# It's not so difficult to build a pond

MANY gardeners find winter frustrating and itch to get outdoors and find jobs to

Here's one to keep the fidgets busy for some time and enhance the garden building a garden pond.

They are cheap if you do the labour yourself. They can also fit any garden scheme providing the chosen site is not beneath a large tree — the pond will quickly become choked and breed bugs and pests.

Also weigh up whether your new feature is likely to endanger small children either family, neighbours or visitors. Once decided, most of the heavy preparation work can be done now while the weather is not too warm for labouring and not too cold to put you off work alto-

Don't be too conservative about size and shape - larger ponds make more impact and, perhaps surprisingly, are easier to maintain.

The choice of materials is:

FIBREGLASS — rigid liners come in many shapes and sizes and can save a lot of time and effort. Simply choose the site, dig the hole required and line with sand to pack and support the liner - though the latter part is often more troublesome than you would

FLEXIBLE PLASTIC - sheeting able to adapt to the most ambitious shapes. It comes in many grades depending on the life span demanded.

The pond shape is dug and lined with sand but care must be taken to avoid leaving any sharp points which might puncture the plastic membrane.

stretched across the hole and weighted at the sides before being gently filled

with water. Once filled, the plastic over lap can be trimmed away.

CONCRETE — lasts for decades and also allows flexibility in design, but care must be taken to install without risking later cracks and contamination of the

It is best to consult a specialist book before using this method.

If you opt for plastic or concrete yet have trouble visualising your creation, try marking out the site using a car tow rope of the garden hose.

Having then settled and marked the shape, excavate to at least 18 inches in the centre. That's the minimum depth required for everyone's favourite pond plant — lily pads.

Step the edges at around 9 inches to allow you to grow a range of marginal

Paving stones or bricks can then be used as an attractive and secure edging for the pond, though it is worth adding a rockery as a backdrop to break up the regularity of paving.

Go one step further and use the rockery as an excuse to install a pump and waterfall gushing into the pond! It's an attractive feature and keeps the pond

After creating your new pond feature over the next few weeks or months, you can then plan the planting and stocking, which can start in April.

### ingredients:


1/4 cup bottled barbecue sauce

4 pork loin chops cut 3/4 inch thick (11/2 to 11/4 lbs thal)

### Method:

In a small saucepan, stir together barbecue sauce **CHOPS** 



and apricot preserves. Cook over low heat just until preserves melt. Stir in sesame seeds. Remove from heat. Trim

fat from chops. Season with salt and pepper. Grill for 10 minutes. Brush chops with sauce. Turn chops over.

Grill 10 to 15 minutes more or until no longer pink, brushing with sauce during last 5 minutes. Serves 4.

# Road Damage — Council To Appeal To Environment Minister

# Local Station Officer Retires



JOHNNY AND PHILOMENA HAMILTON

After a most distinguished career serving as Station Officer with the Dungarvan Fire Brigade, Mr. Johnny Hamilton decided to "call it a day" and retired on September 30 this year.

Johnny Hamilton of Boreenatra, Dungarvan, joined up as a fire fighter in 1967 when the Fire Station was situated in the Council Yard. That same year, the Fire Brigade moved to new premises across the road at Shandon.

Five years later in 1972, Johnny was given his first promotion to Sub-Officer, which he held for ten years.

The highest point of his esteemed career came on March 1, 1982 when Johnny was made Station Officer, a position which he has held for the past eleven years.

Johnny is one of only 2 surviving members of the Brigade when it was situated in the old County Council Yard in Dungarvan (Oliver Walsh being the other member).

To mark his retirement a Mass was celebrated by Rev. Fr. Kiely CC in the new Fire Station premises at the Shandon by-pass on October 28 at which all members and all former members of the Dungarvan Fire Brigade were present. Later on the party adjourned to the Park House to enjoy the night's enter-

tainment.

The high esteem in which Johnny Hamilton was held was reflected by the attendance of so many Fire Department representatives from all over the county.

Members of Waterford County Council will make an urgent appeal later this week when they meet the Minister for the Environment for additional funding to be made available to meet the cost of repairs to roads damaged around the county by torrential rain during the first week of October.

In a report to last week's Council meeting, the County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn, confirmed that it will cost £141,855 to repair roads damaged in the Ballymacarbry, Tramore and Lismore areas by the floods.

Mr. O'Flynn said the collapse of an embankment into the river Nire at Ballymacarbry is the most serious damage and the overall repair cost will come to £70,000.

"Coming near to the end of our financial year we do not have the resources to meet the cost of the remedial works that are necessary," said Mr. O'Flynn who also disclosed that their representations to the Dept. of the Environment for additional funding made on October 19 had met with a negative response.

"The most pressing of the work has started but the rest will have to wait because we have no money," the County Engineer added.

VERY DISAPPOINTED

Cllr. Kieran O'Ryan said he was "very disappointed" with the Dept.'s refusal to come to their assistance. The damage caused had been the result of an act of God and could not have been foreseen by the Council when they sat down to finalise their estimates for 1993 almost a year ago.

It was agreed that members of a Council deputation who will be meeting the Minister for the Environment later this week on another matter will urge him to make funds available for the road repair programme.

### Irish Heart Foundation Notes



# No Solution At Estimates Meeting

The annual Waterford Co. Council Estimates Meeting held last Friday ended in a stalemate as the members failed to strike a rate for 1994 in the midst of a worsening financial situation.

The Councillors were faced with a gloomy prediction of a £100,000 deficit to be carried forward as over expenditure into 1994, and an adverse balance of £466.000 in the revenue account at the end of last year.

Cllr. Kieran O'Ryan described it as "the most difficult estimates meeting" he had ever attended and added that they, the Councillors were "in a powerless position faced with figures they found impossible to grapple."

In his report, the Acting Co. Manager, Mr. Brian J. McNally, disclosed that their rate support grant for 1994 is £4,065,087, which is up 2.5% on the current year. Anticipated expenditure however is set at £15.82m in 1994 with income put at £9.78m.

The Council then learned that a rate increase of 18%; 15% increases on both domestic and non-domestic water charges and an increase of .50p per refuse collection tag was advised to cope with these figures.

"We have totally run out of options" added Mr. Mc-Nally, and we must now seconsider riously disengaging from some areas of service."

The meeting was then told that redundancies may be necessary especially in the area of temporary staff. The suggestion of laying off 26 workers on the county roads and switching them for 13 full time staff met serious resistance, however, from several members.

Cllr. Paddy O'Callaghan warned the council of the "hardship and trauma" created by unemployment, "especially at this time of the year in the run-up to Christmas". Cllr. Coffey however felt "if it has to be, it has to be, we have to try to cover our own permanent staff".

Cllr. Billy Kyne proposed that the council contact the Minister for the Environment before making a final decision about the workers. "There should be an alternative for even one of the workers; he urged, "maybe a week on/week off basis or part-time". It was unanimously agreed to write to the Minister and highlight Cllr. Kyne's points.

Cllr. Kyne then went on to suggest that they should have quarterly financial meetings in addition to the estimates meeting. At least that way, he added, "we wouldn't be in the trouble we are today". "A yearly

meeting is a waste of time" he declared.

A proposal was then made by Cllr. O'Callaghan and seconded by Cllr. Jackie Fahey "to; 1. not let temporary workers ago and 2. not dispromote members of permanent staff to work on county roads while temporary staff are moved to National Primary roads".

The motion was deferred, however, and the chairman, Cllr. Con Casey said that the proposal could be put when they finally come to adopt a rate.

It was decided to convene again on 22 November, 13 days before the December 5 deadline to strike a rate.

The most southerly point in the parish is Ballinacourty Point where the lighthouse stands. Ballinacourty townsland was once in the parish of Clonea. It extends from where the Goldcoast stands, in a northerly direction, touching the main road to Clonea Hotel and containing all the lands south of this except for the small townsland of Kilgrovan.

Ballinacourty means "Homestead of the Mansion." The mansion in quesprobably Ballinacourty House stand-

ing on part of the Quigley Magnesite land but it could have been the old clubhouse of Dungarvan Golf Club (demolished by fire) which was once a coastguard station. The golf club is now run by Goldcoast Holidays Ltd.

The entire peninsula is commonly known as Ballinacourty but north of the actual townsland and adjoining the Clonea Road are the following townslands: Ballynalahassery North (Homestead of the half ploughland N), Bally-

nalahssery South (Homestead of the half ploughland S), Scart (Thicket), Scartore (Golden Thicket) Ballyrandle (Homestead of the Rundale), Acres (Acres), Tallacoolmore (Corner Summit big), Tallacoolbeg (Corner Summit little), Kilminion South (St. Minin's Church South), Garrynageragh East (Garden of the Sheep).

Except for Acres these are all Irish placenames. A second division of Ballyrandle is situated north of the Clonea Road, the Dungarvan Rugby Club grounds comprising most of it. A rundale was a division of land into adjoining strips.



# **Englishman Pleads Guilty** To Possession Of Cannabis

A District Court Judge said last Friday that while people from Britain and elsewhere will always be welcome in Ireland they most definitely will not be welcome if they bring the drugs habit with them into this country.

Judge Michael Pattwell was commenting at Tallow District Court where a 30 year old Englishman, Sean Huttley, with an address of Kilcronat, Ballynoe, Co. Cork, pleaded guilty to having possession of cannabis resin in contravention of the Misuse of Drugs Act on June 28 last.

The court was told that gardai found the cannabis resin in the defendant's car

which they searched at 2 o'clock in the morning in the village of Conna.

Convicting Huttley, Judge Pattwell said people from England, Scotland, Wales and elsewhere are more than welcome in Ireland. Sometimes, however some of them bring habits to this country that are not welcome

to young Irish people.
"We have enough problems besides those that some people from other countries bring here," added Judge Pattwell who imposed a fine of £150 on the defendant.

It was only last week they heard of planning permission after six years.

# W.D.P. Reports Significant **Progress**

Waterford Development Partnership was launched last week by the Minister for Food, Mr. Brian O'Shea, T.D. at a reception in the Park Hotel.

The WDP, which reported significant progress in the achievement of their original aims also announced the exciting news of the siting of an EC Carrefour Centre in Dungarvan by the end of this year.

In his speech Minister O'Shea said he was delighted to launch the report and described the WDP as a "community response to unemployment", with the aim of "locally based dynamic organisation".

WDP Chairman Mr. John Moloney of Waterford Foods reiterated the sentiments of Minister O' Shea and reported that 95 sustainable full time jobs had been created as a result of the efforts of the Partnership.

Over 300 unemployed people have received training from the Partnership in one form or another and very significant community efforts have been mobilised to aid the tourism drive in the area.

### **FUNDING**

The WDP, formerly the West Waterford Development Partnership was born out of the Programme for Economic and Social Progress in 1991. Its eighteen strong board is made up of representatives of the social partners, the community and the state sector.

To-date, the company has received £300,000 from the EC and £69,000 from the Enterprise Trust. From this funding the Partnership offers a "package of support to people to minimise the threat of failure." A complete aid package includes training, financial aid, management assistance and the provision of relevant information and contacts.

£176,000 has been allocated to enterprise projects; £66,000 has been allocated to tourism projects; £45,000 has been allocated to services for the unemployed and a further £43,000 has been allocated to training. This leaves a balance of £38,700 currently being considered for allocation.

Included in the allocation of funds is a low interest rate revolving loan, available to certain business projects assessed by the WDP.

On behalf of Mr. John Moloney formally thanked the Department of the Taoiseach, ADM Ltd., the European Commission, the Enterprise Trust and Waterford Foods for their contributions to the work of the Partnership.

# **Fined For Possession** Of Cannabis

A 42 year old defendant, Philip Walton, Coolbeggan, Tallow, was fined £250 by Judge Michael Pattwell at Tallow District Court when he pleaded guilty to being in possession of cannabis resin on May 18 last contrary to the Misuse of Drugs Act.

The court was told that gardai searched Walton's home and seized a quantity of cannabis resin that would make 147 cigarettes.

Sgt. John Molloy said the cannabis was strictly for Walton's own use. He described the defendant as a recluse who doesn't socialise.

Having commented on the sizeable amount of cannabis seized, Judge Michael Pattwell imposed a fine of £250 on the defendant.





# "REMEMBERING OTHER DAYS"



This week for our "Remembering Other Days" feature we go to the West of the County, to the Cornerstone town of Cappoquin. The street scene shows what was then known as North Main Street, now known as Main Street. The photograph was taken in the early part of the century and the bare sky line emphasises the absence of wires of any kind, either telegraph or electricity, which in modern instances tend to dominate photographs of this kind. The famed Corner Stone is situated at the front of the gable end of this building on the corner at left, then known as Blackwater Hotel and now known as the Blackwater House Public House.

On the right front of the photograph is the premises known as the Market House, now the shop owned by John McGrath. The photo was taken from the Square, the camera pointing towards Melleray and in the distance is Walsh's Hotel which survives to this day. The houses beyond the hotel (Barrack Street), have been demolished. Ryan's Woollen Mills were situated on the left of the street and subsequent to this, Sargent's Garage & Petrol Pumps became a well known landmark, again on the left side of the street. Readers are asked to note the fashions of that day, the horses and carts, the principal modes of transport at the time and the lone hen in the centre, front, pecking for food. A real historical photo this.

# Accommodation For Homeless Growing Problem

Before the meeting of Dungarvan Urban District Council last Monday was a document from the Department of the Environment regarding the provision of accommodation for homeless people.

Under section 10 of the Housing Act of 1988, housing authorities now have a range of responses to meet the needs of persons who are regarded as homeless.

These are:

A. to make arrangements with approved bodies for the provision of accommodation for homeless persons.

B. to provide assistance, including financial assistance to homeless persons, and

C. if necessary, to rent accommodation, arrange lodgings or contribute to the cost of such accommodation or lodgings.

Cilr. Austin Hallahan welcomed the document but said he would like to see "activity rather than reports" in this area. "The local authority and the Health Board", Cilr. Hallahan urged, "should get together and do something positive such as building a shelter for these homeless persons". The problem he felt "is not going to get better, but worse".

Cllr. Hallahan further pointed out the non-mention of homeless young boys in the report which he stressed is an increasing problem with so much unemployment. At present he said, there is a centre in Waterford city which deals with young homeless women and battered wives.

The Chairman, Mr. Tony Wright expressed his concern that after 5 p.m. there was no social worker on duty to deal with homeless cases. "Surely" he added "problems are more likely to arise at night time".

Clir. Paddy Power, supported the Chairman and suggested the construction of a hostel run in combined effort by the Urban District Council and the Health Board.

This, Cllr. Hallahan agreed "would alleviate lots of problems".

Cllr. Kyne, however, a member of the Health Board, stated that caution must be exercised as such a hostel may be "too open to people and encourage people over 18 to use it as an excuse for one night".

It was agreed that Cllr. Kyne should ask the Programme Manager of Community Care, Mr. Dermot Halpin, for a resumé of emergency referral procedures be discussed at the next months meeting.






KILROSSANTY MACRA NOTES

# **FOUNDATION** COACHING G.A.A.

A very important new development in the whole area of coaching has come into operation. The whole area of coaching as we know it is going to change dramatically in the near future. To avoid any possible litigation procedures, in the foreseeable fu-

ture, only qualified coaches will be covered under the G.A.A. Insurance Scheme.

The National Coaching Games and Development Committee in conjunction with the Munster Coaching Games and Development Committee has launched a new range of coaching courses which have and will be given nationwide.

The initial course, termed the Foundation Course was held in Limerick University on Saturday, November 6. The tutors for the course were Brian Lotty of Cork (hurling) and John Cummins of Tipperary (football). It lasted for six hours. The aim of the course is "to provide those who have a peripheral involvement in preparing teams with a range of basic organisational and instructional skills."

It consisted of one hour's discussion about coaching in general — the who, why, what it is about. This was followed by a 2 hour outdoor session involving the passing on of the various skills. After lunch a further 2 hour session involved the structuring of a total coaching session. A one hour discussion was held to evaluate the course.

It was attended by coaches from all Munster counties. The Waterford representatives were Eamonn O Mairtin, Timmy O'Keeffe and Pat Condon (football) and Declan Murphy, Pat Moore, Macdara Mac Donnacha and Joe Carton (hurling).

All who successfully completed will receive a coaching certificate from Croke Park which is officially recognised by NCTC Limerick. The next stage, a LEVEL ONE course will be held in early

As in all other counties, Foundation Courses will be held in Waterford. The hurling course, catering mainly for east Waterford, will be run in Waterford RTC on Saturday, December 4 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. and from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. The fee is £10 which includes a lunch. Special application forms are available through all club secretaries and completed forms with fee should be returned to Joe Carton, 3

The Glen, Waterford. The football course, catering mainly for West Waterford, will run in St. Augustine's College, Dungarvan, with the same times and fee. The forms for the football courses should be returned to Eamonn O Mairtin, c/o C.B.S., Dungarvan.

N.B. — The closing date for both courses is

Wednesday, December 1.

All clubs are urged to send at least one coach to the courses, bearing in mind the new insurance regulations which are imminent. Two further courses will be held, in opposite venues, in early 1994. All those who successfully attend will receive a national foundational level coaching certificate from Croke Park.

# Lost Time!

On many occasions throughout the year I have observed a discrepancy in the timing of championship games and there have been more than a few occasions when others drew my attention to the matter and asked for comment. I am referring to the time allowed by referees to compensate for the time lost because of players being down injured.

One of the occasions which stand out in my mind was a hurling game in the league section of the championship here in the West this year when the referee blew full-time after 30 minutes of the second half when there had been a minimum of four minutes of stoppages due to a number of reasons. One team won the game by a goal (2-8 to 0-11). The referee was given some abuse but ignored it. In writing this, I must first of all acknowledge that the referee is the official in charge and the only one entitled to judge the timing of a match.
Here is what the rule states about timing:

To record playing time and to extend time in each half for deliberate or incidental delay, or to allow for a free - awarded before time had expired — to be taken. Should the defending team commit a further foul before the referee whistles for full-time, he shall further extend the time to permit an additional free to be taken from which a score can be made — providing no other player of the side taking the free, touches the ball."
INJURIES AND INCURSIONS

"The referee may give his permission to a team medical officer or one authorised official to enter the field of play to examine an injured player. No other official from a team shall enter the field of play. Play shall not be stopped for injury to a player, except in exceptional circumstances to enable seriously injured players to be treated on the field or removed from the field of play. All other injuries shall be treated off the field of play.

This particular rule was introduced a few years ago to help defeat certain forms of gamesmanship and malingering. It was also designed to ensure that all club matches would enjoy 60 minutes playing time.

### FOOTBALL TEAM MANAGER

What could only be described as a very bizarre affair resulted from the appointment of a football team manager which had been the subject of much controversy over the past number of weeks.

The Munster Council ruling was that its meeting in Limerick on 3/11/'93 decided in respect of the above appeal that Coisde Cho. Portlairge CLCG, was, at its meeting in October entitled to appoint a senior football team manager on the basis of a simple majority.

'Coisde Achomhrairc na Mumhan instructs Coisde Phortlairge CLCG to put before its members at its next County Board meeting, the recommendation of Coiste Peile, Phortlairge on the appointment of a senior football team manager for ratification or otherwise by simple majority vote." Quite an amount of argu-

ment went on regarding the manner in which the recommendation should be put to the meeting. The Co. Chairman said he would accept any amendments that were put and there were several submissions that this was an improper way of dealing with the matter. It was submitted that the recommendation should be put to the meeting and then, if defeated, the Board could proceed to elect a manager, if it so wished. The instructions from the Council were that the recommendation be put to the meeting for ratification or otherwise and the majority felt that this was the way in which it should be done.

Finally the recommendation was put to the meeting on the proposition of John Jackson and the amendment was that the manager of the football team be chosen by the selection committee. A roll-call vote resulted in a 28/25 in favour of the recommendation. Others who were keeping a count did not get the same result, but all, with one exception, had a majority of at least two votes. Because there was a discrepancy in the count the Chairman ordered another vote and this caused uproar at the meeting. The Chairman kept on insisting that

another vote be taken and after a lot of arguing, it was taken and resulted in a majority vote for the Coisde na Peil recommendation. Michael Brophy, Manager, thanked the meeting and pledged himself to continue to do his utmost for football and appealed to clubs to give the selectors their full co-operation in the coming months.

### OTHER **MATTERS**

Tommy Hennessey raised the matter of the county football team wearing the Kilrossanty jerseys for the league match against Lim-

He was informed that this was due to an oversight and the fact that the regular official who looks after this matter was out of the country on the day. Kilrossanty Club were thanked for the use of the jerseys (which proved lucky).

Noel Nugent, Clashmore Club, referred to the County Board policy of playing most of our important matches, semi-finals, etc. on Saturdays. He said it was not the most suitable day for everyone and our revenue was suffering as a result. The Chairman said the Board were trying to leave the Sundays free for national league games and matches had to be played as time was not on our

Timmy O'Keeffe, Manager Under-21 Football, stated that a panel of players had been drawn up and the committee would shortly announce details of their training schedule. He was glad to report that Larry Tompkins was again willing to assist with the train-

ing when it begins shortly. The matter of acquisition of land in the city area for juvenile games was raised by Eastern Board na n-Og Secretary, Liam Cheasty. The matter was discussed briefly and a decision was taken as to how they should proceed. The matter is to be kept under close review.

### REPORTS

There were reports from the senior hurling and senior football committees relating to league progress and again the meeting took note of the complaints about players not being available to them because of the club championships. John Jackson raised the matter of the appointment of another junior hurling selector and it was agreed that this would be done at the December meeting.

### COUNTY CONVENTION

The County Convention date was set for Saturday, January 15 and will take place at the Park Hotel which is the venue agreed on the rota which began three years ago. On the proposition of Joe Byrne it was agreed that a small committee be set up to organise the lay-out of the hall. Nominations and motions must be back with the Secretary by December 10.

At the moment there are many rumours circulating and even if half of them are correct we can expect interesting and exciting happenings before the 1994 County Board is finalised. Erin's Own County Board delegate has already openly declared himself a candidate for the county chair and confirmed to us that he will contest the position. There are other names being mentioned around the county also and these include Tony Mansfield, James Tobin, Greg Fives, Frankie Cullinane and Declan O'Meara.

The rumours relating to the contests for the other positions will need some sorting out before they can be published, but I hope to keep readers in touch as the weeks go by.

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
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
