Abbeyside Man Wins £26,000 On

Winning Streak Game Show

Tragic Street Incident Mars istmas In Dungarvan

While for the most part, the Christmas festivities in Dungarvan passed off quietly, a tragic incident which resulted in a young man's death in the early hours of Christmas morning cast a great gloom over the town and marred the otherwise enjoyment of the festive period for the people of the town and district where the parties involved are all well and popularly known.

Matthew Monahan, a 28- home. year old labourer, married with a four-months-old daughter, of Congress Villas, Dungarvan was fatally injured in an incident with another man at the entrance to Cathal Brugha Place, about 200 yards from his

Mr. Monahan was walking home from a local public house in the company of his wife and another man at about 1 a.m. when the incident occurred. He fell to the ground and was found to be unconscious.

Gardai were called to the scene and medical assistance was given by a local doctor and Mr. Monahan was removed by ambulance to Waterford Regional Hospital but was pronounced dead on arrival.

A post mortem was subsequently carried out by the State Pathologist, Dr. John Harbison.

Gardai carried out investigations into the incident over the Christmas period following a definite line of inquiry and statements were taken from a number of peo-ple who were in the vicinity at the time the incident occurred.

On Monday last, Supt. Ray McAndrew who headed the investigations, told the "Leader" that their inquiries into the matter had now been completed and the file in the case has been submitted to the Director of Public Prosecutions.

PARISH MOURNS ACCIDENT VICTIM

A great sadness was felt throughout the parish and surrounding areas when the news of the death of Robert (Robbie) Kirwan of Kealfoun came through. Robbie had been in a critical condition in the Regional Hospital, Cork since Christmas Eve after being involved in a road accident.

Robbie, aged 22, was a very outgoing lad and was a great athlete in his teenage years. He was the holder of under-16 and minor medals Western division and was a member of the Kilrossanty minor team that were defeated in the county final in 1989. His death at such an early age comes as a great shock to all.

His remains were removed to Fews Church from the District Hospital on Thursday evening fol-lowed by one of the largest corteges seen in Fews for a long time. His remains were blessed and received Fr. Ml. Frawley, P.P. A guard of honour was formed by members of the Kilrossanty Football Club and his coffin was draped with the flag. Requiem Mass was offered on Friday morning by Fr. Frawley assisted by Fr. Duggan. The readers were Sinead O'Hara and Michelle Cliffe. The Kilrossanty and Fews Choir sang appropriate hymns. His coffin was carried to adjoining burial grounds by his relatives. Many wept openly as the priest recited the prayers of the faithful. An oration was delivered by John Power, Chairman of the G.A.A., at the graveside.

Heartfelt sympathy is extended to his parents John and Nora, brothers Alfie, Jason, John and Michael, sisters Ann, Sinead, Tanya, Kate, Julie and Lenora, his

grandmother Mrs. Anne Kirwan, Graigueruesh, uncles, aunts, relatives and friends.

A nice gesture was the donation of Robbie's organs to be used for transplants. May he rest in peace.

Planning Appeal Arrears

At Record Low Level in 1988.

Bord Pleanála has published its report and accounts for 1991. At the end of November 1992, the number of appeals on hands (at 752) was the lowest in the history of the Board. The average time taken to dispose of appeals has now been reduced to four months. The board is very advanced in its preparations for meeting the statutory objective of disposing of appeals generally within four months, as laid down in the 1992 Planning Act.

The other main features of the report are:

• The Board received about 3,000 appeals a year in each of the last three years, compared with 2,257

 The number of appeals disposed of in 1991 (3,204) was the highest level since 1984. The proportion of appeals on hands for over six months dropped from 16% at the end of 1989 to 3% at the end of 1991.

Between 1977 (when

the Board was set up) and the end of 1991, 51,000 appeals were received by the Board. There were 171 High court challenges against the Board. Only 19 judgments were made against the Board which is equivalent to only 4 in every 10,000 appeals received.

VEC Objection To Further Integration Of Schools In Dungarvan

Any thoughts about having just one major post primary school in Dungarvan would be educationally unsound for the town, the December monthly meeting of the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee was told.

Mr. Paudie Geary, TUI representative on the VEC, said such a school would have a student enrolment of about 1,700, while Jimmy Byrne said that would amount to "one big educational jungle.'

The matter arose during a "carry over" discussion from the November meeting on the whole vexed question of the existing facilities at Dungarvan Technical College where student enrolment numbers have spiralled to a record high.

The chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne, said a series of meetings have been held with the teaching staff to try and coordinate their approach, and to prepare a programme of development at the school for presentation to the Department of Education.

The CEO, Donal Kelleher, said the spectacular success of the school has seen a dramatic increase in student numbers.

Later at the meeting the CEO told Cllr. Nora Flynn that there were no plans to sell the site in Dungarvan which had been acquired several years ago for a pro-posed new vocational school.

Meantime, a calendar at present being produced giving details of Dungarvan Technical College was being undertaken without the approval or knowledge

of the Co. Waterford VEC's Chief Executive Officer the meeting was told.

Cllr. Kyne said they would check to see if the venture had the approval of the TUI and if not they will have to seek legal advice in the

1993 Will Be Difficult Year To Assess

The following is how Stephen O'Connor, Managing Director, Waterford Foods plc sees the year anead:

An optimist is sometimes defined as a pessimist who doesn't know the facts. Few people in business will want to be seen as optimists when it comes to assessing the prospects for 1993. It is a very difficult year to read and anticipate.

That can't be good news for 1993 and it threatens to be worse for 1994.

What we need at this stage is very strong, assertive, cohesive Government pursuing a well-defined policy. Is that what we are likely to have in 1993?

In the case of Waterford Foods, we have had a good solid year in 1992 and we move into a challenging New Year in very good shape.

company has made excellent acquisitions to achieve an important increase in scale and has made major strides towards incorporating these into the total business. We have also moved closer to the consumer and become less dependant on the products that can't live without intervention.

But despite the great unpredictability where the year ahead is concerned we must have hope and confidence in our ability to cope with all the problems that continue to loom as without hope the future would certainly be a bleak prospect.

In a joint pastoral letter issued prior to Christmas the Irish Bishops Conference stated that the "unsatisfied hunger for jobs" is the great-est single social issue facing the country. At this time when it is indicated by official estimates that the number of people out of work will soar by at least 25,000 over the next few months to rise above 300,000 for the first time, the 4-page pas-toral, "Work Is The Key: An Economy That Needs Everyone" says high unemployment is not something to be "lived with" and is something that should be

Simultaneous with the publication of the Bishops' pastoral comes the news that the live register could approach 320,000 in what the Department of Finance regards as a worst case" scenario.

The average number of jobless persons over the past year was 284,000 compared with an original estimate of 272,000. It costs the Exchequer a gross £3.2 million for every 1,000 officially registered people out of work. The cost of unemployment assistance in 1993 would therefore be at least £80 million and reach as high as £96 million in the event of the worst case" scenario being

reached.

The single most important purpose of the Bishops' pastoral is to counter the spirit of fatalism about the supposed inevitability of high unemployment and emigration for the rest of the decade. "Reducing unemployment in Ireland is a daunting task, but it is not impossible," they declare.

The pastoral contends that the main sources of our high unemployment lie here at home. "The remedies must ened national morale. be found and can be implemented here at home," it claims. There is an insufficient sense of our collective responsibility for each other

and too little concern of how our individual and sectoral behaviour affects other persons and other groups in society, it adds.

The pastoral also points to the worrying degree of cynicism about government, politics, business and a lack of respect of what is public. People are worried about standards of public morality. Scandals and rumours of scandals have undermined public confidence and weak-

Certainly the level of unemployment predicted for 1993 will cause major problems for the incoming government - this is if we are to have one!

Apropos the foregoing the views expressed by Dublin parish priest Fr. Anthony Gaughan in the Redemptorist magazine "Reality" are in stark contrast when he states that many people in Ireland have never had it so good despite the talk about recession. In an attack on shameful greed and selfishness, Fr. Gaughan states that those who worked in some essential industries, aware of their ability "to pull the plug on the country" in effect fixed their own salary and wage rates. Workers in secure employment frequently insisted on pay well in excess of what their labour was worth, he claimed. This had a knock-on effect going right up to the best salaried

in the State. The Dublin PP also struck at trade unions some of which were, he said, obsessed, not with the problems of the unemployed or partially unemployed but with the high rate of income tax faced by better-paid members. The unemployed and partially unemployed were given benefits to keep them quiet. It was sad, he said, to look at all this in the perspective of a world in which two out of three people suffered from malnutrition or worse.

Certainly it is no exaggeration that the unemployment problem has reached crisis proportions and must now be recognised as our No.1 Social Problem.

banished from our island. Our TD's Are More Than Well Paid

According to the most recent official figures which surfaced just before the Christmas break we learn that the average T.D. is paid a minimum of £37,286 per annum in salary and alleged expenses. In addition there are extra allowances to cover office, secretarial and travelling expenses.

The figures are contained in two booklets issued by the Leinster House authorities to enable the many new members of the Oireachtas returned in the November general election to ascertain the entitlements and facilities available to them.

The "basic" salary of £30,100 (from January 1) is just part of the pay-out which a T.D. now enjoys. When they produce receipts they get another £2,560 in nses and then when they merely say they spent the money they receive a further £2,250 in "unvouched" expenses.

T.D.'s in small constituencies receive £750 a year expenses to travel around the constituency while those in the bigger constituencies get up to £4,000 a year which is to cover their travelling to funerals, local meetings and other political functions.

As for the facilities which they enjoy, T.D.s have an excellent library, two bars and four restaurants in Leinster House while the Dail ter for Industry as well) can

TV system includes a "playout service" which enables T.D.s to order up and watch in the privacy of their office, recordings of debates they haven't bothered to attend. In addition each T.D. gets two direct line phones, and two for a secretary, and unlimited free calls. T.D.'s can also designate a phone at home, in their car or elsewhere in their constituency and the taxpayer pays 75 per cent of that bill up to a maximum of £2,000.

Then there is the free postage facility. Each T.D. gets 1,250 postage-paid envelopes per month at 32p each which comes to a whopping £4,800 per year. As many well know, a big number of these filter down to party members at constituency level but nonetheless it is the taxpayer who has to foot the bill in the long run.

So having made up the sum as set out above, you will be able to realise that our T.D.s certainly look after themselves and pay themselves very handsomely given that the Dail sits on about 90 days a year!

But while the above payouts are not small, the real big bucks are on the European scene. Our new E.C. Commissioner, P. Flynn, former Minister for Justice (and in latter months Minis-

look forward to a salary of roughly £120,000 a year after tax. Incidentally, Mr. Flynn who has been awarded the portfolio of Social Affairs in Brussels has declared that a jobs drive is to be his priority during his two years term of office. Time will tell whether this works out.

But to get back to the perks" which Mr. Flynn will be enjoying in his post as EC Commissioner, for starters he and his wife will be entitled to a once-off allowance to cover their move to Brussels which comes to some £24,000. Meals and travelling expenses will run to about £15,000 a year. Mr. Flynn will have a chaffeurdriven top of the range "limo" at his disposal at alltimes, even when he returns to Ireland for visits.

In addition he will be entitled to the services of a chef to provide him with meals for any number of guests at any time. The rent of a house in Brussels will be covered and each of the Commissioner's children will have an allowance of £100 pocketmoney per month.

A Peach Of A Time For Planting

January is a month for fruitful thoughts even if there is no harvest, for preparation and planting now will ensure plenty of good fruit next season.

The end of the month is the deadline for planting trees for stone fruits such as plum, cherry, damson and peach, as these varieties start growing so early in

When planting remember all fruit frees need moisture and good drainage so pick a suitable spot and enhance the conditions by mixing well-rotted manure or garden compost with soil as you plant the sapling.

The softer types such as peach and apricot will also need sun and shelter to survive so try and pick a wall or fence site. It may take a few seasons for all these varieties to produce a decent crop, but when they do you'll need to stand by for jam and winemaking when they all ripen

In the meantime, you may want to try for faster results from soft fruit varieties although many seem to have fallen from gardeners' favour.

Blackberries, gooseberries and blackcurrants can be planted now, should give good crops next summer and taste better than any you could buy. Blackberries are so easy to grow it's more a case of controlling them as choose a wall or fence location or put up a trellis or stout frame-

Unfortunately, they do produce thorns

and those are also a likely deterrent to growing gooseberries but this traditional fruit has much modern appeal.

It can be left on the bush for a week or two once ripe without rotting or suffering from the weather and will stand freezing better than soft fruits such as strawber-

Gooseberries can be planted from November to March but, with little happening in the garden, you might as well plant now as they are exceptionally hardy and can withstand exposed locations. The brushes need up to five feet between them depending on the variety, but require little pruning as they fruit on old and new wood. Blackcurrants ought to be planted now and in sheltered positions about four feet apart — if you already grow them you should have pruned them ruthlessly to about four inches above soil level in the autumn. Redcurrants should be treated similarly except that their slow growth requires the pruning of just four inches off last year's growth. It may not be time to plant other types but

some will require attention: remove the tips of tall shoots on raspberries and cut out weaklings to leave about six shoots per plant.

Revenue Commissioners Issue Strong **Reminder To Motor Traders**

The Revenue Commissioners have issued a strong reminder to motor traders who hold unregistered vehicles on their premises from January 1, 1993. Under the new vehicles registration system, such traders, including distributors and dealers in motor vehicles and motor cycles, and other traders supplying services to dealers and distributors, must be authorised by the Revenue Commissioners.

While a large number of applications for authorisation have been received, the Commissioners warn that those who have not applied will not be able to trade as and from January 1.

Under the new arrangement, Revenue will handle vehicle registration, and a new tax - Vehicle Registration Tax (VRT) - will







Improved Sight Testing Service For West Waterford

Councillor Billy Kyne, referring to a letter from the Programme Manager of Community Care of SEHB, Mr. Matt Lynch, welcomed the action outlined by the Programme Manager in response to queries raised by him at the November and December meetings of the South Eastern Health Board in relation to the ophthalmic services for West Waterford.

Waterford and South Tipperary area was unacceptable with a waiting list of almost two years for eye tests," said Cllr. Kync.

Now, an agreement between the optometrists of the SEHB region and the Health Board will result in 500 people getting authorisations for eye examinacommencing immediately at 30 persons per week being referred for eye examinations.

"I commend the Programme Manager and the optometrists in activing at this agreement that will bring a vital health service to the people of the area in question," Cllr. Kyne told the "Dungarvan Leader" on Monday last.

Cllr. Kyne went on to say that while he was willing to give the agreement time to get underway, it did pose the question, why did these unacceptable delays arise in the first case?

The resolution of the question could be possibly brought about by a return to the choice of Opticians scheme.

This scheme provides the best service to the patient and would reduce and SEHB region."

"The situation in West eventually eliminate waiting lists.

Cllr. Kyne in his statement went on to explain that the private optician premises are open 6 days a week and are much more available than clinics which are of much shorter duration and are complicated by travel difficulties especially for the elderly or the ill.

If the eye test backlog is cleared, it allows more time for patients with more serious problems to get treatment.

On the cost side, it has been argued that a more cost effective service can be offered by the private opticians. Either way, the new ad hoc scheme will be a major improvement but ad hoc schemes are not the long term solution.

"I will, in the coming weeks," Cllr. Kyne then stated, "be monitoring the progress made in reducing these waiting lists. I will also be pressing for the SEHB to put in place the most cost effective schemes that will deliver an ongoing service to the public, and that will prevent a reoccurence of these waiting lists, in any area of the

Awards Group Meet

This year a new group of adjudicators have been appointed by the County Board and they met on Monday night to make their judgements. The Cost of Medals

The cost of championship medals is a matter which has been the subject of much discussion at meetings and conventions in recent times and members and officials have been expressing concern about the escalating cost of such trophies. It was inevitable then when the All-Ireland under-21 medals were being presented last week that the question would be asked about the cost of these trophies.

It surprised some people to hear that an All-Ireand under-21 hurling medal costs approximately £220 (including VAT) and that a single Munster minor medal about £90.

Regardless of how large a panel of players is, only 21 medals can be given by

Central Council or Munster Council. The additional medals must be purchased by whichever County Board requires them. All-Ireland medals cost Central Council in the region of £50,000 a year. The bill for Munster medals is approximately £20,000 a year and on last year's balance sheet here in Waterford the price paid for championship medals was £6,169 and the amount paid for extra medals by clubs requiring

them must have also cometo a sizable figure. These do not include the cost of medals for the divisional winners.

Here in Waterford it means that the gross gate receipts for the county senior hurling final between Ballygunner and Mount Sion would be given over to pay for the county finals trophies for all our championships. The payment of VAT on medals is a big factor in reckoning the cost.

County Draw

The reports are that the fund-raising draw is gathering momentum and that clubs have been canvassing support over the Christmas break. It now seems certain that the draw will get underway by late February at the latest. I have been told that the public response is encouraging and there is growing confidence that the proceeds will yield sufficient finance to enable the Board to proceed with the proposed devel-opment of the two grounds.

The Triangle Club

This group who raise money for several worthy causes is based in Carrick-on-Suir and in a number of ways it involves the three counties of Tipperary, Waterford and Kilkenny. As well as helping charitable organisations the group hold an annual dinner at which awards are made to outstanding G.A.A. players, etc.

At the most recent function, Padraigh O Fainin, former president was the guest speaker. The awards presented were to Frankie Walsh, who captained the successful 1959 All-Ireland Waterford team for

his contribution to hurling in our county in the past, and the Waterford hurler of the present was named as Dathai Foran, Portlaw who was chosen because of his consistently good displays over last year; Ollie Walsh was given the Kilkenny player of the past and Liam Fennelly was named as the hurler of the present for the same county. Tadgh O'Connor and Bobby Ryan were re-spectively awarded the distinctions for Tipperary. John Finnucane and John O'Riordan, both of St. Mollerans club were given special awards also.

final at Thurles on next Sunday afternoon commencing at 2.30 p.m. and with the standard judged to be very good in the county at present, all will be hopeful of doing well against the opposition from the other counties.
