Second Body Recovered In Drowning Tragedy

Twenty three days after the drowning tragedy which claimed the lives of two teenaged first cousins and devastated the close-knit community in the tiny Co. Waterford Gaeltacht of Ring, the second body was recovered from the sea off Helvick Head shortly after mid-day last Sunday.

The body of 16 year old P. J. Rossiter of Baile na nGall was seen floating in the water not more than one hundred metres from where that of his first cousin, 16 year old Pat Tobin also of Baile na nGall, was found on October 21. A local fishing trawler engaged in the continuing search came on the body about half a mile from Helvick Harbour. At that very moment

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COUNTY MANAGER TO RETIRE

Although the decision was not entirely unexpected, there was considerable regret throughout Waterford last week at the official confirmation by County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, that he is to retire from office next January.

Mr. Hurley's decision was conveyed by him in a letter to the Chairman, Cllr. Con Casey, and members of the County Council in which he stated it is his belief that "the time is right to stand aside, and request the appointment of a new County Manager."

Mr. Hurley, a native of Blackpool in Cork, will have completed 13 years as Waterford County Manager on December 31, having come to Dungarvan from holding a similar position with Westmeath County

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Some natural alternative to chemicals



SOME gardeners still spend freely to dump lots of chemical fertiliser onto their soil when natural alternatives are just as effective.

The best one is garden compost. It need cost nothing and recycles most of your garden debris.

To organise production properly you need two heaps — one which is 'ripe' and ready for digging in, while the other contains new material that is still decomposing.

However, you can speed production by using a proprietary 'compost maker' and regularly watering the heap to sustain the conditions required by the bugs and bacteria which do the good work.

Adding woody material such as rose cuttings to the heap will slow things down — either bag them up for the tip or burn them and rake the ash into the soil. You should also be careful not to add weeds to the heap — the seeds tend to survive and germinate later in your beds and borders!

Of course, animal manure was the traditional friend to the gardener but is now either expensive or difficult to obtain — farmers like to keep it for their own crops.

If you find some, remember that wet material from cattle and pigs is best for light and sandy soils, while dry manure from sheep and horses is best for heavy soil.

Spread it onto soil after digging so that it can decompose further and be worked in when planting.

Mushroom compost is becoming increasingly available and popular as a compost/soil conditioner.

It is a mix of debris from cereal crops, animal manure, gypsum and lime and created specially for huge mushroom farms.

Though the farms have used it and discarded it, it remains an excellent and cheap source of humus for the gardener. Pulverised bark is another common and cost-effective soil conditioner. It's a by-product from the timber industry and can be mixed with compost to help soil drainage and conditioning during your winter digging.

However, its nutritional value is much less than its worth as a mulch on top of the soil, where it will keep weeds down and retain moisture during the growing season.

Much more nutritious is leaf mould though the disappearance of deciduous trees and replacement by evergreens has made it difficult to come by.

Evergreen material can be used but takes longer to rot down — once it has, it is good for beds raising soft fruit such as strawberries and raspberries.

If you are fortunate enough to have a few deciduous trees in the garden or access to a stand of them, you can make your own leaf compost by piling them up while wet and restraining with garden netting. Over a year, they will rot into some of the finest fertiliser you can use in the garden.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Cllr. Tony Wright On Disposal Of Property

Dear Editor,

A considerable number of people have contacted me to express their amazement and annoyance about the decision of our Urban District Council to dispose — free of charge — of its property at Davitt's Quay. Your paper reported on the debate but it did not give the complete picture. In the interests of accountability and with your permission, I wish to make the following points.

In 1990 the Council acquired this property (7,730 square feet) on the quay from Mr. John Phelan for £25,000 and also provided him with a site valued at £22,000. In addition, the Council paid the legal and other fees, bringing the total cost to over £50,000. Now, just three short years

later, my fellow councillors have voted to give away — absolutely free of charge — this fine cut-stone building and prime development site to a private consortium known as 'Harbour Development Ltd.' When developed, the company will lease back 600 square feet (only 8% of the total floor space) to the

Council to be used at its discretion for a period of twenty five years.

The councillors did not have to vote to accept this arrangement which is too cosy to be wholesome. There were many other options which would have had greater benefits for our town and its people:

1 — We could have disposed of the property on the open market with a reserve price which would have recovered the Council's initial investment and any other costs and expenses incurred since 1990.

2 — We could have developed all or part of the building ourselves and then leased all or part of it back to the private sector.

3 — We could have developed the site on a joint basis with the private sector. For example, at U.C.C. the College allowed a private company to build a student hostel on its campus, the company will own and run the hostel for twenty years and at the end of that period the property will revert to the ownership of the College authorities. Such a scheme could have operated on the Davitt's Quay site.

The decision taken by the councillors in relation to this valuable property and prime development site is the wrong one for the town, its people and the state. This is particularly so at a time when not one brown penny is available for many worthwhile, necessary projects in the urban area.

Since all the facts and all the options were not placed

before the Council prior to the vote, I, as Chairman of the U.D.C., would be willing to convene a special meeting of the Council if my fellow councillors were to give me some indication of their willingness to review and rescind this outrageous decision.

BAKE AN OPEN SANDWICH



Two or three different toppings on a length of French bread make a filling snack. It is a splendid way of making leftovers go a long way. Here are two ideas to try:

CRUNCHY CHICKEN & HAM

Ingredients:

12cm (6in) piece French bread split lengthways
2tbs (30ml) crunch peanut butter
2oz (50g) cooked chicken, chopped
1 pineapple ring, quartered
1 tomato, sliced
2oz (50g) sliced ham, cut into strips
2 large chopped spring onions
large pinch mixed herbs
2oz (50g) Cheddar cheese, grated

Method:

Spread bread with peanut butter. Top one half of each piece with chicken and pineapple. Arrange tomato

slices, onion and herbs on other half with ham strips on top. Sprinkle cheese over both toppings. Bake at 400°F, 200°C, gas mark 6 for 10 minutes until cheese has melted. Serve hot.

THREE-IN-ONE

Ingredients:

12cm (6in) piece French bread split lengthways
2tbs (30ml) tomato relish
2oz (50g) sliced ham
4 black or green olives
2oz (50g) each: mushrooms, thinly sliced
Gouda cheese, cut into strips

Method:

Spread bread with tomato relish. Arrange ham at one end, olives, tomato and mushroom slices in the centre, and salami at the other end. Top with cheese strips. Bake at 400°F, 200°C, gas mark 6 as before.

in tandem with the traders and business people of the town in purchasing a new set of Christmas lights which will serve the town for many years to come.

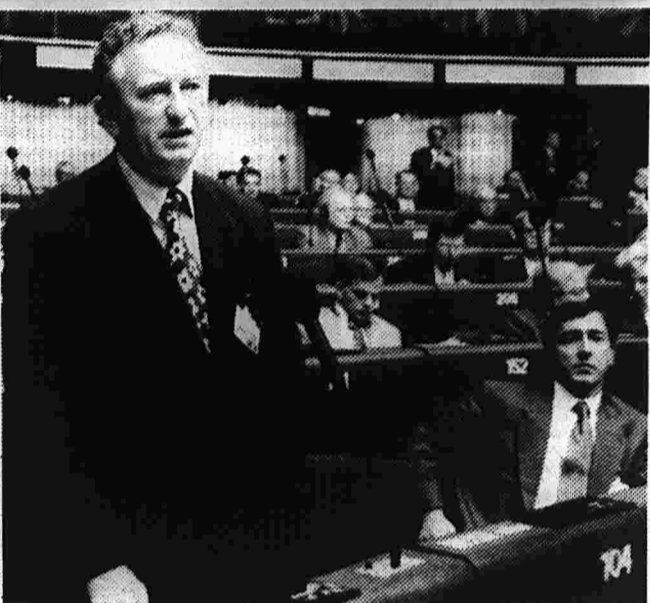
Deputy Deasy On Disadvantaged Areas

dozens of people gathered on the pier at Helvick were reciting the rosary, praying that the body would be found.

Nine days ago the navy and garda diving teams were withdrawn after one of the most intensive sea-search operations ever along the coastline. In the space of two weeks the sub aqua teams carried out almost thirty dives, each of them for a minimum one and a half hours.

However since last Saturday week locals continued the sea and coastline search. Earlier yesterday up to one hundred people took part in a search of the coast that extended as far as Ardmore Head, while the Kinsale Coast and Cliff rescue team also joined the search operation.

There was relief throughout the Gaeltacht community that the search finally ended as everyone had fer-

vently hoped it would with the recovery of the body.

"At least both families will now have a shrine to visit and pray at," one local said last night.

The body was removed to the Waterford Regional Hospital where a post mortem examination was carried out.

The dead youth is the youngest of a family of three and is son of P. J. and Eibhlis Rossiter. Like his cousin, Pat Tobin, he too was a keen Gaelic footballer and this year won divisional minor football championship honours with An Gaeltacht.

He was buried side by side this Wednesday with his best pal and fishing partner. It was the final poignant chapter in a tragic story that had its origins in that ill-fated trip by them to the fishing grounds in Dungarvan Bay on October 8.

Local Abattoirs Upgraded To Full Standards

In a recent report to Waterford County Council, the veterinary Inspector, Ms. Frances Connolly, confirmed that 2 more local abattoirs have reached full licencing standard under the Abattoirs Act of 1988.

One of the abattoirs is owned by popular Dungar-

van business people Tony and Catherine Dunphy at Kilosserra, Dungarvan, who also run their own Butcher's Shop in Abbeyside. Ms. Connolly's report acknowledged that their abattoir has been thoroughly upgraded and improved to meet the exacting standards required by the Abattoirs Act of 1988.

Ms. Connolly further commended them on their commitment in terms of time, effort and money "so as to ensure the customer gets the highest quality meat".

Also up to full licencing standard is Michael Murphy's abattoir in Cappoquin. Mr. Murphy also has his Butcher's Shop in Main Street, Cappoquin.

All Council members were unanimous in extending a united congratulations to those involved.

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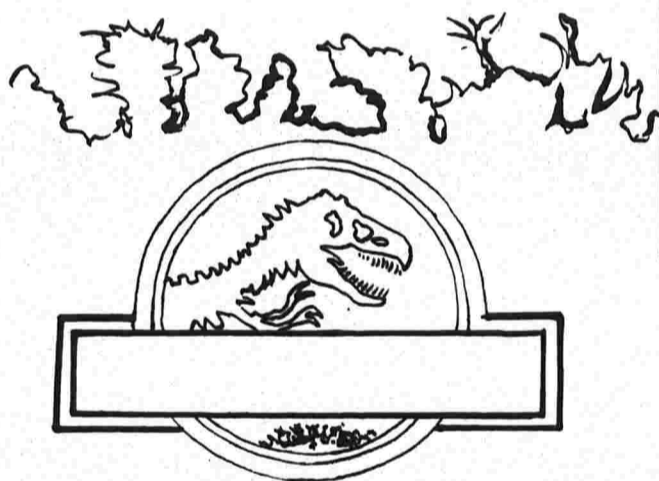
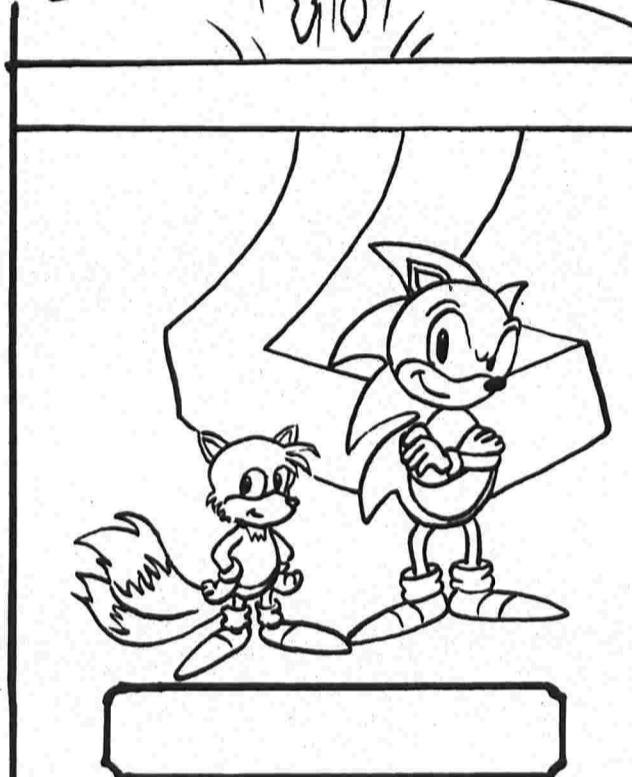
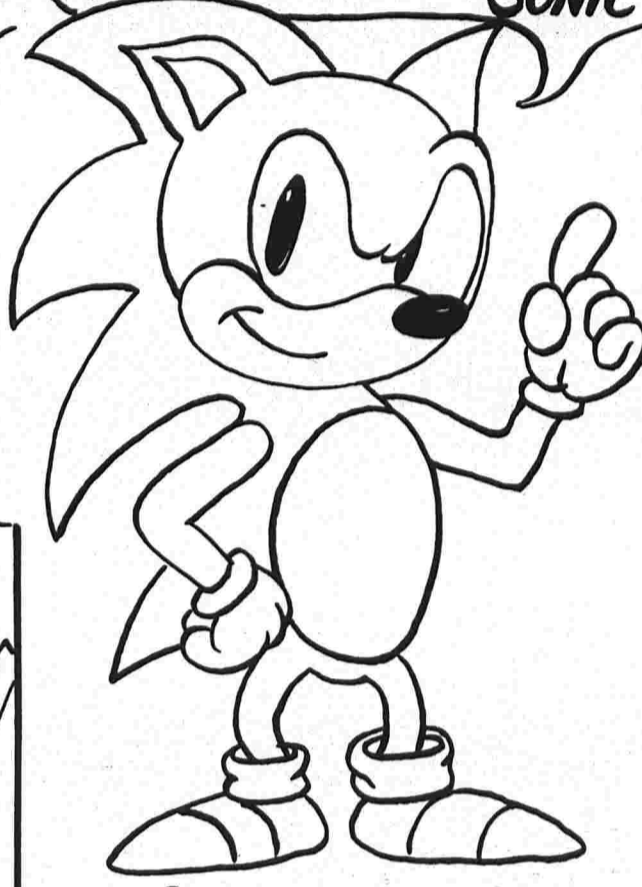
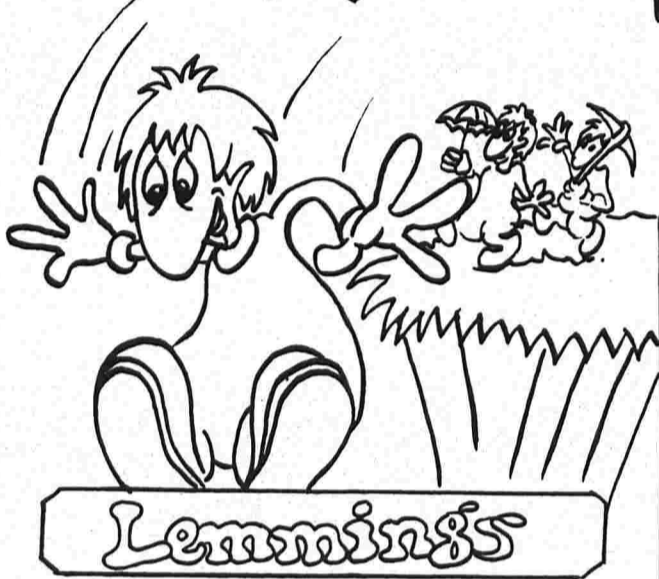
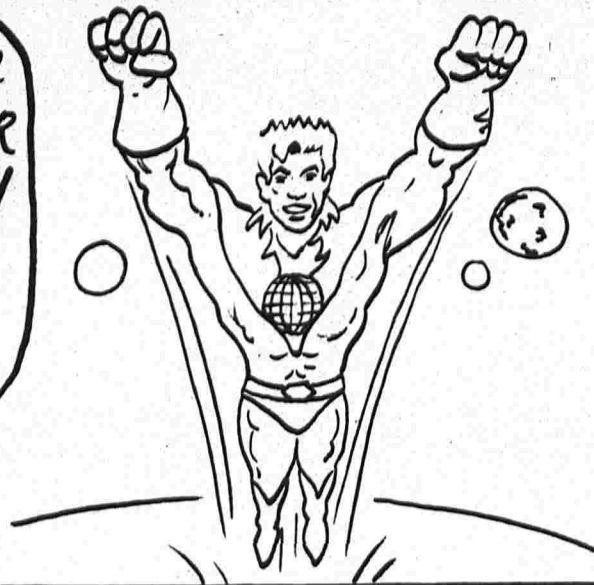
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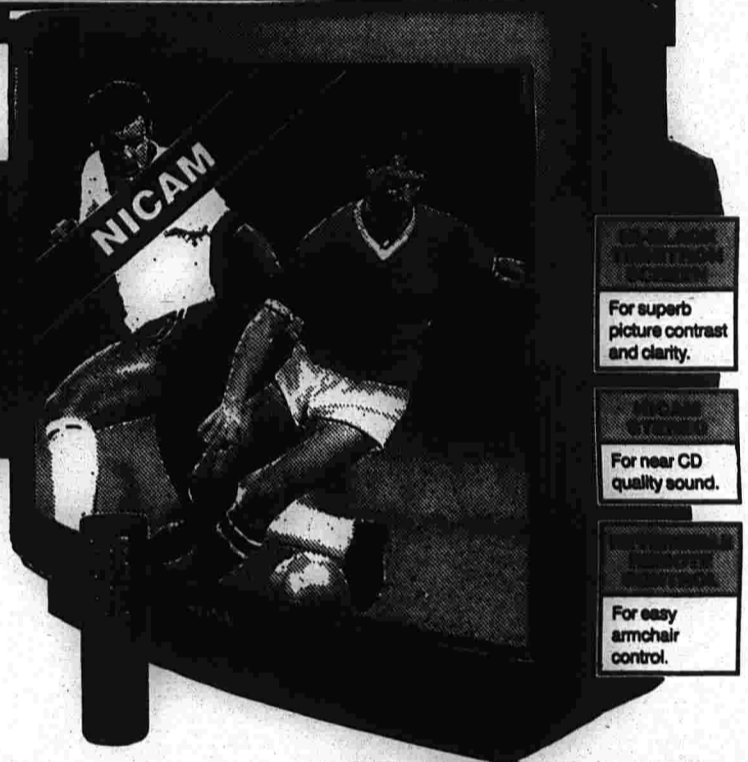
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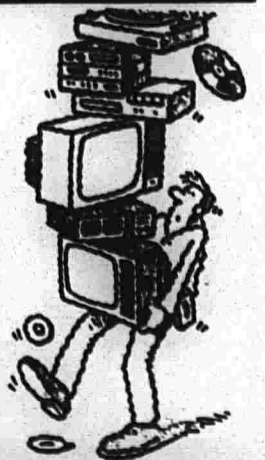
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Remembering Other Days

PASSING OF NOTED WRITER

Mrs. Una Walsh, Bonmahon, Co. Waterford, whose death occurred recently was a well-known personality in Clonmel and district where she formerly resided for many years. She was eldest daughter of the late District Justice Sean Troy, Oakville, Clonmel and widow of the late J. C. Walsh, Solicitor, New Quay, Clonmel, who practised extensively in the town and district. He was also a coroner for West Waterford.

A writer of considerable talent and industry, the late Mrs. Walsh wrote under her maiden name Una Troy, and first came to prominence in the literary sphere with the production by the Abbey Theatre in the 40's of her play "By Dead Stars Light." There followed a number of novels of which the most noted was "We Are Seven", a work which was later to be dramatised for a series on German television and later was adapted for a series on Harlech T.V. with the setting changed from Ireland to Wales.

She retired to live in Bonmahon after the death of her husband. She was a frequent visitor to Clonmel over the ensuing years and had been there only a short time before her demise. She was keenly interested in the progress of the Clonmel Writers Weekend, to which she was an early and most interesting contributor.

On a talk to one of the weekends she related how some of her works attracted the unwelcome attention of the Censorship of Publications Board and told of a run-in she had with the

Parish Priest of S.S. Peter and Paul's Very Rev. Dean Byrne P.P. "We Are Seven" she recalled on that occasion, a tale of a mother with seven illegitimate children by various fathers, had been inspired by a case which had come before her late father at Cahir District Court.

MY AMERICAN TRIP

By Richie Walsh

Chicago, Chicago, here I come! It is always a bit breathtaking arriving at O'Hare Airport, Chicago, just to watch anything up to a dozen planes landing or taking off at the one time. It is — and has been for many years — the world's busiest airport. Yet it is so well planned that access is easier and quicker than so many smaller airports. The many terminals are laid out, on rising tiers, one above the other, each tier complete with car park and ancillary buildings.

The airport, generally, is serviced by a superb network of modern road expressways. The three are named "Eisenhower Expressway," "John F. Kennedy Expressway" and "Dan Ryan Expressway." I have a picture showing a junction of those three expressways. Now, they are probably the three busiest roads in the world, yet one need not drop below 50 or 60 miles per hour to negotiate anyone of them! Would that our road planners would have a look at those splendid roadways.

The history of the city of Chicago must be one of the most meteoric in the history of mankind. To us here in Ireland, with our long and troubled history, the year 1825 is comparatively recent history. Yet, in that year, there were only 14 taxpayers and 35 voters in what was to become in a little more than 150 years later, one of the greatest metropolises of the world.

Chicago was incorporated as a town in 1833, and on March 4, 1837, with a population of 4,170, it was incorporated as a city. Just over 140 years ago, a single stage coach line travelled the trails eastward from Chicago and ox-drawn canoes traversed Lake Michigan to the Mississippi. Today, it is the world's busiest transportation centre, and the Michigan Waterway, connecting the Great Lakes — St. Lawrence Waterway, with the far-flung Mississippi River System has helped to make Chicago the world's greatest inland port. Then it boasted one factory, a few frontier shops and a trading post. Now, it is the nation's leading manufacturing and distribution centre with an annual sales total of over 70 billion dollars.

What made Chicago great? This answer requires no crystal ball. Chicago has a remarkably impressive list of natural advantages of great economic worth. Geographically the city is located at exactly the right place, and from a very early date became the nation's crossroads. As the nation grew and as its business grew, Chicago also grew, but at a vastly accelerated pace. The city's hinterland, extending from Central Canada to the Gulf of Mexico and from the Rocky Mountains to the Appalachians, quickly became the greatest wealth producing region on earth — and Chicago, because of its location, became its economic focus, its business and financial capital.

In the city's early years the population growth was fantastic. Chicago was originally a fur trading post named Ford Dearborn and in the 1820's when the Indian fur trade declined, Chicago was almost stillborn. A few entrepreneurs settled there towards the end of the 1820's, giving a population in 1829 of 30; in 1833, 150; in 1836, 3,820; 1840, 4,470, and ten years later, in 1850 it had jumped to 29,963! In this period, Chicago's proximity to the forests of Michigan and Wisconsin made it a great timber centre. Its closeness to the fertile prairies of the Wabash River Valley and Central Illinois provided it with sufficient agricultural and livestock products to feed a growing population; to support gigantic food manufacturing plants and to export grain and meal to the rest of the world.

The next 20 years saw development and expansion to a degree never experienced by any city anywhere, or at any time. The official opening of the Illinois Michigan Canal in 1848 turned the trade of the Mid West from New Orleans to Chicago, and by 1860, Chicago's grain receipts were ten times larger than those of the Southern city. During those eventful years, Chicago became famous for its vast railroad system. Situated as it was in the key crossroads between the East and West, Chicago's huge rail yards quickly became the centre — and the envy — of rail enthusiasts the world over.

At this time the city became famous for something else: its world-famed stockyards. These yards were situated close to the rail yards so that transport was readily accessible for the import of the raw material (cattle) and the export of the finished product — meat.

Those huge stockyards and butcher premises spawned the famous slogan of those days — "Eat what you can, and can what you can't."

Abandonment Of Railway Line

Deputy Austin Deasy has received the following reply from Brian Cowen, T.D., Minister for Transport, Energy and Communications:—

You wrote to me recently concerning proposals by the Fishguard and Rosslare Railways and Harbours Board to abandon part of the Dungarvan-Waterford line.

I have been in touch with the Chairman of CIE concerning the issues raised in your letter. I have been informed that the Dungarvan-Waterford line closed to passenger traffic during the 1960's and that all traffic

ceased on the line in 1975. I understand that the segment of the line which is the subject of the Abandonment Notice is the property of the Fishguard and Rosslare Railways and Harbours Company. Under existing legislation, notice of the Board's intention to abandon the line must be published at least one month prior to the making of the Abandonment Order. Having issued the Notice of Intention to abandon the line, the Board of the Fishguard and Rosslare Railways and Harbours Company will consider any representations made about the abandonment of the line, prior to taking a decision in the matter. Representations concerning the line should be forwarded to Mr. Brian Dowling, Company Secre-

tary, Coras Iompair Eireann, Heuston Station, Dublin 8, who will arrange to bring them to the attention of the Board of the Fishguard and Rosslare Railways and Harbours Company.

I have been informed by the Chairman of CIE that the decision by the Fishguard and Rosslare Railways and Harbours Company to post the Notice of Intention to abandon the line was made with the agreement of the Boards of Iarnrod Eireann and CIE. The question of providing services on the line or the disposal of the property is, under the Transport Act, a matter for the Board and Management of CIE and I have no statutory function in the matter.

I trust that the foregoing clarifies the matter for you.

Motorist Guilty Of Careless Driving

The overtaking action of a motorist on the main Dungarvan-Cappoquin road last April had part-contributed to the head-on collision involving two other cars, Judge Uinsinn Mac Gruairc held at Dungarvan District Court.

Michael Millea, Kilderrheen, Cappoquin, pleaded not guilty to a charge of dangerous driving at Cappagh, Dungarvan, on April 20th.

During a lengthy hearing there was evidence that a Citroen car being driven by Millea went to overtake a tractor travelling in the same direction. It was then confronted by an approaching car being driven by Mary McGrath, Silver-springs, Dungarvan.

The court heard that in trying to avoid the defendant's approaching car Ms. McGrath's vehicle pulled into its left hand side but then went out of control and crashed head on into another approaching car driven by James Ryan of Enniscorthy, Co. Wexford.

Millea in evidence denied that he was ever completely on his incorrect side of the road. When he saw Ms. McGrath's approaching car he pulled safely in behind the tractor and when the car passed heard a loud bang.

Judge Mac Gruairc held however that Millea had created a danger for the approaching motorist, and though his driving was not dangerous he was guilty of careless driving.

Convicting Millea on that lesser charge, Judge Mac Gruairc fined him £50, directed him to pay expenses totalling £186, and endorsed the conviction on his driving licence. Recognisances were fixed in the event of an appeal.

Inspector Michael Blake prosecuted.

He lectures in the Dublin Institute of Technology School of Architecture and had been writing, painting and illustrating for a number of years. His most recent book "Irish Long Distance Walks" (1993), a guide to official Way-Marked Trails in Ireland, was recently in the Irish Times top-ten best sellers in Ireland. He also illustrated Marion Herons best selling book "The Hidden Gardens of Ireland" (1993).

The subject of Michael Fewer's lecture is broad ranging and expansive and will be of interest to a wide audience. He has already addressed the Waterford Literary and Historical Society on "By Cliff and Shore", when the talk, and particularly the high quality

of the projected slides, was warmly received.

The talk, the first of Dungarvan Museum Society's 1993-'94 Lecture Programme, takes place in Lawlor's Hotel on Thursday, November 11 at 8 p.m. and all are welcome. (See Advt.)

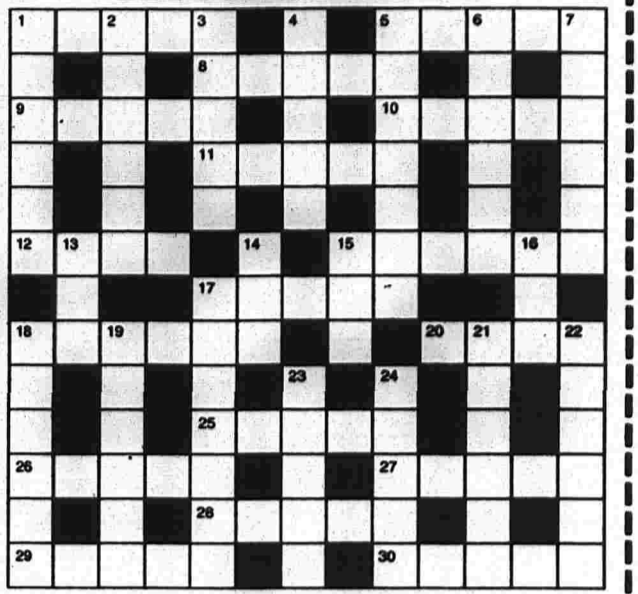

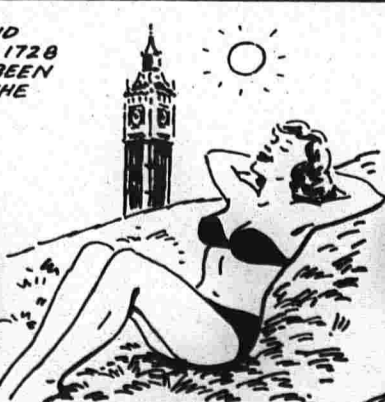

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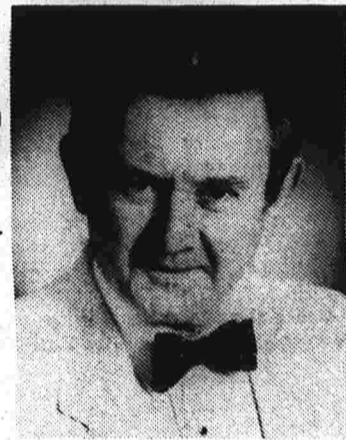

GAELIC FOOTBALL SKILLS

Free Taking — Another aspect of kicking and probably the most important one is the ability to score from frees. Important games have often been won due to this skill. This art or skill requires constant practice.

A player should place all important frees on a little tuft of grass to raise it up. He should face the valve part of the ball in the direc-

tion of the target and if he likes, line it up with some object behind the goals. In kicking the close-in free, kicking with the toe is discouraged as it can be very inaccurate. A very big factor in the taking of frees is the correct angle of approach.

The taking of close-in frees is really for the specialist who has mastered the correct technique and has constant practice. In the close-in or short free it is height and accuracy you require; in the long free, distance.

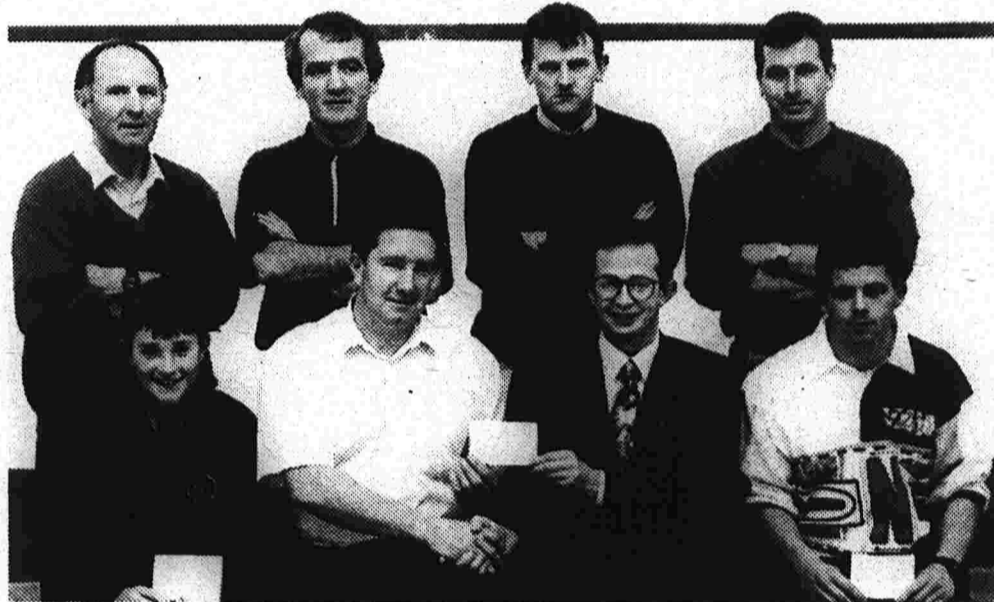

SENIOR FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

Champions Hold Out In Thriller

DUNGARVAN 2-9 STRADBALLY 1-10

Two goals scored between the 25th and 26th minutes by brothers Peter and Morrie Ferncombe made all the difference between winning and losing this very exciting game of good football at Leamybrien on Saturday last. It should be equally said that Liam O'Brien's shot off the upright in the 48th minute made the difference between losing and winning to Stradbally who contributed enormously to this great game of football and might be considered unlucky in the end.

In the first half Stradbally went for fourteen minutes before putting a score on the board and by this time Dungarvan had sent over four points. The trend of the game changed after Pat Curran's brilliant goal at the end

of the first quarter.

Throughout the second half it was hectic stuff all the way and much of the tackling was of the bone-shaking variety with no quarter being asked or given. But nevertheless it was a sporting game and a contest that will do credit to both teams. I felt that Stradbally could have won this game. But they did not because Dungarvan did not allow them to win. The champions seem to have the ability of doing just that and that, perhaps, is one of the reasons why they continue being county champions. Stradbally have to satisfy themselves with the intermediate hurling county title and begin planning for a football win next year. Dungarvan will go on defending their title and will play Rathgormack on next Saturday.

PLAY

The game began on time before the biggest crowd that I have seen so far at the popular Kilrossanty club venue and Dungarvan were first off the mark with a Peter Ferncombe point from a 45 metre free in the 5th minute. He had a second point, this time from play, in the 8th minute and the champions were three up when Morrie Ferncombe pointed a free in the 10th minute. Derek Lyons had a good point in the 11th and three minutes later Pat Curran after a splendid run, saw an opening and kicked to the net for Stradbally's first goal and the first of the three scored in the match. Eoin Phelan and N. Cusack combined to supply Liam O'Brien who sent over for the 'Reds' first point and a score which levelled the sides in the 19th minute. Stradbally were in front when Liam O'Brien pointed a free in the 23rd minute. He said he is proud of their work together, and is thankful for the full support and co-operation he had always received from the councillors in the formulation and implementation of major, and often difficult pioneering schemes.
 The County Manager said he is also proud of the personal friendships he had made with the councillors. "Friendships I will always treasure," he added.
 "To have worked and lived with Waterford people had been an enriching experience and one of which I will always be conscious of."

Returned For Trial To Waterford Circuit Court

A 28 year old unemployed labourer, Paul Flanagan, 8 Skehacrine Court, Abbeyside, Dungarvan, was returned for trial at Dungarvan District Court last week to the Waterford Circuit Court sittings on November 16 on an indictable assault charge.
