Fiord House Sold For £221,000



The impressive Fiord House, Dungarvan went under the hammer last Thursday, April 28 at a packed auction held in Lawlor's Hotel. Advertised exclusively locally in the "Dungarvan Leader," the well-known residence aroused much interest and speculation among local residents for whom the building has been a familiar sight on the Dungarvan-Clonea Road since the 1930's.

The house was previously owned by Mrs. Denny who has now entered a nursing home.

Initial bidding began at the kindly sum of £120,000 but soon crept up to £221,000

when it was bought by a private trust.

Approached by a short driveway, the property stands on 2.5 acres and boasts of bright spacious accommodation comprising of 3 reception, 6 bedrooms, 3 bathrooms, oil fire central heating, south facing mature gardens and good out-fices.

Fiord House is also located near the Gold Coast Golf Club and Dungarvan Golf Club and close to Barnawee Bridge.

The sale was handled by Hamilton Osborne King, Auctioneers and Estate Agents, Dublin, who reported over 100 people had viewed the house before the auction.

Down With Cruachán Mast?

Still celebrating the fruits of victory in the aftermath of the recent Seefin saga, the Comeragh Environmental Protection Association (CEPA) had now set their sights on Telecom Eireann's 165 foot mast on Cruachán Mountain.

This latest campaign was revealed last week by CEPA Chairman, Michael Murphy who has now convened a meeting at the Park Hotel, Dungarvan for tonight, Wednesday, May 4, which is open to all the community.

The controversial subject of tonight's meeting is of course the infamous Cruachán mast, a structure which has been widely condemned in the area.

Among those addressing the meeting will be solicitor Joseph P. Gordon whose successful efforts prevented the erection of a microwave mast on Seefin.

The question on everybody's mind is whether there is any legal way to get the, as yet, non-operational Telecom structure down from its aerie Comeragh location.

NUMEROUS COMPLAINTS
Having received numerous complaints from con-

cerned members of the public regarding the transmitter, Mr. Murphy said "the overwhelming view is that something should be done to compel Bord Telecom to make the mast more visually acceptable." The towering steel transmitter is 165 feet high and dominates an entire area of Cruachán mountain, set in the Comeragh heartland just outside Dungarvan.

The tough assignment facing the environmentalists will be considerably different from the Cork Communications proposal, as full planning permission is already in place for the Cruachán structure.

CEPA have already shown great grit and determination in their recent successful quest for An Bord Pleanála's reversal of the planning permission granted by Waterford County Council to Cork Communications

to erect a controversial microwave transmitter on the

Comeraghs at Seefin. "This Bord Pleanála decision," Mr. Murphy stated, "proved to CEPA that outsiders cannot impose such

CO. COUNCIL MATTERS

The County Council were complimented on the work currently underway at the Boreen. In addition, the wall delineators on the low wall at the canal was seen as a big improvement.

The need for additional public lighting was again raised by both Mr. P. Dowd and Mrs. M. Morrissey. The Clerk stated that he had again written to the County Council on this matter, but had received no reply. The Clerk undertook to look at the position regarding dumping on the Glencairn road beyond Hornibrooks garage.

TALLOW ROAD

Mrs. J. Bolger complained that the roots to a number of trees were exposed on the

Tallow road and that the wall here needs refurbishment.

PHONE BOX

Mr. P. Dowd hit out at the increasing amount of vandalism in the town. In particular the phone box at the Mall was in a deplorable state. In addition, some trees adjoining the tennis court and the Mall have been vandalised. It was agreed to highlight this matter in the press and request the co-operation of all the townspeople to combat this problem.

The Chairman began by welcoming Mr. J. Taaffe, Manager, Waterford Development Partnership Ltd. to the meeting. Mr. J. Taaffe began by stating that plans were being made to take in the second phase of the Leader funds. The purpose of his visit was to allow the Commissioners a forum for constructive criticism of the proposed plan and also to develop new ideas which may be added to the plan. A synopsis of the plan having been previously circulated. Mr. Taaffe then went on to outline its five programmes as follows:

1. Plato/SMED - endeavouring to line all the small business in Co. Waterford; 2. Area Tourism/SMART - The Community taking a long term view of the area; 3. Integrated Training/ECT - training of community groups, emphasis on practical work; 4. Community Services/ RPP - the provision of a part time local person with access to the different agencies; 5. Carrefour/RIC - This facility allowed a link between

Lismore and the important funding agencies both in Dublin and in Europe. Following presentation of the plan, the Commissioners comments were requested. The general opinion was that without the full plan, which would be available in a weeks time, it would not be fair to comment. It was agreed to defer making any suggestions until the next meeting.

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Scrap Dealer Sentenced To One Month

A 28 year old father of six, Francis Kerrigan, n.f.a. and the halting site, Shandon, pleaded guilty at last week's sitting of Dungarvan District Court to a charge of handling stolen property worth £420 from Radley Engineering & Co., Dungarvan.

Outlining the facts of the case, arresting officer, Detective Garda Eddie O'Sullivan, told the court that on the night of February 20-21th, he had found the stolen property in the boot of the defendant's car at Ki-

ladangan.

Kerrigan had subsequently told the Garda that he had purchased the material as scrap for £30.

Appearing for the defendant, Mr. David Burke Solr., said Kerrigan had cooperated fully with the Gardaí and had bought the property only because he had thought it looked like scrap.

Nearly £2m Housing Allocation For County Waterford

Minister Brian O'Shea T.D., has welcomed the announcement by Emmet Stagg T.D., Minister for Housing and Urban Renewal, of the 1994 allocation for local authority housing programmes.

Waterford Corporation is to receive just over £3. and Waterford Co. Council

£1.97m making a total allocation for Waterford city and county of just over £5m.

This represents an increase of £1.6m on the 1993 allocation and is further proof of the Government's commitment to increasing the number of local authority houses provided each year.

Brian O'Shea stated how this allocation will fund, not alone, the provision of local authority housing, but also improvement works in lieu of local authority housing, the provision of residential caravan parks for travellers, remedial works to local authority houses, and the provision of bathrooms in older houses.

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How to get those darling buds of May

MILD-mannered May weather comes just as gardeners need time to tackle a lot of work.

If it isn't done then June will certainly be bursting out all over, but in all the wrong ways — with plants growing untrained and weeds thriving.



So you need to put your back into all the necessary trimming or pruning of existing plant stock and to clobber flourishing weeds and pests.

Start with plants already done for this year: tulips need lifting if you want their beds for summer blooms. Replant elsewhere to allow the tulip greenery to wither naturally, before finally lifting bulbs for storage.

Indoor bulbs or most varieties can also go outside for similar 'finishing' before storage, but remember they must now become outdoor bulbs and be replanted in autumn — they can only be forced for indoors once.

Make time too to life primroses. They will be healthier and add more blooms for next year but don't be tempted to use sites prone to dryness and direct sun.

Despite the risk of frost, particularly on the east side of the country, you can plant biennials such as Sweet William, wallflowers and Canterbury Bells. But stand by with cloches or newspaper to protect half-hardy annuals and dahlias on potentially frosty nights.

If you are caught by a sudden frost, water the vulnerable plants with tepid water first thing in the morning, using a fine spray. This moderates the contrasting heat of the sun so soon after the touch of frost.

It is also not too late to establish conifers and evergreens. Simply soak the root ball overnight before planting in soil enriched with moist peat or good well-rotted garden compost. Then make sure they are well-watered every day if the weather is dry. Get a grip on your roses — yank up sucker shoots. These are the pale and extra thorny ones which sap the strength of the tree.

Then check for and wipe out pests such as greenfly or aphids, and leaf-rolling sawfly. Cut away where you can but also be prepared to use an insecticide — spraying on a calm day, keeping pets and children away and covering bare skin.

Some hedges such as privet will now grow quickly and need gentle trimming and shaping.

The lawn may also be patchy and needing a cut, but avoid trimming new lawns until the blades are about two inches high.

Attack weeds by hand at first or dab them with a paint brush dipped in weed-killer. The last resort is a selective weed-killer that should help you keep them at bay for the rest of the summer.

You will need something potent as well to stop weeds and grass growing between paving slabs and through paths, but use a hoe elsewhere if you possibly can — it's amazing how much you can achieve by wielding the hoe for few minutes every night after work.

Meatballs — Indian style



Fill your kitchen with the delicious aroma of this easy-to-make meal with an Indian flavour. It's easy-to-eat, too!

Ingredients

450g/1lb minced lamb
1 onion, grated
3 tbsp ground almond
1tsp ground cumin
1/2 tsp ground ginger
1 egg, beaten
salt and freshly ground pepper
1 tbsp oil
1 tbsp plain flour
1 tbsp tomato puree
450ml/3/4 lamb stock
2 tbsp mango chutney
25g/1oz preserved stem ginger, finely chopped

Method

Mix the lamb with the onion, almonds, cumin, ground ginger, egg and seasoning. Form the mixture into 16 small balls each about the size of an unshelled walnut. Heat the oil in a frying pan,



add the meatballs and brown lightly. Transfer to a plate.

Stir the flour into the remaining fat in the pan and cook for 1 minute then, off the heat, stir in the tomato puree, stock, chutney and chopped ginger.

Bring the sauce to the boil stirring all the time, return the meatballs to the pan, cover and cook the dish for 25-30 minutes or until tender. Serve with rice and a tomato and onion salad.

Portlaw Tanning Plant Greets Minister

Mr. Brian O'Shea, Minister for Food and Horticulture visited the Michell Ireland Tanning Plant recently at Portlaw, where he toured the factory and received a briefing on the company's concern in relation to the possible impact on the availability of hides for processing arising from the current high level of live exports of cattle.

The Minister, in praising the state of the art tanning facility, stated strongly that he is anxious to meet the company's concerns. He reassured Mr. D. J. Ashton, Chief General Manager, who is over from Australia, that his Department has a clear policy of pressing the EU Commission to ensure that nothing in the EU subsidy regime would favour the export of live cattle over the export of beef.

Secondly, he said that his Department had an obligation to implement strict EU animal welfare regulations and that his officials would continue to inspect port fa-

cilities and vessels to ensure that these were being met.

On a personal note, he believed that it was not in the long term interests of farmers, beef processors, employees or the development of markets for Irish beef to have such high levels of live cattle exports.

For its part, the Company assured Minister O'Shea that it has exceeded its employment projections. There are now 69 people employed — 19 more than was projected and there are another 20 people indirectly employed in haulage etc. The Company is meeting its production targets and is supplying customers in the UK, France, Italy, Taiwan, Korea, Australia and South Africa. The Portlaw plant is also complying with the rigorous waste water conditions set down by the planning authorities. Minister O'Shea noted that this success was achieved in a remarkably short period of time since the plant was opened earlier this year.

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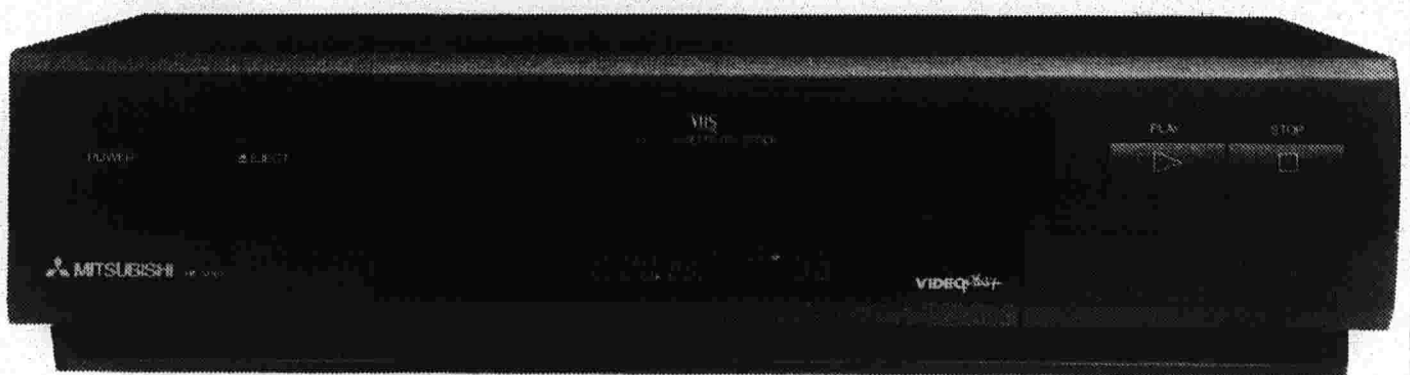
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RECENT DEATHS

Fr. Vincent Power who died tragically at the hands of intruders to his Parish Church, in Jamaica last week was laid to rest in Jamaica last Wednesday. Sixty year old Fr. Power came from Raheen Road, Clonmel. His relations in Clonmel and Rathgormack were deeply shocked and saddened with news of his death. A Mass will be celebrated in memory of Fr. Power by Most Rev. Dr. William Lee, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore in S.S. Peter and Pauls Church, Clonmel on this Wednesday. Police in Falmouth said Fr. Power had gone to his Church to prepare for morning Mass at around 6 a.m. He was attacked by the intruders who took his keys and ransacked the presbytery. He was found dead when parishioners arrived

for Mass. Fr. Power was originally from Rathgormack, Co. Waterford. His father was a Veterinary Surgeon in Clonmel and served the Ballymacarbry district for years. He joined the Columban Fathers after leaving school in Clonmel and was ordained in 1955. He served in Japan

from 1956 to 1984 when he returned to Columban headquarters in Dalgan Park. He went to Jamaica in 1990. His cousin Fr. Nicholas Power, P.P. is Parish Priest of St. Pauls in Waterford and a late uncle of his Fr. Nicholas Power, P.P., Kilcass/Kilsheelan. He is buried in Gambonsfield. He was very interested in Gaelic Games (Hurling) and mountain walking. Some time ago he spent a holiday in the Nire Valley.

Drunken Youth 'Jaunting Around'

A drunken Co. Tipperary youth, was apprehended 'jaunting around' in a tractor on April 26th last, having previously consumed a bottle of whiskey.

Appearing at Dungarvan District Court last Wednesday, 20 year old Shane Fahey of Curraheen, Horse and Jockey, Thurles, pleaded guilty to charges of larceny and of driving without insurance or a driving licence.

Garda Noel O'Brien of Cashel told the court that on the date in question the defendant had been in Dunderum with friends. Having consumed a full bottle of whiskey, Fahey had then walked to Goold's Cross, Cashel, where he had encountered 2 parked cars and a tractor.

Garda O'Brien went on to say that the defendant had unsuccessfully tried to start both cars from which he had stolen property to the tune of £59. Fahey had then taken unauthorised possession of the tractor which he proceeded to "drive around all night".

'FOOLHARDY ACTION'

Speaking for the defendant, Mr. J. P. Gordon Solr., told the court that since returning from England four weeks ago, Fahey had not received any social welfare payments and had run out of money. Although Fahey's action had been "foolhardy", the defendant had been under the influence of alcohol, Mr. Gordon stated, and was merely taking the tractor 'for a jaunt around'. He had had no intent to steal and had been very forthcoming with the Gardai.

Fahey's previous convictions include driving with excess alcohol and with no insurance.

9 MONTHS DETENTION

For the unauthorised possession of the tractor, Judge Michael Pattwell subsequently sentenced the defendant to 9 months detention at St. Patrick's Institution. "It aggrieves me to send you to a place of detention", said the Judge, "but there comes a time when one has to protect other people's property".

The defendant was also disqualified from driving for a period of 2 years with the conviction to be endorsed on his driving licence.

Recognisances were fixed in the event of an appeal.

Call On Opposition To Seek Taxation Changes In Finance Bill

The ICMSA has called on Opposition Finance Spokespersons to table amendments to the 1994 Finance Bill to remove what the Association calls an "anti farmer bias" from finance legislation.

ICMSA President, Mr. Tom O'Dwyer said that chief among the discriminatory aspects of the 1994 Finance Bill is the fact that it continues to deny farmers and their spouses the same total personal allowances as are available to the PAYE sector.

Mr. O'Dwyer has called on the Opposition parties to

seek an amendment to correct the current injustice whereby a farm family with an annual income of £15,000 has total personal allowances of £2,172 less than a PAYE family on the same income, resulting in a greater tax liability of £600 for the farm family.

EQUITY IN PERSONAL TAXATION

— FACT OR FANCY?

"Is the principle of equity in personal taxation, contained in the Programme for Competitiveness & Work a fact or fantasy? If this principle is to have any real meaning, all taxpayers — including farmers — should receive the same total per-

sonal allowances. As farmers are on the current year of assessment, they pay their tax in full in the year of earning and in many cases before their income is actually received, therefore, there is no justification whatsoever for debarring them from the same personal allowances which are available to PAYE persons," said Mr. O'Dwyer.

ALLOWANCE SHORTFALL AFFECTS LOW INCOME FARMERS MOST

He added that the non-availability of the proper personal allowances affects those farmers on the lower end of the income scale most. He said some farm families in effect have to pay the equivalent of an almost 7% surcharge on their income by way of an additional tax, vis-a-vis PAYE taxpayers on identical income.

Curran Welcomes Milk Price Bonuses

Waterford IFA Dairy Committee Chairman, Gerald Curran, has welcomed the announcement by Barryroe Co-op of a 3p per gallon price bonus payable to suppliers on all 1993 milk deliveries.

Mr. Curran said that the 3p per gallon bonus was a substantial boost to Barryroe suppliers and confirmed Barryroe's position as a leader on milk price. Barryroe are also paying a 3% bonus on grain and issuing a 3% refund to farmers who

purchased farm inputs from the Co-op during 1993.

The Dairy farmer welcomed a 1p per gallon price bonus announced by Drinagh Co-op, which he said underlined the strong performance of the West Cork Co-ops. Drinagh is also issuing a 2.5% refund on all 1993 purchases of fertiliser and feed.

Mr. Curran would like to see the rest of the Co-operatives in the country following this initiative set by Barryroe.

County Waterford ICMSA News

The County Waterford ICMSA Chairman, John Cusack, reports on a recent meeting between the ICMSA and senior officials of the Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry and said that the Department had responded very positively to ICMSA proposals on cattle tagging and identification.

The Department is currently proposing that every animal born after July 1 this year will be required to wear three ear tags and be accompanied by two official documents. Two tags would be identically numbered to comply with the EU directive on identification and registration and ERAD would continue with its own tag which would bear a different number. A new document would be required to comply with the EU Directive while ERAD would continue to use the current cattle identity card.

At the above meeting the ICMSA proposed that all animals born after July 1 should be tagged with only one number and that a single document should be provided to satisfy both ERAD and the new EU Directive.

"The Department clearly saw the merit of the ICMSA proposal. They acknowledged the amount of thought which went into it and the fact that it provides a practical solution to a complex problem.

"A farmer friendly system based on common sense should be put in place and ICMSA will not accept a situation where farmers are bogged down by unnecessary bureaucracy," concluded the County Chairman.

Meanwhile, the Co. Waterford Executive welcomed the comments made by Tom O'Dwyer, President of ICMSA, who said: "The Minister for Agriculture, Food & Forestry must oppose any restrictions being proposed on Irish beef imports to Germany or any other country."

Mr. O'Dwyer also called on the Minister to invite the German Minister for Health and the German Veterinary officials to visit Ireland and examine for themselves how we implement our animal health rules.

"There is no justification whatsoever for the German proposals to restrict Irish beef imports. Ireland's reputation for the quality of its beef is internationally accepted. We operate a slaughter policy for herds affected by BSE and therefore it is impossible for meat from such herds to enter the food chain.

"To restrict Irish meat imports would be to wrongfoot Ireland. The onus now rests with the Minister to reject any allegations concerning our beef imports and to do all in his power to ensure all our export markets remain open," concluded Mr. O'Dwyer.


Germany Not To Ban Irish Beef

— Walsh

Germany has indicated that Ireland will not be included in the scope of any proposed restrictions on beef imports because of BSE. The Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Mr. Joe Walsh, TD, said that he was very pleased at the outcome and, in particular, at Germany's recognition of our high disease-free status

and the value of our extensive control systems.

The Minister said that the intention now was to rebuild the position of the Irish beef industry in the lucrative German market. The Minister confirmed that Ireland will continue with our stringent control systems to reassure consumers of the quality and safety of Irish beef.



WELCOME BOOST FOR GAELIC GAMES AT LISMORE C.B.S.

The ongoing promotion of Gaelic games at Lismore C.B.S. received a welcome filip on Wednesday last when the newly-formed alliance of the five clubs in the catchment area - Ballyduff, Ballysaggart, Lismore, Shamrocks and Tallow - made a presentation of a substantial financial contribution to the college authorities, the proceeds in the club's first joint fund-raising venture.

The amalgam, appropriately called the "C.B.S. Trust Fund for the promotion of Gaelic games" was born out of a desire by the five units to show their appreciation of the efforts of this hallowed institution in fostering our National games. In reply, Mr. Geary was fulsome in his gratitude and said that while the subscription was like "manna from Heaven" he was equally touched by the actual gesture. They had laboured for years under financial constraints he said, and often longed for the day when that burden could be alleviated in some small way. "Given the present economic climate and the never ending task of fund-raising by the clubs for their own needs, the setting up of the Trust fund was a magnificent and welcome recognition of their endeavours", he went on, and assured all those present that the money would be well spent for the purpose for which it was intended.

John Heneghan, staff member and one of the driving forces behind college teams over the years concurred with the remarks of his boss and reminded his audience how fortunate they all were to have a Principal who had such a keen interest in G.A.A. in particular, and sport in general.

Vice-chairman of the Trust Fund, James Tobin (Shamrocks) spoke of his long and happy association with Lismore C.B.S., and through involvement in Parents' Councils etc. he was only too familiar with the monetary constraints of one sort or another when it came to funding different projects. He was actually aware of the need to preserve, and improve upon, the solid foundation which had been put in place for the promotion of Gaelic games on the campus. This requirement had taken on a new significance with the decision to site the new Community School in Lismore which would inevitably lead to an influx of much greater numbers of students he said. But he and his club were happy to be part of any initiative which would further the aims of Cumann Luthchleas Gael, he concluded.

In many cases striking the ball gets too little attention in training where the purely physical preparation hogs most of the time. Why? It would be wrong to generalise, of course, but I've known coaches who can't think for themselves and/or haven't the confidence in themselves to coach the correct striking of the sliotar, from the hand or off the ground, left or right.

In a match you will only perform confidently those skills which have been practised hundreds of times in training. Remember the final minutes of last year's All Ireland Final? Joe Cooney (fine hurler, decent chap) had possession. Should have struck it immediately. He looked about, turned, saw no Galway jersey, expected one to turn up and then passed over the sideline, to nobody! He must have practised it, the hand pass I mean, ad nauseam. Otherwise why would it be his first option? Did you hear what the acerbic Kevin Cashman said of handpassing?

TOPICS

New Line Bridge

This section of Abbeyside was one that attracted young people as a meeting point especially the young people from Upper Murphy Place and others from New Line Middle. In those times the bridge constructed over the railway tracks was not flat as it is today but was a smoothly rounded Hump Backed Bridge. Here the young people congregated usually in small groups to converse, laugh, joke, boast and play games that afforded hours of pleasurable pastime. It seemed natural to wave to the passengers on the outgoing trains especially the express to Roslone which connected to the boat to Fishguard. The passengers seemed relieved at our youthful presence probably due to the fact that the tearful farewells on the station

platform in Dungarvan were not after all so "final".

On the Murphy Place side of the bridge the top of the sizable bank was tilled meticulously by Billy Feeney but the Kyne Park Houses side was planted with ash trees and various other shrubs in a more dense fashion than it is today making it an ideal hideaway for our games of 'Hide and Seek' and 'Block'. This right hand side of the bridge which we will call the New Line bank was bereft of anything of a planted nature except grass which was where the more robust game of 'King of the Castle' was played. 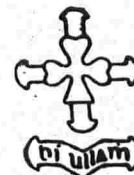
TROOP MEETING

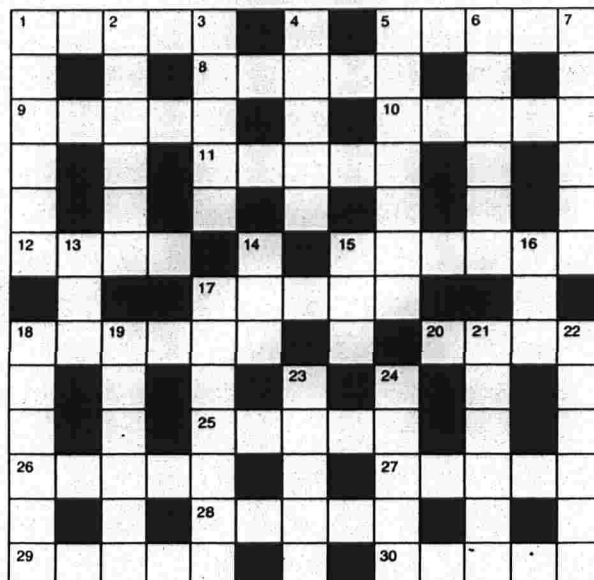

In one lengthy chapter, he details the history of the conflict which some claim has its origins as far back as the

first battle of Kosovo in 1398. Through the various wars since then, the people have been losers and whether it was the killing of Archduke Ferdinand in Sarajevo in 1914 or the savagery of the Second World War, it is a region which has seen stalemate rather than true peace for almost a century.

The event promises to be a most interesting and enjoyable one, with the proceeds of book sales helping towards the cost of aid for Bosnia.

ROAD SAFETY CAMPAIGN 1994

"Death and injury on Irish roads remain at an unacceptably high level", said the Minister for the Environment, Mr. Michael Smith, T.D., when he launched the National Safety Council's 1994 Road Safety Campaign, "last year 433 died and 9,197 were injured."

The Road Safety Campaigns mounted by the National Safety Council in the last few years have had a major impact, and public perceptions of road dangers have been significantly heightened. This is evident by the alteration in the public's attitude to drinking and driving; people are no longer tolerant of the drunk driver.

Speeding is a major cause of road accidents and is the primary focus of the 1994 Road Safety Campaign. The theme is: "Slow Down — Stop The Bloody Slaughter."

This hard hitting uncompromising campaign will focus on the specific effects of irresponsible behaviour on our roads by drivers, with emphasis on speeding. The integrated campaign will utilise television, radio, outdoor posters and cinema and will run right up to year end.

GARDA SIOCHANA

The Garda Síochána, with whom the Council has a close working relationship, will also be co-operating fully with the campaign and it is expected that an impact similar to the drink-driving campaign will be achieved.

IRISH INSURANCE FEDERATION

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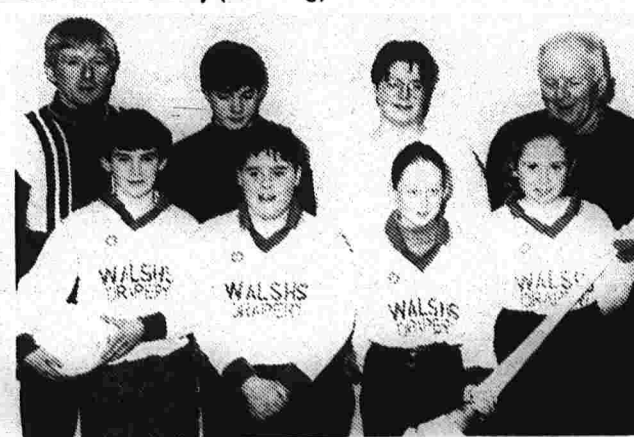

County Board Meeting

RETENTION OF SHARE OF GATES

Shares from gate receipts at matches involving senior clubs in championship competition and which were normally paid to clubs at the end of the season, will be retained by the County Board for the present year. This decision was taken at last week's meeting following a proposition by N. MacCraith. An amendment proposed by S. O'Brien was defeated on a vote.

ADMISSION PRICES

Admission prices to matches was discussed following complaints made by a number of delegates about the confusion arising at some venues over the past couple of weeks.

There was unanimous agreement that single matches would have an admission fee of £2 and double-headers £3.

The regulations concerning the admittance of children, students and old age pensioners and unemployed persons, was referred to the Coisde Gnotha, who will make recommendations to the next meeting. Other matters relating to gate management at all venues and which are presently being discussed, will be submitted to the next meeting also.

GAELIC SCHOLARSHIPS

The Board have decided to offer fifteen scholarships to Colaiste na Rinne again this year. Because it was the centenary of Connradh na Gaelighe, the usual number was increased to fifteen this year.

The scholarships are for both sexes and the interviews will take place on Saturday, May 29. The Portlaw interviews will be held at 11 a.m. and the interviews for Western candidates at Lawlors Hotel at 3 p.m. The qualifying ages are over 12 and under 18 years.

The course will be held at Ring College from July 27 to August 17. Applicants must have some involvement with their local club, either through the games/Scor, etc. Application forms have already been circulated.

CAPTAINCY OF TEAM

The matter of the appointment or selection of a captain for the under-21 football county team was raised by Sean Lennon, Kilrossanty. He said that Kilrossanty, as county champions, did not have a player on the team and therefore had no complaint in this respect, but they thought that as champions, they should have the right to name a player who would take over the captaincy of the team on the day.

The Chairman pointed out that there was no rule or bye-law which automatically gave the right to a club to have or name the captain, but he undertook to have the matter looked at.

Kilrossanty also asked that the under-14 and under-21 football county championship medals be issued to their club as soon as possible and an undertaking was given that this would be done.

ANCILLARY WORK

The Fraher Field Committee were given the go-ahead to carry out ancillary work outside the main contract. The application related to the following:

- 1 — The draining of the entire pitch and re-sodding part of it.
- 2 — Erecting a wall on the north side of the pitch.
- 3 — Erecting railings and gates to completely enclose the pitch.
- 4 — Erecting of new goal posts.
- 5 — Erecting protective netting behind goals.
- 6 — The building of 3 new embankments.
- 7 — The erection of 11 stairways on the northern embankment.
- 8 — The erection of a new scoreboard.
- 9 — The building of 3 new public toilets.
- 10 — The laying of sewers, water pipes and power cables.
- 11 — The erection of 3 new gateways.
- 12 — The installing of 10 new turn stiles, electrically operated.
- 13 — The equipping of a control and counting room for gamemen.
- 14 — The laying of grit track to encircle the pitch.
- 15 — The draining and re-surfacing of the Show Ground.

Official Reopening Of Fraher Field

Full details of the reopening programme of events which will take place at Fraher Field, Dungarvan on the weekend of May 13/15, were outlined at a Press Conference held at the Park Hotel, Dungarvan on Friday night last.

"May 15 is D-Day for Pairc Ui Fearachair, Dungarvan, when its gates will be opened once again to the many Gaels whose residence it has been on a Sunday evening for many years in the past. The weekend of May 13 to 15 will be recalled in history as a major leap forward in C.L.C.G., Portlaurge. Waterford as a county can now stand tall with all the other so called giants of our national game when it comes to playing grounds."

"14,000 people combining forces in the county G.A.A. draw has resulted in what can only be called a dream becoming a reality. We must also keep in mind that this is only part of our efforts. Walsh Park in the very near future will also stand aloof."

"Pairc Ui Fearachair is now a tribute, not to any individual or groups of people but to C.L.C.G. Gaels, Portlaurge, players, mentors of teams, the 14,000 people who paid £5 to our draw last year and have continued to do so, and most of all to you our patrons."

This was the core of the press release which gave a brief outline of the history of the progress at Fraher Field since the grounds were purchased on April 1, 1973.

Greg Fives, Treasurer of the Finance and Development Committee, welcomed the media and the many others who came along to the conference.

He traced the history of the planning of the development and the organising of the county draw which yielded a total of £477,000 for the clubs in the county last year and provided the finances to develop Fraher Field to its present state and would soon develop Walsh Park, for which planning permission has been granted. Having paid tribute to the work of both the field and finance committee, he asked those present to remember the late Liam O'Donnell, who was a very active member of the Fraher Field Committee up to the time of his death. He also paid tribute to the clubs, promoters and the 14,000 people who had joined the draw in order to develop our grounds.

Nicolas MacCraith, Secretary of the Field Committee, informed the meeting that it had been decided to recommend to County Board that the new stand would be named Ardan na nDeise. This was consid-

ered to be a very fitting name and one that would be popular and acceptable.

The main bank in the field, which is on the Curran's Boreen side of the field, will be named 'Port Ui Mhaolchathaigh' in honour of John Mulcahy former Dungarvan born businessman, who contributed very generously towards the cost of the purchase of the field in 1973.

The bank on the roadside of the grounds will be named Port Ui Faolain in honour of the late Pax Whelan, who laboured for many years to keep the grounds in top class condition.

The bank at the West side is to be named Port Ui Bhraonain, in memory of the late Jim Brennan who was county P.R.O. and organiser of many important county events for a long number of years.

The official opening will take place at 3.30 p.m. approximately on Sunday, May 15, when the new President, Jack Boothman, will performed the opening ceremony after the stand has been blessed. Other dignitaries will also attend.

Waterford and Wexford meet in senior football at 2 p.m. After the opening by the President, the main event of the afternoon will see Cork and Wexford (who fought three memorable battles in the never to be forgotten League final at Thurles last year) in opposition for a set of trophies. To wind off the programme, Waterford and Limerick will meet in the field at 7.30 p.m., also for a set of trophies. Bands will attend and a souvenir pro-

gramme will be on sale. The referees on duty will be Michael Wadding, Pat Moore and Thomas O Meachair.

It was also announced that a £5 admission ticket will permit patrons to attend the entire weekend programme. There will be a single admission for people wishing to attend for the single match programmes. Children will be admitted free on Friday and Saturday evenings, but because of the seating arrangements in the new stand, only ticket-holders can be admitted on Sunday.

The capacity of the stand is 3,000 and of these 1,500 are in a covered section.

Other speakers at the conference were Eamon O Murchu, County Chairman, who praised the work of the field and finance development committee and said that May 15 would be a day of great joy for the Gaels of Portlaurge. Seamus Grant, County Secretary, Declan O Meara, Chairman Finance and Development Committee, Frankie Cullinane and P. S. O Riain, both Divisional Board Chairmen.

On the night of the official opening a celebratory function, including buffet with band and bar extension, will be held at Lawlor's Hotel and will be open to everyone at £5.

Other fundraising ventures are also planned and will include Open Air entertainment at Fraher Field on June 4 and 5. On Saturday, June 4 — A marquee will be in situ for a dance with Diarmuid O'Leary and the Bards. On Sunday, June 5 — An open air disco will be held in the Show Grounds.

Erin's Own were clear winners against Kilmacthomas and the city side gave a display which gave notice to all and sundry that they will be there at the finish this year.

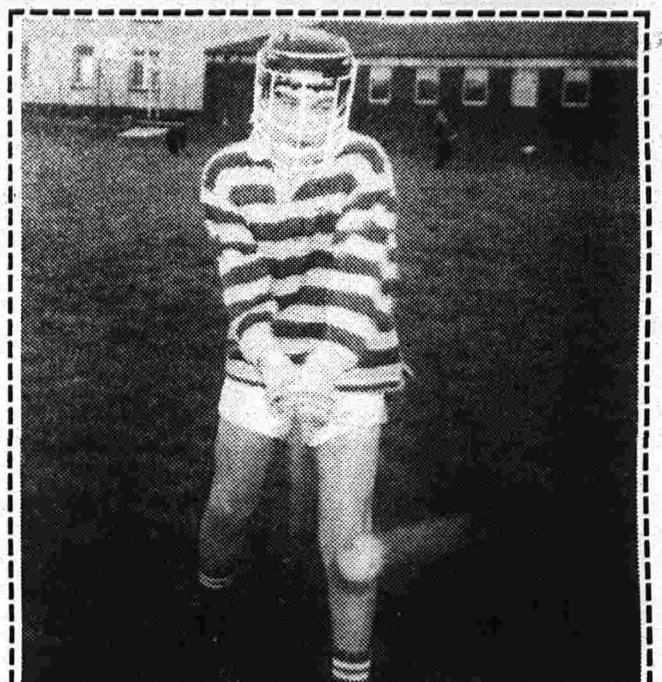

The 1994 campaign will be concentrated over the summer period and will consist of:

- extensive radio and newspaper advertising;
- distribution of posters and leaflets at exhibitions, tourist offices, harbours and schools;
- continuation of the freephone safety helpline service 1800 392 392;
- a co-ordinated surveillance and enforcement effort involving the Department of the Marine, Gardai and Harbourmasters.
