## Dungarvan And Lismore To Benefit From £2.4m Allocation

The amalgamation of the three secondary schools in the neighbouring towns of Lismore and Cappoquin is set to become a reality after almost a decade of uncertainty.

Education Minister Niamh Breathnach has confirmed an allocation of £1.3m for the construction of an ultra modern community school embracing Lismore C.B.S., Presentation Convent Lismore and the Mercy Convent in Cappoquin.

In addition the Minister has also given the green light for a £1.1m extension to Dungarvan Technical

College where there has been serious overcrowding in recent years because of the inadequacy of the existing accommodation facilities.

While no official indicator has been given about starting dates, it is hoped that both projects will commence sometime next year.

The new West Waterford community school will be

sited in Lismore alongside the existing C.B.S. school. At present the three schools have a combined enrolment of more than 600, but student numbers are expected to be closer to 700 when the community school eventually opens its doors.

The proposed community school was first mooted almost a decade ago and was

### ROADS CRISIS—

## Councillor Calls for Immediate Emergency Repair Programme

A crisis situation now exists as far as the rapidly deteriorating state of many of Waterford's county and other minor roads are concerned, Cllr. Kieran O'Ryan told Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council.

Urging that some kind of immediate emergency repair programme be undertaken, Cllr. Kieran O'Ryan said that in all his time on the Council he had never known the county roads to be so bad.

"The torrential rain of the past two months has aggravated the situation still further and there are many bye-roads around the county that are now impassable," he said.

Cllr. Oliver Wilkinson agreed and said in his area of West Waterford fallen trees have added to the difficulties. There is now serious unrest over the state of the roads among the rural community. "There is no sense," he added, "to what

is happening."

County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn confessed to a feeling of hopelessness about the situation. The trouble had started, he said, in 1977 through the abolition of rates and the underfunding from Government ever since to local authorities.

"The torrential rains of recent months has been the straw that finally broke the camel's back as far as the county roads in Waterford are concerned," Mr. O'Flynn added.

He added that they hope to carry out some kind of "blitz" on the roads when funding from the budget comes through shortly.

### Breaks In Kilrossanty Water Supply

"The situation is crazy and the people cannot be expected to put up with it much longer," Cllr. Oliver Coffey stated at Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council when he spoke out over the frequency of breaks in the Kilrossanty public water supply.

Cllr. Coffey said that in one recent week there had been no fewer than five breaks in the supply, while Cllr. Tom Cunningham said each break is costing about £70 to repair.

Cllr. Cunningham said it would cost only £14,500 to replace all the pipes and in the long run it would be more financially wise to do so.

However the County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn, said that until they receive their grant allocation for the year, they won't know if they can afford to replace the pipes which have run their life. He agreed, however, that the scheme is a priority one.

# Conflict Of Evidence

## — Fishery Charges Dismissed

A District Court heard last Friday how officers of the Southern Regional Fisheries Board kept an overnight surveillance on a fixed net on the river Blackwater in an effort to apprehend its owner.

Two of the officers gave evidence of positive identification of a man charged in connection with the incident to Judge Peter Smithwick at Cappoquin District Court.

However the accused, Charles Ware, Aglish, Cappoquin, categorically denied being on the river bank on the occasion and claimed that he was working on a welding repair job in South Tipperary on that date.

Ware pleaded not guilty to charges of using a fixed engine for the unlawful capture of salmon on the river Blackwater near Aglish on August 1, and fishing for salmon during the annual closed season.

Fishery Officer, Michael Fanning, said he and two colleagues were on duty on the Blackwater when they saw the net fixed to the bank of the Blackwater in an area where they had previously seized a number of nets.

"We set up a surveillance of the net and stayed overnight," he said.

Officer Fanning said that around 10.15 on the morn-

ing of August 1 he heard a car approach and he radioed to his colleagues. He saw a young man aged about 20 standing on the jetty, and when another fishery officer approached the young man and an older man, who he identified as the defendant, ran into the front garden of an old cottage.

Witness said he saw a red Nissan car parked in the garden which he subsequently learned was registered to John A. Wood Ltd.

Officer Fanning said on August 11 they went to the John A. Wood quarry at Cappagh, Co. Waterford, where they saw the red Nissan car. They asked for the defendant who worked there, but when confronted about the August 1 incident Ware completely denied it.

Fishery Officer, Mark Fanning said he positively identified the defendant as the man who hauled the net from the river while a younger man stood on the jetty as a "watch out". When he approached them they ran into a house nearby.

When Judge Smithwick refused the application of defence solicitor Mr. J. P. Gordon for a dismissal of both charges, the accused, Charles Ware, told the court that he was no where near the river Blackwater that

morning.

Ware said he had gone to Grange, Co. Tipperary, on Saturday, July 31 to do a welding repair job for a friend and did not return home until the afternoon of Sunday, August 1.

Ware said the car registered to John A. Wood Ltd. was near the river that morning but was driven by his daughter who had gone to the family mobile home to clean it up.

"I don't know why the officers have picked on me. I wasn't there on August 1," he added.

Patsy Walsh, Grange, Ardfinnan, Co. Tipperary, corroborated Ware's evidence that the defendant had come to his place on July 31 to repair a welder and did not return home until the following afternoon.

Judge Smithwick said that while the original identification of the defendant by the fishery officers was clear, he would have to hold that Mr. Walsh had lied deliberately if he was to convict Ware.

"I am not satisfied that he has done so, and I must therefore dismiss both charges against the defendant," the Judge added.

# Hazardous Conditions As Siberian Chill Sets In

Dungarvan and surrounding environs woke up to a thick blanket of snow last Tuesday following heavy overnight snowfalls and freezing temperatures, attributed to the Siberian chill which gripped much of the country earlier this week.

Particularly affected by the arctic freeze-up were West Waterford and Cork where 2-3 inches of snow fell between Monday and Tuesday.

## "SCHOOLS OUT"

For many young people it was their first glimpse of a white Dungarvan. Because of the conditions the majority of schools were closed on Tuesday allowing fresh faced children to celebrate in style with snowmen and snow fights in front gardens. It wasn't all fun, however, for Dungarvan residents, as the strong easterly winds saw temperatures plummet, freezing the slush and turning some of the streets into icy traps.

## TREACHEROUS ROADWAYS

Many roads throughout Co. Waterford were in a treacherous state this week with traffic in and around Dungarvan reduced to a crawl.

Stretches of the main Dungarvan-Youghal road at Pulla were also extremely hazardous, and one motorist had a lucky escape when his car skidded across the road, but missed the oncoming truck before ending up in the ditch.

The Dungarvan-Cappoquin road was also very dangerous in parts, while roads in the Colligan and Touraneena areas demanded maximum care on the part of motorists.

The Pike area on the main

Waterford-Dungarvan road was one of the worst hit areas demanding extreme caution.

The far western end of the county, however, escaped relatively unscathed. There were snowfalls, but the Clonmel and Fermoy roads remained mainly clear with no reports of accidents.

The A.A. has warned motorists to drive carefully especially at night when temperatures drop below zero.

## WEATHER OUTLOOK

The good news is that the snow is expected to clear with the remainder of this week windy and dry. Temperatures will increase and the weather is expected to be back to normal by the week-end. A thaw has already set in as the Siberian chill, which has worked its way across Europe, departs our shores.

So kids it's back to school as Spring sets in once again - at least on the calendar anyway.

## "Fishermen Will Lose Their Lives"

— SAYS COUNCILLOR

A Fine Gael member of Waterford County Council told Monday's meeting that unless two ladders are replaced at the north pier in the fishing village of Passage East, lives will be lost.

Cllr. John Carey said the ladders are used by fishermen and pilots but are now in such a state of deterioration that they can no longer be considered safe.

"They must still be used, however, and the Council

will have to find the money from somewhere to replace them," he said.

Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer, said he would investigate the matter but said at the end of the day it would be down to financial resources.

"Wherever the money is to be found it will have to be found," said Cllr. Carey. "Otherwise my fear is that fishermen will lose their lives."

actually given ministerial sanction in 1987 — subject to the agreement of the entire local community.

That, however, wasn't readily forthcoming, with many people in the Cappoquin area less than happy at the prospect of effectively losing the local Mercy Convent.

The prospect is no less inviting today than it was then for those same people, but the Minister has now ended all the speculation and uncertainty by announcing the £1.3m allocation for the new school.

van Technical College has been given an unreserved welcome by the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee which administers the college.

## SATISFACTORY CONCLUSION

Its Chairman, Labour's Cllr. Billy Kyne, told the "Leader" that it brings to a satisfactory conclusion a protracted campaign for overall improvements at "one of the most successful educational establishments in the country."

With a student enrolment of more than 300 — and increasing — the school has had to provide no fewer than twelve pre-fab buildings to cope. More than a decade ago the Dept. of Education actually gave planning permission for a brand new school on a green-field site, but that was never pro-

ceeded with.

In recent months, however, a local group representing the V.E.C. headed by Cllr. Kyne and the newly appointed School Principal, Mr. Kieran Heffernan, met with senior officials of the Building Unit of the Dept. of Education at the Dungarvan School.

"These officials saw first hand the inadequacy of the facilities at the school, and I have no doubt our representations ultimately convinced the Minister of the urgent need of either a new school or a major extension," said Cllr. Kyne.

He said their final meeting with senior Dept. officials on January 20 had probably "shaded the verdict", and he lauded the efforts of Mr. Heffernan, the V.E.C.'s liaison group, and his fellow V.E.C. members on bringing the accommodation crisis issue in Dungarvan to a successful conclusion.

## New spuds from the garden so yummy

THOUGHTS of new potatoes fresh from the garden in early summer are a great consolation when contemplating the bleakness of February.

And such a crop is not hard to produce providing you have done some digging and soil conditioning with well-rotted compost before the onset of winter. Even if you haven't laboured over such preparation, a vigorous turning now to the depth of a spade plus a lacing of compost should produce results. More important is choosing a lime-free location — potatoes are otherwise tolerant of most soil types. Then buy the seed potato tubers: Duke of York and Home Guard are two hard and tasty varieties worth trying for an early harvest. Make sure to stock you buy is guaranteed disease-free.

Stand the tubers with the eyes pointing upwards in wooden seed boxes or cardboard egg trays in a cool yet frost-free location, which is also light and well-ventilated — a greenhouse or conservatory will do.

They will sprout soon afterwards and can be planted out in March, about 4-5 inches deep and a foot apart in the case of early varieties — these guidelines should be increased by about a third for later and heavier cropping varieties such as Majestic and King Edward.

Advice on how you plant tends to be more varied: most people like to hoe a trench while others swear by trowelling each tuber into its chosen location.

Once planted, early tubers need frost protection using straw or shredded newspaper spread around the shoots. As those shoots develop, you must then mound or 'earth up' soil to protect them and the side shoots.

This will produce and condition the new tubers for harvesting.

Unfortunately, this practice also makes it difficult to hoe around the plants without damaging the new roots and tubers.

As a result, efficient hand weeding and mulching — preferably with straw — is vital. Apart from starving marauding weeds, mulching will also help to keep the soil moist. Don't feel bad about being impatient to harvest the first small tubers that's when they taste best and are easiest to prepare and cook.

There should be plenty more to come too, providing you harvest the early growth carefully and gently mound the soil around the plants again.

You should not, however, harvest later varieties such as Majestic in the same way — you will simply reduce the harvest that comes at the end of summer.

Once lifted, these are then dried for a few hours before careful storage for the months to come.

## The Credit Union And You

Question — Who runs the Credit Union?

Answer — Once a year the members come together for the Annual General Meeting. They own the Credit Union, so they want to hear how it got on last year and to appoint members to run it for the coming year.

They get Reports as follows:

(1) From the Treasurer telling how their Credit Union got on financially last year and recommend-

ing the dividends to be paid on their shares — and they vote on whether to accept this.

(2) The Auditor reads his/her Report.

(3) The Credit Committee reports in general terms on the previous year's loans.

(4) The Supervisors report on the checks they carried out during the year to ensure that all was well.

The members then elect a

minimum of 5 directors, or a maximum of 15 directors to run their Credit Union for the coming year.

These directors are members like all other members but give their time voluntarily to run the Credit Union. They also elect 3 members as Supervisors to keep an eye on the running of their Credit Union — and an independent outside Auditor, who audits the accounts at

the end of the year.

The members can, and should, take an active interest in ensuring that their Credit Union is run as well as possible.

## The Tipsy Lamb Hotpot Is So Crisp



Rich in flavour, low on cost — that's our lamb hotpot with ale. It has a crisp, crunchy topping.

### Ingredients:

2lb (900g) stewing lamb  
12 pickling onions  
2 carrots  
peeled and cut into chunks  
8oz (225g) swede,  
peeled and diced  
1 medium potato, peeled and diced  
2 bay leaves  
1/2 pt (300ml) each brown ale and stock  
salt and pepper  
14oz (400g) can haricot or red kidney beans



### Topping

2oz (50g) brown bread-crumbs  
2tbs (30ml) chopped parsley  
1oz (25g) chopped walnuts

### Method

Place lamb, onions, car-

rots, swede, potato and bay leaves in a large saucepan. Add ale, stock, salt and pepper. Bring to the boil, then skim the surface. Transfer to large oven-proof dish and cover tightly. Cook at 325°F,

160°C, gas mark 3 for 1 3/4 hrs, until lamb is tender.

Stir in beans with liquid. Mix the topping ingredients and sprinkle over hotpot. Cook uncovered for 30mins until topping is golden.

# Local Civil Defence Seaborne

Selected Civil Defence units around the country have just been issued with new recovery craft which will greatly increase their capacity for search and recovery.

Waterford County Civil Defence was among those selected units present at the Naval Base, Haulbowline on Friday, February 11 last, where the Minister for State at the Department of Defence, Mr. Noel Dempsey, proudly presented them with a new recovery craft.

Waterford Civil Defence unit already has an excellent record in responding to searches for missing people,

but, up to now, the organisation's volunteers have been confined to land-based searches.

The new recovery craft will enable Waterford Civil Defence unit to expand their activities to provide this service on local waters in co-operation with other organisations involved in this worthwhile work.

Each unit receiving those versatile craft, have been given intensive training by the Naval Service at their Haulbowline facility. Speaking at the presentation, Minister Noel Dempsey complimented the organisation as a whole, "for all the

searching it has carried out."

"Today the process of water based activities begins and as training skills are developed the organisation will be in a better position to respond to local water search and recovery. I feel, with the addition of these workboats, we will expand our capacity considerably and we will be able to provide a much better service to the other agencies involved in this area."

To the Naval Service, Minister Dempsey added "on behalf of Civil Defence, we are extremely grateful to you and we hope that this is the first phase of what will be a

long association between our two services."

Speaking on behalf of the Waterford County Civil Defence unit, Mr. Colm Bannon, Civil Defence Officer, told the "Dungarvan Leader" that the new recovery craft will further expand and support the unit's day to day services.

Mr. Bannon explained that prior to receiving this welcome piece of equipment, the unit was confined to searching river banks when looking for missing persons. Now, with this new 30 horse-power inflatable boat, the unit can be of vital assistance to Gardaí in searching estuaries and rivers.

Mr. Bannon also thanked the Naval Service for giving the local unit the opportunity to train under the Service's excellent training course.

## "THIS IS YOUR LIFE"

At the Oriel Bar, Ballymacarbry, on Saturday night last, Fourmilewater hurling club hosted a great night to one of its outstanding club men, on his election to the office of Chairman of West Waterford Divisional G.A.A. Board. He was Paddy Joe Ryan, Graignagour.

The 'This Is Your Life' narrator was Michael Ryan, well-known in ladies football circles. He gave a complete run down on his life and involvement with Fourmilewater and Nire teams down the years. Afterwards he was presented with a scroll by Billy Walsh, Chair-

man Fourmilewater hurling. He also received a weekend for two at a Killarney Hotel. His wife received a bouquet of flowers from Claire Walsh, daughter of the chairman. People from many clubs in county Waterford were present on the night.

## SHUT OUT OF THE WOODS

The Forest Ramblers Association which was formed last year to protest against restricted access of Gurteen Wood on the County Waterford side of Kilsheelan where shooting rights are leased to a commercial driven Pheasant Shoot, has countered statements made by Coillte in a recent letter. Coillte's head of communications, quality, staff development and training in a letter said, that "no restrictions on public access are imposed in areas which are let for shooting purposes." That may be so, but it is difficult to go into the woods, according to Mrs. Helen Walsh, Chairwoman of the Forest Ramblers Association. Some of the Association's members were in the wood for a walk at 9 a.m. one day during the Christmas holidays. Subsequently a complaint was made to a Coillte representative in the locality by a representative of the shoot that the walkers were disturbing the feeding lines.

Mrs. Walsh denies this and said they kept to the forest path way, but were told by the Coillte representative that they

were being unreasonable by being in the woods at that hour of the morning. What we are saying is that effectively we can be shut out of the woods 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, going on the fact that the shoot do not want their feeding disturbed. We can be shut out every day claimed Mrs. Walsh.

Entering the wood during shooting days is inadvisable according to the F.R.A. This year there will be twenty shooting days, but according to one of the articles written in the Angling and Shooting News by the head gamekeeper, Mr. Bob Otley, the shoot will be looking for forty days in the '94-'95 season.

The Association wants Coillte to do two things — to make it quite clear that the shoot has shooting rights only over the land; and that the owner of the shoot has no right to eject people from the forest. Coillte has to come out and be very public about the shoot. The Association would also like the Shoot to publish the days and times that shooting is taking place so people will know.

## ONE HUNDRED AND ONE HUNDRED AND ONE

During the past week two South Tipperary ladies made the news. On last Friday, Feb. 11 Sister Mary Immaculata Walsh a member of the Good Shepherd Order celebrated her 101st birthday with her community in Clifton Convent, Montenotte, Cork. Despite four major operations in the course of her long life and having to battle with a severe bout of flu' in the early part of this year, Sister Immaculata is still in reasonable good health, getting up each day, and managing to attend Community Masses in the Convent Oratory. She hails from Ballylomasna in the Parish of Ballylooby/Dunhill, and is the eldest and only surviving member of the family of Patrick and Catherine Walsh. She was baptised Elizabeth on the following day of her birth in the Church of St. John the Baptist, Dunhill. Her mother died in December 1943. Sister Immaculata was educated at the Convent National School, Clogheen, and at the Ursuline Convent, Thurles. She entered the Good Shepherd Order in May 1914, a few months before the outbreak of World War 1. Another sister of hers, Catherine, was a member of the Order as

well, her religious name was Sister Oteran, she died at a Waterford Convent in 1986. Sister Immaculata has now given eighty years of her life to her religious vocation.

The other lady to celebrate her 100th birthday was Bridget Lonergan. She was born at Park, Grange, Clonmel, on the 5th of February, 1894, the feast of St. Agatha. Her birthday was celebrated with a night out at a party held in her honour by the people of Galbally, Co. Limerick. She has resided there with her daughter Peggy for the last twenty years. The Galbally Community Centre was packed to capacity for the celebrations. Bridget received her birthday cheque of £250 from the President Mary Robinson from Very Rev. Canon Denis Talbot, P.P. and presentations were made to Bridget by a number of clubs and organisations in the village. Bridget attributes her long life to hard work. She never smoked or drank. She worked as a nurse in Waterford, England and in the local area before she was married. She gave up her nursing career when she married, her husband Patrick, who died in 1963. 
# Abbeyside Scout Notes

# FARMING LEADER

## Special Beef Premium Scheme Age Problem

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan said that the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh and the Department of Agriculture must implement the Special Beef Pre-

mium Scheme properly regarding the ages of animals. Mr. Donovan welcomed Minister Walsh's clarification of their age issue, where he specified that under EU Regulations male

cattle of 8 months of age or over are eligible for the 10 month Special Beef Premium and male cattle 21 months of age or over are eligible for the 22 month Special Beef Premium.

The Aglish livestock farmer said that following representation from IFA the Department had now agreed to adopt this age policy on all animals applied for during the January/February 1993 and the June 1993 application periods. "This should release payments up to 18,000 farmers which are currently held up.

Mr. Donovan said that a similar interpretation must be adopted by the Minister and the Department towards the November 1993 and the January/February 1994 applications. "In this regard, on the current application for 10 month Special Beef Premium male cattle born on or before the 30th June, 1993 must be eligible. Like-

wise for the 22 month Special Beef Premium male cattle born on or before the 31st May, 1992 are eligible."

Mr. Donovan said that the Minister cannot apply one set of rules for one application and a different set of rules for another application period under the same scheme. "Clearly animals born on or before June 30th, 1993 are 8 months of age and animals born on or before May 31st, 1992 are 21 months of age." The livestock farmer said that the Association would take up this matter again with the Department to have it clarified beyond question.

Mr. Donovan also welcomed Minister Walsh's accommodation to resolve the problem regarding the payment of Special Beef Premium on cattle exported to Third Countries, whose identity cards were not punched prior to sale by the local Department Office.

## IFA Call On Minister Walsh To Protect Sheep Quota In Non-Disadvantaged Areas

Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman, James Coughlan has called on the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh to ring fence sheep quota in Non-Disadvantaged Areas as it is currently the case in Disadvantaged Areas.

Mr. Coughlan said that recent transactions of quota would clearly indicate that the majority of sheep quota movement is from Non-Disadvantaged Areas to disadvantaged Areas. "IFA are extremely concerned that there is large movement of quota in one direction. The National Sheep Committee feel that Minister Walsh should act on this information and move to

ring fenced quota in Non-Disadvantaged Areas, encompassing these as sensitive areas for quota movement."

The Kinsalebeg sheep farmer pointed out that when CAP Reform was introduced Minister Walsh declared Disadvantaged Areas as Sensitive Areas for quota purposes specifying that quota cannot be traded outside of their areas. "With two seasons in quota trading now completed it is apparent that quota is moving out of Non-Disadvantaged Areas and it is time for Minister Walsh to act within the EU Regulations to prevent this worrying trend from continuing."

## Convicted Of Careless Driving

A two-car crash in which a retired Co. Waterford garda sergeant was killed, was recalled before Judge Murrugh Connellan at Dungarvan District Court.

Teresa Walsh, Ballymulala, Cappagh, Co. Waterford, was convicted of careless driving on the new Dungarvan By-Pass Road at Shandon on September 21 last year.

The Court heard that when overtaking a lorry Ms. Walsh's car was in a head-on collision with an approaching car. The driver of the vehicle, Daniel Lucey, was fatally injured.

Inspector Michael Blake said the defendant did not have a clear view of the road ahead when overtaking the lorry. She had suffered serious injuries and her passenger had also been injured.

Mr. Jack Murphy solr. defending, said there may also have been an element of fault on the part of the lorry driver but they had been unable to locate him.

On the careless driving conviction Judge Connellan fined Ms. Walsh £75 and

endorsed her driving licence.

## Agreement Reached For 1994 Crop Malting Barley

At a meeting in Dublin on February 2, 1994, negotiations in respect of 1994 crop malting barley were finalised between the National Grain Committee of the IFA and representatives of Guinness Ireland Ltd., Minch Norton Ltd. and Williams Waller Ltd.

These negotiations which commenced in December were conducted against a background of volatile and difficult inter-

national trading conditions and took account of the need to secure the home trade and be competitive on both price and quality in export markets.

I was agreed that Guinness would pay a price of IR£92 per tonne for 1994 crop malting barley at 20% moisture, delivered to intake point, for the varieties Blenheim, Alexis and Grit at a protein content of 10.5/10.6%.

## County Waterford I.C.M.S.A. News

Council members Tom Hickey and John Dowley attended a special council meeting in Limerick on Wednesday 9th February last to consider the outcome of the negotiations on the new Programme for Competitiveness and Work. The National Council of the I.C.M.S.A. on the recommendation of the President, Tom O'Dwyer, adopted the Document as adequate to allow the Association to take part in the Programme.

The Council of the I.C.M.S.A. resolved to have an annual analysis of progress on implementation and to then decide in its participation in the follow-

ing year. The I.C.M.S.A. decision was made despite very deep reservations on:

1. the continuation of the probate tax;
2. the continued denial to farmers of personal allowances for income tax equal to those provided to P.A.Y.E. persons;
3. the continued denial of pro-rata pension rights for P.R.S.I. contributions made and
4. the severe restrictions placed in this years Budget on widows' rights to contributory social welfare pensions.

The Council directed that these issues will have to receive priority attention.

## IMPORTANT NOTICE FOR SHEEP PRODUCERS EWE PREMIUM AND SHEEP HEADAGE SCHEMES 1994

1994 Application period, National Reserve and Transfer and Lease of Quota.

**Application Period:** The Ewe Premium and Sheep Headage application period for the 1994 marketing year will commence on 21 February 1994 and close on 28 February 1994. Composite application forms covering both Schemes together with Terms and conditions have issued to last year's participants. Any flockowner who has not yet received a form should immediately obtain one from the nearest local office of the Department. Applications received between 1 and 20 March 1994, will not attract the full rates of payment. Applications received after 20 March 1994 will not be considered.

**Retention Periods:** In the Ewe Premium Scheme, the 100 day retention period will run from 28 February 1994 to 7 June 1994 both days inclusive. There is also a retention period in the Sheep Headage Scheme of a minimum of 2 months from the date of submission of the application.

**Area Aid Forms:** Intending applicants for the Sheep Headage Scheme and Ewe Premium applicants with at least 50% of their holdings in Disadvantaged Areas are reminded that they must submit an Area Aid Form by 31 March 1994.

**Inspections:** Inspections under both Schemes will commence in March and continue until June 1994.

**Ewe Premium Reserve Quota:** Producers who have been asked to submit further information have until 18 February 1994 to do so. Failure to comply will result in the rejection of their applications.

Any producer whose application to the Reserve has been unsuccessful or has not been fully processed may acquire Quota by lease or transfer up until Friday 11 March 1994. Such producers who intend to acquire Quota may apply for the Ewe Premium in respect of the number of eligible sheep on their holding at date of application for the Premium.

Producers whose applications to the Reserve have not been fully processed will be notified, as soon as possible, of additional Quota (if any) to which they may be entitled.

# Disconnection Of Water Charges "Undignified, Demoralising And Draconian"

The disconnection of water charge defaulters was described this week by a Fine Gael member of Waterford County Council as an "undignified, demoralising and draconian action".

Cllr. Gary O'Halloran proposed that in the future enforcement of water charges the Council use remedies other than water disconnection. He did not believe that water disconnection was a "last resort" and said it would be far more dignified if the Council first sought a court order on any and all

outstanding debts.

Seconding the proposal, Cllr. Tony Wright (Democratic Left), said Waterford County Council is now the leader in the national water charge league table. "We have the highest charges in the country," he said.

However, Cllr. Billy Kyne (Labour) said he resented the portrayal of the Council as a draconian one. People who had fallen behind in their mortgages had always found the Council sympathetic to deal with, and he would regret if it went abroad from their meeting

that they are "a tough and heartless regime."

Cllr. Michael Queally pointed out that Telecom Eireann and the E.S.B. doesn't resort to court orders when people steadfastly refuse to pay their bills. "They are eventually disconnected," he said.

Cllr. Paddy Kenneally agreed and said it is only a hard core of less than 10% who are refusing to pay their water charges. "Our consideration should be for the 90% who do," Cllr. Kenneally added.

Mr. Brian J. McNally,

Acting County Manager, said they had a waiver system for people finding it difficult to pay water charges, but many of those refusing to pay are people earning very good money.

Mr. McNally said that were the Co. Council to go through the courts there would be further expense on people, and the end result would still be disconnection if they refused to pay.

Cllr. O'Halloran's proposal was defeated by 16 votes to 2.

## Charged With Assaults On Fishery Officers

Three Co. Waterfordmen, who face several indictable charges arising from an alleged violent physical confrontation with officers of the Southern Regional Fisheries Board off Mine Head on July 28 last, appeared before Judge Murragh Connellan at Dungarvan District Court.

The charges against two of the accused, Liam Og Kelly and his brother Kieran Kelly, both of Helvick, Dungarvan, include two counts of assaulting two fishery officers occasioning them actual bodily harm.

They also face six charges of common assault on fishery officers, and one of possessing an offensive weapon.

The third accused, John Healy, McCarthyville, Abbeyside, Dungarvan, is charged on six counts of common assault on the officers, and also one of possessing an offensive weapon.

Mr. Gerry McCullagh solr. for the Kelly's, intimated to

the court that they will be opting for a jury trial on the two charges of assault occasioning actual bodily harm.

Mr. J. P. Gordon solr. successfully made application to the court for free legal aid in respect of Healy, but similar applications by Mr. McCullagh on behalf of the Kelly's were adjourned for substantiation of their financial circumstances.

Judge Connellan, with the consent of the State prosecutor Inspector Michael Blake and both defence solicitors, adjourned all the indictable charges to Dungarvan Court on April 13.

Summary charges against all three accused in respect of the same occasion were also brought by the Southern Regional Fisheries Board.

Mr. David Keane solr. for the Board, said he would be seeking an adjournment of all the summary charges until after the indictable offences against the accused had been dealt with.

Judge Connellan also adjourned these to April 13.

# Central Heating Vital In Housing Programme

Responding to a circular issued by the Department of the Environment regarding the 1994 housing construction programme for Waterford County Council, Cllr. Billy Kyne (Labour) said last Monday that he welcomed the 45 houses allocated for the area. These local authority

houses are to be provided by way of building new houses and/or the acquisition of existing houses.

Council members were also reminded of the guidelines and procedures relating to Departmental approval of such housing schemes. These guidelines include external joinery,

counteracting social segregation and central heating.

## "GREAT OPPORTUNITY"

Referring to the welcome development of the central heating guidelines, Cllr. Kyne urged the council to "grasp this opportunity and make sure that future local authority houses have heating".

Stating that it was "crazy in modern society" for a house to be without a "radiated system", Cllr. Kyne further added that council members "must now respond in an innovative and imaginative way" to tackle the problem of central heating.

## REASONABLE, SAFE AND EFFICIENT

Under the central heating procedures to be employed by local authorities the Department of the Environment states that "full central heating should be provided in new local authority housing". "The authority should be satisfied that the cost of any heating system is reasonable; that it is safe, efficient and appropriate; that it can be adequately maintained, and that it will not result in unsustainable running and maintenance costs".

Also supporting this new

development Cllr. Austin Flynn (F.F.) stated that local authority houses will now be of a modern standard. Central heating, Cllr. Flynn added, will also "contribute to the maintenance of houses".

Following on from these departmental guidelines, Waterford County Council will now determine the composition of their 1994 programme between purchases of houses and the building of new houses. Details of new residential halting site proposals will also be determined and forwarded to the Department of the Environment by the end of this month.

## Ship Building And Ship Builders of Waterford & County

Early historical records tell us that Waterford was noted for ship-building from at least Viking times and the historical development of the craft will provide the subject for Dungarvan Museum Society's next public lecture in Lawlor's Hotel on Thursday, February 24. The speaker on the occasion is Mr. Bill Irish, a lecturer at Waterford Regional College, presently researching a thesis on the topic. On his maternal side, Bill Irish is a member of the Wall family of Slieverue, who have a long association with ship-building on the River Suir.

Among the firms prominent in Waterford's peak ship-building period in the mid-nineteenth century were Penrose's, Smith's, White's, Pope's and Malcolmson's who owned the renowned Neptune Iron Foundry and were early developers of ironclad hulls and later screw propeller propulsion. Dungarvan's contribution to maritime trade was also considerable both in building and ownership—crewing, while Malcolmson's Green Island Foundry at Portlaw cast and machined shafts for the screw steamers. A most interesting lecture is assured at Lawlor's Hotel on Thursday, February 24. All are welcome. See advertisement elsewhere in this issue.

## Used Slash Hook On Brother's Van

A 23 year old unemployed labourer, who threatened and intimidated gardai with a slash-hook on one occasion, and on another subsequent date used a slash-hook to strike the windscreen of a van being driven by his own brother, was sentenced to a total of nine months imprisonment at Dungarvan District Court.

Frankie Keniry, 12 Ringasillogue, Youghal Road, Dungarvan, was given three-month concurrent sentences for assaulting Sergeant Tadg Donovan and Garda Sean McMahon at Childers Estate on August 28 last.

Keniry, who pleaded not guilty, was given a further consecutive three months for producing a slash-hook in a manner likely to threaten and intimidate Sgt. Donovan.

The court had been told that Keniry picked up the slash-hook and threatened the officers after they were called to a domestic dispute.

In respect of charges relating to an incident on November 27 last when the court heard that Keniry used a slash-hook to strike the

windscreen of a van driven by his brother John at 3.30 a.m., the defendant was given concurrent six and nine months sentences.

Gardai John Twomey and Perrie Galvin told the court that Keniry had threatened to wreck his brother's van. Almost immediately the van approached along the Youghal Road and Keniry ran across the road, picked up a slash-hook, and struck the windscreen of the van with it.

Keniry, however, denied in evidence that any such incident took place on that occasion.

Judge Murragh Connellan described the incident as "horrific" and said there was no knowing the possible consequences of Keniry's actions.

The defendant was returned for trial on fourteen other indictable charges to the April sittings of the Waterford Circuit Court.

They include causing criminal damage to two garda patrol cars and assaults on seven garda officers, all on January 7 last.

Inspector Michael Blake prosecuted.

## TALLOW G.A.A. CLUB NOTES



**Clubs and Pressure** — The struggle of clubs to survive nowadays is always properly appreciated by their supporters and very often the players take for granted or are unaware of the huge effort required to support financially a season's playing activities.

Only those in executive club positions with responsibility for handling the (usually) limited resources available - Chairman, Hon. Secretary, Hon. Treasurer and committee - realise fully what running the club's many teams entails.

Tallow, for instance, has a senior hurling team, junior hurling and football teams, Under 21, minor, Under 16, Under 14 and Under 12 hurling and football teams. Training, challenge, tournament and championship games cost quite a sum of money. An exclusively football club has a considerable annual outlay, I'm sure, but a club where hurling has priority - and it must if you aspire to a high standard - must surely expand at least five times that sum. Do you know what a hurley costs, even for an Under 12? Any idea how long, on average, a player's stick can be expected to remain unbroken? How many sticks will an active player need for a season? Where will he get sticks and what will it cost him?

Fortunately the Tallow club always acknowledged the existence and importance of this costly equipment problem and did something about it. Juveniles, minors and those not in employment could buy a camán at a greatly reduced price thus enabling every player to purchase his own stick, one that suited him in terms of length and weight. Senior players, too, were always facilitated (on a more modest scale) in this fashion over the years. It is only right that any club purporting to support and promote our greatest field game should have some such structure in place. Mo náire our government who have still to recognise the injustice of putting a penal V.A.T. on the camán.

No Tallow player ever needs to buy a sliotar; no senior, junior, minor or under-age. The club supplies them for training and for matches. Whenever our teams train the coach has a bag of sliotars, allowing one sliotar for every two players. Sliotars, no more than anything else nowadays, don't last and their life span is severely curtailed if training has to take place in inclement weather. Balls are worn, torn, lost or (occasionally) disappear mysteriously only to turn up another time in other hands! Would it astonish you to learn that a good sliotar costs £5 or £6? No surprise then that this item of expenditure figures largely on the annual club balance sheet. Cutting down on the sliotar numbers is false economy by any standards.

Finally before a hurley is grasped or football fielded a club must register its teams. Those teams must be insured (most important) if players are to be covered in the event of accidental injury. This procedure recently cost Tallow club £1,000 for 1994. Though necessary that's a big sum for a relatively impecunious little club at the extreme western end of the county and forced to travel longer distances than most other clubs for every match. Isn't it very hard to keep the flag flying? Wouldn't you admire a club, any club, which keeps the faith, nourishes its hope and can depend on the bountiful charity of its supporters and admirers? That's why while expressing sincere thanks for the continuing support of our loyal followers we promise our best efforts towards regaining for Tallow a respectable place in the hurling firmament of Waterford.

Kinsalebeg's trip to R.T.E. last week to take part in "The Works" proved very worthwhile.







In attack we may not have the same placings as we did at Leamybrien, but included will be Peter Queally, Liam Dalton, Anthony and Paul Fitzgerald, Derek Kiely and Derek Wyse. Roger Power and Ger Power, both of whom were introduced in our last game, will be seriously considered for places also.

Kilkenny, whose only defeat of Waterford was at Portlaw, may see this as their one chance of taking a brace of points and will

come with this in mind. Two weeks ago they scored 1-8 against Wicklow and this was no mean achievement against a team of Wicklow's standards.

## Western Board Meeting

## Where The Money Goes

When the Munster Council hold their annual convention in Dungarvan next week, delegates will be told where the £1,460,000 total gate receipts for the year, were distributed.

The huge figure did not reach the record set in 1992 when the receipts amounted to £1,550,000.

The accounts will show that the biggest 'gate' of the season was for the Cork v. Kerry Munster football semi-final. This figure was £262,271; the football final against Tipperary at Thurles brought in £111,886; the first round football tie involving Clare and Cork realised a total of £104,632. In hurling the provincial final between Tipperary and Clare brought a gate of £254,262.

Outgoings were also huge last year and for staging games, counties were paid a total of £173,371 in rent.

Grants to counties for county and club grounds development were £286,850.

Grants to provincial finalists amounted to £90,192, and for coaching and development of games the Council paid out £159,687, while schools in the province were given £45,000.

For public liability the Council paid over a quarter of a million, but of this figure a total of £163,215 was paid in by the six Munster counties. Players injury claims amounted to £285,396; and they distributed a total of £110,000 in interest free loans to counties. In excess of £200,000 was given out in development grants for stadia and county grounds.

Even though huge amounts are being given out for development, etc., the figure for coaching, games development and schools is much greater than ever before.

# Costly First Half Lapse For Waterford

A ninth minute goal by Ger Manley helped the home side to a 1-5 to nil lead at Páirc Uí Caoimh in round four of the Hurling League on Sunday last and while Waterford showed much improved form when scoring five points as against three for the Rebels in the second half, we must rue the chances that presented themselves and were not availed of.

The result must put us out of contention for a place in the play-off stages and the county must now try to avoid relegation, which will not be easy allowing for the fact that three of the eight teams in our division will be relegated when the league ends in May.

Having to play Galway, Limerick and Antrim poses a formidable challenge and as both the Galway and Antrim matches are away games for us, it looks as if

we will be really up against it to stay in the top division next year.

Waterford fielded as selected and took some time to settle against the National League champions and their failure to register a score in the first half was, in the main, due to the solidarity of the Cork defence. Waterford did play quite a lot of the ball throughout this half and might be described as a bit unlucky not to have at least a couple of scores. Ger Manley's goal was the result of a combined effort involving Cathal Casey and Tony O'Sullivan and it proved to be a devastating blow for Waterford, who, at the stage, were showing signs of coming into the game.

**DETERMINED**

Undaunted by Cork's 1-5 to nil lead at half time, the Deise side came out determined to wipe out their lead and hurling with greater

confidence they had their first score in the 33rd minute when centre back Stephen Frampton sent over a long distance free. They continued to hurl with grit and fierce determination, but again found the opponents defence to be rock solid and unyielding. With ten minutes remaining only four points separated the teams and Waterford, sensing that all was not lost, threw everything they knew into a final effort, but it proved to no avail as Cork held out to take the points. Taking into consideration the bitter cold and the poor underfoot conditions, the standard was good and one could not ask for a better contest in the first hurling league game of the season.

Cork were obviously delighted with their performance and with the result and the champions are now hoping to reach the knock-out stages again this year.

Waterford coach, Georgie Leahy, although a little disappointed, was not down-hearted by our display. He said we had a very young team out, including six under-21 players and with an improvement in our scoring power, we can look forward with hope to the championships.

For Waterford, Tom Fives, Mark O'Sullivan, Damien Byrne, Stephen Frampton and Billy O'Sullivan played outstandingly for most of the hour.

## PRIMARY SCHOOLS G.A.A. NEWS

### THE HURLEY

Hurleys are available in a variety of lengths, weights and shapes. In general, the hurley should not only suit your height but also your physical ability as you should be able to handle your hurley for long periods without fatigue and with speed and accuracy.

Most young hurlers use hurleys that are too long and too heavy. A useful test is a boys or girls ability to swing and control the hurley with reasonable ease using one hand only at the top of the hurley. It is much better for the hurley to be too light than too heavy.

### KNOW YOUR GAME

**The Field Of Play** — The field of play shall be rectangular and its dimensions shall be as follows:

- Length — 130m minimum and 145m maximum
- Width — 80m minimum and 90m maximum.

**EXCEPTION** — The dimensions may be reduced by local bye-laws for under 15 or younger grades.

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**G.A.A. Referee  
"Did Not  
Wish To Offer  
Evidence"**

A well-known inter-county G.A.A. referee, who complained to the gardai that he had been assaulted by a player during the course of a football championship match he was refereeing last July, told Judge Peter Smithwick at Cappoquin District Court that he did not wish to offer any evidence in the matter.

John Michael Kelly, Knockanore, Tallow, had been called to give evidence as the chief State witness in an assault charge brought by the Director of Public Prosecutions against John

Byrne, Lower Glen, Modeligo.

Byrne, who was assisting Modeligo in a junior football championship game against Old Parish on the occasion, was charged with assaulting Kelly at the Cappoquin G.A.A. grounds on July 10 last.

When Mr. Kelly took the witness stand he told prosecuting Supt. Ray McAndrew that while he had made a complaint of an assault on him by Byrne on that occasion to the gardai he didn't now want to offer any evidence in connection with it.

Asked by Judge Smithwick if he understood that the court would be left with no option but to dismiss the charge in the absence of his evidence, Kelly replied that he did.

The Judge then dismissed the assault charge against the accused who was represented by Mr. Michael Hanrahan solr.

**£1.3 MILLION  
ALLOCATION?**

Earlier the meeting was told that Waterford County Council could receive a maximum allocation this year of £1.37 million from the Dept. of the Environment for improvement works on non-national roads.

The County Engineer said proposals would have to be submitted but each project must be over £75,000 in value. "That does not mean, however, that we will get all of that amount," he said.

Cllr. Billy Kyne said they should try to priorities what they want, and he suggested that the road to the airport would be one such priority. He feared that if they simply came up with a list of twelve or eighteen projects and lobbied them on the Dept.'s table, they would end up getting nothing.

The Chairman, Cllr. Con Casey, said they should pursue all the compulsory purchase orders for the airport road programme because this type of allocation would become available each year.

Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson said £400,000 alone would be needed to repair the non-national roads in the Lismore area, so vast is the damage which has been done to them.

It was agreed that the members will make submissions to the County Engineer before a final priority list is drawn up for presentation to the Dept. who, at the end of the day, will have the final say.



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
