## Urban Council Condemns Vandalism

A spate of late night incidents in Dungarvan over recent months, which have been strongly commented upon at sittings of the local Court by the District Judge, also commanded the serious concern of the members of Dungarvan Urban Council at last Monday night's meeting.

An accusing finger as a major contributory cause of the trouble was pointed at two fast food shops in the centre of the town by Cllr. Austin Hallahan who claimed that they are operating while in blatant breach of the conditions under which their respective businesses were granted planning permission.

"One only has to read the newspapers in recent weeks, and the comments of the District Court Judge, to know of the level of vandalism and blackguardism to which our town is being subjected at weekends," Cllr. Hallahan said.

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## Official Go Ahead For Davitt's Quay Development

What has been described as "one of the most exciting developments ever" in Dungarvan, was given the official go ahead at Monday night's meeting of the Urban Council.

A local company, Harbour Developments Ltd., plans to convert former warehousing and grain stores, the property of the Urban Council, on the seafront at Davitt's Quay into a major complex of upmarket apartments.

Under the agreement approved at this week's meeting, the Urban Council will now dispose of the near derelict properties - free of charge - to Harbour Developments Ltd. who in turn will totally renovate and refurbish them and provide 600 square feet of prime groundfloor accommodation, rent free, to the U.D.C.

## PLEA FOR LOW INCOME FARMS

The two main farming organisations and the dairy co-operatives have been accused of turning their backs on the plight of small dairy farmers who are at the bottom of the milk league and badly in need of financial resurrection. The accusation had been levelled by the President of the United Farmers Association, Mr. Paddy Phelan, who called yesterday on the Minister for Rural Development, Mr. Liam Hyland, to make future Leader funding available to enable low income dairy farmers purchase milk quotas. Mr. Paddy Phelan said a recent survey carried out in Clare has pinpointed the need for urgent action to counteract what he describes as "the unfair operation of the milk quota system since its introduction a decade ago. Most small dairy farmers have made little or no progress in acquiring essential quotas, while large operators who already have more than adequate quota are able to use their cheque books to purchase any quota that becomes available," said Mr. Phelan. The U.F.A. President said that the milk quotas that would be vital for the survival of many small farms had been taken and consolidated into holdings that

were already well above the valid level. At the other end of the spectrum, said Mr. Phelan large numbers were pushed out of milk production by a well orchestrated co-op campaign to tidy up milk collection. The U.F.A. President said the Leader funding used to keep small dairy farmers on the land

would be money well spent and would show an immediate and ongoing return by keeping families gainfully employed, self sufficient and off the dole. Other long term beneficial effects would be the retention of jobs which are dependant on a stable, vibrant, rural population and a crucial slowing down of the flight from the land, Mr. Phelan added.

# New Augustinian Bishop



Father Senan Louis O'Donnell, O.S.A., who has been the Apostolic Administrator of the Diocese of Maiduguri, Northern Nigeria, has been appointed Bishop of the Diocese by His Holiness, Pope John Paul II. His two brothers are also Augustinians, Father Benignus in St. Augustine's

College, Abbeyside and Father Columba in Good Counsel College, New Ross.

Father Senan was born in Scattery Island, Co. Clare in 1927. His father was the lighthouse keeper there at that time. With the advent of modern technology the lighthouse is now automated, and the 188 acre island is for all practical purposes deserted. The island had a rich historical and ecclesiastical heritage with a fine round tower and the remains of 7 churches. It is being developed as a tourist centre at the present time.

The O'Donnell family were stationed at several

lighthouses around the coast, and ended up in Duncannon, Co. Wexford, where Father Senan did his primary schooling. Subsequently he went to Good Counsel College, New Ross, for this secondary education, to U.C.D. for his B.A., to the Gregorian University in Rome for his Theology Degree and to U.C.G. for his higher diploma in education.

He taught in the old St. Augustine's College, Dungarvan, for five years and then went as an Augustinian Missioner to Nigeria where he has spent over 30 years. We wish him well in his new post.

# New Tourist Complex For Ardmore

Ardmore's deserved reputation as one of the leading — and most popular — holiday resorts in the country, will be further enhanced next year with the provision of a new tourist complex on the beachside that will cost in the region of £50,000.

Details of the plans were unveiled at a press conference in the village presided over by the Chairman of the Ardmore Enterprise Co-op, Mr. Richard Lincoln.

The new facilities, which will include a tourist office, a beach guard observation office, and public toilets, will be located at the car park adjacent to what is one of the finest, and safest, beaches in the country.

The venture is a unique tripartite partnership involving the local Enterprise Co-op, Waterford County Council and the West Waterford Development Partnership Ltd. The main funding is being provided by the Enterprise Co-op and the County Council with the West Waterford Development Partnership providing grant assistance as well as important professional expertise.

A model of the proposed complex was on display at the press conference. Designed by Dungarvan architect Damien Dillon, it is uniquely circular in shape, the first of its kind in the country. It will, however, be a huge addition to the tourist facilities already available in the resort.

"It is indeed an unusual building, but also a very exciting one," Richard Lincoln said. "It is another significant achievement by Ard-

more Enterprise Co-op which had operated a local tourist office in the village for the past three years."

Mr. Lincoln disclosed that more recently, with grant assistance from the National Heritage Council and the Dept. of the Environment, the Co-op had re-thatched one of the oldest houses in Ardmore — Straw Cottage. Angling signposting had also been erected with the assistance of the Central Fisheries Board.

"Under the leadership of the Enterprise Co-op, the resort continues to be vigorously marketed with the production of quality colour

brochures and our attendance at trade and holiday fairs," Mr. Lincoln said.

The Co-op, he went on, had also played an important role in the setting up of the Ardmore Growers Co-op, and is now endeavouring to initiate something similar for the local fishermen.

"It is only through self-help initiatives such as these that small local communities, like Ardmore, can hope to survive and create jobs," Mr. Lincoln added.

Presenting a cheque for £10,000 to Acting Waterford County Manager, Mr. Brian J. McNally, towards the overall cost of the new tourist complex, Mr. Lincoln revealed that work on its construction will commence next February and will be "up and running" in

time for the commencement of the 1994 tourist season.

## LAUDED EFFORTS

Mr. McNally lauded the tremendous efforts of Ardmore Enterprise Co-op and pledged that Waterford County Council will not be found wanting in its support for any worthwhile projects.

Mr. James Taaffe of the West Waterford Development Partnership Ltd., said groups such as the Enterprise Co-op are deserving of all and every practical support that can be given.

Also present were Mr. Maurice McHugh, Waterford County Development Officer, John Moloney, Vice-Chairman, Ardmore Enterprise Co-op, Matt Power, Treasurer, Committee members Donal O'Brien, Dick Power and John Hurley, and Waterford County Council members Paddy Kenneally, Austin Flynn, Richard A. Walsh and Lar Hart.

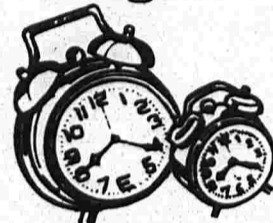

## New Houses For Senior Citizens

At the Urban District Council meeting last Monday night, the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley informed the Council that he had acquired half an acre of land at Rices street, Youghal Road, on which he proposed to build 8 two-bedroomed houses, hopefully in 1994.

The housing development will be mainly for senior citizens as it is securely situated beside the Garda station and within close proximity of the church and town.

The cost of the land was £16,000, £2,000 per site, which Mr. Hurley deemed "very modest".

The Estimates meeting of the Dungarvan Urban District Council was agreed to be held on November 29.

## Time To Mend Your Fences



Fence mending is a favourite expression used by beleaguered politicians and executives — it's not so popular with gardeners. But is the job is to be as painless as possible then October is the time to tackle it.

The weather is inclined to be neither too hot to work nor cold enough to put you off, and repairs and treatments now will save damage in the winter to come. You may be lucky and find just a few loose boards needing nails — preferably galvanised, against rust — but don't hammer back rotten or split boards as they quickly get worse.

Replace rotten base or gravel boards with new ones saturated in preservative, making sure that they are securely fastened to adjoining fence posts.

Posts, of course, are the key parts of the fence structure and a rotten one is the worst horror to find during inspection.

If it has already started breaking away at the base then you risk losing part of the fence during winter storms. It is a horrible job breaking out the concrete base and lifting the old stump, although it is the surest way of repair.

If you go to such trouble then:

- make sure the hole for the new post setting is at least 18 inches deep for a six foot high fence;
- really saturate the replacement post in preservative before you position it — that should keep rot and replacement at bay for some years;
- pack the bottom and surround the post with firmly packed hardcore before binding with a rich mix of concrete.
- top the post with a wooden or metal cap, or cut it at an angle — this prevents water settling and starting rot.

Alternatively, you can remove the post stump and drive a fence spike into the same location before fitting the existing fence.

You should then apply preservative to new sections and the whole fence if you haven't done so for a couple of years.

Creosote is a powerful and cheap preservative, still preferred by many people, but it is toxic to nearby plants and must never be used on trellises.

Application needs care in warm weather when fumes carry further, but never work with it during rainy weather as this affects the finish and preserving power. Alternative 'green' preservatives are available and usually allow easy cleaning of brushes and yourself, but often at premium prices.

You can also investigate ranch or porous paints which withstand the flexing and water penetration experienced by fences and garden structures such as greenhouses and sheds.

Even garden metalwork such as gates can also be better cared for nowadays, thanks to 'hammered' finish paints now available.

But before applying any new garden finish, brush away algae, rust, dust and mud.

# Dungarvan Gaming Premises Has Licence Revoked

Dungarvan's only gaming premises, the Amusement Arcade, Grattan Square, has had its licence revoked, and a District Court Judge has ordered the forfeiture of thirty five gaming machines with a value estimated at between £30,000 and £40,000.

The order was made by Judge Michael Pattwell at last Wednesday's sitting of Dungarvan District Court and follows three garda inspections of the premises in the space of a week last April.

John Doyle, proprietor

and licensee of the Amusement Arcade, was convicted of offences brought under the 1965 Gaming and Lottery Act.

During a lengthy hearing there was evidence of garda inspections of the premises on April 6, 7 and 12 this year. The court was told that a number of the machines permitted stakes in excess of the permissible legal amount and also permitted the payment of winnings above the amount allowable under the Gaming Act.

Sergeant Tom O'Grady, who was involved in all three inspections, said he seized a total of thirty five gaming machines on the premises on April 12.

At the conclusion of the prosecution case, defence solicitor Ms. Maeve Breen asked for a direction on all the charges preferred against Doyle. She also made a number of legal submissions in support of her application which was, however, refused by Judge Pattwell.

Doyle was convicted of opening a premises for the purpose of unlawful gaming on the three dates in April and was fined £100 in re-

spect of each offence. A charge of promoting and providing facilities for unlawful gaming on the same occasions was marked "taken into consideration."

### STRUCK OUT

Other charges brought against the defendant were struck out.

In addition to the fines totalling £300, Judge Pattwell revoked the gaming licence in respect of the premises and made an order for the forfeiture of the thirty five machines.

Recognisances were fixed in the event of an appeal.

Inspector Michael Blake prosecuted.

## AMERICAN TRIP

One of the greatest attractions in Colorado is the United States Airforce Academy, which is situated a few miles north of Colorado's second city, Colorado Springs. The Academy lies in a striking setting, at the base of the Rampart Range, just a short distance from Pikes Peak and is Colorado's leading attraction, open to visitors the whole year round. The Academy prepares young men and women cadets to become Professional Officers in the US Air Force. A military environment is constantly present, even in the classroom and of course they march to lunch.

The academy grounds contain 143 acres of athletic fields, a multi-million dollar field house, a 52,153 seat football stadium and 27 men's and women's teams which compete in 18 inter-collegiate sports.

One of the outstanding sights of the area is the Academy Cadet Chapel. This unique three-tier building, containing three chapels — Jewish on the lower level, then Catholic and Protestant, is a national landmark with its 17 gleaming aluminium

spires soaring 150 feet skywards. The Protestant Chapel seats over 1,200 and has a 100-seat choir. The Catholic Chapel, located at terrace level, seats 500. The altar area of the Catholic Chapel is strikingly beautiful. The table top altar of polished marble is mounted on a cone-shaped pedestal. On both sides of the altar is an abstract mural of glass mosaic, superimposed on which are two marble figures. On the left is "Our Lady of the Skies" and on the right is the Guardian Angel. Above and between the two figures and outlined by a brilliant background is a marble dome, symbolic of the Holy Ghost. Overlooking the altar is a 46 ft. high aluminium cross.

"Pikes Peak or Bust" was the cry of the gold prospectors as they headed west to find their fortunes in the mountains of Colorado. Only a few found riches but all found a land of contrasting beauty and healthful climate. This led to the birth of Colorado Springs. The town was laid out in 1871 by Gen. W.

J. Palmer and was first named Fountain Colony because of its location on Fountain Creek, but was later renamed for the many mineral springs in the vicinity.

Following the gold strikes in the Cripple Creek area, Colorado Springs became the wealthiest city per capita in the US. Situated about 60 miles south of Denver at a junction of several State and Interstate Highways; with an altitude of over 6,000 ft., it can now be truly called "The City of Sunshine" with its invigorating climate, big shopping centres and over 1700 of street parking. Colorado Springs is rapidly becoming the chief health resort of Colorado.

The State Capitol, Denver, is one of the best planned cities in the US. Situated at the foot of the Rockies, on the western edge of the Great Plains, it has become an emporium of all the historical and chronological events of the mighty mountains and the fertile valleys.

The innumerable museums ranging from the Buffalo Bill Memorial Museum, honouring Buffalo Bill Cody, giving a panoramic view of Denver from the grave site to the Molly Brown Museum, displaying the Victorian home of the "Unsinkable" Molly Brown, heroine of the Titanic disaster.

Denver City itself is an international crossroads, being the gateway to the far West, just as Chicago is the gateway between the east coast and the mid-west. Stapleton International Airport is about the sixth busiest in the US. Perhaps I should have said, "was," as a new international airport is nearing completion and is expected to be opened this fall. Another sign of the development of the city is when the Lions International Convention was held there in 1988, the main centre of the Convention was Currihan Hall, a perfectly ample and well appointed convention centre. At the Convention the

Denver Municipal Authorities advertised that they were going to build a new and bigger convention centre, and that they would be looking for the Lions International Convention before the end of the century. Well, the new centre is built and was dedicated at the end of 1991. I hope that they will get the Convention, although it will be very near the end of the century as the locations have been chosen for the next four or five years.

One of the greatest attractions of Denver is the 16th Street Shopping Mall. It is unique, as instead of being housed in one or a small number of buildings, it is the entire street. 16th Street is 1 mile and 1/8 long, is pedestrianised, with the exception of an electrically operated bus system. The Centre of the street is laid out with furniture — chairs, benches, tables, shrubs and flowers. The buses circulate continuously and are free. Larimar Square is situated downtown and is packed with unique shops and restaurants, and as they claim: "it's not a shopping trip, it's an historical event."

16th Street starts as Larimar Square and proceeds up town culminating in a roundabout at the city's main railway station and within 5 minutes walk of the Governor's Mansion, the State Capitol.

The Capitol, situate at the junction of Broadway and Cobfox, is modelled on the US Capitol in Washington. The building features a gold-plated dome, beautiful apartments and a panoramic view of Denver and the Rockies. Incidentally, the 15th step on the west side is exactly one mile high. This gives the city its second name "The Mile High City" and of course Denver's main football stadium is appropriately named "Mile High Stadium." I could go on, but the time has come to move on. My next stop, America's second city, Chicago.

### PORK AND BEEF BRAID

#### Ingredients:

- 12 oz (375g) short pastry
- 6 oz (175g) minced beef
- 6 oz (175g) pork sausage-meat
- 1 small onion, finely chopped
- 1 tbs (15ml) tomato ketchup
- 3 tbs (45ml) breadcrumbs
- 1 beef stock cube
- 1 egg, lightly beaten

#### Method:

Roll pastry into rectangle about 30x23cm (12x9ins). Place on baking sheet. Heat meat in saucepan, stirring well until light brown. Drain excess fat. Turn into a bowl and add onion, ketchup, crumbs and crumbled cube. Reserve 2 tbs (30ml) egg



and mix remainder well into meat. Season.

Arrange filling in line about 7.5cm (3ins) wide down centre of pastry, to within 5cm (2ins) of ends. Cut corners from pastry, make series of diagonal cuts down each side to within 2.5cm (1in) of filling. Pull ends over, then braid side strips. Glaze with remaining egg. Bake at 425°F., 220°C, gas mark 7 for 45 mins, until golden brown

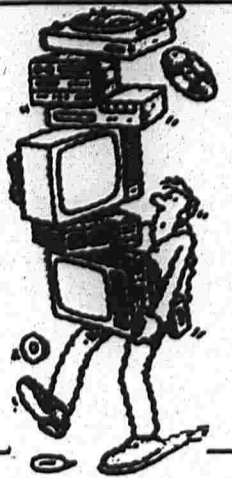

# Inquest On Dungarvan Man Open And Adjourned

Because criminal proceedings have been instituted, an inquest into the death of a young married man who died from injuries sustained in an incident in the early hours of last Christmas morning, was opened and adjourned before Dr. D. F. Cantillon, West Waterford coroner, at Dungarvan Courthouse last Thursday.

The inquest, one of five to be held before Dr. Cantillon, was on 27 year old Matthew Monahan, an unemployed labourer, of 36 Congress Villas, Dungarvan.

After formal evidence of identification of the body was given by the dead man's brother, Billy Monahan jnr., Inspector Michael Blake asked that the inquest be adjourned at that stage.

Inspector Blake confirmed that criminal proceedings have been instituted arising from Monahan's death, and his application that the inquest be adjourned until after these had been disposed of was acceded to by the coroner.

**HEAD-ON COLLISION**  
An inquest on a 60 year old retired Garda Sergeant,

Daniel Lucey, Mweelnahorna, Ring, Dungarvan, who was fatally injured in a two-car crash at Shandon, Dungarvan, on September 21, was told he had sustained multiple injuries in the head-on collision.

Garda John Nugent said that the deceased, a native of Tarelton, Kilmichael, Co. Cork, who had only retired from the Garda Síochána two months earlier, was pronounced dead at the scene as he was placed in an ambulance.

Dr. Maurice Murphy, who carried out the post mortem examination, said the cause of death in his opinion was multiple traumatic injuries including multiple fractures of the ribs.

The jury unanimously returned a verdict in accordance with the medical evidence.

**DROWNING VERDICT**  
Dr. Cantillon sat without a jury at the inquest into the death of Michael Connors, an 80 year old retired labourer, 17 Parks Road, Lismore, whose fully clothed body was found near Camphire Bridge on the river Blackwater on September 4.

Dr. Robert Tate gave evidence of performing the post mortem examination,

and the coroner recorded a verdict in accordance with the pathologist's evidence that death was due to drowning.

### VERDICTS RETURNED

Also sitting without a jury, Dr. Cantillon returned verdicts in accordance with the medical evidence in the inquests of 59 year old farm labourer John O'Brien, Ballinameela, Cappagh, who was found dead in the driving seat of a car on July 7 last, and Patrick Scanlon (48), Coolowen, Glencairn, Ballyduff, who was found in an outhouse on his farm on the evening of June 21.

Medical evidence was given by Dr. Maurice Murphy who carried out both post mortems, and Dr. Cantillon returned verdicts that O'Brien had died from carbon monoxide poisoning, and that Scanlan had died from asphyxia.

At the conclusion of each inquest Dr. Cantillon on his own behalf, and Inspector Blake on behalf of the gardai, extended sympathy to the bereaved families.

Mr. Gerry McCullagh solr., representing the wife and family of the late Daniel Lucey, returned thanks on their behalf for the expressions of sympathy.

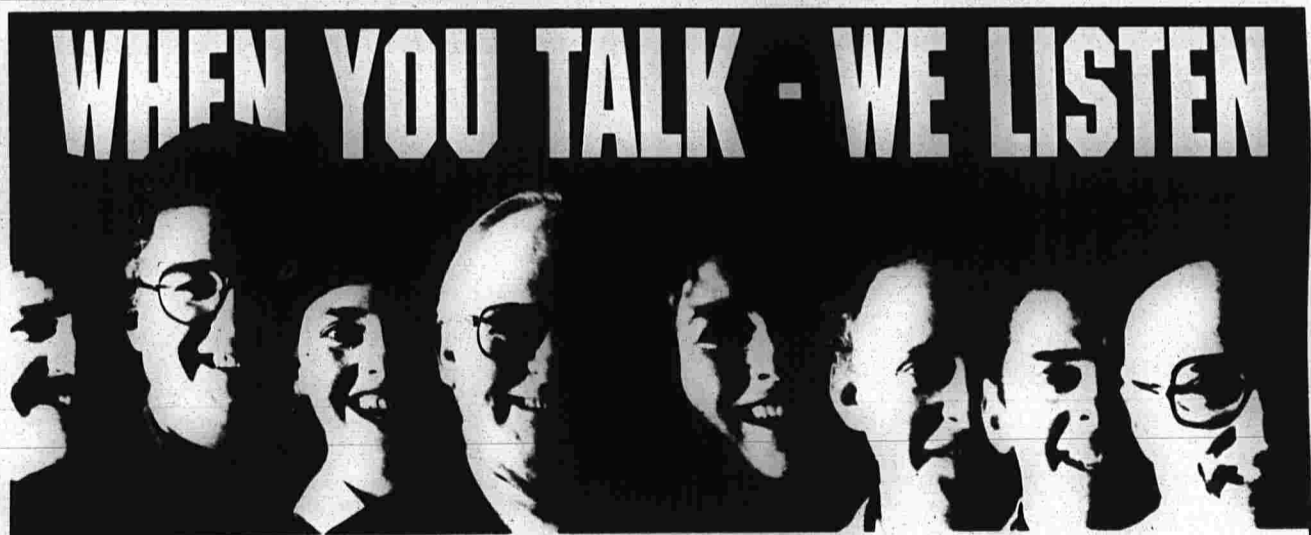

# Official Go Ahead For Davitt's Quay Development

for a period of twenty five years.

However, while the general consensus among the councillors was that the "deal" is a good one from the U.D.C.'s point of view, the chairman, Cllr. Tony Wright scathingly attacked it.

At the outset the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, said that if they do not dispose of the property to the local company the Council will have to spend as much as £26,000 on putting on a new roof.

Mr. Hurley said the developers plan to start phase one of the development within a month, and his belief is that the proposed deal represents excellent value for the Council.

He warned, however, that there can be no delay on the part of the company proceeding with the development. If it is not started within a specified time the property reverts to the Urban Council.

"Discussions are also taking place with other interested developers for the other remaining property at Davitt's Quay", Mr. Hurley disclosed. "I have no hesitation, meanwhile, in recommending the proposed deal with Harbour Developments Ltd. to the Council", he added.

Proposing that they approve of the proposed agreement, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan said it will bring about a massive transformation of Davitt's Quay where there is so much dereliction at present.

Seconding, Cllr. Mary Dixon said the quay area is in urgent need of the facelift this proposed development will give it.

### 'POOR DEAL'

Cllr. Wright, however, said he believed the U.D.C. is getting a very poor deal. They had already invested £50,000 on the ground involved, and if they put the properties and the sites on the market they would fetch a lot of money.

"If we renovated them ourselves and sold them what would we get for them" the chairman went on. "What happens after twenty five years when our fine property will be gone from us. I do not believe we should sell off our prime assets to speculators".

The Manager said the decision taken by the members will be immaterial to him. He has tried to do a good commercial deal for the Council and he believes he had done just that. He said that in rent alone over the 25 years the Council would get at least £75,000 for the office accommodation the company will be handing over to them.

With Cllr. Wright alone dissenting, it was agreed to dispose of the properties under the terms outlined by the County Manager.

P.S. It is understood that the developers interested in other property at Davitt's Quay also have in mind the development of modern apartments and possibly the provision of a Travel Lodge type hotel.

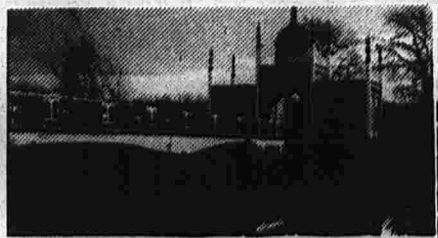

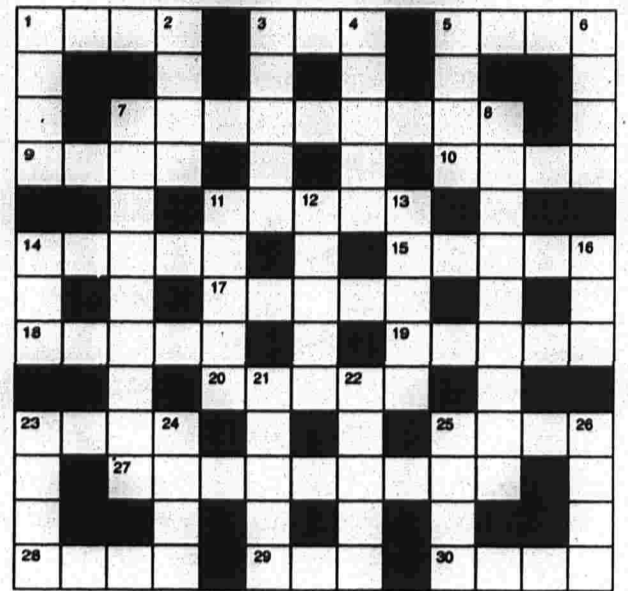

# The Power Of Darkness

Once dubbed in the Dail as "the fellow who writes the dirty books," John McGahern has come a long way. His controversial literary and human nature meant that in the sixties his books were banned and he lost his job as a teacher. Now he is regarded as one of Ireland's literary gems his work culminating in his multiple award winning novel "Amongst Women." His work has always attracted controversy because of his brutal and honest dealing with sexual repression and family politics in a bleak rural landscape.

The "Power of Darkness" is McGahern's first stage play and is a tightly-plotted melodrama about the workings of envy, avarice and lust upon a group surrounding a dying horse-farmer, one of the old breed who never spent a penny on comforts. The Sunday Press had this to say about its Abbey Premiere some two years ago: "City sophisticates may find the plot highly improbable but

county people will recognise it as being deeply rooted in a way of life that has a good few kicks left in it yet. It's a roller-coaster of evil in which the women are damned but the men have some hope of redemption." McGahern writes of a world where sexual ignorance turns men and women into adversaries and exploiters and where the irrational fear of famine turns into manic greed.

The cast is a true and tried bunch ranging geographically from Lismore, Cork, Tallow and Ballyduff and names like Moynihan, Canning, Ahern, Murphy, Heneghan and McDonnell have long graces the Ballyduff and indeed Munster amateur stages. Gay Byrne described the Abbey production as "one of the finest night's theatre I've ever seen." You can rest assured that the Ballyduff one won't be bad either. 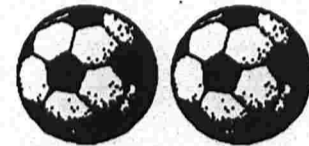

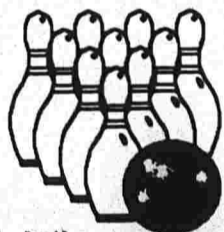

# John Treacy Seeks 2nd Marathon Success

The 14th Annual Dublin Marathon takes place this Bank Holiday Monday with the early starting time of 10 a.m. from outside the General Post Office in O'Connell Street. The fact that Golden Pages Ltd. are sponsoring this year's event and the recent announcement that Olympic silver medalist John Treacy will be among the competitors, has added considerable interest and hopefully from a Waterford point of view we will be witnessing the county's first winner of this race shortly after 12 noon on Monday.

From eleven marathon starts the Villierstown athlete has one victory under this belt, it being the Los Angeles event in 1992. The fact that he had entered this race ensures us that at this stage of his career he is anxious to win a marathon on home ground and he should be the recipient of massive Irish support over this fast and flat two lap course.

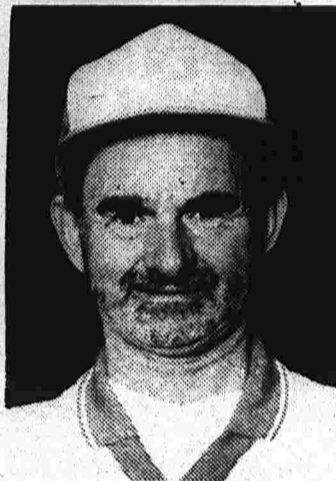

### SUPERB PERFORMANCE BY JOHN TREACY

# All-Ireland Title For Ring Runner

On a mild windless December day the All-Ireland Cross Country Championships U-11, U-13 and U-15 Boys and Girls were held at Muine Beag, Co. Carlow, on Sunday last. It was ideal cross country weather, a dream day for mid winter. Small wonder that the spectators were treated to some wonderful races — none more spectacular than the U-15 boys race. Here John Treacy, St. Nicholas, Ring, the Munster champion, was Waterford's main hope of a medal and he did not disappoint.

Moving easily with that long loping stride, John was soon out in front and by the half way stage had turned the race into a procession. This was an absolutely superb performance by young

Treacy, a runner in the Delaney class. He has the same lean and hungry look, the ideal build for a miler. In addition he has the determination, the class performance and the sportsmanship to make the grade in really top-

class company. Certainly standards in juvenile athletics, particularly in middle distance, improve yearly and to pulverise the pick of Ireland as Treacy did last Sunday marks him out as a rare find for Waterford.

**TO YOUNG ATHLETES** — "Devotion is definitely the word. You must believe and you must want so bad that you are willing to sacrifice everything."

# Waterford Lucky To Escape Defeat

Waterford hurlers can count themselves lucky to have escaped defeat by the narrowest of margins when coming from behind in the 60th minute to equalise and win a share of the league points in this mediocre first round game played before a crowd of about 1,000 at sunny Walsh Park on Sunday last.

This was a game that we most certainly should have won, but didn't because of a very weak attack that found it almost impossible to penetrate the solid Down defence.

Throughout the game they got a generous supply of the ball from out of our defence which played good hurling throughout and our midfield with Tom Fives and Tony Browne in good form, but

they failed to make any impression on the Down defence and did not succeed in scoring from play until the 3rd minute of the second half.

Over the hour we got no clear shots at goal and only on one occasion did visiting goalkeeper Noel Keith have to save a ball that looked like going all the way to the net. The entire attack scored only two points from play during the match, and this, by any standards, is very poor.

Down fielded without five of their regular team which is selected from their only three senior hurling teams in their county. They were pleased with a draw and expect to do better as the league progresses.

## PLAY

## Players Injury Scheme

As announced at last week's County Board Meeting, a seminar will take place in Limerick on Friday night next to outline and explain all the details of the new players injury scheme which will come into effect on January 1 next year. As already announced the premium for teams will increase from £60 to £100, but the benefits as well as being increased, will extend over a 26 week period instead of the present four weeks. Also the dental benefits will increase considerably.

This will certainly be a much improved scheme and something like it is long overdue. Clubs who have to pay the additional cost are sure to feel the financial pinch, but this problem can easily be overcome by requiring club members, and particularly players, to pay a higher annual club membership fee.

## The Football Versus Hurling Stakes

One of the big talking points within the association around the county this year, has been the huge difference in the takings between football and hurling in the National Leagues. Because of the manner in which it was structured, the football league attracted bigger attendances in all four divisions and this brought the total gate receipts to an all-time record total of £919,228, while the receipts for the hurling league totalled £423,549 (which was around normal).

The figures which were published last week saw Waterford getting £16,929 which was more than double our normal returns from the football league. We got £7,427 for the hurling league.

# Footballers Take On Limerick In National League At Leamybrien

## Dungarvan v. Gaultier In Senior Football Championship At Kilmacthomas

As well as the above matches, it is also reasonably sure that the replay of the Eastern junior hurling final between Kilmacthomas and Ferrybank, will be played at Walsh Park on Sunday and the junior football semi-final involving Seana Phobal and Kilgobinet will take place at Cappoquin. There are one or two others that might also be fitted in, but there is nothing definite on those at the time of writing.

### LIMERICK ARE FAVOURITES

Waterford footballers are without a win for quite a while and their defeat by London was a disappointing start to our new league campaign. For that game we were without several regulars because they were club tied and while no senior football games are listed for next Sunday, quite a number of the players will be in action on Saturday, but may be called upon to line out on Sunday.

Two years ago, Limerick reached the Munster final and gave a splendid account of themselves against the mighty Kingdom. Four weeks before the provincial final, Waterford ran Limerick to two points (0-11 to 0-9) in the semi-final in Fraher Field.

Earlier that year Limerick narrowly defeated us by 1-6 to 0-7 in the McGrath Cup

semi-final in Clonmel. One year earlier again, Waterford giving a great display of football, defeated the favourites, Limerick by 2-12 to 2-11 at Askeaton.

On the basis if these results, Waterford with a full side should be at least equal to the visitors, if we can play to our potential.

### NO TEAM

The football selectors have now decided to follow the example of the hurling selectors by delaying the selection and publication of their team. The hurling team to play against Down was not released until Wednesday night and was not therefore available for publication in the local papers, despite a decision by County Board that county teams would be selected early in the week and in time for announcement in the weekly papers. The football selectors named their team to play London in very good time and I commended them. Let us hope that this will not become the policy of the selectors for the remainder of the Leagues.

With a lot more players available, including Stradbally's Eoin, Conor and Fintan O'Brien, Tom Gough, Pat Walsh of the Nire and a couple at least from Rathgormack, the Waterford side is sure to show a number of changes from the team which lost to London two weeks ago. In the London game the Dungarvan full-back line of Bobby Lyons, Darrell Donnelly and Martin Sheehan played exceptionally well but as all three are on duty on Saturday it is not certain if all or any of the trio will be brought out again on the following day.

Limerick are sure to find Leamybrien a strange ground, they not having played here before, so the advantage here will be with Waterford.

Supporters will look to this as one of the league matches that we have a chance of winning and maybe with a bit of luck and an all out display from the team, we might end our losing sequence in the league.

### DUNGARVAN v. GAULTIER

This is a play-off to decide which club goes on to the quarter final against Stradbally and it is sure to attract a good crowd to the Kilmacthomas venue on Saturday afternoon.

Gaultier caused a surprise by beating the county champions at Kill in the

league section and following their splendid performance against Dunhill on last Sunday morning, they are sure to travel reasonably confident of beating the champions.

It will not be to Dungarvan's advantage that they have been without a competitive match for a while, but I understand that they are well tuned up, just the

same and fully determined not to allow Gaultier the same latitude which brought them back into the game at Kill last month. Having been beaten by Gaultier on two occasions will mean that the champions will approach this game with caution as winning, even at their best, will not be easy.

Gaultier now free of their

hurling commitments will give this one a real 'go' in an attempt to repeat their victory which they achieved at Kill last month.

### AT CAPPOQUIN

The only game likely to be played here is the Seana Phobal versus Kilgobinet junior football semi-final which was postponed because of the tragedy in the Gaeltacht two weeks ago.

# Tramore Take Co. Title

### TRAMORE 2-8 ABBEYSIDE 1-9

A goal within two minutes of the start after the Abbeyside keeper mishandled the ball which had come in high from a long kick by Niall Geary, gave Tramore a dream start to this entertaining and very well contested county final and which saw Tramore succeed after successive county final defeats by Dungarvan in the past couple of years.

Abbeyside, eight points down after 15 minutes, fought back very courageously to come within a point of the leaders by the 40th minute. In fact it was their inaccuracy in the closing stages when they shot over 6 wides in the final 13 minutes, that denied them at least a share of the spoils, which they richly deserved.

The final was played before a small crowd at Stradbally venue and was dominated by the breeze assisted Tramore in the first quarter when they led by 2-2 to nil. Their scores came from N. Geary 1-0, S. Reinl 1-0 and K. Hennessey 0-2.

Derek Hayes pointed for Abbeyside in the 15th min. and Hennessey replied with a Tramore point. Gavin Keane had two points for Abbeyside and Derek Hayes made it four while Tramore's other score was a point by N. Geary to leave it 2-4 to 0-4 at half way.

### NARROWED GAP

Abbeyside played much better in the second half and a mighty point by Derek Hayes narrowed the gap in the 32nd minute. Geary pointed for Tramore and then Derek Hayes, getting his fist to the ball, steered it to the net to leave just a goal between them. Geary for Tramore and Michael Enright for Abbeyside exchanged points and when Enright came back with another and Alan Beatty sent over from a free in the 41st min. it was 2-6 to 1-8.

The Western champions were clearly on top at this stage but were unable to capitalise on their dominance, sending out a succession of wides. Points by

Geary and John Murphy gave the Eastern team a three points lead in the 47th min. and while the final ten minutes belonged to Abbeyside they failed to get the scores that their efforts deserved. A final point by Alan Beatty ended the scoring to give Tramore the hard earned title after two previous failures in '91 and '92.

The game was evenly contested in the first half with the Eastern team having missed many more chances than the Nire. At the break the Nire led by 0-6 to 0-4 and the scene seemed set for a thrilling second half.

Within half a minute of the resumption, Pat Walsh had the ball in the Saviours net and this was followed by a Kevin Mulcahy point which left the eventual winners six points clear.

Some minutes later Paul Thompson was dismissed from the game and this left Saviours one down. Ten minutes later two more were sent to the line when Tom Flynn, Nire and Albert Healy, Saviours, received marching orders. Within another five minutes Tony Corcoran was sent off and Saviours were reduced to eleven players after the dismissal of Derek Healy only a minute before full time.

With such a numerical imbalance, St. Saviours did remarkably well to stay within five points of the winners who were certainly not impressive.

I feel that if we had played them here at home, even with the same team, we would likely have won. It is now past and there is little point in dwelling on the subject as nothing will restore the lost league points.

As I have written the occasion was an historic one and was treated as such by the gaelers over there. Although the attendance was small, considering that three very

important games were listed, including the London senior hurling final between Sean Tracey's and Thomas McCurtain's, the crowd were enthusiastic about the whole affair and gave a good reception to Waterford who were out on the field for more than fifteen minutes before the London team.

The game was played in beautiful sunshine and there was a carnival atmosphere about the Ruislip grounds and quite a number of London based Waterford people were around to greet the group who travelled over.

The souvenir programme on sale was very much Waterford orientated and there were a couple of interesting articles by well informed writers on Deise matters.

There was a nice tribute to the late Mickey Morrissey who was rightly described as one of Waterford's great gaelers and his longtime friend Billy Mills who were pictured together on the programme. Interestingly, Billy Mills, who led Fenor to a county football title here in 1932 when they beat the Brickeys and who emigrated two years later and now well into his eighties, is very much a father figure in the London gaeldom and has seldom missed a Sunday at Ruislip since the war. I was more than a little surprised to learn that Billy is fully up to date with the progress of the games here at home.

To mark the auspicious occasion, County Board Chairman, Eamon Murphy, presented the London Board with an inscribed Waterford Crystal Bowl. The Vice-Chairman, who accepted the present, said that Waterford's nice gesture would be appreciated and the gift would be given a place of prominence in the Ruislip Centre where it would remain displayed.

# Divers Locate Engine

—As Search Continues

Hopes were rekindled on Tuesday night for the recovery of the bodies of missing teenage cousins, Pat Tobin and P.J. Rossiter, after the outboard engine of their 19 foot open fibre glass boat was found off Helvick Head.

Divers located the engine early on Tuesday afternoon little more than 100 metres from where the youths boat was found submerged and entangled in its own nets on October 8th.

It was earlier that same day that they left Helvick pier on their last illfated visit to the fishing grounds in Dungarvan Bay.

Yesterday - the 12th day of the search - again involved navy and garda divers together with members of the Waterford sub aqua club who have been involved throughout.

There were fewer boats out, however, as a number of the local fishermen, who have given of themselves unsparingly since news of the double tragedy broke, returned to earn a living.

"The finding of the engine gives hope that the bodies will still be recovered", one of the divers told the "Leader". They will continue with their operations for another day or two at least, but the belief is that they will be withdrawn at the week-end if the bodies still have not been found.

Meanwhile hundreds of people from all over the gaeltacht of Ring and Old Parish attended an open-air Mass at the Ring G.A.A. grounds on Monday night for the missing youths.

The celebrant was the local parish priest, An t-Athair Conchuir O Dalaigh, who praised the wonderful efforts of the entire gaeltacht community throughout the last week and a half.

plementing the conditions attached to the planning permissions granted to the two fast food outlets at Grattan Square, Cllr. Hallahan accused them of being in blatant breach of the Planning Act.

He expressed the view that the late night opening of fast food shops generally is contributing to the "goings on" in Dungarvan at weekends and, while he did

not want to deny anyone the right to make a living, consideration must also be given to the people who cannot get a proper night's sleep because of the disturbances.

Cllr. Hallahan said if the fast food outlets he was referring to adhered strictly to all the conditions attached to their planning permission most of the concerns and worries would be eliminated and that in turn would not make for the very damaging publicity the town has been getting.

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan, however, said if there were not late night discos there would be no late night "chippers", but the Chairman, Cllr. Tony Wright, pointed out that meals are supposed to be served at discos for which bar extensions have been granted.

"If these meals were being served the patrons would not have a need to go to the chippers afterwards", he said.

**SMALL MINORITY**  
 Cllr. Paddy Power said it is only a small minority who are causing the problems for the vast majority. If there was a strong Garda presence around the town late at night on weekends, there wouldn't be all the trouble there has been.

Finally, on the suggestion of County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, it was agreed to seek a report from their legal adviser on Cllr. Hallahan's motion and to consider it in depth at the next meeting.

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
