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Tragedy Strikes Ring Gaeltacht

Tragedy struck the tiny Co. Waterford Gaeltacht of Ring on the double last weekend when the cruel sea claimed the lives of teenaged cousins, Pat Tobin (16) and P. J. Rossiter (15) of Baile na nGall, whose upturned fibre glass boat was found submerged and entangled in its own nets about a mile and a half off Helvick Pier last Friday afternoon.

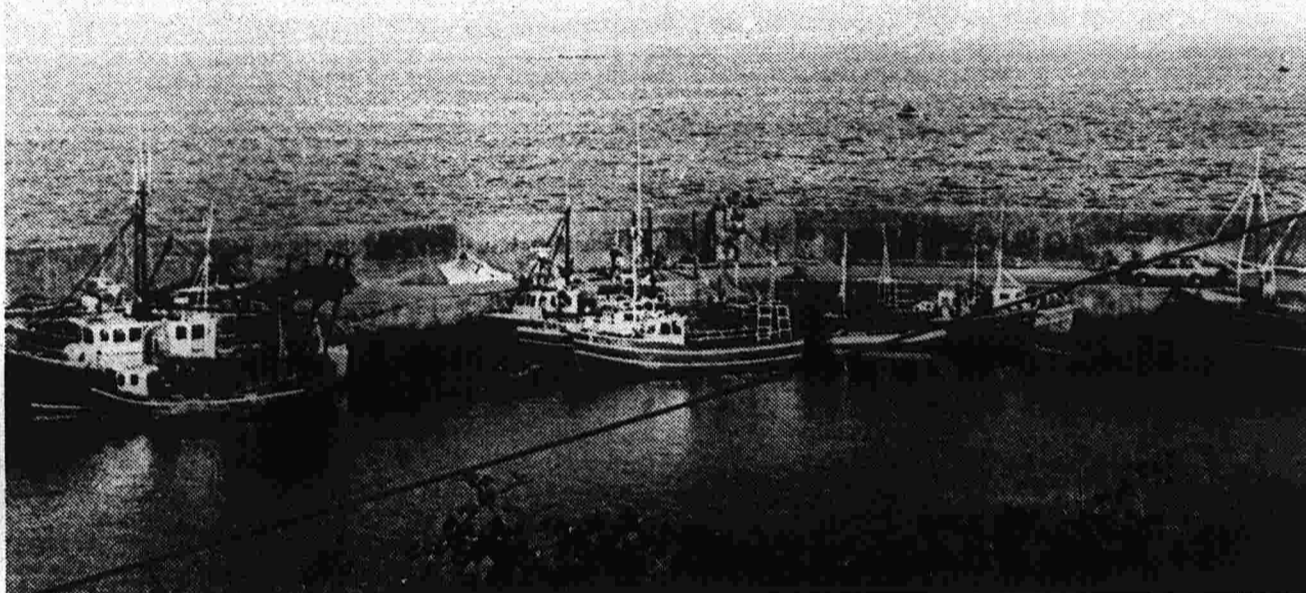
Up to forty divers from the Naval Service, the Garda Síochána and the Waterford Sub Aqua Club have been engaged in the search, augmented by more than thirty local boats.

A helicopter from the

Marine Rescue Co-Ordination Centre at Shannon has also been involved as has the Youghal inshore lifeboat.

The Dunmore East and Ballycotton Lifeboats were

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County Engineer Brands Statements As "Untrue"

Waterford Co. Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn, has branded as "untrue" statements made at a recent public meeting convened in connection with the planning permission granted by the Waterford County Council to Cork Communications Ltd. for the erection of a microwave transmitter and ancillary buildings on the Comeragh Mountains at Seefin.

Mr. O'Flynn told Monday's meeting that the Chairman of the Comeragh Environmental Protection Association, Mr. Michael Murphy, had told the public meeting that he (Mr. O'Flynn) had stated in a report to the County Manager that "we need not take the objectors into consideration as they are of no relevance."

Mr. O'Flynn said Mr. Murphy had also told the meeting that in his (Mr. O'Flynn) report to the County Manager on the planning application he said of the 1,400 objectors to the erection of the transmitter, "in this instance they do not matter."

Mr. O'Flynn said both these statements are untrue,

and he found it disturbing that statements purporting to be direct quotations from his report should be attributed to him at a public meeting.

"I do not wish to speculate on the reasons why such mis-statements were made and not subsequently corrected or withdrawn," said Mr. O'Flynn. "I would hope that I have now clarified the position for the County Council who can be assured that in dealing with planning applications all aspects of the proposals, including any objections lodged, are taken into consideration in arriving at decisions," he added.

AMERICAN TRIP

The hills and mountains of the Southern Rockies still contain remnants of the gold and silver that first brought eager settlers to Colorado, but mining has long since yielded first place to the tourist industry. Thousands of visitors come first to see the Colorado Mountains every year. This, besides the sportsmen who come in summer and fall, the earnest all year round mountain climbers and winter sports enthusiasts.

The eastern third of Colorado is part of the Great Plains, a treeless and flat rolling region. On the western fringes of the Plains, where they meet the mountains, live two-thirds of the State's population; here are located Colorado's three largest cities — Denver, Colorado Springs and Pueblo.

The great Plains are the granary of Colorado. Dry stock farming is the general rule, due to the dry climate. Colorado's climate is generally mild and sunny in summer and cold and sunny in winter. Temperatures in the inhabited areas of the State average between 50° and 75° in summer and 10° and 35° in January. Everywhere the air is dry and invigorating

and the rainfall is scanty. The average annual rainfall is only 16.5 inches. Due to the very dry climate, irrigation is required on a large scale, especially as they grow such water related crops as sugar beet. Whilst wheat, which is grown from drought-resistant strains, is the main crop; second is sugar beet, the annual crop of 2.5 million tonnes being 13% of the national total. In all, some 2.7 million acres are irrigated. As a matter of fact, some of the water which starts flowing down the western slope, is tunnelled through the Divide and ends up growing crops on the eastern side.

Mining was Colorado's top-ranking industry in the 19th century. Gold, first discovered in 1858 in Cherry Creek, near Denver, and later at Gregory Gulch, was the most important product, followed by silver, lead and zinc.

An interesting sidelight: The above-mentioned Cherry Creek, which is situated about 15 miles south of Denver, is a highly populated area and quite close to one of Denver's biggest satellite towns, Aurora, and

is now a lake of many hundreds of acres. The authorities have constructed a man-made beach there, by importing many thousands of tonnes of sand. It is the main reservoir for the city of Denver. I was taken for a trip on the lake in a speedboat and was shown the hillock on the northern shore overlooking the metropolis of Denver, which was to be the spot on which His Holiness the Pope was to celebrate the open-air Mass on the occasion of his visit to the city. This event took place after my departure.

Top place in Colorado's mining industry today is taken by fuels, which provide more than half of all revenue from mining.

There are more than 200 production oilfields in the state, rising from a production of 18.5 million barrels annually in the late 1940's to 58.5 million barrels in 1956. Leading place among the metals is now taken by uranium and molybdenum. Nearly all US molybdenum production and probably the bulk of world production comes from Colorado's Climax Mine in Lake County, Central Colorado. (Molybdenum is a precious metal and is used in high tech industry.)

Understandably, Colorado produces a wide range of granite, sandstones, marbles and other building stones. Proof of the great quality of those sandstones and marble is the fact that the Lincoln Memorial and the Tomb of the Unknown

Soldier, both in Washington, and the municipal buildings of New York and San Francisco, are built of Colorado marble.

Obviously, tourism is one of Colorado's greatest industries, attracting more than 4 million tourists a year. No other State in the Union can provide such breath-taking scenery, from the sheer wild beauty of the Rocky Mountains, to the wonders of the lower regions, such as the Garden of the Gods, which are filled with the wonders of nature. The Garden of the Gods was dedicated in 1909 and the 1,350 acres, are a wonderland of red sandstone rock formations. Many of these are over 300 million years old and have been sculpted through time by erosion into really wonderful shapes. Nearby is the famous Cave of the Winds. This is a fantastic underground series of caves which are festooned throughout with an amazing array of stalactites, of every shape and size.

In a word, the outdoor attractions of this State are endless, and to make sure that those are protected, nearly one-third of Colorado lies in the public domain. Public lands include national parks, national forests and national monuments. Colorado's monuments include the impressive Black Canyon, the eroded Rock Pinnacles of Colorado National Monuments and the 600 ft. high sand dunes of Great Sand Dunes National Monuments, and many, many more.

Old Parish Wins £1,000 In "Pobal Beo" Contest

At an awards function in Spiddal, Co. Galway, on Friday, October 8 Minister for Arts, Culture and the Gaeltacht, Michael D.

Higgins, presented a £1,000 prize to Old Parish in Ring, in Údarás Na Gaeltachta's "Pobal Beo" community action compe-

tion.

Old Parish earned their special award through their work in planning for the future of their community

and for their emphasis on co-operation between various development groups and committees in Old Parish.

Assault Charges Dismissed At Dungarvan Court

The cost to the State in free legal aid in a case at Dungarvan District Court last Wednesday involving five female defendants, four of them unmarried mothers, was strongly commented upon by Judge Michael Pattwell.

At the end of a two and a half hour hearing at the special sitting of the court, Judge Pattwell said that at a time when people cannot get medical aid, when people are on waiting lists to undergo heart and hip operations, and when there are shortfalls all round in the health service, the State has had to spend at least £1,000 on five defendants who are already receiving State entitlements of some kind — and all because of trouble on the streets of Dungarvan at night.

"It is gone too far, the taxpayer is taking too much," Judge Pattwell said.

Commenting that all five

defendants before him had been granted free legal aid by the court, Judge Pattwell said four of them are receiving State entitlements as unmarried mothers and the fifth was also receiving a State entitlement in some other form.

"It is very easy for me to understand the feeling that is abroad at present about the way people's taxes are being used," Judge Pattwell said. "Here today we have five people in receipt of State entitlements who can do nothing better than fight around the streets of Dungarvan."

The Judge said the minimum cost of the case before him to the taxpayer is £1,000 and this at a time where there are shortfalls all round, especially in health service.

He said the decent, hard working people of Dungarvan — and they are the vast majority — are fed up to

the teeth about the bad name the town is getting.

"Maybe I am to blame to some extent for that, but I have no apologies to make for condemning all such acts of violence," Judge Pattwell said.

Before the court were Mrs. Eileen Riordan snr. and her daughter Eileen Riordan jnr., of 40 Cathal Brugha Place, Margaret Fraher, 16 Cathal Brugha Place, Libby Kirby, 18 Cathal Brugha Place, and Susan Nolan, 56 Cathal Brugha Place.

The Riordans, Kirby and Fraher, were all charged with assault arising from incidents in the town on the night of June 24 last, and there were applications by the State to bind all five to the peace.

During a lengthy hearing there was a complete conflict of evidence between the Riordans on the one hand and Fraher, Kirby and Nolan on the other.

The Riordans claimed that they had been set upon by the other defendants as they walked home late at night, and Eileen Riordan jnr. claimed that she was attacked by Fraher and Kirby and had to undergo x-rays at Waterford Regional Hospital on the following day.

Margaret Fraher alleged that she had been struck on the forehead with a plastic bottle by Eileen Riordan snr., a charge however that Riordan vehemently denied.

It also emerged during evidence that the incidents that night may have been

related to the fact that one of the defendants, Susan Nolan, had given State evidence two weeks earlier in a case in which jail sentences were imposed on Eileen Riordan snr.'s husband and two of her sons.

At the conclusion of the case, however, Judge Pattwell commented on the lack of independent evidence in the absence of which he had to try and reach a fair and just decision.

He felt that the State might not have produced all the evidence it possibly had open to it and he was not in a position to decide who assaulted who or who started what.

Charges of assault against both Riordans, Fraher and Kirby were dismissed because of insufficient evidence.

Asked that State's attitude towards the applications to bind all five defendants to the peace, Inspector Michael Blake said he would prefer if all the parties went out of court to try and start afresh again as neighbours.

Inspector Blake then withdrew the applications, but Judge Pattwell warned that if any of the defendants are convicted in his court again of assault they will need at least as good solicitors as they had this time to prevent him from sending them to prison.

"The decent citizen is fed up with what is happening in Dungarvan, and I am fed up too," Judge Pattwell added.

Waterford Roads To Benefit From EC Cohesion Fund For Ireland

The European Community announced on Thursday last the second group of Irish projects to receive assistance from the EC Cohesion Fund (interim instrument). Eight projects are to get a total of £32 million.

Six of the eight projects to be funded are major water treatment schemes intended to achieve water standards laid down by the EC directive on urban waste water. The seventh project will preserve an important type of natural habitat — raised bog. The final project is a series of measures to improve the national road network.

The total cost of the eight projects is £38 million, of which 85 per cent will be provided by the Cohesion Fund.

Waterford projects to benefit are included in the Road Network Improvement Scheme. This decision covers a group of twelve related projects on national primary roads, all of which form part of the Trans-European Network. The funding provided will be used to upgrade the network by improving the road pavement, increasing road capacity by widening carriageways, adding hard shoulders and climbing lanes where nec-

essary, and improving safety, for example, by changing the layouts of junctions and access roads.

The roads are as follows:— N25 Botherboy - Grange; N25 Leamybrien - Pike; N25 Grange - Piltown.

Improvements Needed At Cappoquin Courthouse

Members of Waterford County Council this week called for immediate improvements to be carried out to Cappoquin Courthouse where District Court Judge Michael Pattwell has indicated he will refuse to preside over future courts unless the premises is upgraded.

Cllr. Nora Flynn warned that there would be local anger if the District Court is withdrawn from Cappoquin, and she said it is the Council's responsibility to provide adequate facilities.

Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson supported his colleague, and it was agreed to furnish a report on the cost implications for the next meeting.

Plan that new rose bed now



TIME spent on roses now can yield excellent blooms later on — October is perfect for preparing a new rose bed or sorting out existing ones.

Once new sites are prepared this month, you can then plant in November, confident that the roses will establish well and be more pest and disease-resistant. You can, of course, plant container-grown roses at any time of year but October is ideal due to warmth remaining in the soil and its moist and crumbly texture which allows roses to put down good roots. Weather and soil conditions should also favour the gardener, making light work of any digging.

Key points to remember when planning a rose bed are:

- Choose an open position where there is a good flow of air to encourage growth — avoid walls and close-boarded fences unless you are planting climbing roses.
- Dig deep and turn the soil well before working in well-rotted organic compost. Such preparation is crucial to ensure that the roots can create an extensive root system for the many years ahead.
- Extreme soils need extra compost: it makes heavy clays better drained, binds sandy types to help keep moisture, and reduces the alkalinity of

chalky soils.

- Give the roses room. Don't pack them in with other shrubs and trees and always allow 18-30 inches between the roses, depending on the expected size of the variety — remember that you also need space for pruning, dead-heading blooms, weeding and hoeing.
- Design the bed to make the best use of the colours and varieties of rose. Large and full bushes should be sited at the back of a side border or in the centre of middle border — more compact types need to be in the front ranks.

Existing rose stock also benefits from checking in October, particularly if they have been in the same site for more than seven years.

Trees can then become spindly and disease-prone and pass it on to new stock. One answer is to create a new site, but you can also retain the same location by digging up 15 or so inches of topsoil and exchanging it for barrowloads from a rose-free part of the garden. It should give new life to your rose bed, while the old soil will be fine for vegetables or other flowers.

However, remember why you carried out this hard labour and avoid using this transported soil for roses until a few years have gone by.

Aglish Tidy Towns Progress Report 1993

The 1993 Tidy Towns progress report of the scenic village of Aglish, Co. Waterford, saw a significant increase of 12 points (171) as opposed to 159 in 1992.

The adjudicators remarks are as follows, 1992 marks in brackets:

Effort (30) 32 — Your responses on the questionnaire and particularly the

map were most helpful during adjudication. Obviously there is an active committee and indeed community hard at work in Aglish as great strides forward have been made. If you sustain your present level of maintenance of grass areas in particular and carry out some extra improvement works every year you will no doubt be a serious contender for an award in the future.

Tidiness (29) 29 — The overall impression of the village was one of neatness with little litter to be seen except on grass verges here and there. There were a few yards and laneways which might have been tidier. The yard beside the garage at the stream in the centre of the village is one example. The open yard opposite the new shrubs on one corner of the Youghal road detracted somewhat from this approach. The disused factory out past the school hopefully will be improved before long. Waterford Co-op was reasonably tidy in view of its function.

Presentation of Buildings (26) 28 — It was a pleasure to see the commercial premises in general so well presented with simple signs, indeed the type advocated. Bright paint and floral adornments formed the overall impression. The church and school were exceptionally well presented. The Garda Station would look better if painted. The Post Office was admired. Several outbuildings and also the garage by the bride over the stream would be significantly upgraded if even whitewashed.

Presentation of Natural Amenities (27) 30 — There is clearly great interest in this aspect of presentation as the established green areas were generally meticulously mown with good attention to details such as

trimming edges. To be highly commended are all those who invest time also in planting and maintaining flower beds, hanging baskets and tubs. The presentation of the stream was truly excellent. The old graveyard will look very well when finally cleared. It is suggested that there is scope with the green area opposite the telephone kiosk to develop a further green with a seat or two and the removal of the perimeter fencing. The ball alley are could also be developed somewhat (at least weeded) but the new stone walling looks well.

Appearance of Approach Roads (28) 32 — Congratulations are due to those responsible for the very high standard presented along the approach roads this year. Most grass verges had been cut, some extremely well with neat trimming against stone walls, etc. All new stone walls are most welcome as they complement perfectly the older ones. Older walls which had been recently whitewashed looked very well; nonetheless there were quite a few other drab looking ones which should be attended to for next year. The standard of street furniture, especially road signs, was good but several litter bins needed cleaning.

Presentation of Residential Areas (19) 20 — There were many beautiful presentations under this heading. Nonetheless there were some drab boundary walls and rusting gates. The flower beds and green at the estate were excellent but no effort had been made with the open space at the rear — even if a neat strip of grass were mown next to the roadway this would be a start.

Congratulations on a significant increase in marks. The adjudicators look forward to returning to Aglish next year.

HASTY PASTRY



minced beef
1 small potato,
onion and carrot,
finely diced
1/2 beef stock
cube, dissolved
in 1 tbs (15ml)
boiling water
salt and pepper

Method:

Pastry for all these delicious mouthfuls has been made by the quick and easy all-in-one method. Here's how.

HASTY PASTRY

Ingredients:

8 oz (225g) plain flour
5 oz (150g) margarine
2 tbs (30ml) water

Method:

Cream margarine, one-third flour and water with fork until sticky dough is formed. Mix in remaining flour. Bind dough with hands; knead on lightly floured board until smooth. Roll out.

PASTIES

Ingredients:

6 oz. (175g) pastry
2 oz. (50g)

Cut four 7.5 cm (3 in) pastry circles. Mix fillings; divide between them. Brush pastry edges with water, draw up and seal. Brush with egg or milk. Bake at 200°C., 400°F, gas mark 6 for 20-25 mins.

CHICKEN TARTLETS

Ingredients:

2 oz (50g) pastry
1 cooked chicken joint
1 oz (25g) frozen sweet corn and peppers
4 tbs (60ml) white sauce
salt & pepper

Method:

Line patty tins with pastry. Cube chicken, mix with other ingredients and fill pastry cases. Bake at

200°C., 400°F, gas mark 6 for 15-20 mins.

QUICHE LORRAINE

Ingredients:

2 oz (50g) pastry
2 rashers bacon, chopped
1/2 onion, grated
1 large egg, beaten
1 oz (25g) Cheddar cheese, grated
salt & pepper

Method:

Line patty tins with pastry. Fry onion and

bacon. Add to beaten egg, cheese and seasoning. Fill pastry cases and bake at 200°C., 400°F, gas mark 6 for 15-20 mins.

PIZZA

Ingredients:

2 oz (50g) pastry
1/2 small onion, finely chopped
1 oz (25g) mushrooms, sliced
2 tbs (30ml) tomato puree
pinch mixed herbs
1 oz (25g) grated cheese
salt & pepper

Garnish: anchovies olives

Method:

Line patty tins with pastry. Fry onion and mushrooms lightly. Remove from heat and add tomato puree, herbs and seasoning. Fill pastry cases and sprinkle with cheese. Garnish with sliced olives and anchovy fillets. Bake as for quiches.

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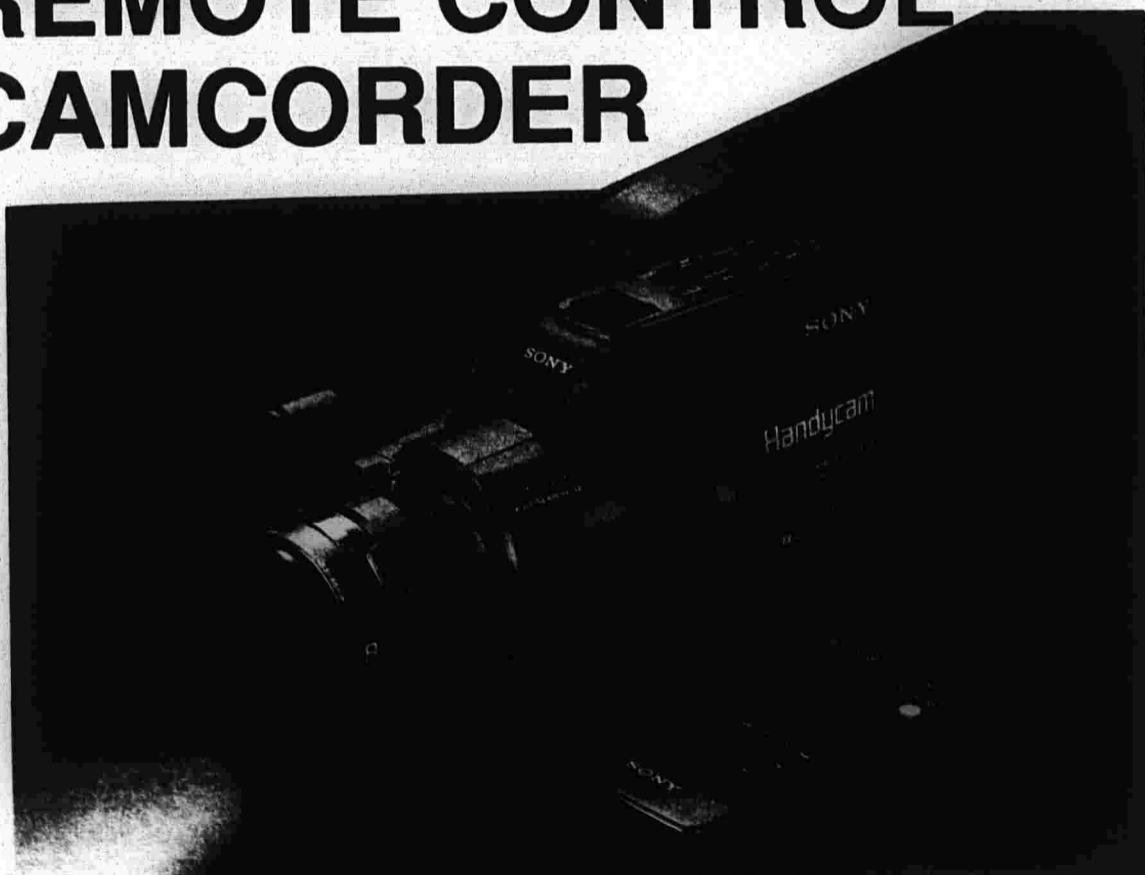

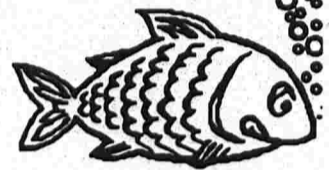

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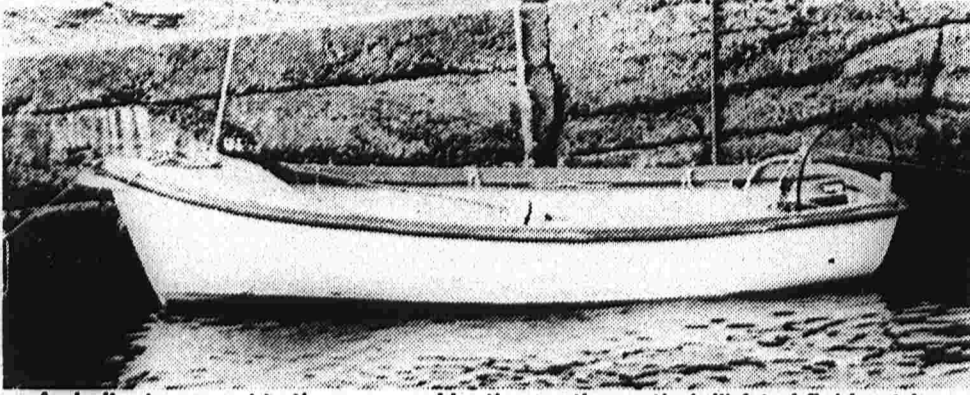
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Tragedy Strikes Ring Gaeltacht

also called out at the weekend, while hundreds of local people together with Gardai and Civil Defence members have fincombed the beaches along a 15-mile stretch of coastline between Mine Head and Ballyvoile in what — at the time of going to press — has been a fruitless search.

The short journey out from Helvick Head pier which was to have such tragic consequences began for the two youths shortly before noon last Friday. They set off in their 19 foot boat in conditions that have been described as "very reasonable."

However when they hadn't returned some hours later the alarm was raised and many of the local fleet put to sea.

Shortly after 4 p.m. a local trawler, "An Finn", skippered by Patalain O Faolain, made the grim discovery of the upturned boat submerged in the water about a mile and a half from Helvick pier and entangled in its own nets.

The find sparked off an even more intensive search with the Dunmore East and Ballycotton Lifeboats being called out in what had now become steadily worsening weather conditions.

With darkness, however, the search was called off and it resumed again at first light on Saturday. That has been the continuing story since but to date all concerted efforts to locate the bodies have failed.

Over the weekend hundreds of people visited the scene at Helvick Head. On Saturday, and again on Sunday, people knelt at the pier and recited the rosary through Irish. Many wept openly and unashamedly.

On Saturday the search yielded items of weather-proof clothing which the youths had been wearing when they left on their final, ill-fated, trip to sea. Late on Sunday evening their wellington boots were found not far from where the boat has been located, but despite the heaviest concentration of the search in these areas the bodies have remained unrecovered.

The local people, despite their grief, have involved themselves totally in the search operations in whatever way possible.

Even the women of the area have set up a "food kitchen" within the Fishermen's Co-op where soup, sandwiches, and tea have been made available for the divers and everyone else directly involved in the search.

While the diving operations obviously cannot be maintained indefinitely, locals say they will carry on with the search "for as long as it takes."

The missing youths were extremely popular members of the Gaeltacht community, and had decided, together, on a career in full time fishing.

Pat Tobin is son of Barney and Nora Tobin, and is the eldest of a family of three, while P. J. Rossiter is son of P. J. and Eilish Rossiter, and is the youngest of a family of three. Barney Tobin and Eilish Rossiter are brother and sister.

The boys are grandsons of Micil Tobin, now in his 80's, who is the last surviving crewman of the old Helvick Head Lifeboat which was controversially withdrawn from service by the RNLI in the late 1960's.

Pat Tobin was also an outstanding hurler and footballer with the Ring Club, and in fact was regarded as one of the brightest prospects in both codes in the county.

Only a few short weeks ago he was the youngest player afield when Ring narrowly lost the county intermediate hurling championship semi-final against Clonea. Last year he won Under-16 county football honours with An Gaeltacht.

Because of the tragedy the football championship games involving the Ring and Old Parish clubs at Cappoquin last Sunday were called off as a mark of respect.

Councillors Call For Traffic Lights At "Dangerous Junction"

A call was made at Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council to provide traffic lights at what was described as "the most dangerous junction in the county."

Cllr. Kieran O'Ryan said the junction in question on the new Dungarvan by-pass road at Shandon had already been the scene of many accidents. "It is a miracle, however, that there haven't been fatal accidents

there up to now."

Cllr. Tony Wright agreed and said Dungarvan Urban Council had already asked for the installation of traffic lights there.

Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer, said the funding would have to come from the National Roads Authority. However a roundabout

is planned there and this, he believed, would eliminate the need for lights. He was hopeful the funding for the roundabout would be forthcoming in the near future.

Cllr. O'Ryan however proceeded with his proposal to provide traffic lights and it was unanimously supported by the members.

COUNCIL ADOPTS COAT OF ARMS FOR COUNTY WATERFORD

At last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council the members gave their approval for a new Coat of Arms for the County of Waterford.

The shield was proposed by Councillor Harty and was unanimously adopted by the entire council. The Coat of Arms itself comprises a quartered shield with two supporters, St. Patrick and St. Declan, all of which is capped with a crest of a sunburst.

Within the shield are; 1) a round tower symbolising the Christian traditions, 2) a ship on the seas symbolising the maritime traditions, 3) land and mountains symbolising the agricultural traditions and finally a dolmen which symbolises the Pre-Christian traditions.

The crest at the top of the shield 'Gal Gréine', marks the link of the County with the Fianna. Indeed the Fianna motto is also used in the shield. 'Glaine 'nár gCroidhe, near 'nár ngéag s'Beart de Réir ar mBriathar', (Cleanliness of heart, strength in our limbs and do according to our word). A good motto for the future.

Times That Are Past — On the subject of times that are past and gone, a collection of old photographs from the Kinsalebeg area is being assembled, for permanent display in the locality. Behind the idea is Michael Hackett assisted by Henry Curran, Brendan Griffin and Mary Healy of the Old Mill Bar.

Already to hand is a photograph of the Kinsalebeg volunteers, training in a field near Piltown around 1915. It can be clearly seen that there was a shortage of guns, as the majority of the men assembled in the two lines, have hurleys or timber imitations. Just a few seem to have real guns. Also interesting to note is that the men,

assembled in the two lines, have on their Sunday best, with collar and tie, plus a cap or hat.

Another photo is of the pupils at Tinnock School around 1928 with their teacher Mrs. Waide. The pupils in this have been identified and can be named. The old metal bridge is captured in two of the snaps with the late Frank Coughlan opening the gates. An old (now decayed) thatched house at Kilmaloo features in another picture, where a local postman, Edmond Moran was photographed with his parents in 1904, before setting off on foot to deliver the mail. Edmond later resigned from the P.O. and emigrated through Cobh to make his career with the Boston Electric Railway in the U.S.A.

As soon as the new Piltown church is built, the hall will, of course, be available for community activities again. As we know the building is in great condition and amongst other uses, it will be ideal for the display of treasures if the past like old photographs and printed historical stories.

In the meantime, Mrs. Mary Healy has offered to display the frames on the walls of the Old Mill for all to enjoy. This will be a must for returning emigrants and visitors to our parish.

Massive Damage To County Roads Network

Waterford County Council could face a substantial bill as a result of massive damage to the county roads network caused by the rain of recent weeks, Monday's meeting in Dungarvan was told.

The adverse weather conditions have wreaked havoc on some stretches of the already crumbling county roads, and a report will be furnished to the next meeting on the financial implications of the damage.

Several members highlighted areas where serious damage had occurred, and Cllr. Jackie Fahey warned that the damage to one stretch of road in the Ballymacarby area could be as much as £100,000.

Cllr. Kieran O'Ryan urged that they seek an immediate meeting with the Minister for the Environment to try and secure badly needed funding to tackle what are now "massive problems" relating to their county roads.

"In my area of Ballymacarby several stretches of county roads have caved in under the pummelling they've taken from the incessant rain of recent week," said Cllr. O'Ryan. "There are areas around Ballymacarby where people were housebound, unable to leave their homes to get to work because of the torrential rain and the damage it caused."

Cllr. O'Ryan said they must make a strong case for funding to the Minister, and he warned that if the bad weather continues they are going to have the gravest of problems with their county roads.

"There are parts of the county where the roads have been devastated in the last few weeks", he added.

Cllr. Jackie Fahey said the money will have to be found "from somewhere", while Cllr. John Carey told of a road at Brownstown in the eastern end of the county that had been completely

washed away last Friday. Cllr. Dan Cowman also referred to serious flood damage in Tramore at the weekend.

The Chairman, Cllr. Con Casey, said the Council's outdoor staff and fire brigade personnel had done tremendous work in coping with a very serious county-wide situation last weekend. He believed the damage that had been highlighted at the meeting is probably only the tip of the iceberg and he asked that a detailed report be prepared for their next meeting.

Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer, agreed that the damage caused to the county roads last weekend was extensive. The damage to one stretch of the Dungarvan-Clonmel road alone could cost anything from £50,000 to £100,000.

Mr. O'Flynn undertook to prepare a detailed report on the damage for presentation to the next meeting — and the cost implications.

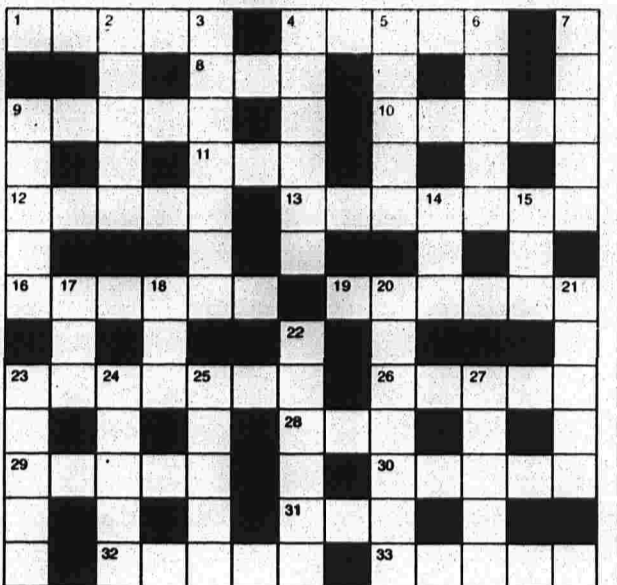

Golden Pages Dublin Marathon

BRAVE BRÍD'S A CHAMP

40 year old Bríd Murphy from Cork is one of Ireland's top women over the marathon distance. Reigning national champion after finishing third overall and the first Irish woman in Dublin last October, she is at her peak, still setting personal bests and winning races at an age when most elite runners would long since have retired. Bríd won the Dungarvan 10k ladies race in 1992 and is a regular competitor at Waterford races.

Bríd Murphy

Bríd didn't come into the sport by a conventional route. Her first marathon — in fact only her second race of any length — was the 1987 Dublin Marathon, which she finished in a creditable but unspectacular 3 hrs. 47 mins — not bad for a beginner. Her motivation was, as it is for many first timers, charity fundraising.

Bríd was raising money for the Irish Sudden Infant Death Association which researches cot death. She had lost a baby herself and had only taken up running in an attempt to shake off the depression she had suffered from. It worked brilliantly and it brought her into contact with other people. Her physical and mental improvements went together. Until she began running seriously she had no idea that she had talent, so that was another plus.

In 1988 Bríd broke the 3-hour barrier, clocking 2 hrs. 58 mins. The following year she improved by eight minutes and in 1990 again at the Dublin Marathon, she was timed at 2 hrs. 48 mins. Further improvement came in 1991 and Bríd recorded her all-time best of 2 hrs. 44 mins. 7 secs. in Dublin last year. When preparing for a marathon, Bríd can clock up to 100 miles per week while her children are at school. Bríd lives in Mallow with her husband and three children aged 15, 13 and 8.

Down Hurlers Return To Walsh Park For Opening Of National League

Important Games Listed For Other Venues

Following our abysmal record in the second half of the 1992/93 hurling league and our first round Munster championship defeat by Kerry, hurling supporters all over the county will look with unusual interest to this first round meeting with the Ulster team, Down, at Walsh Park on Sunday.

Two years ago when the counties met for their first time in an inter-county game, Waterford took the two points after a rare battle with the Ulster county who had their share of accomplished hurlers. Both counties were playing in Div. 2 at the time. We won by 2-11 to 2-4 but the reports of the game told readers of their Monday morning papers that the home side were flattered by the seven points winning margin.

It would be difficult to judge their relative standards to-day, but it is a pretty safe bet that Down have at least, kept pace with any improvement we might now show. They have played some splendid hurling in the championships of the Northern province and were unlucky to lose to Antrim in the Ulster final this year.

It is a new and welcome experience for Down to have graduated to Div. 1 on the National League and being listed with the eight top teams in the competition. In fact it is almost amusing to find them a step above the All-Ireland champions, Kilkenny, who are down in Div. II this year. They are certain to make a very strong bid to get themselves off on a winning note and will travel down more than a little confident that they are good enough to beat a side who lost to Kerry in the championship this year.

No fewer than five of their team have been selected to play with Ulster in the Railway Cup and that game last

Saturday will help to keep them tuned up for their match with us.

The recently published hurling panel shows that nine of the All-Ireland under 21 team and a sprinkling of last year's minor team are being absorbed into the group who are currently in training. Johnnie Brenner is one of a couple of surprise omissions.

On Saturday last, Waterford were due to play a trial match against Kerry with a view to getting themselves organised for the league, unfortunately this fell through, so the selectors are faced with a problem.

This is a very important match for us as we need to restore our injured pride after the Kerry defeat. Another such defeat would further wound our pride and prestige and would leave us with a mountain to climb to hold our membership of Div. 1 as the other six counties in our division are more highly rated and may be more difficult to beat.

Waterford must beat Down, and if we don't we will be forced to acknowledge that our hurling future is facing serious problems.

The men available to us are players well capable of playing a high standard of hurling and they are players with a lot of experience. Playing to their potential as a unit, they should be well capable of beating Down, regardless of the fact that they are an up and coming county.

The visiting side will include M. Coulter, John O'Connor, who was their top scorer in the Ulster final against Antrim at Casement Park last July, N. McGrath, Paddy Megeean and Jim Crawford, etc.

Waterford selectors are likely to do a little bit of experimentation, it being their first game of the new league season, but whatever the

placings, they are likely to rely on many of the old guard for this one. This will see Jimmy Beresford, Stephen Frampton, Billy O'Sullivan, Damien Byrne, Liam O'Connor, John Meany, Brian Green, Tony Browne, Paraic Fanning, Paul Prendergast, Sean Daly, Pat Walsh and Tom Fives in action. This will leave them with a good back-up group of under 21 and minor substitutes as readymade replacements should the occasion demand change.

We look forward with interest to the publication of the team and with hope to the game, which, with some luck will get us back on a winning trail at the end of a disappointing year in hurling.

PUBLICATION OF TEAMS

Now that the league has begun, let us hope that the selectors in both football and hurling will find it possible to have teams selected in good time for publication in the weekly papers. The players and the public are entitled to expect this to be done.

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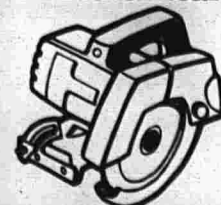
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Urban Council Condemns Vandalism

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Official Go Ahead For Davitt's Quay Development

What has been described as "one of the most exciting developments ever" in Dungarvan, was given the official go ahead at Monday night's meeting of the Urban Council.

A local company, Harbour Developments Ltd., plans to convert former warehousing and grain stores, the property of the Urban Council, on the seafront at Davitt's Quay into a major complex of upmarket apartments.

Under the agreement approved at this week's meeting, the Urban Council will now dispose of the near derelict properties - free of charge - to Harbour Developments Ltd. who in turn will totally renovate and refurbish them and provide 600 square feet of prime groundfloor accommodation, rent free, to the U.D.C.
