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Urban Renewal Scheme For Dungarvan

A major new urban renewal scheme aimed at regenerating the cores of cities and towns across Ireland was unveiled by Finance Minister, Bertie Ahern in his Budget last Wednesday.

The new package of incentives is geared towards attracting employment back into urban areas and encouraging people to return to live in town and city centres.

There will be accelerated capital allowances for industrial buildings which will be at 50% for owner-occupiers and 25% in the case of lessees. In a bid to encourage conservation of existing buildings, the existing residential owner-occupier al-

lowance for construction expenditure will be doubled in the case of refurbishment work.

The scheme will come into effect on August 1 of this year and designated areas will include Dungarvan and Clonmel, among others.

Responding to the Minister's announcement, Deputy Austin Deasy said that he was delighted that the Min-

Stradbally Up In Arms Over Proposed Piggery Complex

A need for development but not development at any cost would appear to be the general consensus in Stradbally following a well organised, informative meeting at Stradbally G.A.A. centre last Monday night.

The meeting was convened following a planning application lodged on January 7th by Queally Pig Farms for a proposed pig breeding and fattening complex at Rathnaskillogue, Stradbally.

The small G.A.A. hall was packed to the door with over 200 worried landowners, residents and traders, anxious at what such a proposed complex could do to their scenic village, and determined that they would tolerate no threat whatsoever to their livelihood and future.

Also attending the meeting were such notable politicians as Deputy Brendan Kenneally, former Minister of State, and councillors Tom Cunningham and Paddy

O'Callaghan of Waterford County Council.

Chairwoman for the meeting Maria Curran of Garranurton, explained how the Stradbally Action Group had grown out of the merging of the West Waterford Development group; the Agri-tourism group; the Stradbally Tidy Towns Committee and local farmers and residents. This action group was originally formed 2 years ago but had leased new life following the lodgement of the Queally application with Waterford County Council on January 7th.

THE PROPOSED PLANT

This action group faces the formidable Queally Pig Farms which, to-date have

6 Month Sentence For Dangerous Driving

A 21 year old Co. Corkman was sentenced to six months imprisonment at Youghal District Court yesterday for what Judge Oliver McGuinness described as "quite the most appalling case of dangerous driving I have come across in twelve years."

Ivan Bryan, "Columbine", Quarry Road, Youghal Road, Youghal, faced a total

of 24 charges, including 11 of dangerous driving and six of exceeding various speed limits during a high speed chase which began in the West-Waterford town of Tallow on the night of September 6, 1992 and ended with his arrest near Youghal.

The court heard that the van being driven by the defendant reached speeds of up to 100 miles-an-hour as it was pursued by a garda motor cyclist, and that it negotiated a series of bad bends completely on its incorrect side of the road.

The court was also told that there were two bald tyres on the untaxed van, and that at one point it collided with the garda motor cycle resulting in the garda's knee being crushed.

Bryan, it was stated, had subsequently gone to England but had now returned to face up to his responsibilities.

Outlining the facts of the case to the court, Inspector Pdraig Hyde said "this extraordinary incident" began in Tallow when Garda Michael Dineen was on motor cycle patrol in the town.

"He saw the van being driven at a very high speed, about 80 miles an hour," said Inspector Hyde. "Garda Dineen followed the van and when he caught up with it switched on the flashing blue light on the motor cycle. At that the van increased its speed."

Inspector Hyde said the garda then put on the motor

cycle siren as the van drove through a 30-mile speed limit zone at 70 miles an hour. Eventually Garda Dineen succeeded in overtaking the van, pulled in front of it, and had signalled the driver to stop.

"The van driver did a hand-brake turn and headed back into Tallow at speeds of 75 and 80 miles an hour," Inspector Hyde went on.

"Garda Dineen radioed for assistance and continued the chase. He saw the van overtake a car on a bend on its incorrect side of the road and almost out of control. The van driver took another bend at 80 miles an hour, again on its incorrect side, and proceeded to negotiate a series of bad bends on the wrong side. On a straight stretch of road the van reached a speed of 100 miles an hour."

Inspector Hyde said the van eventually halted, and when it did Garda Dineen approached and shouted through the window at Bryan to stay where he was. However he succeeded in restarting the van, reversed it, and in doing so collided with the motor cycle, resulting in the garda's knee being crushed against the petrol tank.

The Inspector said Bryan again drove off at speed but he was eventually arrested and taken to Youghal Garda Station.

Mr. David Keane solr., said Bryan had no previous convictions and had returned voluntarily from England to meet the case. "He is engaged to be married, is about to embark on married life, and bitterly regrets this incident," Mr. Keane added.

Judge McGuinness said he

would deal with all the dangerous driving charges as one continuing offence, and sentenced the defendant to six-months imprisonment together with a 12-months driving ban.

In addition Bryan was fined a total of £620 on the various other offences and a further six months disqualification to run concurrently with the twelve months. Recognisances were fixed in the event of an appeal.

Jamie Costin Is Supreme Young Sportstar

Seventeen year old Dungarvan C.B.S student Jamie Costin, a member of Ring/Old Parish A.C., is the inaugural winner of the Garda Pat Noctor Memorial Trophy for the Supreme Young Sportstar of the Year (1993).

The award scheme has been launched by the Dungarvan Garda District Social Club in memory of Garda Pat Noctor, whose untimely death took place last March. It is confined to under 18's living within the Dungarvan Garda District area.

At a packed Ard Scoil na nDeise in Dungarvan last Friday night Jamie Costin was confirmed as the winner of the coveted award from a final list of ten nomi-

inations.

In a memorable 1993 the very promising walker captured county, provincial and national championships, and twice went to England where he won two 3 AAA's British championships in impressively devastating style. He is now regarded as one of the brightest prospects in a long while on the Irish athletics scene.

Originally there were thirty nominees for the overall award, but an adjudication

panel comprising Mary Ashe, Kieran O'Connor (Waterford Foods), Jim Joe Landers (WLR FM) and John Murphy (Cork Examiner) whittled them down to last Friday's final ten.

All ten finalists were presented with an inscribed scroll by Inspector Michael Blake as they came to the podium with a trumpet fanfare by Dungarvan Brass Band conductor Francie Kenneally ringing in their ears.

The presence of the Brass Band certainly enhanced a truly memorable night which saw the awards scheme off to the most spectacularly successful of starts.

The huge attendance of more than three hundred included the respective chairmen of Waterford County Council and Dungarvan Urban Council, Cllrs. Con Casey and Tony Wright. Also present was Mr. Austin Deasy T.D. and members of Dungarvan U.D.C. A significant garda presence was headed by Chief Supt. Sean O'Halloran, Supt. Ray McAndrew and Inspector Blake, together with members from all the stations within the Dungarvan District.

The special guest of honour, however, was Mrs. Judy Noctor, wife of the late Garda Pat Noctor, together with her sons Ian and Fergal and daughter Aoife.

The trophy was presented to the Supreme Sportstar by Mrs. Noctor who spoke of her husband's great love of youth and sport. "It is entirely fitting", said Mrs. Noctor, "that Pat has been remembered in this way."

The proceedings began with a few words of welcome from the Chairman of the Dungarvan District Garda Social Club, Sgt. David Sheahan, who said this was a very important night for the gardai in the district.

Sgt. Sheahan thanked the many people who had worked tirelessly in the background to make such a memorable occasion possible. Referring to the late Garda Noctor, he spoke of his "bright and pleasant personality."

Supt. Ray McAndrew said it was with a great sense of privilege and pride that Dungarvan District Garda Social Club presented the Pat Noctor trophy in honour of an esteemed colleague.

Supt. McAndrew spoke of the late Garda Noctor's twenty six years in Dungarvan, the last thirteen of them as Garda Juvenile Liaison Officer.

"In honouring his memory we do so by linking three of Pat's abiding interests —

the young that he encouraged, respected and served so well; the sports of all codes that never ceased to excite him, and the Garda Síochána in which he took great pride and satisfaction in serving," Supt. McAndrew added.

The other speakers included Cllrs. Casey and Wright, Inspector Blake and Chief Supt. O'Halloran who said he was personally privileged to be part of a wonderful tribute to a wonderful garda.

Finally Garda Eddie Fitzpatrick, who has succeeded the late Garda Noctor as Juvenile Liaison Officer, and who worked so unsparingly as chairman of the adjudication panel, thanked everyone for making the occasion the memorable one it was. "It has been a truly fitting tribute to a wonderful colleague," he added.

SPECIAL

After Jamie Costin had said his few words of thanks and appreciation, outstanding M.C. Kieran O'Connor announced that the adjudicators had decided to present a special Merit Award.

There was many a moist eye in the hall as young Karl Dunford of the St. Patrick's G.A.A. Club made his way to the platform on crutches to accept the piece of Ring Crystal.

Karl has been unwell throughout 1993 and is receiving chemotherapy treatment. Nonetheless he was among the original thirty nominees for the Supreme Sportstar, and the adjudicators felt his courage and bravery should be marked in what was a very fitting way.

The sustained ovation for Karl was unquestionably the most moving moment of the whole night. The other nine finalists in the running for the overall award were — Aidan Ahearne, Cappagh (athletics); Paul Beecher, Tallow (showjumping); Tom Flynn, Ballymacarbray (Gaelic football); Derek Hayes, Abbeyside (athletics); Mark Hyslop, Dungarvan (soccer); James Keohan, Abbeyside (boxing); Trevor Norris, Dungarvan (golf); Dan Shanahan, Lismore (hurling) and Catherine Walsh, Coolnasmea (ladies football).

In a post function comment to the "Leader", Inspector Blake thanked the people for turning out in such vast numbers to the award ceremony.

He said the awards scheme had also been launched in a year when the gardai had sponsored G.A.A. leagues, athletics and fishing competitions in West Waterford.

"We are endeavouring to maximise youth involvement in sport and to keep young people out of trouble," added Inspector Blake.

Plenty to do in the garden

FEBRUARY is a great time for gardeners to catch up if they can bear the cold! Fortunately, most winter chores that may remain are ones we have put off because they are hard work. That now becomes an advantage as we try to keep warm in the February chill.

Deep digging will certainly cause a sweat, because the ground is hard and this month is the last chance before the new spring begins to appear.

On the plus side, you can be less fussy about breaking up sods — February's frost and wind will crumble them quite nicely.

Work in well-rotted garden compost or manure as you go and the ground will soon be in good condition for planting, though not soon enough for early potatoes and onions — soil preparation should be under way already.

Buy seed potato tubers now too: stand them with the eyes pointing upwards in wooden trays or cardboard egg trays in a cool, light and well-ventilated space. They will sprout soon afterwards, signalling that they can be planted out in March.

Meanwhile onions can be prepared for planting out in May if you sow seeds now under glass.

If you have a greenhouse for this, check and overhaul any equipment such as watering or ventilation systems needed for when sowing starts in earnest.

And don't think it's too early for ventilation on sunny days — you risk mould and fungus if you don't get air circulating.



Some of the few signs of vegetable growth in the open air will be your cabbages and broccoli, but they may be at risk from slugs — don't encourage these pests by leaving fallen leaves or other vegetation to lay in the garden.

Put down slug traps using beer or sweetened milk in saucers or plant drip trays. Slugs either drown or trap themselves for easy disposal — much safer than using pesticides.

Don't be fooled by the lack of activity when you turn your attention to the lawn. Earthworms will be more active now and produce casts which need lightly brushing away with a stiff broom or spring rake in dry conditions.

But be careful about putting weight on the lawn as the blades are fragile — especially after frost — and the soil easily compacted, ruining the drainage characteristics.

Before the end of February, give the lawn a top dressing made from half loam, one quarter sharp sand, and a top-up of peat or well-rotted compost.

If that seem like hard work, try pruning — thick gloves impede your work but your hands soon get cold without them.

Fruit trees should be finished this month and fed with potassium-rich fertiliser such as dried seaweed.

Roses, blackberries, raspberries and gooseberries also need a 'haircut'.

Be ruthless with hybrid tea roses — leave shoots 6-9 inches above ground — but floribundas and climbers need only cutting back by a third.



Ice 'n' Easy



Homemade ice cream is always a treat whatever time of year. These two recipes can be made up quickly and easily with items from your store cupboard.

COFFEE

MARASCHINO BOMBE

Ingredients:

2 sachets Bird's Dream Topping
1/2pt (250ml) milk
2 level tbs (2x15ml spoons) each sugar and instant coffee
12 maraschino cherries
2tbs (2x15ml spoons) maraschino syrup
whipped cream and maraschino cherries for decoration

Method

Put 1/4pt (125ml) milk with 1 level tbs (15ml) sugar and coffee into small bowl and use to make up 1 sachet of

Dream Topping as directed. Cover the inside of a 1 1/4pt (625ml) pudding basin with this and freeze.

To serve, unmould and decorate. The frozen bombe needs 1 1/2 hrs at room temperature to reach ideal eating quality.

CUSTARD ICE CREAM

Ingredients:

2 level tbs (2x15ml spoons) custard powder
3oz (75g) sugar
2 eggs
1pt (500ml) milk
1 sachet Bird's Dream Topping
5fl oz or 1/2 teacup (125ml) milk

Method

Mix custard powder, 1oz (25g) sugar and eggs



smoothly with very little of the milk. Heat remaining milk. When nearly boiling, pour onto mixed custard, stirring. Return to pan and bring to boil stirring. Cover and leave until cold. Make up

Dream Topping as directed, whisk in remaining sugar and carefully fold into custard. Turn into a tin and freeze. The ice cream can also be flavoured with grated orange rind or melted chocolate.

Stradbally Up In Arms Over Proposed Piggery Complex

over 2,500 sows in County Waterford. Owner of this lucrative agricultural business is Peter Queally of Gardenmorris, Kill, who now proposes to build and operate a new unit for breeding and fattening pigs at the Rathnaskilloge location.

Following normal planning procedure, Queally pig farms were required to complete an environmental impact statement which was then presented to the council with the purpose that the proposed piggery would have no negative side effects on the actual surrounding environment.

Included in the 40 page long statement are details of the proposed plant which is to cover 1 hectare including buildings and perimeter roadway. The site is to be located 3 km. from the village and will not be visible from any dwelling or public area. The buildings themselves are to be insulated and ventilated against malodours while noise pollution and traffic problems will not affect any area of amenity or scientific interest. Queally Farms report a "considerable demand for pig slurry from local farmers" and promise regular sampling of soils, surface and ground waters to be carried out as required by the Planning Authorities. At present, the company assures that it operates all its facilities with no apparent environmental damage and that it has maintained good relations with its neighbours and public in general.

SMALL COMFORT

These assurances, however, cut no ice with the anxious members present and came as a small comfort to the many householders who felt under threat from such a highly intensive agricultural development.

SITE UNSUITABLE

First to address the meeting was Councillor Tom Cunningham who, after visiting the proposed site at Rathnaskilloge the day before,

fore, said that he had not found the site to be suitable and that Waterford County Council would be looking for further information from the Queally group as their application, he felt, was "not acceptable". Cllr. Cunningham further added that the council would deal with the Queally application after February 7th exactly one month after the initial lodgement on January 7th.

SERIOUS SHORT-COMINGS

In a fully comprehensive report outlining the groups plan of action, P.R.O. for the action group, Peter Lanigan O'Keeffe declared Queally's environmental impact statement to have "serious shortcomings and inaccuracies". Son of the late Judge Lanigan O'Keeffe the P.R.O. admitted that he was very personally involved in the project, being a life long resident of Stradbally.

"One tiny mistake in this development could result in the degradation of the environment", he stressed.

"I would ask each member of the council if they are 100% sure of the willingness and the ability of the developers to oversee their strict adherence to the Planning Authorities rules", Mr. Lanigan O'Keeffe further added. Outlining the Stradbally Action group's campaign, it was learned that the group are to write to the council with their views and analysis in a 30 page document.

Environmental scientists from Queens University in Belfast have agreed to look at the situation in detail and will also forward their conclusions to the council. The proposed plant will "do little or nothing to benefit the community", deemed Mr. Lanigan O'Keeffe. Justly feeling that Stradbally should be entitled to the finest, most modern and technically advanced piggery in the country the P.R.O. concluded that the company "certainly has the resources to do this".

THREAT TO TOURISM

Representing West Waterford Tourism, Enda Flynn was next to voice his objections. Under the community enterprise programme, tourism has been identified as the main employment area in Stradbally.

According to Mr. Flynn's statistics, £10.7 million is spent by visitors in West Waterford each year which will lead to 191 jobs in the coming years. A Pitch and Putt course, a new sewage scheme, a craft shop, riding school and caravan park are all being considered to create employment in the Stradbally area. Speaking to

a now hushed, intent crowd, Mr. Flynn then declared that with the threat of the proposed pig breeding and fattening complex that these plans, "are all in jeopardy".

TIDY TOWNS WITHDRAWAL

George Crowley, Chairman of Stradbally Tidy Towns Committee, spoke of the scenic attraction of the village which has consistently attained high marks in every Tidy Towns competition, a high standard which has taken the committee 12 years to build up, he added. "The building of a piggery and slurry spreading holds no place in the Tidy Towns plans for '94", Mr. Crowley said, adding that he felt that all the committees efforts will have been in vain, heatedly adding that Stradbally will withdraw from the Tidy Towns competition if the plant is to go ahead.

"I WOULDN'T LIKE TO BE DRINKING IT"

So stated Ian McGlenan of Waterford Earthwatch who explained to the meeting the various threats to ground water arising from intensive farming. According to Mr. McGlenan, between 40-50% of water in West Waterford is taken from boreholes. The threat to this ground water will come from nitrates which are used to a huge extent in pig farming. The constant spreading of slurry with the piggery's proposed "adapted band spreaders" is highly likely to cause soil impaction, thereby killing off earthworms and useful bacteria.

"There is no acknowledgement of work done by hydrogeologists in this statement", said Mr. McGlenan, who further added that 13 families near the pig farm currently being served by a group water scheme were also not mentioned in the statement.

"The people who did the survey didn't take much of an interest in the actual environment they're going to have an impact on - and that's worrying", Mr. McGlenan concluded.

NO ALTERNATIVE BUT TO MOVE

Following these factual, clearly thought out and spirited speeches, chairwoman, Maria Curran, then threw the meeting open to the floor where Fr. M. J. Ryan, P.P. voiced his fears about the eventual degradation of the beautiful rustic attraction of Stradbally. "I'm not against development", he stressed, "but I cannot see the sense in picking this particular area of the county which has built up such a high national and international standing".

Also speaking from the floor, Stradbally local, Greg Dunford, (who had obviously done his homework), put the enormous quantity of slurry into perspective by converting the annual amount of slurry to be spread (9,400m²) into gallons. Mr. Dunford calculated that a staggering 2.2 million gallons of slurry will be spread every year for 8 months, which means 7 loads a day for five days a week. This, he added, was a "pretty daunting prospect". A prospect which he felt would give him no other alternative but to "move to another area".

Also pledging their support to the Stradbally Action Group were Deputy Brendan Kenneally, who claimed that the potential in Stradbally was great for tourism and jobs and also Councillor Paddy O'Callaghan on behalf of Minister Brian O'Shea, who promised to report back to the Minister and pledging Minister O'Shea's support to the group.

TIME HAS COME

Concluding the meeting, Maria Curran urged the crowd to "stand up and be counted". To demonstrate the widespread opposition of the proposed plant, written objections must be shown to Waterford County Council. Judging by the negative reaction and general bad "vibes" generated by the packed G.A.A. hall on Monday night, the action group can certainly be assured of enormous support as the Stradbally Villagers go up in arms against the proposed piggery.

IN SHORT

In short, the main objections as felt and expressed by the people of Stradbally are:-

- 1 - Risk of contamination of drinking water and water ways.
- 2 - Obnoxious odours on surrounding farmland.
- 3 - Threat to wildlife and vegetation and increase in rodent and vermin population.
- 4 - Tourist development of Stradbally under threat.
- 5 - Danger of loss of earnings and threat to potential tourist related jobs.
- 6 - Devaluation of residential property.
- 7 - Jeopardising Stradbally in any future tidy towns competition.
- 8 - Risk of spoiling one of the most beautiful villages in the Country.
- 9 - It will be of no benefit, financial or otherwise, to the greater majority of the community.

Waterford Foods In Bid For 1998 World Equestrian Games

Ireland's bid to host the 1998 World Equestrian Games received a boost last week when the Minister for Tourism and Trade, Mr. Charlie McCreevy launched the video which will form an integral part of the bid process.

The video, which was produced with support from Waterford Foods' GAIN Horse Feeds, highlights the

strength of the Irish case for hosting the Games. It features well known personalities in the equestrian world, demonstrates previous major successes such as the European Three Day Event Championships and concludes with the Minister summarising Ireland's very strong appeal for visitors.

Speaking at the launch, the Minister said that the

World Equestrian Games has the capacity to attract anywhere between 100,000 and 300,000 visitors.

"The Games would be a huge boon to Ireland, not just for 1998, but also in the major advance promotion of Ireland and the tourism spin off following the massive international coverage of the Games."

Aidan Dempsey, Group General Manager, Trading Division, Waterford Foods, said that the video does a very effective job of selling Ireland as a venue.

"The image of the Irish horse will also benefit substantially and GAIN Horse

Feeds are delighted to be associated with the bid for the Games."

The six equestrian disciplines of the Games are — showjumping, dressage, vaulting, three day eventing, carriage driving and long distance riding. These will be based at the RDS and Punchestown.

Competition to host the Games in 1998 is from Germany (Berlin), Italy (Rome), Portugal (Lisbon) and the U.K. (Harrogate in Yorkshire).

A decision by the Federation Equestre Internationale will be announced in Florida, U.S.A., in March of this year.

Quota Problems In Farm Retirement Scheme Under Review

The Chairman of Waterford IFA Rural Development Committee, Anthony Ryan has said that problems had arisen in relation to the transfer and leasing of quotas under the new EU Farm Retirement Scheme.

IFA had a meeting with the Dept. of Agriculture last week and the Department was referring the matter back to Brussels for immediate clarification.

Mr. Ryan said that farmers who wish to take part in the EU Farm Retirement Scheme and who are planning to transfer their ewe premium rights to someone else in 1994 may have a difficulty in participating in the Scheme as they must notify the Dept. of Agriculture by January 21. "If this is not done, then the rights cannot be transferred until the end of the 100 days retention period next June. A similar problem in relation to suckler cow grants may also arise later."

Mr. Ryan said that IFA has got assurances from the Dept. of Agriculture that the matter was being actively pursued with the EU Commission and that necessary flexibility was being sought. "IFA has sought a special concession for farmers taking part in the Retirement Scheme that there will be no hindrance to the transfer or lease of quota for ewes, suckler cows and milk.

Calls For Increased Participation In 1993 Milk Price Audit

Waterford IFA Dairy Committee Chairman, Gerald Curran this week called on dairy farmers to ensure increased participation in the 1993 Milk Price Audit by pressing their own Co-op to participate. "No creamery should be allowed walk away from independent milk price measurement," he said.

Mr. Curran said that IFA regard the price audit as a major issue because it relates to the most fundamental concern of dairy farmers

— milk price. Only by a transparent pricing system will individual firms be challenged to substantiate their price claims to farmers and those paying high prices able to attract suppliers from their competitors as required in a competitive market.

Mr. Curran said that independent milk price measurement is one of the main reasons why the Dutch and Danes received 103% and 106% of the EC target price respectively in 1992.

County Waterford I.C.M.S.A. News

The Co. Waterford ICMSA Chairman, John Cusack, said that the budget brought some welcome changes for farmers but failed to change the discrimination in the tax allowances suffered by farmers.

While some changes were made to the probate tax i.e. agriculture relief and the exemption of spouses from probate tax, ICMSA will be seeking more changes to the probate tax before the finance bill is published. Mr. Cusack said that ICMSA welcomed the extension of the PAYE allowances to farmers' sons and daughters working on the farm. However, farmers as tax payers continue to be discriminated against by virtue of the fact that they still receive less personal allowances than the PAYE sector. The association has consistently highlighted the inherent discrimination in the tax code whereby PAYE and PRSI allowances have not been extended to the farming sector.

ICMSA welcomed the improvements on inheritance tax and the extension of agricultural relief to stock and machinery.

The association expressed disappointment that there was no accelerated capital allowances for on farm investment.

Other areas of concern to the ICMSA include the non-provision of pension entitlement to some 30,000 farmers and the failure of the Minister to provide income supplement to low income farmers.

The association also welcomed the reduction in the marginal tax rate from 48% to 40% and it welcomed increased funding allocated to Teagasc for research. Also welcomed was the alloca-

tion of £2m. to the Department of Agriculture to improve the present situation whereby payments are seriously delayed.

IFA Demand EC Funding For TB Eradication

Waterford IFA Animal Health Committee Chairman, Ned Murphy, said recently that the Agriculture Minister Joe Walsh must deliver on his assurance to Irish farmers that he will secure the promised £80 million of EC funding for bovine TB eradication in Ireland over the next four years.

Mr. Murphy pointed out that this was a key commitment in the Government's outgoing PESP Programme for Partnership and the IFA would insist that it was fully implemented as a priority under any new national agreement.

Mr. Murphy said that if this Government was serious about the total eradication of TB for the national herd, then the funding set-back reported in recent days was a most fundamental blow to that objective and demanded an immediate response from Minister Walsh.

This EC funding is needed to eradicate the disease, reduce the excessive disease levies of £27 million being paid by farmers each year and also to introduce the option of live valuation for reactor cattle to help alleviate the financial hardship TB outbreaks impose on farmers.

DUNGARVAN DISTRICT COURT

Ballinagoul Man Exits Scene Of Accident

Last weeks sitting of Dungarvan court was told of a local man who left the scene of an accident after driving into the back of a car at Ballinagoul, Ring on January 16.

The defendant, James Foley of Ballinagoul, caused £560 worth of damage to the vehicle involved and had then left the scene and his own car behind him.

The charges against the 31 year old were: [1] dangerous driving, [2] driving without insurance and [3] failing to remain at the scene of the accident.

Appearing for the accused Mr. Niall King Solr., told the court that on the

day in question, the defendant had been extremely upset due to a marital dispute and could therefore not explain his actions. Mr. King added that full compensation had already been paid to the owner of the damaged vehicle.

In the light of these facts, Judge Oliver McGuinness subsequently struck out the third charge and reduced the charge of 'dangerous' driving to 'careless' driving.

Mr. Foley was fined £50 for careless driving and £150 for not having driving insurance. His driving licence was endorsed in both cases.

Jobs And AV Facilities For Ring

The industrial base in the Waterford Gaeltacht of Ring grew last year, with a nett job increase of 22, resulting in an overall nett total of 76 jobs.

There was a positive trend in the Gaeltacht generally where there was a nett gain of 204 jobs, the highest since 1989. Total employment is at a record 5,860. This was stated on Monday, January 31 by Udarás na Gaeltachta chief executive Ruán Ó Bric, at the publication of the authority's end-year results for 1993.

Total new jobs created on the ground was 871, which was 45% above the authority's target under the Programme for Economic and Social Progress.

AUDIO VISUAL INDUSTRY

The audio-visual industry came up for particular mention and the Udarás chief executive described the setting up of Teiliffs na Gaelige as one of the most

important initiatives for the Gaeltacht and the Irish language in general since the foundation of the State. He outlined the various initiatives that have been taken to support the development of an audio-visual skills base in the Gaeltacht, including the new training and commissioning fund that will provide £670,000 in assistance for programme making that is linked to training opportunities.

The audio-visual and TV production facility requirements of the Ring Gaeltacht received a particular boost recently when, arising from a submission from a private sector investor, approval was given for the provision of a network of facilities in the Munster Gaeltacht areas of Kerry, Cork and Waterford. The total investment involved is approximately £800,000 and will include the provision of pre-editing facilities, cameras and recording facilities in Ring.

THE PASSING OF TOMMY MOLONEY

It was with great sadness that the people of Ardmore laid to rest one of its finest citizens in the shadow of The Round Tower, in his beloved Ardmore on Sunday January 9th, following Requiem Mass celebrated in St. Declans Church. Tommy Moloney was a legend in his own time. Tommy's life over a span of eight decades was colourful and eventful. He had a memory like a computer and he could give a detailed account of events dating back to his youth.

Tommy's deep, religious faith carried him through good times and bad. He welcomed God into his life and he trusted in him for everything. In death as in life he was happy to go and meet his Creator.

Tommy, born in 1907, was one of eight children born to Eileen and Thomas Moloney, The Old Post Office, Ardmore. The Moloney family dominated life in Ardmore at that time. His father was the local blacksmith. Tommy grew up around the Forge and his life was greatly inspired by his father and brother. Tommy in turn learned the trade and he was an expert in his trade. Up to recent years Tommy continued to shoe horses and ponies. He had volumes of stories and tales to tell of events which occurred during those years at the Forge. The Forge was a regular meeting place at that time and it was a social occasion for many people when they took an animal to the forge.

As the need for the blacksmith declined Tommy branched out in to the Hackney Business. A regular driver for the South Eastern Health Board, Tommy was a great favourite with everyone. He had a wonderful gift of friendship and even in recent years following the closure of the Post Office which he shared with his brother and the death of Michael, his door remained open with a welcome for all. He always made a great contribution to charitable events and played a large part in community happenings. A loyal supporter of Fianna Fail in by-gone years he did trojan work for the organisation in this area.

The door is closed, a friend is gone, but the beautiful and happy memories of Tommy will live on.



Jimmy Mulligan Wins First Senior Title

The postponed Waterford Mens and Womens Senior Cross Country Championships were staged in Tramore last Sunday where victories were recorded by the pre race favourites Jimmy Mulligan and Elaine Fitzgerald, both of Waterford A.C.

Over a sun drenched course in Pickardstown outside Tramore, Clonea Power athlete Jimmy Mulligan added his name to the long list of Waterford senior cross country champions when he ran a very positive race to win decisively by a twenty seconds margin from clubmates Sean Foley and the 1981 winner Derek Tebay. The continuing absence of reigning champion James Sullivan through emigration denied him the opportunity of an unprecedented five in a row titles but taking the current athletic well being of both

spent a term on an athletics scholarship in Providence College, U.S.A., he was on the Deise A.C. team that won the National Inter-Club senior cross country title in Rathkeale, Co. Limerick in 1983 and later in the 1980's he bowed out of the athletic scene for a few years.

Back in the sport seriously less than two year's, Jimmy was second in this race last year and he was a leading member of the winning county national intermediate cross country championship team last February. In 1993 he recorded fine wins on the road and on the track and he is currently in as good as form as ever.

1993 CLUB EXPENDITURE ON THE COUNTY

As we all know only too well, as far as the county scene goes, 1993 was a year, generally speaking, to be best forgotten. There were, of course, some exceptions — the junior hurlers did us proud, the under-21 footballers made progress, but, it was really left to the lady footballers once again to bring home an All-Ireland.

It cannot come as a great surprise, therefore, that the activities of the club were correspondingly below the highs of the previous year, and, particularly, the funds available for spending were reduced over 1992 levels. Nonetheless, £7,305 was spent on the county and the following list of payments details this outlay:

Donations to County Board for floodlights for Walsh Park and contribution to Dublin for NHL match, £2,000; Minor hurlers, £417; Under-21 hurlers, £464; Tony Forristal tournament, £516; Senior hurlers, £681; Under-21 footballers, £760; Senior footballers, £250; Junior hurlers, £1,055; Lady footballers, £250; Coaching, £180; Fitzgibbon Cup, £150; Camogie team, £439; other items, £143. Total: £7,305.

Overall, many grades were catered for and there were some appreciative letters from some members of team managements. Now, in these times where money is hardly easy to come by, the above amount is by no means a paltry contribution, but strangely enough, it did not warrant a mere mention by either recipients, officers or anyone else at County convention. Maybe a lot too much is taken for granted in this county in more ways than one.

FLY TO BELFAST

The club is looking into the possibility of chartering a 30-seater plane to fly from Waterford airport to Belfast for the up-coming NHL match versus Antrim. This would be an ideal way to travel such a long journey and while no definite arrangements have yet been finalised with Waterford airport, it is hoped that cost of the trip will make this venture economically viable. NEXT WEEKEND

The coming weekend marks the restart of official competition with the resumption of the national football league and the playing here in Cappoquin of the 1993 county minor 'B' football championship between An Gaeltacht and Portlaoighaire. The national football league match is against Sligo and has been transferred to the Leamybrien venue because of the unavailability of Stradbally for which it had been originally fixed.

The county football team, which ran into many problems since the start of the present league, have but two points from a win against Carlow, they having lost their first game by a point to London in Ruislip and were fairly narrowly beaten in the other three. In any of their five matches so far, they have not been at full strength, as for a variety of reasons certain players were not available to them. One of the main causes of this was that important club championship games were being played on the same weekend of their league fixtures and clubs would not release selected players. Also, there were situations where players opted out of the county panels and all these

decisions had a weakening effect on the teams which represented us.

With the restart of the league and for the championship as well as the new league which begins in October, steps must be taken to ensure that these problems do not arise again and that all our teams playing on the intercounty front will be in a position to select from a full panel.

On Sunday last a couple of players were not available to the footballers because of having played with the hurling team, who are also preparing for their important league match against Cork on the following Sunday, but those who did play with the footballers showed great commitment and with the majority of them sure to be included on Sunday's team at Leamybrien, we can look hopefully at the outcome.

The team was due to be named on Monday night when the selectors met at Dungarvan and if available, will be published in this issue.

In the matter of selection of teams to represent the county, in whatever grade or competition, be it championship or league, we hope that the county directive on the matter will not be ignored, as it has been so many times in the past. Se-

lectors are required in accordance with the directive to select their teams in good time for publication, in fairness to the public and the players, etc.

It would be nice to start off the season with a win in our very first match and with practically all of the players who will represent us having played many times at this venue, we should find this an advantage. Our last win against Sligo was achieved in Sligo town some years ago.

Two weeks after we lost to London, Sligo played a draw with the same team in Sligo town. Also, Sligo reached the final of the 'B' All-Ireland in November last, but were hammered by Laois. We can win this one.

MINOR FOOTBALL FINAL

Many people will have forgotten that this county final is still unplayed. Both sides played very well in their respective divisions last year and there can be very little between them in standards and it should be a splendid contest for supporters at Cappoquin when it is played on Saturday at 2.30 p.m.

WESTERN BOARD MEETING

There is quite a lengthy agenda for the first meeting of the new Divisional Board which takes place at Lawlor's Hotel on to-morrow, Thursday evening at 7.30 p.m.

The notification to clubs require each club chairman and secretary to attend this initial gathering. The second meeting of the Board was already announced for January 17, but as the first meeting of the County Board is fixed for January 14, it is likely that the second meeting of the Divisional Board will be brought forward in order to have all their proposals in relation to transfers, regradings, declarations and championship structures, ready for submission to the Senior Board.

BUSINESS

As reported last week, this Western Board meeting will finalise transfers, affiliations and regradings, etc. and applications relating to these matters will not be accepted after tomorrow night. The notice of the meeting informs clubs that collective applications for transfer will not be accepted or in other

words, each transfer application must come from the individual who is applying. The affiliation fees, etc., were given in this column last week but in addition to these, clubs are also required to pay £100 per club for hurling and football coaching (total £200). This scheme costs in the region of £21,000 and about half of this is contributed by the clubs in both divisions.

DISCIPLINARY COMMITTEE

The annual election of a disciplinary committee will also take place and for this, clubs will have the right to nominate from the floor, but nominees should have previously agreed to have their names put forward.

The outgoing committee are — Eddie Cunningham, Tallow, Thomas O Cadhla, An Rinn and Denis McGrath, Affane/Cappoquin. The Board officers are also members of this committee.

CHAMPIONSHIPS

This is not listed as an item on the agenda, so clubs need not have their minds made up until the following meeting.

Voting At Conventions

It is a subject that I dislike writing about but it has become such a major matter in the area of the selection of people and members to run our affairs on most of our Boards, I believe that the subject is well worthy of some serious consideration by clubs and members throughout the county.

In writing on the subject, I have no desire or, indeed any intention of becoming embroiled in the matter of who should or should not be elected to any of the many positions on any Board, but like a huge number of people inside and outside clubs I am concerned about the stress and strife and the amount of 'in-fighting' that goes on in clubs all over the county when convention time comes around every other year. Elections are healthy and are the recognised means of choosing the members who will officiate in their different capacities in whatever office they may hold, but it is no secret that the intensity of the canvassing that has been waged in the weeks leading up to these elections is doing untold harm to many clubs and has in many cases resulted in bitterness

and division among great and devoted club people who are known to work night and day, week in and week out in the interests of promoting the games in their local clubs. Very many of these members got unwittingly caught up in the whole business and feel that they can well do without it. People are becoming weary, distressed and in some cases disillusioned about the whole business as well as beginning to lose interest in the things that really matter in their club activities.

Other counties, maybe to a lesser extent, have from time to time experienced the kind of problems that are now affecting us in this respect and have sought a way of overcoming the system of elections of the kind that we have at present.

Some years ago Cork had problems involving elections to office at their county conventions and on one occasion the elections were the subject of an investigation by the Munster Council. After that, they put things in order and eventually decided on a postal vote.

Now all matters dealing with elections to all offices at their convention are covered in their county bye-laws. Bye-law number 9 reads as follows:

'Nominations for county officers, delegates, etc. shall be sent to the county secretary, one month before convention. A candidate must

receive a nomination, submitted on official form, signed in Irish by the club secretary and be a member of the Association in accordance with Rules 17 and 18 O.G. and name of the club of which he is a duly registered member must appear after his name on the ballot paper. One ballot paper shall be sent to each club and one to each member of the Board two weeks previous to county convention, and returned by registered post to county secretary on or before Friday previous to convention. Each club ballot paper shall be accompanied by a declaration to the effect that the ballot paper has been marked in accordance with the decision taken at a properly convened meeting of the club and the declaration shall be signed by the club chairman, vice-chairman and hon. secretary. Previous to nomination papers being sent out, a small Election Committee shall be appointed to make all the necessary arrangements in connection with the county convention and to deal with the scrutiny of the votes.'

Readers may imagine that there are imperfections in the system above, as to secrecy, etc., but they also have made provisions for the confidentiality of the count. By-law number 9 in Cork is much longer than I have written here and I have just outlined their system.

I know that in a neighbouring county to ours, a certain club after being put under severe pressure to vote a certain way in a number of elections, decided on a plan to beat the pressures. Four days before

convention their fifteen-man committee met to decide on support, or otherwise of the nominated candidates who were listed in the convention booklet. Each committee member voted on a slip of paper for the candidate of his/her choice and then placed his vote in an envelope marked 'chairman' (or whichever other officer which was nominated for the different positions). The envelope was then sealed and handed to the club president (who in this case was the local P.P. and the vice-president). The vote was confidential and the result was not disclosed until it was handed to the club chairman, who headed the delegation on the afternoon of convention. The other club delegates to the convention were not given sight of the result until the election for the particular office was called. The envelope with the club voting slips were returned to the club, should any questions be asked, afterwards. This system spared the club members a lot of hassle and pressures and they could not be identified as being 'backers' of one side or the other.

Clubs may not find this to be the ideal system to beat the pressures and so on that is now associated with conventions, but in their own interests and in the interests of harmony within clubs, some arrangements, different from what we have here at present should be agreed upon. I think the county as a whole would benefit and greater harmony would be restored. It is something that might be looked at well in advance of the next conventions.

SENIOR FOOTBALL CHALLENGE

ENCOURAGING PERFORMANCE

Leinster football club champions, Eire Og travelled in strength for this challenge which they had requested as a trial run before meeting Castlebar in the All-Ireland club semi-final and they fielded a very fit and eager side who went all out from the throw-in.

Waterford did not have all their regulars, but nevertheless

gave a very encouraging performance and were in front by 0-8 to 0-5 at half time, thanks to some splendid scores by Anthony and Paul Fitzgerald, Liam Dalton, Tom Gough and Eamon Cullinane (who later played with the hurlers). The home side were in front by 1-9 to 0-8 after 45 minutes, but a great and storming finish al-

lowed the visitors to race ahead in the closing stages and win by 1-14 to 1-12.

County Bórd Na nÓg Convention

There was an attendance of over 70 delegates at last week's convention of the County Juvenile Bórd and at which John Kiely, Chairman, presided. Having welcomed the delegates, the chairman referred to the splendid attendance and looked forward to their many contributions during the meeting.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

In his report to Convention, Secretary Martin McNamara dealt with all aspects of the Bórd's activities during the past year.

In it he said that there is a serious obligation on all clubs in the county to promote good school/club co-operation. He earnestly asked all clubs to support the development of their games in schools. The youngsters are, he said, their most important asset and it is their responsibility to nurture and encourage their interest in the national games.

He then goes on to give an account of the various inter-county tournaments in which Waterford were involved — the Jim Power Memorial Trophy, Tony Forristal and Sonny Walsh Tournaments (all promoted by Waterford) and the Ne-nagh Co-op Tournament.

THANKS REFEREES

Continuing the report says: "At this stage I feel it is my place to thank our referees for their service during the year. It is essential that a climate of respect for referees, and their decisions, must be created. Abuse and foul language etc. cannot and must not be tolerated. I think the lack of clarity in the playing

rules themselves are a reason for some acts of indiscipline on the field, but the major cause in most instances can be found in the lack of self-control and the failure of officials in charge of clubs to take appropriate action when it is called for."

SYMPATHY

The report continues: "I would like to place on record the entire sympathy of all the players and selectors to the Tobin and Rossiter families who suffered a tragic loss when Pat and P. J. were suddenly taken from our midst. They were quiet, unassuming lads who were greatly respected and admired by all their team mates at Óg Peil an although their lives were brief we all are the better for knowing them"

TREASURER'S REPORT

Treasurer Sean Whelan presented a very detailed and clear report of the Board's financial transactions during the year. Receipts from all sources amounted to over £14,000 and expenses totalled approximately £14,600. The additional spending related to bus hire for representative teams over three years and as a result the Board ended with a small debit balance.

Approximately £1,000 was received from gate receipts for the county finals and in sponsorship and grants the Board received about £7,500. These are the main sources of income for the Board. A sum of £1,120 was paid for hurleys and hurling balls for the many teams fielded by the Board in representative games including the Tony Forristal Tournament. A sum of £5,115 was received and paid out to clubs for the hurling subsidy (where each club received a repayment of one pound for every hurley purchased from the recognised maker).

The account was approved after very little discussion and the treasurer was thanked for having presented the balance sheet in such a splendid manner.

CHAIRMAN'S ADDRESS

In his wide ranging address, John Kiely touched on every aspect of their activities over the year and referred to problems that had to be faced in some areas. Having thanked the school teachers in primary and secondary schools for their dedication, support and assistance, he complained about the lack of co-operation shown by some clubs with the schools and he appealed to all clubs to make their venues available when requested by teachers.

The need for good organisation and planning were, he said, of great importance

and it should be noted that the clubs who concerned themselves with these matters were always among the successful clubs. He referred to the clubs who put club before county and spoke about the need for co-operation with the Board's selector for the various representative matches which had been referred to in the secretary's report. He paid tribute to the members who organised the Tony Forristal Tournament and looked after the teams who were well prepared. He also spoke about the city league. He spoke about the Deise Draw and their generous supply of equipment to primary and secondary schools but reminded clubs that they too had an obligation to look after the needs, in this respect, in the local school.

Earlier, on the Secretary's report, the Chairman, responding to Roger Power and John Power, Kilrossanty, explained the circumstances surrounding the awarding of the under-14 final to Roanmore. Kilrossanty expressed their anger at the failure of the Board to refix the county final and reference was made to the Adult Board's decision.

Others to address the convention were Peter Power and Pat Curran, both county coaches gave a report on the satisfactory progress being made and the co-operation being received by the teachers throughout the county.

MacDara MacDonnacha, on behalf of the coaching council, also addressed the meeting and gave a detailed account of what was involved in the Foundation Courses, presently being organised.

Eamon Ó Murchú, County Chairman, also addressed the meeting.

MOTIONS

One of the striking features of the convention was the interest shown by delegates and their willingness to become involved in the discussions throughout the two and a half hour meeting. It was certainly a more relaxed gathering than either of the adult conventions and members spoke freely of things on their minds and during the debates on the motions there was no sign of any acrimony, even though a few of the proposals were contentious issues. I will write on those next week.

As the focal point for West Waterford tourism a visitor centre open the year round showing the history, culture and visitor attractions of the area would be a major boost to tourism.

"At a future date and as soon as the Urban Renewal designation is announced by Minister Smith, Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce and Industry will hold a wide ranging conference on the subject of Urban Renewal giving a forum to all interested parties to come together and discuss and develop this most significant opportunity for Dungarvan and environs."
