Councillor "Feared For His Life" At Stormy Fine Gael Meeting

A Fine Gael public representative who walked out of a weekend party meeting in Dungarvan, has claimed that he had never in his life felt more intimidated in an atmosphere he described as "a frightening experience."

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan, a member of Dungarvan Urban Council and a former member of Waterford County Council, said he feared for his personal safety during a meeting of the Dungarvan FG District Executive which had been convened to consider the upcoming co-options on the urban and county councils following the recent death of Cllr. Richard A. Walsh.

Ironically the stormy meeting was chaired by Cllr. O'Riordan's wife, Mrs. Aine O'Riordan, and she too described it as "frightening".

The meeting, which at-

tracted almost seventy people, was — according to Cllr. O'Riordan — "a takeover", with several non-members present and even people from outside the Dungarvan District area in attendance.

"I was the subject of outrageous verbal attacks simply because I indicated my intention to seek the party nomination for the County Council seat," he said. "It was the first time I ever felt afraid for my own safety at a Fine Gael meeting or at any other meeting," he said.

Cllr. O'Riordan said they had just eight people in attendance at the previous

meeting of the District Executive, but this time people came from "the highways and the byways". He said there might have been as many as fifty non-members present.

The U.D.C. member accused certain people of doing everything they could to prevent his wife from properly chairing the meeting. They were so unruly that at one point they began stamping on the floor, he said, and when he tried to

Council Gives Thumbs Up To New Expenses

The members of Dungarvan Urban Council took little or no time at the monthly meeting to give a firm "thumbs up" to the new rate of expenses for Local Authority members announced by the Minister for the Environment and which became operative from January 1.

Under the new scale, members of the UDC will receive an annual expense allowance of £800 as against the £20 per monthly meeting which they have been receiving up to now.

Mr. Bertie White, Town Clerk, said to qualify for the £800 allowance members will have to attend 80% — or more — of the meetings held during a full year.

Members of Dungarvan Urban Council have hit out strongly at the now totally derelict state of a former petrol filling station at Youghal Road.

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan said it borders on the disgraceful that a once fine property had been allowed to become the eyesore it now

St. Brigid was born in Faughart, Co. Louth. Her youth was spent in herding and milking cattle and making butter. She was an attractive girl so her father naturally wished to fix a marriage for her. One is reminded of Patrick's words: "But greatest is the suffering of those women who love in slavery. All the time they endure terrors and threats. But the Lord gave his grace to many of the maidens, for though they were forbidden to do so, they follow him bravely."

Brigid wished to consecrate herself to God's service. Her father refused permission, but seeing her determination he consented to allow her to take the veil. Her life depicts her as an active nun living with her community but often travelling either for evangelical

or charitable purposes. Cattle were the main support of her monastery. Hospitality, alms-giving and care of the sick were her main preoccupation. Though her monastery was small in her lifetime, her reputation for genuine holiness earned her the title of Mary of the Gael.

Auditor To Investigate Disposal Of Council Owned Property

The Chairman of Dungarvan Urban Council is to ask the Council's Local Government auditor to initiate a full scale investigation into the majority 8-1 decision to dispose of Council-owned property on the seafront to a local business consortium.

Cllr. Tony Wright of Democratic Left, who was alone in his opposition to the disposal of the near derelict property at Davitt's Quay free of charge, has described it as "the most disgraceful" decision ever taken by the UDC.

Under the terms of the

"deal" the developers will provide 60,000 square feet of ultra modern office accommodation to the UDC — without charge — for a period of twenty five years. In addition they will also pay rates annually on the re-developed property to the Council.

Cllr. Wright, however, told the monthly Council meeting that he remains "deeply concerned" about certain aspects of the decision to dispose of the property, and he believes an in-depth inquiry into the whole matter should now be undertaken.

"I want to inform the meeting that it is my intention to ask the Local Government auditor to hold a full investigation to see if the UDC got value for money, or indeed if it has got anything at all from this deal," the Chairman said.

"I feel very strongly about this matter, as do a lot of people I have spoken to about it," Cllr. Wright added.

Mr. Brian J. McNally, Acting County Manager, said councillors are entitled to raise any issue with the auditor.

Plans For Dungarvan's St. Patrick's Day Parade Well Advanced

With Christmas and the new year safely behind us, many are now turning their thoughts to the next major holiday, St. Patrick's Day, an occasion which has grown in stature in Dungarvan in recent years.

This is due in no small way to the commemorative parade which is held each year and the small but dedicated group which organise the event. From humble beginnings almost 20 years ago, Dungarvan's parade has grown annually to be a showpiece of organisation, a credit to all who take part and a fitting tribute to our National Apostle.

For several years now St.

Patrick has smiled on the efforts of Dungarvan Pipe Band who organise the mammoth event and their efforts have been blessed with bright sunshine and high temperatures.

Whether such will be the case this year we will not know until the day, but the hard-working St. Patrick's Day Committee will leave little else to chance as they seek to discharge the re-

They are well advanced with their plans, having commenced long before Christmas and though they are still shocked by the tragic loss of their Treasurer, James Power, they have vowed that the parade will again be a spectacle of which he could be proud.

They call on all local clubs, societies and organi-

sations as well as representatives of industry and commerce, to consider entering the parade, whether with a float, as a marching body or in some form of dress. Greater community participation would substantially help the parade which has grown to be not only Dungarvan's but West Waterford's official celebration of the National Day.

Presently the committee are seeking sponsorship to defray the £3,000 approximate costs of the parade and any contribution, large or small, will be appreciated. In the meantime they continue their preparations so that all will be in readiness on the big day.

Plans For Ultra Modern Traffic Roundabout Outlined

Detailed plans for a new ultra modern traffic roundabout — the largest in Co. Waterford — were outlined by County Engineer Mr. John O'Flynn at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council.

The roundabout will form part of Dungarvan's new by-pass road and will link up with the main Cork-Waterford N25 route at the Youghal Road.

To enable the roundabout to be constructed the planners have had to extend out into part of Dungarvan Bay where a new protective sea wall will also be built.

In addition it has been necessary to demolish a dwellinghouse in the area, but Mr. O'Flynn told the meeting that the family involved has already been rehoused.

Mr. O'Flynn disclosed

that the roundabout will have a wide footpath all around its perimeter to ensure pedestrian safety, while a pedestrian railing will also be provided. There will be a pelican-operated crossing sign and a special "cycle way" so that cyclists can also cross in safety.

"It isn't easy to protect pedestrians at a major roundabout other than an overhead bridge like the one which has been provided in Midleton which no one seems to use," said Mr. O'Flynn.

The County Engineer said the National Roads Authority will be providing the funding for the roundabout which should be in place by the middle of this year. There would also be complete new traffic route lighting, he added.

Don't forget the Indoor Plants



JANUARY weather can be a deterrent to gardening but don't see your indoor plants suffering along with you.

This is the time to appreciate houseplants but gardeners stuck inside with time on their hands often forget their fellow inmates too easily.

True, many need little care, but that often depends on the right locations and temperature in the first place. Unless these are well chosen and a watchful eye kept on the plants, they can all quickly.

Many hate draughts while others abhor the dry and stuffy atmosphere created by modern heating.

Perhaps the most durable and novice-proof are cacti and succulents. They are close relatives but cacti generally have spiny 'leaves' while succulent leaves are tough and fleshy, though these do come in strange forms such as the so-called living rocks (lithops).

Keep both types cool and watered sparingly perhaps once a month at this time — any more and rot may set in. But while cacti and succulents are easy to keep they are rather dull, with the exception of the blade-leaved Sansevieria — aptly named Mother-in-Law's Tongue.

Better focal points are rich green-leaved varieties such as the Rubber Plant, Swiss Cheese Plant (Monstera), Philodendron and Castor Oil Plant (Fatsia).

These tolerate indoor conditions and are quite cheap in High Streets and garden centres, usually complete with tags showing tips on care.

One tip for this time of year is likely to be a light spray with water to prevent browning and curling leaves.

Sometimes it is worth creating a 'moisture jacket' by choosing a larger pot and standing the plant's own pot inside. The gap between is filled with peat, kept saturated in order to create humidity around the plant.

A craving or humidity is a problem with the elegant but fussy Weeping Fig, which hates draughts and needs regular misting.

It is also susceptible to scale insect — watch for the tell-tale stickiness from the bugs and their tortoise-like shells on leaves and stems.

Such problems probably account for the premium prices commanded by this variety, and make it worth protecting your investment with pesticide pellets/pins inserted into the plant's compost.

Don't put them somewhere hot just because you think they like the desert — they actually prefer around 60F, little sun and lots of water and misting during winter. The family favourite is the Parlour Palm, probably as it is easier to look after.

But if you want plants to share your winter-time inactivity, stick with cacti, succulents or, toughest of them all, the good old aspidistra — not for nothing known as the Cast Iron Plant! — *Arthur Hines*


High Fibre Scones Are A Good Snack



baking powder
1/4 tsp (1/4x5ml) spoon
salt
2 oz (50g) margarine
3 oz (75g) mature cheddar cheese, finely grated
4 fl oz (100ml) milk
Extra milk for brushing
1 oz (25g) grated cheddar cheese for topping

Method

Sift flour, baking powder and salt; add bran left in sieve. Rub in margarine with fingertips until mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs. Add grated cheese, corn niblets, liquid from can and milk. Stir together with round-bladed knife. Draw mixture together to form dough, then pat out on flowered surface to



1cm (1/2in) thickness. Cut into 6.5cm (2 1/2in) rounds. Place on lightly floured baking sheet. Brush tops with milk and sprinkle with grated cheese. Bake 18 mins, at 425°F, 210°C, gas mark 7, until scones are well risen and brown. Place the scones on a wire rack to cool. Makes 12.

7 oz (198g) can corn niblets

Dissatisfaction At Quality Of T.V. Service From Cork Communications

Two representatives of Cork Communications Ltd. were left in no doubt about the depth of dissatisfaction with the quality of their multi-channel television service in West Waterford when they attended a two-hour meeting in Lismore last week.

Two representatives of Cork Communications Ltd. were left in no doubt about the depth of dissatisfaction with the quality of their multi-channel television service in West Waterford when they attended a two-hour meeting in Lismore last week.

During what proved to be an acrimonious even stormy meeting the company was

accused of "foisting" a new MDS system on their customers, and there was a suggestion from the floor that all payments to the company be withheld until "matters are rectified."

The meeting was convened by Lismore Town Commissioners in the wake of the Cork Communications decision of early December to switch from the cable system

which the company has been successfully operating in the towns of Cappoquin, Lismore and Tallow for many years.

The change necessitated the installation of a black box which will also make available the range of Sky channels including Sky Sports and the two movie channels.

However public anger swiftly followed with many people complaining that the changeover had resulted in a serious deterioration in reception from the R.T.E. 1 and Network 2 channels.

The company was also ac-

cused of seriously disrupting the operation of video recorders in homes throughout the region.

"Public anger became so intense that I decided we should convene a meeting to which Cork Communications would be invited", Mary Ryan, Chairwoman of Lismore Town Commissioners told the "Leader".

The company did take up the invitation, and Michael McCormack and Patrick Punch sat through a meeting at which criticism of Cork Communications was often unsparring.

Another member of Lismore Town Commissioners, Mrs. Mary Fenton-Morrissey, said the cost of taking up the full range of multi-channel options from the Cork company, including charges for the "black box", will come to about £450 annually.

"That", she insisted, "isn't on."

The meeting was also attended by local county councillors William McDonnell and Nora Flynn, and Cllr. Flynn said that a serious confrontational situation will emerge unless the company adopts "an entirely different attitude."

The Cork Communications representatives said they weren't aware that so many problems existed and they undertook that the company would take speedy measures to put matters right.

"We now await the fulfillment of that commitment, but in truth we're not holding our breath," said Mary Ryan.

Lismore Town Commissioners

CORK COMMUNICATIONS

It was stated that such difficulties began when Cork Communications began installing "black boxes" in the cabled area of the town. The meeting was fixed for Wednesday, January 12 at 8 p.m. in Lismore Hotel.

It was agreed to invite a representative of Cork Communications to attend. Mrs. M. Ryan stated that the meeting would be a forum for local issues only and they were providing a platform for the residents to air their views.

Mrs. M. Morrissey felt that a representative from RTE should attend. It was agreed on her proposal that Mr. Ted Kelly, technical director RTE be also invited.

Please note that Reception Complaint forms regarding difficulties in receiving RTE 1 and 2 are now available in the Post Offices in Lismore, Cappoquin and Tallow.

DOG LITTER

Mrs. M. Morrissey stated that on returning from school recently, she was horrified at

the continuing amount of dog litter that soiled our footpaths. It was agreed that the Commissioners had done everything in their power to highlight this problem.

Mr. B. McNally stated that to effectively control this matter, the residents would have to be willing to go to court and give details of any such occurrence.

Mr. P. Dowd felt that they should make use of the Dog Warden. Mr. McNally stated that if Commissioners give him details, then he would relay such matters to the Dog Warden for the county.

TEAGASC

Mrs. M. Morrissey complained that the shrubs in the Teagasc grounds have been allowed to grow wild and now overhang onto the public road with an obvious danger to pedestrians. It was unanimously agreed to write to Teagasc and request them to clean up same.

VEE ROAD

The Clerk stated that he would have investigated the amount of water lodging on this road, which was raised by Mr. P. Dowd.

OGHAM STONE

Mr. J. Roche felt that every effort should again be made in order that the Seamacudda Ogham Stone be returned to the area. The Clerk stated that they made previous representations both to the Minister and UCC in this matter. It was agreed that the Clerk would provide copies of the correspondence to Mr. Roche.

IRISH FAMINE 1845/1995

Mr. B. Leddy felt that with the approach to the 150th an-

niversary of the famine that some consideration be given now to planning some commemoration to mark the event. Mr. Leddy agreed to research the project and report at a forthcoming meeting.

D. HURLEY'S RETIREMENT

The Chairwoman was complimented on the success of this night, which was enjoyed by all.

GRAVEYARD

The Clerk stated that two trees were taken down by the Council as they were a danger to the adjoining wall and ESB supply and had not fallen due to storm damage.

County Council Takes Action

After many discussion regarding dangerous tress at Waterford County Council meetings, the Council are now taking a stand on the issue after Cllr. Willie McDonnell, Tallow, raised the following motion at the January meeting of the Council:

"At the request of the Parents' Association of the Presentation Convent, Lismore, would Waterford County Council request Lismore Estates to immediately knock dangerous overhanging trees on the Ballysaggart, Vee and Shanavoola roads, in the interest of safety."

Since then Cllr. McDonnell has been notified of the following by John O'Flynn, Co. Engineer:

"I wish to inform you that Mr. Ray O'Dwyer BE, Area Engineer, has taken the matter up with Mr. Pendruddock, Agent and Mr. Chevasse, Forester, Lismore Estates, and they have undertaken to fell any trees considered to be prejudicial to the roads in question. Marking of trees considered to be dangerous has already commenced and it is expected that felling of tress will follow in due course. In the meantime the position is being monitored by Mr. O'Dwyer."



Mr. Denis English, Bawnfaun, Ballymacarbry, a business man who has owned Marlfield House for the past thirteen years, completed a deal recently and bought another stately mansion, Knocklofty House. The price tag on Knocklofty House was £360,000 which was a major reduction on the original asking price of £1.5 million when the former house of Lord and Lady Donoghmore was put on the market two years ago. Just six months ago Denis bought Durrow Castle in County Laois, an early 18th century castle which until recently was a school run by the Presentation Sisters. He sees this property as an ideal venue for large exhibitions or sales because of its location on the main Cork-Dublin road. There he will be holding a major Gardening Show, the Irish Grounds, Gardens and Outdoors Show on Easter weekend, April 2-4, 1994. Mr. English plans to live in Durrow, while the plan for Knocklofty is to rent long and short terms apartments

there. This he had been successfully doing in Marlfield for the past decade. Mr. English is now the owner of three stately homes, a remarkable success story. He began his working life at the age of fourteen years in Burke's Bacon Factory, Clonmel, where he remained for just six months. He worked for a further six months in Curran's Signs, Clonmel. He then moved to Dillon's Garage, Clonmel, to serve his time as a mechanic. He stayed there until he emigrated to England setting up his own garage business. His entry into the property field came by chance. He had a small garage in 1978 and through an enquiry he made about renting a lock-up garage, he ended up buying the estate of which it was part of. Property prices at the time were low but interest rates at the time were high.

All his business has been transferred back to Ireland by now and as he bought in Ireland he sold in England. Since Knocklofty House was sold by the Donough-

more family in 1983 for conversion into a hotel, it is estimated that around £1 million has been spent on it. It now includes a golf course, a leisure centre with a swimming pool, squash courts, sauna and outdoor tennis court. He plans to lease the restaurant, leisure centre and golf course, and to let apartments in the house and converted mews on a long or short term

basis. Knocklofty dates from the 17th century with 18th and 19th century additions. Its leisure facilities include a mile of fishing along the River Suir.

Denis attributes his success to a number of factors, including reasonable prices, the contacts he made and also the fact that he is very reasonable. So we salute this young business man on his achievements.

tory in Ireland to receive the international quality standard, ISO 9001. Waterford Foods is the first of the food manufacturing companies to have part of their operation upgraded from ISO 9002 to ISO 9001.

Being upgraded to ISO 9001 means that the Kilmeaden cheese factory have now satisfied additional requirements in the areas of design control and servicing.

Presenting Kilmeaden Factory Manager Donal Lehane with the certificates, Minister for Food Brian O'Shea praised the attitude of the Waterford Foods personnel, citing the award as clear evidence of Waterford Foods' continuing commitment to quality in all aspects of their work.

Speaking at the short presentation ceremony, Stephen O'Connor, Managing Director of Waterford Foods plc, described the event as an outstanding day for the Kilmeaden cheese plant.

"Kilmeaden is now a state of the art cheese manufacturing facility with approximately 100 people employed and a major investment, costing in the region of £1 million, is due to be completed within a month. This investment is creating the infrastructure for future expansion at Kilmeaden."

"The ISO 9001 award demonstrates to our customers that our work in design control and after sales service is the best available.

It is significant that we are the first in Ireland to receive the ISO 9001, and that Kilmeaden has achieved real scale in European terms. Add in the very substantial Magheralin and Galloway West operations and the full extent of Waterford Foods involvement in the cheese manufacturing begins to be revealed".

Mr. O'Connor praised Donal Lehane and all of the staff at Kilmeaden for their excellent work and for their far sightedness in targeting ISO 9001 as an achievable goal.

"It means that the Dairy Division, through Kilmeaden, is looking to the future of the cheese industry", he added.

ICMSA Calls For Abolition Of Death Tax

The ICMSA attended a meeting of the Alliance Against Probate Tax on January 17th, which re-convened in advance of what the ICMSA describes as a death tax.

"The ICMSA was the first organisation to condemn this unjust and crude form of taxation. The Probate Tax is a death tax which takes no account of the ability to pay, or of the marital or family circumstances of the recipient of the property.

"The Probate Tax is another form of Government discrimination against the productive sector and against the farming sector. Thousands of small farms which would not otherwise have been subject to capital tax are now liable to this tax on the death of the farmer," said Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, President of the ICMSA.

HOMEOWNERS FARE BETTER THAN FARMERS

Mr. O'Dwyer gave an example of a 70 acre family farm, where the farm is worth £150,000 and on the death of one partner the surviving spouse is liable to a £2,400 probate tax bill. By contrast, he said that a couple living in a much sought after urban district, with a family home valued at £150,000 are not liable to probate tax on the death of one of the spouses, due to the fact that the family is exempt from the tax. This is totally unjust according to Mr. Dwyer.

The Alliance meeting also outlined other taxation demands which Mr. O'Dwyer said are essential if we are to create a healthy environment for investment, particularly by small to medium sized companies.

IFA NEWSWEEK

Special Beef Premium Scheme

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan welcomed the announcement from the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh to extend the current application period for the 10 and 22 month Special Beef Premium Scheme from January 31st to February 28th, 1994.

Mr. Donovan said: "Minister Walsh's positive response to IFA's request to extend the closing date will allow additional cattle, which would otherwise have been barred, qualify for premium, worth £73.23/head."

The IFA livestock farmer was highly critical of the fact that many farmers were still waiting on their Special Beef Premium application forms from the Dept. of Agriculture despite the fact that the application period opened on January 1st. "It is unacceptable that farmers are denied the facility to make an early application because the Department have not got their act together on something as simple as sending out application forms on time." Mr. Donovan added: "This mistake has significant repercussions for people wishing to sell cattle in early March, following completion of the two month retention period."

In order to overcome this problem Mr. Donovan called on Minister Walsh to obtain a derogation for a one month extension period for all Beef Premium applications submitted in January. "This will enable producers who apply immediately sell their cattle in late February and avoid an oversupply and unnecessary price pressure in March." Mr. Donovan also called for

a further Beef Premium application in the month of May.

ANIMAL HEALTH

Following successful negotiations between the IFA National Animal Health Committee and the Dept. of Agriculture/ERAD, farmers with diseased holdings will now have their premises and utensils disinfected by the Farm Relief Services free of charge.

The Waterford Chairman of the Animal Health Committee, Ned Murphy, said the Department of Agriculture will pay the Farm Relief Services for the work on a contract basis similar to the reactor collection service. The streamlining of the EC disinfection requirement will help in the eradication of bovine TB and brucellosis and also speed up the payments of reactor grants to farmers.

Previously, individual farmers in serious financial difficulties following outbreaks of disease in their herds had to pay excessive charges ranging from £60 - £200 to have the EC veterinary disinfection and certification requirement carried out, even though they had the machinery and manpower to carry out the work themselves.

MILK HYGIENE REGULATIONS

Waterford IFA Dairy Committee Chairman, Gerald Curran, this week called on Minister Walsh to clarify the position regarding available grant aid under the new milk hygiene regulations.

Mr. Curran said: "IFA believe that up to £100 million is required in grant aid to meet the standards demanded under the new regulations."

Ireland's Suckler Quota Must Be Protected

The Chairman of the ICMSA Livestock Committee, Mr. Nicholas Ryan, has called on the Minister for Agriculture, Food & Forestry, Mr. Joe Walsh, to make immediate contact with Commissioner Steichen to protect the quota of suckler cow producers in this country.

Mr. Ryan said that any attempt by the EU Commission to reduce the suckler cow quota to 1991 levels must be clearly opposed.

He said that many farmers established themselves in suckling for the first time in 1992 and many of these paid above the odds when buying cows to establish a quota. These farmers would be out of business with serious financial commitments of their quotas are now confiscated. Mr. Ryan concluded by calling on Minister Walsh to take immediate steps to safeguard the livelihoods of Irish suckler producers.

Having made a hurried dash from the Montrose studios after presenting that afternoon's "Sports Stadium", Michael surprised many of the audience by his acknowledgement that he was in fact born in Dungarvan.

He referred to the "wealth of talent" that exists in Waterford sporting circles and lauded the Park Hotel for providing the platform from which that talent can be highlighted.

The chairman of the adjudication panel, Fr. Pat Moran O.S.A., said it had taken them ten hours of deliberation to finalise their choice as the Supreme Sportstar. They had, he said, twelve outstanding monthly contenders, and in the final analysis the decision had not been an easy one.



The torch lit at the dawn of this century has often flickered uncertainly but still burns steadily as yet another generation grasps it with hope and courage while this century tapers to a close. 





G.A.A. NOTES

Eastern Convention

I was reminded last week that I gave very little coverage to the Eastern Convention which took place at Mount Sion Centre on Monday, January 10. This was because of the County and Western Conventions being held on the same week and also the Western Bord na nOg Convention which was also held on January 10.

It is not good for everyone that so many important meetings should take place in the same week, not alone because of the publicity factor, but also because many people are put under too much pressure.

Of late the pressures involved by the elections are so intense that other important matters which would be attended to, get neglected. Very many people will agree that all conventions should be held before Christmas in order to leave the new year for planning and getting things better organised before we set out on our club and intercounty championship campaigns.

CHAIRMAN'S ADDRESS

Frankie Cullinane who was re-elected after a contest with Michael Hearne of Ballyduff Club, made a number of interesting points in his address to the convention which had a one hundred per cent attendance. I quote from his address:

"It saddens one to have to report that our playing standards have dropped and consequently, general opinion indicates that the playing standards in our division are not comparable to standards in former years. Is this the reason for the drop off in attendances at many of our venues?"

"I would like to draw attention to the fact that there are clubs who only attend the inaugural meeting of the Board for the sole purpose of affiliating their teams and for the remainder of the year are not

being represented at further meetings. For the good of the Association this is a trend which must cease.

"I would like to advise the Board that the matter of inter-club transfers is something which needs urgent attention. If this is not looked at seriously, some clubs could find themselves on the verge of extinction."

Referring to the intermediate football championship, Frankie Cullinane stated: "The intermediate football championship requires serious attention as to my mind, it is a non-runner, having only a few teams showing any interest in the grade. If this trend is allowed to continue, I am afraid football in the division and indeed in the county in general, will be all the poorer."

On the brighter side the Board Chairman said there were noticeable success stories in the championships in the Eastern Division and he congratulated those clubs who had championship victories, etc. He also dealt with Scór, sponsorship of the championships and the tremendous publicity afforded to the Board by the media in general and mentioned WLR and the County PRO, John Jackson.

FINANCE

Board Treasurer, Davy Kirwan presented a fine balance sheet which showed the Board to have assets of £3,267, despite the fact that expenses for the year increased, mainly due to increased payments to referees, whose expenses were brought into line during the year, with those obtaining in other counties.

Gate receipts for the year also showed a satisfactory increase when they totalled £9,000 approximately.

Sponsorship

The decision by the Association to allow sponsorship of championships, etc., has proved to be of enormous benefit to the Boards and Councils and this fact, as far as this county is concerned is clearly illustrated in the balance sheets published by the various Boards this year.

The generosity of the many firms, businesses and individuals show in a very tangible way, their interest in the promotion of the games in this county. This year alone in sponsorship and programmes, the County Board benefitted to the tune of approximately £20,000, the Western Board received £2,150 and the Eastern Board approximately £1,000. Over £2,500 was received by County Bord na nOg and there was also generous sponsorship given to the divisional juvenile committees, to the coaching committees, to our well run summer camp, to intercounty teams and to clubs, etc., throughout the county, so in all we are talking of around £30,000 from the various donors, etc.

Waterford Crystal too have been most generous and their contribution to the county amounts to many thousands of pounds as we already published after their official launch last year. Our county hurling teams are sponsored by Waterford Foods, our club championships by Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan and there is sponsorship of the football teams by the Park, Clonea Strand and others. The Waterford Supporters Club have also provided great relief in sponsoring activities on the inter-county front and as indeed have others.

While it would be impossible to quantify the full value of all the sponsorship, it is acknowledged that the generosity of those mentioned, and others, is of enormous benefit to the county and to our clubs and long may it continue. Church & General, who are the sponsors of the National Leagues, give generously to the Association in general and we benefit annually to the tune of £1,500 from this and would qualify for larger amounts if we were more successful in the league competitions — maybe we will in the future.

New ground will be broken in the area of national sponsorship this year when the All-Ireland series will be sponsored for the first time. Negotiations are at an advanced stage and expected to be finalised before the inter county championships commence in April. All counties will benefit from this innovation and understandably the counties who progress in the provincial championships will fare better, financially, than those who go out in the early stages.

This article is by no means intended to create the notion that our activities

expenses are taken care of by these sponsorship grants as huge amounts of cash have to be earned or raised in different ways by all the units concerned as can be seen from the various annual sheets of Boards, Clubs and Councils.

Tonight, at the County Board na nOg annual convention a figure of almost £15,000 will be seen by the delegates as the figure involved in running their affairs last year and the very detailed report which was recently circulated to all clubs in the county clearly illustrates, the headaches involved for all the members who are charged with the responsibility of running our affairs at this level.

The county convention last week saw delegates discuss their balance sheet which involved over a quar-

ter of a million pounds and both Divisional Boards last year had huge amounts passing through their accounts and if we add the finances involved in the programme for development of fields, the running costs of clubs and our other activities we are well into a seven figure amount.

It is difficult to imagine, but nevertheless a fact, that our sixty or so clubs who spend an average of £20,000 a year to run their affairs, handle in the region of one million pounds in running costs and development annually.

I often wonder about all this and the great club people who are prepared to stick with it in spite of the headaches and hardships that have to be suffered to keep the show on the road every year. It is a subject that I will return to again.

All Stars

It was explained to me many years ago, the basis on which players in both codes are selected for the annual awards. I often doubt if the proper guidelines or terms of reference for final selection are being strictly adhered to and so do many others in other counties. Of course I have always had reservations about this whole matter of awards and being selective about people who perform or play as I have ever felt that there is an element of discrimination involved. However, all these selections are made every year from the lowest to the highest level and must be accepted for what they are worth.

I attended a few All Star presentation functions during the past years and experienced the great disappointment felt by nominated players who felt that they should have won the award, but didn't.

In a recent publication, details of the 660 All Star awards since their introduction in 1971, were given and these were shared by 344 players in hurling and football, some winning a number of times. We had no one in football and had only 4 of the 330 awards in hurling. Here is the list.

Hurling All Stars — Kilkenny 74, Cork 70, Galway 53, Tipperary 39, Limerick 28, Offaly 22, Wexford 18, Clare 13, Wa-

terford 4, Antrim 4, Dublin 2, Laois, Westmeath and Down one each.

Amazingly of the 344 players (both codes) who have received awards in the 22 years of the scheme, all have surname initials covered by all but five letters of the alphabet. The exceptions are U, V, X, Y and Z.

On Munster Team

The provincial team to play Connaught in the semi-final of the Railway Cup on Sunday, February 6 was named last week and includes Tom Fives who will play at midfield, Stephen Framp-ton at centre-half back and Sean Cullinane, Passage, Billy O'Sullivan and Tony Browne are named as substitutes.

It is good to see a number of our players getting very deserved recognition by the provincial selectors, even though the Railway Cup competition is no longer a high-profile affair, as it was in days gone by.

Is This Unique

It is not usual for a chairman of a club to also be a player, but it does happen occasionally. It is very rare indeed that the club chairman is also the team captain. It is probably unique when the club chairman captains a team which goes on to win a county championship. It creates a funny situation when the championship medals are being presented and the chairman has to shake hands with himself I suppose. Such is the case with well known Michael Lawlor who is both chairman of the Kilmactomas club and had the honour of captaining their junior hurling team which won them their first title last year.

The medals, by the way will be presented at their annual social which takes place on Friday night, February 4.

Lismore To Celebrate

On Friday, February 4 Lismore club will hold their annual social and celebrate a year which was probably the greatest in their history and distribute a record number of trophies to the players who won the honours in 1993.

As well as winning the 'Club of the Year' trophy, they won the senior, under-21 and under-16 hurling

championships to add to the under-21 hurling title of 1992 (which was played and won in March of 1993).

Young Dan Shanahan, who will be among those receiving championship medals has set a record of having won no fewer than 10 championship trophies, including six Western titles, a record not likely to be matched for a very long time.

NATIONAL LEAGUE DATES

The playing season will officially open on next Sunday week when the county footballers resume their National League campaign at Stradbally venue, where they take on Sligo, who are reported to be doing quite well in the league so far. We have a home football game against Kilkenny at Portlaw just two weeks later.

The Cork hurlers are expected to be back from the Canaries, where they are on holidays at the moment, in time for their game against Waterford when these counties re-open their league campaign at Pairc Ui Caoimh on next Sunday fortnight. Two weeks later we will play Galway at Ballinasloe.

County Convention

I promised to return to the subject even though a reader remarked to me last week, that by now everyone has had enough of it. The rejoicing and disappointments of the meeting have been discussed over and over and I'm sure very few readers are interested in a rehash of something that has been discussed over and over again in the past ten days or so. Maybe it is just as well to leave it and get on with things of the future.

Talking about things of the future and relative to one convention decision, I found during the past week that one of the administra-

tive matters being discussed was the passing of the motion which will give junior clubs full rights at monthly meetings of the County Board and the future role of the Divisional Boards in the affairs of the county. One of the points being made strongly is that junior clubs will have equal representation with the larger clubs, etc., at convention and the resultant imbalance in representation. It is also being said that this point should have been made when the motion was being discussed and passed and this is a reality. But at the same time the imbalance is a matter

that will likely be addressed in some way in the future. The matter of the need, or otherwise of having three Divisional Board Representatives from each of the two divisions, is now also being discussed. They are required to put the views of junior clubs to the County Board meetings, but now since junior clubs will have official audience at such meetings, will there be any

need for the divisional reps. and will they become redundant?

As of now they are elected and their office and role in things cannot be interfered with, but unless there are further structural changes to redress some of the complications, their future must be considered to be in jeopardy. That, of course, will be a matter for future Boards.

SENIOR HURLERS

On Saturday last Waterford hurlers travelled to Ennis for a challenge game with Clare and according to reports, it was a satisfactory trial from our point of view. Waterford travelled in strength and were being led by seven points going into the final quarter. Then a grandstand finish saw Waterford take control of the game and draw level just on time, with some delightful scores.

Coaches Reappointed



Councillor "Feared For His Life" At Stormy Fine Gael Meeting

He finally decided that the best thing to do was to leave the meeting. "Even as I did there were jeers and applause," he said, "I never thought certain people in Fine Gael could sink so low."

The meeting ended shortly afterwards — but without completing any of the business it was convened for in the first place.

Cllr. O'Riordan said that had he been approached in a proper way and asked to withdraw his name for the County Council nomination he would have given it due consideration. However after what he and his wife had been put through at the weekend meeting there was no way he is now going to stand aside.

"My name will be before the convention, a convention many at the meeting didn't want to have at all," said Cllr. O'Riordan. "I will abide by the democratic decision of the convention."

Members of the late Cllr. Walsh's family however have denied that any of them lost their cool at the District Executive meeting.

Martin Walsh, a son of the late Cllr. Walsh with whom he had shared membership of Dungarvan Urban Council between 1979 and 1985, said his father was hardly cold in his grave when the plotting and planning began about filling the vacant U.D.C. and County Council seats.

"Respect for my father is gone as far as some people within Fine Gael are concerned," he said, adding that it would have been his father's wish that he would fill both vacant seats.

Another of the late Cllr. Walsh's sons, John, said in deference to their father's memory there was no way any of the family would allow themselves to be defeated at what, he said, would be a "rigged" convention.

Mr. Walsh said it was the accepted norm that in the event of a councillor's death

the vacant seat would go to a family member if one was interested in it. There was plenty of precedent for that within Fine Gael in the Waterford constituency, he said.

"With my brother Martin interested in succeeding his father my entire family are appalled at the very idea of having to go through a convention contest," John Walsh said. "We left the weekend meeting with dignity and with heads held high."

Mr. Walsh said that because of a complicated system of voting there will be only twenty four people eligible to vote at a selection convention. "The frustrations at the weekend meeting of sixty two "disenfranchised" delegates representing every parish in the district manifested itself in what, I acknowledge, was at times a very heated debate."

He added that Cllr. O'Riordan and Dungarvan businessman Mario Flavin, who had expressed an interest in the U.D.C. seat, were urged to abide by precedent and allow the vacancies to be filled by a family member.

Both Cllr. O'Riordan and Mr. Flavin unsuccessfully contested the 1991 County Council election for the Dungarvan electoral area.

Cllr. O'Riordan, who had won a County Council seat in 1985, polled 446 first preferences and was only eliminated on the 10th count. At that stage he was just three votes behind the W.P.'s Tony Wright who went on to win a seat.

Cllr. O'Riordan actually called for a recount at that stage which was granted to him but the result remained unchanged.

Mr. Flavin polled 225 first preferences and was eliminated on an earlier count. Ironically it was a transfer of 225 of O'Riordan's votes which finally elected the late Cllr. Walsh.

March 11 has been earmarked as the convention date to select the FG nominees to fill both seats. However after the dramatic development of the weekend no one in Fine Gael in the Dungarvan District Executive is quite sure of what happens next.
