Community Mourns As Drowning Victim Laid To Rest

There were poignant scenes in the Ring Gaeltacht last Monday afternoon when 16 year old Pat Tobin of Baile na nGall, one of the two victims of the drowning tragedy of October 8 which has devastated the close-knit local community, was laid to rest in the new cemetery.

Life came to a veritable standstill throughout the parish as people from every walk of life turned out to pay their final respects to a teenager who was such a tremendous favourite with them.

Requiem Mass was celebrated at noon in a parish church that was full to overflowing, and the subsequent funeral cortege to the nearby new cemetery was one of the biggest and most representative.

Hopes Of New Vocational School For Dungarvan

Hopes that Dungarvan will finally get a new vocational school, which was "knocked" several years ago by the Dept. of Education, have been revived, members of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee heard at last week's meeting.

Although no commitments of any kind have yet been given by the Dept., a strong and impressive case has been prepared by a special Liaison Group for presentation to the Dept. in the coming weeks.

The chief executive officer, Mr. Kieran Heffernan, told yesterday's meeting that a very comprehensive report had been prepared which highlights the need for a new school in Dungarvan to replace the existing Technical College.

He disclosed that a senior officer from the Dept. also visited the Technical College on October 12th and he has now submitted a report to the Dept.'s Planning Unit which will actively review the situation in Dungarvan.

"Something must be done to provide proper facilities, and we are hopeful of a satisfactory outcome from the

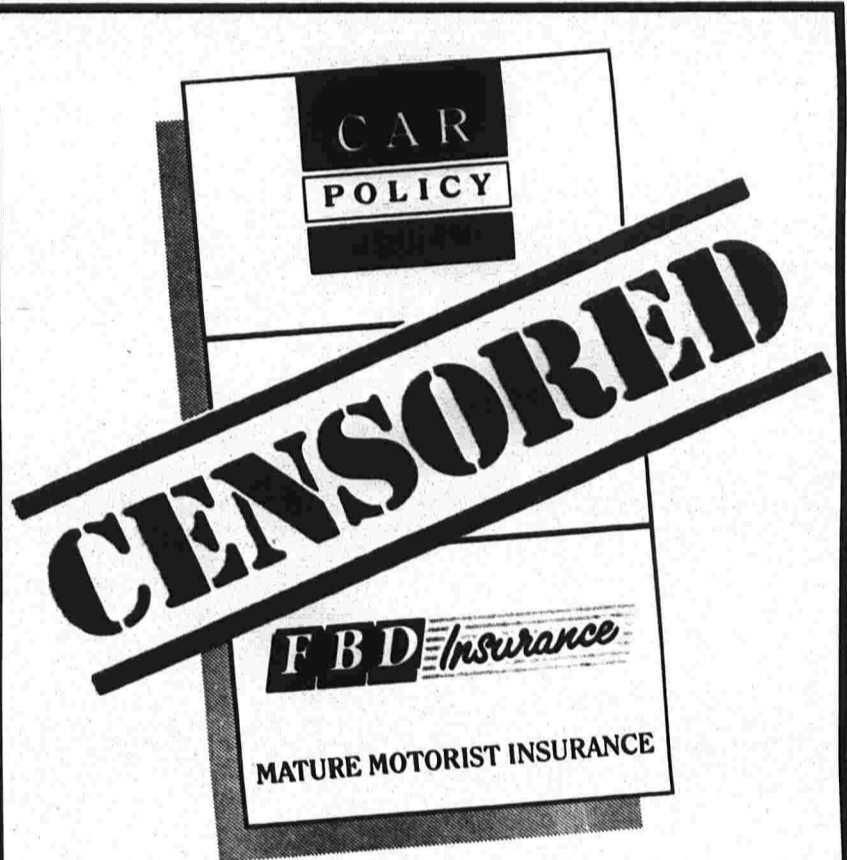
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"REMEMBERING OTHER DAYS"

Dungarvan Tidy Towns Report

The 1993 report on Dungarvan by the Tidy Town's adjudicators was described as "one of the best ever" by Bertie White, Town Clerk at last week's Urban Council Meeting.

With a total of 174 marks, Dungarvan improved its 1992 performance by 6 marks. The following are the adjudicators comments, 1992 marks in brackets:

Effort (31) 32 — It was most encouraging to see further improvements carried out in Dungarvan since last year. There is clearly an active committee hard at work achieving back up assistance from much of the community and indeed local authority. Any members of the community who do not share this enthusiasm and commitment must be encouraged to alter their ways by pointing out the advantage of a clean and well presented town. It is appreciated that it is difficult to achieve a consistent standard throughout a large town, but nonetheless it is worth striving for. Your detailed submission, particularly the map, accompanying the completed questionnaire was most helpful during adjudication.

Tidiness (26) 27 — It was encouraging to note the overall improvement in the level of tidiness and cleanliness. It is indeed commendable that the UDC has reduced the number of derelict sites significantly since 1990. It is suggested that now you should make a list of all untidy yards, laneways, forecourts and small incidental open spaces which are not what they might be. For instance, there was a most untidy yard very conspicuous at the Clashmore junction on the by-pass. Also a laneway at one end of Lawlor's Hotel detracted from otherwise good presentation here.

(Incidentally, this laneway would simply not have been seen if there were a solid gate across it.) In other areas there were building materials, pallets, etc., which seemed abandoned. Billboards such as just off O'Connell Street tend to detract from the town centre being quite out of scale with the building on which they are placed and the streetscape in general. Graffiti was to be seen on the boundary wall running along behind the former swings near the Sports Centre. Quite unusually litter seemed most concentrated in residential areas. It would seem therefore that perhaps an educational programme should be launched to deal with the problem.

Presentation Of Buildings (29) 30 — The standard of street frontages is slowly improving and especially commended are those premises owners who have invested in fresh paint since last year. Nonetheless there was numerous shabby and drab coloured buildings such as on St. Mary's Street which would benefit from an uplift. It is suggested that a shopfronts competition might be held to accelerate the process of the removal of outdated plastic signs. Without delay any superfluous projecting signs ought to be removed, also gaudy window stickers which often detract from subtle and sensitive timber and shopfront detailing. The improvement of derelict sites has already been referred to and is particularly commended along the quays. The mill conversion is excellent. Joseph Kelly and Ben O'Neill are to be congratulated on their restoration work. The salvaging of two cannons from the armaments of Dungarvan Castle was an excellent idea; they look very well outside the library! Indeed most public/community buildings such as churches and

schools are obviously well cared for.

Presentation Of Natural Amenities (32) 33 — The main amenity areas within the town looked well. Causeway Park is a laudable development of what could have been a wasteland area. The 'Lookout' area along by the sea/riverside is a good amenity and well presented. Green areas were well maintained and with attention to details such as trimming edges around trees, etc. contribute much to the ambience of the town. The car park on the other side of the river near Abbeyside was neat although there were a few building materials left at one end. The Sports Centre area could have been better maintained and most certainly the swings ought to be restored. The paving and planting at Grattan Square enlivens greatly the town centre. The 'Welcome to Dungarvan; display with box hedging on the Waterford approach created a good impression. The screening of the County Council Yard on the by-pass is effective; hopefully other yards might now be similarly treated. All those people responsible for the maintenance and indeed planting of new flowers shrubs and trees about the town are to be praised.

Appearance Of Approach Roads (32) 33 — The standard of the approach roads was again somewhat inconsistent although some of the sections referred to last year had been upgraded. The Rosslare approach with its 'Welcome' display looked very well. Verges along the Clonmel approach were well cut. The Tramore approach had reasonable grass verges, improving greatly towards the town. The stone wall along by the sea would look much better if grass were removed from it. A disused garage on the Cork approach

was a negative element. The excellent landscaping of the IDA estate area contributed greatly. Indeed it was good to see the grass verges along the minor approaches also cut. The by-pass is beginning to mature well with fine trees and well maintained grass margins. The Waterford Co-op entrance looked very well but some other areas could be screened to the standard of the County Council yard. Weed control was generally good except for a few unfortunate outbreaks such as at the base of the posts and chains across the road from Causeway Park. Rusty posts detracted a little from the quayside area, also some rusty signpoles, some poor bins and old street name signs at various locations throughout the town. Nonetheless many items of street furniture were well presented.

Presentation Of Residential Areas (18) 19 — Bright paint has been used quite effectively on many of the street houses but those drab tend to detract from them. Most of the estates were well presented; many residents display a keen interest in the presentation of their property, especially gardens. Lios Mor Avenue looked well but long grass around the trees was unfortunate. Sea Park had excellent green areas, also Byrneville as well as many others. The green areas in Childers Estate had been generally cut on a regular basis but it is suggested that a tree planting programme be carried out here. Some older residential areas such as on Wolfe Tone Road suffered from drab walls. The elegant houses opposite the cinema were admired. The U.D.C. is to be commended for the refurbishment of 61 houses in Cathal Brugha Place.

Congratulations on another significant increase in marks.

Lismore Writer Wins 'Irish Woman Of The Month' Award

One of Ireland's leading travel writers has been voted Harveys/Sunday Independent 'Irish Woman of the Month' for cycling 3,000 miles across Central Africa to research her new book.

In a Sunday Independent readers' telephone poll, sixty-two year old Dervla Murphy of Lismore, Co. Waterford, beat a strong team which included well known fashion figure Elaine Doody, writer Rose Doyle, Chairman of the Irish Writers Centre Eilis Dillon, - in recognition of her amazing travels by bicycle for her latest release 'The Ukimwi Road'.

At the age of 14, Dervla left school to look after her mother, but she continued her education by reading widely and cycling in Europe. After her mother's death, she fulfilled her lifelong ambition to cycle from Ireland to India, where she worked with Tibetan refugees. On her return to Ireland, she wrote her first two books 'Full Tilt: Ireland to India with a Bicycle', and 'The Waiting Land: A Spell in Nepal'.

Dervla's next trip was to Ethiopia recounted in 'In Ethiopia with a Mule'. In 1973, she headed off to Coorg in southern India with her five year old daughter Rachel. A year later they trekked through Karakoram, walked 1300 miles through the Peru-

vian Andes with a pack mule and endured a disaster-prone journey through Madagascar.

The resulting books were 'On a Shoestring to Coorg', 'Eight Feet in the Andes' and 'Muddling through in Madagascar'.

Home for Dervla in between travels is Lismore where she owns a 17th Century house.

SPECIAL PROJECTS GRANTS AWARDED BY V.E.C.

A grand sum of £4,200 has been allocated this year for Special Projects Grants by the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee at their meeting last Monday week.

There was a total of seven applicants this year but due to the demand exceeding the supply, five beneficiaries were approved.

Both the Dungarvan Brass and Reel Band and Youth 2000, a youth organisation which promotes alcohol-free discos, are to receive £1,500 each. £528 will go to the Family Support Group, £372 to the Dungarvan G.A.A. club and £300 will go to the Wheelchair Association.

sentative ever seen in the Gaeltacht.

People wept openly and unashamedly as the coffin was lowered into its final resting place. The poignancy of the scenes will be remembered for a very long time to come.

Members of the Ring and Gaeltacht G.A.A. Clubs, together with representatives of the local fishing community, formed a guard of honour in a fitting final tribute to one of the most outstanding present-day G.A.A. prospects in the county.

The number seven jerseys which Pat had worn with such distinction with Ring and An Gaeltacht rested gently on the coffin as it made its short and final journey to the new parish cemetery.

On the previous night the Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, Most Rev. Dr.

William Lee, was chief celebrant of Concelebrated Mass in Ring Church which was unable to accommodate the vast numbers in attendance.

The cortege stretched for more than a mile as it wended its way along the five-mile route from Dungarvan to Ring. Again the coffin carried the club colours of the Ring and Gaeltacht clubs, and on arrival at Ring Church members of the local G.A.A. and fishing interests joined in forming a guard of honour.

Pat is survived by his parents, Patrick and Nora Tobin, his brother Michael, sister Sonya, grandfathers, grandmother, uncles, aunts and many other relatives.

FOUND

The first breakthrough in the search for the missing

youths came last Thursday afternoon when a Helvick-based trawler saw the body of Pat Tobin in the sea off Helvick as it returned from the fishing grounds.

The body was more than a mile from where the youths open fibre glass fishing boat had been found submerged and entangled in its own nets on the afternoon of the double tragedy.

It was taken to Waterford Regional Hospital where a post mortem examination was carried out on Friday morning. An inquest will be held at a later date.

CALLED OFF

Meanwhile, and not unexpectedly, the Garda and Navy diving teams which have fincombed Dungarvan Bay for two weeks following the double tragedy, were officially withdrawn

last Saturday evening.

Despite their best efforts they failed to locate the second body, that of Pat Tobin's 15 year old first cousin P. J. Rossiter, although the local community had pledged to continue the search "for as long as it takes."

There were also very emotive scenes in the Gaeltacht as the Navy and Garda sub aqua teams prepared to take their departure.

Sgt. Thomas Lavery, on behalf of the garda divers, presented an engraved plaque to the local community which was accepted by Noirn de Bhial. He referred to their search as the most intensive they had ever undertaken, involving as it did twenty eight divers during the fortnight.

Sgt. Lavery also expressed the heartfelt admiration and appreciation of all his mem-

bers of the caring way they had been looked after during that time by the local people.

On behalf of the naval diving team, Mr. Philip Gray presented one of his own framed hand painted pictures to the local community together with twenty four print copies to the people who had manned the rescue co-ordination centre in Helvick for the duration of the search.

Supt. Ray McAndrew spoke on behalf of the gardai in the Dungarvan district, while Nioclás Óg MacCraith responded and pledged that the Gaeltacht community would forever be indebted to the navy and garda diving teams for their tremendous efforts to recover the bodies.

He promised that the local community will continue the search for P. J. Rossiter's body so that it can be buried side by side with his cousin, neighbour, and best pal.

Call On Department To Abolish Exam Fees

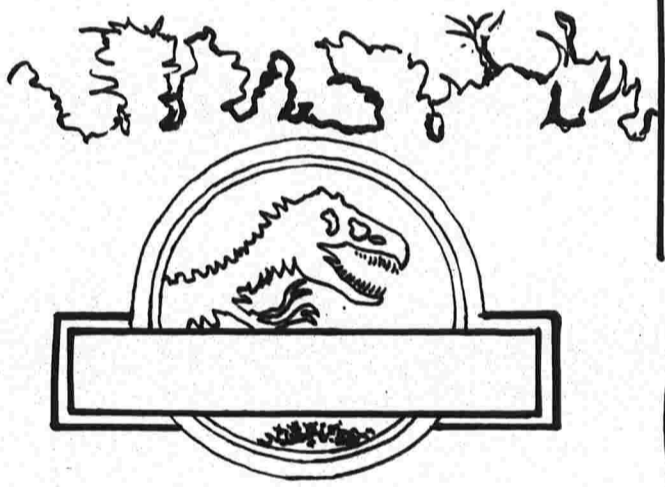
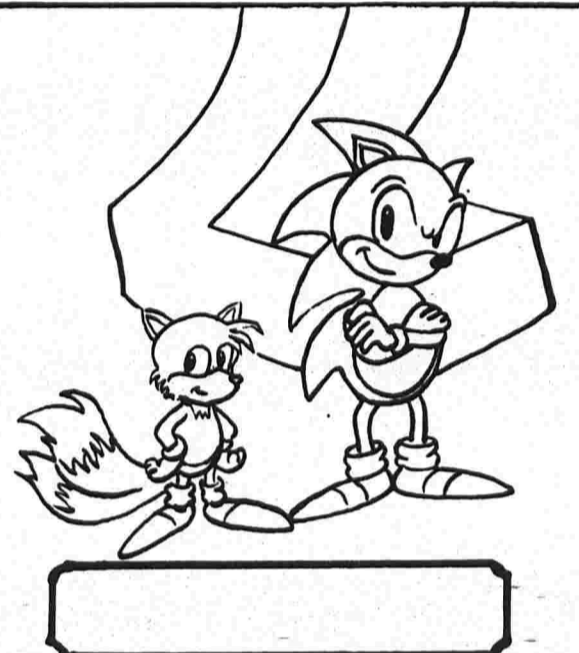
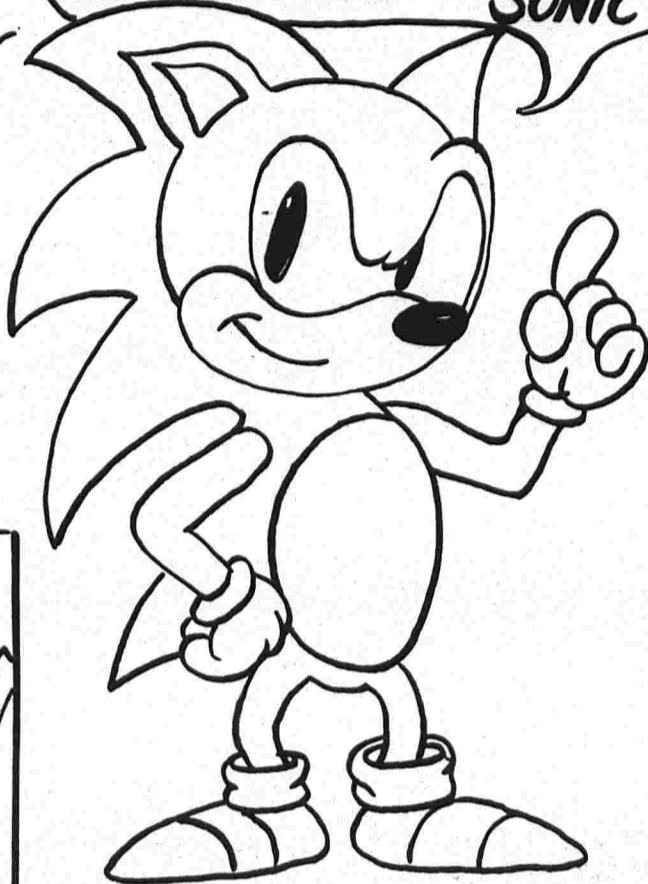
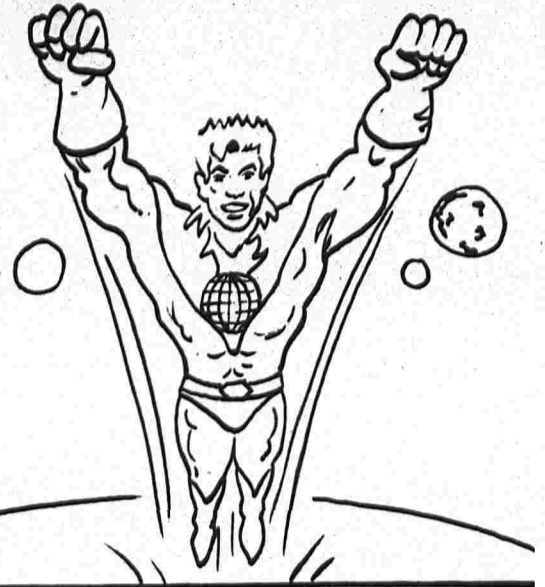
The high cost of examination fees was strongly condemned at last week's meeting of the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee. Cllr. Nora Flynn said "it is a scandal," that tax-paying parents should have to "fork out hefty sums" for examination fees while there is no tax free allowance available in return.

The cost of repeating the leaving certificate examination alone is £120, which Cllr. Flynn described as "an even bigger disgrace."

The decision was made by the Committee to write to the Department of Education asking that examination fees be abolished.



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Apple and pear trees need a hard prune

The last of the leaves falling from fruit trees marks the season for pruning and planting the trees.

Apples and pears need ruthless pruning or you risk having sparse and spindly fruit next year. Main shoots should be cut by up to half last season's growth and lesser ones by even more.

Aim for a well-spaced tree shape while cutting away inner branches, which are unlikely to fruit.

Criss-crossing branches are also a waste of time and encourage wounds and infection. For the same reason be bold in cutting away canker and dead wood.

Nooks and crannies which remain will be seized by pests and diseases trying to ride out the winter, so spray trees with tar oil before the end of December — don't forget to cover up, protect your eyes and avoid windy days when spraying.

After cutting and pruning, always paint exposed sap wood to reduce infection and speed healing — bark grows quickly over most pruning wounds.

Up to the end of the year is also a good time to plant fruit trees and shrubs.

March is the real limit but you reduce the risk to your spending and labours by planting earlier so that the new stock establishes well.

Unless you know exactly what variety you want, go to a large garden centre or nursery where the stock and its characteristics are well labelled and usually selected for garden use — commercial types may be too big.

Some dwarf varieties can be trained into

fans or espaliers against walls and fences, while others are available without branches — literally, easy-picking. Beware saplings with weeds or moss on their soil or appearing too pot bound. Plant carefully:

- dig out just a bit more than the depth of the root ball and ensure that the base of the hole is broken up for good drainage.
- fork in some compost or manure.
- place the tree in the hole and fill and level with extracted soil and compost/manure in equal parts, so that the trunk is at the same level as it stood in the nursery's pot.
- tread down firmly.
- secure free-standing trees with a stake driven into the ground at 45 degrees and bind together with a wide plastic or rope tie to reduce cutting into the bark. The trees needs this support to resist the winter winds.
- trees or shrubs being trained should be supported from the start.
- water thoroughly if the soil is dry.

You don't have to stick to apples and pears. Mild weather lovers such as peach can be grown against sunny south-east facing walls.

If space is the problem then try growing the hybrid loganberry or fussier raspberry. — ARTHUR HINES.



Dail Questions By Deputy Austin Deasy

The following are a list of Dail Questions tabled by Deputy Austin Deasy T.D. to the Minister for the Environment which were answered last week.

Question — To ask the Minister for the Environment if he will approve the plans submitted by Waterford County Council for the provision of a new Fire Station in Ardmore, Co. Waterford in view of the poor condition of the existing one.

Answer — Minister for the Environment (Mr. Michael Smith): Waterford County Council's request for approval in principle for a new fire station at Ardmore is being examined in my Department. I will be communicating with the Council in the matter as soon as possible.

Question — To ask the Minister for Environment the up to date position with regard to the proposed new Sewage Treatment works for Dungarvan, Co. Waterford.

Answer — Minister for the Environment (Mr. Michael Smith): My Department approved the brief submitted by Dungarvan Urban District Council for this scheme in September, 1992. Consultants have since been appointed to prepare a preliminary report and completion of this is expected in a matter of months.

Question — To ask the Minister for the Environment if he will approve proposals submitted by Waterford County Council for (a) the provision of an extension for Dungarvan Library and (b) two library vehicles to serve as mobile libraries, branch exchange vehicles and school delivery vans; if he will make a statement on the matter.

Answer — Minister for the Environment (Mr. Michael Smith): Detailed plans for an extension to Dungarvan branch library were received in my Department on 28 September and are being examined in con-

junction with An Chomhairle Leabharlanna. Proposals for the purchase of two library service vehicles were also received on 28 September and my Department has requested further information on these.

Eileen Proctor, Life President of the National Association of Widows in Ireland has been nominated for the Irish Laureate Women of Europe Award for 1993.

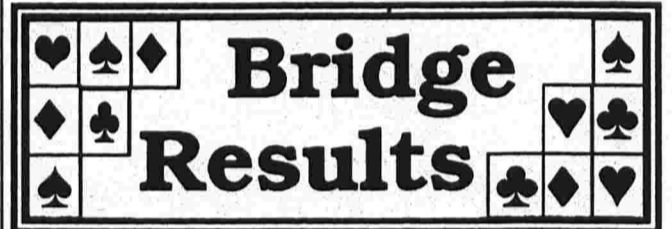
This prestigious Award highlights outstanding contributions made by women in developing European integration.

Lamb Casserole Is So Upper Crust



A topping of scones flavoured with sesame seeds, makes this lamb casserole unusual.

CRUSTY CASSEROLE

Ingredients:

- 2 lb (1kg) lamb neck chops
- seasoned flour
- 1 tbs (15ml) oil
- 1 onion, diced
- 2 tbs (30ml) brown sugar
- 2 tbs (30ml) soy sauce
- 1 chicken stock cube
- 1/2 pt (250ml) water
- 1/2 green pepper, sliced thinly
- 4 oz (100g) mushrooms
- Sesame scones**
- 1 oz (25g) butter
- 8 oz (200g) self-raising flour
- 1/2 tsp (3ml) mustard powder



- 1 tsp (5ml) salt
- 1/4 pt (125ml) milk or as required
- 1 tbs (15ml) sesame seeds

Method:

Toss chops in seasoned flour; brown in oil on both sides. Transfer to casserole dish. Add onion, sugar, soy sauce, crumbled stock cube and water. Cover and

cook at 305°F, 180°C, gas mark 4, for 1 1/4 hrs or until tender.

To make scones, cut butter into sifted flour, mustard and salt. Rub gently until mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs. Stir-in enough milk to form soft dough. Turn mixture on to floured board and knead until smooth. Cut into six

rounds.

Add green pepper, and mushrooms to casserole, and place scones on top. Glaze each with a little milk and sprinkle with sesame seeds.

Bake uncovered for a further 15-20 mins. at 400°F, 200°C, gas mark 6 until golden brown.

Serves 4-6

On Historic Third Cycle To Dublin

On Saturday, September 18 last we embarked on our third sponsored cycle from Dungarvan to Dublin. You might think that at this stage we would be very confident of the success of the cycle but nothing could be further from the truth as we were every bit as apprehensive this time round as we were on the very first occasion of the cycle.

Everyone of the cycles to-date have been special in their own right. The first cycle was undertaken by three very fit and brave men, namely Eamon O Mairtín and Stephen Curran from the Briceys and "Ghandi" O'Brien from Ballinameela. The second bunch arrived in the square at 7.10 a.m. and the whole conversation concentrated on the weather, whether it would rain, would the wind rise and be driving into the head all day. Johnny Clarke and I partnered each other last year in the car, looking after the needs of the women for the day. This year we were both on the saddle hoping we would still be in one piece when we reached Dublin. With another big cheer from supporters we hit off on the rocky road to Dublin.

I heard "Stylo" O'Riordan saying that if he got over the "Pike" hill, he'd make Dublin. We were on the Pike hill and we knew what he meant because we were still cold and hitting the biggest hill on the way to Dublin.

GOING WELL

Everyone was going well, with Aidan Power and the Skibbereen man Donal McCarthy pumping some pedals, with Eamon O Mairtín and Vincent O'Brien hot on their heels, and the rest of us were tucking in nicely at a nice pace.

Frank Murphy and his helpers were keeping a



close eye on things as the bus with our branch members and collectors passed by with great cheers of encouragement being given to the cyclists.

We met up with the women and the rest of the men about three miles this side of Waterford City and Tom "Stylo" O'Riordan looked as fresh as a new baby with Patsy Tobin cycling as if he was born on the bike. The four women, Sylvia Murray, Siobhán Cullinan, Anita McGrath and Canny Ahearne were enjoying themselves and having a bit of craic with the lads.

Our arrival in Waterford City was very special this year as the Mayor of Waterford, Martin Cullen, T.D. and Eddie Wyndberry of WLR came out to greet and meet us. I'm sure I speak for the rest of the cyclists when I say that it added greatly to the occasion to have the Mayor present and he went around to all the cyclists and wished them luck and gave us a rousing send-off over the county boundary on our way to Kilkenny, which was to be our next stop.

Eddie Wyndberry did a very good interview with "Stylo" O'Riordan and some of the Branch members and Eddie and WLR really did a great job this year in publicising our cycle and helping to make it successful.

The weather was holding well and we were now hopeful that we would be in Dublin ahead of the rain. As we pedalled our merry way to Kilkenny, Eamon O Mairtín injected a bit of pace to the proceedings and he certainly tested our stamina, but we were not

found wanting and we pulled into Kettler's Inn well ahead of schedule. Niall Parkes was smiling broadly as he left the saddle and sat down for a welcome rest. Gerry McGrath with his black rugby gear on looked pleased to be at the half way mark in one piece. Young Hogan was feeling the pinch but was determined to keep going. We were feeling well and "Stylo" O'Riordan was looking forward to arriving in Dublin. Eamon O Mairtín was within 30 miles of completing his hat-trick of cycles to Dublin.

Newlands Cross was a welcome sight for us all, as the nearer you get to the finish the more impatient you begin to get and the concentration levels begin to drop, so with the bus in front and the Garda cyclist alongside, we headed in for Dublin with the old warrior Tom "Stylo" O'Riordan leading us in with the "yellow jersey" on his back, which was presented to him by Jerry O'Brien prior to the last leg of the cycle. Alongside him was Eamon O Mairtín with a grin like a Cheshire cat on his face.

The scenes outside Wynn's Hotel had to be witnessed to be believed. A truly great reception at the end of a perfect finish.

Well we had done it again, 20 cyclists had started in Dungarvan and safely finished in Dublin. This was again a great success for the Briceys and the Branch. The feeling abroad at present is that the cycle is now a permanent fixture and will even go on to greater things.

On behalf of the Branch I would like to congratulate Tom "Stylo" O'Riordan on his marvellous achievement and also Eamon O Mairtín on completing his hat-trick. 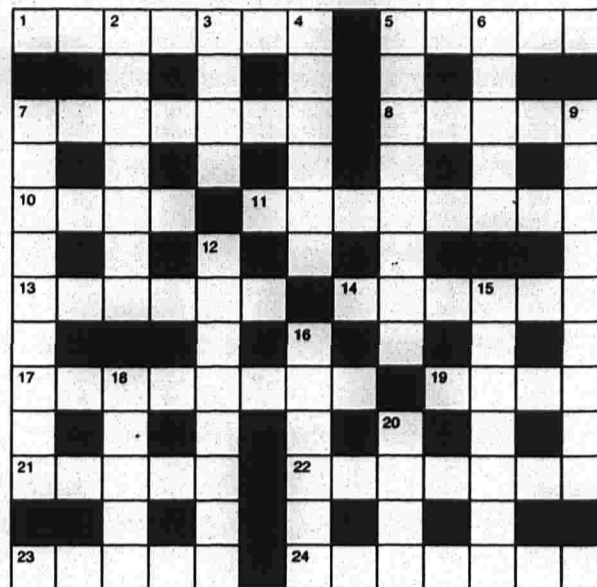

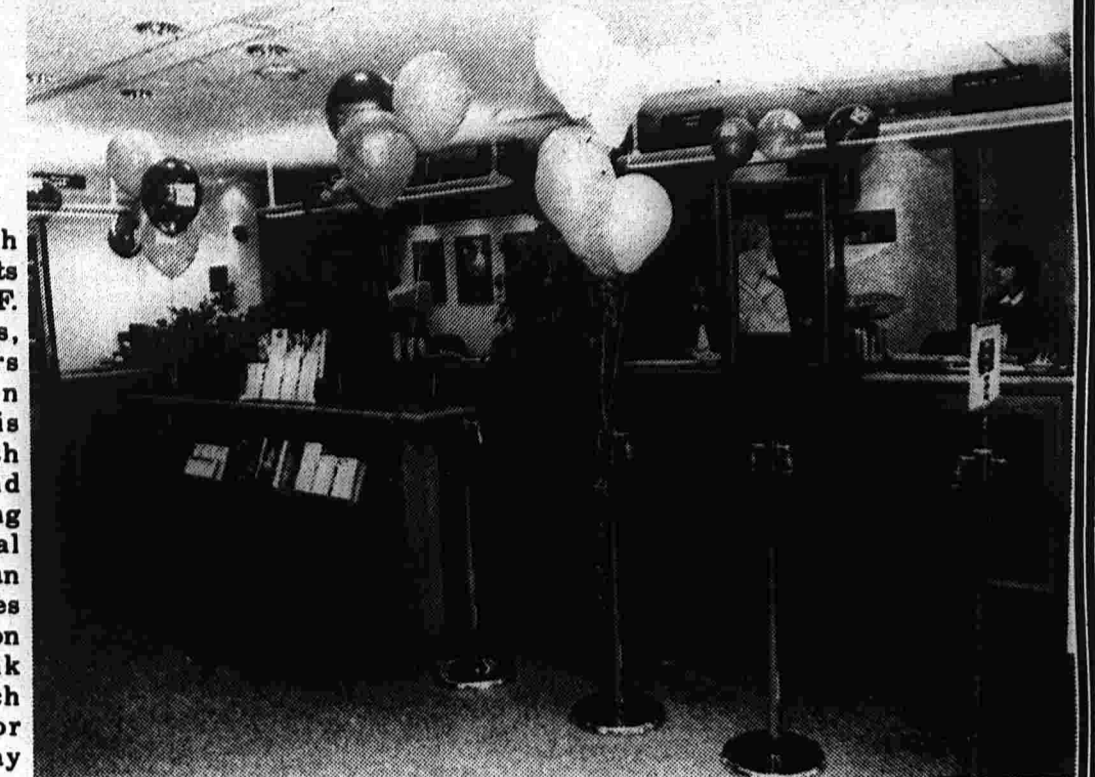

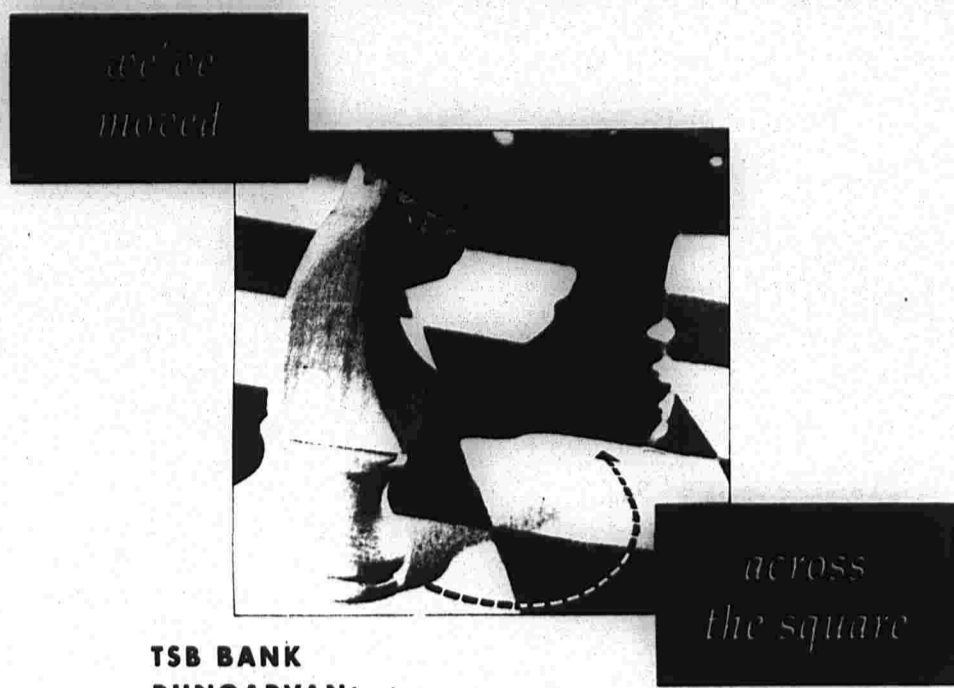

Interior view of the new Branch of T.S.B. Bank, Davitt's Quay, Dungarvan



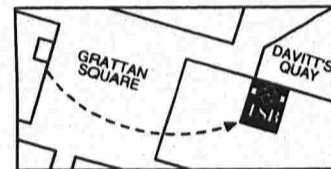

GOLDEN PAGES MARATHON

JOHN TREACY DOES THE BUSINESS

The 14th Annual Dublin City Marathon produced another first in the long and very successful career of thirty six year old distance runner John Treacy when the popular Villierstown man did the business in the Golden Pages two lap event last Monday to win his first marathon on Irish ground and his second win ever over the 26.2 miles distance.

Irish record holder Treacy who confessed to be both excited and nervous about his participation admitted that there was a ton of expectation about his performance but the former Providence College runner said that this was territory for the course

and he was ready to meet all challenges.

Once the race got under way there was a group of anything up to fifteen runners together for the first five to six miles of the race which, by Treacy's standards, was run at a very comfortable pace. An injection of speed reduced the leaders to three, Mohamed Abadina (Algeria), Noel Richardson (Limerick) and the Waterford athlete who were later rejoined by Tommy Maher (Meath), John Griffin (Tralee), Chris Penny (England) and Gerry McGrath (Dublin) as the half way pace read 67 mins 35 secs.

At 18 miles double former

winner John Griffin tested Treacy's form who indeed both met and overcame the Kerryman's challenge running two five minute miles and he went on to comfortably win the race by about four hundred metres in a time of 2 hrs. 14 mins. and 40 secs.

In a post race interview the New Balance athlete said his objective was to win and he was delighted to do so. "The crowds were great to me, especially over the last three miles and the atmosphere coming into O'Connell Street was incredible". The Olympic Silver medalist went on to say that he was involved in a good race and that from the outset he wasn't out to do anything heroic. "I was comfortable all the way and despite a small cramp over the last half mile I was in control all the way".

When quizzed about his athletic future the American based Treacy said "I will probably run two more marathons, one next spring and perhaps finish up by returning to Dublin next year. This would be a nice way to say farewell". John Treacy's victory is a great boost for athletics in Waterford and all

connected with the sport wish him continued success.

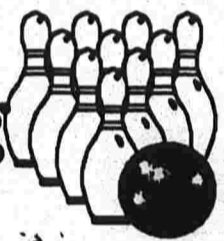
Crystal started the second half strongly and forced a number of corners which suggested an equaliser was imminent. However it was Otteran's who increased their lead with a cross shot

Gerry Cantwell Wins Thriller As Abbeyside Pip Dungarvan

In ideal weather conditions last Sunday week, the Dungarvan five miles cross country championship produced very exciting individual and team races on a day when hundreds of people took part in the area's first ever Terry Fox Run in aid of Cancer Research.

Forty seven runners lined up in front of race starter Billy Kyne, Urban Council, for the cross country race

which involved four laps of St. Augustine's College, Abbeyside. Race favourite Kieran Maher (Ring) was an absentee through illness which was unfortunate as his presence would have made a great race even greater.

Dermot Hickey, Michael Roche, Mark Radley and Gerry Cantwell soon established themselves as the leading group and they

whipped past the one mile mark at 5 mins. 30 secs. Shortly after two miles Dermot Hickey, whose performance overall was a revelation, was dropped from the leading group and a move of even greater significance occurred just before the three mile mark when Gerry Cantwell opened a gap which stretched to sixty metres at one stage.

At the bell and indeed for most of the last lap the result seemed obvious but entering the final four hundred metres, Mark Radley, the current Irish Community Games Marathon champion, eventually pulled clear of the tenacious villager Michael Roche and he unleashed a powerful sprint which brought him to within two seconds of Gerry Cantwell at the finish line.

In hindsight the winner made his move at the right moment and he opened a gap which in the end deservedly won for him the first ever Dungarvan Cross Country title. Forty runners finished the fast four lap course and as the results show it brought club athletes of all ages together in a high spirited event, one of its aims which was to promote cross country running in this area.

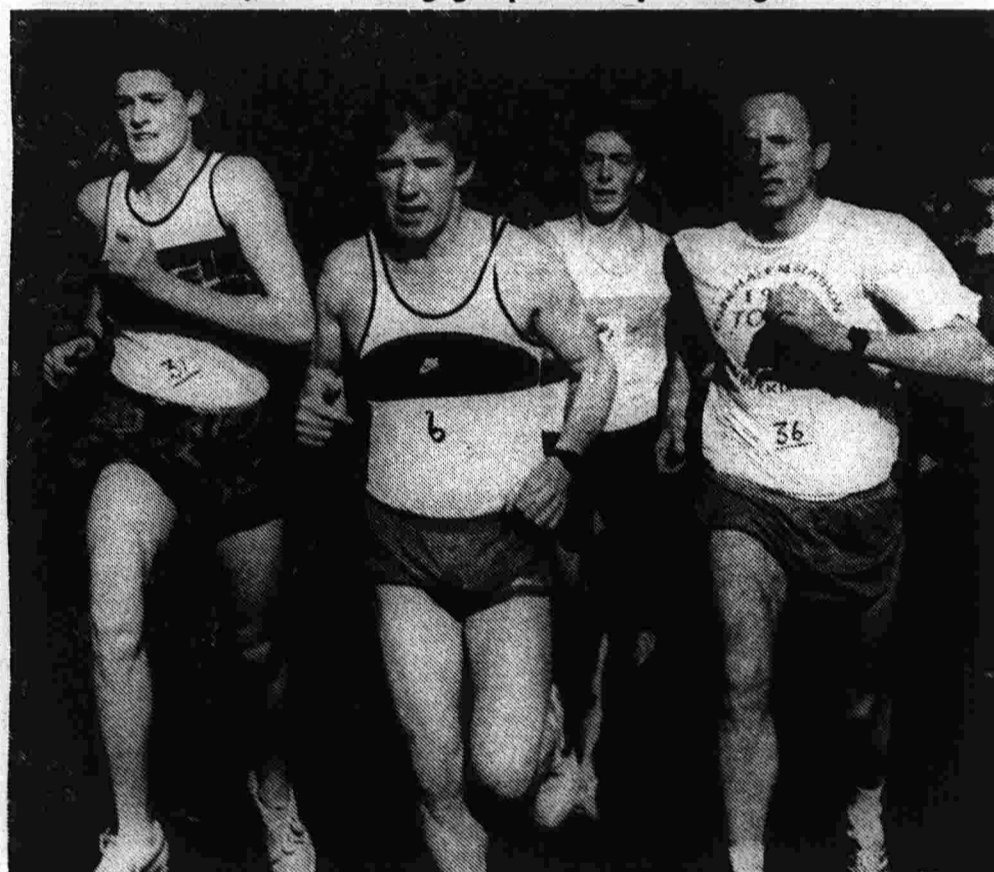


ATHLETE OF THE WEEK — Jamie Costin (Ring/Old Parish AC), who won the British U-17 Race Walking Championships in Brighton.

GAELIC FOOTBALL SKILLS

KICKING — Kicking is one of the outstanding features of Gaelic football. It is the basis on which the game is played. Therefore it is important that all players should endeavour to become experts in the art of kicking.

There are different types of kicks and each has its special use. They can all be mastered with practice and you are advised to concen-

trate at first on the more common ones, the punt and perhaps the drop kick and later on, the hook, overhead kick and first time gRound pulling with the foot.

Timing plays a very important part in all types of kicking. It is a mistake to try to kick too hard in the learning stages. Maintain balance with well-timed contact with the ball and follow through. It is important to be well balanced on the supporting foot when kicking. Where time permits, every player should practice all types of kicks with BOTH feet.

KNOW YOUR GAME

MUNSTER CLUB

Lismore v. Ballyduff

When the same teams met in the first round at Lismore on Saturday, October 26, 1991 the Waterford champions scored a surprising run-away win against the much vaunted Kerry side to the tune of 5-18 to 0-4.

That being Lismore's first ever game in the Munster club championship, elaborate arrangements were made at the venue and a 32 page programme was produced to mark the occasion. The event was an anti-climax and was well over before half-time was reached. At that point the Waterford champions were 4-7 to 0-3 in front and for the visitors, the game was up, so to speak. Lismore's 16 points half-time lead was extended to 29 points before Cork referee Joe O'Leary blew the last whistle.

On Saturday next at Lismore, the sides are due to meet again in the first round of the provincial championship and while our champions must be looked upon as favourites, it would be foolish to regard the result as a formality. Over confidence on the part of supporters and the public generally has a way of transmitting itself to the players and this is known to have had disastrous consequences on occasions before.

Three weeks ago, Ballyduff won their 18th Kerry

county senior hurling championship and according to reports they were in devastating form against neighbours, Lixnaw when winning by 2-10 to 0-8. Amazingly not one of the Ballyduff team was included on the Kerry side which beat Waterford so sensationally in the Munster championship. My enquiries on this point drew the response that Ballyduff play great hurling as a team, while as individual players they are not always deemed to be county material.

With so many splendid players like Michael and Sean Hennessey, Jimmy O'Sullivan, Liam Ross, Christy Ross, Kenneth Boyle, Noel Browne and P. J. Houlihan, etc., etc., it is difficult to understand this view.

The Waterford champions side is sure to show a positive resemblance to the team which defeated Ballyduff two years ago. Their county final team this year included 12 of the same side, so on that basis we can expect the selected team for next Saturday to include 13 or 14 of the first fifteen who lined out against Passage three weeks ago.

Declan Landers their most dependable keeper, will be the net minder again and outside him will be Mark O'Sullivan, Dave Barry and Paddy O'Donnell. In the half line of defence Brendan Crowley, centre-back Seamus Prendergast who captained the team against Ballyduff in 1991 and young Philip Hickey will complete that section of the team. Kieran O'Gorman and Brendan Prendergast who played a major role in containing the lively Passage due in the county final, will be the midfield partners and up front the Lismore team will have such players as Paul Prendergast, captain, Sean Daly (who scored 2-4 against Ballyduff in '91), Billy Lee, Brendan Lawton, Michael Hickey, Dan Shanahan, James O'Connor and company who are not likely to line out in the same positions as they all did in the county final.

Michael O'Sullivan, who was married to Onra Enright on Monday last is unlikely to be back from his honeymoon and will miss the game. Michael will no doubt be hoping to be included for the semi-final, should Lismore survive.

When Lismore and Bally-

duff met two years ago, eight of the home team scored while all 4 points for the Kerry champions were scored by John Hennessey.

Lismore club are producing a commemorative programme for the match.

Lismore should win this game and qualify for a meeting with the Limerick champions, Sixmilebridge, in two weeks time.

INTERMEDIATE FOOTBALL FINAL

All parties are agreed that this postponed Western intermediate football final between An Rinn and Ballinameela, will go ahead on Sunday next. It was postponed because of the horrible tragedy which occurred in the harbour two days before it was scheduled to take place at Cappoquin.

Shattered by the tragedy, the Gaeltacht players will find it difficult to regain their concentration and appetite for the game now, conversely, the feeling that they owe something to their young team-mate who was one of the two boys who lost their lives in the drowning accident, might prove a motivating factor in the heat of the battle.

Ballinameela impressed me very much when beating Faha at Bushy Park in the semi-final and as I wrote in my first preview of the match, I expect them to win and qualify for a meeting with Newtown in a week or two later.

JUNIOR FOOTBALL FINAL

Because of Lismore's involvement in the Munster Club game, it may be some

time before the Western junior football final is played. Lismore are also involved in the county under 21 and minor hurling county finals as well.

The second semi-final between Kilgobinet and Senan Phobal which was refixed for last Sunday was postponed.

UNDER-21 HURLING 'B' COUNTY FINAL

At Portlaw venue on Sunday, Western champions Fourmilewater will take on the Eastern champions Dunhill/Fenor, in what promises to be a splendid contest between teams who are reported to be as good as any of the teams in the 'A' grade. Both survived strong opposition in their respective divisions and a case can be made for both winning the title.

A win for the Western champions would help in compensating for the defeat of their senior hurlers following their great run in the championships.

JUNIOR HURLING FINAL OFF

Kilmacthomas who defeated Ferrybank in a thrilling replay in the Eastern final one week earlier, have invoked the bye-law which allows them two clear weeks between a divisional and county final in the adult grades. This decision was taken by the Kilmacthomas club because of a number of injuries received by players in their divisional final matches on successive weeks.

NEW ACCIDENT SCHEME

Members of the Coisde Gnotha were in Limerick on Friday evening to hear details of the new players accident scheme spelled out by the special committee which have spent the last two years planning the scheme.

As the scheme comes into operation on January 1 next year, all teams which will be participating in the coming championships must be registered with the scheme before the end of December this year. Late registration will not be accepted. As the scheme is mandatory, clubs have no option but to register and pay the £100 premium in respect of every adult team (including under 21) and £50 per team for underage.

This was seen by the big attendance at Limerick, as the biggest problem with the innovation. Many clubs will not have organised themselves by the end of December. It is now very important that clubs hold their annual general meetings in early December. It would help matters as well if the conventions were held in December. Brochures will be distributed to all clubs at the November meeting.

The Waterford team showed two changes in personnel, with Darrell Donnelly and Peter Ferncombe unavailable and being replaced by Derry Kiely and John Ferncombe. There were a number of resultant changes in the placings of the team.

Waterford arrived without the county jerseys and luckily the green and gold strip of Kilrossanty club were on hand and were worn by the team. About 400 were at the game which was very enjoyable and quite exciting at times. A number of the 30 scores which were registered were splendid efforts and were applauded

Limerick opened the scoring within ten seconds of the start with a point from corner forward, Pat Galvin. About 30 seconds later, Eoin O'Brien equalised for Waterford when he converted a free. John Quane had a 6th minute point for the visitors before Donal Fitzgibbons

and Paul Foley exchanged points. Eoin O'Brien levelled the scoring when fistling a ball over the bar and a minute afterwards Ger Walsh had Waterford in front with a 10th minute point. Shortly after this, play was held up for 5/6 minutes while the injured Timmy Cummins was being attended to and taken off on a stretcher. A period of 12 minutes elapsed without a score until Michael O'Brien's super shot to the net put the home side 4 points up. Peter Queally sent over to give us a 5 point lead, but after Donal Fitzgibbons' 23rd minute point, centre forward Sean Kelly had Limerick's first goal to bring our lead back to just one point. Dept.", Mr. Heffernan said. The Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne, complimented the special Liaison Group on

the preparation of a superb report. "There are now very positive channels of communication established to the Dept. and the progress made over the past few months in relation to school facilities in Dungarvan has been very encouraging." Cllr. Kyne added.

Meanwhile the CEO also disclosed to the meeting that there are now almost 700 students attending their two schools in Dungarvan and Kilmacthomas.

Mr. Heffernan said the enrolment figures for St. Declan's Community College in Kilmacthomas have reached a record 481 — an increase of 57 on last year. The enrolment of 127 in the first year Junior Cert is the largest ever.

The CEO said the enrolment of 316 at Dungarvan Technical College is the same as last year, but the night classes are filled to capacity with a total of 174 adults taking the various courses.

Mr. Heffernan said the adult literacy scheme organised by the VEC had 41 participants which he described as "an extraordinary" figure. The scheme is being operated by eighteen voluntary tutors.
