## Labour Target Three Seats

Labour has set itself a target of equalling its best ever achievement of three seats on Dungarvan Urban Council following the selection of outgoing councillors Billy Kyne and Paddy Power together with Waterford County Council member Lar Hart.

Cllr. Hart will be contesting the UDC election for the first time, but after a spectacular successful first venture into politics in 1991 when winning a County Council seat he will be

strongly fancied to win again this time round.

This is seen as the most formidable Labour election "team" ever in Dungarvan. The possibility of adding a fourth candidate may be considered at a party meeting next weekend but it is thought unlikely that they will do so.

Meanwhile Democratic Left has selected the present Chairman of Dungarvan Urban Council, Cllr. Tony Wright, and the P.R.O. of the local branch Christy Power, to contest the June 9 election.

They were the unanimous choice of delegates at a convention chaired by the General Secretary of the D.L. Mr. John Gallagher.

Director of elections, Eamonn Martin, has expressed confidence in their ability to get both candidates elected.

One of three Independents, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan — formerly of Fine Gael — has declared his intention to stand again, but as yet there has been no official announcement from the other two Independents, Cllrs. Austin Hallahan and Mary Dixon.

## Deputy Deasy To Answer The Call

Fine Gael has turned to former Minister for Agriculture Austin Deasy to raise the party's flagging fortunes in Dungarvan where its present representation on the Urban Council — one seat — is its lowest ever.

Deputy Deasy has answered the party call to contest the June 9 U.D.C. Election in his home town together with Cllr. Mario Flavin, who was recently co-opted onto the Council, and local District Hospital staff member Ms. Cissie O'Mahony.

Headquarters will ratify this trio this weekend, and will also consider adding the name of a fourth candidate, Peter Hayes, who has expressed a definite interest in a place on the official party "ticket".

Fine Gael dropped from three to two seats in 1985. However following the internal upheaval of recent weeks which resulted in the resignation of Cllr. Michael O'Riordan from the party, Cllr. Flavin is now the sole F.G. member on the Council.

Cllr. O'Riordan has since confirmed his candidature in the election as an Independent, a move that will make life even more difficult for Fine Gael.

Hence the party decision to turn to Deputy Deasy to salvage something positive from F.G. from the June 9 election. Coincidentally he began his rise to political prominence through winning seats on both Waterford County Council and Dungarvan Urban Council in 1967, but resigned from both following his appointment as Minister for Agriculture in the F.G./Labour Coalition Government of 1982.

FIANNA FAIL  
SELECT THREE

Meanwhile a Fianna Fail convention in Dungarvan last Saturday night selected outgoing Cllr. Nuala Ryan as one of three candidates to contest the election. The others are Austin Flynn, who is one of Fianna Fail's ten

members on Waterford County Council, and local businessman Frank Browne.

The convention marked the end of a distinguished political career for Declan Goode who decided not to seek re-election after twenty seven years of unbroken membership on the U.D.C.

Cllr. Goode is one of the best known G.A.A. personalities in the county having won All-Ireland minor and junior hurling medals with Waterford and being a member of the team narrowly beaten by Dublin in the 1938 All-Ireland senior final.

He subsequently became the longest serving G.A.A. County Board Secretary in the country, completing thirty three years in the post.

## LOCAL MAN WRITES BOOK ON CAROLE WILEY

"Thank you for the commitment, dedication and sincerity which you have brought to your work. Cork is proud of you, and I am pleased for Cork that we still have people of your calibre amongst us." So stated Sen. Denis Cregan, Deputy Lord Mayor, when he officiated at the launch of the new book by Dungarvan man Tom Keith about the work of Carole Wiley, the humanitarian aid worker from Carrigaline, who, for the last two years has been sending a regular supply of food and medical aid to the hospitals and refugee camps of the Mostar area.

Earlier, Most Rev. Dr. J. Buckley, Auxiliary Bishop of Cork and Ross had told the large attendance at the book launch at the Cork Spring Fair and Garden Show that he was well aware of the work that Carole was doing. "I am delighted to be able to acknowledge that work once more," he said, "and I am

pleased to further promote your work through this book."

Cork's best selling author, Alice Taylor congratulated author Tom Keith on "a fine book" on a subject in which the people of Ireland had taken a special interest. "Often books are written to put money into the author's pocket," she said, "but this book is being launched to ease some of the suffering of the world, and there can be no better cause than that."

Tom Keith, a native of Cahir, Co. Tipperary, has been working for the Local Authority in Dungarvan for the last twenty-eight years. He has been manager of the Dungarvan UDC's sports centre since it was built ten years ago. Tom took up writing five years ago and has had a good deal of published material to his credit. He has been active in a variety of social and caring organisations for many years and has contributed to

a number of local schools for the last sixteen years on boards of management or parents' councils. For a long time he was active in youth clubs and served several terms on the Waterford Regional Council.

He says in the foreword of his book that it was written "to highlight the suffering of the people of all ethnic backgrounds, acknowledge the exceptional generosity of the Irish people towards their suffering brothers and sisters and further promote the work of Carole Wiley and the other aid workers who are making a genuine and honest effort to help the victims of the war (in Bosnia).

The book runs to 213 pages with 30 photographs. It was printed by Lithopress, Middleton and is presently on sale around Munster bookshops at £5.99. This is Tom's first book and already he is working on a second, to be published later this year.

## Lost Youth Steals Bike

An English youth now residing in Cappagh, Co. Waterford pleaded guilty to two charges of larceny at Dungarvan District Court recently.

Claiming that he had pleaded guilty only because he had no choice in the matter, the defendant Bryan Cope was charged with stealing a ladies Hercules bicycle from Murray's Cross on July 12th and a mountain bike from Western Terrace on April 2 of last year.

Outlining the facts of the case, Garda D. Gavin told the court that on 27th July he had stopped the defendant at Kilrush cycling a stolen red ladies bicycle. On arresting the ex London resident, the Garda had subsequently searched the defendant's residence at Cappagh House, Cappagh, where he had discovered a stolen resprayed mountain bike in the garden.

"IN THE MIDDLE OF NOWHERE"  
Appearing without a solicitor, Cope told the court that on July 12th he had left

his Cappoquin job early and had walked for a number of hours before finding himself lost "in the middle of nowhere". Finding what he thought to be an 'abandoned' bike up against the hedge, Cope had availed of the opportunity and had taken it.

Referring to the second charge involving the theft of the mountain bike, Cope told the court that his story was too far fetched to be believed, but that he hadn't realised the bike was stolen.

"BIT OF MYSTERY"  
On hearing the defendant's story, Judge Michael

Pattwell deemed it to be a "rather loose variation of a bike falling off the back of a lorry".

"You're a bit of a mystery to me", added the Judge who then ordered a suitability report with regard to community service for the court sitting on May 11th.

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# Don't Let Your Plants Dry Up

Mulching might lack the glamour of real 'green-fingered' flower and vegetable growing, but it is every bit as important.

Mulching is the creation of a barrier of natural material on top of the soil, allowing rain and nutrients to sink in while 'keeping the lid on' things the gardener would rather keep below ground.

Public gardens, where labour is increasingly expensive and thinly spread, have long been aware that mulching:

- keeps weeds down by denying them heat, light and easy growth;
- keeps moisture in;
- maintains soil warmth.

Mulching has become even more crucial in recent years with a succession of dry — if not sunny — summers and widespread hosepipe bans.

So, as the days warm and weeds start to run riot, the benefits of mulching become more obvious and they need not cost a lot.

Favourites which also please the eye are pulverised bark and peat — although there are doubts whether it is ecologically correct to use the latter.

Both are also relatively expensive, so you may prefer to use old grass clippings and sawdust, chopped straw and even shredded newspaper as cheap and practical alternatives. Certainly, these cheaper mediums will be fine for the vegetable patch.

Stone gravel or chippings are best for rockeries or alpine collections. They are effective, tidy and, above all, look authentic.

Once you have decided what to use, wait for a good downpour, or, if there is no hosepipe ban in force, give the area a good watering. If you mulch after that, then you will retain the maximum amount of moisture before you start.

Other good tips for ensuring that your plants do not get too parched are:

- try to water before plants show signs of wilting;
- try to re-create the effect of light rain by using a fine rose on the watering can or hose — you don't want to batter the plants or wash away goodness;
- give the water a chance to get to the roots by soaking, yet not creating puddles on the soil;
- never water in the heat of the day — your efforts will evaporate quickly.

If you encounter another hosepipe ban or just like exercise, then the watering can is not quite as bad as it seems.

It definitely makes you think carefully about where and when to water and also enables you to add soluble fertiliser if necessary.

If you are happy to use a watering can, it is worth setting up a water butt to collect run-off from a gutter on your house, or an outbuilding such as a greenhouse or garage.

If you buy a butt fitted with a tap, make sure there is enough room to get a bucket or watering can beneath — set the butt on a brick or stout wooden plinth if necessary.

The extra work is worth it to conserve some all-too-rare rainfall and your plants will prefer it to tap water.

## Tax Payers and the General Public

At the April meeting of Waterford County Council, two notices of motion put down by Nire Valley Councillor, Ciaran O Riain (FF) regarding tax payers and the general public were unanimously passed by the members.

### EXTRAVAGANCE

The first of these motions stated "that in the light of recent events and the enormous cost to the Exchequer,

this Council call on the Government to end forthwith sending members of the Cabinet around the world on St. Patrick's Day."

Submitting that he was opposed to "this type of extravagance," Cllr. O Riain stated that it made little sense that so much money should be spent on sending the entire members of the Cabinet all over the world at the expense of the tax payer.

### STRUCTURAL FUNDS

Cllr. O Riain's second notice of motion read "that in view of recent statements made in Brussels by the EU Commissioner, Bruce Mulvan, responsible for structural funds, I am asking this Council to protest in the strongest possible manner."

Submitting that he had been astounded to hear the Commissioner declare that "not a penny of the struc-

tural funds would be spent on country roads," Cllr. O Riain stated that the Council did not need to be lectured on how their money should be spent.

"Whatever money this country receives from the Structural Funds should be a matter for the elected representatives, the Fianna Fail Councillor added.

The motion was seconded by Cllr. Oliver Coffey.

## A CHINESE PORK SALAD



Why not go on for a spot of home-made Chinese dish rather than a take-away? Here's a simple recipe for Chinese Pork Salad.

### Ingredients

225g (8oz) cooked pork, cut into strips

### Salad

227g (8oz) can pineapple pieces in natural juice, juice reserved  
2 medium carrots, peeled to make curls  
4 spring onions, cut into strips  
50g (2oz) mange tout, trimmed  
1/2 yellow pepper, seeded



and cut into strips  
1x15ml sp (1tbsp) sesame seeds, toasted\*  
**Dressing**  
3x15ml sp (3 tbsps) peanut butter  
1x15ml sp (1tbs) soy sauce  
3-4x15ml so (3-4 tbsps) reserved pineapple juice

### Method

Mix the dressing ingredients until smooth and glossy. Mix salad ingredients (except the sesame seeds) with the meat in a serving bowl. Spoon the dressing over the salad and toss to coat. Sprinkle with the toasted

sesame seeds. Serve immediately.  
**Serves 4.**  
\*To toast the sesame seeds, place in a saucepan over a medium heat. Dry fry until the seeds start to turn golden brown. Remove from heat immediately.

# Severe Smoke Problem At Childers Estate

The current smoke problem of two Childers Estate householders, commanded the serious attention of the members of Dungarvan Urban District Council at last week's meeting.

On deputation to the Council at the Town Hall venue were concerned residents, Mrs. Mary Power of 62 Childers Estate and Mr. and Mrs. Declan Barron also of Childers Estate, who all had experienced severe smoke problems in their respective council houses.

## DIABOLICAL

Outlining the main basis for his complaint, Mr. Barron explained that smoke had become a constant fixture of his Childers home since Christmas. On Christmas Day his front room had been full of smoke even in the absence of a lighted fire. The problem of the smoke, he claimed, was aggravated by neighbours fires and also by wind currents.

"I have worn a path to Cllr. Michael O'Riordan's house, Cllr. Tony Wright's house and Cllr. Mary Dixon's house in all kinds of weather", the aggrieved tenant declared. While warmly thanking these councillors for having made representations on his behalf, Mr. Barron felt it was "diabolical", that more effort had not been made to rectify the situation.

## FIRE ALARM WORN OUT

Mrs. Mary Power told the council that the smoke problem at her Childers residence had grown considerably worse over the past number of years. The 'upset' tenant claimed that the smoke had caused severe damage to the house including curtains and wallpaper, while her fire alarm had finally worn out. "I'm not going to stand for it much longer" stated Mrs. Power. She went on to say that when her fire was lighting, her neighbours would experience smoke problems and the opposite was also the case.

## ONUS ON COUNCIL

Having received the deputation a lengthy discussion ensued with council members determined to rectify the severe smoke problem as experienced by both tenants.

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan said since its construction in 1974, there had been continual smoke problems in Childers Estate. The onus he stressed was on the Urban Council to investigate the complaints made by these two 'proud' house-

holders and to ultimately solve the situation. Reiterating the sentiments expressed by Cllr O'Riordan, U.D.C. Chairman Tony Wright declared he had been in nearly all of the 114 houses in the Estate over the years because of smoke problems.

Cllr. Nuala Ryan, however, submitted there had never been a question of the council not taking any action against the smoke problem. "We left our fate in the hands of the Town Engineer", she added.

Having called to Mr. Barron's house on a number of

occasions and having installed a vent to disperse the smoke, Town Engineer George Taylor informed the members at the meeting that the problem could possibly result from the chimney pots which, he claimed, are on the same level. A solution to the ongoing smoke problem at Mr. Barron's house, would be to add an extension to one of these chimney pots.

It was then unanimously agreed by council members that the U.D.C. officials follow every avenue to rectify the situation for both Childers Estate householders.

## West Waterford Development Partnership Expands

Following a recent announcement by the Department of the Taoiseach and ADM Ltd., the area of operation of West Waterford Development Partnership Ltd., has been extended to cover all of County Waterford Rural. The name of the company is now being changed in recognition of the company's wider brief to Waterford Development Partnership Ltd.

The extension will facilitate the Partnership in its ongoing efforts to:

1 Make a successful "County Wide" application for Leader 11 for Waterford.

1 Expand the work being currently done to the entire County, including areas such as Portlaw, Rathcormac, Dunhill/Fenor, Tramore, Passage

East and Dunmore East.

1 The Partnership will continue its work with small enterprise development, small tourism initiatives, education, community animation and services to the unemployed.

With regard to Leader 11, the Partnership is currently finalising a draft plan which will be circulated throughout the area by mid May, and it will be in direct contact with all groups and bodies who have already contributed to the plan.

The Partnership would also welcome contributions/suggestions from individuals who haven't been in contact with the Partnership and where constructive suggestions are forthcoming, they will be taken into consideration.

# Loss For Lismore Heritage Company

Members of Waterford County Council were presented last week with a detailed financial report on the Lismore Heritage Company of which the council is a major shareholder.

Compiled by Acting Co. Manager Brian McNally, the report shows company trading losses of £84,443,

incurred in the first two years of operation.

The report also revealed that the Lismore Heritage company presently owes the council £71,825.

The main source of finance for the project came in the form of a non-returnable Co. Council grant of £75,000 and a further sum of £140,280 from Bord

Failte. The capital expenditure on the project by the Lismore company was £207,275 namely courthouse buildings, town improvements and fixtures and fittings.

A further sum of £20,000 to cover operating costs is to be given to the company this year as set out at the council's estimates meeting.

Labour Cllr. Paddy O'Callaghan expressed concern over the £89,000

deficit, stating that should this loss making trend continue, the council would find itself in trouble as it owned substantial shares in the company.


Defending the current company situation, however, Mr. McNally said that a break even point would be attained after a number of years and that it was normal for the company to experience a loss in the first few years of operation.

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

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# OPEN LETTER TO THE MINISTER FOR AGRICULTURE

Mr. Paddy Phelan, Toureigh, Ballymacarbry, has submitted the following letter on behalf of the United Farmers Association at which he is President to Mr. Joe Walsh, Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry:

Dear Minister,  
 You will be aware that farmers generally have suffered severe hardship and extraordinary livestock losses this spring owing to prolonged and incessant bad weather. The extreme weather conditions have greatly increased fodder expenses while at the same time drastically reducing stock numbers owing to livestock deaths. Lamb losses have been as high as 50% in outdoor situations, particularly along the Western seaboard. The situation is a national disaster for many farmers and calls for a rescue package to help alleviate to some extent the effects of the crisis. U.F.A. appeals to you to implement

the following measures as a matter of urgency:

(1) All monies due to farmers to be paid immediately;

(2) All farmers with forty five (45) Livestock Units or under be paid double headage on their full quota allocation. This double headage to be paid in the calendar year of 1994 in order that small farmers be in a financial position to hold sufficient stock to maintain their quota in future years;

(3) All unnecessary regulations such as compulsory R.S.I. numbers to be dropped for the weaker section of farming.

## THE CREDIT UNION AND YOU

Question — What protection have members shares/savings in the Credit

Union? Answer — There are many layers of protection

covering savings in the Credit Union. All monies received are banked regularly. Payments are made by cheque. Full books of account are kept and financial statements placed on public display in the credit union office. The Treasurer and all persons handling credit union cash are surety bonded.

The Supervisory Committee regularly checks the books of the Credit Union and evaluates its operation. This is an extra safety precaution, which is part of the group operation of the Credit union. Finally, annual certified returns must be lodged with the Registrar of Friendly Societies and are on public record.


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## A WHITE CHRISTMAS — 1929

## A Little Bit Of History



The above Shield recalls a little bit of history in Dungarvan during the Emergency years in the Second World War. It was presented by the "Irish Press" in 1942 for competition among L.D.F. members in the Ardmore, Lismore, Cappoquin, Learybrien and Dungarvan area. The competition consisted of 10 rounds fired from a .22 rifle at 25 yards at a target sized 9" x 9" and in charge were Commdt. Jim Mansfield, R.I.P., Capt. Mike Shalloe, R.I.P., Capt. A Farrell, R.I.P. and Lient. Con Dempsey. The winners of the Shield were Vol. Thomas Egan who scored 100 out of a possible 100 and Sg. Comm. W. Claxton (R.I.P.) who had a score of 96 out of a possible 100. The L.D.F. (Local Defence Force) was the forerunner of the present day F.C.A. (Forsa Cosaint Aitiuil).

# PATROL CAR WINDOWS SMASHED WITH SLASH-HOOK

A Garda Sergeant told Dungarvan Circuit Court that he and two of his colleagues feared for their personal safety when a man wielding a slash-hook smashed five windows of a patrol car in which they were occupants.

The court heard that this was one of a number of incidents involving 23 year old Frankie Keniry, 12 Ringasillogue, Dungarvan, when he went on a criminal rampage over a period of four months.

Jailing Keniry for four years, two of which were subsequently suspended, Judge Diarmuid Sheridan said he could not, and never would, condone acts of violence against gardai.

Keniry, who appeared before the court in custody, pleaded guilty to a series of charges relating to dates between August 28 and January 7 last.

These included assaults on

garda officers, criminal damage to two patrol cars with a slash-hook, and driving the same slash-hook through the windscreen of a van driven by Keniry's own brother at 3.30 in the morning.

The charges had originally been brought against Keniry in the District Court but the Judge refused jurisdiction because of the gravity of them.

Detailing an incident on January 7 last, Sgt. Tom O'Grady told Judge Sheridan that Keniry smashes five windows of a patrol car in which he and two other gardai were seated.

"He drove the slash-hook head high into the windows," said Sgt. O'Grady. "We feared for our personal safety and we were very lucky to have escaped serious injury."

Mr. Thomas Teehan B.L. prosecuting on behalf of the DDP, also told the court that around 3.30 a.m. on

November 27 Gardai John Twomey and Pierce Galvin met Keniry in a very excited and aggressive state. When he saw a van approaching he ran across the road, picked up a slash-hook from a concealed position and struck the windscreen of the van with it. The van was being driven at the time by Keniry's brother.

When told of Keniry's many previous convictions, Judge Sheridan sentenced him to a total of four years in jail. "I must protect gardai in the course of their duties," he said.

However when Keniry gave an undertaking under oath to the court to keep the peace for two years after his release from custody, and that specifically he will not interfere in any way with the gardai or garda property during that time, Judge Sheridan suspended the last two years of the sentence.

## VEC VACANCY AS HARTY RESIGNS

Members of the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee were informed last week of the verbal resignation of fellow committee member, Jim Harty.

A native of Gortnadiha, Ring, Mr. Harty is a former Fine Gael member of Waterford County Council and had served on the VEC for a period of 2 years.

Citing pressure of business as the reason for his decision, Mr. Harty had earlier tendered his resignation over the telephone to CEO Kieran Heffernan.

The CEO told the committee members that he asked to have the resignation in writing for this meeting, but so far it had not been received.

On behalf of the Co. Waterford VEC, Acting Chairman, Cllr. Con Casey, accepted Mr. Harty's resignation and thanked him for his considerable contribution to the committee.

News of the vacancy created by Mr. Harty's resignation will now be conveyed to Waterford County Council, who in turn will appoint a new committee member.

## HOPE FOR STRADBALLY ACTION GROUP

Following the Public Meeting and Information Session held some weeks ago to discuss the proposed development of a Pig-breeding and Fattening Unit at Rathnaskillogue, the Stradbally Action Group has continued to petition Waterford County Council in an attempt to have this development stopped. The

many letters sent in by members of the community demonstrating the concerns of local residents will certainly have made an impression on the Planning Officer and we are pleased now to be able to say that the Council have responded in a strong and responsible manner to the Application.

On 2nd March the Planning Officer replied to the Applicant as he is required to do and in a letter which voiced many of the concerns raised by the local community, he listed some eighteen points about which the Applicant is asked to provide further details, elaboration and clarification. These requests for further information are prefaced by a requirement for the Applicant to provide a non-technical summary of the Environmental Impact Statement which will 'clearly indicate to people without technical expertise the likely environmental effects and the steps being taken to deal with them'. Among the specific points raised are clarification of the amount of slurry that will be produced; the construction of a borehole on the site to assess the availability of water; proper legal contracts between the Applicant and the farmers who have agreed to take slurry; more specific soil surveys and samples from the site and from affected farms; an analysis of the Phosphorous content of the slurry and of the lands where it may be spread; details of existing slurry production of affected farms and how these figures are arrived at; along with detailed farm management programmes for each farm; elaboration of the methods of distributing the slurry and exactly how this will be achieved; an assessment of the visual impact of the development on the landscape; details of any alternative sites that were looked at and the reasons for their being rejected; a base line study of the existing flora and fauna of the site and affected areas; a structural engineer's report on the suitability of the site; more details regarding water seepage and run-off; further analysis of noise levels, odour pollution and traffic levels; an analysis of land-spreading techniques and odour reduction methods and how they might be applied in this instance and the possibility of spreading slurry somewhere further removed from the tourist sensitive village of Stradbally. New maps will have to be supplied indicating all dwelling, boreholes, water-courses, ditches and boundaries. New maps for all affected farms will have to show every building, how it is used and the type and number of animals kept in them. Farmers involved will also have to agree to apply for Planning Permission if they alter the rate of intensification of farming their lands. Considerable elabora-

tion is also required concerning the physical construction of the proposed buildings showing in particular how they will conform to various building standards.

Such a response from the County Council is very heartening and gives us hope that perhaps the development is seen as unsuitable as we know it to be. However, it is no time for the community to be complacent in this matter and until

a denial of Planning Permission is issued the Action Group will continue to bring pressure on the Council. The support of the local community and continued interest in this issue is absolutely vital if we are to gain our objective.

The Action Group will continue to keep you informed of any further development and express their thanks for your efforts so far.

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
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# SAD DAY FOR GLENCAIRN



The smallest Post Office in Ireland, located in the village of Glencairn, closed since last Friday. Note the sign which dates back to British days, explaining why it's only "as Béarla."

Situated at a crossroads, 3 miles from the West Waterford towns of Lismore, Tallow and Ballyduff, the small rural community of Glencairn was dealt a severe blow last week with the sudden closure of the Village's 88 years old Post Office.

News of the shocking closure was conveyed in writing from Mallow postal headquarters to Postmistress Aileen Coughlan on April 20, a mere 48 hours before the 4 p.m. deadline on Friday, April 22.

## LEHANE FAMILY

Reputed to be the smallest in Ireland, Glencairn Post Office was literally the size of two phone boxes. The Office was taken over by the Lehane family in 1906 when Aileen's father was Postmaster. Having completed her Post Office training in Blackrock, Aileen, now 75 years old, became Postmistress 40 years ago. In 1984 she handed over to her late husband Liam Coughlan R.I.P. who served as Postmaster to his death only 6 weeks ago.

## LOCAL ANGER

Serving the entire local community for nearly 90 years, the small Post Office constituted a major focus

for local residents. It has no fixed opening hours and customers could call at any hour, seven days a week. Payouts for pensions, social welfare entitlements and childrens allowance alone totalled £3,000 a week.

In the wake of Friday's abrupt closure, much concern and anger has been expressed by local residents, particularly the 40 senior citizens who now have to travel to either Lismore, Ballyduff or Tallow.

On behalf of the people in Glencairn, Cllr. Willie McDonnell has made numerous representations to the postal headquarters in Mallow and has recently confirmed that the closure decision is indeed irreversible.

"The abrupt way in which the closure of the Post Office has come about and the short notice issued to Mrs. Coughlan is unacceptable to say the least," slammed the Fine Gael Councillor.

Cllr. McDonnell further indicated that the closure of the Post Office is of greatest concern to the Cistercian Community in St. Mary's Abbey, the only Cistercian Convent in Ireland. The Sis-

ters used the postal service out of the local office on a daily basis to post Communion Hosts — made at the Abbey — to the four corners of the world.

Cllr. McDonnell's greatest concern is for the manner in which the closure came about — so soon after the death of the last Postmaster. The human aspect of life had not been taken into account.

Although having perma-

nently closed its doors to the public, the small Glencairn Post Office will, no doubt, live on in the hearts of many local residents who have availed of Aileen's office for so many decades.

In appreciation of the exceptional service rendered by the Lehane/Coughlan family for 88 years, a presentation was made by the local residents to Aileen on behalf of all in the area.

## No Success For VEC Sanction Requests

Members of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee were informed last week that ongoing representations for Departmental sanction of the appointment of a Co. Waterford Adult Education Officer, have, as yet, been unsuccessful.

Addressing the April meeting, CEO Kieran Heffernan stated that at present, Waterford and Louth are the only 2 counties in the country without an Adult Education Officer.

Mr. Heffernan further submitted that the former CEO had written to the Department of Education on a few occasions in 1993, requesting sanction to fill the empty post. The Department's reply however was that the Minister was "having the matter looked into".

On March 30, Mr. Heffernan had again personally written to the Department with no reply to-date.

"The situation continues to be most unsatisfactory",

declared the acting chairman Cllr. Con Casey, while Jimmy Byrne said the Department had continued to ignore the VEC's representations for far too long.

In the course of 1993, Adult Education Officers have been replaced on two other VECs.

It was unanimously agreed to defer the matter to the May meeting by which time it is hoped the Department will have responded to the VEC's most recent representations.

larceny of animals from farms in South Tipperary, South Kilkenny and Co. Waterford. ## RELEASE FROM PRISON DEMANDED

United Farmers' Association calls on our democratically elected government to immediately release from prison County Limerick farmer, Michael McElligot.

Mr. McElligot of Pallasgreen was sentenced to 3 months imprisonment in the district court on February 25 last on grounds that he was obstructing the Dept. of Agriculture in their operation of the TB Eradication Scheme. Mr. McElligot's appeal to the circuit court was heard on Tuesday, April 12. Judge Higgins affirmed the sentence.

Mr. Elligot agreed to have an animal on his farm, which was deemed to be a reactor, punched, to confirm reactor status, but would not agree to have the animal removed from his farm ex-

cept under Section 20 of the 1966 Act. Under this section, reactors are taken out by agreement between the Minister and the farmer.

In a high court case on October 3, 1989, taken by Con Howard, the system of removing reactors without agreement was adjudged to be ultra vires and was knocked down.

An appeal to the supreme court by the Minister against the judgment in the Howard case, which was due for hearing on January 19, 1993, was withdrawn on December 21, 1992.

Thus, the 1966 Act stands and Michael McElligot is in jail because he has stood for his legal and constitutional rights. He has also stood for the legal and constitutional rights of all cattle owners in the country.

## Co. Waterford ICMSA News

Mr. Tom Hickey, PRO for County Waterford ICMSA executive, outlines below changes made to the Suckler Cow Scheme for small scale milk producers which came into effect in the 1993/94 milk year.

Commission Regulation (EEC) No. 3886/92 Article 24 1 (b) states that the applicant must not increase his/her individual quota above the specified threshold during the 12 month period starting on the date of submission of the application. The current threshold is 25,638 gallons.

Prior to the implementation of this regulation, the relevant quota was the quota available to the applicant on 1 April in the year of application for the suckler cow premium. This included any quota which was part of a land/quota lease. It excluded quota which became available to the applicant after 1 April through temporary leasing arrangements or allocated as flexi-milk.

Under Regulation 3886/92 any quota, including flexi-milk quota, which becomes available to the producer during the year subsequent to the date of application for the suckler

cow premium and which increases his/her quota above 25,638 gallons, will make the applicant ineligible for the premium. While applicants for the suckler cow premium can regulate the leasing of quota through the temporary leasing scheme, they should be extremely careful regarding allocations of flexi-milk. Applicants for the suckler cow scheme should not accept an allocation of flexi-milk if this allocation pushes their quota above

25,638 gallons.

In the event of the applicants quota exceeding the quota limit of 25,638 gallons within 12 months of the application he/she will not be entitled to a suckler cow premium on foot of that application.

However, the applicant may apply for the suckler cow premium again at the earliest within one year of the previous application. Therefore, where the applicant's quota exceeded the limit of 25,638 gallons and

if the closing date for the scheme falls due before the end of the 12 month period associated with the previous application, the applicant must wait and submit a late application and accept the penalties, or wait until the following year to submit an application for suckler cow premium.

As farmers may not have been fully aware of these changes, ICMSA are seeking concessions for the 1993/94 milk year, concluded Mr. Hickey.

By increasing representation from the National Livestock Committee to 4 including the Chairman Richard Booth, the National Council recognise the importance of the cattle sector among our members and will ensure that it is kept top of

the IFA Agenda at all times."

IFA Livestock Committee Chairman Richard Booth said that this positive move will cement the livestock sector at the top in IFA. "Cattle farmers be they suckler producers, store producers or beef finishers can be assured that no stone will be left unturned by IFA in dealing with the issues that effect their incomes be it prices, premiums or quotas."

Mr. Booth added that the additional 3 representatives to National Council will be elected by the National Livestock Committee and with the Chairman will represent the 4 provinces and the different categories of producers within the livestock sector. Mr. Kevin Kinsella moves up to be-

come Director of the IFA Livestock Section with responsibility for all aspects of the cattle and sheep industry including premium payments.

Also at the recent National Council meeting, Livestock Committee Chairman, Richard Booth announced that IFA is to undertake a strategic programme for the development of the Irish beef sector. "This study will examine all aspects of the industry ranging from the producer to the processor through to the consumer. With the major policy changes agreed in CAP and GATT it is timely that we would examine the short and medium term prospects for the further development of the largest farming sector in Ireland."

In our youthful minds the Humps

and Hollows was also an ideal arena for Indians to attack the Cavalry resplendent in their navy uniforms and holstered six-guns which had arrived courtesy of that enigma 'Santa Claus'.

During early Autumn 'The Humps and Hollows' and surrounding fields adopted a more realistic setting as the quality soil produced inviting mushrooms willing to be rendered to those enthusiastic enough to trespass the farmers grass-land in the early morning when blades of grass sparkled like diamonds with the early morning dew.


# ABBEYSIDE SCOUT NOTES







**COUNTY BOARD MEETING**

**MOTION OF CENSURE DEFERRED**

A motion of censure against Munster Council representative, Jimmy O'Gorman being moved by county chairman Eamonn O Murchu at last Monday night's County Board Meeting was deferred until the May meeting, following a long debate in which about a dozen members became involved. The motion was a sequel to the matter which led to the adjournment one week earlier when Jimmy O'Gorman refused to resume his seat following an altercation with the chair.

The chairman at the outset said that a complete withdrawal and an apology to him and another to the members of the County Board, would be acceptable, but in the absence of such a withdrawal and apology, he would move the motion of censure. He quoted rule 137 O.G. Jimmy O'Gorman said he was sorry that the delegates had to be brought back here to-night and it certainly was not his wish that the meeting would be abandoned, but he felt that he was well within his rights in seeking an answer to a question relating to a letter from his club dealing with a matter concerning a distinguished member of his club whose reputation was being impinged and maligned as was the name of another fellow officer of the Board. This was as far as he was prepared to go.

James Tobin, Shamrocks was quickly on his feet to propose that no further action be taken against Jimmy O'Gorman and a number of members rose to second this. The chairman immediately ruled that the proposition was not acceptable. This decision was strongly challenged by several members and there followed a very acrimonious debate with practically everyone who spoke, supporting James Tobin's proposition. The chairman refused to relent on his point, despite submissions made by several delegates including, Joe Byrne, who was very critical of the chairman's handling of the matter, Phil Fanning, Eddie Cunningham, Ollie Wilkinson and others. When James Tobin submitted that insufficient time had been given to Jimmy O'Gorman in accordance with rule, the chairman said he would adjourn the matter to the May meeting.

Brendan Tobin thanked the people who voted for him and asked for the co-operation of clubs and members and said he would do his best to live up to the standards set by his predecessors. Jim Landers congratulated Brendan Tobin and assured him of his full co-operation. He also took the opportunity to thank the local press, the Cork Examiner and W.L.R., for the wonderful coverage given to our games.

Dungarvan won a corner and big J. Kyne ran into the area to slot home a loose ball.



In the 1988-89 season Dungarvan captured the under-13 league title and they captured their second double when they defeated Southend by 2-1 in a replayed cup final. The 1988-89 season also saw Dungarvan qualify to represent Waterford in the S.F.A.I. under-13 cup where they were beaten 1-0 by Newcastle in Galway.

Dungarvan competed in the under-14 league in 1989-90 and once again they captured the league title in a closely run race with Tramore, the title eventually being decided in a play-off. However there was to be no double this year as Southend gained revenge for the previous season with a 2-1 victory in the cup final.

1990-91 saw Dungarvan move up to the under-15 age group and Conor Murphy joined the squad. The Blues reached their fourth consecutive cup final and once again they met Southend in Ozier Park, but it was the city side who clinched a 2-1 victory. Revenge was swift however as Dungarvan defeated Southend the following week to pip them for the league title and complete a remarkable four in a row.

It was Dungarvan and Southend who battled it out yet again the next season for the under-16 league and this time Dungarvan had to settle for second best. There was to be no consolation either in the cup as Bolton defeated the Blues in the semi-final. This season also saw the

signing of Micheál Downey from Kilmacthomas, while Michael French also joined the squad.

### VITAL EXPERIENCE GAINED IN 1992/93 SEASON

It was decided to enter Dungarvan in both the under-17 and under-18 leagues in 1992-93. Looking back it was a splendid decision as the experience gained from playing a higher level of football has really stood to Dungarvan this season. Following the previous year's disappointment, Alan Beatty and Finbarr O'Rourke were signed having previously played for Abbeyside, while Kealan O'Neill was appointed assistant manager. Dungarvan acquitted themselves very well in the youths league finishing a creditable fourth, while in the Munster Youths Cup they qualified to represent Waterford. They bowed out to eventual winners Oldbridge in an evenly contested quarter final. While Dungarvan were bitterly disappointed to make their exit from the competition the fact was that they had the same squad of players available again the following season and the experience of this level of football would stand to them — a fact that has been proved true this season.

The Blues enjoyed further success when they were very convincing winners of the under-17 league, their fifth league title in six years. This season Mikey Donnelly has joined the squad as Dungarvan are well placed in the league and have reached the cup semi-final as well as reaching the Munster Youths Cup final.

Two club stalwarts who in the early years were involved with this team are Liam Curtin (1978-88) and the late Jeff Power (1988-89).





# Waterford's Courageous Fight Back

One of the most courageous fight backs that we have seen in recent times from a Waterford team in any grade, was seen in all its glory at Tipperary town venue on a rain-sodden pitch on Wednesday evening last when, against all the odds, we beat a very highly fancied Clare in an exciting first round game which thrilled the few hundred Waterford supporters who watched the match in a continuous downpour.

Given the conditions, it was a tremendous game of football in which no quarter was asked or given and one of the talking points after the game, was the manner in which the players lasted the fast and furious pace of the match, despite the misery of the weather.

Clare can justifiably claim to have been unlucky, having missed so many scoring chances, particularly in the second half, but those chances were won against a 14 man Waterford side who kept on pressurising the Clare forwards whenever the ball was being kicked for scores.

Conditions were really appalling and the venue was totally unsuitable for an April championship game, as there was no shelter either for patrons or for the substitutes. In fact there was no seating for the subs. who had to stand in the rain throughout as did the Press Reporters. Clare had a panel of 29 players and we had 24.

#### THE PLAY

Clare opened the scoring in the first minute with a point by corner forward Aidan O'Dwyer, from play and another Clare point in the second minute by the other corner forward Colin Lynch. In the 5th min. Clare's corner forward Colin Lynch was fouled and the penalty taken by centre forward Martin Daly, was saved by Kieran Cullinane in the Waterford goal and deflected out for a '45'.

Two minutes later the final whistle blew leaving the scoring 1-7 to 0-6 in our favour.

In the first half Waterford had 3 wides as against 1 for Clare and in the second half Clare had a total of 11 wides as against 1 for Waterford.

Waterford's superior fitness which was obvious in the closing stages was a distinct factor in deciding the game.

I suppose the manner in which the victory was achieved, must to some extent have been responsible for the euphoric behaviour of our people in the immediate aftermath of the game. Supporters had every reason to feel proud of the team

The same might also commemorate the historic landing of arms by the 'Erin's Hope' at Helvick during the trouble times. It is also possible that the stand might not be named.

I understand that a very attractive intercounty match programme is being organised for the opening day and this should bring out our supporters in their thousands.

The next county development draw which is financing the development of both county grounds, will take place on the Friday evening before the field opening. Patrons who are also members of the Deise Development Draw will be very pleased when visiting the Fraher Field and seeing how their money is being spent.

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# Action For Damages Dismissed

A crewman on board a Helvick-based fishing trawler, who claimed he sustained injuries when he fell into the engine room, had his £30,000 action for damages against the trawler owner dismissed by Judge Diarmuid Sheridan at Dungarvan Circuit Court.

The claim was brought by Henry Walsh, Childers Estate, Dungarvan, against the trawler owner, Maurice Kelly, Helvick, Ring, Dungarvan, with whom the plaintiff had been employed as a deckhand on the date of the alleged incident, September 18, 1990.

Walsh told the court the trawler was berthed in Howth Harbour on that date while it was being fitted with a new engine. The hatch of the engine room was open and as he stepped across it his left foot slipped and he fell down the hole.

The plaintiff said he sustained a serious injury to his elbow and other minor cuts and bruises and was out of work until the following summer.

Under cross examination Walsh denied that he had been told by the owner of the trawler to stay off the boat while the engineers were working on it.

The defendant, Maurice Kelly, said, however, that he had instructed all his crew to vacate the boat while the engineers were working on it. He and the rest of the crew were repairing nets on the pier when Walsh arrived on the scene and said he had fallen and cut his hand.

Kelly said that if Walsh had fallen through the hole into the engine room the

engineers working there could not have been unaware of such an incident. Yet when he asked them about it they knew nothing at all about it.

Patrick White, a crew member with the defendant at the time, said all the crew had been specifically instructed by Kelly to leave the boat to give the engineers a free hand.

Dismissing the plaintiff's action, Judge Sheridan said he fully accepted that Walsh had been instructed not to go on board while the work was being carried out in the engine room. He had ignored that instruction and must face the consequences.

The Judge, however, made no order as to costs in the case.

## Drunk In Charge Of Car

A Ballinagoul man Donal Monahan pleaded guilty at a recent sitting of Dungarvan Court to being drunk in charge of a car.

Arresting officer, Garda D. Gavin informed the court that on October 23 at around 3.45 a.m., he had seen the defendant sitting in the driving seat of a car outside a chipper in Grattan Square with both the car headlights and the engine on.

On approaching the car, the Garda had got a strong smell of alcohol from the defendant. It was later found that the Ring man had 198 milligrams of alcohol per 100 mls. of blood.

Appearing for the defendant, Mr. Niall King Solr., told the court that as a council worker with the Roads Department, Monahan had to travel a great deal. A disqualification the solicitor urged would have "serious ramifications on his employment".

Judge Michael Pattwell subsequently fined Monahan £150 with the conviction to be endorsed on his driving licence.



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
