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# **New School** Sanctioned For

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# Villierstown Tidy Towns Report

The picturesque village of Villierstown showed improvement over the 1992 adjudication. Their 173 marks was three more than the 1992 figure. They showed improvement in four of the categories, losing a point however for tidiness.

The following are the adjudicator's comments, 1992 marks in brackets.

Effort (32) 33 — It was again a pleasure to visit Villierstown as it is a village which has great potential to do well in the competition. It was encouraging to see that you have sustained and indeed further improved on last year's standard. With a little more attention to detail, finally resolving the dereliction problems and with all of the community's assistance you would be among the top ranking towns in the country. Your response on the questionnaire and particularly the clear map were most helpful during adjudication.

Tidiness (32) 31 — The village centre was again commendably litter free but here and there along grass verges on the approach roads a few papers were to be seen. Any construction sites such as the one on the Dungarvan approach must be kept as tidily as possible during the works. Any building materials, heaps of sand, etc., no longer required should be removed immediately. There few were a areas/laneways which could have been tidier. The disguising of derelict buildings by boarding up and decorating the windows is a good idea as others such as on the right hand side of the Clashmore approach generated an untidy appearance.

Presentation of Buildings (30) 31 — The improvement of one derelict building at the top of the street was noted. An Cruiscin Lan and the buildings beside it looked very well. The National School was well presented but the entrance area was somewhat weedy and long grass had not been trimmed against the boundary wall in front although the grass verge had been neatly cut. The simple pre-sentation of the Post Office was admired. The formally positioned, yet strangely modest (in terms of its visual impact on the villagescape) church was admired. At least one of the monuments had grass growing from the top. Remember to present outbuildings/ sheds to the same standard as the main buildings.

Presentation of Natural

Amenities (28) 29 — The quayside was neatly presented but for a few weeds here and there, particularly beneath the seats. The removal of overhead telephone lines is a good idea. There is scope however for better maintenance of the green area here. The standard of the main street was good with well mown greens, mature trees and incidental planting in tubs and

hanging baskets. To be commended are all those who invest their time in the maintenance of green areas and planting. The young trees on the green down the hill opposite the church are most welcome. The 'square' at the telephone box looked well but the surface needed weeding. It is suggested that the open space at the crossroads on

the corner between the Clashmore and Dungarvan roads be developed to the same standard as the opposite corner.

Appearance of Approach Roads (31) 32—
The roadside verges of the Clashmore approach were well presented. Those on the Dungarvan approach were becoming at the time of adjudication overgrown

except for the area at the village name-sign. The Cappoquin road was quite overgrown. The road down to the quay was reasonable in places and overgrown in others. The new stone walls at the bottom of the village have been very well built. There is scope for clearing other walls such as on either side of the greens at the top end of the vil-

lage. The standard of street furniture was generally good.

Presentation of Residential Areas (17) 17—
There was great inconsistency under this heading.
While some properties were exceptionally well presented others seemed quite neglected in comparison. The stone house opposite the telephone box was

one which was particularly liked. Quite a few boundary walls were in need of painting. Also a number of entrance/roadside areas needed weeding.

Congratulations on another increase of marks. You must eliminate altogether for next year any litter and also achieve a more consistent standard generally.



# Now for the nasty jobs



OCTOBER is a thankless month for the gardener — winter digging is looming and must be completed by Christmas, while the recent growing season has left many rotten jobs.

 Hedges — clear out hedge bottoms thoroughly and burn or bag up debris. Otherwise you encourage pests and diseases to lie dormad over winter before causing new havoc next year.

If your hedge is deciduous, you could use the clear out as an chance to plant snowdrops and primroses for a cheerful start to next spring.

 Conifers — now is the best time to plant but take special care in preparing the site. Thorough planting now will ensure strong and healthy growth for many years.

 Harvesting — lift and store the last of your potato and carrot crops and keep picking apples and pears as they ripen. Never store any produce when damp and always ensure that it is well-ventilated.

Keep checking for mould or rot — the expression 'one rotten apple. . . 'applies to any stored produce.

 Geranlums — can survive to the first frosts but prepare for overwintering now by moving to a frost-free greenhouse or a windowsill indoors. The latter should be sunny but not in a well-heated room.

A shed with a decent window will do but lack of light may cause dropped leaves.

Another method is to dig up the plants, shaking off soil, pruning back to six inches high, and cutting off leaves. These 'skeleton' plants are then planted close together in trays of slightly moist peat. Watch for and remove shoots or plants which die but most should survive and revive next spring, ready for repotting or planting.

 Frost — all frost prone plants should be raised by now. Bulbs, tubers and corms should be dried and stored while complete plants are overwintered in a greenhouse or where frost cannot reach them.

■ Lawns — must be kept clear of fallen leaves. If you haven't already done so, work over with a spring rake to remove flattened and dead material before spiking or slitting for aeration.

Follow up with a proprietary phosphate feed.

Trim newly-sown lawns at two inches high and again a

few weeks later.

• Repairs — make repairs to all garden fences, gates, brickwork and paths before winter sets in and prevents

you working as well as increasing existing damage.

Storage — many tools and machines will be stored away now for several months. Make sure they are clean, well-oiled and put away carefully and safely. Re-

pair now rather than wait until needed.



# FIRST OPEN **DAY IN 158** YEARS

History was made at St. Luke's Psychiatric Hospital, Clonmel, last week, when for the first time every in the 158 years of the hospital's establishment, an open day was held which brought family and friends of patients together with the nursing staff and residents. St. Teresa's Ward, a long stay, rehabilitation ward, was the ward chosen to host the open day. There was a large turnout of relatives who came at the invitation of the sixteen residents.

The day began with Mass in the temporary church, usually the residents dining hall. The setting throughout the day was informal and relaxed, even during the Mass, where everybody sat for the entire proceedings, including the priest. The celebrant of the Mass was Rev. Fr. Abbie Kennedy, a former staff member of St. Luke's. Fr. Kennedy came all the way from Portumna in Galway to celebrate the Mass for the residents. Fr. Kennedy said that he recognised many of the faces in the room despite the fact that it had been sixteen years since he had worked in the hospital.

The purpose of the day was to encourage more communication between residents and relatives and to give the relatives an insight into the quality of life which the residents are leading.

The Mayor of Clonmel, Cllr. Michael O'Brien (F.F.), said that he would only mention the word "institution" once and that was to say that it should be taken from all books and there should be no mention of it again. Cllr. O'Brien said he knew the true meaning of the word because he had been brought up in Ferryhouse. He then went into the Army where he was further institutionalised. The word hospital was a nice word, he said, and he was glad to see the high walls were gone from St. Luke's. Even the nurses caps were now gone, he said, which showed how much more caring and helpful the hospitals are today. With the Mass over there were a few speeches which were short and informal, so much so that the Special Hospitals Programme Manager, Mr. Matt Lynch said of the Mayor's speech that he had never before heard a politicians speech without the politics.

Mr. Denis Ryan, the Asst. Chief Nursing Officer, had said at the start of the day that it was either going to be a tremendous success or a total failure and let's say that St. Luke's Hospital. Clonmel, could be the venue for another open day at some stage in the future.

# **AMERICAN** By Richie Walsh

Robert Liet, General Chairman, 1993 International Convention Host Committee, states in an article that bidding for a Lions International Convention is a five year process. Among the requirements are 10,000 first class bedrooms, what type of convention centre would be required; is there enough volunteer labour available; a guaranteed shuttle bus system between the convention centre and 40 to 50 hotels. (This year Minneapolis St. Paul provided over 2,000 volunteers).

Parade route approval and indeed many others, including a booking fee of \$1 million. The other contestants for the 1993 convention were: Singapore, Mexico City, Vancouver and several US cities. The International Committee made no mistake in choosing Minneapolis St. Paul for the 1993 convention as it was truly a great convention and the people of the metropolis "City of Water" gave all of us a truly warm welcome. It is reported to have been worth \$27 million to the city.

However, the convention over, the time had come for us to depart and truthfully, we did so regretfully.

My next port of call was Denver, capital of the State of Colorado, one of the Rocky Mountain states, a city of over one and three-quarter million people. Colorado became a state on August 1, 1876, exactly one hundred years after the signing of the Declaration of Independence. Therefore, Colorado became known as the Centennial State. It is one of the highest states in the US (average elevation 6,800 ft.)

Colorado has almost a perfectly rectangular shape, with an east-west extent of 387 miles and a north-south extent of 276 miles. It is bounded on the east by Nebraska and Kansas, on the south by Oklahoma and New Mexico, on the north by Wyoming and Nebraska, and on the west by Utah. It is twice the size of England and slightly larger than the 3 states of New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania combined.

The three major physiographic regions of the United States are represented by Colorado. In the east are the level rolling lands of the Great Plains. In the west are the plateau and basins known collectively as the Colorado Plateaus, and in the centre are the mountains of the Southern Rockies.

Here, slightly west of the crest of the mountains lies what is known as the Continental divide. This irregular watershed splits the State into two roughly equal sections. The altitude of this whole area is over 12,000 ft. I have stood by a large plaque, by the watershed, which shows the origins of many famous rivers, some of which are about 200 ft. apart, but owing to the divide, end up in the ocean, 2,000 miles apart.


The great Colorado River and its major tributaries in this area flow down the western slope of the Pacific Ocean. The South Platte, Arkansas and Rio Grand, flow down the eastern slope, all eventually reaching the Atlantic Ocean.

In the central portion of the State lie the Southern Rocky Mountains, a vast wilderness of high, rocky and snow-capped peaks, more than 50 of which exceed 14,000 ft., nearly five miles high. The highest are: Elbert, 14,423 ft., Harvard 14,420 ft., Massive 14,404. One of the most famous of these is Pike's Peak, named after Lieut. Zebulon Pike, who discovered the mountain

In 1820, Dr. Edwin James made the first recorded ascent. In the 1850's "Pike's Peak Or Bust" became the slogan of the Gold Rush seekers. In 1873 the US Army Signal Corps built a weather observatory on the summit. Until 1899 this was manned year-round by a lone enlisted man who was replaced periodically after a short tour of duty. One of these was Sergt. John O'Keeffe who gained national notoriety with his tall tales about duty on the peak. His most famous (or perhaps infamous) story was about his baby daughter "Erin" being devoured by "mountain rats" a complete hoax! With a name like that and a vivid imagination, I feel he must have been an Irishman!

original roadway was built in 1886-'88. This is now a modern macadamised roadway. But there is an easier way of getting to the top. In 1889-'90 a business tycoon built the Manitou and Pike's Peak Cog Railroad, which is still going strong. My son drove me to the top and we were not long there when the trusty old cog-way arrived, with its two coaches of passengers. The drive is a pretty scary one, with long stretches of unprotected roadway and very, very sharp bends.

Once at the top, one can take advantage of the 2 to 3 acres plateau which the powers that be laid out by levelling the top. On this man made plateau area a number of shops, and restaurants now stand. Although not the highest peak (14,110 ft.), it has one major advantage: the mountain stands out on its own, with no other peaks near, thus giving an unparalleled view of the surrounding countryside, and even as far down as Colorado Springs, Colorado's second city.—(TO BE CONTINUED).

It is estimated that the fair value of the net assets of the business, which is being acquired on a debt free basis, is approxi-Stg£4.5m. mately (IR£4.8m).

The Durham Dairy liquid milk operation processes approximately 9 million gallons of milk annually and produces a full range of whole and low fat milks for sale to wholesalers, households, retailers and schools in coun-Durham Northumberland. The business which is based at Stonebridge, South West of Durham, employs 110 people

and services 220 milk rounds for 22 distribution depots.

## **County Waterford ICMSA News**

County Secretary, Mrs. Anne Kirwan outlines below the submission made by ICMSA to the Department of Education recently. In a detailed submission to Dr. Donal de Buitléir, Chairperson of the Advisory Committee on Third Level Student Support, at the Department of Education, the ICMSA has called for an end to the blatant discrimination against farm families inherent in the calculation of farm income to determine eligibility for third level grants.

Among its recommendations, the Association is calling for an appeals mechanism which would enable farm families who are refused grant aid to have their application appealed within

The fundamental point raised by the ICMSA is the fact that the Department of Education uses a different method to the Revenue Commissioners to calculate farm income and in so doing excludes many families who would otherwise be entitled to grant aid.

The Minister for Food, Mr. Brian O'Shea, has presented certificates to representatives of Waterford Foods Gain Animal Feed Mill in Dungarvan at the Waterford Foods stand at the National Ploughing Championships.

Waterford Foods are the first company in Ireland to have two feed mills attain ISO status as the Gain Animal Feed Mill in Clonroche achieved ISO status earlier this year.

The Dungarvan Mill produces about 30,000 tonnes of feed annually which is sold either as bulk feed or as bagged rations.

Aidan O. Dempsey, Group General Manager of Waterford Foods Trading Division said that Gain management and staff are now at the cutting edge of quality control in provender milling.

"This is as clear a demonstration as possible of our commitment to high quality animal feeds. Our customers can see evidence of this both through our ISO accreditation and through the success of the Gain range of products.







# KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question — I have been claiming Unemployment Benefit since February 1993 when I was made redundant, I have been offered work for 2 days per week. If I take this will it have any effect on my claim when it runs out in May 1994?

Answer — You are entitled to 390 days Unemployment Benefit. If you work for 2 days each week you will only be signing on for 4 days per week. So, it will take you longer to use up your 390 days Unemploy-

When your 390 days are used up, you will have to get another 13 PRSI contributions paid to re-qualify for Unemployment Benefit. If you earn at least £25 per week you will be insured at the Class A rate. These 13 weeks don't have to be consecutive. As this will then be treated as a new claim, you will have to satisfy the additional requirements. This means that you must have suffered a loss in earnings and have also lost 1 day's work. Your most recent 13 week period of employment in the 52 week period before the start of your new claim will be looked at — you wouldn't satisfy this rule if you continued working for 2 days per week. In effect you would have to reduce to working one day.

If your earnings were less than £70 per week in the governing tax year your benefit would be paid at a reduced rate. A claim made in 1994 would be based on your earnings in the tax year 1992/93, and a claim made in 1995 would be based on your earnings in 1993/94. So, taking a job for less than £70 per week could have an effect on your rate of benefit in the future. You would have the option of applying for Unemployment Assistance instead of taking the reduced rate of benefit. However, this would involve a means test.

We have had quite a number of similar enquiries from people offered work for 1 or 2 days per week. Before taking this work they should check their situation. Free, confidential information is available from any Citizens Information Centre. They are listed in the Golden

Question — I am separated from my husband and am getting court maintenance of £80 per week, £40 for our two children and £40 for myself. Would I be entitled to the Lone Parent Allowance?

Answer — The Lone Parent Allowance for your size family is £89 per week. As your £80 maintenance is less than this, you would be eligible for some amount of Lone Parent Allowance. The £40 maintenance you get for the children will be disregarded, as will the first £6 of your maintenance. The remaining £34 will be assessed as means along with any other income or savings you might have. Assuming that your only income is your maintenance, your rate of Lone Parent Allowance would be £55 per week (£89 less £34), £25.20 for yourself and £29.80 for your children.

However, the Liable Relatives/Maintenance Recovery Section in the Dept. of Social Welfare could have the Maintenance Order transferred to them and depending on your husband's income, they could have the Maintenance Order brought up to the level of the Lone Parents Allowance and then pay you the full Lone Parents Allowance of £89 per week.



Local Run To Aid

Kesearch

The forthcoming Dungarvan Cross Country Championship in St. Augustine's College, Abbeyside will link up with the 13th Annual Terry Fox Run in aid of Cancer Research. At a recent meeting in Lawlor's Hotel the Munster Co-ordinator for the Irish Cancer Society, Margaret O'Sullivan, outlined the nationwide plans for the "marathon of hope" Irish style on Sunday week, October 17.

In co-operation with the Dungarvan Athletic Club the local branch of the Irish Cancer Society, under the leadership of Mrs. Maura Shanahan and Mrs. Lily Lineen, will co-ordinate this year's run and plans are presently being finalised which will ensure that the local event will contribute greatly to the Cancer Research effort.

This is Ireland's first year to participate and funds raised will be allocated by the Irish Cancer Research Board for projects in Irish Hospitals and Universities.

#### THE MARATHON OF HOPE

Terry Fox was born in Winnipeg, Canada in July 1958. At the age of 19 he was diagnosed with bone cancer in his right leg in 1977. His leg was amputated six inches above his knee. While in hospital,

Terry was so overcome by the suffering of cancer patients that he decided to run across Canada to raise funds for cancer research. His journey was called The Marathon of Hope.

Terry's Marathon of Hope took place in 1980 with Terry's simple objective to raising the awareness of all Canadians of the critical need to fund a cure for cancer. Terry's fierce determination resulted in him running 26 miles every day for 143 days. By February 1st 1981 Terry's hope of raising one dollar on average from every Canadian was realised when the Marathon of Hope fund totalled 24.17 million dollars. The previous September Terry had to stop running as the cancer had spread to his lungs. His commitment was carried on by others. Long before that day Terry had captured the hearts and imagination of the nation - he

had become a Canadian hero.

Terry died on June 2, 1991, one month before his 23rd birthday. He left everyone with a legacy of hope that continues to inspire so many today.

#### THE LOCAL EFFORT

The Cancer Research effort in the West Waterford area is taking a three pronged approach. At present a number of Primary Schools are holding a week-ly "Friday Bucket Collection", following lessons and videos on the Terry Fox story. Further schools wishing to get involved can contact Mrs. Maura Shanahan at (058) 42507. They may then take part in the Run/Walk/Jog on Sunday, October 17 which will start at Grattan Square, Dungarvan at 2 p.m. and which is open to everyone of all ages. Adults are asked to contribute £2 or £5 per family group with the children having already contributed in the Friday collections.

Led by the Dungarvan Brass and Reed Band the 'pelathon' will then head for St. Augustine's College where upon arrival run certificates and stickers will be distributed. Any participants still not in oxygen debt at this stage will be invited to complete one lap of the Friary cross country course.

The local athletic club's inaugural Cross Country Championship over a distance of five miles will be started by the Chairman of the Dungarvan Urban Council, Cllr. Tony Wright and will involve keen and sporting competition between teams from Ring, Abbeyside, Dungarvan and West Waterford. Those with no athletic affiliations whatsoever will be most welcome to participate in this side of the day's events. The entry fee here is £4 with each participant receiving a cancer research tshirt. Sponsorship cards are also available on request for the athletes and anybody collecting £10 or more will receive a t-shirt and gain automatic entry to the race. The day's events will conclude with a social evening in Brennan's Bar, The Square, where the results of the Dungarvan Cross Country Championship race will be announced.



This has gone very much awry and having it played before the end of next month is not going to be easy as there can be hidden problems to be overcome, like the playing of our 'home' matches in the National League. We have four games in the league which are due to be played in our venues and on Sundays before the end of November and it will be difficult to play senior football champi-

# Resolute Lismore Thrilling Final At LISMORE 0-8 PASSAGE 0-7

Played in the most appalling conditions because of the incessant rain which fell on a ground which had taken a real battering from the heavy rain of the previous week, this was a thrilling county final which will be remembered for the true courage, dedication and skill of the players on both teams who battled with the conditions as if their lives depended on the outcome.

For the final ten minutes the drenched crowd of approximately 2,500 had been gearing themselves for a draw as at that stage only a point separated the sides and scores were coming very slowly. It is also true to say that the vast majority of neutral supporters expressed their opinion in the immediate aftermath of the final that a draw would have been a fair result to this mighty battle between two lionhearted teams. The losers Passage, did get their chances of squaring the score in the closing minutes, but uncharacteristically sent two close-in frees just wide.

But despite all the ifs and buts of the game, I must

was available. The 'dugout' was packed and with the rain blowing into that area, it was almost impossible to take notes. The light wind blew across the field, but partly favoured Passage in the first half.

Within 30 seconds Passage were awarded the first of their 23 frees and Mossy O'Keeffe gave them the lead, which was doubled a minute later when Anthony Fitzgerald sent over and just a minute later Barry Walsh (grandson of the famous "Doyle" Walsh of their 1937 team) had Passage's third point. Amazingly, this was almost half their total score for the final as they were to score only a further four points in the remaining 57 minutes.



Both sides had a couple of wides before Lismore opened their account in the 11th minute when full forward Sean Daly sent over a placed ball. Michael O'Sullivan, from play, made it two points for Lismore before Mossy had his final score of the game when he pointed a 14th minute free. It was 0-4 to 0-2 at this point and at the end of the first quarter. An injury to

Brendan Crowley delayed the game for some minutes and shortly afterwards when Lismore were awarded a semi-penalty, Sean Daly opted for a point to leave the situation at 0-4 to 0-3 at half time.

#### HIT FRONT

Within seconds of the restart, Paul Prendergast was wide of the posts when striking under pressure, but made amends when he sent over the equalising point in the 32nd minute. Two minutes later Lismore hit the front with a Brendan Prendergast point, he having received a pass from Sean Daly. Anthony Fitzgerald had a 37th minute point (their first score after 23 minutes) to put the teams level again. Lismore introduced Dan Shanahan for Michael O'Sullivan at this stage.

Just on the three-quarter stage Brendan Prendergast inched Lismore in front again with a fine point but two minutes later Paul Fitzgerald had things all square again at 0-6 a-piece. Brendan Lawton put LIsmore one up in the 48th minute but Martin Murphy, who had a rather quiet game to this point sent over for Passage and now with ten minutes left, a draw looked to be a likely result.

They now had it all to play for and the players realising that a puck of the ball could make the difference between victory and defeat,

threw caution to the wind in the grandstand finish that saw both miss good chances. Passage in particular had a succession of missed frees and after Brendan Lawton sent over a great point in the 54th minute they had two fine chances with close in frees but amazingly missed the uprights.

The county final was at an end and Lismore were the champions again. The only other county final without a goal being scored was in 1986 when Lismore lost to Mount Sion by 0-16 to 0-

At the time of writing I have not heard which player was awarded the man-ofthe-match accolade, but for me this was a day when one should not be selective in apportioning credit as every one of the players gave of their best to the last ounce.

Declan Landers, didn't get a whole lot to do in goal for Lismore, but what came his way was well taken care of. David Barry with Mark O'Sullivan and Paddy O'Donnell on each side of him, protected their goal line and repulsed the onslaughts that came their way during the hour. In the half line, Seamus Prendergast (who captained the 1991 champions in the final) and his two wing men, Brendan Crowley and Philip Hickey did everything required of them as did Brendan Prendergast and his midfield partner Kieran O'Gorman.

Billy Lee, Paul Prendergast and Michael O'Sullivan in the half forward line and Brendan Lawton, Sean Daly and Michael Hickey in the inside line all played their part in the scoring or the making of the scores that brought them this great victory. Dan Shanahan and James O'Connor, who went on as substitutes, also played their part in the win.

Ray Barry in goal for Passage also effected some fine saves and with the Cullinane brothers, Eamon at full back and Sean at centre half and James and Pat Connors, Seamus Keating and Ed. Quann also defending very well and making live difficult for Lismore; Paul Connors and Paul Fitzgerald both played very well in the middle and Anthony Fitzgerald, Noel Connors, Barry Walsh, Sean Carey, Mossy O'Keeffe and Martin Murphy played their hearts out in their do or die bid to bring the first senior title to the Dunmore East Club.

Perhaps they deserved another chance, but things just did not go their way on the day. I have no doubt but that their day will come in the next year or two and then no one will begrudge them a title.
