## RIGHT TO LEARN

The Right To Learn is an exciting and unique innovation in television, working with a group of twenty unemployed people from different backgrounds and regions in Ireland.

This joint Audio Visual Centre, UCD and RTE Euroform project has produced a series of five television and radio programmes. The programmes will be first broadcast each evening during "Work It out" Week on Network 2, February 7-11.

Following transmission, a specially prepared video pack and workbook which accompanies the series will be available for adult education and community groups such as the "Right To Learn" Course. The course will be taken "on the road" throughout Ireland by the group of twenty unemployed people — the "Right To Learn" tutors. The video pack of the Right To Learn course will be used as the basis of a self-development module in an adult education environment.

The tutors were involved in all stages of the project from writing scripts, planning documentaries and conducting interviews. They researched material for the television and radio programmes as well as the video pack and text book. The tutors also acted in the dramatic and documentary sequences under the direction of two drama coaches. Jimmy Byrne represented Dungarvan Resource Centre.

The programmes voice the concerns of the unemployed people in a totally new way — using and accessing television. The programmes are as follows:

Programme 1 — Exploding Myths — About unemployment, our economic system and the promise of jobs through training.

Programme 2 — What Are You Doing Yourself? — A new look at what it means to have a job.

Programme 3 — The Emperors New Clothes — Access and barriers in the Irish education system.

Programme 4 — The Road Less Travelled — Innovations in the adult education.

Programme 5 — New Directions — A discussion on where we need to go from here.

## Rice Anniversary Marked By Year Of Celebrations

A year-long programme of events has been arranged to celebrate the 150th anniversary of the death of the Venerable Edmund Ignatius Rice who was responsible for founding the Christian Brothers and the Presentation Brothers.

Events will be held throughout the country to celebrate Edmund Rice's life's work and the contribution he has made to Ireland and its people.

Born in Callan, Co. Kilkenny in 1762, Edmund Rice was a businessman who opened a school for poor children when he was widowed. He subsequently gave up his business to devote himself to training teachers. In 1802 he founded a religious congregation from which grew the Christian Brothers and the Presentation Brothers. He died in Waterford in 1844. Last year, Edmund was declared Venerable — the first step to canonisation as a saint — by Pope John Paul II.

Liturgical events will be held in Galway, Callan, Co.

Kilkenny, Dublin, Cork and Waterford.

Other religious events include an assembly of "Muintearas" — associates of Edmund Rice — at Westcourt, Co. Kilkenny, a famine walk at Callan, a pilgrimage to Knock, a conference of provincials and religious superiors, an assembly of Christian Brothers and former members of the Christian Brothers.

Highlights of the year include a number of conferences on educational themes in Belfast, Dublin, Cork and Waterford. Cultural events include the issue of a commemorative stamp by An Post and gala concerts in the National Concert Hall, Dublin.

Sport will feature inter-school competitions in Gaelic football, hurling, soccer, rugby, athletics and orienteering, as well as a number of golf competitions/outings in Callan, Rosslare, Greenore, Portlaoise, Charleville and Armagh.

## DUNGARVAN DISTRICT COURT

### Waterford Duo In South East Cheque Forgeries

At Dungarvan District Court two Waterford women pleaded guilty to charges of uttering forged cheques in stores around the Southeast.

The two defendants, Jackie Moloney of 166, Clonard Park, Ballybeg and Christine O'Donoghue of 95, Doyle Street, Waterford faced a series of charges dating from December 2 to December 9, '93 of obtaining goods and cash to the total of £677 at stores in Waterford, Tramore, Dungarvan and Youghal.

Representing the Director of Public Prosecutions, Supt. Ray McAndrew told the court that the charge relating to the cheque forgery in Dungarvan, dated from the 3rd of December last when the duo had obtained goods valued at £104 at the L&N supermarket, Davitt's Quay, Dungarvan.

Both defendants were subsequently arrested six days later by Sargent Sheehan.

Judge Oliver McGuinness remanded the duo on continuing bail to Dungarvan court on February 23 for payment of compensation.

## A good time to move plants

EVEN in February the days are lengthening and the soil warming — a double cue to prepare for the flowering season ahead.

See that you make the most of any sunny days from now on although they may still be some way off in Northern England and Scotland.

Typical jobs for those days are:

Moving plants — if you want to swap deciduous shrubs, ferns or herbaceous stock around then lift gently with as much soil around the roots as possible. Don't allow them to dry out before relocating.

Tease out any coarse grass and weeds, especially the fleshy white roots of that tenacious pest, bindweed.

Go for good scents — check wallflowers have battled through the worst of the winter and firm them into the soil if they have been loosened by wind and frost. A good nitrogen-rich fertiliser such as dried blood will perk them up.

Lily of the Valley is another good scent. The flowers are not spectacular but they smell wonderful!

Crowns can be planted now in a shady spot with lots of leaf mould and other well-rotted organic matter.

Leave shoot tips just below the top of the soil and they will soon poke through. Within a couple of years they will be established and spreading to create a scented carpet of greenery.

Check your roses — new bush roses should be pruned during this month and roots firmed in after disturbance by winter weather.

Cut all growth back to about six inches from the ground, preferably at a bud facing outwards so that new growth is not hindered.

New climbers need cutting back by two-thirds and fastening securely to the wall, fence, trellis, pergola or other support.

But don't fertilise new roses yet — they will be more inclined to put down stronger roots and be healthier in the long run if you don't spoil them just yet.

It's a different story for established roses. They need a dressing of well-rotted compost or commercial rose mixture, lightly raked into the surface above the roots. This can be done this month or early in March when it's their turn to receive a pruning.

Strike early against slugs — milder weather will bring out these pests and you need to kill as many as possible before your blooms arrive or the slugs find more places to hide as dormant vegetation comes to life.

Pellets are a convenient favourite with many gardeners but can be expensive, are not very 'green' and may harm pets and children.

Simple traps are a good alternative — saucers and flower drip trays filled with milk or beer slops which the slugs cannot resist. They will either drown or break cover, enabling you or the local thrushes and blackbirds to dispose of them. — *Arthur Hines*

## DUNGARVAN DISTRICT COURT

### Malicious Damage In Early Morning Row

Michael Keenan of the Halting Site, Shandon pleaded guilty at Dungarvan District Court recently to charges of causing malicious damage to a Garda patrol car in an early morning row on January 23.

Garda S. O'Leary told the court that he had answered a call concerning a row between the defendant and his wife outside the premises of the Last Bite, Abbeyside.

Upon arriving at the scene at 1 a.m., Garda O'Leary told the court that the defendant had then attacked the patrol car, causing £50 worth of damage.

Appearing for the accused, Mr. P. Gordon Solr., said that on the night in question Keenan had taken a 'good share of drink' and had since paid full compensation to the Gardaí.

Judge Oliver McGuinness gave the defendant the benefit of the Capital Probation Act.



## Chops In Pastry

### Method

Sprinkle chops with salt and pepper. Place a tbs (15ml) of cranberry sauce on each one. Roll out pastry to an oblong 30x20 cm (12x8 ins). Brush with egg and cut into 2.5cm (1 in) wide strips.

Wrap the pastry strips around the chops, starting at the base and overlapping the edges a little. Press to seal.

Place chops on a baking sheet and brush with egg. Bake in pre-heated oven at 200°C, 400°F, gas mark 6 for 35-40 minutes until pastry is golden brown.

Serve garnished with watercress and orange slices. Serves 4

4 lamb best end-of-neck chops  
salt and pepper

# Recent Deaths

He was a wonderful, kind and loving husband and father who laboured for the good and betterment of his family. After the celebration the interment took place in the adjoining family plot. Fr. Kiely, assisted by Fr. Kelly, officiated at the graveside. Another very large concourse was present to pay their final respects and to sympathise with his nearest and dearest.

# Heart Children Weekend

At a meeting held in Lawlor's Hotel last Wednesday, the Dungarvan committee of Heart Children gave details of Heart Children's Weekend '94 sponsored by Irish Industrial Gases.

This is the fourth successive year that Heart Children will hold their nationwide fundraising drive — 'Heart Children Weekend', sponsored by Irish Industrial Gases, on Valentine's Weekend the 11th to 14th February, 1994. For four days, Heart Children volunteers will take to the streets of Dungarvan appealing to the public to "be

their lifeline". Heart-shaped balloons will be sold on every corner, as the group attempts to raise much needed funds, in turn creating a great national awareness of Heart Children.

This year the group hopes to raise over £150,000 nationwide for the cardiac services of Our Lady's Hospital for Sick Children in Crumlin.

Funds raised will purchase electrophysiology equipment and cardiac theatre lamps at the hospital. Money raised through last year's campaign has gone towards employing a full time Cardiac Liaison Nurse at the hospital for a three year period.

### ELECTROPHYSIOLOGY EQUIPMENT

The heart beats in a very organised way. To do this, it has an electrical system, more complex than even the most advanced computer. Electrophysiology is the study of the heart's electrical system. Disorders of the electrical system (the rhythm) of the heart are called arrhythmias.

There are many different types of arrhythmias, some occurring naturally, some occurring after heart surgery. Babies and children's arrhythmias are often very different from the adult varieties. An electrophysiology study allows the doctor to find out the exact cause of the arrhythmia. This can be very important in choosing the right treatment for the patient.

There is currently no facility in Ireland for electrophysiology testing in children. The electrophysiology equipment which Heart Children hope to buy will help in the diagnosis and treatment of many infants and children with heart rhythm problems.

Anyone who has had to face the prospect of life-long medication will know how important and relieving it would be to have the problem dealt with at source and to be free of medication.

### CONGENITAL HEART DEFECTS

Congenital Heart Defects are the most common major congenital abnormality and affect one child in every hundred born at present in Ireland. The majority of these babies are treated at Our Lady's Hospital for Sick Children in Crumlin. About half of these babies born with CHD will require surgery. Unless treated, CHD is responsible for 33% of all newborn deaths and 50% of children born with a Congenital Heart Defect will die by the age of 15 years. However, with effective treatment 85 to 90% of these children can look forward to a normal adult life. At present about 300 open-heart operations are performed every year on children from one day old to teenagers.

### HEART CHILDREN

Heart Children is a support group for parents and families of children born with Congenital Heart Defects (CHD). The group was first established in 1990, and is run on a voluntary basis by parents, for parents and families. The basis of the support available through the Heart Children group is not counselling or advice, but the understanding that can exist between people who share a common difficulty or trauma. The group disseminates relevant information to parents and families through parent support and bereaved parents meetings, their magazine "Heart Strings," and at its annual conference.



# BALLYMACARBRY NEWS

## AID FOR SMALL MILK SUPPLIERS

Mr. Patrick Phelan, Toureigh, Ballymacarbry, National President of the United Farmers Association, in a statement this week said, that the U.F.A. has presented the following proposals to the Minister of Agriculture Joe Walsh for aid to small milk suppliers — "That no more cuts be imposed on quotas of

40,000 gallons or less. All milk quota sold this April through The Restructuring Scheme be sold to producers under 15,000 gallons. In the event of these farmers not being in a position to buy all this quota, the remaining quota should be purchased by the Co-op's and frozen therein until these suppliers are in a po-

sition to purchase the balance over the following years. Accordingly, this quota could be temporarily leased by the Co-ops to cover the cost of purchase. No milk should be afforded to suppliers over 15,000 gallons until all suppliers reach 15,000 gallons or be satisfied with an amount less than 15,000 gallons. Following that, suppliers under 20,000 gallons should be eligible.

"To ensure that these small milk suppliers can afford to purchase enough quota to generate a decent level of income, the banks, Co-ops and the Minister for Agriculture will have to agree a package whereby the banks will provide low interest loans or Euro Currencies with the Co-ops paying an interest subsidy and the Government paying a subsidy on the purchase price. In addition suppliers who started under 15,000 gallons and bought their way up above 15,000 could also avail of low interest and purchase subsidy especially those experiencing difficulty in repaying borrowings for quota already purchased. Farmers paying subsidised price for quota should have the same lease and sales rights as farmers paying full price, as farmers may have to lease quota in the event of a disease breakout. There are also a number of small milk producers who suffered whole or partial herd de-population due to disease problems in the years prior to 1983.

"Although these farmers applied to the Appeals Tribunal, some received very small allocations while others received nothing at all, which left them in a crippled position to date and are facing a bleak future. The U.F.A. propose that a sufficient amount of milk quota be made available to the Tribunal to satisfy the needs of these suppliers who in all fairness, complied fully with the Disease Eradication Scheme's rules, removed reactors promptly thus curtailing the spread of disease and were restricted from buying replacement cows, resulting in a small quota allocation. That the details of the Farm Investment Grant be announced immediately to allow farmers plan for the year or years ahead. That a facility be made available to large quota holders wishing to scale down their operation to sell part of their quota into The Restructuring Scheme and still continue to supply milk."

## SEEFIN RULING DELAYED

An Bord Pleanála will not make a ruling on the Seefin Mast until March 25, 1994. Joseph P. Gordon, solicitor, acting for the Comeragh Environmental Protection Association in their appeal against the mast,

has received word from the Bord this week. Because of the "complexity of the issues involved" the decision will be delayed well beyond the expected date of judgment.

Michael Murphy, President of Comeragh Environmental, regards this as a hopeful sign. "At the oral hearing on December 9," says Murphy, "we raised many substantial issues concerning Cork Communications poor record of compliance with planning conditions. We are hopeful, now that An Bord Pleanála has taken these matters seriously and is investigating thoroughly."

Murphy reports that The Comeragh Environmental Group has not rested following its successful presentation at the oral hearing. Association members have held "positive" meetings with Waterford County officials and all four Waterford T.D.'s.

"We're all very concerned with issues beyond just the mast at Seefin. We now know that Cork Communications has been putting up powerful microwave boosters throughout counties Cork and Waterford.

Not only aren't the basic safety issues of MMDS resolved, but it now appears that some people may be receiving microwave radiation from as many as four overlapping signals."

Murphy points out that anyone can stand on the corner of O'Neill-Crowley Street and The Quay in Youghal and see MMDS aerials mounted on houses within 50 yards of each other point in 4 different directions. "There are two possibilities," Murphy says. "Either Cork Communications' installation procedures are remarkably shoddy, or there are 4 different microwave signals inundating one corner with their radiation."

Other issues raised with elected representatives include the problems in the Lismore area since MMDS service began there and Cork Communications breaking of planning conditions at Clashmore.

"Look", states Murphy, "this company thinks they can come into Waterford and do any thing they feel like. The message we're taking to our T.D.'s is that the people of West Waterford say 'No More'!"



#### Decision On Beef Support Cuts Will Hurt Fatteners

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan said recently that the decision by the EU Beef Management Committee to cut beef and live cattle export refunds by 5% would hasten cuts in beef price supports ahead of those already agreed in CAP Reform.

The IFA Livestock leader warned: "This badly timed decision will have the effect of halving the value of the Winter Slaughter Premium to already hard-pressed Winter Fatteners."

Mr. Donovan called on the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh to act immediately with Commissioner Steichen to have this premature adjustment in price supports reversed and to insist that the EU Commission abide by the agreements they entered into on cattle price cuts made in CAP Reform.

Mr. Donovan warned: "This recent decision, coupled with Commissioner Steichen's move to cut Ireland's Special Beef Premium quota, amounts to creeping reform of the reform of CAP. It's time for Minister Walsh to call a halt to the Commissioner's back door cuts."

the Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh and his Department to cast the entire blame for the major delays in Premium and Headage payments on unintentional errors made by farmers on their application forms, was a smoke screen to deflect attention from the Minister's failure to deliver on his earlier promises of speedy payments.

Mr. Donovan said: "To be resorting to such excuses at this late stage is clearly an attempt by the Minister to find a scapegoat for the shortcomings in his Department's administration of the schemes."

Mr. Donovan said that some farmers make unintentional errors on their applications because of the complexity of the schemes and as a result of the failure by the Department to put in place a proper administration system. "The majority of errors occur under the Special Beef Premium Scheme as a result of the inflexible application periods imposed by the Department and the fact that there is not proper cattle identity document available for premium purposes."

Mr. Donovan said that if the Department implemented IFA's proposals for an all year round open-ended application period and a proper premium identity document similar to other EU countries, the vast majority of the problems would be eliminated immediately. Mr. Donovan added that not all the mistakes delaying Premium and Headage can be attributed to farmers.



# Know Your Rights

**Question** — Has there been a recent change in the rules for qualifying for Deserted Wife's Benefit?

**Answer** — Yes, there has been an important change in the rules for Deserted Wife's Benefit. In future a woman's own insurance obtained in another EC country can be combined with her Irish insurance for Deserted Wife's Benefit and Contributory Widow's Pension. Up to now only the husband's insurance from another EC country counted for Contributory Widow's Pension and only Irish insurance counted for Deserted Wife's Benefit. The reason for this was that (i) other EC countries only use the husband's insurance for Widow's Pension and (ii) they do not have a Deserted Wife's Benefit.

This change has come about through a successful appeal against the refusal to combine a woman's Irish and EC insurance for deserted wife's benefit. Which goes to show the value in making an appeal.

The Dept. of Social Welfare have now accepted that Deserted Wife's Benefit is a Family Benefit. They have gone a step further and will now combine a woman's own insurance for Contributory Widow's Pension.

The position now is:

- Either husband's or wife's insurance in another EC country can be combined with Irish insurance for Deserted Wife's Benefit and Contributory Widow's Pension.

- As Contributory Widow's Pension is a survivor's benefit, it will be calculated on a pro-rata basis (i.e. the more Irish contributions there are — the higher the rate of payment).

- As Deserted Wife's Benefit is a Family Benefit your rate of payment will be calculated as if all your insurance was Irish.

- Deserted Wife's Benefit in certain cases may be paid abroad, e.g. if the woman is a "posted" worker and goes abroad to work.

- In other cases, she would become entitled to whatever Family Benefit is payable by the EC country of her residence, if she satisfies the conditions for getting it there.

**Question** — My aunt will celebrate her 100th birthday early next year. We wouldn't like her to miss out on the President's Bounty. Can you tell me what the procedure is for claiming it?

**Answer** — At the start of each year, the Dept. of Social Welfare send a list to the President's Office of all social welfare pensioners who will reach their 100th birthday during the year. So if your aunt is in receipt of a social welfare pension you won't have to do anything.

If the centenarian is not receiving a social welfare pension, a relative or neighbour should notify the President's Office of the person's name and address, and send a copy of their birth certificate.

The Dept. of Social Welfare will be asked to verify these facts. When the claim has been verified a cheque for £250 will be issued to the local clergyman who will present it on the President's behalf. The President sends a letter to the centenarian congratulating her/him.

Surprisingly, up to 100 centenarians will be eligible for the Bounty this year.

**Question** — The Post Office deduct DIRT on my deposit interest and I have to wait until the end of the tax year to claim it back. Would there be an advantage in putting this money into a Credit Union?

**Answer** — Credit Unions are not obliged to deduct DIRT (Deposit Interest Retention Tax) at source. They pay the interest gross and you don't have to wait until the end of the tax year to claim the tax back if you are exempt from tax. If you were liable to tax you would have to declare this interest on your tax return as it is taxable.

You can withdraw your money at any post office, whereas you have to use

the one Credit Union since each Credit Union is independent. You should compare the rates of interest as this may vary depending on the amount you have on deposit.

**Question** — My husband's Unemployment Assistance comes up to £120.30 per week. We have two children. I have been offered a part-time job for which I will be paid £60 per week. Would I be entitled to FIS (Family Income Supplement)?

**Answer** — To qualify for FIS you must normally be working for at least 20 hours per week and you must expect to be employed for at least

6 months of the year. You must be getting child benefit for at least 1 child and your combined gross income must be below the income limit for your size family. The income limit for a two child family is £195.

Your FIS would be calculated as follows: Income limit for a two child family: £195; Your income (your earnings £60, your husband's UA £120.30): £180.30; Difference: £14.70; Weekly FIS 60% of £14.70: £8.82, rounded up to: £9.00.

If you earn more than £45 per week part of your earnings would be assessed against your husband's Unemployment Assistance in the following way:

From your net earnings deduct £45 personal allowance, plus union dues and an amount for travel expenses to work, the balance would be assessed against your husband's UA.

Your dependency status would now be affected, since the £9 FIS would put you over the £60 limit and your husband would lose you as a dependent on his payment. To avoid this you would have to keep your earnings to £38 per week.

**Question** — I have been receiving Deserted Wives Benefit for the past six years. The Dept. of Social Welfare have now written to me requesting that I transfer my Court Maintenance to them. This would mean a drop of £80 per week in my income. Are they entitled to do this?

**Answer** — Under the Liable Relatives Provisions which came into force in November 1990, a man and woman are responsible for maintaining their spouse and children. If they fail to do this and a payment is awarded under the Social Welfare Schemes for Lone Parents, Deserted Wives or under the Supplementary Welfare Allowance Scheme, then, the liable relative is required to contribute towards the cost.

The Department of Social Welfare may go to Court to get an order directing the spouse to contribute. If you are getting maintenance under a Court Order they may request you to transfer that maintenance to them.

If you refuse to do this, they will then request you to return your book and your social welfare payment will be reduced to take account of your maintenance.

When these Liable Relatives Provisions came into effect in November 1990 people who are already receiving maintenance payments under maintenance orders were allowed keep these payments in addition to their Deserted Wives or Lone Parent payment. The Social Welfare Act '92 changed this and the clawback of maintenance now applies to all maintenance orders.

To be fair to the Department of Social Welfare, changes in the legislation which disimprove your position are generally only applied to new claims. This seems to have been the original intention with the Liable Relatives Provisions. However, for some strange reason, this practice was not followed here.

You may be entitled to help with rent or mortgage payments and you should contact the Community Welfare Officer at your local health centre.

**POTS, PANS, PORRIDGE & POTATOES NEEDED URGENTLY**

Already the county wide response to the Carole Wiley Bosnia Appeal is very encouraging, with much needed supplies beginning to arrive at the Dungarvan headquarters and the various collection points in the towns and villages around the county. The committee has declared 11th - 19th February Bosnia Week in the county and they ask people to be at their most generous for this worthy cause.

"Search your garages, kitchen presses and storerooms for unwanted items" is the message from the Co. Waterford Appeal Committee who expected to reach their target of filling a container with a wide range of necessary supplies to be dispatched to Bosnia by the end of the month.

Amongst the items this voluntary group seeks are:

The group plans to conduct a food appeal in all the shops of the county during Bosnia Week and people will again have a chance of making a contribution to alleviating the suffering of a people who have long passed the limits of normal endurance.

They appeal to people to come together to further the appeal by holding coffee mornings, raffles in work places, food collections, anything which will fill the container or pay for its transport to Bosnia.

Carole Wiley, through whose agency the container will be dispatched, confirmed this week that the only aid reaching the besieged Mostar was that dispatched through Cork.

If anything, the situation in Bosnia/Hercegovina has worsened in the past week and the greatest tragedy in recent times has been the bombing of the marketplace in Sarajevo which claimed over seventy lives.

Our Brownies have also been practicing their songs and are proving quite a chorus! The Guides will have to start practicing soon if they don't want the Brownies to put them to shame!







## County Waterford I.C.M.S.A. News

The Dungarvan Regional branch of I.C.M.S.A. held a very successful information meeting last week. The guest speakers included Brian Hillard, Teagasc, who spoke on the new dairy regulations and Maurice Fitzpatrick I.C.M.S.A. who covered the new EU from retirement scheme and gave a handout on all grants available to farmers. Also shown on the night was the video on the new Dairy Hygiene Regulations.

Officers elected for the coming year were Chairman - Greg Fives Dungarvan and Secretary - Tom Cronin, Ardmore.

Below is an outline of the new Farm Retirement Scheme:

Value £9,764 (10,000 ECU) (maximum payment) from 1st January 1994.

Paid in two parts: Basic payment - £3,905 (4,000 ECU), Area payment £98/acre (250 ECU/hectare).

A person retiring from farming with 60 acres or more qualifies for the maximum payment.

A person retiring from farming with less than 60 acres qualifies for a reduced payment i.e. reduced £98/acre for every acre below 60 acres.

Payment will be made for a maximum period of 10 years but not beyond the transferors 70th birthday.

Eligibility - Transferor (i.e. person retiring from farming) — 1. Aged between 55 and 66 years. 2. Retire completely from farming (retain 1 hectare/2.5 acres). 3. Own at least 12.5 acres (5 hectares) of land. 4. Practiced farming as a main occupation for 10 years.

Transferee (i.e. person taking over farm) — 1. Aged under 50 years. 2. Has the necessary education/occupational skills. 3. Undertakes to farm as a main occupation for at least 5 years. 4. Enlarges the holding.

Farming as a Main Occupation — devotes 50% of work-

ing time to farming; and derives 50% of total income from farming.

Enlargement Criteria — \* Enlarge the holding by a minimum of 5 hectares (12.5 acres) or 10 percent whichever is the larger. \* The requirement to enlarge the holding depends on the status of the transferee at the time of taking over a holding (i.e. whether he/she owns land or not).

(a) Owns land (a minimum of 5 hectare) - the person is required to increase the size of their own holding by 5 hectares or 10% whichever is larger.

(b) Owns no land - The person is required to increase the size of the holding acquired by 5 hectares or 10% whichever is larger.

Education/Occupations Skills - 1. Born after 1st January 1968 - must be farming for 3 years and have at least 180 hours of agricultural education. (In this case farming means helping on the farm - but not necessarily working full-time, indeed the person could have an off-farm job.



**On Sunday, February 13 the third running of this event takes place starting at 2.30 p.m.**

The race was first staged in '92 when Irish international runner Robert Costello, Limerick A.C., came home in first place in a time of 30.17 but the events of last year's race certainly gave all who turned up on the day a race of classic proportions and a new holder of the title, when current All-Ireland 10,000 meters champion, Noel Richardson, Donore Harriers, simply destroyed all the opposition to win in a time of 29.24 followed home by James O'Sullivan, Waterford A.C. in 29.39.

Last year's event attracted 118 runners but all the indications so far would suggest we will see a big increase in those taking part on Sunday. Without doubt, the decision to include the event in the official B.L.E. running calendar for this year has given

the race a tremendous boost with enquiries to date coming in from all the top clubs in the country and the race is now firmly established as one of the elite running events on the Munster scene.

Certainly Race Director, Finbarr Kelly and his committee of Liam Dwyer and Gerry Cantwell have been working hard over the past couple of months to ensure that everything is well organised for such an event and Sunday next should see the reputation of this great race further enhanced. The race course itself is ideally suited to producing some fast times and with part of the route taking us through Springfield and the Cork By-Pass Road, it should make for greater local involvement for spectators and runners alike.

While the run for overall victory should be a great battle, the race for first local athlete home should be no less intriguing with last year's winner, Gerry Cantwell, determined once again to prove he is no. 1 athlete in the local scene. However he will not have it all his own way as he is sure to face stiff opposition from Liam Rossiter, Michael Roche, Jason Travers, Colin Lyons, Martin Sandford, John Joe Wright, Tiger Kiely, Race Director Finbarr Kelly and college stars Derek Kenneally, Kieran Maher and Darren Drummy, who will be all out to retain his junior title he won last year and, of course, if Tony Ryan should declare himself fit, he will post a major threat to all concerned. 

**Derek Hayes Wins Munster Sports Award**



# Waterford v. Cork

## At Pairc Ui Chaoimh

### Western Board Championships Resume

Waterford hurlers who opened their league campaign with a draw against Down and then lost to both Wexford and Tipperary by a single point, resume their campaign on next Sunday when they travel to Cork to play the home county in what is a very vital match for both counties. Cork with only two points from their three games to date are slightly better placed and like Waterford, they must win this one if they are to have any chance of getting back into contention. They were beaten (1-13 to 0-13) by Limerick in their first game in the present league and two weeks later they went under to Galway by 0-15 to 0-13. They showed a recovery of form by beating Antrim 2-21 to 3-11. Ger Cunningham's outstanding performance in goal was a major factor in that game and two of Cork's goals were said to be of the lucky variety. They have done an amount of regrouping and are determined to get back on a winning run. They are the National League champions, following their marathon with Wexford last summer and their supporters will expect them to be involved in the play-offs this time round again.

On Sunday last Cork lost by 1-15 to 1-8 in a preparation game against Limerick and they won't feel too happy about their form in

that one and will surely have changes before meeting us. Things have not been going all that well for the 'Rebels' since losing to Clare in the Munster semi-final last year.

Waterford slipped up against Down and that was a game that might have been won, but we were very unlucky against Wexford who beat us by 1-13 to 1-12 in a 64 minute game in New Ross and with a bit of luck we could have beaten Munster champions Tipperary (0-11 to 0-10) at Cappoquin in our final game before Christmas.

Since resuming training after Christmas, we have played three games which have all ended in a draw, but more importantly, the selectors were pleased with how things are moving and are in no way pessimistic about having to travel into 'enemy' territory to play Cork next Sunday.

To a certain extent, there is an air of secrecy about their plans and perhaps they have good reason for playing their cards close to their chests and writing about playing cards, I thought that team trainer Georgie Leahy put things very much in perspective in an interview for Gael Sport last week.

Georgie said: "In a game of poker you lose money if you are consistently dealt bad cards. But you are likely to lose far more if you

are getting good hands and still being beaten. It has been a bit like that with Waterford hurlers," he said. "So often they have come within sight of the pinnacle only to be hurled down the slopes by a deadly avalanche. Down the barren years the Deise have often been the cause of major upsets and giant-killing acts. For a time euphoria reigns as the resurgence of Waterford as a hurling power is heralded. But culmination is always the same, the humiliation of a defeat in the succeeding round. Waterford have been dealt some good hands and because of this, have suffered all the more coming up against better ones. We have", said Georgie, "got to believe in ourselves, then we have to use the ball right and be ready to die for the jersey." He said his favourite analogy is 'if you keep on beating a stone, you're bound to crack it eventually.'

He is, he said, satisfied that Waterford hurling is on the verge of a breakthrough and maybe his feeling in this regard will strengthen after Sunday. It is never easy beating Cork, but how many times have we proved that it is by no means impossible.

Like the footballers last week, they have decided not to name the team to do duty on Sunday until Tuesday night. Like very many

others, I fail to understand why this could not have been done a couple of days earlier and allow the local papers the opportunity of previewing the game in the normal way without having to speculate on the possible lineout.

There are rumours that Jimmy Beresford is not available and if the report is true, the Colligan man will be a definite loss. With all the others likely to be available, the lineout may see Ray Barry in goal, with Sean and Eamon Cullinane and Mark O'Sullivan in the full back line. Pat Walsh, Stephen Frampton and Brian Green, who have all been playing very well in the half line are expected to be retained for this test. Tom Fives and Tony Browne played so well in the game against Tipperary that they seem the likely duo to represent us at mid-field again. There may be changes in attack but players like Billy O'Sullivan, Padraigh Fanning, Paul Flynn, Ger Harris, Michael Hubbard, Paul Prendergast and Liam O'Connor are among those likely to be included.

Taking all things into consideration we must have a chance of winning. Hopefully we can take the points that will help to build up the confidence needed for the tough matches that lie ahead.

## AFFILIATIONS

The number of clubs who affiliated was more or less the same as in previous years. Kilrossanty did not enter a hurling team in the championships, as they had in previous years and the majority of their hurling players were transferred to Clonea, with whom some of them had previously played. Stradbally club were allowed to enter a third adult team in the football championships. Their third team (names were supplied) will play in the 'B' junior football championship and they will be confined to the list supplied at the meeting.

## TRANSFERS

A total of 45 players were transferred and as usual on the transfer market, there were gains and losses to clubs. The number of players who moved was slightly down on previous years.

## GROUPINGS

Permission to group in the under 21 championships was granted to Tallow/Shamrocks in under 21 hurling and

Shamrocks/Tallow in under 21 football. Sliabh gCua/Modeligo in under 21 football and St. Mary's/Modeligo in under 21 hurling.

## TRIAL GAME

Under 21 hurling county selector, Eddie Cunningham informed the meeting that a county trial would take place in March and requested all clubs with suitable players in this grade to forward names to any member of the under 21 hurling selectors in good time to have a panel organised.

## CHAMPIONSHIPS RESUME

Because of the atrocious weather conditions prevailing last week, the minor football 'B' divisional final between Portlaw an An Gaeltacht which had been fixed for Cappoquin, had to be cancelled.

The County Board have announced that it will be played at the same venue on next Saturday, at 2.30 p.m.

## UNDER-21 FOOTBALL

Now that venues are becoming available again, the Western Board have decided to proceed with the fixtures that were called off after clubs had invoked the county bye-law relating to the closed season in December/January.

The following games are now fixed for next Saturday and all will be played at 2.30 p.m.

**Under-21 'B' Semi-Final** — Nire versus St. Patrick's at Bushy Park.

**Under-21 'A'** — Kilrossanty v. Naomh Brid at Stradbally; Dungarvan v. Ballinacourty at Leamybrien.

It is the intention of the Board to have all outstanding championships completed before the first Sunday in March.

The County Board are hopeful that all three football finals in these grades will be completed in March.

## EXPENSIVE

James Tobin spoke about the rising costs of affiliating teams and the great difficulty being experienced in raising money to pay for entry of teams, accident scheme payments, public liability, coaching, etc., and now with the minimum cost to clubs, being in excess of £1,000, clubs could find it impossible to meet their commitments. The Chairman said that the county development

draw was now the main source of income for clubs.

## DISCIPLINARY COMMITTEE

The following were elected — Eddie Cunningham, Tallow; Denis McGrath, Af-fane/Cappoquin; Tom O Caodhla, An Rinn; Tom Browne, Ballinameela and Stephen Power, Kilgobinet. The Board's Chairman and Secretary will also be members.

## SPONSORSHIP

A list of the various sponsors for the championships was read and approved and the firms and individuals were thanked and the Chairman stated that clubs, etc., should show their appreciation in the most meaningful way.

He further stated that a special night to launch the sponsorship would be arranged as soon as possible.

The Chairman announced that the West intermediate hurling championship would definitely be played this year.

## REGRADINGS

Practically all clubs availed of the bye-law which allows a total of seven per team and this time the overall total was an amazing 154.

An application by Clashmore to come down from senior to intermediate grade in football was allowed to go before the meeting after the Clashmore Secretary Noel Nugent explained that the application had been submitted to the County Board as the club understood that they were the regarding authority in the circumstances. Timmy O'Keeffe made the case for the club and submitted that they were no longer of senior status and, presently had no future in the top

grade. Several clubs opposed the application and among those were a number of intermediate football clubs who submitted that while they might not be a top class senior side, Clashmore would prove too strong for the other teams playing in this grade. The point was also made that several other clubs in the senior grade were 'no hoppers' also, and would be more suited to a lower grade and that some of the intermediate teams would do well to examine their standards and could find their level in the junior grades. Some agreed but such a policy or decision, would have to wait until re-gradings were being dealt with in the future.


## I.F.C. —




