting at Woodview Park was exceptionally well presented. Some houses in the estate have been painted; these look so much better than the other drab ones. The older small scale terraces within the town were (except where derelict) neatly presented but many would be greatly enhanced were they painted bold colours such as one in bright blue on Chapel Street. As already mentioned the three renovated houses on Barrack Street are a great improvement. Many individuals make a valuable contribution by way of their floral displays and are to be commended.

Rayleen Clancy For Cork Film Festival

22-year-old Rayleen Clancy, daughter of the late Tom Clancy of the internationally renowned Clancy Brothers, has had her first short film, *Water Rhymes*, accepted for participation in the prestigious Cork Film Festival.

A recent graduate in Visual Communications at Dun Laoghaire College of Art and Design, Rayleen's film

has already drawn generous acclaim from the eminent film critic Lelia Doolan, who has described it as "a coming of age piece" in the current issue of *Film Ireland*.

Educated by the Sisters of St. Louis in Malibu, at Colaiste Muire, Dungarvan and at Colaiste na Rinne, Rayleen studied for her Foundation Year at the National College of Art and Design, and is a finely talented artist in her own right. Her paintings will hang in a local exhibition in November next. Home base is now in the Ring Gaeltacht in County Waterford where she lives with her mother Joan and five-year-old sister Rosemary. Sadly her father, Tom, succumbed to cancer almost three years ago.

Rayleen has been invited to attend the much coveted

Fugi Awards Ceremony in BAFTA House, Picadelli, in recognition of her work in *DLCAD*.

Written and directed by her, *Water Rhymes* stars Siobhan Miley and Ann O'Neill, both well-known from T.V. and theatre. Lighting, sound and other technical effects have been supplied by students of Dun Laoghaire College of Art and Design, under the watchful eye of tutor Anne O'Leary.

"The film is a short visual tale about one young woman's recollections of childhood enigmas; the inhibiting constraint of matriarchy, and the imprint they leave on her as an emerging adult," Rayleen explains.

The 38th Cork Film Festival runs from October 3 to 10 in the Opera House and Triskel Arts Centre.

SAVE WATERFORD/ BALLINACOURTY RAILWAY

Dear Sir,

Could you please give some publicity in your popular and widely-read newspaper to the campaign to save all or part of the Waterford-Ballinacourty railway line, which is the county's last link with the national rail network. Dungarvan is the only county town in the south of Ireland no longer served by rail.

We have requested Iarnrod Eireann to postpone track-lifting for a year while efforts are made to find a private operator. Multi-million pound industries in Dungarvan have been approached to subscribe to a share issue to buy out the

line for a resumption of rail freight traffic by a connecting spur track to Abbeyside. Our society would be willing to lease a scenic part of the line for tourist shuttle trains but we would need local support.

Time is running out. We must not let this lifeline be destroyed forever. If we do, future generations of Dungarvan people will condemn us for our apathy and indifference.

Reception For Local Born Mayor Of Leicester

The Dungarvan born Mayor of Leicester has spoken of the true bonds of friendship that exist between Ireland and England despite the atrocities that continue to be committed in the North.

Henry Dunphy, who was born at Knocknagranagh outside Dungarvan and who was elected Mayor of his adopted city of Leicester last May, was speaking at a reception given to him and the Lady Mayoress, Mrs. Rose Dunphy, by Waterford County Council at Dungarvan Town Hall.

Mayor Dunphy was elected a Labour member of Leicester City Council over twenty years ago and has been re-elected at every subsequent local election.

Presentations were made to him by the chairman of Waterford County Council, Cllr. Con Casey, and the acting chairman of Dungarvan Urban Council, Cllr. Billy Kyne who also presented the Lady Mayoress, who is a native of Co. Meath, with a handmade

silk scarf.

Cllr. Kyne said everyone in Dungarvan and Co. Waterford took a pride in Mayor Dunphy's election as Leicester's First Citizen, and said it was a particularly significant appointment at a time when efforts are still being made to find ways to reconciliation in the North.

Cllr. Kyne spoke of the difficulties the Irish in Britain can face when atrocities are committed on the mainland when the fear of a backlash against the Irish is always a real one.

"The election of people like Henry Dunphy to the position of Lord Mayor can only be of significant help to Irish people everywhere in Britain", he added.

Mayor Dunphy spoke of his delight to be returning to his home town as Lord Mayor of a major English

city and thanked Waterford County Council for the official reception afforded him.

He said he always has been, and will continue to be, proud of his Irishness but he must acknowledge too the many opportunities Britain has given to thousands of Irish emigrants down the decades.

Mayor Dunphy said that despite the "troubles" people of good will can always live and work together. He went on to express the hope that the chairpersons of both Waterford County Council and Dungarvan Urban Council will visit him in Leicester during his term as Lord Mayor.

Other speakers included Mr. Brian J. McNally, acting County Manager and Mr. Bertie White, Town Clerk, Dungarvan. Also in attendance was the Lord Mayor's mother, Mrs. Hannah Dunphy, who lives at the old family home at Knocknagranagh; Garda Inspector Michael Blake, and Mr. Tom McHugh, retired principal at Garranbane national school where the Lord Mayor received his early education.

Earlier in the day the Lord Mayor visited the school and was given a warm welcome by the teachers and pupils alike.

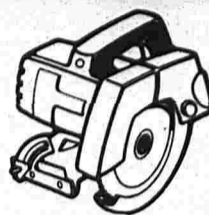

Guilty Plea By Dungarvan Defendant

A 33 year old unemployed labourer, Michael Butler, St. Patrick's Crescent, Dungarvan, pleaded guilty at the local District Court to charges of entering a petrol filling station with intent to steal, causing malicious damage to the station to the amount of £140, and obtaining goods and cash to the value of £98 by uttering a

forged cheque.

The court was told that Butler, who had not been in trouble since 1988, is now receiving help for a drink problem.

Judge Michael Pattwell remanded Butler on bail to a sitting of Dungarvan Court on October 27 for a report on him from the Court Welfare Officer.

Smashed Fist Through A Parked Car

A 21 year old unemployed man who was heavily under the influence of drink at 3 o'clock in the morning, smashed his fist through a parked car in the centre of Dungarvan, Judge Michael Pattwell was told at the local District Court.

Alan Leahy, Ballintlea, Old Parish, pleaded guilty to causing malicious damage to the car to the amount of £245? on September 17 last.

Mr. J. P. Gordon solr. said Leahy had been accused by accused by a woman and to emphasise his denial of the accusation he thumped the back window of the car and smashed it. "It was a wanton but not a malicious act," Mr. Gordon added.

Judge Pattwell adjourned his decision until November 10 pending a report from the Court Welfare Officer. Inspector Michael Blake prosecuted.

Give your tools a proper MOT

APART from spades and forks for winter digging, most garden tools have done their job for the year by now.



But don't think 'out of sight, out of mind.' Instead, think carefully about money invested in your tools and machines and how much they need to be in tip-top condition next spring.

Then you will prepare and store them properly for the winter. Sensible gardeners also carry out any maintenance — there might be too many other things to do when the planting and growing season starts again.

Here are some tips:

- Clean and dry all tools before winter storage, especially machines such as mowers, power trimmers and saws.
- Remove rust using wire wool before all moving parts are cleaned and oiled, but don't touch power tools unless certain they are unplugged, or the fuel supply and spark are cut off.
- Clean and oil metal surfaces on traditional tools such as the spade, shovel, fork, rake and hoe before storage.
- Many now have maintenance-free metal and plastic tubular handles, but wood handles still look best and can be kept intact by light sanding and rubbing with linseed oil.
- Garden shears need cleaning, oiling and checking before storage. They should bow apart between the pivot nut and the tips. If not, adjust the nut until they do.
- When sharpening, undo the bolt so that each blade can be properly dealt with in a vice using a fine file for a good edge.
- Remove blades on rotary mowers for the same treatment and grease the blade mounting. Get any mower serviced now rather than in a rush next spring.
- Check mowers and trimmers for any build-up of grass debris which might cause inefficiency or over-heating.
- Replace damaged power cables or cut away the flawed section and joint the halves with a slim male/female coupling.

Insulating tape does not guard against electrocution and if you do fit an electrical connection, make sure the female end is the one attached to the cable running to the mains.

The other way round risks the joint being unplugged either accidentally or deliberately, leaving live prongs dangerously exposed.

● Don't discard a traditional tool if the handle is broken. Simply remove the retaining screws and yank out the useless handle. If you can't get a grip then drive a screw into the end and grip this in a vice so that the broken shaft can be pulled free.

Don't discard the old shaft until you have used it to mark the length of the section fitting into the tool head. For spades and forks, you might also like a longer handle this time — they have been shown to be more efficient and better for the back.

When fitting the new handle/shaft you may need to shape the end with a rasp for a tight fit, before replacing the retaining screws. — Arthur Hines

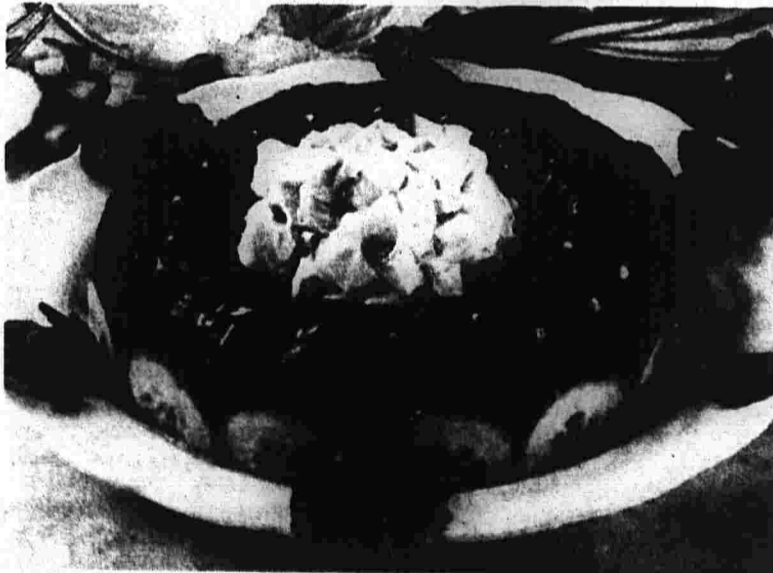

While the schoolchildren played in the school field the invited guests were treated to tea, sandwiches and cakes in the school by the Parents Committee.

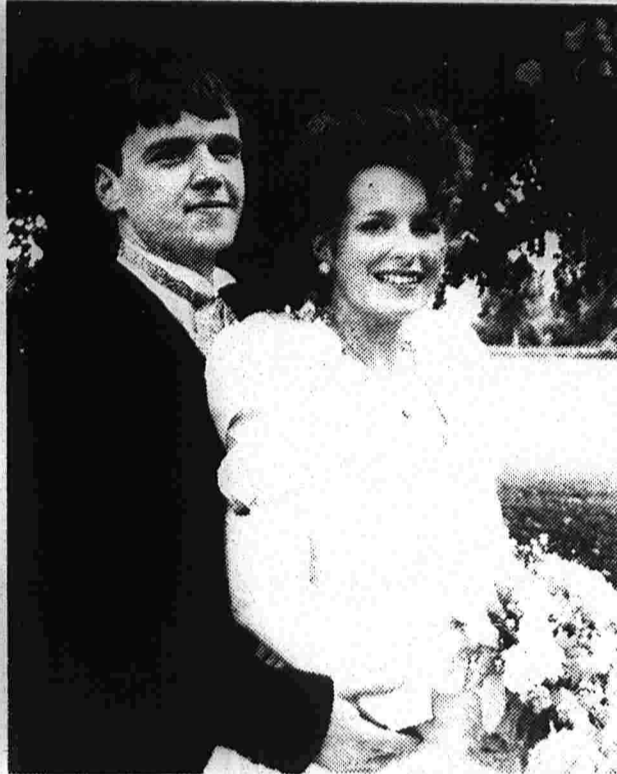

BALLYMACARBRY NEWS

1993 TIDY TOWNS PROGRESS REPORT

The following is the adjudicators report on Ballymacarbry's Tidy Towns Effort for 1993 (1992 marks are in brackets):

Effort (37) 36 — It is a pity that this year you did not return the questionnaire to aid the adjudicators. Nonetheless a high standard of presentation was apparent on adjudication day with the exception of various details

as outlined below. There would seem to be a few people in the village who do not share the enthusiasm of the majority of the community. If everybody were to at least attend to their own environs the Village would be well on the way to securing an award.

Tidiness (29) 28 — Some litter was to be seen this year, notably in the car park

opposite the Melody's Bar, across the road from the post office and at St. Patrick's Hall. There were several quite weedy and otherwise untidy side areas/yards to be seen. Details such as abandoned concrete blocks in the road from the post office are significant at your level in the competition. It is suggested that perhaps a wall might be built in lieu of the wire fencing to screen the yard between Waterford Foods and

Waterford Co-op.

Presentation Of Building (31) 31 — Melody's Bar, as usual, was well presented. The plastic sign of Oriel Bar preferably should be removed. The Garda Station looked well but the boundary wall needed freshening up. The Post Office was neatly presented but the sign will soon need repainting. Waterford Co-op would have benefitted from some touching up of paintwork. Doocey's was neatly presented. St. Patrick's Hall for some reason was quite neglected.

Presentation Of Natural Amenities (31) 32 — Great interest in this aspect of presentation was clearly demonstrated. The car park overlooking the river is a useful amenity area. The picnic area opposite St. Patrick's Hall was exceptionally well presented. Because the Village is so spread out it is of vital importance that the roadside be maintained to a high standard to give it a clear identity. There were however some fine hedges to be seen such as those along from the telephone box, also excellent incidental planted areas.

Appearance Of Approach Roads (33) 34 — The grass verges had not been properly maintained — rough cutting is not good enough! Weed control seemed somewhat better but not in several side areas and laneways. Environs of St. Patrick's Hall looked very poor. The new stone wall being built at the time of adjudication at the Clonmel end of the village will be an improvement. There is still scope for further work to stone walls such as that directly opposite the Garda Station. A stone wall could also be built in lieu of the barbed wire fence diagonally opposite the Garda Station. The standard of street furniture was inconsistent with several litter bins being in need of cleaning.

Presentation Of Residential Areas (17) 18 — Generally the standard of St. Martin's Place was truly excellent; the freshly painted walls, finely trimmed hedging and colourful planting were admirable. Most other houses throughout the village were also well presented but one or two could have done with painting, particularly their boundary walls. The garden beside the post office is obviously well cared for but the new house across the road was yet to be developed in terms of landscaping and the roadside.

You must concentrate on the Hall for next year.

PLANNING REGULATIONS FOR AFFORESTATION PROJECTS

United Farmers Association calls on the Government to introduce planning regulations for afforestation projects. Planning regulations currently in force can deny a native permission to build a dwelling on the grounds of obstruction on the scenic view of a particular area while Coillte or Greenbelt can plant large areas of conifers without let or hindrance.

These plantations will effectively isolate people further, reduce amount of essential sunlight available whilst destroying the real natural beauty of an area.

The campaign now underway to encourage farmers and non-farming speculators to plant trees is seen by many as a deliberate tactic to push more and more people off the land. Land that has been used by farmers for generations for livestock grazing is being taken over and planted. This smacks of the Cromwellian mentality and agrarian alarm bells are beginning to ring around the county. Banks seem to be deeply involved in financing and organising this planting in of trees and planting out of people.

This is very apparent in forced land sales and raises the frightening spectre of vendor and purchaser being one and the same, opening the way for insider trading and new depths of corruption in land transfer. Another sinister development which follows take over and planting is letting of shooting rights in these forestries to Continentals and others who adopt a fascist attitude to the natural rights of native Irish rural dwellers to walk, to fish and to shoot in their own countryside. History shows that native people, when their blood is up, will always successfully defend their own terrain against those who would exploit and take over that terrain. It is time that people in high places began to read their history books.

Waterford ICMSA News

The County Waterford Executive of ICMSA held their annual general meeting on Wednesday, September 22, in Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan.

The County Chairman, John Cusack, welcomed the President and members to the meeting. Both Chairman and Secretary Tom Hickey, outlined some of the activities that ICMSA were involved in over the last year.

This was followed by the President's address which covered such items as CAP Reform, GATT, Milk Quotas, Retirement Scheme, Taxation, Disadvantaged Areas, Public Liability and Animal Disease.

On the taxation issue, the President said that ICMSA are still seeking an alternative to tax-on-accounts and while the present system has got much more penal because of changes in stock relief, and capital allowance, it is unfortunate that some still prefer the present system of accounts, which takes no account of the work done by the farmer's wife and family; no allowance for the seven day week; no proper allowance for reinvestment and treats farmers differently to other tax payers in relation to PAYE and PRSI allowances.

"The 4.5% milk quota case which ICMSA has lodged in the European Court last February is progressing and if ICMSA can be successful it will mean a return of 50.8 million gal-

lions of milk quota to the country," said Mr. O'Dwyer.

On the whole question of premia, the President said that applications for the 10 and 22 month premia will have to be a more regular basis because at present the markets are being distorted by cattle being held for 2 months and a limited application.

"The ideal situation would be for farmers to apply when their animals reach the age of 10 months or 22 months which would cause little effort on markets and less hardship for farmers," said Mr. O'Dwyer.

Autumn Cattle Prices To Stabilise — IFA

Commenting on the decision of the EC Beef Management Committee to accept 2,114 tonnes of intervention beef from Ireland last Friday, Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Dono-

van said: "At a price of 236,68 ECU's/100 kgs. equivalent to 107p/lb for R3's at 105p/lb for R4's to the factories, prices should now stabilise for the Autumn trade at the current level."

The IFA livestock farmers: "Having operated without intervention support for over four months, there is a strong responsibility on the EC Commission to ensure that the Irish Beef Market is properly supported by

means of intervention of APS during the peak Autumn kill. The Commission's attitude in rejecting 60% of Friday's tender will have to change for future tenders in order that the beef market can be kept in balance and cattle prices maintained.

Mr. Donovan said: "It is now up to Agriculture Minister Joe Walsh to ensure that the Commission grant adequate support to the Irish beef sector for the remainder of the Autumn kill, whether this be in the form of intervention or a properly structured APS Scheme linked to Third Country contracts or higher export refunds on carcase beef."

STRADBALLY NOTES

TIDY TOWN'S PROGRESS REPORT 1993

Effort — very year the village of Stradbally looks better than the previous year, with a little extra attention to detail Stradbally could be a serious contender for a national award. Consistency is the key to success in the competition and this is only achievable through total co-ordination of all the community and local authority.

Tidiness — On the occasion of the 2nd adjudication despite a thorough examination no litter was in evidence. The task is to maintain this standard of litter control throughout the year. The involvement of the school children, scouts, cubs and beavers helped to combat the litter problem.

Presentation Of National Amenities — Special praise was given to everyone involved in preparation and maintenance of flowers and shrub displays whether in hanging baskets, window boxes or the many flower beds in the village. A standard of real excellence has been achieved in relation to these features. The appearance of the village was very significantly enhanced by colourful flower displays on the 2nd adjudication. The standard of roadside planting was excellent. The village green was beautiful. Replacing broken trees is to be encouraged also improvement in Stradbally Cove, G.A.A. clubhouse and forecourt.

Appearance Of Approach Roads — The appearance of approach roads were not up to the standard of previous years, however, the new stone walls were greatly admired, street furniture was satisfactorily presented and quite a few road signs will have to be freshened up next year.

Presentation Of Buildings — Commercial premises were well presented, Cove Bar and Whelans were especially admired, as were property owners who freshly painted their premises. The Church Of Ireland and Roman Catholic Churches, National Schools and Garda Station were highly praised. Sheds and out buildings should be presented as high a standard as main buildings since if they are in view from the public domain, they will also be judged.

Presentation Of Residential Areas — The thatched houses were truly beautiful, Rockville estate neatly presented, the stone sign at Viewmont Drive and the main green area greatly admired. There were also many beautiful gardens to be seen throughout the village and street houses. Nonetheless some boundary walls need painting, broken trees need replacing, around the village a few houses with garden areas yet to be fully developed. Stradbally's marks for 1993 were 195 as compared to 193 in 1992. Well done to all concerned and good luck in 1994.

Jumbo GATT Meeting Resolved Nothing — ICMSA

Following the jumbo Council of EC Ministers meeting on GATT, the President of the ICMSA, Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, said that in his assessment unfortunately the meeting did not resolve the issue of Irish concerns in relation to the Blair House agreement.

Mr. O'Dwyer said that the situation is just the same after the meeting as it was before and that the Irish Government must now more than ever take immediate action to protect our vital national interest.

TAOISEACH MUST MAKE PRESIDENT CLINTON AWARE OF IRISH POSITION

"All that has been agreed is that the EC will seek clarification and modification of the Blair House agreement. In my view what is now required is for the Taoiseach to make immediate contact with the US President, Mr. Clinton to make him aware of the disastrous consequences for our national economy if satisfactory modifications to the GATT proposals are not achieved," said Mr. O'Dwyer.

He added that renegotiation of the Blair House is essential if our vital national industry, agriculture, is to expand.

Pig Farmers Demand Release Of Cereals From Intervention Stores

Following a meeting last week with Deputy Brian O'Shea with an IFA delegation, the Chairman of Waterford IFA Pigs & Pigmeat Committee, Ian Tierney said that the cereal shortage on the home market must be supplemented by barley released from Intervention Stores.

The cereal harvest is down by 400,000 tonnes this year. Cereal supplies are tight and the cereal market is very strong.

There are 230,000 tonnes of barley in Irish Intervention Stores. This must be released to normalise trade on the home market. Trading volumes of grain are low in anticipation of higher prices and this is pushing grain prices up further.

JERRY HICKEY - AN APPRECIATION

He was always known as Jerry - no surname was needed to identify one of Ballyduff's finest sons. His contribution to his community was unparalleled and is unlikely every to be equalled. In his lifetime he was involved in every Social, Cultural and Sporting Club in the parish. Each organisation was to benefit enormously from his organisational skills, his hard work, his charisma and diplomacy.

Nowadays we live in a changing world where the emphasis is on self-advancement and personal gain. Jerry epitomised a different ethos - work together for the greater good of all.

Jerry's involvement in community affairs began at an early stage and was to continue to his death. His contribution to Muintir na Tire was enormous. He was

involved in this organisation from its inception. Through his half century of involvement he held every position and was actively involved in the progressive work carried out - building St. Michael's Hall, extending it in 1981 and its complete re-development a few years ago. He loved to remind people that with his horse and cart he drew the first load of top soil from the foundations of the new hall in the 40s. The Muintir na Tire was closely allied with the Drama Group and Jerry gave a lifetime of commitment to the Drama culminating in Claremorris in May 1981 when Jerry was in the cast of Ballyduff's presentation of "One Flew Over The Cuckoo's Nest" which won the All Ireland confined Drama.

The local Drama Group spawned the West Waterford Drama Festival in 1981 and in a short space of time was acknowledged as the most successful of its kind in Ireland. Jerry was an influential and hard-working member and at the time of his death was President of the festival. Other organisations to benefit from his energy and inspiration were Conradh na nGaeilge, the L.D.F., the Field Committee which bought and developed the Community Field.

In the sporting world Jerry's first love was Tug-of-War. He was a founder member of the Ballyduff Tug-of-War Club and as coach he was to guide it to an All-Ireland Final appearance. At National level he was very involved in formulating the rules which became the basis for those drawn up by the International committee. Even though the local club faded Jerry was to remain a keen follower of the sport and loved the company of Tug-of-War men. He was also a founder member of the Ballyduff Community Games and enjoyed working with the young people. He was a player with the local G.A.A. Club and lifelong supporter. He trained camogie teams, threw bowls in Tournagecha, trained greyhounds and rode in a Point to Point race.

Jerry's legacy to his beloved Ballyduff was enormous - a legacy of honest endeavour and of pride in his native place. Ballyduff is always known for its community spirit and Jerry not only embodied but helped create this.

His loss to his family - John, Mary, Margaret, Eileen, Mary and Patsy - and parish is inestimable but wherever Ballyduff people will socialise, in the Hall playing 45, in the Corner House or in the Drama Club, stories will be told about Jerry's colourful life both as a Co. Council worker and as a voluntary worker with all

the organisations with which he was involved. Our memories of his generosity, of his caring nature and his roguish sense of humour will survive.

Jerry you have lived by Gospel values and the Great Adjudicator will give you the ultimate award with the eternal spotlight shining brightly on you.

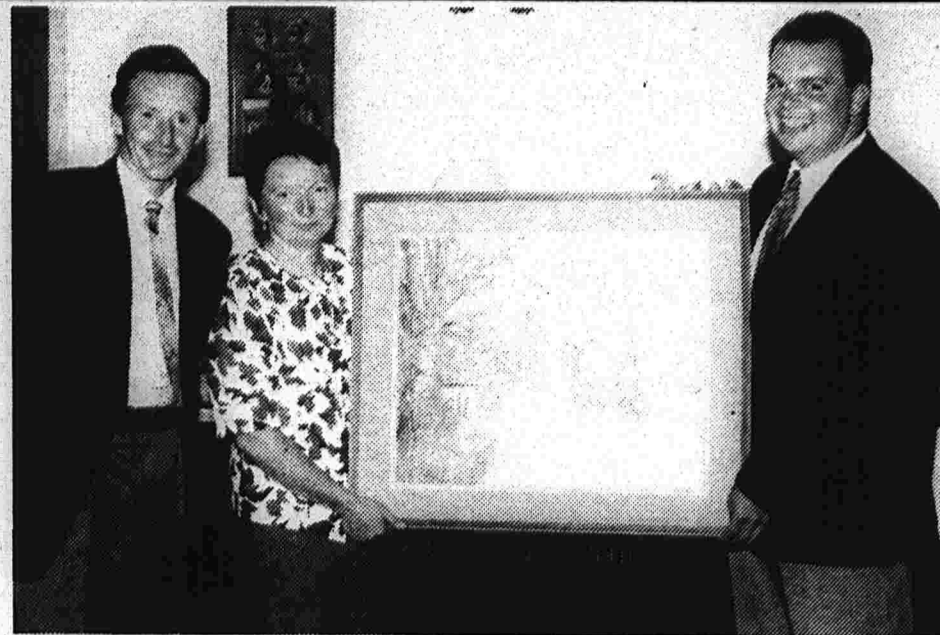
Ballyduff Capture U-16 (B) Football Championship

Policing Difficulties In Dungarvan

A senior garda officer has acknowledged that there are policing difficulties in the town of Dungarvan on Friday and Saturday nights.

Inspector Michael Blake made his acknowledgement at Dungarvan District Court last Wednesday where Judge District Pattwell said he now perceived Dungarvan as a town that is providing real policing difficulties at weekends.

The Judge also spoke of the urgent need for the legislators to seriously consid-

er the opening hours of fast food outlets which Inspector Blake singled out as a primary cause of many of the weekend problems Dungarvan is experiencing.

Judge Pattwell, who also described a Debs Ball as "rubbish" and expressed concern that sports clubs with bar facilities may be exposing young people to the "pub culture", made his comments when dealing with applications for special exemptions.

"It is time the legislators

looked at the whole question of the opening hours of fast food outlets," Judge Pattwell went on. "Most of the late night rows are taking place outside chip shops."

The Judge also said that in practically every assault he had dealt with at his courts in Dungarvan he had been told the people involved had left late night drinking premises.

Inspector Blake agreed but said that not all of the rows involved people who had been attending discos.

Lismore Notes



1993 TIDY TOWNS REPORT

1992 Marks in Brackets EFFORT (34) 35

Lismore is steadily progressing towards the top towns in the competition. If all of the town were presented to the standard of Gallows Hill, West Street, New Way, Cappoquin Road and the Mall there is no doubt that you would be in strong position to secure the coveted National Award. In other words, in order to succeed you will have to achieve greater consistency; this is only possible through total community co-ordination. Your comprehensive responses on the questionnaire and clearly annotated map were very helpful during adjudication.

TIDINESS (29) 27

Except for a few papers evident in some peripheral areas on adjudication day, a commendable standard of litter control would seem to have been achieved. Nonetheless, there were a few untidy areas which regrettably diminished the overall impact. For instance abandoned cars, lorries, etc in yard on Convent Road created a poor impression, also pallets in view from Upper New Street near the Tidy Towns plaque. Incidental areas and gaps between buildings such as that beside Credit Union House must also be considered. Construction sites must be kept as neat and tidy as possible.

PRESENTATION OF BUILDINGS (32) 33

The standard of public/community buildings was generally excellent although details of some such as gates beginning to rust at the school on Convent Road were significant. The condition of the railway station looked very sad as did all other derelict and disused buildings. Work in progress at the Hotel at the time of adjudication augurs well; hopefully the horizontal railed fencing will be removed as it is not of the same calibre as walls in the

vicinity. The standard of commercial premises although improved to some extent since last year still has a long way to go. To be commended are all those premises owners who have invested in fresh paint and new signage in particular, contrasting greatly with the numerous drab and shabby buildings. Thankfully plastic signs no longer seem to be a major problem; perhaps any Dutch style canopies might now be removed. It should be noted that the backs of buildings, outbuildings and yards where visible from the public domain must be equally well presented as the main frontages. The courthouse and monument opposite were beautifully presented quite appropriately as they are an integral part of the town centre.

PRESENTATION OF NATURAL AMENITIES (31) 32

Great interest is apparent in this aspect of presentation, judging from the profuse planting, both in individual properties and communal open spaces, throughout the town. All those responsible for the maintenance of such areas and indeed new planting are to be congratulated. The riverside and established green open spaces all looked exceptional. Some work was in progress at the side of the tennis court and also across the road, presumably for the proposed grotto; the completion of these and other projects is looked forward to. It is most appropriate that you are planting new trees as trees are so much part of the character of Lismore. The railway entrance area it is appreciated has been planted with trees but in general this area looked quite poor. The attention of detail such as trimming edges, around trees, etc on the greens is laudable.

APPEARANCE OF APPROACH ROADS (33) 34

The Tallow and Cappoquin

roads in particular looked beautiful with neat grass margins and well maintained stone walls. Grass verges on some of the minor roads had not been as frequently tended. The road edges towards the castle entrance could have been neater. Weeds were to be seen growing along the top of stone walls in just a few places; all the same these were a negative feature. Weed control was excellent but for some back lanes. Incidental items of street furniture had for the most part been well looked after. The high standard of the car park below the hotel was admired; it is discreetly yet effectively located and developed.

PRESENTATION OF RESIDENTIAL AREAS (17) 18

The rows of small scale terraced houses are an integral part of the town and must be kept in good repair. Indeed most are but some such as on Church Lane were neglected. Many terraced houses throughout the town were beautifully painted and those with colourful floral adornments and well painted railings and/or finely trimmed hedges were commendable. As was noted last year, the simpler the boundary treatment the better; do not allow fussy individualistic railings or walls to be erected when there is a predominant type or style in existence. Green areas such as at Bank Field and Parkes Road are a valuable asset to the respective areas. New roads such as at Ashley Court should be finished as soon as possible.

Congratulations on a further increase of marks this year. Try to encourage more of the community to take out their paint brushes prior to next year's adjudication.

Blanket Of Smoke Contributed To Two Car Collision

A roadside fire which set off a blanket of smoke that resembled a dense fog contributed to a two-car collision on the outskirts of Ardmore last March, Judge Michael Pattwell heard at Youghal District Court last Thursday.

The woman responsible for lighting the fire, Margaret Maher, Moonbrack, Ring,

Dungarvan, was fined the maximum permissible under the Act — fifty pence.

She pleaded guilty to starting a fire within sixty feet of the public roadway.

Her brother, Michael Allen, Crusheen, Ardmore, was acquitted on a similar charge.

A third defendant, Patrick J. Clancy, Ballymacart, Old

Parish, was convicted of careless driving on the occasion and was fined £25 with an endorsement of his driving licence.

Margaret Power told the court that as she drove from Ardmore on March 8 last she encountered a blanket of smoke on the road from a roadside fire. "It was like a dense fog and I stopped my car because I couldn't drive safely through it," she said. While her car was station-

ary it was struck by Clancy's car, she added.

Referring to the ridiculous penalty under the Act, Judge Pattwell said he must nonetheless record a conviction against Margaret Maher and impose the maximum fifty pence penalty because in starting the roadside fire she had done a very dangerous thing.

Judge Pattwell said he knows a man who is now a paraplegic as a result of a similar incident.

Inspector Pdraig Hyde prosecuted.

Cappoquin Notes

1993 TIDY TOWNS REPORT

The following is the Adjudicators Report, 1992 marks in brackets

EFFORT (29) 30

The adjudicators are indeed pleased that you are following a definite plan for Cappoquin and look forward to returning year by year to see how you are progressing. Presumably you are endeavouring to get all of the community actively interested in the development of the town. Clearly there are some individuals who do not share the same enthusiasm and commitment as the main committee and sub-committees. The formation of a local development company to deal with derelict sites was an excellent idea. You are to be congratulated to date on all your achievements. Having the benefit of a social employment scheme is most valuable. Your detailed submission accompanying the questionnaire and particularly the map were most helpful during adjudication.

TIDINESS (24) 24

The town centre was for the most part free of litter except for Market Square. In peripheral areas papers were to be seen here and there. The poor presentation of some yards created a nega-

tive effect just as derelict areas. Dumping of cars, etc. at the garage beside the fire station and also on Twig Lane created a very poor impression.

PRESENTATION OF BUILDINGS (32) 33

There has been some improvements in the standard of buildings since last year. The removal of plastic signs is most welcome but there are still more! Also, consideration should be given to removing outdated tiled shopfronts. Walsh's Hotel looked very well this year having been brightly painted. It was encouraging to see that you have commenced work on derelict sites. Leaving aside the derelict properties there were many others which looked drab and whose owners should be encouraged to take out their brushes before next year. There were many fine traditional fronts to be seen including the Statoil garage on Main Street. The frontage of Super Valu would have been fine were it not for the over large and superfluous window advertisements.

PRESENTATION OF NATURAL AMENITIES (27) 28

Market Square looked

very well and the A.I.B. garden at one corner contributed much. The hydrangeas on Castle Street were as all other incidental areas of planting commendable. The stands with hanging baskets were noted but it is wondered if they are of benefit since they could be deemed to contribute to "clutter". Sometimes adornment is not necessary, simplicity being preferable. The green along by the fire station and Garda station had been very well tended. The rosebeds at Shanbally and at the monument on Melleray Road were admired. It was good to see that you have initiated a tree planting programme. The riverside at the little bridge on the Dungarvan road has great potential. The development of Twig Bog area is looked forward to as it ought to be a great amenity for the townspeople and visitors.

APPEARANCE OF APPROACH ROADS (36) 37

The stone walls on the Lismore approach were fine. The stone walls on the Melleray road also looked well but long grass overhanging created a negative effect. The grotto area was neatly presented. Some further stone wall clearing might be considered on the Dungarvan road approach. Regarding items of street furniture, most were satisfactory although some signs and litter bins were in need of freshening up.

PRESENTATION OF RESIDENTIAL AREAS (16) 17

While most individual properties had been well cared for some boundary walls were in need of attention. Some street houses, despite floral adornments, could have benefited from re-planting. Shanbally Estate looked well, particularly the greens and rosebeds, but the newer estate across the road was not as well maintained. The open space/playing field ought to be regularly cut. Also timber boundary fences are not recommended unless they are frequently maintained.

You should concentrate on untidy yards, especially with dumped cars, for next year.

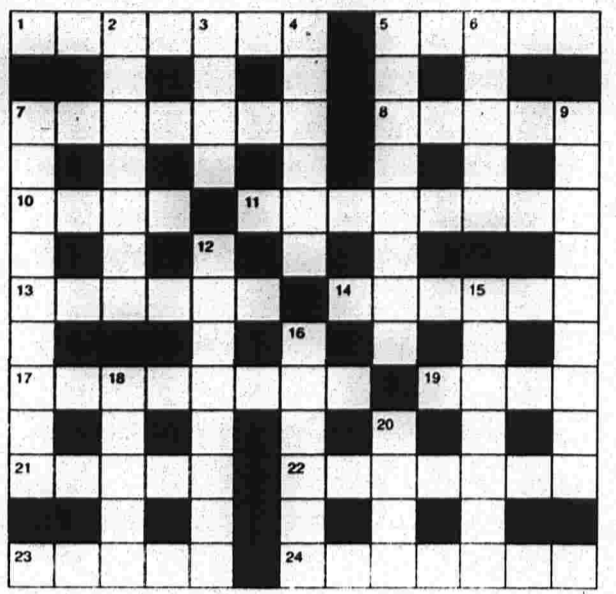

A BIT OF HISTORY

"1942 — The One That Got Away"

The record books graphically pinpoint Lismore's county senior hurling championship title win in 1925. But what they don't show is that Lismore actually won the title again seventeen years later in 1942, only to subsequently lose it in a Munster Council boardroom.

Ironically Lismore made application to the County Board at the start of that year to be regarded from senior to junior status. The application was refused and Lismore went on to show just how wise that Board decision was as they swept impressively to the county final.

Erin's Own's colours were lowered in an epic final and Lismore took the title amid tremendous scenes by 2-5 to 2-3.

But then came the bombshell announcement that Erin's Own had lodged an objection on the grounds that John McGrath had not been properly transferred from Tourin to Lismore. The objection failed at County Board level but Erin's Own took it one step further to the Munster Council, and it was there that the honour of "champions" was stripped from Lismore.

To this very day in the Cathedral town, Lismore folk will insist that the club has won 3 senior hurling titles. Alas, however, the record books show otherwise.

That 1942 county final

Western Junior Hurling Final On Saturday

All roads lead to the city venue on Sunday next when finalists, Lismore and Passage meet for the 92nd playing of the Waterford senior hurling county championship final and in a game that promises to make up for much of the disappointing fare seen on our playing fields throughout the season.

The pairing, though unique, is not very surprising in that both clubs were on the short list of many pundits from a fairly early stage of the championship.

Passage, in the county senior final for their first time, have come through the testing campaign with an unbeaten record, having played their best ever hurling and most certainly their best since winning the intermediate county hurling title when beating Fourmilewater by 4-8 to 1-8 in a splendid final at Fraher Field in 1988.

Lismore suffered just one defeat throughout the campaign, but having lost to Mount Sion, they recovered their form in time to reverse the result when beating the Monastery side at Kill in a play-off game.

SHOW PIECE

As always the county final is our hurling show piece and a game which invariably sets the county alight with interest and expectation. This one is no different and at the end of a year which brought disappointing results on the inter county scene and not a lot to get excited about on the club championship front, patrons all over the county are looking forward with hope to a clash which may leave us with some satisfying memories of 1993.

I spoke to two of the men involved with Passage last week and a well known Lismore man was present also, when I was told that Passage are going to enjoy this final more than any other match they have played in their history. That is a rather strange comment, but it certainly indicated a great lack of tension or pressure in the camp and this is obviously designed to develop a very relaxed attitude to the final. Their ability to keep cool and composed when under pressure was well evidenced in their games during the year when they were involved in cliffhangers with last year's county champions, Ballygunner, whom they beat by 2 points and Roanmore who went down by a single point. Against Mount Sion, Passage played

a semi-final draw before beating them by a single point, again proving their ability to survive under pressure.

In the 1991 championship when Passage began to show signs of a breakthrough at this level, they lost to Lismore by a single point (1-12 to 3-5), but in last year's championship Passage reversed this result when beating Lismore by 2-8 to 1-9.

Again in their meeting this year in the Sargent Cup at Cappoquin Passage showed splendid form in beating Lismore by 5-11 to 2-5.

The line out for the final shows a nice blend of youth and experience with the entire team having graduated through juvenile ranks. Ray Barry, county under 21 goalkeeper on the county team, is a safe keeper and will have Edward Quann, county defender Eamon Cullinane and another under 21 county player, Seamus Keating in the full back line in front of him with Pat Connors, centre half back Sean Cullinane and James Connors in the half line. At centre field Passage will have Paul Connors and Paul Fitzgerald, another county player of great potential. Martin Murphy who starred in the county junior side this year will play at centre half forward and will be flanked by Sean Carey and Barry Walsh, who is grandson of the great 'Doyle' Walsh of their 1937 championship winning side. Veteran of the team is 35 years old Noel Connors, who is captain and who is named as full forward and flanked by Anthony Fitzgerald and top scorer, Mossy O'Keefe. Seven of that side played in the county final of 1988 with Passage.

The pedigrees of the Lismore players as seen in their pen-pictures is something that every club would like to boast of having. They must be the most medal-laden panel to represent a club in a county final, for a very long time. Twenty eight of their thirty seven county hurling titles, including Feile na Gael, have been won in the last twelve years and all but one of these at underage

level. The odd one out is the senior county title won by the club in 1991 when beating Mount Sion by 5-7 to 1-5. In my programme of that final I noted Carthage Barry and Donie Landers (who had a hat-trick of goals) as players who gave three-star performances, and unfortunately both have since gone off the panel, which has changed only slightly over the two years.

So far this year Lismore have done little wrong and must have good reason for feeling pleased with their progress, having lost only one game in their nine-match schedule. At the same time they would indeed be foolish to get excited about what they have achieved or about being too confident of success here on Sunday. Most of the people to whom I have spoken about the final, seem to rate Lismore as favourites to become the third team from this division to win a senior hurling county final in Walsh Park in the past half century.

My view is that it will take an improved display on their part — and that means improvement on all their games, if they are going to beat Passage in Walsh Park. I rate Passage as slight favourites and won't be surprised if they win the title and that judgment is based on the standards displayed by both teams so far. My support will be with Lismore who are fully deserving of better rewards at this level for all their dedicated work over the years.

The lineout has not been announced at the time of writing, but it is not likely to show changes from the team which defeated Roanmore in the semi-final. Declan Landers their most dependable goalie will be fronted by Mark Sullivan, David Barry and Peadar O'Donnell with Brendan Crowley, Seamus Prendergast (who captained the 1991 winning team) and Phil Hickey in the outside line of defence. Kieran O'Gorman and Brendan Prendergast will fill the midfield berth and in attack Michael O'Sullivan, Paul

Prendergast (capt.), Billy Lee, Brendan Lawton, team top-scorer, Sean Daly and Michael Hickey will be expected to get the scores that will regain the title for the 1991 champions. Young Dan Shanahan and others on their substitute bench will be on standby for call up during the final, if selectors, Michael McGrath, Willie Lineen and John O'Gorman see fit to do so at any stage.

We wish the best of good luck to Lismore and if they get it all together on the day, we'll enjoy seeing the bonfires blaze along the Blackwater on Sunday night.

CAN HISTORY REPEAT ITSELF?

It is interesting to note that when Passage won the intermediate hurling final for their first time in 1988, their sister club, Gaultier (which included many of the same players) were also in the intermediate football final of that year and they won both. In the football they defeated Sliabh gCua by 5-6 to 2-4 at Walsh Park. Of course Gaultier are not yet in the football final but we can tell the way they are thinking, just the same.

BACKGROUND

Passage are perceived by many followers of them as being a club without a firm background, having come to prominence in recent years. Their club members don't see things that way and are quick to point out that when Waterford first came to prominence on the hurling scene, the name of Passage was linked with other county teams. Our search of the records revealed that when the county won its first All-Ireland title our minors were captained by a well-known Passage clubman, Paddy Donnelly R.I.P. The same Paddy helped the county take their second junior All-Ireland hurling title in 1934. County junior hurling champions in 1937, they had John Baston playing for the county and he was a sub. on the 1938 senior team which played in our first senior All-Ireland hurling final, the same Waterford team being

captained by a Passage man, Willie 'Doyle' Walsh for the Munster final (in the absence of Mick Hickey who was out injured at that stage). Captain Vin Baston's role in the county's first All-Ireland final is not likely to be ever forgotten.

Doyle Walsh, who was a Portlaoise senior player in '38 is the only surviving member of their 1937 junior team.

The club did get out of existence for a few years because of lack of members in their small populated area, but when serious work began at juvenile level by a very dedicated group of members, the club was on its way back in a big way.

Back in 1986 Passage were one of three clubs to win county championship hurling doubles. Lismore and Mount Sion were the others. In that year Passage defeated Abbeyside by 3-5 to 2-2 in the 'B' minor hurling county final and had earlier in the summer beaten St. Patrick's by 8-3 to 4-2 in the under 14 'B' hurling county final. Two seasons later Passage having opted to go to intermediate without being pushed up, won the intermediate title when

beating Fourmilewater.

JUNIOR HURLING SEMI-FINALS

The big crowd who turned up at Cappoquin on Sunday got good value in the two junior semi-finals that produced some delightful hurling. Both matches are reported by our Cappoquin correspondent.

MINOR FOOTBALL

Two semi-finals in the minor football 'A' championship are scheduled for next weekend and in one, Dungarvan will play Naomh Brid and Abbeyside are due to meet St. Olivers in the other.

All going well, this championship will finish well in advance of the senior football championship, thus allowing both finals to be played together in Cappoquin in late October or early November.

Western Board Chairman Cleared

The GAA official who admitted assaulting the chairman of the Waterford County Board earlier this month has been cleared of a charge of bringing the Association into disrepute.

In a dramatic twist to the latest upheaval in Déise gaeldom, county chairman Eamonn Murphy has acknowledged he now intensely regrets having made the remark that sparked off the assault.

Frankie Cullinane, chairman of the East Waterford Board, presided over a two hour meeting that had been called on the direction of the county chairman to which Ollie Wilkinson, chairman of the West Waterford Board and a joint vice-chairman of the County Board, was instructed to attend to answer charges brought against him by Mr. Murphy under rules relating

to bringing the Association into disrepute.

For almost half an hour, Mr. Murphy outlined the events of the night of September 6 last when the executive committee of the County Board met in a Dungarvan hotel.

He said he had been told by Mr. Wilkinson that he was a disgrace and unfit to hold the office of county chairman. But though he was eventually goaded into making the remark he now regrets having made, that should not be used as a justification for the assault that was made on him.

Mr. Murphy said that on three occasions he had been

given a democratic mandate to be chairman of the Waterford County Board and at 41 years of age he is not going to be told that he is unfit to be chairman and a disgrace to the office.

Responding, Mr. Wilkinson alleged that over the last five years under the chairmanship of Eamonn Murphy the name of Waterford GAA has been sullied throughout the country.

He had attended a Munster Council convention and the annual Congress this year and was shocked at the number of people from every corner of the country who had expressed their dismay at the state of things in Waterford.

"I wanted to make a comment about the county senior hurling selectors when I was cut down by the chair-

man," said Mr. Wilkinson.

"I was then about to leave the meeting when he made his premeditated and deliberate remark that has brought such stress, strain and hurt to two families."

He went on to refer to the trauma the county chairman had inflicted on two households.

"There is now a cancer in our midst and it started five years ago. There are great GAA men on both sides of this tragic divide but sadly many long time friendships are now irrevocably broken," he said.

"Given the circumstances that provoked the assault I have no apologies to make for it, though I very deeply regret that it ever took place. I place myself at the mercy of this County Board," he added.

MICROWAVE TRANSMITTER

Comeragh Committee Determined To Fight On

“Given the very real fears we have about this microwave transmitter the least we would have expected of Cork Communications was that they would send a representative to Monday night’s meeting to face the public and answer whatever questions would have been put to them”, he said.

“Instead with planning permission in their pocket they choose the easy option and stayed away”, said Mr. Murphy.

He said the company had also turned a blind eye to earlier invitations to attend other public meetings and had only once sent a representative to what was in essence a private meeting.

Also before the meeting was a report from independent consultants which claimed that at two specific Cork Communication sites at Ovens and Carron Hill near Doneraile the company is putting out 1,024 watts when the limit of their permission is only 100 watts.

Following Monday night’s unanimous decision to appeal the County Manager’s decision to An Bord Pleanala, Mr. Murphy disclosed yesterday that his Association will be meeting with its legal advisers later this week about the appeal which must be lodged not later than October 6th.

Mr. Murphy pledged, however, that “the battle has only begun”, and Monday night’s meeting, which packed the venue to capacity, confirmed what everyone had expected — an appeal against the County Manager’s decision to An Bord Pleanala.

The attendance at the meeting included County Councillors Oliver Coffey, Kieran O’Ryan and Billy Kyne, together with Cllr. Austin Hallahan of Dungarvan Urban Council. All four spoke out against the Cork Communications proposals.

There was a stinging attack on the Waterford County Engineer, Mr. John O’Flynn, who it was alleged stated in a report submitted to the County Manager that “we need not take the objectors into consideration as they are of no

relevance in this situation”.

It is also understood that the Co. Waterford Mountaineering Club has also decided to appeal the decision.

Meanwhile fundraising plans are being drawn up by the Comeragh Environmental Protection Association to finance the appeal. These have already received a major boost through an offer by Liam Clancy of the internationally renowned Clancy Brothers, to put on a concert free of charge.

Mr. Clancy attended Monday night’s meeting and he too spoke out strongly against the Cork Communications plans. Another public meeting has been called for next Monday night at Dungarvan’s Park Hotel to prepare the Bord Pleanala appeal and co-ordinate a continuing campaign of opposition to the proposals.

“This issue is far from over”, a defiant Michael Murphy pledged.

Guilty Of Mean And Nasty Offence

A motorist who twice filled up his car with petrol at a self-service station and then drove away without paying for it, was told by Judge Michael Pattwell at Dungarvan District Court that he was guilty of a mean and nasty offence.

Twenty four year old unemployed father of two, David Smith, Stradbally, Co. Waterford, pleaded guilty to stealing £27 worth of petrol on August 28 and £30 worth on September 20 the property of the Deise Service Station, Youghal Road, Dungarvan.

The court also heard that Smith had served two and a half years in prison in England for armed robbery.

“He is not the most desirable person to be joining us on this little island,” Judge Pattwell commented.

“Self service stations operate largely on the basis of trust and the defendant showed a considerable amount of contempt,” he added.

Fines totalling £150 were imposed on Smith.

Inspector Michael Blake prosecuted.
