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Cork Communications has been guilty to breaches of the "fine points" of the planning permission granted to it in respect of the erection of a mast in the Clashmore area of Co. Waterford, Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council was told.

The Council's Chief Planning Officer, Mr. Jimmy Shine, told the meeting that as yet no decision has been made as to whether or not "further action" will be taken against the company.

"Cork Communications has acknowledged that there have been "minor difficulties" in relation to the planning permission, and we must now consider if these are material differences,' said Mr. Shine.

"If we consider them to be material differences then it will be open to the company to apply to the Council Council for permission to conform to them," he

The matter was raised by Cllr. Oliver Coffey who said it was now being openly alleged throughout the county that Cork Communications is in breach of the planning permission grant-CONTINUED ON PAGE 36



NIALL TOIBIN IN DUNGARVAN



Niall Toibin was born in Cork, but could now be described as part of the international community. His brilliant talents as straight actor and comedian, have brought him to private venues, theatre, T.V. studios, and film sets all over the world.

His theatrical achievements alone are legend, and range through — Borstal Boy, playing Larry Slade, at the National Theatre, London. Then there's Hamlet, where he played Claudius, in the Michael Bogdanov production at the Abbey, There are

so many others, such as two of Brian Friel's works, Lovers and Making History. Then you have Death And Resurrection Of Mr. Roche, Mass Appeal, That Championship Season, House Of Blue Leaves, Tartuffe, The Hostage, with all of them giving him huge joy and satisfaction.

Niall has toured extensively in Ireland, the U.S. and Australia, performing his one man show, and most recently sold out for ten solid weeks in Dublin's Tivoli Theatre. This must be seen as a major tribute to the man and his talents. It cannot, however, be seen as a surprise tribute, as his side splitting humour has created tears of laughter wherever he performs, not alone on his one man shows, but also as an after dinner speaker. His cassettes, Live And Kicking, Encore and Niall Toibin Live, are terrific testimony to his comic na-

Niall is regularly seen on the screens, big and small: Television works include The Detective (BBC), Confessional (ITV), The Birmingham Six Investigation (ITV), then there are appearances in Ballroom Of Romance, Children In Crossfire, Eat The Peach, The Irish R.M., Caught In A Free State, The Outsider, etc., etc. Most recently his television

Most recently his television and film work has included a second series in the hugely successful production of Stay Lucky, in which he stars with Denis Waterman and Jan Francis, going out on ITV.

Then, of course, filmgoers will have seen him when he played the part of Tom Cruise's father in Far And

Niall lives in Dublin with his wife Judy, who is one of his biggest fans, even though his work takes him away from home a lot. They have five children. His ideal of relaxation is to hit a golf ball as often and as far as he can, but his real passion and devotion is to the stage. In that sense he has it made, knowing that his work is one of love.

Niall had been the recipient of the Sunday Independent - Irish Life special award for "distinguished service to the theatre." This was an award that greatly merited and is equally cherished.

Minister of State at the Dept. of the Environment, Deputy Emmett Stagg, at Monday's Council meeting.

In a report to the Council, the Junior Minister made it clear that local authorities who fail to come up with proposals to provide halting sites for travellers in their 1994 housing programme will not have their programme approved by his Department.

Cllr. Kyne said he both resented and rejected Minister Stagg's "intimidation", and said he had no right whatever to threaten the Council's housing programme simply because of their unwillingness to house transient travellers.

"Even if we provided a halting site overnight we haven't the money to manage it," Cllr. Kyne added.

There was also stinging criticism by Cllr. Pat Coffey who said they wouldn't be intimidated into providing halting sites by Mr. Stagg or any other Government Minister. Cllr. Richard A. Walsh agreed while Cllr. Paddy Kenneally said the further away they keep travellers from the county the better county they will have.


"That has to be said," Cllr. Kenneally added.
SUPPORTED MINISTER

Cllr. Tony Wright, however, supported the Junior Minister and accused Waterford County Council of doing "absolutely nothing" for travellers. Dungarvan U.D.C. and Waterford Corporation had provided halting sites but the County Council had failed to shoulder its responsibility in the matter, he said.

Cllr. Dan Cowman said many travellers wouldn't use halting sites and Cllr. Pat Leahy said he too is totally opposed to them. Instead, he added, they should try to house one travelling family in every parish in the county.

Cllr. Paddy O'Callaghan felt they should make some effort to provide a halting site. That was all the Minister is asking of them.


Mr. Jimmy Shine, Chief Planning Officer, said he had received a number of complaints about certain things that are allegedly going on in the forest area concerned.

AREA AID REQUIREMENTS FOR 1994 LIVESTOCK AND ARABLE SECTORS

Farmers who wish to avail in 1994 of aid under the following schemes will be required to lodge Area Aid applications by 31 March, 1994. The schemes involved are:

- Suckler Cow Premium
- Special Beef Premium
- Extensification Premium
- Disadvantaged Areas' Headage Schemes

(Cattle, Beef Cow, Sheep, Goat, Equine)

- Arable Aid Schemes.

These Area Aid applications must be accompanied by Ordnance Survey maps on the 25-inches to the mile scale in all areas for which maps on this scale are available. Exceptionally for 1994 schemes, maps on the 6-inches scale will be accepted from farmers who are already in possession of such maps. In areas not covered by maps on the 25-inches to the mile scale, maps on the 6-inches to the mile scale will be acceptable.

Maps may be obtained directly from the Ordnance Survey Office on payment of the specially reduced fee of £25 per map plus £2 postage for orders received on or before 15 December, 1993. Maps ordered after this date must be accompanied by the normal fee of £42 per map plus £3 postage. Orders must quote the Ordnance Survey sheet numbers required.

Help will be available to farmers in Teagasc Offices to identify the sheet numbers of their map requirements and maps may be ordered through these Offices at no extra cost.

The closing date for Area Aid applications in 1994 will be 31 March 1994. As there will be a very substantial demand for maps, early ordering is essential.

Farmers are strongly advised not to apply to Land Registry for maps as Land Registry has not got the capacity to supply any more maps than the number normally required for land transactions and will not be in a position to supply extra maps.

AMERICAN TRIP

Last week I dealt with the origin and meteoric growth of Chicago. This week I hope to expound and expand on this great metropolis of the Mid West of America. Now, Chicago, America's second city, has in its metropolitan area, a population in the region of 8 million people. Of course, Chicago suffered setbacks as well, the greatest being the Great Chicago Fire of 1871, when practically the whole city was razed to the ground. This great disaster was waiting to happen.

As a contemporary issue of the Chicago Tribune put it: "Chicago had for many years been exposed to a destructive fire. All that was required was the concurrence of certain circumstances - a long dry season - in fact there had been 14 weeks of drought a fire starting among wooden buildings on the West side, a negligent, or womout fire department and a gale of wind strong enough to carry the fire brands across the south branch of the river. On that fatal day they all happened together."

In fact, at that time, Chicago's 334,000 inhabitants lived in a virtual fire trap. Of a total of 39,366 buildings, 36,654 were built of wood and even the sidewalks (footpaths) were wooden, and all were tinder dry after the lengthy drought. That night, the city's firemen were all exhausted from fighting a stubborn fire the day before.

The fire started about 9 p.m. and quickly spread from Mrs. O'Leary's barn through the tenement area of ramshackle buildings and moved northward out of control to the business district on the other side of the Chicago River. Panic stricken citizens jammed the bridges where many were killed in the crush. The supposedly fire-proof business district went up in a sheet of flames.

Twenty-seven hours later when the blaze was finally brought under control, an area of three and a half square miles had been burned to the ground. The fire killed an estimated 250 people, destroyed over 17,000 buildings and rendered nearly 100,000 people homeless. 73 miles of streets were burned down or blown up by explosives in efforts to stop the conflagration.

Many of the refugees were absolutely penniless. The damages bill came to nearly \$200,000,000 of about one-third of the city's property valuation. Among valuable documents destroyed was the original draft of Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation.

The cause of the fire? The original story was that Mrs. O'Leary was milking her cow with the aid of paraffin or kerosene lamp and that the cow kicked over the lamp, setting fire to the dry bedding of the animal, and thus starting the most destructive fire in history. However, Mrs. O'Leary stoutly denied this and claimed that her barn had been set on fire by an unknown man, probably a careless smoker. Sixty American insurance companies went bankrupt in an attempt to meet the claims.

In the aftermath of this great disaster, the spirit and resilience of the people of Chicago were exemplified by the grit and determination they displayed in rebuilding their shattered city.

However, the catastrophe had a beneficial result, it led to new building and fire regulations. The new regulations enforced sounder construction; a strict building code, and improved fire department. Therefore it has eventually led to perhaps what is now the most modern and up-to-date fire department in the

After the tragedy, relief from the outside world began to pour in immediately in such quantities that the city's nine railroads were unable to supply enough cars (railway wagons) to transport the food and clothing. Five million dollars was contributed from all over the world. This was used wisely, not only to feed and help the destitute, but to start building

And, as the new Chicago rose phoenix-like from its ashes, the spirit and determination of its people was seen at its best because in just two years, not only had they rebuilt their city, but a more beautiful and spacious one. Ironically, with what one would think unlimited land in the hinterland, yet a very large part of modern Chicago is built on reclaimed land that was originally water and marshland at the junction of the Chicago River and Lake Michigan.

Next week I hope to describe some of the world famous buildings of modern Chicago.

APPRECIATION: THOMAS DOHERTY, LISMORE

Lismore lost one of its best personalities recently by the death of Thomas Doherty. Some weeks before his death I visited him in Dungarvan District Hospital. With typical grit and humour Tommie said "Well E., I think I'm for the Palm Court - the celestial one". In the debris of adversity personality is built.

Tommie had emigrated to London in the late forties. His father said to him on leaving that he had two advantages, one, you're a Lismore man, two, you're a Doherty, a name which in Irish means the ability to stir it up, get up people's noses, live up to that. He worked in Acton, Brixton, settling in Clapham.

Tom had a philosophical turn of mind seeing life as a kind of tragic joy, question-ing the taken-for-granted why we're here, religion, the place of work and so on. I'm convinced he was the original 'man on the Clapham bus', sniping with foresight and insight at politicos, bureaucrats, pompous media asses, indispensable on-the-markers with his own pawky humour. Living up to the proud O Dochartaigh name.

Tommie's attitude to everything was highly person-al. Take work. He wasn't one for the first or last ditch duty to President, Monarch or John Company. To para-phrase Tommie, 'See, a lot of work is a con, exploitation, the masses involved in joyless jobs and pointless pleasure ... no time to smell the roses, got to the opera ... I used go there once with a girlfriend, but they'd never believe it at home. Manual work is only a punishment from God for man's disobedience - ask the Jesuits. As for indispensable men, the graveyard is full of them!'. Of course Tommie had a point though he needn't have been apologetic about it. The great W. B. Yeats had no qualms about saying in a poem that he hated work all his life.

If Tommie got a hole to dig his first instinct was not to dig it but to sub contract it. 'After all' Tommie would say 'my initials are T.D. therefore I know how to evade the issue, but I wonder do any of those pillocks of society know how





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

Killian Walsh pulls off his hat trick in just over a week. On Wednesday October 20, he weighed in at the Commodore Hotel in Cork for the combined army and navy boxing championships. He hit the scales at just under 67k (Welter weight) and drawn against Anthony Donnelly of the Eastern Command, who is trained by Olympic Gold medalist Michael Carruth. The Eastern Command had a strong team down in Cork with Donnelly being one of their favorites.

Killian Walsh represented the Southern Command as he is based in Fermoy 13th Battalion, but last year he won the All-Ireland title (Welter weight) for the Navy, so he had a huge support from the audience in Cork with the Navy being hosts to the championships. In his corner were John Mahon Irish coach and Gerry O'Mahoney Dungarvan B.C.

The first round Donnelly came out strong and seemed to dominate the first part of the round. Killian seemed overpowered by the presence of Michael Carruth and Phil Suttcliffe in Donnelly's corner, but once he got over this and settled down, he soon boxed his way back into it. Donnelly won the first round by a point, the second went to Killian by a point in spite of a public warning. The reason for the warning is still unclear as there was no obvious foul blow.

The third round put Killian well ahead to be de-clared the winner of the semi final.

In the final on Thursday October 21, Walsh fought David O'Brien of the Curragh Command, last year's welter weight champion. Walsh was not leaving an Irish title slip away, so he came out fast and hard. O'Brien didn't know what hit him. Just as the bell went for the end of the round O'Brien was receiving his first standing count. He got a second count 30 seconds into the second round. Shortly after, the referee, Tony De Lougherie stepped in to stop the fight as O'Brien was unable to defend himself from Walsh's onslaught.

Walsh was declared Irish Army Champion '93. This is his second successive army title.

On Friday the 29th October, Walsh was invited to step in for senior boxer Robert Driscoll Ballyvolane B.C. who had the flu.

This tournament was held in the Greenhills Hotel, Limerick and was organised by St. Munchins Boxing club. All proceeds went to Our Lady's Hospital for sick children in Crumlin, Dublin. Special guest and chief official for the night was Michael Car-

This was Killian's second chance in a week to box in front of Carruth and he wasn't going to disappoint him.

Walsh's opponent was John Daly, Southhill B.C., Limerick, a light middle weight which Killian had to give away 1/2 stone. Daly was a taller boxer with a strong right hand, he kept tying Killian up in clinches and it was in one of those clinches that he cut Walsh under the left eye.

Nonetheless Walsh was the better boxer and caught Daly with lovely straight lefts. Walsh went on to beat Daly by a surprising majority decision.

Many of our hurling followers believe that the length of our stay in Div. 1 of the league will depend on how we fare against Tipperary at Cappoquin in round three of the competition on next Sunday.

The loss of the points, even though not entirely our fault, at New Ross was a disappointment and a set-back for the team, who had survived for a draw with Down at Walsh Park two weeks previously.

Hard luck does not count in the league no more than the championship and whatever the cause, we are left with just a single point from two games while the inform Tipperary have four points because they are unbeaten after meetings with Antrim (4-17 to 1-12) and Limerick (1-17 to 3-8).

Although it is 40 years since it all happened, the wonderful double victory of the Club's junior hurlers and footballers is obviously not going to be forgotten while there is a club in the village.

Elaborate plans are in hand in Ballyduff for the double celebration and I know that St. Michael's Hall will be packed to capacity on Friday night, November 19 when the surviving members and officials are feted by the present club officials. As it happened, Ballyduff/Mocollop were the only Western team to win a county championship in 1953 as the other four titles went to clubs in the Eastern division.

The great Mount Sion who were at the height of their fame at that time were going for a 'grand slam,' they having won the senior and minor county titles and made history by winning their first ever senior football title. De La Salle had won the minor football

county title and all that remained for the West were the two junior titles.

I recall the day when they defeated Mount Sion in the junior final at Cappoquin and the wild excitement which followed the blowing of the final whistle by the great Dungarvan hurler and footballer, the late Jackie Goode who was referee on the day. The final score was 5-4 to 3-2.

In football the side, known as Mocollop, defeated Stradbally in the Western final before going on to beat Dunhill in the county final.

The celebrations which followed the double had to be seen to be believed and as one might expect, they went on for a long time.

There was no intermediate grade in those days so both teams moved up to senior status. The club won an intermediate hurling county title in 1964 and the intermediate football title in 1973.

As a contest, it did not compare with the Dungarvan/Stradbally clash on the previous Saturday, or indeed with the Gaultier/Dungarvan match two weeks before. Rathgormack's failure to score during the first half seemed to take a lot of the life out of the game and the second half was pretty failed to arouse the crowd, which yielded a much bigger 'gate' than on the previous Saturday (£2,780 as compared with £1,555).

The champions went in front in the 4th minute when John Ferncombe fisted over a high ball sent in by brother Morrie. A free in the 7th minute taken by Morrie Ferncombe saw Denis McGrath well placed around the goal area to sidekick it to the net for a brilliant score and a tonic start for the champions. Fergal Cunningham passed to John Ferncombe who sent over again in the 8th minute. Dungarvan were 1-2 up at this stage and this by any reckoning was great value for the amount of possession that they had enjoyed

up to this point.

By the 13th minute Rathgormack had recorded a total of 7 wides without a score. After a scoreless fifteen minutes Dungarvan had a Morrie Ferncombe point from a 23rd minute free and this was the last flag raised during the first

For the start of the second half Rathgormack made a big number of switches on their team and this did result in an improvement. Finbarr Crotty opened their account in the 31st minute when sending over from a free, but P. P. Ferncombe brought one back when he pointed a free one minute later. Finbar Crotty pointed another free but this was negatived when Morrie Ferncombe did likewise from a free. Morrie pointed another free in the 39th minute to leave the score 1-6 to 0-2. After this the Rathgormack net had a couple of successive amazing escapes, chiefly because of brilliant goalkeeping by Pat Fahy between the posts. FINAL SCORE

Then a 43rd minute point from play by J. J. Ferncombe put the champions a clear eight points in front and seemingly heading for a comprehensive victory. 

He went on to say that the erection of masts and transmitters around the county by Cork Communications is now a "vexed and dicey subject" that has worried and angered a lot of people. Cllr. Coffey said that if the

company does not put all and every matter "right" in relation to the mast erection at Clashmore the County Council should deal very severely with them.

Cllr. Gary O'Halloran, who lives in Clashmore, said the mast has been operation for several months. He was confident, however, that the County Council will ensure that it is carefully monitored in relation to its health safety levels.

He then went on to refer to public meetings which had been held around the county about these telecommunication developments and said many inaccurate and misleading statements had been made at that.

VILLIFIED

"People have been personally villified, including our own County Manager," said Cllr. O'Halloran.

Cllr. Pat Coffey said he had not attended any of these public meetings in the past nor is it his intention to attend any of them in the future. "I have received nasty telephone calls but I will not be intimidated by these people or their rent-a-crowds," he said. Cllr. Tom Cunningham

said they had opened a can of worms when they gave Cork Communications planning permission for all their developments around the county.

Cllr. Paddy Kenneally said the erection of the Clashmore mast should never have been allowed by the Council's Planning Dept. It is disgraceful, he added, the way the skyline has been altered. "There is something radically wrong.

UNAUTHORISED

Later in the meeting a report from the County Manager was considered on the current telecommunication transmitters and receivers throughout the county.

That report contained the shock disclosure that "as far

as can be ascertained" there are four unauthorised developments now under investigation. All four relate to radio or television retransmission.

Mr. Shine confirmed that one of the four is an RTE mast at Deerpark North outside the village of Ballymacarbiy.

Cllr. Nora Flynn said her greatest concern in the whole matter relates to the health and safety aspect of these transmitters. "I have still had not an absolute assurance from either the Dept. of Health or the Dept. of Communications that they are completely save," she said.

Mr. Shine said the present Government policy is that the levels of radiation from the MMDS transmitters are safe and he must accept that until it is proven to the con-

Finally it was agreed to present a detailed report to the next meeting on whether or not the differences in relation to the mast in Clashmore materially change the planning permission granted to Cork Communications for its erection.

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
