

# el Fail

As the grim financial facts of life were again spelled out in their most stark form, the members of Waterford County Council failed for a second time last Monday to strike a county rate for 1994.

They will meet for the third time next Monday a mere three days before the deadline date set by the Dept. of the Environment for the striking of the rate. Failure to do so would almost certainly result in the abolition of the Council and its replacement by a Commissioner appointed by the Minister.

It's unlikely in the extreme that that will be the

ultimate scenario, but members openly acknowledged at Monday's meeting that the Council's overall financial position is now a "hopeless" one.

In his detailed report to the previous estimates meeting, the Acting County Manager, Mr. Brian J. Mc-Nally, had disclosed that to balance the books and retain

employment and service levels a rate increase of 18% would be needed. Additionally water charges would have to be raised by 15% — bringing them to about £127 annually - and an increase from £1.50 to £2 per refuse collection tag.

At their Dungarvan Headquarters Waterford Foods have installed a combined heat and power plant - their second - with a maximum output of 1MW. The project is on target to boost annual site electricity generation to 12 million KWh.

The Awards are organised by ESB and recognise manufacturing companies which have achieved improvement in their business performance by using advanced energy-efficient processes or by enhanced management

of the usage of electricity.

Awards winners were presented with a gold plated eta award and a cheque for £10,000 by the Minister for

Pat Noctor Memorial Trophy For "Supreme Young Sportstar"

A Dungarvan-based garda who gave so much of his time to helping young people and whose untimely death last March robbed the Force of one of its most exemplary officers, is to be remembered and honoured in an appropriate way by his colleagues.

The Pat Noctor Memorial Trophy and replica will be presented annually to the "Supreme Young Sportstar of the Year" by the Dungarvan Garda District Social Club, and the inaugural presentation will be made at a function in Dungarvan next January.

The age limit will be under 18 years on January 1 and will be confined to boys and girls living in the Dungarvan Garda District which embraces Cappoquin, Lismore, Tallow, Ring, Aglish and Ballymacarbry.

Garda Noctor, a native of Gorey, Co. Wexford, died on March 6 last, a victim of the motor neurone disease. He was aged 53.

He served for twenty-six years in Dungarvan where he enjoyed the esteem and respect of the entire community. He was the Garda Juvenile Liaison Officer for twelve years from 1981 until his death eight and a half months ago.

Sport was one of his great social loves and he himself excelled at several different sports. He played football with his native Wexford and was a hurler of considerable ability too. He was an exceptionally talented handballer, a sport at which he garnered many honours over the years.

Sgt. David Sheahan, Chairman of the Dungarvan District Garda Social Club, said they had decided that the presentation of a memorial trophy annually to a young sportstar would be a fitting way on honouring Garda Noctor's memory.

"He loved sport, he worked closely with young people in his job, and this annual award will honour his memory in a way we, his colleagues, believe he would like," said Sgt. Sheahan.

The panel of adjudicators comprises Jim Landers of WLR FM, Kieran O'Connor of Waterford Foods plc, Mary Ashe of Ard Scoil na nDéise and "Cork Examiner," journalist, John Murphy.

A "short list" of nominations will be finalised in mid-December and the first "Supreme Sportstar of the Year" for 1993 will be named at a function in Dungarvan in January.

# Council Fail For Second Time To Strike Rate

Mr. NcNally on the implica-tions of introducing a "four day week" at the administrative headquarters in Dungarvan. The possibility of its introduction had been mooted by Fine Gael's Cllr. Gary O'Halloran at the last estimates meeting.
Mr. McNally disclosed

that there could be a saving of £300,000 a year by such a move, but to achieve that there would have to be trade union negotiations, legislative change to protect the superannuation of staff and a complete rescheduling of current procedures to ensure that payments and payroll requirements were met.

The "four day week" suggestion, however, came under stinging attack from several councillors.

"Ridiculous" was how Cllr, Tony Wright described it. "It's totally idiotic" said Cllr. Austin Flynn.

At the outset of the meeting a letter from the Minister of the Environment confirmed members worst fears - there would be no additional funding to the Council in the coming year.

That led to Cllr. Jimmy Ouirke (FF) commenting that the recent deputation they had sent to meet the Minister had been a waste of both time and money. But he warned that unless Central Government provides local authorities with adequate funding to run their affairs they will be in a dire situation out of which, they will never come.

His Fianna Fail colleague, Cllr. Kieran O'Ryan, said he was acutely disappointed with the Minister's negative response. Damage caused to their county roads by the rains of last month had come to £141,000 and the Council simply doesn't have the resources to meet

The County Manager, Mr.

ing that pay increases negotiated at national level will have a significant cost implication for the Council in the coming year. Howev-er, while their rate support grant had been increased by just £95,000 their overall increases, which must be met, run close to £500,000.

Mr. Hurley stressed that he, like the councillors, wants to retain their entire labour force but to do so they will have to provide the money to pay them. "We are trying to provide a level of services which the Department, through its inadequate rate support grant, says we cannot afford", he added.

Mr. Hurley said that if they were to adopt a rate increase of 2.5% and a similar increase for water there would be a financial shortfall of £346,000, while a 5% increase would leave the shortfall at £283,000.

A 1% rate increase will bring in just £13,400 for us, whereas in Cork it will bring in £160,000", he said.

The chairman, Cllr. Con Casey, said it seemed to him that they haven't a snowball's chance of balancing the books.

Cllr. Tony Wright (Democratic Left) then proposed that they abolish service charges in 1994 - a move that would further reduce the Council's income by £750,000. He was seconded by FF's Cllr. Jackie Fahey who stressed that he had always been consistent in his opposition to these charges.

Mr. Paul Clerkin said that over the past decade the water charge collection has been 93% throughout the county.

Mr. McNally warned, however, that such a measure would put the entire organisation at risk.

'If the proposal is carried it will bring fierce unem-Dan Hurley, told the meet- , playment to county Water-

ford", warned Cllr. William McDonnell (FG). "Those who support the abolition of service charges are supporting the mass laying off of Council staff".

The chairman said if the Council is abolished it is the very people they are trying to protect that will become the victims.

Cllr. Wright's proposal for the abolition of service charges was overwhelmingly rejected on a 19-3 vote, with FF's Cllr. Pat Leahy also voting for their aboli-

Cllr. Pat Coffey said it is ironic that at a time when the Government is preparing to go on the biggest spending spree in the history of the State through the National Plan the councillors are racking their brains to try and keep their staff at work. "It is a fiasco", he added.

Replying to Cllr. Pat Leahy, Mr. Clerkin, disclosed that they are losing £65,000 a year on their refuse collection service.

When Cllr. Leahy said they couldn't afford that level of loss, the Manager agreed but said it is one of the prices to be paid to retain the staff.

Finally it was agreed to adjourn to a third meeting next Monday. In the interim the County Manager will prepare a "position paper" in which he will put forward suggestions where cuts might be made in areas that will not affect employment within the Council and on the basis of a rate increase in the area of 4% to

It was also agreed, on the proposal of Cllr. Quirke, to ask the Minister for the Environment to make an advance payment of part of the 1994 rate support which will enable the cashstrapped Council to make savings on its bank charges.

# Get those odd jobs done before

# winter

NOVEMBER is generally the lull before the winter storm and popular with gardeners as a chance to complete odd jobs before really cold weather arrives. Digging is the major task and benefits from weather to come breaking up the turned clods, but the task can be spread over the next few months if you find more pressing tasks for November. Before you do any, remember these dos and don'ts:

Don't walk on and compact the grass if you can help it. It is especially vulnerable and brittle after frost.

Do clean and oil tools before putting them away if you don't think you will need them for the next few months. DO try and support your weight by standing on a board when digging or working on beds and borders.

And here are a few of the jobs you may be facing:

Clearing leaves and garden debris. If left on the lawn they will mark it, while rubbish beneath hedges and bushes allows pests to over-winter and plaque you next year.

Woody waste such as fruit canes and rose cuttings, together with diseased material, should be bagged up for the tip or burned — ash can be dug into borders to replace nutrients lost during the growing season.

Apart from tulips, most spring bulbs should be planted now.

Rub skins to check for mould and cut out any traces before dusting with fungicide. Bad cases are a waste of time and may infect others - throw them into the dust bin.

lawn by cutting and lifting sections with broken edges and rotating to allow the damaged



part to regenerate while facing inwards. Replace bald patches with similar but new turf from other parts of the garden. Turfed lawns can be laid now providing the site has been prepared and is welldrained, but frost is a risk and turf is expensive. Alternatively, sow a new lawn in spring.

Perennials in the herbaceous border should have stems cut back. Sturdier stuff such as golden rod, asters or Michaelmas Daises thrive until late but can now be added to the compost heap.

Rotted compost can be forked into the same borders before covering with a mulch of pulverised bark or chippings to deter weeds.

Plant deciduous trees, shrubs, roses and hedges now. Conifers are best left until spring.

A cool greenhouse can over-winter less hardy plants and he made more effective by lining with 'bubble-wrap' packaging to create a crude double glazing - ideal for fuchsias and gera-

Deciduous climbers such as Virginia Creeper and honeysuckle can be planted now, but allow for the root spread by siting at least a foot away from walls. If you keep fish, watch for ice and carefully lift it out rather than breaking it shock waves can kill fish.

# AMERICAN TRIP

When dealing with Chicago's famous buildings it is hard to know where to begin. However, to me there is one outstanding building, not so much the building itself, but what it contains. It is the "Museum of Science and Industry," which is one of Chicago's great attractions. The museum, founded by Julius Rosenwald, occupies the reconstructed Fine Arts Building of the World's Columbian Exposition of 1893.

In its beautiful setting in Jackson Park, this structure is one of the finest examples of classic architecture in the world. With a total floor area of approximately 14 acres, it is host to an average 3,000,000 visitors who pass through its spacious portals each year.

Here, you can see any. thing from the proverbial 'needle to an anchor." An idea of its size can be seen in the Hall of Flags. Here, suspended from the ceiling like butterflies, hang two of the actual planes used in World War 11, the immortal RAF Spitfire of the Battle of Britain fame and its nearly as famous German rival, the Stuka Bomber. High along the four walls of this room fly the many flags of the United Nations.

Of interest to agriculturists, is the beautiful lay-out in the farm section. Here can be seen the world's first reaper. It is a crude horsedrawn machine with a barefoot boy astride the horse. It was fitted with the original version of the modern section type cutter bar, behind which was attached a kind of platform onto which a man on foot tried to gather into bundles the falling stalks.

As a boy I often worked on a future development of this idea. This was the sideharvesting equipment for making shaves on the old mowing machines. Only

this time I did not have to walk as a seat was placed over the wheel behind the cutter bar. In fact, I became quite expert at the sheaf making, due to the great ease and comfort of the binders. Appropriately enough, this contraption was invented by Cyrus Mc-Cormack, the founder of the great harvester and agricultural machinery empire. Side by side, with this exhibit stands a beautiful replica (life size) of the headquarters section of a modern fully mechanised 160 acre Mid-Western farm. Giving it authentic realism are the rolling fields, fully equipped farm building and fleet of up-to-date agricultural machines in similar operation.

In common with many thousands, I was thrilled to watch an actual birth at the museum. This is constantly taking place at the "Food For Life" exhibit where you can watch the chicks emerging, bit by struggling bit, from their shells. In another exhibit one can see inside a human cell, which is magnified millions of times. Here too, you can walk through a giant replica of the human heart, you can see how its principal parts work, as they do in your body, and you can actually hear it throb! Another very large room

is occupied by a nearly lifesize miniature railroad. It is the old Santa Fe Railroad which straddled the old US from coast to coast. In this model there are five fully automatic operational trains, continually moving through tunnels, in and out of stations, automatic signals, whistles, etc. In fact, one would be excused for thinking that one was standing in a very busy railroad terminus!

Next week I hope to illustrate the museum's greatest pride.

# Full of Eastern Promise



A poussin full of Eastern promise, this dish is easy and economical to prepare, and will evoke gasps of admiration from your guests as you unveil it.

Poussin is perfect for parties, as it looks so different and special, and is so quick to prepare. Simply pop your poussin in the oven around half an hour before you are ready to eat. A single poussin which weighs around 1lb, costs between £1.45 and £1.60 in most retail outlets, and will feed one person very comfortably, or two if you are also providing a starter and pudding. Mogh-

lai Poussin is prepared using a lightly spiced yoghurt marinade perfumed with saffron — redolent of its Persian origins, and very similar to a tandoori style. The dish is best prepared the day before and left to marinade overnight, leaving you with next to nothing to do on the evening of your party.

### MOGHLAI **POUSSIN**

Ingredients: 2 Poussin 1/2 tsp saffron threads 2 tsp mild curry powder or paste Seeds of 1 cardamom pod, crushed 2.5cm/1" piece fresh ginger, peeled and finely chopped 1 clove garlic crushed with 1/2 tsp salt

125g/5oz carton natu-

ral yoghurt

To Garnish

Onion rings, lime or leman wedge, quartered tomatoes.

Preheat oven to 220°C/425°F/Gas mark

Soak saffron in 1 tbsp boiling water for five minutes. Mix spices together and stir in the yoghurt and the saffron i threads and liquid. Slash breasts and legs of the poussins and rub all over with marinade. Cover and leave to stand for at least five hours or overnight in the fridge. Scrape off the excess marinade and roast on a rick set in a roasting dish for 25-30 minutes, until the juices run clear. Serve with rice, onion rings, lime or lemon wedges, tomatoes and a green salad. Serves 2 to 4.

# TAX AMNESTY **SCHEME 1993** How It Works

The Tax Amnesty Scheme 1993 became law on July 14, 1993 and it applies to periods ending on or before April 5, 1991.
The Scheme has two direct

1. — A "15% Incentive Amnesty" which applies to Income Tax, Levies and Capital Gains Tax owed by individuals for periods ending on

or before April 5, 1991. 2. — A "General 2. — A "General Amnesty" which waives interest and penalties on a wide range of taxes outstanding for periods ending on or before April 5, 1991.

Both amnesties are obligatory and must be claimed if applicable.

Probably the most important feature of the "15% In-centive Amnesty" is that it is not confined only to individuals who have undisclosed monies put away over a number of years. It can also be availed of by individuals who have simply fallen into arrears with payment of tax for periods up to

Certain individuals and tax who were subject to investigation or audit or proceedings on May 25, 1993 are excluded from the amnesty.

and including April 5, 1991.

O. — Do I need to bother with the Amnesty Scheme

A. — Yes, if you have unpaid tax liabilities up to year 1990/91 inclusive, you must avail of the amnesty. It is

Q. - What must I do to avail of the amnesty?

A. - You must, by November 30, 1993, if you

are claiming the "15% Incentive Amnesty" give the Chief Special Collector a full and true declaration of your income and chargeable gains coming within the terms of the amnesty on the prescribed Form A-2 and send on to him 15% of the amounts declared by January 14, 1994.

If you are availing of the General Amnesty, you must pay all arrears of taxes up to and including the year 1990/91 to the Collector General on or before January 14, 1994. You must also submit a correct Tax Return for 1992/93 on time.

Q. - Where do I get Form A-2?

A. - From the Chief Special Collector, 26, Harcourt Street, Dublin 2 (Tel. (01) 4783777), or local Tax Office: Tel. (051) 73565.

Q — How can I be sure that confidentiality under the terms of the amnesty will be observed?

A. — The Office of the Chief Special Collector operates completely separate from the normal Revenue operations. The Chief Special Collector and his staff are bound by a statutory declaration of confidentiality. As a result, they are obliged not to disclose, whether to anybody within Revenue or outside, any information on a person's affairs which was obtained in the course of administering the amnesty.

Q. — What are the benefits of the "15% Incentive Amnesty?"

A. - (i) - Where you

have tax due on undeclared income or Capital Gains up to April 5, 1991 or where you have unpaid tax, levies or Capital Gains, a payment of 15% of the amount of income or gains will fully satisfy your liability.

(ii) You will enjoy complete confidentiality.

(iii) You will have the right to block investigation of your tax affairs for the years covered by the

Q. — How can I show that I availed of the "15% Incentive Amnesty?"

A. - On receipt of Declaration on Form A-2 and the settlement amount, the Chief Special Collector will issue you with certificate confirming that the amnesty was availed of.

Q. — Can the benefits of the amnesty be withdrawn?

A. — Yes, if (i) Declarations are not true and correct; (ii) The correct taxes due up to April 5, 1991 are not paid; (iii) You fail to lodge a correct tax return for 1992/93 on time.

The aim of the amnesty is to give those who have failed to meet their tax obligation a final opportunity to put their tax affairs for years up to 1990/91 inclusive in order, without the imposition of interest and penalties.

# Savage Attack On Members Of G.A.A. Supporters Club

A savage attack on members of a GAA supporters club by seven Dungarvan men was described as an absolutely scandalous assault by Judge Diarmuid Sheridan at Waterford Circuit Court last week.

The defendants, armed with sticks and a broken bottle, waded into the Kilmacthomas supporters group after a fund-raising function in a local hotel at Shandon on June 19 last year.

In the ferocious attack, which lasted four minutes, men and women were knocked to the ground and the injuries included broken jaws, a damaged skull, multiple lacerations requiring hospitalisation and surgery.

**CRIED OUT** 

One victim required 39 stitches and was out of work for six weeks while another received 57 stitches for lacerations to the face. A woman who cried out to the gang to stop was knocked to the ground, hit with a stick in the jaw and got a gash on her chin, requiring six stitches.

Six youths, all from Dungarvan, were charged with assault, occasioning actual bodily harm, while another was charged with common assault to a number of Kilmacthomas people. They all pleaded guilty.

Supt. Ray McAndrew told the court that members and supporters of the Kilmacthomas GAA Club came to a local hotel in Dungarvan to raise money for a player who was injured while playing for

**TWELVE PINTS** 

Meanwhile two of the defendants, Brian "Jaffa" Kirby (21) from 18 Cathal Brugha Place and Daniel Wade (23) Shear Street, Abbeyside, both Dungarvan, had been drinking since 8 p.m. on the evening in question. They both admitted drinking in the region of twelve pints which they got for free at a Smithwicks promotion in a pub in

Afterwards they went to a local hotel. While they were there a verbal altercation arose over the Dungarvan men allegedly taking a pint belonging to a Kilmacthomas

The two defendants left the hotel and went up town and collected the rest of the defendants. These were Kirby's uncle, Edmund Kirby (27) 18 Cathal Brugha Place, Tristan Holt (17), 69 Childers Estate, Paul Power (18) 48 Kyne Park, Liam O'Keeffe (19) 111 Childers Estate and Darren Lyons, 16 Byrneville, Dungarvan.

Wade and Kirby briefed them on what had happened. "They told them they got grief in a local hotel," Supt. McAndrew said.

They went to a chipper in the Square for chips on the way back to the hotel and later went into a construction site opposite the entrance to the creamery and with the ex-ception of O'Keeffe, armed themselves with sticks about three feet long and one inch wide. They had also collected a stake from The Square, which had been used to keep trees straight.

Meanwhile, the group of people at the function were told that there was a bus waiting for them at the front of the hotel and they went out.

There were between 12 and 20, half and half men and women, standing outside when they saw the group of Dungarvan men coming from

"Brian "Jaffa" Kirby and Danny Wade were first into the fray. They went for Pat Hayes of Kilmacthomas," he said

Mr. Hayes ducked but another man was struck. At this stage the other members of the gang charged into the Kilmacthomas group. "It lasted for three or four minutes and for that time it was most intense. People were knocked to the ground, some of them girls and women," he said.

A Mr. Bowran was knocked to the ground. He received multiple lacerations and was hit by a number of people. He had to get 39 stitches. Edward Power (27) was also knocked to the ground and received a blow from Edmund Kirby which broke his jaw, damaged his skull and caused multiple

DESPERATION

He was hospitalised in Waterford and Cork Regional hospitals and was out of work for six weeks. In desperation, during the fracas, he jumped over the eight foot tide wall to get away from the gang.

Trevor Whelan (19) received cuts and scars, requiring 57 stitches, as well as bruises to the neck and shoulders. He was badly scarred on the left-hand side of his face and will require plastic surgery.

Michael John Power (31) re-

ceived a ragged laceration which required 30 stitches. There were a number of others who were all injured by

TAKEN ABACK

"They were not expecting anything and were totally taken aback by the ferocity of the attack," Supt. McAndrew said.

The defendant Edmund Kirby had a broken bottle in his hand which was responsible for considerable damage. After the fracas, the defendants threw their weapons over a wall.

When the defendants were interviewed by the Gardai, they admitted their responsi-

Supt. McAndrew said Liam O'Keeffe was responsible for the least part of the fracas.

Having read a Victim Impact Study, Judge Sheridan said the Kilmacthomas Supporters were a "remarkably resilient group." He asked what was the cause for "this blood lust."

SPECIAL TRIBUTE

Judge Sheridan paid special tribute to Supt. McAndrew and the Garda Siochana for their investigation of the incident. "It was absolutely first class," he said.

He described the incident as "an absolute scandalous riot outside the hotel." He said Wade and Kirby were the ring leaders but the others were carried along by "the blood lust."

Mr. Denis Vaughan Buckley, SC for Holt, Lyons and Power, said the incident became a disgraceful fracas. He said his clients were the youngest of those involved and given time would be able to pay £1,000 each to the injured parties.

Judge Sheridan sentenced the three to three years penal servitude, with the warrant not to issue for a year if the defendants are of good behaviour and return to the court next year with £1,000

each as compensation. Liam O'Keefe, who was charged with common assault, was given the Probation Act. "He made a decision not to take a stick as a weapon and he should be rewarded in the light of the entire incident," Judge Sheridan said.

Brian Kirby and Danny Wade were both sentenced to four years penal servitude, with two years suspended on them entering a bond to be of good behaviour for two years.

Edmund Kirby was sentenced to three years penal servitude, with 18 months suspended on him entering a bond to be of good behaviour.

Brendan Crotty, from 23
Congress Villas, Dungarvan, pleaded guilty to the manslaughter of Matthew Monahan (28) from 36 Congress Villas, on December 25, last year.

Judge Diarmuid Sheridan sentenced him to seven vears penal servitude, but suspended three of these on the defendant entering a bond to keep the peace and be of good behaviour.

Waterford Circuit Court was told the deceased was walking home from the pub on the morning in question with his wife. They met with William Kirby and stopped to chat with him at the junction of Cathal Brugha Street and Congress Villas.

The defendant approached the junction and went over and hit the deceased without provocation or excuse. He was struck on a vital artery leading to the brain and suffered a haemorrhage and died almost immediately. Mr. Monahan who was an unemployed labourer, was married with one young child.

Sgt. David Sheehan said the defendant went to the garda station on Christmas morning and when he was told Mr. Monahan had died he said he could not believe it and thought he was having a nightmare.

Judge Diarmuid Sheridan described the case as a terrible tragedy.

"Mr. Crotty did not intend to kill the deceased. But he was engaging in an unlawful act by, with no provocation whatsoever, hitting the deceased. The blow was sufficient to cause his death," he said.

When passing sentence, he said he would take into account the defendant pleaded guilty. He sentenced him as stated and refused leave to appeal the severity of the sentence.

### LATE MR. **EDMUND** CONNOLLY



# VILLAGE TOPICS

### *OUR LOCALITY*

This week we move to the most northern townsland in the parish namely Deelish Mountain. There are no roads or buildings to be found here now but in the late 19th century 23 people lived in the area. The sheep have the land all to themselves among the ferns, heather and hurtleberries or hurts. It is bounded on the west by a tributary of the Deelish River. Three prominent rocks are the only identifiable landmarks. These demarcate the northern part of the townsland. On the slopes of Cruachán (Little Pile) as

seen from Abbeyside this peak predominates. The two lower ridges to the right are in the townsland of Deelishmountain. The first of these is well over 1,000 feet above sea level. On the second, to the right of this, there is a forestry plantation covering the east flank. This is the townsland and parish boundary, the green of the trees showing clearly the part of the ridge which is not in our parish. The highest point here is Farbregagh which means "simulated man." If you look carefully, on the right slope of Cruachán you will

notice a sudden dip in the outline of the slope against the skyline.

This is the most northerly and the highest point in the locality — "Carrig na Fuin-neoige." (The Rock of the Window). Just below and to the right of this the outline if Carraigaul stands out against the skyline. It is translated "Rock of the River Fork." The third prominent rock is "Carrig na Gaoithe" (Rock of the Wind) but this is not visible from Abbeyside.

# FARMERS SNUBBED IN GOVERNMENT/TRADE UNION MEETINGS

"Seeking bi-partisan agreement between Government and Trade Unions on the abolition of the 1% income levy is not the way forward in the development of a consensus approach to a future national programme for economic and employment development strategies," said Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, President of the ICMSA recently.

Mr. O'Dwyer said that he is strongly critical of the Government for allowing this impasse to develop and to gather a life of its own, thereby ignoring the other social partner groups.

"Each social partner group should have the same status. The abolition of the 1% income levy is as much a concern for farmers as it is for PAYE persons. The ICMSA rejected the 1% levy when it was first mooted in this year's Budget. Therefore, any agreement reached on its abolition must be acceptable to farmer representatives.

"I am strongly of the opinion that insistence on the delivery of pre-conditions by one social partner group or another, does not lead to a good climate for national consensus. It is my opinion therefore that the conditions governing the abolition of the 1% income levy should be for discussion and settlement in the context of an overall agreement between all the social partners on a new national economic and development programme.

A native of Ballyreilly, Kate was a member of the well known Tobin family, a family who have won far-flung fame for Gaeltacht na Rinne as singers, especially in the sean-nós style.

A sister of the renowned Nioclás Toibín, Kate herself appeared on many television programmes and indeed no less than Tony McMahon himself remarked that Kate was the best traditional singer he ever heard.

In 1937 Kate won the sean-nós competition at the Oireachtas. The year previously she had the privilege of singing for the Taoiseach Eamonn de Valera when he visited Coláiste na Rinne for a special function.

Her wonderful singing voice was always appreciated and over the years she sang on many a link-up by telephone from London on Radio Na Gaeltachta. Predeceased by her husband Con in 1964, Kate was aged 68 years and had spent most of her life in London.

# "Great Give-Away" Condemned At Democratic Left Meeting

There was very strong condemnation of the "audacity" of the Council to hand over free of charge a £50,000 building. The Council, it was suggested, had lost "its moral authority" to levy such taxes on the people of Dungarvan. Christy Power P.R.O.


# ICMSA Meets Department On Sheep Dipping

Members of the ICMSA Sheep Committee, led by Chairman, Eamon O'Rourke, met senior officials in the Veterinary Division of the Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry recently. Among the issues which the ICMSA raised were: identification regulations in respect of animal movement, the scrapie monitoring programme and the contentious issue of sheep dipping.

Mr. O'Rourke called on the Department to fulfil the commitment made to the Association in June 1992 to deregulate sheep dipping by the end of 1993. Mr. O'Rourke said that the compulsory sheep dipping scheme must be abolished as promised by the Minister and farmers given responsibility for dipping their own sheep.

"The ICMSA position is clear on this issue. We want sheep dipping deregulated and that sheep scab would continue to be a notifiable disease. Sheep dipping is good husbandry practice and the majority of farmers dip their sheep in the summer months to control fly strike. It is ridiculous that farmers have to pay someone assigned by the County Councils to supervise the dipping of their sheep," Mr. O'Rourke told the Department.

The ICMSA delegation said that there should be spot checks at marts and factories for sheep scab and that anyone found with diseased animals should be unable to trade until the disease is cleared up.







# County Waterford I.C.M.S.A. News

very successful Milk Symposium which was held in Lawlors Hotel, Dungarvan, last week.

The very well attended meeting was chaired by County Chairman, John Cusack and the guest speakers included Mr. Gerry Higgins, Department of Agriculture, Mr. Michael O'Neill and Mr. Niall Cullen, Waterford Foods and Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, President I.C.M.S.A.

Mr. Higgins, who is the Department official who will be inspecting dairies, gave a very informative talk on what is required by dairy farmers to meet the New Regulations. His advice to farmers, especially those under 50,000 gallons, was not to do any structural work until the inspector calls, as grant aid will be available to suppliers up to a certain gallonage.

Mr. Michael O'Neill, Waterford Foods, said that the Co-op in conjunction with Teagasc and the Department will be holding open days on farms in order to give practical advice on what is required. Mr. O'Neill said that Waterford Foods is 200,000 gallons over quota at present.

The County Waterford insight into the problems associated with somatic cell count (S.C.C.). He went on to say that the Co-op have worked very close with dairy farmers and over the next six months will continue to do so where an individual farmer has a S.C.C. problem. His advice to farmers was to have cows individually tested in order to find the problem

Mr. Tom O'Dwyer covered a wide range of issues which included C.A.P. and G.A.T.T. and the 5.3 million gallons of quota which is being allocated to small scale milk producers. He pointed out that there are two major anomalies in the criteria for this allocation.

Mr. O'Dwyer said the obligation for farmers to have acquired additional quota in the past number of years and by confining distribution to farmers with under 70 'map' acres is unfair and inequitable.

"For an example there are many small suppliers who could not afford to acquire additional quota, and there are some Co-op areas where additional quota was not available for farmers. Therefore, we believe thatfarmers who clearly demonstrated their commitment to milk production by delivering at least 85% of their quota in past years, should not be bound by this restriction."

"The restriction of 70 map acres is not equitable as 70 map acres in one part of the country can not be equated with similar acreage elsewhere, therefore, we believe that this restriction should by 70 adjusted acres," concluded Mr. O'Dwyer.

This was followed by a question and answer session. The winner of the £50 door voucher sponsored by Waterford Foods was Mr. Tom Hickey. The County Chairman, John Cusack, thanked the panel of speakers and the large gathering for coming to the meeting.

garding the payments of suckler cow, beef cow and special beef premia and sheep headage, Mrs. Ann Kirwan, County Secretary of Waterford ICMSA said that ICMSA have been in contact with the local office in Waterford.

From the information received from the Department, she said that the majority of these payments will reach farmers over the next few weeks.

Some payments are based on a 60 per cent advance payment on the Spring 1993 and June 1993 applications for the 10 and 22 month special beef premi-

"In the event of farmers not receiving their payments before Christmas they should contact the local Agriculture Department office to query the delay as there may be some problem," concluded Mrs.

"Farmers in particular and indeed owners of property generally should realise that their legal responsibilities towards people entering their properties have not changed," said Mr. Tom Hickey, County Waterford ICMSA PRO.

Mr. Hickey said that the legislation placing a heavy duty of care on farmers towards those entering their properties has not been changed despite the commitments received by ICMSA from the previous and present Taoiseach and from the previous Minister

'The ICMSA will accept that reasonable responsibility may be attached to farmers in respect of invited persons. We will not accept any responsibilities towards uninvited persons," said Mr. Hick-

It is the ICMSA view that changes in the present state of legislation governing occupiers liability are extremely urgent if farmers are expected to give access to the various categories of people who want access to their lands.

"If the legislation is altered to clearly and definitely remove the burden of liability from farmers, no restrictions will be required.

"Those who previously said that the law did not need to be changed carry blame for the delay in getting satisfactory change implemented.

"Until such time as satisfactory alterations to the present legislation is enacted, farmers will serve the best interests of themselves and their families by restricting access to their holdings only to those who are necessary to the business of the farm," concluded Mr. Hickey.

As Dungarvan prepare for their bid to write their names into the modern history books by taking four titles in a row, we take a look back at some interesting facts and statistics.

Neither Dungarvan or the Nire were in contention when Kilrossanty, won their eleventh county title, defeating Ferrybank 1-10 to 1-7. But on the same day Dungarvan minors defeated Clann na Gael (1-9 to 0-3) and it is interesting to record that after ten years only four of that winning team i.e. David Burke, Derek Lyons, Dermot Callaghan and Morrie Ferncombe are still regulars on the senior side. David Burke and Derek Lyons who played centre-half back and right half forward respectively on that day are now the midfield partnership and both Dermot Callaghan, left-half forward and Morrie Ferncombe at full forward on the minor team of 1983 are still playing in the same positions.

Others from the 1983 panel who are still on the present senior group are Peter Quealy, Tony Hamilton and Denis McGrath.

Interestingly, the Nire were in the news also in 1983 when winning the new-look intermediate football championship. Having been beaten in the senior championship qualifying rounds, they played great football and took the title by beating Ballyduff East by 0-10 to 0-4. Unfortunately I have been unable to unearth the Nire team who won that day (if Sunday's final ends in a draw I'll produce it for the replay).

**KNOW YOUR** GAME

Question — If a player is injured in the course of a game should the referee automatically stop the play or not?

Answer - If there is no danger to the injured; er, he may wait until the bat, goes out of play, but not necessarily.
