councillors in voting to dispose of Council-owned property at Davitt's Quay to private developers without charge. And he indicated his willingness to convene another meeting to rescind the decision if they wished to do so.

Cllr. Billy Kyne said it would have cost the Council between £20,000 and £25,000 just to make the property safe. As part of the 'deal" the private developers would refurbish the entire property and would then provide 600 square feet of it free of charge to the Council for a period of twenty five years.

Cllr. Kyne said the Council would benefit to the tune of about £3,000 annually in rates from the refurbished property. Cllr. Wright's letter to the press had cast aspersions on the integrity of the other eight councillors and had suggested that they had accommodated the private developers by a deal

that would have no benefits for the UDC.

"I resent the tone and tenor of that letter," said Cllr. Kyne, who added that the derelict property involved was a liability on the back of the Urban Council.



Waterford Foods Teams Winning Energy System

Waterford Foods had a remarkable record in the national energy awards (ETA) sponsored by ESB. Their Dungarvan plant took the top prize and its sister operation in Virginia, Co. Cavan, won the regional award for the North East.

Success for Waterford Foods was founded on huge savings achieved in both plants as a result of meticulously planned energy systems. Dungarvan, for example, with a turnover in dairy products of £70 million per annum, has saved £420,000 per annum or the equivalent of 0.7p per gallon of milk processed.

At a function in Dungarvan on Friday, December 17, company chairman John Barry congratulated the relevant team, led by John Harnedy, on its commitment to efficiency. He said that closest attention to detail in reducing unit production costs was an essential element of a very competitive dairy industry. It would take on new significance in the context of more liberal trade within the new GATT agreement.

Waterford Foods has a long track record in improving energy efficiency — in 1984 it installed the first combined heat and power (CHP) plant in the Irish dairy industry and in 1988 was among the first in Ireland to install ice bank refrigeration and compressed air precooler units.

The CHP plants consisted of a boiler and a back pressure tandem steam turbine set with a maximum electrical output of 1900 kw. As the turbine output fluctuated with the amount of milk being processed, which varied seasonally, the set could not operate to its full capacity. In addition the power input to boiler feed pump was fairly constant even at low steam loads.

installed a second tandem set which incorporates a condenser and has a maximum output of 1 mw. A variable speed drive was installed on the boiler feed pump cutting its running costs significantly. Operating both turbine sets increased the load factor of the boiler and the original tandem set improving their efficiencies dramatically.

The first six months operating experience has been very satisfactory and the project is on target to meet projected annual savings. Annual electricity generation on site will increase to 12 million kwh. The final installed cost, inclusive of an EC grant, came to approximately £800,000, giving a simple payback of just over 2 years.

The Dungarvan plant manufactures a wide range of milk powders, butter, casein and food ingredients. There is also a provender milling operation on this site. There is very high demand for electricity and steam for processing and drying. This made it an ideal situation for a combined heat and power plant, which was first installed in

The Virginia plant, now part of the Waterford Food Ingredients division, has an annual throughput of over 70 million gallons of milk, its main product being the cream base for Baileys.

It also plays an increasingly important role within the Group for its progress in developing and marketing an excellent range of ingredients. It has established contracts for these with some of the world's best known food processing companies.

Lettuce Is The Stuffing For The Turkey!

To put the finishing touches to your festive spread, we suggest an unusual lettuce stuffing for the turkey.

LETTUCE STUFFING

Ingredients: To stuff a family-size turkey:

2 onions, finely chopped
2 cloves garlic, finely chopped
1/2 lb (225g) bacon, diced
2 oz (50g) margarine or turkey dripping
5 slices white or brown bread, crusts removed a little milk
10 oz (275g) sausage meat



2 lettuces, blanched and chopped 11/2 tbs mushrooms, chopped 2 eggs seasoning good pinch mixed herbs.

Method:
Saute onion, garlic
and bacon in the margarine for 5 mins., and
allow to cool. Soak
bread in milk, then

squeeze out any ex-

cess. Add bread, sausage meat, lettuce, herbs and mushrooms to onion and bacon mixture. Bind with beaten eggs and season to taste.

Stuffed Roast Pork Is A Tasty Christmas Treat

Fancy a change from turkey on Christmas Day? What about stuffed roast pork?

TRADITIONAL RICE STUFFED LEG OF PORK

Ingredients: 13kg (6 lb) leg of pork, boned.

Stuffing:
100g (4oz) cooked
American grain rice
100g (4oz)
sausagemeat
100g (4oz) cooked
bacon, diced
100g (4oz)
mushrooms,

chopped 1 onion, chopped 5ml (1tsp) dried sage salt and pepper 1 large egg, beaten

Gravy:
30ml (2 level tbsps)
cooking fat reserved
in pan
30ml (2 level tbsps)
flour
500ml (1pt) chicken
stock, made with 3
cubes or 30ml (2
tbsps) stock granules
45ml (2 tbsps) brandy

Method:

Ask the butcher to bone the pork. Rinse skin and score well. Mix stuffing ingredients until blended. Fill both ends of the cavity of the pork with the stuffing. Any leftover



stuffing can be rolled into balls and baked separately for 15mins. Stand on rack in roasting tin. Rub skin well with oil and salt.

Roast at Gas Mark 5, 190° C or 375° F, for about 21/2 hours. Turn heat up to crisp skin. Transfer to platter. Keep hot. Pour all but 30ml. (2 tbsps) of cooking fat from the roasting pan and return to the heat. Stir in flour and cook until lightly browned. Add stock, stir until smooth and boiling. Add brandy and serve with pork. Serves 8-10.

Here's Your 'Hit List' For This Christmas

December is a quiet month for gardening — just as well, with the distractions of Christmas to contend with.

However, it is still necessary to brave increasingly chilly weather to stay on top of necessary chores. Leaves, for instance, may still be accumulating and can cause yellowing if left on the lawn.

And if you wait too long to clear them from flower beds you will soon risk damage to sprouting bulbs when raking.

Much better to clear leaves now and add to the compost heap, where they can rot down and be used to condition soil next year.

Other jobs to be added to your Christmas 'hit list' are'.

Wrapping straw, bracken or other protective material around frost-susceptible plants, to help them brave the elements.

 Protecting winter crops such as brassicas with netting to keep scavenging birds at bay. Birds can also be distracted — and your conscience eased — by a bird table.

It's a great way to use up kitchen scraps and particularly popular with kids, who will enjoy picking out more unusual species from the flocks of starlings and sparrows.

Don't stop feeding once started though — birds will come to depend on your food supply.

Completion of any major soil turning and preparation — adding well rotted garden compost or manure — by the end of the year.

By doing so now, you avoid digging during the really bitter chills to come and leave the weather to break down the most stubborn sods — frost opens up cracks in the turned earth and the wind and rain does the rest.

By the time you become active again outdoors you will have only a little forking and raking to do to create a beautifully conditioned soil for the main growing season.

 Lopping or pruning of deciduous trees — now mostly clear of leaves — to preserve their shape or prevent them taking over the garden.

Always cut flush to the adjoining branch so that the bark can close quickly to avoid infection and damage by the elements.

 Pruning fruit trees. Wash them down afterwards with tar oil to deter pests such as aphids and scale insects next summer but don't prune stone fruits such as cherries and plums, as they tend to 'blood' san

 Trim grass and clear weeds beneath trees to allow them more of the moisture supply from the ground and fertiliser to be worked in.

 Use your checks on fruit trees as a reminder to inspect fruit harvested over recent months.
 Throw away rotten ones but be aware that this may show that more ventilation is needed to slow ripening and rot.





Teenager's Sentence Reduced

Dungarvan Circuit Court heard last week how local gardai kept a 16 year old youth under observation and subsequently recovered cannabis resin from him that would make a total of 234 hand-rolled cigarettes.

The teenager, a native of Dungarvan, who was only 15 at the time, appealed against conviction and sentence in the District Court on a charge of having cannabis resin in his possession on October 22 last year for the purpose of supplying

others with the drug.
Sgt. David Sheehan said

he had the youth under surveillance and saw him take money from a number of known drug users. He then boarded a bus to Waterford for the purpose, he believed, of collecting cannabis resin.

Sgt. Sheehan said he and Detective Garda Oliver Phelan were on standby when

they saw the teenager alight from a bus from Waterford at 9.43 p.m. When he approached, the youth discarded something onto the ground which he took possession of and which was subsequently forensically identified as cannabis resin.

Sgt. Sheehan said in subsequent searches of the youth they took possession of further quantities of the drug, a total of 23.948 grammes which would make 234 hand-rolled

cigarettes. He believed the cannabis was intended for supplying others by the appellant.

The youth however said he had bought the cannabis for his own use only and denied that he had taken money earlier from a number of other people.

Dismissing the appeal, Judge Diarmuid Sheridan said he had absolutely no doubt in the case.

However after being told by Mr. John O'Kelly B.L. of the youth's tragic family background, Judge Sheridan reduced the total sentence of detention on the appellant to twelve months.

Dungarvan Lights Switched On As Christmas Shopping **Spree Gets Stormy Start**

Despite what could only be described as atrocious weather conditions, a crowd of several hundred people turned up in Dungarvan's Grattan Square, last Wednesday week for the formal switch-on of the ultra-modern lighting system in the town.

Though buffeted by gale force winds and lashed by the sometimes torrential rain, the crowd clapped and cheered as Santa Claus threw the switch which caused the town centre streets to light up in a blaze of colour.

This is the second year the computerised lighting system, the most modern in the country, has been relied upon to attract in Christmas shoppers and if last year's figures are anything by which to judge, town centre traders should be very happy with their perfor-

All day from mid-morning, there was entertainment in the streets ranging from face painting to singing, to music, from the Dungarvan Brass Band, Abbeyside Folk choir and Seafield Bonmahon Pipe Band.

A "kidnap drama" was enacted with the assistance of local gardaí and the "victim," Santa Claus was recovered later. The "culprit", Bart Simpson was arrested. Children in brightly coloured costumes roamed the streets in search of the missing personality and made the acquaintance of many of the visitors to the

Throughout the day, music was played over the town's public address system, and a live performance was given by William White, Libby Flynn, Michael O Faoláin. St. Mary's School pupils

and Abbeyside Parish Choir, despite having to change location because of adverse conditions.

Previously at a reception in Lawlor's Hotel, Mario Flavin, Chairman of the Retail Traders Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, told representatives of the Urban district Council, Chamber of Commerce and the press that the £56,000 spent on the lighting system last year had proved to be a good investment.

'This was an investment by the people of the town for the people of the town," he said, "and there is no other town between here and Dublin which can match our system.'

He thanked the Urban Council for their continued co-operation and congratulated them on their substantial increase in marks which they had achieved in conjunction with the local committee in the Tidy Towns competition.

Continuing, he said that it was the intention of the Chamber of Commerce to investigate the possibility of drawing up a suitable colour scheme for decorating the town centre as had been done nearly thirty years ago and they would in time publicise their findings.

Tragic Death At Youghal Bridge

A retired factory worker in his mid 70's drowned last Sunday when his Ford Anglia car left the road at the Dungarvan side of Youghal Bridge and plunged into the river Blackwater.

The dead man, whose body was recovered less than 2 hours later, was named on Sunday night as John (Jackie) Foley, Ardsallagh, Co. Waterford.

The tragedy occurred shortly after mid-day just a short distance from Mr. Foley's home. The alarm was raised when the partly submerged car was seen in the river, and within minutes the Youghal Lifeboat, under helmsman Kieran O'Connell, was called out. Members of Youghal Fire , under Fire Off Ollie Casey, also raced to the scene. The body was recovered around 2 p.m. and was taken to the local District Hospital where a postmortem examination was carried out.

The following is a Christmas message to our emigrants from Canon G. Power, P.P:-

Christmas remembers the birth of Jesus at Bethlehem two thousand years ago. He was revealed as Saviour. "To-day a Saviour is born to You, Christ the Lord". We celebrate His birth annually to help us to penetrate more deeply the mystery, the wonder of the coming of the Son of God among us as a child. He wants to make new our relationship with Him so that we can continue to experience Him as Our Saviour. This is the Gospel message of Christmas — this is the message of the Crib. "The Wordwas made Flesh and dwelt amongst us." The Word — the Son of God - was born as a child to Mary and so became one of ourselves. This is a note from your native parish, Dungarvan. It is being sent to you by your parents, or relatives, or friends

Parents Helping St. Mary's School

It has been three years since St. Mary's Primary School, Dungarvan was formed by the Amalgama-tion of the Presentation and Mercy Primary Schools and the green uniform is now familiar to everybody.

St. Mary's caters for boys up to 1st class and girls up to 6th class — a total of 486 pupils. Over the past 3 years, £19,000 has been contributed to the school through the fund raising efforts of the Parents Council. This money has paid for many extras for our children including PE, drama, books and shelving for the library, classroom equipment, sports equipment, subsidising involvement in National Children's Choir, computer aids and repairs.

During this time £6,900 has been handed over to the Board of management towards the day-to-day run-

also paid generous tribute to the press, added that he hoped he would be seen as having been "tough but fair".





Ring Out [by MAI O'HIGGINS] Let the bells ring out - large and small, beautiful and ugly - in the place of the

king - the Mosque of the Faithful and home of the humble - they are all welded together at this time of the New

A world without bells cannot be imagined. They measure our hours from daylight to nighttime. Their tinkle awaken us - the telephone bell summons us to answer its call. The Fire bell — school bell, wedding bell, church bell echo through our lives and the funeral bell's sad tones accompany us to the grave.

Bells were first used by the Chinese around 4,000 years ago. Our St. Columbus introduced bells to Europe. They were only used on special occasions then - death - the crowning of Kings and Queens — the call to war — the marking of the day into nours faithful to prayer.

Our Irish history abounds with proof of the "Ceol" and "Ceolan" — the bell and the little bell used by priests in their duties. In olden days bells were baptised by missionaries, each dedicated to a particular saint which was supposed to have miraculous powers, like keeping the devil from molesting the church or congrega-

The shape of Irish bells has changed little through the centuries. Our bogs have yielded various specimens — a number used in the worship of Druidic Gods. One such bell has a slit shape like a half-moon, this was probably used for moon worship to the Goddess Astarte. St. Patrick's Bell Colman's Cathedral, Cobh.

was 6 inches high and encrusted with gems, gold and filigree work.
"BARCON CIARAN"

St Kieran, who founded a monastery at Birr, Co. Offaly, had the "Barcon Ciaran" given to him by St. Patrick with instructions to build a monastery where the bell first rang. Although the Saint preached for some time in the South of Ireland it was not until he reached the banks of the river Nore, that the bell rang loudly and there he kept his promise to St. Patrick. This famous bell was later called the "Bearnon Ciaran" showing that it had been damaged, probably by the marauding Danes who came up the Shannon in their long boats.

In many churches there are ship's bells hung. One famous one is in a church in Innishowen. This is from a wrecked ship

The famous White Bell which was given to the Convent of St. Brigid in Northern Ireland by a chieftain, who, while hunting had accidentally killed a friend carried out a threat — "When the White Bell rings again." The bell was carefully hidden and many years later during a frightful storm, the bell tolled loudly over the storm. The "White Bell" had rung again and the evil that would

follow its toll, was no more.

An ancient bell is kept in the porch of Doneraile Church. It was made in 1936, and given to the Church by the Hon. William St. Leger.

OUR LOCALITY

This week we write about the only woodland area in the parish that is still extant. This is the area north of Tarr's Bridge commonly called Deelish Wood. The highest part of the wood is in the townsland of Deelish, but to the south adjoining the main Waterford road are townslands Loughaniska, Knocka-havaun and Cushcam. These four translate as fol-"Black Fort", "Water Pond", "O Teevan's Hill" (or possibly "Hill of the Streams", as there are quite a few in the area) and 'Crooked Piece of Land". The crooked piece was the bend in the original road at the spot commonly called "The Wheel". Older people remember the old mill wheel near the bridge over the Deelish Stream. People who know the way to the waterfall on the Glendine River will have come across the old waterworks on their way through the wood. This is the townsland of Currane which means "Pointed Hill". There is a new forestry road entering the wood above this point, at the top of Lacken, the "Glen Slope" from where there is a splendid view of the southern part of the parish. Lacken stretches southwards from here, it most southern point reaching the Military Road. A small portion of Tournore townsland

With Best Wishes

The Christmas Card is now so much a part of Christmas it is strange to reflect that it is only about 150 years old. The credit for this is ascribed to one John C. Horsley, R.A., who designed a card in 1844 by the lithographic process which was coloured by hand and a thousand copies were sold to a London art dealer for the sale in shops.

W. A. Dobson, an artist, also claimed to have designed a card. Dobson was Queen Victoria's favourite artist. A 16 years old printer's assistant, William Eagley, son of the painter William Maw Eagley produced a Christmas Card which showed Sir Roger De Coverly, a Punch and Judy Show and a Christmas Dinner — all in delightful

The name of Raphael Tuck is world famous as the biggest producer of Christmas Cards. The firm was founded in London in 1861 by Sir Adolph Tuck who decided to hold a competition for designs. It proved a big success, ending up as an exhibition in a London Art Gallery. Lord Tennyson, then Poet Laureate, refused 1000 guineas to submit a dozen verses for Tuck's Cards. It was not until 104 years later that the New Year and Christmas Card

became really popular.
Producing cards proved a lucrative business and many firms experimented with various designs and sizes. Some London printers produced cards for the lower income buyers — bearing just a simple verse wishing a "Happy Christmas." For the well off — cards gaily decorated with holly, robins, embossed landscapes, frosted, jewelled and glitter, displaying fancy cord and ribbon slotted through edges, became popular. They sold from one shilling to a crown — a lot of money in those days.

CHRÍSTMAS CÁRDS IN OTHER LANDS

It is interesting to note that the various countries around the world accepted the custom of Christmas cards. In Germany, the name Prang was outstanding. In America, Dora Wheeler is well known. The Japanese cards are most interesting. The merchants greet their customers with a social card bearing the imprint of a stork or turtle and always message of good-

The modern Christmas card comes in many shapes and types from the gaudy to the humorous and simple religious card. As Christmas is Christ's birthday it is only fitting that cards should have some bearing on the Feast, but, unfortunately, in modern times, the true meaning has become debased and commercialised with the horrible word "Xmas" replacing Christmas.

In Ireland it is heartening to see our native publishers are making strides to produce cards worthy of our nation and beliefs. The religious card takes pride of place. The classics of the great Italian Masters are regularly reproduced — pictures of the "Magi" and "Adoration of Christ" are very popular.

Among our foremost designers of truly Irish cards the name of Brian O'Higgins stands out. His gems of Celtic artistry brought a breath of Ireland across the

Christmas cards continue to be big business. Soon the shops will be crowded with customers choosing cards for family and friends. The doggy lovers will be choosing cards of cute Scottys and Cocker Spaniels and the private card will be chosen for Mr. and Mrs. X, who have now moved into I

A 23 year old unemployed labourer, who appealed the severity of prison sentences totalling twenty one months imposed on him in the District Court, had them reduced by six months by Judge Dairmuid Sheridan at Dungarvan Circuit Court.

William Whelan, a native of Dungarvan, but who it was stated was homeless at the time, had been convicted of nineteen charges of burglary, forgery, criminal damage and assault on dates between September and November.

Sgt. Tom O'Grady told the court that the crimes included assaults on three garda officers, one of whom he had head-butted and another whom he attempted to bite. He had attempted to steal cars belonging to two priests and also tried to break into the home of the Dungarvan parish priest.

Sgt. O'Grady said that Whelan was under the influence of drugs and drink when he assaulted the gar-

Whelan told Judge Sheridan that he had tried to keep out of trouble but things had blown up in his face.

The Judge reduce the total sentences on the appellant from twenty one to fifteen months, but warned that he would not take a similar course if Whelan came before the court again.

FINALISATION OF GATT DEAL

Commenting on the finalisation of the GATT deal in Geneva last Tuesday week, the Waterford IFA County Chairman, Pat Murphy supported the IFA President, Alan Gillis, when he said that while some sectors of the Irish economy might benefit from the agreement, the cost of the deal for Ireland would be borne almost entirely by farmers.

Mr. Murphy said that Irish farmers and the Irish food industry had not been adequately defended by the Government in the negotiations. He was highly critical of the government's half-hearted defence when compared with the French government's determination to defend its agriculture sector and maintain the rural environment in France. Mr. Murphy said the only course open to the government now was to salvage compensation from the failure to renegotiate the damaging Blair agreement.

The IFA President, Alan Gillis, said he was sticking to the earlier IFA estimate of £432 million a year from farm income losses and he insisted that the Minister tied down EU compensation for the GATT cuts that went beyond CAP Reform at the forthcoming Council of Agriculture Ministers meeting.

Mr. Gillis reiterated his call for a new beef premium of £120/head to compensate cattle farmers and a dairy cow premium of £100/head for the country's dairy producers to compensate for the price reductions resulting from the GATT

The IFA leader warned, however, that the EU compensation, on the scale necessary to redress the Blair House losses in excess of CAP Reform, would definitely require an increase in the EU budget.

The County Chairman said that while the declaration from the heads of government at the weekend was welcome, in that it established the principle of compensation for GATT farm cuts, it was nevertheless disingenuous of the European leaders to pretend that this could be achieved within the current guide-

The Editor, "Dungarvan Leader"

1993 A BIT OF A LET DOWN

After the great achieve-ments of 1992, 1993 has proved to be a bit of a letdown in Waterford GAA affairs. While I agreed with those who argued that we should not expect too much in 1993 after the euphoria of the previous year, what concerns me greatly is that not only have we failed in the last twelve months to build on the foundations provided in 1992, but in many respects the GAA in Waterford has actually gone backwards this year.

On the completion of Waterford's senior hurling championship campaign in 1992, I reckoned that we were about three players and five selectors - short of a team capable of making a realistic challenge for Amster honours. Were it not for sideline bungling, we would have made it to he Munster final - which would not only have provided us with a really great day out on that glorious July Sunday, but would have given us an even better case from which to build for the future.

As it happened, the mareilous breakthroughs later in the year at both minor and under-21 levels produced up to ten new players with the potential to make the grade at senior level. Excellent pre-Christmas form in the League seemed to confirm the upward movement in Waterford's hurling fortunes. Then came the disastrous performances against Dublin and Clare which denied us an almost certain League semi-final place (and provided Cork with a backdoor to eventual success).

The spineless cop-out against Cork only made matters worse and attendance at training sessions had dropped to single figures by the time the team reached the ultimate - but predictable - depths by

losing to Kerry in the championship. I am inclined to agree with the view that the selectors should not have been fired - because of the implications this could have for future management teams - but they surely should have taken it upon themselves to resign. After all, they were responsible for the worst string of performances I have ever seen from a Waterford team, when one bears in mind the talent at their disposal.

Things of course got much worse with the shenanigans within the County Board later in the year. The way this episode was "resolved" showed clearly how those involved in the internal wrangling had lost all sense of proportion and grasp of their roles as representatives of the ordinary members of the Association, elected to do a particular job. Apart from the appalling example provided to the membership (and particularly the younger players), the widespread revulsion which these events generated could place in jeopardy the success of the Development Draw, which is vital to the future welfare of the GAA in Waterford.

My own view is that, although the County Chairman has shown on several occasions that he has the support of the majority of the clubs in the county, this democratic fact has never been accepted by an entrenched group of long-serving officials. Be that as it may, it now appears to me that the only way forward is for all those involved in this strife to stand down in the long-term interests of the GAA in the county. Otherwise, the tremendous potential which is there at the moment will simply be dissipated away.

All counties in the country are currently supposed to be reviewing their structures and operations. I believe that Waterford should adopt many of the recommendations which have been produced by a special work group here in Kildare. These lude a maximum term o office for all Board officials and the establishment of a full-time administrative office to run the GAA's activities in the county. This would greatly reduce the administrative burden which discourages many able people from putting themselves forward for office. A more regular turnover of officials is important in preventing the emergence of power

cliques in the organisation. It is difficult to look forward to 1994 with great op-

timism. The ongoing friction within the County Board means that the unified sense of purpose which is vital to ultimate success is missing. Although the performance of the county team has improved in the last two matches, we are still saddled with a group of selectors who continue to make weird decisions and who lack the confidence of the players. Johnny Brenner's decision to opt out deprives us of the finest player to emerge in the county in over a decade. John Meaney's disastrous loss of form and Growler Daly's inconsistency have greatly blunted the firepower which seemed on the point of blossoming in

A forward line with Flynn, O'Sullivan, Meaney and Daly all operating at full throttle would surely put us on the verge of the breakthrough for which we have been waiting for thirty years. However, this potential must be nurtured and inspired by the right kind of leadership. Delivering that leadership is the vital challenge facing the Waterford GAA as we enter the new



Hurling Coaching Foundation Course

The first hurling coaching course at foundation level in Co. Waterford was held at the Regional Technical College on Saturday, December 4. The course tutors were Joe Carton, Pat Moore, Declan Murphy and MacDara MacDonncha. It was attended by sixteen coaches in all. It consisted of two onehour theory sessions and two two-hour outdoor practical sessions.

Among those who attended included Billy O'Sullivan and Tom Casey. A total of five clubs from East Waterford were represented.

A similar course to cater for clubs in West Waterford will be held in Dungarvan (venue to be confirmed) in late January/early February.

All coaches who attended the course will receive a coaching certificate from the National Coaching and Training Centre, Limerick and this will enable them to attend further and more advanced courses in the

Details of the course to be held in Dungarvan and a second course for Waterford, will be published in the local newspapers.

County Convention

A total of 21 motions have been submitted from over a dozen clubs and while the majority relate to the running of the championships, there are a few that will certainly arouse interesting discussion. The two motions submitted by Ballyduff and Ring concerning the running of the intermediate football championship on a countywide basis is sure to get an amount of support, but there is likely to be some opposition from both Divisional Boards, who have already lost the intermediate championship, but receive financial compensation from the County Board.

Abbeyside/Ballinacourty have a motion requesting that a full time. Secretary/Administrator be appointed and that he/she would operate from an administrative office.

The second motion from Kill seeks to give junior clubs the same rights as intermediate and senior clubs in the matter of being allowed full membership of the County Board, with the right to attend County Board meetings, etc. The same club have a motion for Congress which will again attempt to give minor clubs the right to attend conventions. Similar motions were passed on two occasions before, by Waterford, but failed to get the required support at Congress,

Cappoquin's three motions deal with matters of administration. One is about the share of gates in county finals and in replayed finals, etc. Their second motion is merely insisting that byelaw 7-05 be strictly implemented each year. The bye-law states 'A committee of three, one being the County Chairman, shall be appointed by the County Board at its first meeting each year to prepare the County Board accounts before these are submitted to the Board's auditors.' Their third motion insists that bye-law 7-06 be strictly implemented also. This byelaw reads 'All monies received shall be lodged by the treasurer in the bank and all cheques must be signed by the chairman, treasurer and secretary'.

If a motion from Butlerstown is successful, then group teams will be back in the championship once more. The allowing of group teams in (under this motion) is conditional on the senior hurling and football championships being run on a knockout system with a losers group.

As I have written, most of the motions relate to the running of the championships and these are submitted by a number of clubs, including Ardmore who lead the field in this re-

Colligan/Emmetts have a rather interesting motion which might help to separate the strong from the weak and give the weaker sides, at least a chance of retaining their interest up to an advanced stage of the championships. Readers will find it easy to understand.

I will return to the mo-

tions, etc. in our next issue.

all his colleagues of giving rate and my fear is that the the property away.

That was not so.

Cllr. Austin Hallahan said that in supporting the proposal put to them by the County Manager he was doing the best for the town and was acting in its best interests. He relied on the professional advice available to him in deciding as he had.

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan said the development of the property would create jobs and he would applaud the "deal" concluded by the County Manager with the proposed developers.

Cllrs. Mary Dixon, Paddy Power and Declan Goode also strongly defended their decision to dispose of the

property.

The County Manager said the public reaction to the Council decision had been very favourable. The letter written by the Chairman and published in the local press was libellous of him personally, the other eight councillors, and the UDC staff and it had greatly upset him

Mr. Hurley said that so upset was he about the allegation that he was giving away the property, he had employed three professional assessors and all three agreed that the gain to the UDC over the twenty five year period would be between £100,000 and £150,000.

"I recent being used as a political football in all of this," the Manager went on. "The letter was an appalling one and was totally inaccurate and my fear is that the adverse publicity may now affect the whole development proposal."

A defiant Cllr. Wright, however, repeated that the decision to dispose of the property was the worst ever taken by a Local Authority anywhere in Ireland.

The Chairman said he had hoped his eight colleagues would have seen the light and rescinded "a bad and deplorable decision." He had been overwhelmed by the support he had received from the public for his stance in the matter.

"If everybody on the UDC is out of step bar one that is not my fault," the County Manager retorted.

Is Drink Driving Still A
