WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL

Dan Hurley "Man Of Vision And Foresight"

At an historic meeting of Waterford County Council last Monday, the retiring County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley said adieu to the Council members at what was his last ever Council meeting before his retirement as County Manager on January 6th 1994.

In his farewell speech to the elected public representatives he had worked with for 13 years, Mr. Hurley said he had enjoyed living and working in Co. Waterford but stated, however, that 10 or 11 years as County Manager should be the maximum as "things get repetitive" he added.

"It's a sad day for me", Mr. Hurley remarked and said he was further saddened at the way powers have been taken away from local Government. "The demise of Local Government is beginning to emerge" he declared. United in their praise, many tributes were made to Mr. Hurley by the Councillors, the County Engineer John O'Flynn and Mr. John Murphy on behalf of the members of the press.

The Chairman, Cllr. Con Casey, expressed sadness on the occasion but said the sadness was tempered by the Co. Manager's own assurance that he is leaving at a time when he is fit and able to tackle other assignments. Cllr. Casey de-

scribed the 'tremendous success' and the 'vibrancy, growth and expansion' which County Waterford had experienced under the County Manager. In difficult financial times the County Manager had started a 'whole new era' in Tramore with Splashworld, retained the Council's employment figures with the development of tourism and industry and many other major projects such as the state of the art East Waterford Regional water supply scheme, the Heritage Centre in Lismore, the programme of public lighting in the

county and the library facilities which the Chairman remarked were "improved beyond all recognition".

Attributing these successful county projects and more to the County Manager, Cllr. Casey wished him and his wife every success and said he was sorry to see him go.

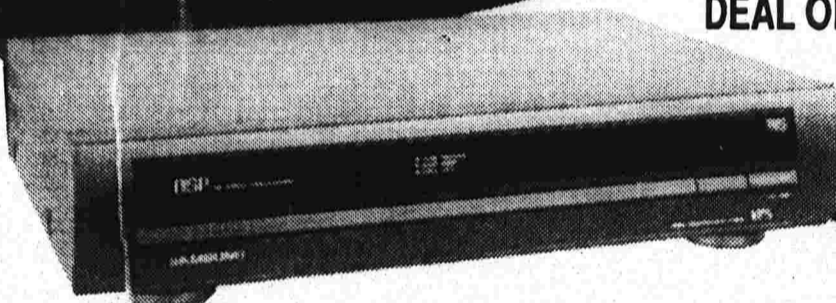

The lucky winners are — Jason Gough, 82 Springfield, Dungarvan, Dolly Kiely, Curradoon House, Ballinamult and Ann Marie

Power, 19 Mitchell Street, Dungarvan. They were drawn from the thousands of entries received over the past two months since the Christmas special game was launched. The winners will meet in a Dublin hotel on Friday, December 17, where dinner, bed and breakfast will be provided. Then early on Sat-

urday, December 18 they will be brought by bus to the airport where they will fly to Lapland. Commenting that the trip to Lapland comes from the unclaimed prizes, the National Lottery Director said that the response to the game was tremendous and that the winners will have a trip to remember. VILLAGE TOPICS

1930: WESTERN FINAL

For reasons that are not now very clear Abbeyside affiliated under the name Abbey Rovers in 1930, entering a junior hurling team only. Michael Morrissey was Club Secretary.

The Western Convention decided to run the junior championships on a Graded System. Among the reasons were a certain disparity of standard which gave inexperienced teams little chance against the better sides in the early rounds. If, however, the weaker and less experienced played off among themselves, the winner would have gained in strength, experience and fitness, so as to stand a better chance of beating any of the better teams.

Some clubs at times wished to enter two teams in junior, as Tallow did in hurling in 1930. And the second strings of senior clubs were often out of their

depth with the best juniors.

Four teams were graded "A" in hurling:

Tallow No. 1; Kilmac-thomas; Dungarvan; Four-milewater.

There were five teams in the "B" grade: Tallow No. 2; Cappagh; Ballyduff; Rockfield; Abbey Rovers who received a first round bye.

The winners of Grade "A" to meet the winners of Grade "B" in the Western final.

In the Western final the score was Tallow No. 1 2-3 Abbey Rovers 1-2.

At Cappoquin 5.10. Ref.: Joe Mason (Capp.).

OBJECTION

Abbey Rovers were very aggrieved at the state of the pitch for the Western final and objected against the result on the grounds that the pitch was not lined or in proper condition. The Board decided to seek a supplementary report from the referee on the matter, but that was rendered unnecessary when a Tallow counter-objection was upheld. It claimed that N. Noonan was illegal not having been reinstated after a previous suspension.

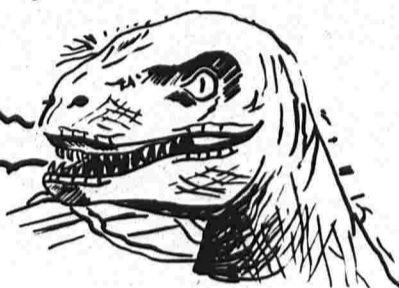

Tumultuous Reception For John Treacy At C.B.S. Primary School

Less than twenty four hours after his magnificent victory in the All-Ireland senior cross country inter-counties championship, John Treacy returned to school last Monday.

The former twice world cross country champion and Olympic silver medalist was given a tumultuous reception by 300 children at St. Joseph's C.B.S. Primary School in Dungarvan when he presented the school's cross country winter league medals which were sponsored by the Dungarvan District Garda Siochana.

Looking as fit as the proverbial fiddle after his previous day's exertions when he destroyed the field to land his seventh individual national title, John was welcomed to the school by the Principal, Mr. Maurice Kearney.

"It isn't every day that we have one of Ireland's finest and best loved sportsmen in our school," said Mr. Kearney. "It is a great honour that John has seen fit to take

time off and come and present the medals."

He told the boys it was a day they will never, ever forget. "Twice world champion, four times an Olympian, an Olympic silver medalist, and seven times national champion, Irish people at home and abroad are proud of John Treacy and his great sporting achievements," Mr. Kearney added.

Garda Inspector Michael Blake said that when the gardai sponsored the medals for the school, little did they think that they would be presented by one of the greatest Irish athletes of all time.

"Looking at him winning his seventh national title, I believe John Treacy is as good now as he was in the late 1970's and 1980's," said Inspector Blake.

"You have, and continue to be, a great inspiration to the youth of Ireland. You have provided great sporting moments for a nation to cherish," Inspector Blake told John.

Before presenting the medals to the boys, the man of the moment recalled how it had all began for him at the age of twelve. "Athletics has since changed my life," he said.

John spoke of his delight that the Garda Siochana had sponsored the medals for the school's cross country league and said there is nothing like sport to keep young boys and girls off the streets and out of trouble.

He then had this advice for the boys — "study hard, listen to your parents and teachers, enjoy your sport even if you are not good at it, get involved because sport is great for your life, health, and team spirit."

Tony Ryan, a member of the teaching staff and a former team colleague of John Treacy on Waterford All-Ireland winning cross country teams, thanked the gardai for their sponsorship of the medals and for the positive way they are involving themselves in the school and in the community as a whole.

PRESENTATION

Before taking his departure Mr. Kearney made a presentation to John of a framed newspaper report of his first All-Ireland cross country championship win at Under-15 level. Coincidentally that was on December 12, 1971 — twenty two years to the day before he captured his seventh senior title on the home soil of St. Augustine's College, Dungarvan last Sunday.

Also present at Monday's presentation were Sgt. Tom O'Grady, Garda Eddie Fitzpatrick, Garda Juvenile Liaison Officer, Fr. Conor Kelly, C.C., the teaching staff at St. Joseph's and members of the Parents Council.

John, whose return home for last Sunday's national championships was sponsored by the Dungarvan-based Waterford Foods plc, returns to the United States today.

Bord Pleanala Hear Marathon 9-Hour Oral Appeal

The vexed and controversial proposal of Cork Communications Ltd. to erect a 25 feet high microwave transmitter and ancillary buildings on an historic location known locally as Seefin on the Comeragh Mountains, was the subject of a marathon nine-hour oral hearing conducted by An Bord Pleanala at a packed Dungarvan Court House last Thursday.

The hearing, which was presided over by Mr. Michael Walsh of Bord Pleanala, began at 10 a.m. and only finally concluded at 8.30 p.m. after two periods of recess.

Waterford County Council, through a decision of the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, granted planning permission — with a number of conditions attached — to Cork Communications to erect the transmitter and ancillary buildings at Seefin — reportedly the seat of the mythical Irish legend Fionn McCumhail.

The most vigorous opponents of the proposal, the Comeragh Environmental Protection Association (CEPA), the Comeragh Mountaineering Club, the Office of Public Works, and others brought that decision before An Bord Pleanala by way of appeal.

As a consequence, the Bord decided on last Thursday's oral hearing.

Officially represented at the hearing were the Comeragh Environmental Protection Association and its legal adviser Mr. Joseph P. Gordon, Solr., the Comeragh Mountaineering Club, and the Waterford Branch of An Taisce.

The Office of Public Works was not represented but did send an apology for its inability to be present.

Cork Communications Ltd. was legally represented by Mr. Jerry Healy, B.L. (instructed by J. W. O'Donovan, Solrs.)

There was a veritable maze of submissions made to the hearing which was not without its moments of acrimony.

The CEPA case, in particular, against the Cork Communications proposal was as detailed as it was meticulously prepared and presented, although both representatives of the Comeragh Mountaineering Club also presented very detailed submissions.

Internationally renowned balladeer Liam Clancy of the famous Clancy Brothers, was one of those to make a submission on behalf of CEPA, and he told the hearing that the plans by Cork Communications Ltd.

to erect the transmitter on the Comeragh Mountains amounted to official environmental terrorism.

At one stage during the hearing, Mr. William Connors on behalf of the Comeragh Environmental Protection Association, handed in 2800 signatures of people opposed to the transmitter.

Liam Clancy also told the hearing of the "intense anger" felt by the local people over the proposed erection of the transmitter, not just because they believed it would be a positive health hazard but because of the visual destruction it would bring to a mountain that is of such importance to the entire county Waterford.

Mr. Clancy urged Bord Pleanala to take seriously on board the "stupidity and futility" of pursuing the company's proposed course of action which is for the enrichment of a small number of people. "I find the whole thing very sinister," he added.

It took five hours to hear all the submissions of those opposing the erection of the transmitter and during that time the presiding inspector, Mr. Walsh, listened to the most scathing criticism of Cork Communications and of the original Waterford County Council decision to give the development the planning go-ahead.

The company was accused of selecting the most "insensitive and ill-chosen site" possible for the erection of the transmitter, while the hearing was told that "the scale of Cork Communications' unauthorised activities is simply astounding."

While the eventual decision to grant planning permission was given by the Waterford County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, the Council's own Chief Planning Officer, Mr. James Shine, told the hearing that his recommendation to the Planning Dept. had been that planning permission should not be granted.

"I considered that the Cork Communications proposal would be a material and serious contravention of the County Development Plan," said Mr. Shine.

The hearing was told that the County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn, was also opposed to the development.

When all the submissions opposing the company's proposal to erect the transmitter had been heard, Mr. Jerry Healy, BL (instructed by J. W. O'Donovan, Solrs.) for Cork Communications launched a blistering attack on what he described as "the prejudicial, insulting and wholly irrelevant evidence" that had been tendered.

Mr. Healy referred to "the downright sweeping attacks" on Cork Communications which had been launched without a shred of evidence to back them up.

The first submission to the hearing was given by Mr. Eamonn Griffin, Secretary of the Waterford Branch of An Taisce.

In the last of eight specific points, he said An Taisce was concerned that the effects of microwave radiation from the proposed development on the public at large was not sufficiently well known to allow it to proceed.

Mr. Michael Murphy, Chairman of the Comeragh Environmental Protection Association, in a very detailed submission, spoke of the absence of planning consent being "no barrier" whatsoever to Cork Communications. "Yet the same company has taken many injunctions against other people to stop them transmitting on the evidence that they weren't licensed."

Mr. Murphy said Cork Communications had advanced no compelling argument in favour of the Seefin location on the Comeraghs for their proposed development.

He spoke of the Waterford County Manager's decision in granting planning permission to the company as "flying in the face of his own engineers, and at that time some 1400 objectors from all over the county."

"How then did the County Manager make such a horrendous and monstrous decision," Mr. Murphy asked.

Other detailed submissions against the Cork Communications proposal were tendered by Mr. Scot Simons, Mr. Michael McGrath, Mr. John Miller, a member of the Carrigaline-based South Coast Community TV, Mr. Mark Chapman, Mr. Tony Harrington, Mr. Sean Murphy and Professor Louis Gleeson, a doctor of medicine and philosophy.

Further submissions were also made on behalf of the Comeragh Mountaineering Club by its Chairman Mr. Joe Power and Mr. Declan McGrath, a qualified environmental scientist.

Professor Gleeson claimed that investigations seemed to show that humans central nervous systems are most vulnerable from radiation emissions.

"There is radiation now from everything, and the question is — how much more can we take before we go off our rockers," he said.

Professor Gleeson said MMDS should be fully researched before people are subjected to it. He added that Cork Communications must undertake "appropriate research" so as to be able to guarantee a clean bill of health before pursuing with

any MMDS system.

Before going into evidence on behalf of the company, Mr. Healy, BL, stressed that Cork Communications did not intend to engage in MMDS broadcasting on the Comeraghs at Seefin. Rather would the transmitter be used to transmit stations from Keepers Hill in Northern Ireland to its mast near Cork Airport.

This was confirmed by Mr. John Moran, Cork Communications co-ordinating officer, who told the hearing that they have no immediate plans for MMDS broadcasting from Seefin. He added that it was company policy to continually improve the quality of its service.

Mr. Moran said that through the Seefin transmitter they intended to bring BBC1 (Northern Ireland), BBC2, Ulster Television and Channel 4 into Cork. They had had no complaints from Bord Failte about their proposed development that he was aware of.

Regarding the health aspect, Mr. Moran said the company had commissioned a study of the effects of such a transmission link and this had been undertaken by Tel-Tech, which is part of the Eolas organisation at UCC.

Mr. Aidan Murphy of Tel-Tech, said the radiation level from the Seefin transmitter would be considerably lower than required under the most rigorous international standards.

Mr. Michael Grace, B.A., MSc., of Brady, Martin, Shipman, Landscape Architects, said that while the area of Seefin is one of high amenity, he did not believe the Cork Communications transmitter would obstruct any view.

"The transmitter," he said, "would be only 7.8 metres in height and would have a very minor visual impact, while the impact would be reduced still further if the ancillary building is below ground level."

Mr. Grace repeated that he believed that overall the impact of the development would be minimal and would certainly not be sufficient to refuse the company's planning application.

The hearing concluded with trenchant final "summing up" by Mr. Healy, BL, on behalf of Cork Communications, by Mr. Gordon Solr. for CEPA, and by Mr. Power for the Comeragh Mountaineering Club.

The inspector, Mr. Walsh, thanked all sides for their presentations at what he said had been a full and frank hearing, while Mr. Gordon responded by thanking Mr. Walsh for the courteous and considerate way he had treated everyone involved.

The decision from Bord Pleanala will be given in due course.

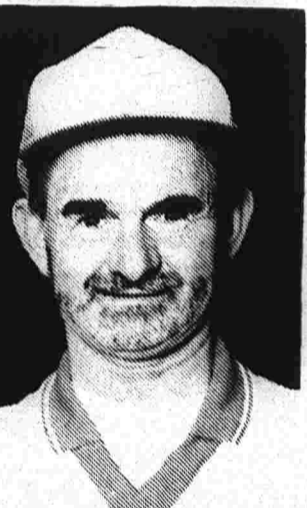

John Treacy was indeed a God send, for the sporting two thousand who spread themselves around the Friary field last Sunday as they witnessed the Olympic Silver medalist's second coming when he won the Buckler National Senior Inter-Counties Cross Country championship after an eleven year absence, he having won the event in Kilbarry, Waterford back in December 1982.

SEVENTH TITLE

The Villierstown runner, whose trip home across the Atlantic was sponsored by Waterford Foods, Yoplait Division, was chasing his seventh title last Sunday but in truth it was the rest of the runners in the two hundred man field who were doing the chasing as the thirty six year old Treacy showed his hand from an early stage. He forced the pace with Galway runner Richard Mulligan and after one of the five two thousand metres laps they were clear of the pack.

By the three thousand metres point the New Balance athlete had gone clear and after two laps he held down a ten second lead. From then on it was a typical Treacy run, the gap widened, the crowd responded and it was both a trip down memory lane and a lesson on the road of reality, that being, that John Treacy can still produce the goods. After three laps the gap to Seamus Power

(Clare), who had taken up and eventually finished second place, was nineteen seconds. At the bell, the out on his own Treacy was thirty seconds clear and after coming down the deafening finishing tunnel the Waterford winner held a thirty four second advantage.

SPECIAL OCCASION

For the many people present John Treacy's appearance and performance was indeed a special occasion. Waterford people a plenty crossed their sporting loyalties to pay tribute to Ireland's greatest distance runner ever. After the race a contented Treacy said "I received a tremendous response around the course". Any why not? Home is the hero. Ní bheidh a leithéid ann arís.

TO THE DAY

Twenty two years ago to the day John Treacy won his first All-Ireland Cross Country championship at Bagenalstown, Co. Carlow when he won the U-15 3,000 metres title. After last Sunday's performance nobody can confidently say that the scenario is complete, that this latest victory is his last Irish title. In the meantime last Sunday's win was a real seasonal Treacy treat and one which will be talked about for a long time to come.

THE POINT

In a recent annual, a contributor wrote about the importance of having a good place-kicker on a team and how the expertise of a skilled kicker of frees can make the difference between winning and losing a game, or even a county title.

This point has been exemplified so many times in recent years that dozens of examples can be given where games in both football and hurling were lost because of poor free taking. Here in the Waterford championship the point made here was very clearly demonstrated in several vital games where only a score separated the sides at the finish.

If we look at the football we find many examples and these include matches involving the leading sides.

Take the champions, the Nire, for instance. They have a couple of splendid place kickers and anyone who watched Michael Guiry during the year will agree that they are well serviced in this area, but the point I make is that a single score could have changed history one way or the other for the club. In the end a single point did change history for them. They had many near misses that could have spelt serious trouble for the team and I recall their narrow escape against Kilmacthomas (1-8 to 1-7) in their first game. A single point would have benefitted themselves

or Kilrossanty when they played a draw in their important tie midway through the championship. A single point would have been a big help to the Nire when they played Dungarvan at a later stage of the league section of the championship. That particular point helped Dungarvan along the way, but its loss would have impeded their progress to the final. (Incidentally, the score here was: Dungarvan 2-7, Nire 1-9 and when they met in the county final it was the same score only that the Nire were 2-7 and Dungarvan 1-9). There are other examples involving clubs who were not engaged in the play-off section, where a score would have made a great difference between winning and losing.

We had many instances as well in our hurling championship this year and ever before the league section was played out, a single score would have made a big difference to the result.

The first of the drawn games played in 1993 was the game involving Colligan and Portlaw (Portlaw 0-11, Colligan 1-8). Neither of these clubs were involved at the close of the championship, but both will tell you how they would have benefitted from a single point at that stage (it was the first game for both clubs).

Mount Sion could have benefitted by a single point on the Saturday evening when Dungarvan pipped them (1-10 to 0-12) and the famous Monastery side breathed a sigh of relief when they in turn pipped Fourmilewater (0-17 to 3-7) midway through the championships. Again a single point would have helped Mount Sion or passage when they ended up all square after a thriller which produced a scoreline: Passage 1-7, Mount Sion 0-10.

But I suppose Roanmore were, more than others, the club who will rue their free taking which certainly cost them dearly this year. At the closing stages they lost by a single point to Passage (2-8 to 2-7) and still qualified but were beaten by a single point by Lismore (1-10 to 0-12) in the semi-final at Cappoquin.

Amazingly, both the county finalists escaped by a single point along the way and then went on to contest a great final, which again was decided by a single point, when Lismore survived on an 0-8 to 0-7 scoreline.

The junior football championships in both codes show the number of games in which a single score would have helped out in the narrow escapes and near miss situations. Kilgobinet and Seana Phobal in junior football have stories to tell about their missed chances at the end stages of the foot-

ball championship. They played a very exciting draw at Cappoquin in the semi-final and the replay a week later gave Kilgobinet victory by just one point.

Kilgobinet were eventually beaten in football, but it was a bigger disappointment when they went under at the final stage in hurling to Clashmore — again by a single point (0-9 to 1-5).

In intermediate hurling the championship also produced cliff-hangers and one of the matches that I recall and which was also one that could have been decided by a single point, was the Clonea versus Stradbally tie which ended in a draw: Stradbally 1-7, Clonea 0-10. They eventually met in the county final which was won by Stradbally.

I cannot leave the subject without referring to one of the best finals of the year which was also decided by a single point and the big crowd who watched Newtown and Ring being separated by a single point after an intermediate classic at Stradbally some weeks ago in the intermediate football grade. It was 0-12 to 0-11 on the same day on which Waterford footballers beat Carlow by 0-12 to 0-11 in the National League.

The above might help to illustrate the enormous importance of a single point in a match and the need for a good free-taker.

MOTIONS

The majority of the 15/16 motions submitted relate to championship structures and I hope to publish these in full next week in order that clubs, holding their A.G.M.'s over Christmas, will be able to think about them. One comment that I feel like making here is that if we are inundated with motions concerning the championships, then is it not clear that a whole lot of clubs are not satisfied with things as they are.

From speaking to many clubs and individual members, the message seems to come across that a championship divided into groups of about four sections and played on a league/knock-out system, is coming very much into favour. I note that Limerick, who are presently in the process of restructuring their county senior championships, are going for something on the above lines, having tried the many other systems.

One of the clubs who have shown their concern in the matter is Ardmore, among others, and they have submitted motions of a very interesting nature, relating to all our championships.

Declan Barron is a man who has many times done a lot of research into championship structures, and he has outlined to me a plan that Ardmore are putting forward for change. I will be publishing this next week, but basically what they are proposing is (in relation to both senior championships) that they both be played in four groups A/B/C/D. Three games

each; Winners of each group to qualify for Phelan and Sargent Cup semi-finals and also for senior championship quarter finals, etc.

Their submissions are lengthy and embody all aspects and stages of each championship and they go on to appoint dates for both county finals. They are certainly well worthy of serious consideration as will be seen.

Lismore too, are back with their motions relating to the senior hurling championship which suggest that this be played in four groups before moving out to the knockout stages.

Readers will be given all the details on both next week.

The annual arguments about county convention not having the right to decide on the structures of the championship, is being made again and again. This rule has been there for half a century, but we have been doing things differently, until it was pointed out officially that we were wrong in having things this way.

In many counties, championship structures are discussed at county convention and then passed on to the controlling body, which is the County Board, by way of recommendation. In most counties, too, recommendations from convention are accepted and acted upon by County Boards, but to a great extent the wishes of convention in such matters are ignored by County Board when it comes to discussing the way in which we should run our championships.

There is logic in the submission that junior clubs should not be allowed to decide on how the senior championships should be run anymore than senior clubs should be given the right to decide on systems for running junior championships. Junior clubs outnumber senior and intermediate clubs by a long way. So there is some logic in the rule about these matters being decided by Boards and not by conventions.

Gael Sport Annual

The Christmas annual is on sale in the shops and those who read the publication will agree that it is probably the best issue since publication began some years ago. There is something to suit everyone's taste including memorable moments from Derry's historic run, optimism by the Lee which deals entirely with the record of Jack Murphy

of Kerry, the hurling miracle in Wicklow, junior Gael-sport and a host of other very interesting articles in the 122 pages of delightful reading.

Of particular interest to Waterford readers is the full page devoted to our hurling prospects. It is entitled "Persistence the Key" and it includes a fine colour photograph of the senior hurling team. The writer is satisfied after our performances against Wexford, Down and Tipperary, the devastating blow of losing to Kerry in the championship is now behind us and we are facing 1994 as a whole new challenge. It is certainly a good buy at £4.

That too is available and as usual contains information on a range of subjects as well as dates for all four provincial championships as well as the dates for the championships at semi-final and final level.

Last year the Association Diary was a sellout shortly after Christmas and many of our people who sought the issue were disappointed.

The County Board was represented by the Chairman Eamon O Murchú and Secretary Seamus Grant.

Unique Year For Ardmore Juveniles

In last week's issue I published the honours list for the year and in writing in Ardmore for three underage titles, I didn't give them due credit for being on a par with Lismore in the number of titles won over the season.

Lismore are well accustomed to success, but for a small club like Ardmore to achieve such great success is certainly something which deserves mention and special credit. Enormous work has been done with these young players over the past number of years by a small group of dedicated people who kept on working despite many disappointments.

One of their proudest moments this year was when they won the 'A' under-14 football county championship and thereby qualified to represent Waterford in the Peil na nOg Feile and reach the national semi-finals. They lost after a splendid game to Bray, who were the eventual winners.

Ardmore juniors won the county championship in 1979 (the year the Pope came) and that co-incidentally was the year in which all the players on their present under 14 football team were born.

With his kind of back-up, success at minor and adult level, cannot be very far off.

It is worth noting that two of their three championship victories this year, were in under-16 and under-14 hurling.

DIVISION OF THE SPOILS

It is worth recording that of the 20 championships completed to date, a total of ten were won by each division. For a number of clubs this was a special year as it marked their first success in the particular grade in which they competed.

Notably, the Nire, who were first formed 64 years ago and after ups and downs that sometimes caused much frustration, they took the senior title, when beating the great three-in-a-row Dungarvan champions.

Stradbally, too, enjoyed their best every season in hurling and finished with the intermediate hurling title for their first time, thus allowing the players to rub shoulders with the upper crust in the senior grade next year.

It was a rewarding year, as well for Newtown whose years of frustration came to an end when they won the classic intermediate football final when defeating An Rinn by a single point in a thriller at Stradbally.

Kilmacthomas had to survive a number of epic encounters before edging home in a nailbiting finish in the East before beating Clashmore in a splendid junior hurling county final.

St. Saviours, certain to be a force in hurling in the years to come, broke new ground when taking the county minor hurling title for their first time. They finished off a great battle with Mount Sion to qualify for a county final meeting with underage specialists, Lismore and survived by the minimum.

Readers of St. Oliver's notes every week don't have to be asked what winning the minor hurling county 'B' title for their first time since they were first formed way back in 1975, meant to St. Oliver's. One of their group told me some weeks ago that St. Oliver's were always good but never before, good enough.

Yes, 1993 will be a year to remember for those first timers.

STORM DAMAGE

Association property suffered quite a bit throughout the county during the storms early this month. Worst damage was done to the stand at Walsh Park when the roof was blown out on the roadway outside. The field committee worked quickly in having the road closed off and luckily no one was injured. The replacement of the stand at Walsh Park is listed as part of the planned redevelopment and since it was no longer a safe part of the structure, the damage might have been a blessing in disguise. The Walsh Park field committee are currently in the process of preparing a submission for planning permission.

Cappoquin and Butlerstown goal-posts also suffered damage, but nothing more serious.
