## Local Traffic Warden In Unfair Dismissal Claim

A traffic warden was finally dismissed after being given seven written warnings and several verbal cautions about his conduct over a period of a decade, a senior Dungarvan Urban Council official told an Employment Appeals Tribunal last Monday.

Mr. Bertie White, Dungarvan Town Clerk, was giving evidence in an unfair dismissal claim brought against the Urban Council by traffic warden James Donovan (42), who was finally sacked after thirteen years in the post.

Mr. White said Donovan's dismissal was for using foul and abusive language in a series of incidents over a period of ten years.

The Town Clerk cited a number of the alleged inci-

dents which were reported to the Council involving the traffic warden.

He told the Tribunal that

on one occasion Donovan had told a protesting motorist that if he didn't shut up he would hit him.

"In another incident Donovan refused to accept as valid a doctor on call with a windscreen display card that had been issued to

a local G.P.," Mr. White said. "The parking ticket issued by Donovan to the doctor had to be subsequently cancelled," said Mr. White.

The Town Clerk also alleged that the warden re-

## Inquest Recalls Double Drowning Tragedy

A double drowning tragedy off Helvick Head last October which claimed the lives of 16 year old first cousins and lifelong best friends, was recalled last Friday at an inquest in Dungarvan before Dr. D. F. Cantillon, West Waterford Coroner, sitting without a jury.

Verdicts in accordance with the medical evidence that Patrick (Pat) Tobin and P. J. Rossiter, both of Ballinagoul, Ring, Dungarvan, died from asphyxia caused by drowning, were recorded by Dr. Cantillon.

There was generous garda praise for the trojan efforts of the many people who gave so unsparingly of themselves for weeks as the grim search for the recovery of the bodies continued along miles of the Co. Waterford coastline.

Dr. Cantillon, too, referred to a tragedy which had such an upsetting and shocking effect on the tight-knit Gaeltacht community of An Rinn.

Opening the inquest on Pat Tobin, Garda Michael Finnegan of Ring recalled the date of the double tragedy, October 8, 1993, and he told of being on the pier at Helvick Head on October 21 when the body of Pat Tobin was brought ashore.

Garda Finnegan said the identification of the body was made possible by birth marks on Pat Tobin's left

forearm and a distinctive identification scar on his knee.

Dr. Robert Tait told of carrying out the post mortem examination on the body identified to him as that of Pat Tobin at Waterford Regional Hospital on October 22.

Dr. Tait said the body was severely decomposed with the decomposition most severe around the head and neck. His conclusion was that death was due to drowning.

The inquest on P. J. Rossiter was told by his uncle Richard Tobin that following the report of both teenagers being missing he went searching the outer harbour off Helvick in his own boat around 4.30 p.m. About 6 p.m. he saw two floats with nets and grappling irons, and subsequently the upturned punt in which the teenagers had set out from Helvick earlier that day was towed back into the harbour.

He recalled his search off Helvick Head on October 21 when he saw a body

# Tallow Priest In Horrific Earthquake Disaster

The January 17th earthquake delivered a hard blow to individual valley communities of California.

In one such community, Granada Hills, resides Tallow born Fr. Michael Slattery, Pastor of St. John Baptist de la Salle on Chatsworth Street. Here, the recent quake is reported to have done untold damage to his church, convent, school and school equipment. Severe structural damage to the 100 foot bell tower has also been reported.

Speaking to the 'Los Angeles Times', Fr. Slattery said that repairing the church is not the first priority. "We'll start building the people back up — renovating them and giving them hope", Slattery said. "The buildings will come

later."

Formerly of the diocese of Lismore and Waterford, Fr. Slattery was forced to emigrate to the warmer climate of the U.S., following a serious lung operation in 1962. For the past fifteen years his two sisters, Carmel and Sally, have been most successful in their fund raising efforts to help Fr. Slattery and his community.

Appealing once more to his sisters, to help him in his efforts to rebuild the church and school, Fr. Slattery sends his prayers, blessing and gratitude for the past year's generosity of the people of Midleton, Tallow and surrounding areas in supporting him in his fund raising for

the missions.





The 14th West Waterford Drama Festival was officially opened by the Chairman of the organising committee Mr. Pat Joe Ahearne in St. Michael's Hall, Ballyduff on Thursday night last.

Addressing the capacity attendance Mr. Ahearne said he hoped that this year's Festival would be the most successful to date. He was

lavish in his praise of the festival sponsors without whom he said it would not be possible to stage such an event. Other speakers included the adjudicator for the ten day event. Mr. Thomas Mac Anna and Mr. Hugh Cellius, Festival Director. Mr. Mac Anna is associate Director of the Abbey Theatre in Dublin.

Following the opening ceremony the Ballyduff Drama Group staged Ray Cooney's "Run For Your Wife" in the Open Section. Commenting afterwards Mr. Mac Anna said that the local group had opened the festival on a high note with a very entertaining performance of an English farce. He said that Irish actors are sometimes nervous of performing English farce but this group under the direction of Bill Canning tackled it very well and worked together as a team. He said it is very difficult to rehearse farce.

**FESTIVAL DEBUT**

On Friday night the Bride View Players, Tallow under the direction of Fiona McDonnell made their festival debut with their production of John B. Keanes, "The Year Of The Hiker". Mr. Mac Anna said this was a good choice of play for a young group who gave a very good performance. He said that Pat Sheehan as Hiker Lacey was a fine actor who held the character throughout and was central for the play. The group had good team work and a very

good set but furniture positioning could be better.

On Saturday night there was another contrast in plays this time from the Tuam Theatre Guild - first time visitors to Ballyduff - who staged "One Last White Horse" by Dermot Bolger. The Tuam group are the first amateur group in Ireland to stage this play. The adjudicator complimented this young group on taking on such a play and he said they had a very good shot at it. There were fine performances from John Mulrooney as Eddie; Lilyan Hannon and Horse; Bernie Couaghlán as Eileen and Ml. Canvan as Faker.

**High Standard**

The high standard at the festival in the words of the adjudicator was maintained on Sunday when the Gaslight Theatre Company, Kilkenny presented Hugh Leonard's "Da". It was an excellent choice of play for this group who did a good job on set design as it is a difficult play to set and was well lit.

Donal O'Brien as Da underplayed a lot and brought a nice drollness into the part and held the character right through.

Mr Mac Anna said that Liam Conway as young Charlie gave an excellent performance while he congratulated Brendan Corcoran on his performance as Mr. Drumm which he said was a most complete study of the character. The producer Ann Hurley was a competent director who introduced imaginative ideas into this production.

On Monday night the Muskerry Players from Cork another first time group at the festival gave a lovely performance of "Same Old Moon" by Geraldine Aron.

On Tuesday night the Palace Players, Fermoy presented "One Flew Over The Cuckoos Nest" by Dale Wasserman. This play is very familiar to Ballyduff audiences as the local group staged it in 1981 and won the All-Ireland Confined Section.

**FESTIVAL CONTINUES**

The festival continues until Sunday night when the final play of the festival will be presented by the Shoestring Theatre, Charleville namely "Mass Appeal".

On tonight Thursday old favourites Kilween are back this time with John B. Keanes "Sive" while on Friday we have the return of Haulbowline with Tom Griffens "The Boys Next Door". "Dancing at Lugh-

nasa" by Brian Friel will be staged by the Temple Players, Dublin on Saturday night. Following the final performance on Sunday the results of the week will be announced.

floating in the water. From the clothing he knew it was that of P. J. Rossiter.

"I took the body from the water and brought it to Helvick pier when I handed it over to a garda," he added.

Garda Don Brennan confirmed that the body had been handed over to him on October 21 at 1.10 p.m. by Richard Tobin who identified it as that of P. J. Rossiter. He later accompanied the body to Waterford Regional Hospital where he identified it on November 1 to Dr. Joseph O'Connor.

Dr. O'Connor in evidence said he carried out a post mortem that same day on the severely decomposed body and in his opinion death was due to asphyxia caused by drowning.

Having returned both verdicts in accordance with the medical evidence, Dr. Cantillon extended sympathy to the bereaved families on what he said was "a shocking and most upsetting tragedy."


**SYMPATHY**

## Hedge your bets this month



GIVE some thought to hedging your bets during March — it's an important month if you are planning to plant a hedge.

Apart from use as an attractive and sturdy boundary marker there is also a strong case for considering something prickly, with burglaries now commonplace.

March is certainly prime time for deciduous planting and evergreens will also bear going in now if you live in the South or another mild part of the country.

The main factors in the choice of variety are soil and drainage, situation, speed of growth, cost and possibly most important, how much care and clipping is required.

Preparation of the site is crucial since the hedge needs to establish well and survive for many years.

You will also be planting intensively to create density, so prepare a bed at least two feet wide for a boundary fence — smaller will do for a dividing hedge within the garden.

Double-dig — two spade depths — to create the soil structure and drainage needed to help roots establish well. Work in plenty of well-rooted organic compost.

After digging comes the really hard part — choosing the variety. For quick results, the hybrid Leyland Cypress is probably best. However, it is shallow-rooted and needs staking for two years and a lot of clipping later on.

In contrast, Yew takes years to establish but has been a favourite since Tudor times and will bear ornamental clipping and shaping.

But if it's security you want then a number of 'prickly customers' come to mind and they needn't look unattractive:

**Common Gorse** — tough yet produces bright yellow flowers.

**Berberis** — the julianae variety can provide a dense and prickly screen up to nine feet high. It produces yellow flowers and the leaves turn an attractive red in autumn. Ottawensis is another attractive burglar-beater and the Berberis family generally is worth checking for other candidates.

**Holly** — a sign of good cheer at Christmas but distinctly unwelcoming to intruders all year round. Attractive and tough but slow growing.

**Hawthorn** — creates a cheap and impenetrable hedge yet produces scented blooms, available in a variety of colours, before these give way to colourful berries or 'haws'. Unfortunately, it does look drab once the leaves drop.

**Rose** — some varieties of the national favourite can also be used as a mean hedge with attractive blooms as a real bonus. Check the different varieties at your garden centre. On the other hand, if you have a less protective role in mind for your hedge, consider.

**Box** — a tradition favourite. Very attractive, but slow growing and expensive.

**Honeysuckle** — sweet smelling but check when buying whether the variety you are choosing can be used for hedging.

**Privet** — cheap and fast growing but needs regular clipping. Arthur Hines.

Olivia Gaynor, played by Laura O'Brien, Marion's friend, confidante and indispensable personal assistant, "is attractive, capable and well used to Marion's approach to life, but despite her best efforts the unsuspecting Conroy, played by Mike Hennessy, is drawn into Marion's "game of life." Conroy is an Irish obstetrician and cum proctologist whose attitude to his marriage is, he claims, typically Irish — he ignores it!

Amongst this merry band of travellers, comes the unsuspecting Mrs. Hand played by Mary Kelly, who is maternal and quick to sympathise and her en-

trance could not be better timed! Each of these five "players" then make up the jig-saw that is Pizzazz.

## Lamb — Oriental Style

### PAN FRIED EASTERN LAMB

#### Ingredients

Grated rind and juice 2 oranges  
2.5cm (1") piece root ginger, grated  
1 tbsp hoisin sauce  
1 tsp clear honey  
1 clove garlic, crushed  
6 lamb shoulder blade chops, trimmed  
1 tsp oil  
300ml (8oz) carrots, cut into matchsticks  
25g (1oz) butter  
salt and freshly ground black pepper  
fresh chopped parsley and orange segments for garnish

#### Method

Mix together the orange rinds and juice, ginger, hoisin sauce, honey and garlic in a shallow dish, until well blended. Add the lamb and turn to coat. Cover and leave to marinate for 2 hours.

Drain the lamb thoroughly and reserve the marinade. Heat the oil in a frying pan and cook the lamb for 5 minutes, turning occasionally, until browned.

Pour over the reserved marinade and stock and add the carrots. Bring to the boil, cover and simmer for 20 minutes, until lamb is tender.

Using a slotted spoon transfer the lamb to a hot plate and keep warm. Meanwhile bring the juices to the boil and boil rapidly until reduced by half. Remove from the heat and gradually whisk in the butter. Season to taste. Return the lamb to the pan and heat through gently. Serve immediately garnished with chopped parsley and orange segments.

Serves 4.



## "NO WIN, NO FEE"

South Tipperary/North West Waterford Dail Deputy Noel Davern has said that members of the legal profession who offered to take compensation cases on a "no win, no fee" basis were, whether they liked it or not, encouraging an unhealthy and costly compensation culture. He called on the Law Society to take action to discourage this practice. First let's get the facts straight, he said and claimed that the number of public liability claims had increased by a staggering 70% from 1982 to 1992. In 1992 the average award for such claims had more than doubled, while public liability awards in Ireland were 108% higher than in the U.K. Compo culture is costing us dear, he said. It has a direct knock-on effect in contributing to escalating insurance costs. If these costs continue to rise they will close down social, sporting and community events and activities. Already these costs are having a prohibitive effect and have led to organisers reconsidering the holding of events. There can be no doubt that there are genuine claims to compensation, but, there is also a thriving compo culture, he said, where the claims for compensation is viewed as a means of a "fast buck". Local authorities know this to their cost. By offering to take compensation cases on a "no win, no fee" basis solicitors were encouraging the compo culture at a time when we should be trying to change it, Deputy Davern claimed. It was now time for the Law Society to address this matter in a serious manner and to act accordingly.



## Daffodil Day - 25th March

If people were never given a reminder in the local press, they would still anticipate the Irish Cancer Society's Daffodil Day every time they looked in their gardens or the decorative flower beds which adorn our towns and villages.

The Daffodil, which has for generations been looked upon as a sign of hope and re-awakening gives a sense of that same hope to the many who suffer from a disease whose very name strikes fear in many a mind. Yet, through the work of good Irish people on Daffodil Day and through the intermissable generosity of the wider Irish public, there is hope for many suffering from Cancer and practical assistance for those at every stage of their illness.

Daffodil Day, one of Ireland's brightest charity events is coming up on Friday March 25th and this year the Irish Cancer Society hopes to raise £1 million.

By any standards this is an ambitious target, but on the basis of previous performances it is quite achievable.

The bulk of the money raised on Daffodil Day goes to local Health Boards and hospice groups to support the employment of specialist nurses skilled in the care of patients with advanced cancer. Waterford County and City similarly benefit and the work of the Hospice Homecare nurses could never be sufficiently acknowledged or quantified.

On a nationwide basis the Society provides £500,000 annually from the Daffodil

Day fund towards the salaries of 33 nurses operating in 24 counties throughout Ireland. These nurses may be contacted through your G.P. or the Regional Hospital, Ardkeen.

# Tragic End To Shooting Outing

An accidental discharge from a double barrel shotgun brought an afternoon's shooting outing to a tragic end, an inquest heard in Dungarvan last Friday.

The inquest, before Dr. D. F. Cantillon, Coroner for West Waterford, heard how the single gunshot instantly killed 36 year old Gerald Crotty, 19 Comeragh Crescent, Dungarvan.

The tragedy occurred on lands just outside the town on the evening of November 18 last.

Sgt. David Sheehan told the inquest that when he visited the scene of the tragedy he found a body of a man lying face downwards on the ground. He had been shot in the head and was dead.

Sgt. Sheehan said the deceased had been out shooting with his friend Anthony O'Riordan, 34 Caseyville,

Dungarvan. "O'Riordan was walking a few steps ahead when he slipped. The gun he was carrying discharged, killing Crotty," he added.

Thomas Wall, Comeragh Crescent, Dungarvan, said he had been a close friend of the deceased for 25 years. He formally identified the body of Mr. Crotty at Waterford Regional Hospital on the day following the fatality.

Dr. Robert Tait told of carrying out a post mortem examination. The deceased's scalp was excessively frac-

tured as was the base of the skull.

Dr. Tait concluded that death was due to an extensive shotgun injury to the brain.

Returning a verdict in accordance with the medical evidence, Dr. Cantillon said it was an accident that had tragically claimed a young life.

Inspector Michael Blake, who extended sympathy to the family of Mr. Crotty on behalf of the Gardai, described the fatal shooting as "an appalling tragedy" which had shocked the entire local community.

## Inquest On 21 Year Old Motorist

Two days after Christmas a motoring tragedy claimed the life of 21 year old Patrick J. Power, Kyne Park, Abbeyside, an inquest heard in Dungarvan Court-house last Friday.

The inquest before Dr. D. F. Cantillon, Coroner for West Waterford, sitting with a jury, recorded a verdict in accordance with the medical evidence.

Garda John Twomey gave evidence of arriving at the scene of the fatal accident at Barnawee Bridge, Dungarvan, on the evening of December 27 last. He saw the body of a young man lying motionless in the car and identified him as Patrick J. Power.

Garda Twomey said driving

conditions were bad and it seemed the deceased had lost control of the car which then hit the bridge. When a doctor arrived he pronounced the young man dead.

Garda Twomey added that the dead man had not been wearing a seat belt at the time of the accident.

Dr. Robert Tait said he carried out a post mortem examination on Patrick Power at Waterford Regional Hospital on December 28. The base of the skull was extensively fractured and death was due to that skull fracture.

Dr. Tait said there was no question of the deceased having consumed alcohol.

Asked by the coronor if wearing a seat belt would have helped the driver, Dr. Tait replied that it might have done.

The jury returned a verdict in accordance with the medical evidence, and having extended sympathy to the family of the deceased, Dr. Cantillon commented that the poor driving conditions had contributed to the accident.

There was genuine relief that the kettle had been recovered but there was little sympathy for the two weary rescuers. "Paddyneen" Whelan R.I.P., took charge of it on the way to Bonmahon. (He was heard to remark that Power and Brino weren't fit to be in charge of the kettle). The lid was lost on the road over to Bonmahon, but happily was found again on the way home that night!

For several more years the kettle continued to prove itself a utensil par-excellence, until one day on a hike somewhere, a leak was discovered. It was a sad discovery, but something that was inevitable for an item that had endured so much hardship and ill treatment over the years.





### EVERY PLAYER GAVE HIS ALL





The question is often asked "how come Ballycotton can get so many runners every year?" There is no secret formula to this. Ballycotton Running Promotions work very hard year in and year out. They have a race organising committee of fourteen workers and then of course there's John Walsh. John is slow to take the headlines and quick to work. Of course when development is completed in Dungarvan, work on Walsh Park will commence and the closure of the city venue will create more fixture problems at the Eastern side of the county. This situation will have to be taken on board by the fixtures committee when making fixtures for the extended championships this year.

## U-21 Football Final

The divisional final involving Ballinacourty and Kilrossanty is due to go ahead at the weekend and by all accounts it will be a splendid contest. Kilrossanty showed good form when accounting for Naomh Bríd in the other side of the draw and will be a difficult side for Ballinacourty to handle.

At the same time if 'Courty play as well and as stylishly as they did in the semi-final they are not going to be easily overcome.

Supporters would do well to check the date, time and venue before travelling to this game.

## Draw Postponed

A two weeks postponement of the county draw was announced last week by the draw committee and the initial draw will now take place on Friday, March 18.

The decision was taken because of the need for more time to deal with the administrative side of things. Clubs too, have been requested to forward names and other details, etc., to the committee as soon as possible in order to ensure that everything will be in order for the 18th.

## SPECIAL MEETING

Since commencing these notes I have been informed that a special meeting of the County Board will take place tonight (Wednesday) at Dungarvan to deal with the county development draw and the senior championship groupings. I understand that the matters normally listed on the County Board agenda will not be dealt with here and that the monthly meeting will go ahead later in the month.

## Final Off

The Under-21 'B' football county final involving St. Patrick's and De La Salle, which was fixed for Old Parish venue on Saturday was cancelled in order to allow Kevin Walsh free to travel to Belfast with the county hurling team. The game had previously been cancelled because of the bad weather conditions. It will now go ahead at the same venue on Sunday next.

## Briefing

The Chairman, Secretary and Central Council Representatives of all Boards will attend a meeting in Croke Park on Saturday to be given an up-date on the progress of the building of the Cusack Stand.

It is also possible that some information on the sponsorship of the All-Irelands this year, will be given to the meeting.

# FOOTBALL IN THE COUNTY

Waterford is not a football county. That means a lot of things and among them is the countywide belief that we are never going to get anywhere in football and will always remain at the bottom of the table with our neighbours Kilkenny.

It also means that football is not to be taken seriously or to be treated seriously by many players and officials. It is seen almost as a waste of time and money. With such attitudes is it any wonder that we seem doomed to remain at the bottom.

One prominent football person who is involved at present said to me recently that the few people who are breaking their backs to promote the game are losing their appetite and becoming convinced that fighting the system is a waste of time. Football in this county will never prosper while the current attitudes prevail.

Since Michael Brophy took over as manager, he certainly has worked very hard to lift football off the bottom, but it seems that because of a great lack of co-operation on the part of some others, who would have been expected to act more responsibly, it has been all to no or little avail.

This season, from the start, all sorts of problems had to be overcome in order to get a team on the field and at no stage in their seven game league programme were the best players available. For our first match, which was against London, we did not have a manager, just because certain people on the Board did not want Brophy to be in charge.

In London, the lack of leadership on the line was the chief cause of our one point defeat. All because there was no one in charge! Also on the same day, Stradbally, who would normally provide a number of players for the team, were engaged in the

county intermediate hurling final and there were other games involving county players as well on the same weekend.

For the remainder of the league certain players were unavailable for a variety of reasons, some were club tied and others just opted out for some reason or other. They were not pushed one way or another by their clubs and unfortunately we do have people in charge of football affairs in clubs, who could not give a damn about the county.

To be absolutely blunt about the whole matter, the footballers of this county were very badly let down this season by the so-called strong football clubs and by a number of so-called strong football people.

In spite of all this, the footballers did very well and will finish up with seven points, which keeps them clear of the bottom. Victories over Limerick and Carlow and a draw with Sligo and hopefully a win against Kilkenny can only be considered good, considering all the circumstances.

### MISLEADING RESULTS

RTE certainly got things mixed up on Sunday evening and gave results that caused some confusion to viewers who were relying on their Caltex service for results. Among those which were incorrect was the score of the Westmeath versus Waterford football game at Moate. Their final score for this match was Waterford 0-12, Westmeath 1-5. Even getting the names backwards, it was still wrong.

We were fortunate that Jim Landers was back on WLR and in Belfast to give us an update on the progress of the hurlers at Casement Park.

## Johnnie Brenner

I noted from the daily papers last week that Johnnie Brenner, De La Salle, who has opted out of the county team for the time being, played with U.C.C. against R.T.C., Cork in the first round of the Fitzgibbon Cup. Brenner started as corner forward and was moved outfield to partner his Waterford colleague Tom Fives. Both played very well according to reports, and Brenner was among the scorers in the match which ended in a draw. In the replay on Saturday last Brenner was again at midfield with Tom Fives and scored two points to help U.C.C. win.

I also noted that in the Waterford R.T.C. victory over U.C.C. in the All Ireland Freshers Hurling League, that Brendan Ormond and Pat Harney (both 1992 county minors) both figured prominently in the game.

# Splendid Display By Understrength Waterford

Although by far the better side in the first half, Waterford were amazingly inaccurate and wasted enough chances to have the result secure at half time. The strength of the wind behind Waterford in this half can be gauged from the fact that the only goal of the match was scored by our right full back, Don McMahon, who with the other defenders was way out from goal when he kicked the ball a full sixty-five metres which deceived the Westmeath goalie in the 16th min. and helped us to a halftime lead of 1-5 to 0-3. Waterford had led by 1-4 to 0-2 after 28 minutes and were unlucky not to have had at least one more goal after Martin Powers long drive hit the woodwork under the cross-bar and went out wide.



## Local Traffic Warden In Unfair Dismissal Claim

fused to stop issuing traffic tickets to cars displaying "change of ownership" forms, while there was a further incident when he tried to put a ticket on an Urban Council truck while it was in motion.

He told of a complaint being received from a work colleague of Donovan with whom he had a verbal encounter. It was alleged by the complaining worker that Donovan used foul and abusive language to him and that the incident was witnessed by up to ten local people.

Referring to another incident with a second doctor, Mr. White said the doctor complained that he had been publicly abused by Donovan within earshot of the doctor's staff and patients.

Mr. White said the warden was told by the County Manager that his actions were bringing the U.D.C. into disrepute.

He went on to say that Donovan had a verbal clash with a lady motorist that had left the woman "breathless."

Mr. White said there was sympathy for the warden who suffered from epilepsy. However his conduct could no longer be tolerated and he was finally sacked for misconduct and failure to carry out his duties.

Mr. Ray Moloney, senior staff officer with Dungarvan U.D.C., told the Tribunal that on July 9, 1993 he had heard a great deal of commotion outside his of-

fice in the Town Hall, Friary Street. He had then seen the warden standing in the road, shouting obscenities and abuse at Pat Moore who had been parking his Council van.

"He lost complete control," stated Mr. Moloney adding that Moore had given the warden no provocation and had simply ignored him. "He was completely incoherent."

Pat Moore then told the Tribunal that he had made no contact with the warden whatsoever and had given him no reason for his agitation. "The public nature of it was unacceptable," Mr. Moore added.

James Donovan told the Tribunal that he was the first traffic warden to be appointed in Dungarvan and as a result he had to take the brunt of public hostility.

He described his job as "an isolated one" and he was under "some pressure." Donovan said that when a second traffic warden was appointed there was a delay in replacing his worn out uniform. "I felt that I was going to be replaced," he said.

He went on to tell the Tribunal that he performed his duties entirely in accordance with the Urban Council's rules and regulations. He admitted that he may have used "a few words" from time to time and also threatening to strike a motorist but he didn't mean that threat.

The Tribunal will issue its findings in due course.
