VEC To Present A More High Profile Image

Members of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee agreed unanimously last Monday to endeavour to present a more high-profile image of the VEC to the public.

The CEO, Mr. Kieran Heffernan, recommended to the committee that they prepare, and circulate a public relations-type document listing the many and various courses and skills that are available under the auspices of the VEC.

Mr. Heffernan disclosed that people had gone to classes at Waterford Regional College unaware that

the VEC was also providing the very same courses. "We need to raise our profile and let the public know exactly

what we are providing in terms of courses, classes and skills," the CEO said.

Cllr. Nora Flynn fully supported the CEO and she also suggested that they hold an information seminar

VEC Strapped For Cash

Members of the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee were told this week that the cash strapped committee doesn't have the finances to implement certain recommendations made to it under the Health and Safety Act at Dungarvan Technical College.

The CEO, Mr. Kieran Heffernan, made the shock disclosure to the monthly meeting after it had been unanimously agreed to upgrade the fire safety equipment in both the Dungarvan and Kilmacthomas schools.

Mr. Heffernan said he had prepared reports in relation to the improvements needed to upgrade the fire equip-

ment and the cost would be £1,595 in Dungarvan and £1,118 in Kilmacthomas.

"It is imperative this work be done to comply with the Health and Safety Act", the CEO added.

It was then that Mr. Heffernan disclosed that a number of recommendations had

Certificate Course On Hygiene

The South Eastern Health Board (S.E.H.B.) in conjunction with the Irish Hotel and Catering Institute (I.H.C.I.) are again presenting their Certificate Course on the Principle and Practices of Food Hygiene in Dungarvan. This is the 7th biennial course held in Dungarvan. The Best Student Award introduced ten years ago is again to be a feature of this course, which commences on Tuesday, February 1 in the Teagasc Offices, Shandon,

Dungarvan.

A perpetual trophy comprising a silver cup has been presented to the South Eastern Health Board by Waterford Foods plc Ltd. This trophy will be held by the winner until the next Certificate Course and may be placed on public display in the premises where the winning student is employed. The student will also receive a replica as a permanent memento to his/her win.

The trophy will be awarded to an exceptional student

who has gained the I.H.C.I. Certificate with a high marking and who has introduced improved standards of hygiene at his/her place of employment. The trophy will be presented at a seminar at the Tower Hotel, Waterford on March 23, 1994.

The course is specially designed to meet the requirements of the Hotel and Catering Industry for Proprietor/Management, Supervisors, Chefs and Senior Cooks in or about to enter the industry.

The Course is of 16 hours duration, consisting of 2 sessions per week, for 4 weeks on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. The syllabus includes Elementary Microbiology, Food Borne Diseases and Food Poisoning, Food Protection Care of premises and Equipment; Personal Hygiene and self protection, control of insects and rodents and Food Hygiene Legislation. The fee for the course is £25 per person and people with queries or wishing to register for the Course should contact the Environmental Health Officer, St. Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan (058-42199) Ext. 44 or 50.

Deputy Austin Deasy, Fine Gael, has issued the following statement:



Seriousness Of Council Finances Highlighted

The seriousness of the overall financial situation of Waterford County Council was starkly highlighted in the auditor's report for the year ending December 31, 1992 presented at last week's Council meeting.

The Local Government auditor, Mr. Patrick J. Healy, disclosed details of several loss-making operations, and of falling returns from a number of collection areas including housings loans and non-metered water charges.

On the latter Mr. Healy stated that "it is now necessary for corrective action to be taken to redress the situation."

The auditor also referred to the Council's purchase of £75,000 of the share capital in the newly established Lismore Heritage Co. with the intention of

funding the investment by an annual charge of £7,500 on the revenue account. He further noted that the Council had also guaranteed company overdraft facilities amounting to £150,000.

"In addition the Council undertook work on behalf of Lismore Heritage Co. amounting to £75,662 which has remained unpaid at December 31, 1992", Mr. Healy stated.

"This", he added, "is recorded as an adverse balance in the capital account when normally such expenditure would be recorded in the revenue

account under agency works."

Mr. Healy also referred to the decision of the Council to take up a 30% shareholding in a second company, Lismore Experience Ltd. in 1992 at a cost of £30,000.

That company had been established with the objectives of operating a heritage centre, including an audio-visual show and exhibition/interpretive centre. The Council undertook work costing £59,303 of which more than £51,000 still remained due to the Council at the end of 1992.

"The company", said Mr. Healy, "recorded losses of £39,984 for the year 1992". And he went on to say that it is a matter of concern to him that the Council had guaranteed overdraft facilities to companies that had suffered substantial losses in 1992.

"The viability of both companies should be kept under constant review and steps should be taken to redress any further trend away from profitability," the auditor added.

Mr. Paul Clerkin, Financial Controller, said the 1993 returns from non-metered water charges will show a significant improvement on the previous year and it was hoped that improvement will continue in 1994.

He said disconnecting of supply will follow in the case of continuing refusals to pay the water charge.

Acting County Manager, Mr. Brian J. McNally, said they have a waiver scheme in operation, they had a pay by instalment system, and overall they take a most sympathetic approach.

Cllr. Tony Wright however accused the Council of behaving in "a totally uncivilised manner" in relation to water disconnections.

Finally it was agreed that, given the seriousness of the financial situation a special meeting dealing exclusively with finance will be held on January 31.

Housing Target Achieved In 1993

Mr. Emmet Stagg, T.D., Minister for Housing and Urban Renewal announced last week that he has now been informed by local authorities that a total of 3,800 local authority houses have been started or acquired in 1993.

"I want to congratulate local authorities, both members and officials, on their success in achieving the challenging target of 3,500 starts contained in the Programme for Government, a target which was 3 times higher than the 1992 level. The new starts, together with other

schemes currently in operation under the Plan for Social Housing will accommodate some 16,000 housing applicants between 1993 and 1994", the Minister said.

The Minister added that he was glad that the achievement of the starts target was accomplished

without resort to building large greenfield housing schemes on the periphery of towns and cities. "It's also encouraging to see that the number of existing dwellings purchased in 1993 was well up on previous years. These trends indicate the success of our policy of mitigating the extent and effects of social segregation in housing."

The number of new starts/acquisitions in 1993 for the county of Waterford was 75.

Ferryhouse Pantomime Will Not Be Visiting Dungarvan This Year

Sadly there will be no visit to Dungarvan this year by the Ferryhouse Pantomime. A spokesperson for the show explained that the problem does not lie with them, but is due to the fact that the Friary Hall is unavailable on the usual dates. In fact, this year's show "Robin Hood" is already on tour, playing Waterford on the 14th, and Carrick on 19th of January. The cast are very disappointed to miss out on what would have been their 21st show in succession in Dungarvan. Roll on 1995.

Feed the birds and keep those garden pests at bay



WINTER'S depths are probably a timely moment to reconsider the gardener's relationship with birds.

We like birds to attack slugs, snails, greenfly and other bugs and pests that plague our blooms and crops but, generally, we are slightly uneasy because the 'feathered friends' may also feed on or damage our garden.

But the 'green' revolution is forcing us to think carefully of other ways to beat the pests apart from chemicals.

Feeding the birds in winter, when they need some help, can also bring a lot of pleasure to the garden at an otherwise bleak time of year.

Blue and Great Tits are great favourites which can be attracted with bags of hanging nuts and upturned coconut halves or other containers filled with scraps set in fat.

They will entertain with looping flight and acrobatic feedings antics until you stop feeding in spring when it is time for them to repay winter dues by dining on pests such as caterpillars and greenfly.

You will have even more entertainment when their fledglings emerge.

Rarer but great allies against insect pests are wagtails and, particularly, the Pied Wagtail with its sprinting tail-wagging flights from cover.

More rural areas are likely to attract colourful finches such as Greenfinch, Goldfinch or Chaffinch if seed is put out. They will repay the debt in summer by feeding on weed seeds and insects.

Even the scruffy Starling and House Sparrow will help sort out summer pests, while the Thrush family — including the Blackbird and Robin — are the 'heavy artillery' you need for the war against slugs and snails.

But you must back your bird pact with consistent feeding through the winter, which encourages them to settle but does make them reliant on you.

You should also:

Use nets and scarers as usual and especially on brassicas in winter, to prevent birds feeding off them.

Distract the birds by making a bird table for feeding and site well away from cover that could be used by cats. If you have a cat, fix a bell to its collar to act as an early warning for birds.

Put water in a sturdy dish or bird bath for drinking or bathing — it will also be entertaining.

Give up spraying in summer as the bodies of insects would pass chemicals into the birds' systems to build up into a lethal dose.

Grow plants which birds like for cover, nesting and food storage, such as climbers and holly.

Encourage nesting with bird boxes. The Royal Society for the Protection of Birds can advise on designs — the size of the entrance is crucial to prevent hi-jacking by sparrows. — *Arthur Hines*

IDA REPORT

Over 1000 First Time Jobs Created

Over 1000 (1085) first time jobs were created in manufacturing industry in the Region. This figure represents the third highest in the country after the East and South West Regions. This is disclosed by Tom McAuliffe, Regional Manager IDA in his 1993 end of year statement for the South East Region. The level of approvals for start up and expanding industries was over 2000 (2076) for the year.

Major job losses at Waterford Crystal and Lapple together with the closure of Wexmann, Barrow Joinery and Castlecomer Woodwork resulted in a drop in permanent manufacturing employment of 361 jobs or 1%. However the impact was minimised by an equivalent increase in people employed on a contract or temporary basis in IDA as-

sisted firms.

After a slow start in the early part of the year 37 projects were approved for assistance under the Small Business Programme. In addition Mentors were appointed to 41 companies and 38 firms were approved Management Development Grants. Feasibility Study Grants were approved for 35 projects providing a

strong pipeline for 1994. Over £1.2m was approved under the Small Business Programme.

A wide range of Irish medium/large companies were assisted to expand including Kilkenny Limestone, Merriott, Glenpatrick, Showers and Dawn Fresh Foods.

Six overseas projects were approved for assistance including a number of greenfield projects including the LPC/Coillte project which will provide 500 jobs. Interest in the Region by overseas investors was high.

WATERFORD CITY & COUNTY

Taking permanent and temporary employment together there was a small increase in total manufacturing employment of 51 jobs. This was a very good performance when taken against a background of over 300 jobs losses in Waterford Crystal.

The decision by Louisiana Pacific Corporation to form a joint venture with Coillte to establish a 500 person Board Mill at Belview was the highlight of the year. IDA in supporting this £40m investment is confident that it will provide a major boost to the local economy.

Milton Bradley in the City and Stafford Miller in the County were approved for major expansions.

10 Small Business projects were supported to start up or expand and management development grants were approved to a wide range of companies.

Michell Ireland commenced production in its

new facility in the Portlaw/Carrick area tanning bovine hides for export markets. This state of the art tannery is a showpiece for the tanning industry in Ireland.

During the year Bausch & Lomb's employment exceeded the 1000 mark.

Telemarketing is a new sector for IDA and Waterford along with the other major population centres in the country has a lot to offer to potential promoters in this sector.

OUTLOOK FOR 1994

The outlook for manufacturing industry is more favourable, the report says, than this time last year. The UK market is improving and lower interests rates at home will boost investment. The pipeline of new investment projects both overseas and Irish indicate a good year for 1994.

Dungarvan Man Returns From England To Face Charges

Dungarvan District Court was told last Wednesday that a local man had handed himself up at the garda station that morning and made a full admission to crimes committed in the town as far back as seven years ago.

Twenty six year old father of two, Con Connors, 64 Childers Estate, Dungarvan, pleaded guilty to five charges of larceny of clothing, shoes, crates of beer, a cassette recorder and cash to the total value of £996 on dates between December 1986 to December 1987.

The specific charges against Connors were: — (1) entering the premises of McKeons, O'Connell Street, on December 26, 1986 and stealing cash and shoes to the value of £36; (2) entering the Arch premises at Main Street on April 24, 1987 and stealing clothing and shoes valued £627; (3) entering the same premises on December 22, 1987 and stealing shoes valued £126; (4) entering Power's Brewery, O'Connell Street, on May 5, 1987 and stealing eighteen crates of Harp beer valued £157, and (5) entering Dungarvan C.B.S. on May 19, 1987 and stealing a cassette recorder valued £50.

The court was told by Supt. Ray McAndrew that Connors had broken into four different premises in his criminal escapade. He subsequently absconded

and went to England. The defendant, he added, had previous convictions.

Mr. Niall King solr. said Connors had returned from England and presented him-

self that morning at the local garda station to face all the charges.

"He wants to come clean on everything, his whole attitude to life has changed,"

said Mr. King, who added that Connors has been employed as a Local Authority worker in England.

Judge Joseph Mangan remanded Connors on his own bail to Dungarvan Court on July 13 to enable him pay part compensation of £500 by that date.

In regard to public access to those areas, the situation is the same as for the remainder of Coillte's estates. Peg, of Coolnasmear and O'Connell Street, Dungarvan, went to God on January 8 at the District Hospital, Dungarvan. She was the youngest daughter of the late Mike and Margaret Dwyer of Coolnasmear. We would like to join in expressing our sincere sympathy with the many who have already done so to his nephews, nieces, sisters-in-law, cousins, relatives and friends at his passing.



OUR LOCALITY

There is only one tombstone with an inscription written in Irish to be found in the graveyard in Abbeyside. That tombstone is of Daithí O Dálaigh (David Daly). It was erected by his

son Pádraig, a Gaelic poet and scholar, who was a "timire" or organiser for the Gaelic League from the year of its formation in 1893. This family lived at the Burgery. The Burgery

townsland consists of two areas, one at Tarr's Bridge and the other just north of Boreen a' Mhuilleann (Little Mill Road) — the road that connects the Burgery and Barnawee. Tarr's Bridge is the old Pike and here we find the smallest townsland in the county, namely Jouterspark. Dealers in fish were locally known as Jouters and this area was formerly a commonage where fishmongers and hawkers carried on their trade. Some say it is the smallest townsland in Ireland and so it may be, being only 3 roods, 3 perches in area.

On the eastern side of the main road we find the following townslands:— Knocknasalla (Hill of the Oziers), Bawnabraher (Friars Field), Skehanard (Whitethorn of the Height).

The townslands on the Western side of the road are:— Knockboy (Yellow Hill), Loughanunna (Anne's Pond), Skehanard Barron (Whitethorn of the Height Barron), Terrystrang (Land of the Two Stainings), Clonmore (Great Meadow), Parkatluggera (Swallow - Hole Field).

ATHLETICS BY RACE LEADER

Kiely Monumental Colligan Cup

Waterford's fastest growing participation sports event, the Colligan Cup running festival, enters its sixth year on this Sunday, when the three Dungarvan Athletic Club promoted fitness orientated running competitions take place at the scenic Colligan Wood venue commencing at 10 a.m.

The Colligan Cup is once again being sponsored by David Kiely, Monumental Works which guarantees the organisational success of the events and all is now in readiness for a great day's sport and fun.

THREE RUNS

For the first time, the Colligan Cup will consist of three runs, the Colligan Wood Shield for under 11 to under 15 boys and girls, the inaugural ladies run for under 16 girls upwards and the long established mens event which concludes the days programme. The race distances are 2 kilometres, 2 miles and 5 miles respectively.

COLLIGAN CUP AIM

The aim of the Colligan Cup from its beginnings has been basically to promote an awareness and an active involvement in the promotion of fitness and running locally. As local sports enthusiast Eamon Martin states "most athletic clubs cater for and concentrate on the elite athlete. Here is an attempt to promote fitness among people who are outside the competitive athletic scene for their own personal benefit." In fact the popular Kerry man who, himself is an annual Colligan Cup pilgrim, does great work annually swelling the entries in the juvenile run through the C.B.S. Secondary School and he is now extending his efforts among the county's footballers as part of an ef-

fort to convince them of the need for an all year round level of basic fitness if our footballing fortunes are to experience an upward trend.

CROWD PULLER

The Colligan Cup is an annual crowd puller to these ideally situated woods and the Wooden Bridge - Stone Bridge circuit keeps the interest of the spectators throughout as their is a constant flow of runners from beginning to end. Many of the attendance leave with the ambition to participate the following year. The annual weather conditions have been ideal for this festival of fitness but now comes its greatest test with our present winter of weather and so, on it will depend Sunday's attendance.

HOW IT WORKS

Each runner predicts the time that he or she will take to complete the run. The event will then begin with the runner who has the slowest prediction time leading off the runners and on a time reverse system each person will run when their prediction time appears on the clock with the competitor with the fastest prediction time the last to begin. The clock continues on its journey to zero and the winner will be the runner who is first to finish the course when or after the clock reaches zero. It's not that we don't trust people or anything(!) but the use of a watch by participants is not

allowed. The first person over the finishing line has never won the event. In last year's Colligan Cup the winner, Liam Rossiter was the thirty fifth runner to finish.

UNIQUE

Devised by Corkman Victor Mullins, the Colligan Cup timing system is unique, not only in Irish

athletic circles, but in the International arena as well. It is a marvellous idea and no doubt in time it will be recognised as a major factor in the awareness and the promotion of fitness in our locality. The idea was born from the facility of a stopwatch to work in reverse and it enables the organisers to put the

responsibility back on the runners to determine their own level of fitness. From an initial entry of twenty two "pioneers" in 1989 the race attracted eighty participants last year.

Once Upon A Time

G.A.A. NOTES

Full Attendance At County Convention

What must surely have been one of the most talked about conventions in our history attracted a full delegation of 163 delegates to the Park Hotel on Saturday night last when the election of a County Chairman was perceived as being the highlight.

In a tight contest, outgoing Chairman, Eamon O Murchú was re-elected for a sixth term after he had declared himself eligible to stand for his final year in office, against Tony Mansfield, Abbeyside/Ballinacourty and Joe Byrne, Erin's Own. It was expected that the voting would be very tight and the result saw Eamon O Murchú hang in there for his final term by reaching the quota of 82 votes as against 72 for Tony Mansfield and 8 for Joe Byrne. There was one spoiled vote.

Having thanked the delegates for re-electing him, he said he would continue to serve the Association and asked for cooperation of all members. He confirmed that it would be his final year in office.

ENCOURAGED

Tony Mansfield said he was immensely encouraged by his fine vote in his first ever contest for a position on the Board and having referred to the highly motivating effect that our success in 1992 had on the county at large and in particular to the support given to the county this year when the development draw etc. was so satisfactorily undertaken, he promised that he would be back again next year to contest the position.

Joe Byrne said he was disappointed at the support given him and he referred to the broken promises and the pressures put on him before the convention not to stand. However, he said that if nominated next year he would again stand.

All the other outgoing members were re-elected as listed hereunder.

FINANCE

In a 30-minute discussion on the finances of the Board, questions were asked on various aspects of the balance sheet and most of these were taken by the Board's auditor who was present. He expressed the need for proper accounting records, particularly in relation to occasional checks on gate receipts on the occasion of big games, etc. He said that part of the Board's income derives from cash receipts and there was no practical audit procedures which could have been adopted to verify the completeness of certain of these records. Questions were also asked on the matter of income and expenditure and

replied to by the Treasurer, James Walsh.

The statement of accounts and balance sheet were adopted and this showed the Board owing approximately £80,000.

DEVELOPMENT ACCOUNT

County Development Treasurer, Greg Fives produced the audited account of the county draw and reported in the ten months period it had generated over £730,000 in income, of which the clubs in the county had benefitted enormously and development work was made possible.

There was a surplus of £178,632 and with Munster Council grants and loan, there was £272,630 available to the committee for developments. Already a total of £111,719 had been spent on Fraher Field, £22,486 had been allocated to buying school equipment for primary and secondary schools in the county and monies had been set aside for development work at Walsh Park. The current assets of the county finance committee are £125,174.

Having complimented the clubs, promoters, co-ordinators and particularly Miss Jackie Murphy, for their efforts, he said they had showed what Waterford can do when they let their minds down to it. He introduced committee secretary John Foley and chairman Declan O'Meara who outlined the promotional arrangements for the new and improved prize money draw, which is scheduled to be launched shortly. The reports were applauded and the committee were thanked by the County Chairman.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

Seamus Grant's report was

disposed of in a matter of minutes and attracted comment from only about three delegates. Jack McGrath took the opportunity to pay tribute to the retiring Jim Joe Landers and John Kiely spoke on coaching.

The County Secretary was complimented on his comprehensive report.

MOTIONS

The debates were somewhat lack lustre as for the most part they related to proposals for changes in championship structures, which really are matters for County Board and are talked about at convention in order to allow clubs to make their feelings known to the people who will ultimately decide on what might happen when County Board decides on the format of the 1994 championships at their first meeting in February.

JUNIOR CLUBS ON COUNTY BOARD

The motion from Kill which proposed that junior clubs have full representation on County Board was moved by Tom Power, Kill and strongly supported by the junior clubs present. The points made were that junior clubs pay the same affiliation and insurance fees as the other clubs and that at present they were excluded from being part of the process for electing county selectors, etc. The motion was passed without a division and this will mean that all junior clubs will have full representation at the Senior Board meetings.

The decision is a major departure from what has been the practice over the years and will, no doubt, have ramifications that might have been overlooked by convention. As well as having full representation on County and Divisional Boards, their voting strength at county conventions will increase to give them parity with senior and intermediate clubs, regardless of size and this will have an unbalancing effect on things in general. Nevertheless, it's what the clubs voted for.

A motion to have Congress agree to give minor clubs the same right to attend county conventions was passed unanimously.

Other successful motions related to recruiting of referees and making clubs obliged to submit names of at least one referee to the

Boards.

Paudie Flynn, Colligan and Michael Quann, Lismore each made strong cases for structural changes in the running of the senior hurling championships and Declan Barron proposed new systems for the football grades.

I will refer again to some of these motions next week.

CHAIRMAN'S ADDRESS

In a wide address, Chairman, Eamon O Murchú spoke about all aspects of the Board's involvement during the year which had just ended. Speaking about our fortunes at inter-county level, he said: "After the great year in 1992, I cautioned that we should not allow ourselves be carried away by the tide of euphoria and I cautioned that what was for us a great year could quickly become a bad year. But, for a couple of exceptions," he said, "that is what we had on the inter-county playing fields during the year 1993." Having referred to our failure to gain even one point in the remaining matches of the 1993/94 league, he said we allowed Cork back into the competition which they won after a three-game marathon with Wexford. He referred to the financial loss which resulted from this situation.


He made references to our shock defeat by Kerry in the Munster senior hurling championship and while we did not begrudge Kerry their overdue breakthrough, it was a devastating blow, but in a strange way we can take solace from it, in that everyone is capable of making a breakthrough, given the right attitude.

Having referred to the major development work at Fraher Field and also at Walsh Park this year, he praised the development and field committees and the clubs and members who had supported the county draw, which must be the envy of all other counties. He praised the role of women in our efforts and said he looked forward to the day when women will find themselves holding the highest offices in the Association.

At the conclusion of convention, County PRO John Jackson proposed a vote of thanks to the various sections of the media including WLR for their tremendous coverage of our games and their splendid cooperation

with him in giving exceptional publicity to all aspects of GAA activity in the county over the year.

Pat (distinguished to everyone in a popular way by being referred to as "small" Pat) was truly a leading light in bringing the first county title to the Nire senior footballers this year.

Pat Walsh's clubmate Tom Flynn, Nire was a popular choice as under-age footballer and his performances with the seniors was no less great than his under-age efforts. Another player with a great future.

WESTERN CONVENTION

One Major Change In New Board

As expected, there was a full attendance of delegates at last week's Western Board Convention which was held at An Rinn when the one major change in the line-up of the new Board resulted in the defeat of the outgoing Chairman, Ollie Wilkinson, Tourin by the lone contender, Paddy Joe Ryan, Fourmilewater.

As already stated, this particular contest had aroused very considerable interest throughout the division and had been viewed as being the highlight of convention with quite an amount of speculation on the outcome up to the 'off'.

The result was decisive in favour of the challenger, Paddy Joe Ryan, and Ollie accepted the result gracefully and promised every assistance to the winner. He said that his interest in Board affairs and the county's future would in no way diminish as a result of the election, even though he might be disappointed at having lost the contest. Many deserving tributes were paid to him for his dedication, diligence and impartiality while holding office as the Board's Chairman during his year in office and during which he was held in the highest esteem by everyone.

Paddy Joe, like his predecessor, had a distinguished career as a player with his clubs, the Nire and Fourmilewater and he has won championship medals in both hurling and football as well as being a referee at all levels and was club secretary for a number of years. In recent times he has turned his attention to the administrative side of our activities and is a regular delegate to County and Divisional Boards. He pledged himself to do his utmost in the interests of the Board while in office and he congratulated Ollie on having served the Board very well while in office. P. J. is the second member from his club to hold the office of chairman — a post previ-

ously held by Kieran Ryan who subsequently went on to become chairman of the County Board.

The results sheet published hereunder show that all the remaining officers were returned.

The convention got off almost on schedule after Nioclac Mac Craith had welcomed the 90 delegates to the Gaeltacht territory.

With the preliminaries disposed of, the meeting got down to the business of the agenda and the Financial Report from Tony Morrissey was disposed of in a matter of 5 minutes. Denis McGrath expressed the view that notes on the account might be more detailed and the treasurer replied that this would be possible in future. The chairman paid tribute to Tony Morrissey for his diligent service and the manner in which the accounts were presented and in reply Tony thanked the sponsors, gate-men and fellow Board officers who had assisted him in his first year in office.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

The comprehensive report by Secretary Anthony Walsh, attracted very little comment. Speaking about the hold up of the championship due to intercounty team preparation, Nioclac Mac Craith said that eight weeks were lost to the Board last year. James Tobin, Shamrocks, also spoke about the hold up in championship progress and said that an earlier start would help things a lot.

Again the Board chairman paid tribute to the enormous amount of work done by Anthony during an abnormally busy season.

MOTIONS

No. 1. This related to proper arrangements for the distribution and payment for All Ireland tickets and that proper records be kept. It was submitted by Cappoquin/Affane and addressed by Denis McGrath and supported by Nicky Donovan.

It was approved after little discussion.

The next six motions all related to a restructuring of the championships and many very interesting points were made in an hour long debate which included pro-

posals for change in every championship under the control of the Board.

Declan Barron, Ardmore, who led the debate, outlined what his club proposed in relation to the minor championship. Others who participated in the debates were James Tobin, Eddie O'Grady, Micheal O Toibin, Nioclac Mac Craith, Paddy Fitzgerald, Denis McGrath, etc., and while no definite decisions were reached, or could not be reached, there was a clear mood for some change among the delegates.

Many of the points made were repeated at the county convention on Saturday night.

The running of the inter-

mediate football championship on a knockout basis was proposed by Eddie O'Grady, Geraldines and supported by James Tobin and the same club proposed that the junior hurling championship be played on a knockout system and this was opposed by a number of delegates.

There were also proposals that the leagues be run in conjunction with the championships, but in the end all final decisions were left to the incoming Board.

Ardmore, through their delegate, Declan Barron, proposed that admission prices to our games, including double-headers, be fixed at the beginning of the year and publicised.

CHAIRMAN'S ADDRESS

In his very comprehensive address Chairman Ollie Wilkinson said:

"Looking back over '93 in the Western division, we can recall with satisfaction many outstanding performances and results on and off the field. The achievement of Lismore who contested five county finals, the heroic displays of Fourmilewater, and, of course, the Nire whose historic win over a great Dungarvan team showed that senior club football can stand with the best anywhere in this country. In intermediate hurling Stradbally join a select group of clubs who will play in the senior hurling and football championships in '94. Our hosts tonight An Rinn, struck by terrible tragedy regrouped with great spirit and battled to the county intermediate football final and I would also like to congratulate An Rinn on reaching the final of the All-Ireland Gaeltacht Championships last year, you did us proud and we can only wish you the best of luck in attempting to go that important one step further to outright victory this year.

"Clashmore in junior hurling made the breakthrough in the West, and Kilgobinet showed that their future is secure by reaching two divisional finals. At minor and Under-21 there were many great games and it is a pity that the divisional boards were not able to finish the Under-21 championships, due to dual involvement of clubs, enforced postponements and at the end the invoking of

county bye-laws."

The Chairman continued:—"The championship structures have been the subject of much discussion. I firmly believe that the knockout is the only way to run the championship — except for minors, backed up by a properly structured and sponsored league. Despite the unrest with the championship set-up, it is a pity that only 2 of the 27 clubs entitled to representation at convention tonight decide to place motions on the clár, dealing with this subject. I would urge clubs to give this matter priority between this and the first meeting of the incoming Board."

VERY QUIET

With regard to the inter-county arena Ollie said that after the mighty achievements of our minor and under-21 hurling sides in '92, the year gone by was very quiet by comparison. The minor hurlers were unlucky, but great strides were made in junior hurling and under-21 football. The great work done in the schools by Bord na nOg, by Peter Power and Pat Curran and their coaching courses was, he said, paying off and while there were major calls on finance in this county, he believed the incoming Board should give urgent consideration to extending the coaching schemes.

Ollie said, "the G.A.A. are in competing for the youth

The Championships

This has been submitted by a reader as a recommended system for running all our championships.

- 1 — Run championships on a league system one year and knockout the next. Hurling and football to rotate. Under-21 to senior grades.
- 2 — Bord na nOg and minor competitions to run opposite years to adult.
- 3a — Knockout championships to have losers group. Meeting to decide point of re-entry to championship proper. Phelan and Sargent Cup to run on league system in small groups. Tuesday or Thursday evening games.
- 3b — Junior and intermediate clubs to have joint special competition on same system as Phelan or Sargent Cups.
- 4a — League championships to be run as at present. Phelan or Sargent Cup to run on open draw, straight knockout competition. Tuesday and Thursday evening games to be considered.
- 4b — Junior and intermediate clubs to have joint special competition on same basis as Phelan or Sargent Cups.
- 5 — Special divisional championships to be run knockout.
- 6 — All county final dates to be fixed in February. All other final dates to be fixed by March 17. County team 1st and 2nd round fixtures to be taken into consideration.

Notes — Point 2 to take some pressure off under-16 and minor players.
Point 6 taking Munster 1st and 2nd round fixtures into account gives room for manoeuvre if teams are defeated. In event of success only one extra round needs consideration.
