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## VEC "Fighting Tooth And Nail"

Strong opposition was voiced by members of Co. Waterford VEC last Monday to the recent Ministerial Discussion Paper regarding the establishment of 8 Regional Education Councils in place of the country's County and City Vocational Education Committees.

Addressing Monday's meeting, the CEO, Mr. Kieran Heffernan said he had attended a special delegate congress of the IVEA last Saturday in Portlaoise, where outright opposition to the proposed 15-member

Regional Councils had been expressed.

Complimenting the IVEA for their stance, Cllr. Paddy Kenneally, who had also attended the congress, stated that in the IVEA's view, such Councils would "lack

local public accountability. They would be too remote from local communities and would result in present local democratic representatives in the area of education being reduced by 80%."

Declaring that such Councils would ultimately result in the abolition of the VEC's, Cllr. Kenneally claimed "the civil servants want to get complete control and not to be answerable to anyone."

**"STRONG FIGHT ON  
OUR HANDS"**

Cllr. Nora Flynn also rejected the Minister's paper and strongly urged the Com-

mittee members to fight "tooth and nail" against what she described as further "slashing of local democracy."

The Cappoquin Councillor further submitted that local community needs would not be serviced by Regional Councils. It was vitally important that County VECs are retained and she urged County Councils to take up the fight.

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## Quay Developers To Issue Public Statement

As a result of local media coverage and recent comments by Cllr. Mario Flavin referring to the company "Harbour Developments Ltd.," encountering problems in their planned development of Council property at Davitt's Quay, Dungarvan, it was revealed by Cllr. Flavin at last Monday night's meeting of Dungarvan UDC that the consortium intends to issue a public statement.

**"TIP OF THE  
ICEBERG"**

Addressing the Council members, Cllr. Flavin said he had been approached by the local consortium to inform the Urban Council of some problems the developers had faced.

The Fine Gel member informed his fellow councillors that repair work on the roof could not commence until the walls of the Davitt's Quay property had been stabilised with horizontal steel bars costing £10,000 to £12,000 before a slate could be touched. This work would also entail drilling through the wall of the adjoining building for which permission was actively being sought but had not been received before the contract signing deadline.

Cllr. Flavin claimed that the adverse weather had further hampered development work and insurance on the building as it stood was not forthcoming, but covered by the bidder's own insurance.

"This is only the tip of the iceberg," claimed Cllr. Flavin who concluded that the developers felt they had not benefitted from a fair hearing as all the facts were not placed before the Council to consider," he added.

**INTEGRITY  
AT STAKE**

Urging both the developers and the urban councillors to meet to clarify the situation, Cllr. Flavin declared that the integrity of the Council was at stake.

Cllr. Billy Kyne however stressed that should the developers feel aggrieved, they should then approach the Town Clerk or the Acting County Manager or ask UDC Chairman, Cllr. Tony Wright for a deputation to meet with the Council.

Strongly objecting to the phrase "integrity of the Council," Cllr. Austin Hallahan said he was fully aware of the facts when the Council had voted to rescind Section 83 and retain

## Lismore and Cappoquin Court Dilemma Solved

The recent wrangle regarding poor court facilities at both Lismore and Cappoquin has finally been ironed out this month with the aid of both long term and short term solutions.

Declining to rule in Cappoquin since last October, District Judge Michael Patwell had shunned the Town Library building which had had the double role of local court facilities.

A solution, however has now been found in the form of the local boat house owned by the Cappoquin Rowing Club. Renovations to the building are already underway with the help of FAS workers and although the location has not been verified as a permanent venue for the Cappoquin court, local people are nonetheless determined to secure a more fully equipped and suitable courthouse in the future.

Court proceedings in the West Waterford town of Lismore had also been interrupted following the District Judge's refusal to preside at the local court last month due to, what he described as 'minimal' changing room facilities.

Thanks to the initiative of

Mr. J.J. Bunyan, District Court Clerk for Lismore, Waterford County Council and Teagasc, additional court facilities at the Lismore Teagasc premises have now been provided as a short term solution to the cramped court facilities. A more permanent solution, however, is envisaged in the new modern Community Centre where court business is expected to transfer at a later date.

### JUDGE SAYS THANKS

In the wake of these new developments, sincere gratitude was expressed to all concerned by Judge Patwell at last week's sitting of Dungarvan District Court. Thanking Acting County Manager, Mr. Brian McNally, the Garda Siochana, local solicitors, Waterford Co. Council and Mr. Bunyan, for the effort being made into supplying excellent facilities at Lismore and Cappoquin, the Judge stated that he would be 'quite happy' to continue to hold his courts at both these locations.

Regarding existing court facilities in Tallow, the Judge warned that if something wasn't found, he would probably move to Cappoquin.

Referring to Dungarvan Courthouse, "a few little improvements" and goodwill he urged was all that

was needed to improve the situation. "The goodwill is already there", the District Judge concluded.

# Clashmore Pub Completely Guttled In Blazing Inferno

One of the oldest pubs in the quiet West Waterford village of Clashmore was razed to the ground last Wednesday following a blaze which started in the early hours of the morning.

Property of P. J. Landers, 'The Maltworms' in Main Street was a popular drinking hole with local residents and visitors alike and all ex-

pressed deep shock and regret on seeing the popular 3 storey establishment completely gutted in the wake of the blazing fire.

### BABY HERO

The alarm was raised at 3.45 a.m. by the Laffan family who live next door.

Speaking to the 'Dungarvan Leader', Mrs. Laura Laffan described how her eight month old daughter Katie had woke at around 3.30 a.m. "hungry for her

next bottle". On going downstairs, Mrs. Laffan had noticed a "funny smell" and had then heard an explosion of breaking glass next door as the flames burst through the pub window. Her husband Justin had immediately contacted the Fire Brigade and they had evacuated the house. "The firemen told us that if they had arrived 5 minutes later, it would have been too late", stated a relieved Mrs. Laffan whose house had escaped the blaze unscathed.

### QUICK ON SCENE

Fire Brigade units from Dungarvan, Ardmore, Cappoquin, Youghal and Lismore rushed to the scene at 4 a.m. where they soon got to grips with the blaze. The Ardmore unit under Jackie Burke, Station Officer and Dungarvan unit under Station Officer Bernard Moynihan, in particular are to be commended for their hard work, staying on the scene for more than 13 hours.

Damage caused by the blaze which destroyed stock, antique furniture and the complete upstairs living accommodation etc., is thought to be in excess of £100,000.

Inspector Michael Blake of the Dungarvan Gardai, has stated that a forensic examination of the remains has been carried out and Garda enquiries are continuing.

## Lismore Heritage Centre Creates Awareness In Tourism Market

In 1991 Lismore was designated as a Heritage Town by Bord Failte. This presented a long overdue opportunity to develop and preserve the character of this historic and picturesque town and to promote the beauty of the West Waterford area. Lismore Heritage Co. Ltd., which is community based, was formed and plans were drawn up.

The aim of the company was and is to establish Lismore and West Waterford as one of the major tourist attractions in the South East. The company saw this development as presenting a unique opportunity to encourage existing and new businesses to provide services for the increased visitor numbers. This has already happened. We feel that tourism is a vital component in the future prosperity of the area. We are very grateful to our Board members, Waterford Co. Council staff and many others who have given so

much of their time, free of charge to assist us in our aim.

Since its inception in 1991 the company has invested £225,855. Grants totalling £140,280 were received from Bord Failte leaving nett expenditure by the company of £85,575. £51,829 of this sum went towards the provision of a car park, floodlighting, walk footpaths, covered refuse bins, etc., which in fact is public amenity expenditure leaving a balance of £33,746 — which was used to provide facilities in the visitor centre.

To date 32,000 visitors have come to the Centre. The Centre won the Irish American Cultural Institute Heritage Award in 1992. In a recent survey conducted by Tourism International Ltd. some 99% of visitors to our Centre described the product on offer as excellent. Over the past two years £60,000 has been spent on establishing West Waterford as a major tourist attraction. This is a modest promotional budget in relation to other similar projects. We are confident that we have created an awareness in the tourism market which will bear fruit in the future.

We realise that we are in a very competitive market and we cannot achieve our potential over night. We are confident that success will come.

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# Growing your own vegetables

TO hear some other nationalities talk, we Irish have only just discovered the true taste of vegetables. But we certainly did have a tendency to over-boil our vegetables or serve them in mashed form.

Fortunately, the national cuisine has improved and vegetable taste and goodness is in fashion, probably explaining why so many people have returned to or started growing their own — the taste of fresh home grown vegetables can't be beaten.

It is also quite easy, very satisfying, good for the diet and exercise, and needn't disrupt your existing garden too much.

If you simply haven't the space for a dedicated vegetable patch, try growing stands of 'quality' vegetables such as calabrese, radishes or asparagus within your existing scheme.

Whether you have lots of space or not, the ground will have needed preparation in late autumn or early winter with thorough digging and inclusion of well-rotted compost or manure.

Helped by winter frosts and weather, the soil then breaks down into a crumbly and workable soil which can be sown or planted when moist but not when wet or waterlogged.

It pays to buy top quality seeds and plants and, when sowing seeds in drills, follow proven advice: don't sow too early, too deeply or too thickly.

Crops to consider starting in April, if you haven't already, are:

broad beans, brussels sprouts, sprouting broccoli, cabbage, carrot, cauliflower, celery, leek, lettuce, onion from seed or sets, parsnip, peas, potatoes, radish, spinach or from seed under glass, tomato.

Though onions tend to be cheap enough in the shops I enjoy growing them and leaving the tops on for braiding and hanging in the kitchen until needed. If you are pushed for space or don't like the idea of a special batch of regimented ground for vegetables, you can always try mixing different vegetables or herbs close together.

This contradicts the view that yields will suffer, but recent findings show the rules can be bent if you plant certain crops with certain partners.

Turnips, for instance, will happily co-exist alongside peas but may suffer when paired with other crops. Peas are less fussy and make a good partner for beans, carrots, corn and potatoes.

Other 'team fixtures' you can try are:

- Asparagus v. basil, parsley or tomatoes
- Beans v. marigolds, celery or potatoes
- Beetroot v. carrots, onions, kohlrabi, cauliflower, kale, broccoli, brussels, turnips or cabbage
- Carrots v. onions, parsley — which repels carrot fly, — beets, peas or sage
- Corn v. beans, cucumber, lettuce, soya-beans or spinach
- Cucumbers v. corn or radishes
- Lettuce v. cabbage, onions or radishes
- Nasturtiums v. potatoes
- Onions v. carrots, lettuce or radishes
- Peppers v. carrots, egg plants or peas
- Radishes v. carrots, lettuce or spinach.

If you want to try something even more unusual, try growing lettuce, basil, nasturtiums, borage or basil in the strawberry patch!

## Ardmore Delegation Meets Minister For The Environment



A delegation from the Ardmore Enterprise Co-op met with Mr. John Browne, Minister for State at the Dept. of the Environment on April 7 last at the Custom House in Dublin. The delegation was accompanied by Mr. Brendan Kenneally T.D.

The Ardmore public water supply is in urgent need of upgrading in order to keep pace with the expansion of Ardmore as a popular tourist resort. Unfortunately, during the past few summer seasons, supply difficulties and shortages have been experienced by both residents and visitors.

Waterford County Council have put forward three alternative proposals to the Dept. of the Environment, which will resolve the current problems being experienced. Detailed discussions have taken place between

Waterford County Council, Ardmore Enterprise Co-op and the Dept. of the Environment over the past year, in search of a solution to the problem.

Minister Browne deputised for Minister Michael Smith who was unavoidably unavailable. The Ardmore delegation was led by Richard Lincoln, Chairman, who was accompanied by Mr. John Moloney, Vice-Chairman and Ms. Caroline O'Sullivan, Secretary of the Ardmore Enterprise Co-op. The Minister was accompanied by Dept. of the Environment Officials, Mr. John Harte, Ms. Margaret Farrelly and Mr. Colm Keena. Mr. Brendan Kenneally T.D. met the delegation at Dail Eireann prior to accompanying it to the Custom House.

It was pointed out to the Minister that the lack of a

reliable water supply is a barrier to the economic development of the area. This water problem is preventing Tourism growth, in particular. As a result, Ardmore is not achieving its employment potential.

The Minister and his officials complimented Ardmore on its community achievements. They were most sympathetic and supportive of this and other community led projects in Ardmore. The funding for the water supply project relies heavily on EU Structural Funds which are currently the subject of de-

bate between Brussels and Dublin. Projects will be allocated funds on the basis of priority; as demands exceed the likely availability.

It would appear that Ardmore can make a very strong case on the basis of the increased economic activity and jobs potential that would result. Such a case is currently being prepared by Waterford County Council officials.

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## Easy-to-prepare Supper



Fancy a nutritious and easy-to-prepare supper? If you've sausages and beans to hand — you should try our:—

### SAUSAGE AND BEAN SUPPER

**Ingredients**  
2 sausages  
1 small onion, chopped  
1 small can barbecue baked beans

1 medium potato, cut into 1.25cm (1/2") pieces  
1 small can chopped tomatoes  
salt and black pepper

#### Method

Place all the ingredients, except the sausages, into a saucepan. Bring to the boil, cover and simmer. Meanwhile, grill the sausages for 10-12 minutes. Remove and slice. Add to the saucepan, cover, and cook for a further 10 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Serve with wholemeal bread and vegetables. N.B — A small can of baked beans in tomato sauce could be used instead of the barbecue baked beans. Try using different varieties of




sausages, e.g. Lincolnshire, pork, pork and beef. Try adding any left over vegetables.

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

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## RECENT DEATHS

## BROTHER CALLS IT A DAY!

Brother Jimmy O'Connor the longest serving Brother in St. Joseph's Special School, Ferryhouse, Clonmel, and a much loved father figure to thousands of young boys, has called it a day. The man from Ballyporeen arrived in St. Joseph's, Ferryhouse in 1954 for a three weeks stay and has been there ever since.

He retired last Thursday week after forty years dedicated child care service. His

abiding memories of the forty years he spent in Ferryhouse are the friendships he developed with the boys, and the "mighty spirit" that was evident there. On Friday night week last Brother O'Connor was feted by his colleagues at Ferryhouse, staff and the boys, as glowing tributes were paid to him and presentations made at a function. Brother O'Connor will remain in Ferryhouse following his retirement.

His primary role over the years was to provide child care service and give advice, understanding and patience to the boys. At the end of the day our objective was to do everything for the lads that would help them stand on their own two feet when they went from here at the age of sixteen years, he said.

One of a family of three from a farming background in Ballyporeen, he joined the Rosminians in 1948 and

after a period based in Kilmurry, Kilworth, Co. Cork, he came to Ferryhouse on March 3, 1954. There were two hundred boys in residence there and eleven members of the Rosminian Order. At that time Ferryhouse catered for the homeless and destitute. There they made their own clothes and shoes and life there revolved around the working of the farm. His first Superior there was that great Cork hurler Fr. Con Cottral.

Their first convent was in Cappoquin and within the next 20 years convents were set up in Dungarvan, Stradbally, Portlaw, Dunmore East, Waterford, Carrick-on-Suir, Kilmacthomas, Clogheen, Ballyporeen and Clonmel. Their chief works were visiting and nursing the sick, helping to alleviate poverty and educating poor children. In the newly established work-houses in Clonmel, Clogheen, Dungarvan and Waterford, they laboured in dire circumstances. They also nursed in the Fever Hospitals in Lismore and Clogheen.


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# Lismore Notes



## SCHOOLS MERGER MEETING

A meeting was held in Lismore Hotel on Tuesday 12th April last to inform the parents of the proposed merger of Lismore C.B.S. and Presentation Convent primaries. The meeting was called by the trustees of both schools.

Mr. Jim Halley was chairman and representing the trustees were Rev. Bro C. Horgan, and Rev. Sr. Imelda. Also present in their official capacities were Rev. Bro. Mulally and Miss

Deirdre O'Shea principals of both primaries and Rev. Fr. Aidan Fenton Board of Management, Presentation Primary. Sr. Imelda and Bro. Horgan. Both spoke in turn as to why they (the trustees) were proposing the merger.

A question and answer session then took place. Arising from the answers it does appear that the amalgamation was first mooted in 1991 with the amalgamation to take place on the

Presentation Primary School site.

The pro's and con's of the for's and against's were debated at length. Many questions asked by the parents remain unanswered, however, if the amalgamation goes ahead and going on projected numbers over the next 3 years there will be a loss of two teaching promotion in addition to one teaching post. Unanswered is the amount of the local contribution (15%) to build the new co-ed school on the present Convent site. Another question which created much debate was the provision of a proper playing pitch for the boys, at present in the brothers. They have their own field for hurling, football, soccer etc.

One of the most important items to emerge from the meeting is that regardless of a merger or not the Community School plan will commence at the C.B.S. As so many questions remained unanswered it was felt another meeting will be necessary so as the parents can be properly informed and that plans can be seen on paper for the new building.

Some comments were passed on the media coverage the merger has received in the last few weeks, both in the national and local papers.

We ourselves make no apologies to anyone for what we have written in this column over the last 3 weeks. Our reason strictly for writing what we did was to advertise and make parents aware of the meeting as all parents were not circled. We speak of the parents whose children will be starting school in the next few years. We broke no confidentiality in our column and we will continue to write on the merger and keep our readers informed as to what is happening in the future.

# I.F.A. Takes Stand On Occupiers Liability

The I.F.A. is the major national representative body for Irish Farmers in all sectors representing approximately 80,000 members and their families. The objective of the Association is to promote and protect the interests of Irish farmers both domestically and at E.U. level.

The need for reform in legislation in the area of Occupiers Liability was identified through its farmer members as a result of:

1. The increased use of the Irish countryside for sporting and recreational purposes.

2. The experience of other property owners in the State concerning legal claims arising out of personal injury, particularly property under the control of semi-state bodies and commercial operations in urban settings.

3. The increased incidence of legal claims for personal injury being brought against private property owners, including farmers, in the State.

The law on occupiers liability at present is determined by common law and is, therefore, subject to change on a case by case basis. Because of the changing nature of Irish society resulting in greater demands for access to rural landscape for leisure activities and agri-tourism, farmers have concerns about increasing pressure on their liabilities to 3rd parties.

In simple terms I.F.A.'s position is as follows —

1. That no duty of care be owed to trespassers.

2. That licensee (i.e. non invited visitors, picnickers, casual hunters, fishermen etc) be treated as trespassers.

3. That invitees be afforded a reasonable duty of care.

The area of invitees is the most contentious as it covers the interests of invited guests - hunts, shooters, tourists, fishermen, sports-bodies etc. all of whom are welcomed by farmers but who may unintentionally represent a major financial threat in the case of an accident.

I.F.A. feel this area needs to be clearly defined so as to give a solid secure basis for the infrastructure of farm business and agri-tourism in the future. Some of the features required would include —

(A) Notices and signs pointing out dangers should exclude liability towards children.

(B) Voluntary assumption of risk be accepted in practice and in law by all participants, as in English law.

(C) Protection from mischievous legislation from "men of straw" - the costs of defending such cases can be penal.

(D) Duties of care by the occupier should be balanced by duties of responsibility by the entrant/invitee/licensee.

Examples of particular concern to rural property owners which would need to be covered by law reform would be as follows:

Voluntary assumption of risk - can a landowner be protected from indirect participants, e.g. followers of a hunt etc.

Children trespassing - e.g. interfering with agricultural operations.

Farmers have always respected their role as custodians of the Irish countryside and have

sought to ensure that access is relatively unhindered for sportsmen or tourists, provided common courtesy and the protection of livestock and property is respected. Indeed as members of rural communities who contribute both economically and socially to the development of their communities, farmers have a very real interest in seeking to ensure that the development of rural communities is not impeded as a result of restricted access to farmlands.

I.F.A. does not wish to see access to the Irish countryside being restricted as a result of failure on the part of

the Government to enact meaningful reform in the legislation which deals with this problem. However, the likely outcome of failure to implement reform of legislation in this area will be a closedown of the total Irish countryside.

The central issue which must be addressed is that the real concerns of farmers must be allayed by urgently enacting reforming legislation which will result in no liability for farmer/occupiers for personal injury caused to an entrant where there is no commercial or other direct interest in the entrant on the part of the landowner.



# Colaiste Na Rinne Welcomes Michael D. Higgins

Yet another important milestone in the 85 year old history of Colaiste na Rinne was achieved last Thursday when the Minister for Arts, Culture and the Gaeltacht, Michael D. Higgins, officially opened the famous Gaeltacht college's newly refurbished and modernised Buildings.

Greeted by enthusiastic pupils, teachers, parents and invited guests alike, the Minister was obviously delighted to officiate at such an historic event, coming particularly at a time he felt when a "brand new atmosphere of goodwill towards the Irish language" existed nationwide. Grant aided by Roinn na Gaeltachta, to the tune of £250,000, the intensive £1.5 million refurbishment programme incorporating a new roof and accommodation facilities had been ongoing since 1988.

## "FEAR MOR NA GAEILGE É"

Proceedings at the impressive sun baked college commenced with a welcoming speech by an Chathaoirleach Aonghus Uas. O hEocha, whose late father Seamus O hEocha, known as the 'fear mór' was founding member and with whom the college has been synonymous.

Praising Minister Higgins for his intewense support of and involvment with the Irish language, Mr. OhEocha then traced the history of the college from small beginnings in

1909 to the renowned all-Irish speaking educational centre it is today. Founded in 1909 on land owned by James Villiers-Stewart, the Ring College boasted 29 pupils by 1919 while today over 180 pupils walk its hallowed halls.

In his speech Mr. O hEocha included Muiris Buidhléir, retired principal, Máire Ní Cheilleachair, present principal, Micheál O Domhnaill, retired manager and Liam Suipéil, present manager.

The building was then blessed by Fr. Conchubair O Dálaig, PP.

## NEW PRO-IRISH ATMOSPHERE

Addressing the representative attendance present, Minister Higgins spoke of a "new pro-Irish atmosphere" which he stressed was important to take full advantage of and to strengthen.

Underlining his words, the Minister then confirmed that the Ring College is to benefit from a further sizeable amount, this time in the form of a £250,000 once-off grant from his de-

partment which will go towards the provision of new dormitories and office reception areas.

Lauding the college founders as pioneers of the revival monement, Minister Higgins praised the many spectacular educational achievements of Colaiste na Rinne. Dúirt sé go bhfuil "cáil ar an scoil maidir le múineadh na Gaeilge. Cuireann an scoil roimpi caighdeán ard líofachta agus cruinnis a chithú sna daltaí agus is geal mar a bhaineann sí an sprioc sin amach".

In 1993 alone a total of 175 courses involving 24,000 students had been held around the country and the Minister regarded the financial assistance for them from his department as money well spent. "Táim sásta gur fiú go maith an t-airgead a chaithearn an dá Roim", [an Roim Oideachais agus a Roim féin].

From 1909 to the present

day, thousands of those who attended Irish course at the Gaeltacht college, are now taking an active part in every walk of life in the country. "Déarfainn gur fánach an duine díobh nár fágadh faoi dhraíocht ag fáilteacht na ndaoine, ag binneas a nGaeilge agus ag áilleacht cheantar na Rinne".

## OFFICIAL OPENING

Suitably armed with a pair of scissors, the Minister then cut the blue and white ribbon to declare the buildings officially open. "Tá an-áthas orm é sin a dhéanamh", a deir sé.

Mr. O hEocha subsequently presented the Minister with a Ring Crystal vase, a copy of the History of the College and a St. Bridget's Cross made by local resident

Peig Bean Uí Reagáin.

To further mark this historic occasion, a beech tree i gcuimhne na h-ocáide was planted by an tAire in the college grounds.

## TEILIFIS NAGAEILGE

Speaking later to reporters, the Minister confirmed that the new Teilifís na Gaeilge channel was bang on schedule for a late Autume '95 switch on.

Rejectiong previous suggestions that the money involved in the project was a waste of taxpayers money, Minister Higgins stressed that the new station will be more educationally oriented with one of the 3 daily broadcasting hours devoted to children.

"I am confident that the new station will be an out-

standing success, and that it will identify with more and more people with the passage of time".

The Minister then stressed the importance of ni=urturing and preserving the Irish heritage "especially in these days of international relations".

"Only people who nurture their own culture and heritage can fully understand other cultures and so help to further the cause of world-wide peace."

In all, a highly successful and memorable day was staged by Colaisrte na Rinne's Board of Management, a day which will certainly go down in the history books and evoke many a happy memory for years to come. Go n-eirf an t-ádh libh.

### Narrow Defeat

De La Salle 1-11 Tallow 2-7

Despite the truth of the old saying that it's better to nearly lose than nearly win, this narrow defeat of our senior hurlers in Cappoquin on Saturday evening last had some positive aspects which give hope for Tallow's immediate future. True, De La Salle deserved their win - they scored 12 times to our 9 - but they truly appreciate how easily the game could have indeed levelled as time ticked away with Tallow surging forward. The final whistle sounded with Tallow still pressing forward and many spectators - with the obvious exception of city followers - wondered why extra time wasn't added on to compensate for those two long second half stoppages. I dare not offer an opinion, only the referee can explain that conundrum, and sour grapes are never very palatable. Tallow's late late show was too little too late.

De La Salle made a bright

start and were leading 0-3 to 0-0 before Tallow got their first score and immediately began to settle down. The sides were level after ten minutes and Tallow enjoyed a spell of possession for the next fifteen minutes which, alas, yielded no score. Several near misses but no flag raised. That was an ominous spell for the Bridesiders because applying pressure without scoring saps much of a team's calmness and confidence. Weathering a storm is a massive boost to defences. Those clearances pressurise the opposition and force him into error. The continuous supply of good ball to the De La Salle forward line was an indictment of our own forwards who, far too often, allowed city backs to clear unhindered. Far more pressure by our forward division, and our half forwards in particular, wouldn't have allowed their opponents the luxury of plac-

ing clearances so accurately.

Those long stoppages early in the second half created a lull and abruptly halted whatever momentum Tallow had built up by their determined restart to the second half. It took the introduction of the experienced Tim Sheehan and Philly Curley to lift the team to such effect that Tallow were transformed from a hitherto supine bunch to a fiercely committed team over the last quarter. Herein lies the reason for optimism. Any group of hurlers who can reduce an intimidating ten or eleven point lead to one within the space of a few minutes has a future. They showed they have spirit and a refusal to throw in the towel and to accept defeat tamely are hopeful signs for the remaining championship games. We may have lost the first battle but there is a long war to be waged and with no sign of the white flag of surrender from Tallow, time allows us the opportunity to prove our worth over the next month or so.

Martin Murphy was a great goalie who had a busy time and enhanced his already high reputation. To be over-critical of the backs would be most unfair. They were under severe pressure coping with a slick, speedy forward line which included Johnny Brenner, Noel Dalton and Eoin Dunphy. Brian Henley and Mark Geary did quite well at midfield, life being made difficult for them with the midfield area often bypassed. Our forwards need a lot of target practice and some sharpening up if the next game is to be won. A better return must come from the six with the emphasis on points. Free taking must be attended to also.

## GLENCAIRN POST OFFICE TO CLOSE

Glencairn Post Office situated halfway between Lismore and Ballyduff is to close its door on Friday 22nd April.

News of its closure was indicated by letter from postal headquarters in Mallow to Mrs. Aileen Coughlan on Wednesday last. The letter was brief, to the point. It thanked Mrs. Coughlan for her family's service and informed her of the imminent closure of the Post Office.

Cllr. Willie McDonnell, on behalf of the people in Glencairn has taken up the issue with the Postal Headquarters. The abrupt way in which the closure of the Post Office has come about and the short notice issued to Mrs. Coughlan is unacceptable to say the least. The late postmaster Ma Liam Coughlan, R.I.P. died only five weeks ago and he has served as postmaster for 10 years. Previous to that the family of Mrs. Coughlan (nee Lehane) have served in the Post Office since its establishment in 1905.

The people of the area are very concerned and disturbed by the news of the Post Office closure. Those who use the Post Office for collection of pensions, social welfare entitlements and children's allowance will be greatly inconvenienced. (Amount in question to cover these payouts total £3,000 a week) Cllr. McDonnell indicated that the closure of the Post Office is of greatest concern to the Cistercian Community in St. Mary's Abbey. They use the service daily for posting Communion Hosts (made in the Abbey) to various parts of the country and their dealings with the postal service are considerable.

Cllr. Willie McDonnell indicated that in the long term - in line with Post Offices of similar size that the area would inevitably have to accept the possibility of the closure of the Post Office. His concern is for the manner in which the closure came about - so soon after the death of the late postmaster. The human aspect of life had not been taken into account.

# Poker And Fruit Machines To Be Returned To Owner

A Circuit Court Judge this week ordered the return of thirty five poker and fruit machines valued at between £30,000 and £40,000 to the owner of an amusement arcade who had been previously convicted in the District Court on a number of offences under the Gaming and Lotteries Act.

Dungarvan Circuit Court heard on Tuesday that the machines had been seized by gardai from the premises of John Doyle at Grattan Square, Dungarvan, following a third inspection of the premises.

Doyle, the court heard, was subsequently charged and convicted in respect of the illegal operation of the ma-

chines, and in addition to being fined also had an order made against him for their forfeiture.

Mr. J. Maher B.L. (instructed by M. T. O'Donoghue and Co. Solrs.), told Judge Sheridan that the appeal before the court was only against the severity of the penalties imposed on Doyle. More specifically the appeal was against the order made for the forfeiture of the machines.

He added that if the machines were returned to Doyle he (appellant) was quite willing to donate their contents — believed to be about £1,000 — to a local charity.

Sgt. Tom O'Grady told the court that all the machines

seized by him from the appellant's premises were being operated illegally. Instead of a maximum stake of two pence some had been adapted to take coins of up to £1 in value with a payout of £20, £30 and up to £100 instead of the legal maximum of fifty pence.

Sgt. O'Grady said Doyle had no previous convictions and had fully co-operated with them. The machines were presently in the custody of the gardai and their contents could be between £1,000 and £3,000.

Mr. Maher BL said he could give an undertaking to

the court that if the machines were returned to the appellant they would be adapted to comply fully with the law. Doyle was also very anxious to donate their financial contents — which he put at about £1,000 — to charity.

"It's an ill wind that doesn't do somebody good," said Judge Sheridan, who directed that the machines be returned to Doyle — on the clear undertaking that they will never again be operated illegally. He also ordered that their financial contents be given to the Dungarvan Conference of St. Vincent de Paul.







# Western Board Meeting

Padraig S. O Riain, Chairman, presided at last week's meeting of the Western Board and at which there was a good attendance. A number of clubs were not represented. The minutes as circulated were adopted and Nioclás Mac Craith complimented the Runaí and said clubs were grateful for the service as the minutes could be copied and circulated to committee members for discussion at club meetings.

Arising out of the minutes, the Chairman informed the members that himself and the Secretary had met with the Referees Committee and had discussions of interest to both. Arising out of that meeting, an invitation had been extended to the referees to have certain matters outlined to club delegates which pertained to the handling and management of games and the Chairman said he had invited Jim Landers to address the meeting.

## CONDUCT ON THE FIELD

Jim Landers told the delegates that the matter which was of most concern to referees at the present time was the liberal use of foul and abusive language by players on the field and very often by mentors on the sideline. The players thought nothing about using dirty language, not alone against opponents and officials, but also against people on the sideline. He warned that a referee was empowered to penalise players by awarding a free when language was used. He also spoke about the problem of sideline control and incursions on to the field of play.

He told the meeting that referees had taken a decision at a meeting this week that in future, matches would not start unless the referee was fully satisfied that there would be no interference from the people on the line who are expected to be seated during the course of the game. He also spoke about players being unaware of a number of the playing rules and outlined the particular rules which referees had in mind. He asked that clubs and officials take the message back to their clubs.

The Chairman thanked Jim Joe and impressed on clubs the importance of complying with the referee directives. He promised full cooperation by the Board.

## MATCH PASSES

The recent decision by County Board to charge a fee of £30 to members who are entitled to passes to our games was referred to when the Chairman told the delegates that the Officer Board are proposing to issue match passes to referees, umpires, officers, etc. and that these would operate for divisional games for the coming sea-

son. The Eastern Board had taken a similar decision.

Some delegates thought this might cause confusion as now there would be two different types of passes operating in the West. The meeting, following a discussion, agreed to the recommendation. It was pointed out that County Board passes will not admit bearers to Divisional Board games.

## ADMISSION PRICES

The following admission prices were agreed for the season: Minor games £1; U/21 games, £1.50; double headers £2; finals £2. Adult games, junior and intermediate £2; double headers £2; junior finals £2; inter. football finals £3.

The Chairman said he favoured low admission prices and with everyone paying.

## PRESS RECEPTION

The importance of sponsorship and the generosity of the firms, etc., in the West who sponsored the divisional championships was emphasised when clubs were being reminded of their obligations in this regard. A press reception to launch the 1994 sponsorship for the Board will take place at Lawlor's Hotel on tomorrow Thursday night at 8.30 p.m. and the Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer of all clubs in the division have been invited and are expected to be present. A club member may deputise for an officer unable to attend.

## OUTSTANDING TICKET MONEY

Referring to the interim report on the outstanding ticket money which was presented to the December meeting of the County Board, the Chairman told the meeting that the Western Board's liability in this matter would be honoured and every effort was being made to collect the outstanding monies from individuals and clubs who had a responsibility in the matter. He said the outstanding amount from the Western Board was £592 and this included what was due by the clubs and individuals referred to.

Ollie Wilkinson said he was delighted to hear the Chairman state the amount due to be £592 as this was the exact figure which was found to have been owed in April of 1993. He also complimented the Western Board Chairman on the stand taken by him at the last meeting of the County Board when delegates attempted to raise the matter.

He referred to the manner in which the banquet account was dealt with in the interim report and said it was an absolute disgrace. Jimmy O'Gorman also referred to that report and said the people responsible had not heard the end of it.

## DISCIPLINARY COMMITTEE

The Chairman announced that there would have to be a change in the composition of the disciplinary committee and both himself and the secretary would need to be replaced. At the request of the meeting, Denis McGrath, who had recently resigned from the committee, agreed to withdraw his resignation and remain on as a member. This brings the membership to five as agreed.

## CHAMPIONSHIP PROGRESS REPORT

The secretary explained to the meeting why there was such a disruption of matches and gave an account of the number of venues which were declared unplayable over the previous two weeks.

He stated that the Clashmore/Ardmore junior hurling game fixed for the coming weekend was called off because Michael Fenton, Clashmore was a member of the under-21 football team to play Clare at Tipperary on Wednesday night. This game was refixed for Tuesday, April 26.

Also, the secretary stated that the two cancelled rounds of the minor football championship would be played on Friday, April 22 and on bank holiday Monday, May 2. He said that other cancelled matches would be fitted in when possible and convenient.

The chairman offered the congratulations of the Board to both Kilrossanty (U/21) and St. Patricks (minor) football winners of their respective county finals which were outstanding from 1993 and played last month.

# Waterford v. Clare At Tipperary

It was our most successful championship last year and the team having played in four championship games, winning three, won them many new supporters who are expected to stand by them again this year, so hopefully there will be a big attendance from Waterford when they line out against the Banner county to-night.

The team, announced on Sunday, will include eight of the team which played in the Munster final last year. In fact the full forward line of Fergal Cunningham, Kieran Whelan and David Whelan, is the same as that which lined out for the game against

Kerry at Walsh Park last year.

The team looks a very strong side and despite Clare's very high rating, our side will be very difficult to beat. Oddly enough the team includes no player of the three clubs who contested the closing stages of the

1993 championship in the grade, some week ago. This is an indication of its real strength.

No panel of players have trained better or with greater commitment over the past few months and team trainer Larry Tompkins and the selectors are satisfied that nothing more could have been done in preparation for this vital test. Let's hope that the trainer, selectors and players will be rewarded for all they have put into their preparation.

## OUR UNDER-21 FOOTBALL RECORD

Over the past five or six years a huge effort has gone into preparing teams for this championship and as will be seen from the following record, we did, on a number of occasions go tantalisingly close to a breakthrough. But it has been like the story with some of the other grades, we didn't have the 'killer' blow when it was needed.

1987 — We are pitted against the reigning Munster and All-Ireland champions, Cork and if we had not missed a couple of early goal-scoring chances on a fine sunny evening in Middleton, we would have been far closer than the final score of 3-12 to 1-7 at the

end of this first rounder.

1988 — We got the better of Limerick in the opening round at Dungarvan and we won on a 2-7 to 1-4 scoreline. In the next game, which was the Munster semi-final, we lost narrowly to Clare on a score of 1-6 to 1-4 — a great chance lost.

1989 — We got to the final of the South Eastern League and lost to Tipperary by 0-8 to 0-6 at Clonmel. In the championship we went to Emly, Co. Limerick to meet Clare. It was an awful evening, weather-wise, and we drew, Waterford 0-7 Clare 1-4. A week later at Kilmallock we wasted too many chances and lost by 2-4 to 0-5.

1990 — This year we beat Tipperary in the final of the South Eastern League and looked forward to a good championship run. Unfortunately the same Tipperary side beat us in the first round of the championships at Clonmel by the narrow margin of 1-5 to 0-7. A heartbreak indeed.

1991 — We beat Limerick by 1-9 to 0-8 at Kilmallock and ran Kerry very close at Walsh Park in the semi-final when they won by 1-11 to 1-6.

1992 — We created some justifiable fuss over our game against Kerry in the first round, some of our players having had to travel a round trip of 320 miles. The Milton venue was in the 'back of the beyonds' as far as we were concerned for a midweek fixture in March. The star-studded Kerry side beat us by 5-19 to 0-6.

1993 — It was a great year for the grade. We beat Limerick before a big crowd in the 'closing down' match at Fraher Field and we won by 2-13 to 0-10. This was our biggest win in over a decade in the grade. In the semi-final we got home advantage and played a tremendously exciting draw with Tipperary (0-11 each). The replay at Clonmel went to extra time before we qualified for a Munster final meeting with the mighty Kerry. We won in Clonmel by 1-14 to 0-12.

Kerry were at full stretch all the way in the final at Walsh Park and were able to pull away near the finish for a 1-21 to 3-5 victory.

## VEC Call For Kilmac' School Extension

The County Waterford Vocational Education Committee is to call on the Department of Education to sanction badly needed permanent accommodation facilities at St. Declan's Community School, Kilmacthomas.

Chief Executive Officer, Kieran Heffernan, informed his fellow committee members that the Kilmacthomas

School currently caters for 448 pupils. This figure is expected to rise next year to 530, while in 1996 six hundred pupils are expected to attend the community school.

Stressing the need for additional school facilities, Mr. Heffernan stated that a permanent extension to the school would prove more feasible than providing temporary accommodation facilities.

Cllr. Austin Flynn strongly urged that the Committee resist any move by the Department to provide extra pre-fab classrooms. "They're not cost effective and they're not a good place to work in," he said.

On the proposal of Cllr. Tom Cunningham and seconded by Cllr. Michael O'Riordan, the Committee unanimously agreed to request the Department to sanction a permanent extension for the Kilmacthomas School.
