## VEC TO COMMEMORATE WORK OF PADRAIG O FIANNUSA

The County Waterford Vocational Education Committee at its meeting last Monday, decided to award an annual scholarship to the Ring Gaeltacht for the best pupil at Irish at the Committee's schools at Dungarvan and Kilmacthomas.

Scolaireacht i gCuimhne Padraig O Fiannusa (The Padraig O Fiannusa Memorial Scholarship) will commemorate the work done for the Irish language and culture by one of the committee's longest serving Irish teachers, Padraig O Fiannusa, who was born in Reidh na dTiompán in the parish of Sliabh gCua in 1914.

Padraig was interested in the Irish language from an early age and in 1936 he started teaching night classes around the county. He taught from time to time in the following centres — Touraneena, The Nire, Ballymacarbry, Kilmanahan, Kilbrien, Coolnasmear, Killisheal, Ballyduff, Lismore, Knockanore, Cappelquin, Mount Melleray and Modeligo. He travelled around to the various centres on his bicycle for which he was paid 2 pence per mile, travelling expenses.

His first permanent job with the VEC was in 1950 at Cappelquin Technical School and he also taught at Tallow during this time and


transferred to St. Declan's Community College, Kilmacthomas in 1970 from where he retired in 1981.

Padraig ran feisanna, pageants, dramas, concerts and aeriochta all over the country.

Kieran Heffernan, Chief Executive Officer, told Monday's meeting of Co. Waterford VEC that the late Padraig O Fiannusa's contribution to the promotion of the Irish language and culture could never be properly quantified.

"I believe we should endeavour to keep the memory of this great teacher alive, and an annual scholarship for the best overall Irish student at our schools in Dungarvan and Kilmacthomas would be a fitting way of honouring him," Mr. Heffernan said.

In addition to the scholarship the VEC will also present a certificate or parchment to the successful student each year.

# Wright Calls For Overcrowding Solution

U.D.C. Chairman, Cllr. Tony Wright, called on members of the Urban Council last Monday night, to take "practical steps to alleviate overcrowding in some of the housing stock."

Highlighting the ever increasing list of families waiting for 4 bedroomed houses, Cllr. Wright then recalled a poignant example of overcrowding problems associated with these families. "I was approached by a woman with five daughters of different ages and all living in the same room,"

recounted Cllr. Wright. "It's now time we addressed these problems," he added.

The solutions proposed by the U.D.C. Chairman involve:— (a) transferring families from 3 bedroomed houses to 4 bedroomed houses, thus releasing the former for letting and/or (b) building an extra bedroom

onto those houses where an overcrowding problem exists as some families may not want to move.

Under the housing construction programme for 1994, Dungarvan UDC has been directed to build 15 houses. Out of this allocation Cllr. Wright then proposed to build 14 4 bedroomed houses and to add an extra room onto four 3 bedroomed houses.

### INVESTIGATIVE PROCEDURE NEEDED

Complimenting the Chairman's proposal, Cllr. Austin Hallahan stressed that the situation be investigated further. Also supporting the proposal, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan urged the Council to examine the housing stock and "see where serious overcrowding exists," with a possible addition of 5

# Fresh Proposals For Urban Road Works

At the February meeting of Dungarvan U.D.C., Bertie White, Town Clerk, announced details of the urban road works proposals for 1994 to 1996.

### GOOD NEWS FOR GRANTS

Mr. White went on to explain that an extra £4,000 has been financed by the Exchequer this year to bring the block grant up to £60,000. This grant is to enable the U.D.C. to meet the cost of maintenance and im-

provement works.

A scheme of specific grants has also been introduced by the Department of the Environment, designed to meet 100% of the cost to local authorities of individual road improvement projects.

These projects selected by the U.D.C., however, will have to satisfy certain EU requirements such as contribution to employment, economic activity, tourism, rural development.

Each proposed scheme must be in excess of

£75,000, although that does not necessarily mean that the council will receive all of that amount for the projects.

### URBAN FACELIFT

Should departmental approval be granted to Dungarvan U.D.C. for their urban road works proposals,

**LETTER to the EDITOR**

**Railway Line To Close?**

Dear Sir,

I am writing in regard to the current issue of the possible abandonment of the "Waterford/Ballinacourty Railway Line", which, I believe, has come to its "now or never" stage.

After the closure of the "Mallow/Waterford" line in 1967, track lifting began in January 1968. Track was lifted from Mallow Station, Co. Cork, to a point near the 'Crooked Bridge' just outside Dungarvan. There is no doubt that the remaining 24 miles of the line to Waterford would have to be lifted as well had it not been for its potential use in the transportation of raw materials to the new Quigley Magnesite Plant at Ballinard, Ballinacourty, which was just beginning to be constructed. To link the line to the plant a new 11/2 mile spur was built and so in 1969 both plant and line opened.

Now the line was mainly used for the transportation of Dolomite (from Kilkenny) and also crude oil for the plant, but special passenger trains were also organised for staff outings. These will still be organised right up to the shock closure of the plant in July 1982.

Although the line has now been closed for 12 years, trains and rail-cars have still traversed it on an irregular basis. I myself travelled on a 'weedspraying train' in June 1987 and I believe it was traversed up until fairly recently (1990+). This is why I believe it can still be saved and its potential realised again.

From a tourism point of view, I believe the line has great potential because of the terrain it travels through, and the many spectacular views, e.g. banks of the River Suir. I also believe that if the line could be re-laid and brought back into Abbeyside, with a station somewhere near Seapark, the use of a 'Railbus' or 'Dart' like service could be a worthwhile project.

The possibilities are endless but time is running out. Already track has been dismantled at Ballinacourty. Is this the start of the end?

I believe now is the time the local Council should act with all its power and save this valuable asset, the only remaining railway line in Co. Waterford. Many people I've talked to share this same view.

The local Council should act positively about this matter immediately and not negatively like their predecessors back in 1967.

**Deasy On Repairs To Helvick Pier**

Mr. Austin Deasy, T.D., has asked the Minister for the Marine if he will sanction the urgent repairs required to keep the pier at Helvick intact and if he will make a statement on the matter.

In his reply the Minister for the Marine, David Andrews, T.D., said Helvick Harbour is owned by Waterford County Council who are responsible for its maintenance and repair.

"The Department of the Marine did provide grant-aid to Waterford County Council in respect of emergency structural renewals undertaken at this harbour in 1992.

Under the National Development Plan, a sum of £12 million is being made available for the development and improvement of facilities at fishery harbours. In order to optimise the benefits of harbour investment projects, the Department of the Marine is formulating a Fishery Harbours Development Plan for the period of 1994 through 1999. All coastal local authorities were invited to submit development proposals to the Department for consideration and possible inclusion in the Fishery Harbours Development Plan.

"In view of the fact that the total cost of the various development proposals submitted to the Department far exceeds the monies available, only those projects considered most strategically or economically beneficial will be included in the finalised plan.

"The Department of the Marine is examining all proposals submitted, including proposals for the development of Helvick Harbour, in order to assess their suitability for inclusion in the plan. Until this examination is completed and agreement is reached

with the Commission of the European Communities on an Operational Programme to enable structural funding to be drawn down to sub-vent the Plans implementation, I am not in a position to say what works, if any, may be undertaken at Helvick Harbour."

## February Meeting Of Co. Waterford V.E.C.

#### FROM TEMPORARY TO PERMANENT

On the agenda for last Monday's meeting of the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee, was the conversion of six temporary wholtime teaching posts to permanent wholtime.

Following the proposal by Cllr. Con Casey and seconded by Mr. Paudie Geary, the committee unanimously decided to apply to the Department of Education to change the posts. C.E.O. Mr. Kieran Heffernan made the recommendation which chairman Cllr. Billy Kyne described as a "welcome development if it can be achieved".

#### ANNUAL I.V.E.A. CONFERENCE

Three Co. Waterford V.E.C. delegates for the annual conference of the I.V.E.A. were chosen at last Monday's meeting. The Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne and councillors Paddy Kenneally and Nora Flynn were unanimously nominated to represent the Co. Waterford

Vocational Education Committee at the conference in Sligo from May 16th to 18th.

It was also agreed to nominate the committee's outgoing member on the Executive committee of the I.V.E.A., Cllr. Con Casey.

#### NEW ALARM SYSTEMS FOR CO. WATERFORD SCHOOLS

A decision was taken by members of the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee last Monday to invest more than £6,000 in new security systems in their schools in Dungarvan and Kilmacthomas.

Mr. Kieran Heffernan, chief executive officer, told the members present that the cost of an ultra modern alarm system will cost £2,600 to install in Dungarvan and a further £250 to include the offices. The cost in Kilmacthomas was disclosed as £3,250.

The proposal by Mr. Jimmy Byrne was accepted unanimously by committee members.

## Trees Are "Public Liability"

The ongoing problem of old, overgrown trees at Murphy Place, Abbeyside, was again addressed by Cllr. Mary Dixon at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban District Council last Monday.

Cllr. Dixon further expressed her fears over the safety of footpaths around the tree roots and over pieces of iron railing embedded in the trunks of some of these trees.

Acting County Manager, Brian J. McNally agreed that the trees in Murphy Place were indeed a "public liability" as, he said, they were "causing disruption on the streets". The solution to this problem, Mr. McNally felt, would be to take the trees down and replant them elsewhere.

Cllr. Dixon stated that she had found only 5 or 6 objections to this solution

# Rockery will Keep

## You Warm



Gardeners who want to keep busy and warm outdoors in the February chill should consider building a rockery.

At the cost of perhaps a small piece of garden, this project offers a great feeling of achievement and a pleasing effect on the eye.

A rockery can also employ a steeply sloping location, possibly useless for lawns or borders, but ideal for an artistic arrangement of rocks and alpines or cascading aubretia.

You need a sloping and well-drained site anyway, preferably one facing as close to south as possible while still sheltered from prevailing winds.

The open mountainside habitats of most rockery plants also dictate a preference for sunshine rather than shade. Having selected your site, these are the next steps:

Use pegs and lines to mark out your site.

Dig out to a depth of about six inches.

Re-fill with this soil mixture: one part grit and gravel to help drainage, and three parts rich weed-free soil with well-rotted garden compost.

Poorly-drained sections must be dug to a greater depth and the base lined with hard core before refilling with soil, this helps surplus water soak away.

Don't be tempted to overstock with rocks: ground hugging alpines look great clinging to the crevices, but you want some more open sections for conifers and flowering plants, to vary and add height to the rockery.

This is especially important with a larger rockery where rocks can dominate and depress the eye.

The rock layout and choice of individual rocks for certain spots becomes the hard part. Check what neighbours and public gardens have done and try to be bold — remember that most of the plants are natives of mountain crags and scree and look better in a rough setting.

Firm rocks into position. If the site is quite steep, angle them backwards for greater stability, i.e. so that water runs off into the soil rather than the outer lip of the rock. Disturb the soil and rocks as little as possible when planting and top any exposed soil with an inch of gravel or grit for an authentic mountainside look and as a weed-choking mulch.

Shredded bark is an alternative but some kind of mulch is vital and must be replaced carefully after any working or planting, so that weeds are denied a hold.

Moss, however, is one intruder to welcome as it gives the rockery an established look — encourage it by 'painting' rocks with fertiliser or milk.

After the hard work, your rockery should then need very little care and maintenance, apart from watering with a fine spray during summer. — Arthur Hines.

# County Awards For Lismore School Children

Delighted school children from the Presentation Primary, Lismore, won county acclaim recently when they achieved county awards for their safety projects in the annual Church and General Childrens Safety Awards.

Open to third, fourth, fifth and sixth classes, the awards are presented to individual children entering the 'Poster' or Safety Quiz' competitions or to groups who enter the 'Project' competition.

Guided by their teacher Deirdre O'Shea, the first four pupils entered under the 'fire' category while the other group specialised in 'sport'.

Explaining the basis objective behind the childrens safety awards, Mr. Aidan Wims of Church and General, said that the competition was designed to encourage children to examine danger aspects in their homes, their community or their schools and to make recommendations on what steps could be taken to ensure a safer community for themselves, their families and their friends.

County Safety Warden, Gillian Hayes, presented each of the eight Lismore school children with a Church and General personalised safety certificate, a baseball cap and a knightlite.

Now in their tenth year, the Childrens Safety Awards are one of the most popular and successful schools competition in the country. This year in excess of 14,000 primary school children participated in the competition.

# A Spectacular Special Sweet



Fruit cocktail brûlée is simple to make, but provides a spectacular sweet for a special occasion.

## FRUIT COCKTAIL CRUNCH

**Ingredients:**  
One 14oz (400g) can fruit cocktail  
1/2pt (275ml) double cream  
6oz (175g) granulated sugar  
1/2pt (275ml) water

**Method**  
Stir sugar in water over a gentle heat until completely dissolved. Then



bring it to the boil, and boil steadily until it begins to turn colour — probable about 10 minutes.

Meanwhile, arrange the fruit in a shallow, heat-proof dish, whip the dou-

ble cream until it forms peaks, and spread over the fruit.

While doing this, watch the boiling sugar carefully as it can turn black very quickly! When it is a deep,

golden brown, pour it all over the cream.

Serve within an hour or two as the caramel begins to melt into the cream.

## Lismore Town Commissioners

Mrs. M. Ryan presided at the February meeting of the above and also present were Mrs. M. Morrissey, Miss M. O'Connell, Mr. J. Roche, Mr. B. Leddy, Mr. P. Dowd, Mr. Eric Flynn (Town Clerk), Mr. B. McNally (Acting County Manager).

The following matters were raised:

The first item before the meeting was a circular letter of 27th January, 1994 from the Minister of the Environment in relation to voting at the forthcoming Urban Elections and the updating of the boundaries of the Town.

The clerk having previously circulated copies of the Minister's letter, outlined the implications of same for the Commissioners. He went to state that the Manager was required to

prepare draft proposals for the alternation of the boundary of Lismore by March 31, 1994. The criteria to be employed included the omission of 1) areas of largely open land adjoining the town and 2) extended lines of ribbon development and dispersed dwellings or other development. The Clerk stated that following consultation with the Manager, the following extension of the town boundary was proposed:

Part of the Town lands of:—

Townparks — existing boundary to old Railway Line.

Townparks East — existing boundary to include Station buildings, Townparks (16 houses), St. Carthage's Hospital and houses on extension of

Chapel Street.

Ballysaggart Beg (West) — existing boundary to approx. line of old Railway.

Ballysaggart Beg (East) — East side of Parks Road (Council Estate) to line of old railway.

Ballymoodranagh - Triangle bounded by Back Road to Cappoquin/Deerpark Road to line of old Railway.

The Clerk stated that the proposed extension would add a further 314 votes to the Urban area.

Following further discussion, proposed by Mrs. M. Morrissey, seconded by Mr. B. Leddy and resolved that the extension to the town boundary as proposed be adopted.

### CORK COMMUNICATIONS

Mrs. M. Morrissey stated that there were still problems being experienced by people in the town. In particular, the promise of crediting consumers with £25 installation fee for a second box had not been implemented. In addition the promise of crediting customers for the problems in the service around Christmas had not been done. Proposed by Mrs. M. Morrissey seconded by Mrs. M. Ryan and agreed that Cork Communications be made aware of the concerns locally and that the Minister for Communications be asked to investigate the running of Cork Communications.

### MAYFIELD ROAD

Following representations from Mrs. M. Ryan, the Clerk undertook to look at the drainage problems on the link road between the Hospital road and the Mayfield road.

### DANGEROUS TREES

Mrs. Ryan highlighted the need in the event of a tree

falling across a road that the Council supply an emergency number in order to have the road cleared. The Clerk in reply stated that initially the onus rested with the landowner on whose land the tree fell to clear same. He went on to state that presently the County Council were undertaking a survey of roads in the area with the intention of identifying possible dangers to the public.

### LIBRARY

Mr. B. Leddy complained that no national newspaper was now available at the local library with a consequent drop in attendance at the local branch. The County Manager explained that as part of the cutbacks in the Library budget, an estimate of £1,600 at County level was deleted from the budget for this purpose. On a proposal by Mr. B. Leddy, it was agreed to write to the County Librarian and request that at least one national newspaper be made available.

### DELINEATORS

Mrs. J. Bolger felt that there was a need for a suitable wall delineator on the low wall at the canal on the approach to the town. The Clerk undertook to have this matter investigated.

### SELLAFIELD

Miss M. O'Connell again expressed her concerns at the increased use and level of activity at Sellafield. The following resolution was adopted on the proposal of Miss M. O'Connell seconded by Mr. B. Leddy "That Lismore Town Commissioners strongly object to any further development of nuclear reprocessing at Sellafield, together with stricter monitoring on the operation and control of the existing facilities." It was agreed to refer this resolution to the British Ambassador.

# RECENT DEATHS

In more recent times he extended his natural caring and attentive nature to encompass his sons-in-law, daughter-in-law and the apple of his eye, his grandchildren. They have lost a husband, father, relative of first rate ability whose growing reputation and exemplary character have gone before him. We are all the poorer for his passing.

A truly Christian man, he personified all that was good in life. Denis pos-

essed a quality of life all of its own, a shining light in our community. 'Ní fheicimid a leighéid arís.'

Denis was a great sportsman who loved his hurling and football. He enjoyed nothing better than to don the blue and gold of Abbeyside. He was involved in many epic battles, endeavouring to bring glory to Dún Na Mainistreach. On the field of play he always was a true sportsman. In later years, thanks to television, he followed all sports. He loved the outdoor life and gardening was a great favourite of his.

Any responsibilities cast upon his shoulders he carried out with vision and understanding. Denis was a religious man, a person who had his priorities in perspective, always uppermost in his mind was his allegiance to God and Church. We know that Denis has returned to that homeland where there is no sadness but lasting joy.

We offer our heartfelt sympathy to wife Dolly, sons, daughters, relatives and very many friends on their loss. We pray that the Lord will help and comfort them in these times. To have known Denis Flynn is much to be grateful for. May Denis have eternal rest with the Almighty.

On Wednesday evening, family and friends gathered at the hospital mortuary where Sr. Maura recited Rosary and prayers. On Thursday at 7.30 p.m. following prayers offered by Very Rev. Fr. G. Power, P.P., his remains were brought to St. Mary's Parish Church. Despite the atrocious weather conditions hundreds and hundreds came to pay their respects to a much-loved member of the community. Guards of honour were provided by his beloved Abbeyside/Ballinacourty GAA, 11th Waterford Scout Troop and Ard Scoil na nDeise. The funeral cortege paused prayerfully at Cathal Brugha Place where Denis, Dolly and family had resided for thirteen years and minutes later at Caseyville in close proximity to St. Patrick's Crescent. On arrival at the church Rev. Fr. McNamara, C.C., blessed the coffin which was draped with the Abbeyside GAA flag, a tribute fully deserved. Also in attendance was Very Rev. Fr. Power, P.P., Rev. Fr. J. Kiely, C.C., Rev. Fr. C. Kelly, C.C., Rev. Fr. M. Enright, C.C., Very Rev. Fr. R. Moylan, O.S.A., Rev. Fr. T. Walsh, O.S.A., Very Rev. Fr. R. Doherty, P.P., Rev. Fr. Roy Drummey (friend) and Rev. P. Cooney, O.S.A.

Denis's funeral Mass took place on Friday morning in St. Mary's Parish Church. Fr. Roy Drummey (Denis's great friend) was chief celebrant, while Fr. Moylan, Rev. P. Ahearne, C.C., Fr.

Schoolchildren from St. Joseph's NS and Ard Scoil na nDeise also paid their respects. Brother-in-law Tommy Street sang hymns and psalms and was accompanied by organist Claire Maher. Tommy in his few words left us in no doubt to Denis's standing among the family and beyond. He spoke from the heart for us all. Liturgy of the Word was shared by Donnchadh and Martin (sons), while Bernie Street, Ann Moore, Eamonn Veale, Martin Veale, Martin Sheehan and Colm Flynn read Prayers of the Faithful. Offertory Gifts were brought to the altar by Catherine (daughter), Christine (daughter-in-law), Caroline (niece) and Anthony and Emily (grandchildren).

His three sons and sons-in-law were pall bearers as Denis was brought to his final resting place. Fr. Drummey said the graveside prayers, after which Denis was laid to rest. The huge numbers present for the funeral obsequies spoke volumes for Denis's popularity. Very many beautiful floral tributes from wife, family, relatives, friends and organisations were placed on his resting place.

## Mr. Michael J. O'Connor

Michael O'Connor, 10, Sexton Street, Abbeyside, passed away peacefully on Sunday, February 13 at his place of residence surrounded by his loving wife and family. Though it was known that he was very ill, the news of his demise was received with a profound sense of sadness and loss by all who knew him.

Michael, the eldest of a family of four, received his education at the CBS, Dungarvan Primary and Secondary Schools. During his school days he captained the CBS College hurling team in which he contributed im-

mensely to the school's many victories on the playing pitch against the various other colleges. For his prowess he was selected on the Munster Colleges hurling team. His outstanding display at centre field, with his well-known and famous solo runs, went a long way in defeating Leinster by seven points (7-4 to 3-9) in the final at Croke Park on Sunday, March 24, 1946, giving Munster its sixteenth title. A note-worthy factor of this game was the introduction of the red coloured sliotar to try and solve the problem of visibility of the sliotar in big games (rather than absence of visibility). Michael was always proud to say he had scored the first point from way out field for Munster with the red sliotar.

He played minor, junior and senior hurling for the "Deise." Hurling apart, Michael also had a lifelong interest and involvement in greyhounds and bred, reared and raced several top class dogs. The Powerstown Coursing Festival at Clonmel and the English Greyhound Derby final were his annual Meccas.

In addition to his love of and interest in hurling and dogs, Michael was also a keen horse racing fan and took in many visits to Cheltenham National Hunt Festival. Above all, however, he was a sportsman supreme and was always as gracious in victory as he was in defeat.

Having completed his secondary education at the CBS, he was appointed on the staff of the Waterford County Council. He had a distinguished public service career in the Engineers Department. His lengthy and meritorious service spanning 41 years in this capacity were reflected in the large attendance at his removal by his colleagues. He retired from this post in June, 1991. He was also involved in several other committees too numerous to mention.

On Monday evening, following Prayers of Requiem at the Kiely Funeral Home, Michael was brought to St. Augustine's Parish Church, Abbeyside, where the remains were received by Very Rev. R. Doherty, P.P., assisted by Rev. P. Ahearne, C.C., Rev. W. Meehan, C.C., Rev. Fr. N. McCarthy and Rev. Fr. P. Cooney, O.S.A.

## Dungarvan Soroptimists Host Carers' Weekend Break

Details of an upcoming carers' weekend break, to be hosted by Soroptimist International, Dungarvan and District, were announced last Thursday at a press conference in Lawlor's Hotel.

This important event, which is to take place from 11th to 13th March, has been welcomed by the local soroptimist club as due acknowledgement of their dedicated, caring and hard working approach to improving the life of so many carers in our society.

### SUPPORTING THE COMMUNITY

Established in 1980, Soroptimist International, Dungarvan and District, has gone from strength to strength thanks to the organisational expertise of its 27 members and the support of the local community.

Numerous fundraising events such as art and craft exhibitions, table quizzes, public speaking debates, car boot sales etc. in aid of local charities, developing local art and helping towards school and exam fees have all been attributed to the most worthwhile work of these ingenious ladies.

### THE PLIGHT OF CARERS

Carers are a dedicated group of people who care full

time for the elderly, the mentally and physically disabled, the infirm and the terminally ill within their own homes. This involves a 24 hour day and a 7 day week without respite or very often financial help or support. Nationally there are in excess of 100,000 such carers with the majority being women.

Dungarvan soroptimist club has pinpointed 3 main issues dealing with the plight of carers. The first major point is that there is a serious need for a structured support system dealing with every aspect of caring such as respite care, home help etc. . Secondly there is a lack of communication with the carer from the family and from statutory bodies leading to a sense of isolation and frustration on the part of the carer. Thirdly a sense of guilt is often overwhelming for carers who feel that they have no rights of their own.

## UNITED FARMERS ASSOCIATION GO WEST

A new U.F.A. branch was formed in Achill Island on Sunday, February 13 last. At a meeting in the Achill Sound Hotel, chaired by Jackie Biggins, Mayo UFA Chairman, it was unanimously agreed to form an Achill branch of UFA. The meeting was addressed by Paddy Phelan, Toureigh, Ballymacarbry, National President, Barney Gallagher, Donegal Co. Secretary and Daniel O'Donnell, Donegal Field Officer.

A four day UFA picket outside Dail Eireann from Tuesday, Feb. 15 to Friday, Feb. 18 has got a good response from politicians of all parties. The organisation is demanding a raise in the R.S.I. exemption threshold for low income farmers, a review of the T.B. Scheme, fairer allocation of quota and rights of consultation with government.

On Friday evening last, John Cannon of Donegal, a fluent Gaelic speaker, was interviewed for the Irish news programme, Nuacht. In the native tongue, he gave the reasons for the picket and spoke eloquently about the decimation of our rural population unless policies are reversed.

## Concern Over Unqualified Accountants

The Clonmel based President of the Institute of Certified Public Accountants, Mr. Tom O'Gorman, formerly of Small Quarter, Ballymacarbry, has said that the accountancy profession is deeply concerned by the increasing number of complaints being received regarding unqualified accountants offering services within the market place.

Mr. O'Gorman told the C.P.A.'s annual ball held in Dublin recently that the use of the term "accountant" was not regulated in any way whatsoever. He called for it to be restricted to those who are professionally qualified. The consumer was only protected when they dealt with a professional accountant who was subject to the control of a recognised body. There is no protection for the unsuspecting individual who trusts their affairs to an unqualified accountant he said. He called for a register of qualified accountants to be established and made available to the public. The public must be protected in this regard and I would hope that the professional bodies through their association in C.C.A.B.-I. would create an awareness of the problem and seek a solution with government.

Mr. O'Gorman of the Clonmel firm of O'Gorman Brannigan and Purtill is coming to the end of a two year term as President of the C.P.A. If the professional bodies made an issue of the area, they ran the risk of being labelled as self-interested parties jealously

guarding work for themselves. But Mr. O'Gorman added the problem was so serious that it merited them taking the risk in the interests of the public. He was not suggesting that anybody should be denied an opportunity to earn a living, he said. However, the product on offer to the public must be labelled correctly.

range, as well as the Premier, Petits Filous and Kilmeaden brands. It also introduces the challenge of marketing the new "Waterford" range of fresh dairy products in the UK.

Within the Consumer Products Division, Aidan Dempsey, previously General Manager of the Group's £70 million Trading Division, switches to new responsibility as Managing Director of Premier Dairies.

The brief is also extended to include all of the Group's liquid milk brands.

Waterford also announces consolidation of its dairy products enterprises, with Maurice Nelan as Managing Director of the enlarged Division.

Mr. Nelan has most recently been Assistant Chief Executive (Dairying). His role is extended to include the Group's comparatively new enterprises at Virginia, Co. Cavan and Magheralin, Co. Armagh.

Within this Division the Kilmeaden Cheese Plant is

among the biggest in Western Europe, with throughput of 23,000 tonnes per annum. Virginia is the exclusive supplier of cream base for Baileys and Magheralin is Northern Ireland's leading cheese plant, specialising in mozzarella.

Finbarr McLoughlin, currently responsible for Virginia and Magheralin, will continue in that role, as Managing Director of Waterford Foods Ingredients. He will also be responsible for co-ordinating business development throughout the division.

## County Waterford ICMSA News

Tom Hickey, one of the National Council representatives for Co. Waterford ICMSA, outlines below some of the proposals under the new National Programme.

It is envisaged that, subject to EU approval, funding for milk, suckler cows and ewe quota restructuring, targeted at those with the capacity to develop from low production thresholds will be introduced. In this, priority categories of farmers, including new entrants, would receive special consideration.

Tom Hickey said this is something ICMSA have campaigned for and it is nice that it is now part of the new Programme because if some type of help is not given to those farmers with little or no quota, they will be pushed out of business. We would then have a similar situation as we have today with the pig industry, i.e. a few large producers controlling it. Also, the present temporary milk quota leasing scheme is very important as this gives small/medium suppliers a chance to lease extra quota.

On the question of premium payments, Mr. Hickey said that farmers are waiting months before they receive their premia cheques. As part of the new programme there will also be improvement here.

The specific commitments under this programme are as follows:

**CAP REFORM**  
**PREMIUM PAYMENTS**  
★ The efficient and timely payment of CAP premia

and headage to farmers is a major priority for the government and the organisations. The Government have already taken a number of steps to achieve this, particularly through investing in additional staffing and computerisation, a process which is being intensified as a result of the allocation of almost £5 million in the 1994 Estimates and Budget. As a consequence, the Government will ensure that there is major improvement in the delivery of all CAP compensatory payments in 1994 relative to 1993. This improvement will be the first step in the Government's commitment to achieving in 1995 payment of all eligible premium claims within three months of application where this is permissible under EU rules.

★ Where necessary and at the earliest possible date, the government undertake to seek the negotiation of changes in these EU rules to facilitate the earlier payments of the full compensatory premia and to seek at the most appropriate time adjustments in the headage limits of the beef premium system most suitable to Irish conditions. The government commits itself to maintain and improve the existing procedures for dealing with complaints arising from decisions in individual cases, and where these channels are exhausted to put in place arrangements under which farmers will have the right of recourse to a formal appeals procedure.

## Milk Price War: Not The Co-Operative Spirit

ICMSA President, Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, has reminded dairy Co-ops that they are part of a co-operative movement and that they should not participate in a milk price cutting war which jeopardises the livelihoods of their members and the public at large.

Mr. O'Dwyer said that it is vitally important that the dairy Co-ops maintain the milk price to primary producers and that they maintain the current doorstep supply of milk to the nation. "Doorstep milk deliveries provide a tremendous service to consumers supplying daily

deliveries of fresh, quality milk which is essential to nutritional well being. At the end of the day a price war threatens door-to-door deliveries, threatens rural and other small shops, it will probably lead to the lay off of agents and milk roundsmen, and it threatens the livelihood of the dairy farmer.

"Co-op Board members must remember that practices which threaten the livelihoods of milk suppliers, which threaten rural shops and jobs have no place in the co-operative movement," said Mr. O'Dwyer.

## Minister Must Now Accept Photocopied Maps — I.F.A.

Waterford IFA Grain Committee Chairman, Alex Heskin has called on the Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh, TD, to immediately accept photocopied maps as the compulsory Area Aid maps fiasco becomes more evident. He criticised the maps distribution system, saying "farmers across the county are getting maps which they did not order and the whole map re-ordering process for distribution errors is causing an intolerable delay in getting the rest of maps out to the remaining farmers."

According to Mr. Heskin "conacre farmers," through no fault of their own, who ordered maps as early as possible after Christmas and who were assured by the Minister that the Ordinance Survey would do

their best to deliver on time are now most likely to get their maps by the March 31st area aid application deadline.

Mr. Heskin added "this level of service is totally unacceptable to farmers who are now eager to fill out their 1994 Area Aid application forms. The Minister has totally ignored the traditional practice of farmers renting conacre in the new year period."

Mr. Heskin continued "conacre farmers are still looking for maps which they just cannot get delivered on time from the Ordinance Survey Office and the only way they cannot get the maps to meet the application deadline is by the Department agreeing to accept photocopied maps."

## Education Grants Assets Test Totally Unacceptable — I.F.A.

Waterford IFA Farm Business Committee Chairman, Gerald Murphy has described as "an ideologically driven campaign" suggestions in a leaked report of an assets test for determining eligibility for third level education grants. Mr. Murphy warned that such a test could not be objective and would only be seen as a further attack on property owners which will clearly discriminate against farm families who are dependent on land to earn their livelihoods.

He said: "The introduction of an assets test, in whatever form, would discriminate against the children of farm families and result in the erosion of the vital asset base farm families depend on to generate their livelihoods. The Minister must remember that assets are not income but only the means to achieving one."

"It is important that a means tested system benefit

all low income groups. It now appears, however, that there is an attempt to skew the means-tested system so that farmers don't benefit even though, on the basis of their actual income, they would. Eligibility for third level education grants must be based on taxable income as acceptable to the Revenue Commissioners."

Mr. Murphy attacked the simplistic view that children of farm families are somehow represented disproportionately among grant-aided college places. He said: "Under the current schemes, children from farming backgrounds are already unfairly discriminated against and no allowance is given for on-farm capital investment in determining whether a child receives a grant or not. The current schemes do not recognise the farmers must invest to stay in business and that this investment is not discretionary.

# Tallow And Shamrocks Pool Resources For Minor And Under-21

Under Age Scene — This year Tallow and Shamrocks pool their resources for the minor and Under 21 championships. This is a good decision one of commonsense, realism and neighbourliness. The flight from the land, accelerated by E.U. policies of recent years, has denuded the countryside of its most cherished asset: manpower. Most rural clubs have seen the player numbers dwindle gradually. The dearth of

local unemployment has forced "many young men to twenty" to take up positions far from home. Without those players now domiciled in the cities and big towns rural clubs - and clubs in small towns and villages - big and small club could not continue in existence. Shamrocks, no less than many other units of the association, are beset by this major difficulty. Despite the continuing admirable loyalty of their "displaced persons" and their dedicated promotion of the Under 12, Under 14 and Under 16's Shamrock Hurling and Football Club were always forced to field minor teams with a large quota of players (often very skilful players) of 16 and 17 years of age. Against teams with a big catchment area such as Lismore, Dungarvan and Abbeyside this disadvantage was most apparent. Elimination was rapid and a great opportunity lost to develop as a team if they could survive until the closing stages of this championship. The same story pertained to the Under 21 campaign with an added difficulty when this championship dragged on into the wet gloomy sticky months of October and November making it a test of stamina rather than skill.

That very scenario is one with which we in Tallow are very familiar. We played a minor football final, for God sake, on Christmas Eve! Our Under 14 team of 1993, for instance had 7 who were under 14, 4 Under 13 and 4 who were Under 12's. Only for the meticulous preparation and great hearted commitment of the lads that team would have suffered the fate of many similar teams with a very young "tail", unmerciful slaughter. In the event that didn't happen, last year at least. A glance at Tallow Under 12 and Under 16 results illustrates a dire situation. Will it get worse? What can be done to arrest this headlong drop in standards? Teams subjected to annual humiliation soon wilt and die and other sporting options beckon.



In 1993 Tallow and Shamrocks came together, shared their resources and offered the hurlers of Dungarvan and Abbeyside a very serious challenge. The specialists of this grade, Lismore, were fully extended before claiming victory. That championship was meaningful and enjoyable. Both hurling and football provided many games and plenty of excitement with interest sustained throughout the summer into early autumn. Thus hope was rekindled for the future of the games in this area. There was a most agreeable amalgamation of players and selectors. Men of the calibre of James Tobin, Liam Ahearne and Billy O'Keefe are easy to work with; their knowledge of the games, enthusiasm and commitment to placing the best team on the field made for a happy and rewarding relationship. A similar set up cannot but operate well this year. I don't just mean the winning of championships - championships take a lot of winning - but we know that we now can field respectable hurling and football teams with a realistic chance against all-comers. 
**KILROSSANTY G.A.A. NOTES**

# Pastoral Letter of Bishop Lee on Vocations

— Lent 1994

When Jesus said "The harvest is great but the labourers are few," his next word was "Pray." "Pray that the Lord will send labourers into his harvest" (Lk. 10.27). To pray for vocations is something which all of you can do. In this pastoral I want to put some thoughts before you about vocations to the diocesan priesthood. What I say applies in many respects to the vocation to the religious life, male and female, in our own diocese and on the missions.  
However, today I want to focus particularly on the need for priests in the diocese of Waterford and Lismore. I ask you to pray for such vocations to the priesthood and you can do this in your homes, in your schools and in your churches.

**A VOCATION IS GOD'S GIFT**  
Since the vocation to the priesthood is a gift from God given to a certain individual, he must wait for the call, he cannot force it. He must wait for God in his own time to make the call known to him. God makes his call known in many ways. Very often, the ways are so ordinary that they may escape a young man's attention.

Whenever God calls any of us in life, it is never very spectacular and it is the same for priesthood. A man gets a feeling about the priesthood, he gets a desire to give the possibility more thought. This may make him uncomfortable. "This cannot be," he says to himself. "It could not possibly be, with my life, with my past. No, forget it." And he often does. One must remember that God calls, not necessarily because of virtue or intelligence or wealth or family status. God calls in his own way and for his own reasons. Only he knows why one is called and others are not called. The twelve apostles were a good cross-section of society — very ordinary men, working men, some of them married, who knew great personal strengths and weaknesses. He could have called others — instead he chose and called the twelve.

**INFLUENCE OF HOME AND PARENTS**  
This feeling or urge about priesthood, as yet unclear and uncertain in a young man, can be strengthened and fostered by teachers, by priests and especially by parents. I do not mean in a pushy, persuasive way but, in a quiet, prayerful and prudent way.

God communicates with us through others and this is true also of the call to priesthood. God's call comes to young people, in a particular way through their parents.  
As a parent, if you put the emphasis on status, on material possessions, on academic distinctions, your children will do the same. If your values are tinged with secularism, if you regard religious vocation as a waste of life, will your children be any different? If you are less than encouraging, if you fear unduly for their future happiness, forgetting that every life is a risk, won't your children be fearful too?  
If the most important values in your life are Gospel values: love, justice, etc., then these will be your children's values too. If prayer is a daily experience in your home, special prayers for vocations won't be needed at all. If you live your vocation as parents to the full, vocations to the priesthood will come of their own

accord. The best guarantee of generosity from the young is fidelity among the old.

**"MANY ARE CALLED"**  
There is an immense fund of good will and generosity in the young men of this diocese. I refer not just to those who do their Leaving Certificate every year, some of whom express an active interest in the priesthood, but there are also many others, men who are in third level education, those who have been away from school for some years, men who are working and have experience of life in the world, men who are considering all future options.  
Christ needs people with all sorts of gifts and talents in the priesthood to be his fingertips in the modern world. He needs you, as other Christs, to make present the power of his compassion and love. He needs you to proclaim his message and to celebrate his sacraments. He calls you now, just as he called the apostles. He asks you to be the Peters and Pauls of this century. He is counting on you — counting on your generosity. Please do not let him down.

The work of the priest is fulfilling and satisfying. Of course this is not to say that it is an easy life or a trouble-free one. Quite the contrary. A young man considering priesthood must count the cost of going through life unmarried, of being sent to a lonely or difficult station. As a priest he must be prepared to give up some, though not all, of his independence. He must make sacrifices. And yet, priesthood is a most worthwhile life.

I am confident that these words will strike a chord in the hearts of many young men who hear them today. I remind you of Christ's invitation: "Come, follow me." Only you can respond. Only you can weigh up and consider for yourself whether you have this desire for priesthood. If you have, I invite you today to do something about it. First of all, ask the Holy Spirit to guide you. Then get in contact with either your local priest or with the diocesan Vocations Director, Fr. Pat Fitzgerald, at St. John's College, Waterford. I myself will be only too happy to hear from you and to give you whatever advice and help I can.

At present we have seven seminarians studying for the diocese of Waterford and Lismore in St. John's College. We are grateful to the Lord for the generosity of these seven, but more are needed. Please God, these students will persevere to ordination and become part of a noble heritage of generous men and women, priests and religious, who have worked in the parishes of this diocese over the centuries, witnessing to the Gospel by their lives of duty, prayer and generosity. Pray today, my dear friends, for all priests, religious and seminarians. Pray also for those in this parish, in this congregation, who may at this time be making a decision to study for the priesthood.  
May Mary, the mother of priests, protect all priests and seminarians in the Diocese of Waterford and Lismore. May she be solace to all of you who, by your prayers and support, make it possible to send labourers into the vineyard of the Lord.





games to date this season and won six, losing to Bolton on penalties in the F.A.I. Youth Cup.



# The Early Years Of Waterford Cross Country

Little did any of us know it at the time, but when Jimmy Mulligan (Waterford A.C.) won the county senior cross country championship at Tramore recently he had just completed the 52nd running of this event which was first staged in the 1942-1943 season.

The Waterford Athletics Board, having recently researched the history of the race, have discovered that the championship was postponed in the 1947-48 season due to the famous snowfalls of that time, and seemingly it was never run afterwards.

### DUNHILL DOMINANCE

The early years of Waterford Cross Country were dominated by Dunhill A.C. whose runners won the title thirteen times. Their last winner was Dan Cowman who won the championship as a seventeen year old in the 1966-67 season. Unfortunately the Dunhill club is no longer in existence. It is a pity that this traditional stronghold has died as the East Waterford club were a very popular and important unit in Waterford athletics.

### LISMORE WINNERS

Up to recently the late Paddy Whelan (Lismore A.C.) held the distinction of the longest year span of victories, winning the title in the 1960-61 season and he regained the championship on his home ground in the 1969-70 season. In winning his latter title, Paddy deprived his club mate John Barry of capturing three titles in a row as John has won the championship the previous two years in facile fashion.

The Lismore club produced many fine runners in those years including the Whelan's, the Barry's, the Ormonde's and the Keane's under the leadership of the late Joe Whelan who was a very popular character on the athletic scene at that time.

### SUCCESSIVE TITLES

For a period of twenty seven years Fintan Walsh (Waterford S.C.) held the record for the greatest number of successive victories, winning four titles in the years from 1962 to 1965, James Sullivan equalled this achievement last year when winning his fourth title in a row in Tramore. James didn't defend his title this year as he is currently working in Belgium.

### OFF THE RECORDS

As in many sports just because an athlete doesn't win a county title it need not necessarily mean that he is any less an athlete than those that have. Indeed provincial, national and even a world champion! have not won the Waterford senior cross country championship.

Prominent names over the years such as Jimmy Costin and John Harty (St. Nicholas A.C.), Davy Browne (Tramore A.C.), Pat Byrne, Tom Jordan and Tom Aspel (Waterford A.C.) among many others would be worthy county winners. Munster novice and intermediate cross country champion Roger Barron (Kinsalebeg A.C.) was runner up on at least three occasions with national intermediate and many times senior international Ray Treacy finishing in second place twice.

### JOHN TREACY

John Treacy has never won a Waterford senior cross country championship. God knows up to this year he could have won twenty one times in a row but he has been operating on a much higher level in America and around the world since 1974. It would be nice to see John Treacy competing in the Waterford championship at some stage and now that he is returning to Ireland for good this year, hopefully he will include this race in his future running.

### THE DOWNEY CUP

This cup which was presented to the winning senior cross country championship team for many years, was mislaid along the line somewhere in the mid 1970's. If anybody knows of its whereabouts it would be great to see it presented once again next season.

The uproar began during a discussion on the unpaid ticket situation which had been discussed at great length and well publicised in certain quarters after the December meeting of the Board.

The matter was not listed on the agenda, but when raised by Nicky Donovan it aroused an amount of acrimony and very heated debate. Phil Fanning took grave exception to the

chairman's decision in refusing to give a copy of the interim report of the special committee, to county secretary Seamus Grant. The chairman's explanation for his refusal to give a copy to Seamus Grant, which is the normal procedure with all correspondence and documentation received by the County Board, was considered unsatisfactory and Phil Fanning reiterated his submission that the decision

was casting some suspicions on the county secretary and former treasurer,

Garry Cunningham. Despite appeals from all sides of the house, Seamus Grant left the meeting and went home.

Following a further brief discussion, the meeting adjourned and a meeting of Coisde Gnotha was called. After a 30 minute discussion it was decided to proceed with the Board meeting and Eastern Board secretary Denis Hanrahan agreed to take notes. It was further announced that the chairman, Eamon Murphy and Denis Hanrahan would meet with the county secretary on Tuesday morning.

## Long Debate on Championship Format

(By "COMMENTATOR")

Following a long debate on championship structures at the County Board meeting last Monday night, a motion proposed by Paudie Flynn, Colligan/Emmetts was adopted for the running of the senior hurling championship. The new system will see the championship run on a league basis consisting of two groups. The matter was due to be adjudicated on at Monday night's meeting of the County Board and it will be interesting to see what decision will be arrived at.

An article on fund-raising by Declan O'Meara, Chairman of the Deise Finance Committee, spells out what the success of the county draw has meant to Waterford. Declan told how the initial figure of 14,000 tickets for the first draw, had increased to 14,500 after a couple of months.

These, of course, are not the only articles which are of interest to Waterford readers and in the many other fine contributions, there are interesting points to ponder on.

## N.L. Game Cancelled

Meetings were not the only activities which had to be called off because of bad weather over the past week, as on Sunday last when I arrived at Leamybrien venue just before 2.30 p.m. I was told that the football league match between Waterford and Kilkenny, had been called off by Limerick referee W. O'Mahoney, who, having inspected the grounds, judged it to be dangerous. The inspection was at 2.10 p.m. and by 2.30 p.m. the field was locked up and deserted.

On the previous day, Dungarvan and Ballinacourty

had played an under 21 football match at the venue and this had nothing to do with the cancellation which was due to the presence of an amount of water on the pitch, following 24 hours of rain. This was the only National League match called off on Sunday. All the other 15 matches were played as scheduled.

It is now likely that the game will go ahead on next Sunday as both counties are free. Our final match in the football league will be against Westmeath at Mullingar on March 6. Waterford have a bye in the final round.

# Wright Calls For Overcrowding Solution

bedroomed houses. Although sympathetic to the spirit of Cllr. Wright's motion, Cllr. Billy Kyne reminded the Council to keep in mind the 7 new houses for senior citizens at Youghal Road which will ultimately decrease the 15 house allocation to 8. Calling for "investigative procedure" into single bedroomed additions Cllr. Kyne added that he did not want to take houses away from the 3 bedroomed housing list. Supporting the views of Cllr. Kyne, Cllr. Paddy Power agreed that the 3 bedroomed housing list "should get top priority, rather than building extra rooms".

**FINAL SOLUTION**  
 There followed a rather intensive discussion with councillors extending different opinions on the overcrowding scenario before a final solution was unanimously adopted. Town Clerk, Bertie White, proposed to build seven 3

bedroomed houses in phase 2 of the Orchard housing construction programme, while also allowing for 6 to 7 additional rooms to be built onto already overcrowded houses. Following this, the determination of the composition of Dungarvan UDC's 1994 housing programme, the details of the proposal will now be forward to the Dept. of the Environment by the end of this month.

**IN GENERAL**  
 Commenting generally on the UDC's 15 house allocation for 1994, Cllr. Tony Wright said he welcomed the development but that the number, he felt, "done nothing to clear the housing list". "Fifteen houses", Cllr. Wright added, "is not keeping abreast with the increasing needs of our applicants". With 302 names already on the housing list this year, Cllr. Billy Kyne also expressed the sentiment that he would like to see more houses being built.

# Fresh Proposals For Urban Road Works

Dungarvan will receive a whole facelift with footpath repair schemes, road resurfacing and maintenance to name but a few. The five areas designated for footpath repairs are; Congress Villas (£7,000); T. J. Murphy Place (£1,900); Boreenatra (£12,300); Sarsfield St/St. Patricks Tce. (£2,000) and Byrneville (£500). Residents of Cathal Brugha Place (£4,800); Congress Villas (£15,510) and The Grove (£4,000) could also benefit this time from road restructuring while further cobblelock at O'Connell St. South is also proposed.

**WIDE SCOPE OF SCHEMES**  
 The road improvement projects involve 4 main programmes as outlined by Bertie White. Explaining the wide scope of these schemes to members of the Council, Mr. White felt that they should "spend money on a good job" rather than spending money on, "patching" here and there. The first programme is for macadam surfacing of the New Line from Mulcahy's to the Friary College. This project meets the EU crite-

ria for contribution to the development of education (St. Agustines) and tourism (Clonea). The second programme involves the improvement of the road at Davitts Quay from The Moorings to the Castle which would benefit tourism and industry. The improvement of the industrial service road from Kilrush traffic lights to the Urban boundary and some distance beyond, constitutes the 3rd proposal which will aid economic activity in the industrial section.

**UNANIMOUS SUPPORT**  
 Unanimous in their support for these urban road works proposals, the councillors warmly welcomed the wide scope of the schemes which, they felt, would encompass all sections of the urban area, from small streets to large estates. U.D.C. Chairman, Cllr. Tony Wright complimented the Town Clerk, stating that within the limits, Mr. White had done an "excellent job". These proposals will now be presented to the Department who, at the end of the day, will have the final say.
