## TOM O'DONOGHUE OF THE 'KERLOGUE'

By 1943 World War 2 had turned in the Allies favour; the Battle of the Atlantic as it is referred to was almost over and the U-boats defeated. As the year drew to a close a number of naval engagements took place in European waters and one of these involved an Irish ship in the last days of December.

Under Dungarvan man, Captain Tom O'Donoghue, the 354 tons gross Kerlogue owned by the Wexford Steamships Company Ltd., was on passage from Lisbon to Dublin on 27th December with a cargo of oranges.

At first light on December 29th, the Irish vessel was in a position some 360 miles south of the Fastnet, when two Fock Wolf Condor bombers circled the ship and flashed the signal "SOS Lifeboats - follow". The Luftwaffe planes then flew off to the south east firing flares. Captain Donoghue, whose niece Mrs. Joan Joyce resides in Sarsfield Street, Abbeyside, immediately altered course and after two hours the Kerlogue came upon the aftermath of a previous day's

naval battle.

The Kerlogue at once commenced the rescue and for the next ten hours criss crossed the area moving from group to group in water, pulling the exhausted and wounded German navymen aboard, many ill clad and suffering from exposure.

For the last five hours the Kerlogue carried out her mission of mercy under floodlight, taking aboard 168 Germans, 93 of which were from a torpedo boat T26 out of a complement of 203.

Captain Donoghue rendered what first aid he could. The most seriously injured he placed in the master's cabin.

Because of the condition of the survivors and a shortage of food, Captain Donoghue decided to sail to Cork, the nearest Irish port. He took the decision to go for Cork in spite of the conditions of his navicert, the allied and British sailing permit given to neutral ships that they must call at a designated UK port for examination and clearance on both the outward and homeward legs of their voyages from Ireland, in his case

Fishguard in Wales.

When about 30 miles south of Fastnet on December 31st, the Kerlogue broke radio telephone silence and called up Valentia coast radio station. She reported having 164 survivors including 7 seriously wounded aboard and requested medical assistance on arrival at Cork Harbour. Valentia acknowledged and signed off with "well done Kerlogue".

After 2 days proper rest and fresh stores, the Kerlogue sailed to Fishguard to obtain her clearance. There the senior British naval officer raged at Captain Donoghue for not landing the Germans at the Welsh port. Captain Donoghue responded that his only concern was to save life. The Kerlogue eventually arrived in Dublin on 5th January where Captain Donoghue received a letter from the German Ambassador, Dr. E. Hempel, expressing his gratitude and appreciation for the rescue effort. Later Dr. Hempel presented a solid silver cap to the master with smaller replicas for each of the other crew members on behalf of the German Government.

## Second Performance By Blackwater Singers

The Blackwater Singers, the newly formed choir, based in Lismore, will give their second public performance on Saturday, April 9 next.

During 7.30 p.m. Mass in St. Carthage's Church, Lismore, the choir, under their conductor Jan van Putten, will sing a selection of Easter music which will include such well known favourites as "Thine Be The Glory" by Handel, "All In The April Evening" and "Laudate Dominum" by Mozart.

Prior to their appearance in St. Carthage's Church, they will sing the same programme in St. Mary's

Abbey, Glencairn at 5.30 p.m. following Vespers which commences at 5 p.m.

The choir now numbers 45 members who travel each week to practice from as far afield as Dungarvan, Mitchelstown, Fermoy, Kilmore, The Nire Valley, Clonmel, Cappoquin and, of course, Lismore.

Everyone is welcome to attend both performances.

The next red letter day in the choir's calendar will be Friday, May 20 when they will be joined by the ever popular "Society Four" in a fundraising gala evening in the Lismore Hotel. A date not to be missed!

## BOXING NEWS

## TWO MUNSTER TITLES FOR LOCAL CLUB

On Saturday 2nd April at Rathkeile, Co. Limerick the Munster Youths Championships took place at the Manns Hotel. Three boxers from Dungarvan entered, they were Jason Shaw, James Keohane and Pa Cummins. Cummins was withdrawn over a weight problem which meant he would have had to fight James Keohane which the local club would not allow to take place.

Jason Shaw fought Irish Champion Alan O'Brien, Rylane, this was Shaws third time meeting O'Brien so he was fairly confident as he went for the hat trick. This was not going to be an easy fight for either boxer as there was a Munster title at stake. Both boxers came out very strong but Shaw took control from the start and held it all the way through. The fights were judged by computer which suited Shaws long left jab. He won by a very impressive 16-4.

This made Jason Shaw the clubs first youth provincial champion and in less than an hour James Keohane was to join him as the second.

Keohane took on John O'Driscoll of Carricktohill. This fight didn't last one round as James came out strong and fast and caught O'Driscoll with a flurry of punches which ended with a left hook and a massive right cross, the referee jumped in and it was all over.

That was the semi-final

out of the way, in the final James took on his old rival Mark McCarthy from Gagin Bandon. The last time they met was in the Cork Leagues when McCarthy stopped James in the first round.

James was out to settle the score.

In the first round James boxed very cautiously and concentrated mostly on his defence. McCarthy possibly snatched the opening round, but Keohane came out so strong in the second round that McCarthy was unable to defend himself. Keohane caught him with everything,

all his training paid off. The referee stopped the fight and James Keohane was declared the Munster Champion.

Both Jason Shaw and James Keohane go forward to the National Championships in Dublin later this month.

## THE BLESSING OF MARY'S MOUNT

Mary's Mount, Youghal, a building of great splendour and glory has been lovingly restored and developed to facilitate the needs of the increasing number of pupils.

Mary's Mount also known as Ashton Court was purchased by the Loretto order of sisters from the Condon family in 1954. Then it was used as a boarding school until the early 1980's. Following the closure of the boarding school and the increasing needs of the day pupils, some rooms in the building were used as class rooms.

In 1989, it was decided that something had to be done to replace the prefabricated classrooms, which were in an appalling condition. The school had all in readiness, the building, the expertise of architect Ron Falconer, Engineer David Kelly and John Costelloe, Quantity Surveyor. All the

school now needed was the go-ahead from the department, it was a slow process.

Sr. Eileen Randles I.B.V.M., lobbied the Department and eventually the school got a listening ear and a £70,000 government grant. The Loretto Community then donated a total of £60,000 from the sale of property and work began.

The total cost of refurbishment was £240,000. It was now up to the board of management to raise that amount.

Right away, staff, parents, past pupils and friends all of whom have great pride in their hearts for this school, made a giant effort to get this amount together and already they are well on the way to success. £48,000 was raised in the 1993 draw, two flag days raised £1,800 and the Dublin City Marathon (Declan Barron) £1,800, and a private donation of £10,000 was also

made.

Work is now complete, and the official Blessing of Mary's Mount took place on Wednesday, March 16th. Dean St. John Thornhill P.P. blessed the building, also in attendance was Councillor Jerry Russell, Chairman of Youghal UDC and the principals of the other primary and secondary schools in the town.

It was a very special day for the Loretto Order, who have given the young girls of this area a strong and lasting education which has prepared them for life. Through their education system, they have kept the word of God alive in the hearts of their pupils and prepared them for life here after. Long may the Loretto Order remain in Youghal.

Congratulations to all concerned on the development. Loretto offers a bright future to all it's pupils in the years to come.

ing Industry (I.H.C.I.).

The course, of four weeks duration, is run on a biannual basis and will again be run in the spring of 1996.

## Are you a dahlia fanatic?

BY late April, dahlia fanatics will be in feverish action — planting one of the most loved of Ireland's garden flowers. But it's no wonder the plants are so popular when the family is so wide in variety and comes in so many colours.

Different members can play different roles too:— some can be deployed for edging borders while others can give plenty of height to a deep border.

Blooms also range from a compact inch across to a mass of colour about a foot wide and they also come in several clear types.

The single-flowered, anemone, collerette and paeony types are quite simply 'daisy' blooms and it is the decorative ball, pompon and cactus varieties which gardeners prize most — cactus blooms really do look like an explosion of colour!

While dahlias are deservedly popular with Irish gardeners, the plant hails from Mexico where it was discovered by the Spanish 'conquistadors' some 300 years ago.

### EVOLVED

The many varieties evolved from those original plants are widely available from nurseries, garden centres and even by mail orders deals — many of them very good value!

Some gardeners like to start tubers early in a cool greenhouse: place them in boxes or pots of moist peat in February and harden the shoots off outside before actually planting from late May.

That is also the preferred month for planting rooted cuttings. These must be well-watered and left to stand for an hour or more before being placed into holes large enough to take the root balls.

Alternatively, plant unsprouted tubers from late April in the South of Ireland — wait a couple of weeks in colder areas.

Whichever method you choose, you must have a prepared site which is bright and open, away from trees, and well-drained.

### SHALLOW-ROOTED

Double-digging is not necessary since dahlias are shallow-rooted — a fact that makes them vulnerable to winds — but you may need to dig deeper to plant well-rooted tubers.

Spacing the plants will depend on which of the many varieties you choose, but the family does divide broadly into two — the leggier border dahlias which



are usually at least three feet tall and need a couple of feet between them, and the fewer bedding varieties, which rarely reach more than two feet high and can be grouped closer. Border types, in particular, need staking after reaching about a foot high, but neither half of the family likes being dry so water plants well during warm weather.

When hoeing between the plants, be careful not to slice through the shallow root systems — you may find hand weeding faster and safer in the long run! Once established, make sure you get the best displays by pinching back stems to encourage bushiness and always deadhead drooping blooms to keep up the supply of colour. Arthur Hines

## Smoked Fish Baguettes



A great idea for lunch or a snack, all the ingredients can be tucked away in the freezer until they are needed

### Ingredients

450g (1lb) smoked cod or haddock, fresh or defrosted, skinned and sliced  
2 small part-baked baguettes  
25g (1oz) unsalted butter or margarine  
5-10ml (1-2 teaspns) chopped cloves pepper  
50g (2oz) mozzarella cheese, grated or sliced

### Method

Preheat the oven to

220°C/425°F, Gas Mark 7. Cut the baguettes in half lengthways. Cream together the butter and chives, and spread the mixture on the

baguette halves.

Arrange the sliced fish along the baguette halves and season with pepper. Top with cheese, place on a baking sheet and bake in

the oven for 7-8 minutes or until the baguettes are golden brown.

Serve with a tomato and cucumber salad.

## ONE HOUSE TO BE BUILT

A notice of motion was tabled at a recent meeting of Waterford County Council by Cllr. C. O Riain, Knockalisheen, Ballymacarbry. The motion was that when the allocation for the erection of Council houses becomes known that the area that he represents be considered very carefully. Last year not a single house was built north of a line from Cappoquin to Carrick-on-Suir.

Mr. O Riain got an assurance from the County Manager that when the allocation for house building in 1994 was being finalised that his area would be considered. The County Manager, Dan Hurley has gone on record as stating the above.

Last year a start was made for the erection of 40 houses and work is progressing on these and they are for completion some time this year. Progress is supposed to be satisfactory, we are informed. This year a start will be made on a further 45 houses in the county.

Mr. O Riain has been informed that only one single house will be built in Kilmaccomma. This is not acceptable to him. Of course Dan Hurley has retired and Cllr. O Riain is left whistling in the wind. It's the same old story, he said, just one single house north of a line from Cappoquin to Carrick-on-Suir. It is ridiculous when you consider how difficult it is for people to get planning permission to build their own home. I know several people, he said, who are quite willing to erect their own houses, only to be re-

fused planning permission. This is hard to swallow, Cllr. O Riain said. I would like the people whom I represent to know what is happening at Council meetings, he said.

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



## CO. WATERFORD ICMSA

Currently all BTE cards should be forwarded along with the application for the SBP [special beef premium]. However, where herds are restricted due to disease, farmers will not have the BTE cards. In addition, where animals have not been tested, no BTE cards will be available.

County Waterford ICMSA Chairman, John Cusack, outlines below some of the possibilities which arise and how they are addressed:

Where farmers wish to apply for SBP but cattle have not been tested

[1] Farmers contact their vet and request that animals be tagged.

[2] The farmers forward a list of the tag numbers to the DVO and "provisional cards" are issued. These cards are only for the purpose of making application for the SBP. Animals cannot be sold using these cards.

[3] When the farmer tests the animals for sale the vet collects the "provisional cards" and BTE cards issued from the DVO as normal.

Where herds are restricted at the time of application for the SBP

[1] Farmers include a note with their application indicating that the BTE cards

are held at the local DVO due to the herd being restricted.

[2] The SBP unit sends a copy of the application to the local DVO requesting an administrative check to see that the numbers on the application match the BTE cards at the DVO. This acts as the administrative check that the applicant possesses cards for the animals supplied for.

[3] The cards are retained by the DVO until the end of the restriction period after which they are returned to the farmer.


[4] The farmer must then forward these cards to the SBP unit so that they can be stamped/punched so that the premium status of the animal is recorded on the card. It is in the farmers interest to have these cards forwarded as quickly as possible because they will not be able to sell cattle unless the premium status is recorded on the card.

Where herds become restricted during the period in which the cards are held in the Special Beef Premium Unit

[1] The local DVO forwards a list of all herds which become restricted to the SBP unit on a weekly

basis.

[2] Cards which are being held in the SBP unit for the purposes of the SBP are then forwarded to the local DVO so that they can be retained until the end of the restriction period.

## Waterford IFA Says Liability Law Change Must Protect Farmers

The Chairman of Waterford Co. Executive IFA, Mr. Par Murphy, has demanded that changes to the law on Occupier's Liability must protect farmers against claims arising from injury to child trespassers. He said, "Farmers will be placed in an impossible situation if legislation introduced to update the law on Occupiers Liability creates a legal loophole allowing claims for children who have injured themselves while on farmland without either the farmer's knowledge or permission."

Mr. Murphy said: "Farms and farming activity can potentially be dangerous especially where machinery is involved and requires a heightened awareness of farm safety at all times. Children and young adults who are allowed the freedom to wander at will must be responsible for their own actions and welfare. Where children are not old enough to be responsible for their actions, then it is clearly their parents duty to look out for their welfare and safety. Farmers cannot be expected to act as "guardian angels" for other peoples children."

Mr. Murphy told gun club representatives that publication of the Law Reform Commission's final report and recommendations on Occupier's Liability was expected in the coming weeks. He warned, however, that IFA was demanding delivery by the Government on its commitment, agreed with IFA in the new Programme for Competitiveness and Work to bring reforming legislation on landowners liability before the Dail in 1994.

The Irish Farmers Association and NARGC have

been working closely together to bring about fundamental changes to the outdated law on Occupier's Liability to allow the general public continued unhindered access to the Irish countryside.

## National Horse Forum At Kildalton

Experts from the U.K., France and Ireland will address this year's National Horse Forum, run by Teagasc at Kildalton College, Piltown, Co. Kilkenny on Thursday, April 14.

The forum, consisting of a conference and outdoor demonstration, will highlight ways of improving output and performance from horses. This, says Norman Storey, Teagasc Equine Specialist and organiser of the forum, is the challenge facing breeders if Ireland is to remain one of the leading horse breeding nations.

The conference will be addressed by Fergus Graham, UK based International Bloodstock Agent of the French Horse Breeding Programme. Among the many experts featuring at the demonstration will be Commandant Ronnie McMahon of the Army Equitation School.







These chicken houses were separated from the street by a conventional clay ditch. Behind the chicken houses were a number of garden plots. One plot was owned by Mrs. Hughes who mar-

ried Christy Power and they opened a shop opposite the scouts den. It is probable that the gardens were handed over to the County Council.

At the Pond side of the Dump the houses were owned by Needhams, Michael Maher (his wife was Mona Maher who was postmistress for many years in Sexton Street in the building on the traffic lights side of "The Last Bite") and Alice Organ. Mahers house was on the site where Cosgraves now live. When the Murphy Place houses were constructed all three of the

forementioned families were accommodated in the new estate. Across the road on the Scouts Den side lived Cathie Beatty, Mary Ellen Keohan and Minnie Beatty.

Older residents of Abbeyside remember the Waterford Senior Hurling Team training in "The Dump". In the scouts field adjacent to "The Den", Mary Ellen Keohan kept a pony presumably for pleasure purposes.

Matthew Hogan informs me that the Fenian Place Houses were constructed in 1968 and not 1966 as stated.


of the trophy. Most of that side are eligible to play this year and for most it will be their last chance at youth level to win a major trophy.



Power had to settle for third place in the time trial on Monday morning when he rode through a blizzard to record 23.43 over the 10 miles course. Because of the terrible conditions prevailing the final stage was cut short on Monday evening. The stage was won by Ashley Clancy (Corrib Wheelers) with Power finishing safely in the bunch to retain the title for the Paddy Buckley Club who had the overall winner last year in Limerick's David Hourigan.

# Dungarvan AC Stage 12th Annual Road Race

On this Sunday, April 10, several months of preparation will be climaxed with the staging of Dungarvan Athletic Club's 12th Annual Road Race, it being the eighth 10K since the series started in 1983. The race will start at 2.30 p.m. from outside the cinema and following a route around the outskirts of the town it will finish in the Square from 3 p.m. onwards.

**INTERESTING CHANGES**

In an event that has been on the racing calendar for many years the organisers have realised that to keep a freshness about the race, changes have to be introduced from year to year where possible.

Since 1983 changes introduced include the race distance coming down from the half-marathon and ten miles to the present 10K to suit the runners' preference. The wheelchair event was introduced two years ago, a results programme has helped finance the event, the race was first videoed courtesy of Gerry Cantwell, Kevin Wyley and James Veale in 1992 and electronic timing has been provided by Ballycotton Running Promotions.

In 1994 the prize list has been increased to cater for the ever-growing vets section. The race has been given championship status within the county with Waterford AC and West Waterford AC clashing in the senior, vets and novice categories. A quality tee-shirt will be presented to every runner who finishes the 10K. Bearing a local theme, this tee-shirt, due to the strain on race finances, may well become a collector's item, but it's an opportunity that's not to be missed. The organisers realise that an unpopular change sees the race entry increase to £5, but taking the tee-shirt into consideration, the runners are gaining each 10K entry for less than £2. Entries will

be taken at the Presentation Convent from 1.30 p.m.

**RACE ROUTE**

The race begins at the cinema and takes the following route — The Square, Bridge Street, Causeway, Sexton Street, Clonea Road (1 mile), left at Duckspool (2 miles), left on reaching Waterford Road, back to Crotty's Corner (3 miles), back to Causeway and through Park, right at Kelleher's Printers and left on to by-pass road to Kilrush traffic lights (4 miles), right at Kilrush to Boithrin na Rua, left at both ends of Boithrin na Rua to glass factory (5 miles), through roundabout, pass by the hospital and straight through to Mitchel Street (6 miles), left at parish chapel and finishing in the Square (6.2 miles, or 10k.)

**PRIZES**

Prizes for the race, which holds a BLE permit, will be awarded as follows — Senior Men, first 10; Vets Men, first 3 over 40, first 3 over 45 and first 2 over 50; Team Prize, first 3 teams outside top ten finishers with three to score. Junior men, first 2; Senior Women, first 5; first over 35 and first over 40; Wheelchair Section, first 3.

**CHAMPIONSHIP EVENT**

The Waterford 10K Road Championship will make its re-entry to the racing calendar on Sunday. It will bring Waterford AC and West Waterford AC into direct opposition and eventually it can only do good to strengthen Waterford's

standing outside the county.

Championship medals will be presented to the first three senior men, the first three senior ladies, the first three vets (everyone over 40) and the first three novices. There will be one team prize of four to score in each of the senior men's, vets and novice sections. A vet can also count in the senior and novice categories. The fifth runner onwards to finish for each club qualifies for the novice race as this is the first championship for a number of years. This facilitates the inauguration of a novice championship.

**WHEELCHAIR RACE**

For the third year the race organisers welcome the wheelchair athletes to Dungarvan. This race, which is once again being sponsored by Paddy Foley's Bar, The Square, will start a few minutes before the main event. The race is made possible through the efforts of Liam Rossiter and Derry Durand who is a regular competitor and who last year brought his course time down from 48.24 (1992) to 43 mins. 04 secs.

Last year John Fulham (Limerick) set a Dungarvan 10K all-comers record of a fantastic 29 mins, 01 secs. and he was just five seconds ahead of Tralee's Ray Guerin (29.06). Patrice Dockery (Dublin) holds the ladies record with a time of 36 mins. and 35 secs. It is hoped that all those competitors will be back to Dungarvan this year as well as Gerry Forde (Blarney) who travelled to the race last year but unfortunately he experienced a tyre puncture before the start. John Ahearn (Cork) won the recent Ballycotton Ten Miles and if he competes we should witness another cracker of a race.

**RACE FAVOURITES**

County Senior Cross Country Champion, Jimmy Mulligan, must be installed as race favourite on all known form. He finished ninth in the Irish Senior Cross Country Championship in Roscommon last February and despite many recent local victories this must rank as his best performance ever. Within the last year Jimmy has won the Dromana '5', the Paddy Flanagan Race and the Dungarvan Crystal 10K. Last year he was just pipped by Tommy Moloney (Thurles Crokes) in a thrilling race with three runners finishing within four seconds of each other. Clearly, anyone who has intentions of winning this year's 10K must first of all beat Clonea Power's Jimmy Mulligan.

Christy Maher (Comeragh Harriers), Michael Roche (West Waterford) and Mick Neville (Tullamore Harriers) will be hard to beat in the three Vets categories, while Mary Sheehan (East Cork), the holder, should retain her Ladies Title. In the Junior Mens Race, Dermot Hickey (West Waterford AC) is the form athlete while the team title has been dominated by the strong Clonmel Athletic Club for many years.





## ADULT HURLING CHAMPIONSHIPS BEGIN

As will be seen from our fixtures list there is a huge number of championship games scheduled for the coming week-end, which also sees the start of our 1994 intercounty activity with the McGrath Cup semi-final game at Leamybrien.

The decision of the fixtures committee to bring forward the start of the senior and intermediate hurling championships by one week from the date agreed at the last County Board meeting was a little surprising, but it is obviously influenced by their desire to make as much progress as possible with the club championships before we are put under pressure from intercounty games.

### MCGRATH CUP

Apart from winning the home section of the competition, Waterford have never won the McGrath Cup, having been beaten by London in the final some years ago.

We have already beaten Limerick in the national league, so we must have a chance here. With several games affecting players

who would normally be chosen for inclusion on the county team, being played over the week-end, it is difficult to visualise what our team will be like.

At full strength we certainly would have a splendid chance of winning and such a result would give a bit of very badly needed prestige to the county. If we win, we will be fixed to play the final in two weeks time against either Tipperary or London. The team is unlikely to be selected in time for publication.

### SENIOR HURLING GAMES

Two senior and two intermediate hurling championship matches are down for decision and hopefully the weather will not interfere again and result in these being called off. It is not known why the other hurling games are not being played.

On Thursday evening, Stradbally and Clonea are due to meet in Portlaw in the opening match of the senior hurling championships. Stradbally playing their first match in this

grade may fancy their chances against a team who are back up in senior ranks after a few years down at intermediate where they failed to make a big impression. # Annual Congress

The installation of the new President, Jack Boothman will be the feature event at next week-end's Annual Congress when approximately 300 delegates from all counties in Ireland and G.A.A. counties of Britain will assemble at the Slieve Russell Hotel, in Ballyconnell for a two-day session.

Two new Trustees will also be appointed and a total of fifteen candidates are still in the field, including three from Munster. With some big names in the field it is difficult to predict the outcome, but the expectations are that it will be one for Leinster and one from Ulster. Probably Jimmy Grey and Rev. Fr. Dan Mac Galloghlaigh.

There are 24 motions listed, the smallest number in a long time, but another 35 motions are listed as being referred to Central Council and will be debated at a later time.

## ARD STIURTHOIR'S REPORT

In his very wide ranging report, Liam Mulvihill deals with all aspects of G.A.A. activity and as ever it is an excellent and thought provoking document.

He has made suggestions about restructuring the championships in hurling in order to revive interest in the competition that may be seen to be losing favour.

He suggests that:

(a) Provincial champions of Leinster and Munster qualify for All Ireland semi-finals, as at present.

(b) The losing teams in the Leinster and Munster finals to play-off for re-entry to the All Ireland championship as at (c).

(c) Galway, Ulster champions, Senior B winners and the winners of the Leinster/Munster play-off, play two quarter finals on the same day with the winners of the two games qualifying to meet the Leinster and Munster winners in the semi-finals.

## ADVANTAGES

The advantages of this proposal are that Galway and the Ulster winners

would have an opportunity of more games than at present, there would be a more competitive conclusion to the competition and public interest would be built up to an even greater extent before the semi-final stages. Most importantly it would be more equitable as it would be much more likely too that the two best teams in the country would meet in the final.

The Ard Stiurathoir asks that the suggestion be given a try.

During another part of his report where he deals with support for the games, he has pointed out that the support for football has been consistently greater than for hurling throughout the national leagues. Counties receiving their share of the league income are already well aware of this. Here in Waterford our income from football league last year, was approximately twice as great as was our share from the hurling pool. This may be difficult to understand, but nevertheless it is a fact.

The Congress Booklet shows that from last year's league a total of £919,000 was distributed for football and only £424,000 for hurling. The receipts were up substantially on the previous year and, of course, there were attractive play-offs as well. Four counties received more than £100,000 (football and hurling as well as sponsorship) from the league last year while a further nine counties received in excess of £30,000, each-three counties had more than £50,000 and the minimum amount received by any county (including Waterford) was £23,740. This was last year and for this year the returns so far are even better, but there is a significant decline in hurling receipts.

It is significant that he refers to counties who do not field their best teams in the league.

Other suggestions made by the chief ex. officer are that the leagues commence in the third week in March and have seven rounds played up to the third Sunday in May,

by playing in league in conjunction with the championship.

What I see wrong with this, and I'm sure others will as well, is that it leaves no room for club championships, which after all are the more important than the leagues, whatever about the financial gains. This is my only disagreement with an otherwise splendid report.

## WATERFORD MOTION

The lone Waterford motion is listed at number 8 and this seeks to allow minor clubs attend the annual county convention. This is from Kill and it was passed unanimously at our convention. On two previous occasions we had similar motions to Congress but were unsuccessful. Maybe it will be third time lucky.

## FINANCE

Income for the year ended December 31st was an all-time record of £4,885,752 or £250,000 greater than the record of the previous year.

Gate receipts were up by £40,000, mainly due to the attractiveness of the football pairings in the concluding stages of the championships. Advertising space took in £300,000. Media coverage netted £410,000 and other commercial revenue realised £121,000 and listed under 'other income' is a figure of £168,107.

## EXPENDITURE

This also showed an increase with match expenses (£993,000) the biggest item and closely followed by a figure of £829,000 for administration and general expenses. This has now become a major item on the expenditure side of the statement of accounts. Promotional expenses were £481,000, teams expenses were £200,000 etc. Out of the operating surplus £1,000,000 was a stadium development, £360,000 for club, county and provincial ground grants. A total of £274,000 was spent on special projects and education sector grants were £65,000, etc. etc.

The All Ireland football final gate was £897,683 and the hurling final was almost the same at £894,807 (both had capacity crowds). The Dublin v. Derry S/F semi final at Croke Park brought in £601,485, which was the biggest 'gate' apart from the finals. A total of £218,018 was spent on youth and coaching and £114,058 was spent on hurling subs. and helmets.

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
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
