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Another Chapter Closes On U.D.C.

Yet another chapter in the history of the illustrious Dungarvan Urban District Council came to a close last Monday night as council members gathered together for the final meeting of the 1985-1994 Council.

There were sad farewells to two outgoing members, long-standing Councillors, Dec Goode and Austin Hallahan (the latter in 1985), who have both announced they were not standing in the June Local Elections. There were also generous tributes paid however as members summed up the last 12 months and the tremendous work achieved by the Council in its nine year lifetime.

In his last farewell speech as UDC Chairman, there were no regrets from Cllr. Tony Wright as he recalled the past year as "busy, very demanding, but enjoyable."

He hoped the local clubs had all acknowledged his contribution in the form of attendance at various functions and meetings, etc. The Chairman reserved particular praise for County Engi-

neer, John O'Flynn whom, he deemed an "excellent public servant."

Cllr. Wright was also loud in his compliments to Town Clerk, Bertie White, the ju-

nior clerks and Council staff, Vice-Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne, Acting Co. manager, Brian McNally, all the Council members and the Press for their cov-

erage.

A GENTLEMAN AND AN INDEPENDENT

Many glowing tributes were paid to the two retiring councillors. Described by his colleagues as a "true gentleman", Cllr. Dec Goode had been a father fig-

Council To Raise "Take-Away" Issue At National Level

The last monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban District Council was held last Monday night, at which the issue of fast food outlets and their opening hours, was the subject of much heated debate.

Submitting a motion for the A.M.A.I. annual conference Cllr. Austin Hallahan proposed that legislation be

introduced by the Government limiting the opening hours of take-away fast food outlets to 12 midnight on the same day.

Explaining the reason behind this motion, Cllr. Hallahan said he wanted to gauge the national feeling of the situation especially concerning incidents of

'rough house', fighting and stabbing etc, which he added, "may invariably occur where people having left public houses, go to a fast food outlet which may be open until 3 a.m."

These late 3 a.m. opening hours, Cllr. Hallahan stressed were particularly

£745,000 Urban Housing Allocation

At last Monday's meeting of Dungarvan Urban District Council, Town Clerk Mr. Bertie White revealed that the Council had received a welcome £745,000 local authority grant allocation which will greatly benefit the current housing construction programme at both O'Connell/Stephen Street and the Youghal Road.

Mr. White informed the members that £675,000 is to be stream-lined for new housing, while £20,000 will be available for improve-

ment works. The remaining £50,000 is to facilitate remedial works at the recently reconstructed Cathal Brugha Place.

The first phase of the O'Connell Street housing programme, known as "The Orchard," is expected to be completed in July and will consist of 4 three-bedroomed houses and 11 two-bedroomed houses. Phase two of the project includes nine 3-bedroomed houses whose completion date is anticipated by the Spring of '95.

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Deputy Deasy And Bank Interest Rates

The following question tabled by Austin Deasy, T.D., was disallowed by Ceann Comhairle, Sean Treacy —

"To ask the Minister for Finance if he has satisfied himself that interest rates being charged by the banks to their customers are justified in the prevailing circumstances; and if he will view these rates in conjunction with their profits."

The Deputy was informed that the Minister has no official responsibility to the Dail in relation to this matter which is one for the lending institutions themselves and for the Central Bank.

In a statement issued by Deputy Deasy he says: "The disallowance of this question is interesting in view of the Taoiseach's statement on the matter. If the banks do not sufficiently respond to the major reductions in Western European interest rates and specifically German rates then I believe the government should legislate to see that people get a fair deal. It would also be interesting if we had a reaction not only from the Commercial Banks, but also from the Central Bank which should be the public's watchdog in matters such as this."

CO. WATERFORD V.E.C.

Panel For College Architect Formed

Members of Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee were told at their meeting last Friday that the appointment of an architect for the proposed £1m.-plus extension to Dungarvan Technical College had been advertised nationally in the "Irish Independent."

An architect selection panel was subsequently formed by members comprising of CEO Kieran Heffernan, VEC Chairman Cllr. Billy Kyne, Cllr. Lar Hart, Paudie Geary (TUI) and a senior member of the Department of Education.

Referring to this latest development in the college extension saga, Cllr. Kyne said the panel formation was a "small, significant step along the road."

Despite various suggestions by members that a local design team be appointed if at all possible for the work, the CEO has stated that while the committee will have the responsibility of appointing the architect, they will have to adhere to very strict guidelines laid down by the Department of Education.

NATIONAL FLAG ISSUE

The present site of the National flag at Dungarvan Technical College was slammed by both Cllr. Lar

Hart and Jimmy Byrne at last Friday's meeting of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee.

"We seem to forget that our national flag should be treated with dignity and should never touch the ground," Mr. Byrne heatedly declared, while Cllr. Lar Hart (Labour) informed his fellow committee members that the flagpole in front of the college "is not suitable where it is."

In reply, the CEO, Mr. Heffernan said the rope was constantly being stolen, but he would certainly look into the matter at a later date.

VEC MEMBER TO RETIRE

One of the longest sitting members of Co. Waterford VEC, Cllr. Dec Goode, is to retire from the Committee having decided not to stand in the forthcoming urban elections on June 9.

Wishing the Fianna Fail

Councillor a long and happy retirement., Cllr. Tom Cunningham said Cllr. Goode had worked tirelessly and had served diligently during his years on the Committee.

Also voicing his praise for the retiring member was VEC Chairman Cllr. Kyne who described him as a great character and humanitarian. "People like him", said Cllr. Kyne, "give of their time, mainly unthanked."

Premises Sought By Pigeon Club

Speaking on behalf of the Dungarvan Pigeon Club at last Monday's meeting of the town's UDC, Cllr. Billy Kyne (Labour) informed the Acting Co. Manager, Brian McNally, of the club's wishes to secure a suitable premises to use as headquarters in the town.

Cllr. Kyne said he had raised the issue already with the ex-County Manager, Dan Hurley, but had received no reply to his queries.

He went on to say that the Pigeon Club, being an old traditional sport in the town, were not looking for a state of the art site, but rather a small, secure base in which they could store expensive equipment and birds.

Mr. McNally replied that he was unaware of any previous requests made by Cllr. Kyne, but he would certainly investigate the matter at a future date.

Health Minister To Visit Dungarvan

Through the grapevine, it is understood that the Minister for Health, Brendan Howlin, T.D., is to visit various hospital facilities in Waterford city and county on Monday next, May 23.

First on his agenda is Ardkeen where he is to attend the opening Phase 2B of the new hospital complex. His visit to St. Joseph's and St. Vincent's hospital facilities in Dungarvan is to last two hours, after which he will journey to St. Otteran's for a staff award ceremony.

MALL FUNDING

Minister Howlin has already given strong commitment in the Dáil that funding for the Community Care headquarters at the Mall in Waterford will be announced in the 1994 Estimate and will probably be announced during his visit on Monday.

DUNGARVAN FUNDING?

For Dungarvan and West Waterford the question is, will the high priority given

to St. Joseph's and St. Vincent's by the Health Board be reflected by a formal announcement by the Minister on this occasion.

While senior Health Board officials remain tightlipped, it is as yet uncertain whether a formal award regarding funding for Dungarvan might be given on this occasion.

The strategy would seem to be for an intensive fact-finding mission by the Min-

ister, which, it is hoped by Board Officials, would speed up significant investment for the hospital complex in Dungarvan.

HOSPITAL PLANS

Already outlined is the Health Board's technical services plan for Dungarvan which sees a phased development totalling £2m. which would obviously see major changes in hospital facilities.

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It's Time You Tucked Your Plants In Bed



Late May and early June herald the start of summer proper and weather safe enough for our bedding plants.

Even if you haven't been raising your own you will need no reminder — shops and garden centres will be stacked up with trays of old favourites — marigolds, lobelia, petunias and so on.

This 'club' of half-hardy annuals and perennials are basically easy-to-grow and colourful varieties which can bring colour and design to even the most modest garden.

They may also complement a specimen shrub or tree — bedding begonias or Busy Lizzies (Impatiens) are ideal as they can tolerate the shade of a larger neighbour.

However, most bedding plants like sun and also need a bed well dug early in the year and pepped up with well-rotted garden compost.

A week before buying or transferring your bedding plants you will need to give it another light turning, before raking fine and level and marking out any special designs.

There are many permutations you can try using the different colours and heights of the many varieties available.

But there are basis rules: always give height in the middle of 'island' beds and at the rear of beds against walls or fences, while planting edges with lower varieties.

Beds then look more balanced and colourful, even at a distance.

The range of possible plant choices is wide but here are some favourites:

- **Petunias** — though the trumpet-shaped blooms are fragile they are plentiful and come in many colours, making petunias one of the cheapest and most effective 'components' in any bedding scheme.

- **Lobelia** — the different blues and mauves make this little plant a powerful as well as a neat, fast-growing border for beds.

- **Marigolds** — plant the French variety close together to create a rich yellow carpet between edging and the middle of borders. The taller African variety can bring plentiful colour at a higher point of the display — and for less than the cost and trouble spent on dahlias or chrysanthemums.

- **Salvia** — spectacular red spiky blooms make them useful for creating a tight centrepiece or clearly defined parts in a geometric display.

- **Alyssum** — a neat ground-hugging plant best known for its tiny white flowers and suitability for edging or planting in gaps in rocks and slabs.

- **Fuchsias** — expensive to use freely but they can be stunning as specimen plants at the heart of a bedding or container scheme.

- **Antirrhinum** — better known as 'Snapdragons', these come in a range of colours, grow quickly and fit nicely behind 'front rank' edging such as alyssum and lobelia.

It was most gratifying to pay a visit to the Ardmore GAA field recently and to note the care that has been lavished on it by the local club. It is a wonderful amenity, a splendid field, well utilised by the youth of the parish.

There are, of course, many splendid GAA fields in the country, but let's face it, they are sometimes quite a blot on the landscape. The contrary is the case in Ardmore, mainly due to the extensive tree-planting done

by the local club and also by the Tidy Towns Association, so that the bleak and treeless prospect of the parish of Ardmore will be relieved and beautified and the area become a visual asset to the locality. It gladdens my heart to remember that I was responsible for some of the initial planting.

Concern for the environment has increased in recent years and the importance of trees in our landscape is becoming better understood. At a seminar dealing with afforestation, in Dublin, in

October 1985, Dr. David Bellamy said that "people could take the non-civilised way and contrive to turn the world into a drab, dull place or we can start to create a Garden of Eden, a truly civilised world of great beauty."

Give That Fillet Steak A Taste Of Orange



FILLET OF BEEF WITH ORANGES

Ingredients
900g (2lb) piece beef fillet
2x5ml sp (2tsp) arrowroot, blended with 4x5ml sp (4 tsp) cold water
1x15ml sp (1 tbsp) whisky
Marinade
150ml (1/4 pt) ginger wine

2 oranges, grated rind and juice
1.25cm (1/2") root ginger, peeled and grated
1 clove garlic, crushed
2x5ml sp (2tsp) brown sugar

Method
In a large dish mix together all marinade ingredients. Place the fillet in the marinade, turning to

ensure covered. Cover and leave to marinate in a refrigerator for 3-4 hours.

Drain meat from marinade, reserve. Season with black pepper. Place beef on a rack in a preheated oven (Gas mark 6, 200°C, 400°F) for about 50 minutes.

Place reserved marinade in a saucepan, stir in blended arrowroot and whiskey. Bring to the boil stirring continuously until a smooth glossy sauce has formed. Serve the beef with the sauce and fresh seasonal vegetables.

Serves 4-6.

Good News For Roads

Deputy Brendan Kenneally has recently been informed by Michael Smith T.D., Minister for the Environment, of an additional allocation of funding in respect of the road improvements for 1994. The increase in the Discretionary Block Grant allocation is being funded from a further £5 million which the Government are providing — further evidence of the priority which is being given to tackling deficiencies in the county roads networks.

The specific allocations in County Waterford com-

prise:

£390,000 Tramore Ring Road; £160,000 Waterford/Dunmore Road; £150,000 Cappoquin Industrial Estate; £75,000 Tramore/Dunmore Road; £75,000 Dungarvan Coast Road.

The Discretionary Block Grant is for those projects which have a significant economic impact particularly as regards employment and on industrial, tourism, agricultural and rural development.

The programme as a whole is targeted mainly at regional and local roads which are important to the generation of economic activity and jobs, be it in industry, tourism, fisheries, forestry or rural development.

"This comes to an additional £850,000 and I am glad to see these particular stretches of roads being included.

"The Additional Block Grant is £143,000, which means the total allocation to Waterford County Council for 1994 is £2,491,000. This represents an increase of 53% over the 1993 grant and I am sure this will mean that many deficient roads can be targeted this year," said Deputy Kenneally.

DEASY ON ROAD GRANTS

In reply to a question tabled by Fine Gael Deputy, Austin Deasy, the Minister for the Environment, Mr. Michael Smith, disclosed that the total amount paid to Waterford County Council in grants for regional and county roads in 1993 was £1.629 million. It was a matter for the local authority to determine the apportionment as between regional and county roads.

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


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BALLYMACARBRY NEWS

U.S. SCHOLARSHIP FOR NIRE LADY

Mary Wright (nee Crotty) formerly from Knockaunbrandaun, Ballymacarbry and now residing in North Wales, will be taking the trip of a life time after winning a prestigious scholarship.

Mary, aged 42, only daughter of the late Tommy and Annie Crotty, is a Clinical Tutor in Radiography, splitting her time between clinical work in the District Hospital, Gwynedd and lecturing on a BSc Course at the Department of Radiography Education, University of Wales, Bangor.

She received her early education at the little school house at Glenanore in the Nire Valley, then at Bennett's Church, Ballymacarbry. She then received her secondary education at the Presentation Convent, Dungarvan. She trained as a Radiographer from 1973-1976 in North Wales and got full time employment straight away.

Since then she has completed several courses as well as learning Welsh. "I have an interest in people of all ages, a desire to help the sick and injured and the

ability to be tactful and understanding when dealing with people". This, along with an interest in scientific subjects drew her into Radiography. Mary will be visiting America after gaining an AERS (Association of Educators in Radiological Sciences) Scholarship. Only two scholarships were afforded to educators from outside the United States, one of which was offered to Mary and the other went to someone from Australia. I am going to Rochester, Minnesota, first and attending an advanced teaching techniques seminar there. Then its Richmond in Virginia, where I have been invited to visit the Radiography programme and the Medical Centre. I will be able to discuss Radiography Education and tour the facilities. I hope to organise an international link between our students and their students. We already have a link with Radiography students in Ohio. As the world becomes 'smaller' due to more efficient travel and communication, I feel that a common worldwide standard in Radiography education is essential." Mary's husband Dr. David Wright, lectures at Bangor University and is at present in Bangladesh. He will arrive back in time to look after the children, Simon, Naomi and Alistair before she leaves. "Many people think Radiography is simple, a matter of getting a patient to breathe in and then press a button," said Mary. I admit, I used to think that myself but in reality it can be a very complicated course for a student."

On her return Mary will be compiling a report to be presented at a Clinical Education Conference at Keele

University. Hopefully she would like to have her observations published in a National Journal.

BREAK IN

VOCATIONS ARE BACK IN FASHION

Vocations to the Priesthood are back in fashion, judging by figures released by a Co. Tipperary Seminary. Seventeen student priests from St. Patrick's College in Thurles will be ordained to the Priesthood next month, the highest yearly figure in over two decades. The large number of ordinations defies the huge fall-off in vocations in the Western world and coincides with a year when not a single person is being ordained in the Cork dioceses. "It's over 20 years since we had a class of this size. We are very lucky to have so many," said Cashel and Emly Diocesan Vocations Director Fr. Tom Fogarty. He said the College had detected increased interest in the priesthood and had just launched a new brochure aimed at attracting new vocations. A new trend was the growing numbers of men leaving their jobs to study for the priesthood. This was a change in the traditional pattern of students joining directly after leaving school. "We are getting more and more students coming from the workforce. I think this is a good thing because they have seen more of life and are more mature," said Fr. Fogarty. None of the seventeen new priests is being assigned to Missionary work abroad, a reflection of the need for more priests in parishes here.

STOP CLOSING DOWN THE GARDA STATIONS

United Farmers Association calls for a reversal of current Government policies which are leading to the closing down of Garda Barracks, Post Offices and other services which are essential to the people of rural Ireland. The recent tragedies in the Clare/Galway area should bring home to everybody the necessity of maintaining local Garda Barracks where the Gardai will have their finger on the pulse of society. Many people in remote areas live in constant fear of their lives owing to the increase in the numbers of criminals who are quite prepared to mug, maim or murder for money. These violent robbers are very mobile and very often make a clean getaway particularly when there is no local Garda presence to hinder them. Agricultural policies which have held sway since we entered E.E.C. have sav-

agely reduced our rural population and given faceless bureaucrats an excuse to pounce and sometimes remove altogether essential services that have been in place since the foundation of the State. The saving and making of money have taken precedence over all other considerations under the misnomer of efficiency. This definition of efficiency is basically laid down by economists and money managers and takes no account of people. It is time to put radical new policies in place that will rejuvenate rural Ireland and maintain a decent population in frugal comfort. There is a point in popular density below which social structures begin to break down completely. We are rapidly approaching this point in many areas of rural Ireland.

It is time to shout STOP.




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

Born in Athenry, Co. Galway in 1933, Tom Raftery, with the aid of scholarships, studied at UCC and UCD from which he gained an honours degree in Agriculture in 1956. His first appointment was at the Soil Research Laboratory at Johnstown Castle, Co. Wexford from which he returned to join the staff of the new Department of

Farm Management in UCD. In 1960 he undertook postgraduate studies in Germany and Scandinavia, and subsequently he was appointed a College Lecturer in Agriculture in UCD. In 1962 he was responsible for the purchase of Lyons Estate for the Faculty of Agriculture and played a large part in its development, before he was appointed to the Chair

of Agriculture in UCC at the age of 30 years.

In 1974 he was elected by his academic colleagues of UCC to the Governing Body of the College, and in 1977 he was elected to the Senate of the National University of Ireland. He was appointed by the Government to the National Agricultural Authority in the same year. In 1979 he was appointed Vice-President of UCC by the Governing Body of the College, and in the same year he was appointed by the Government to the Higher Education Authority and to the Council of An Foras Talúntais.

Having spearheaded the acquisition and development of Fota Estate, he was co-opted to the Council of the Royal Zoological Society of Ireland in 1989. In 1982 he was honoured with the Cork Kerry Tourism Award on foot of his work in Fota and the same year he was presented with the Person of the

Year Award in recognition of his work on Wildlife Conservation.

He was a member of the European Parliament from 1984 to 1989. While in the Parliament he made major impact being the only Irish full member of the influential Economic Monetary Affairs and Industrial Policy Committee.

Co. Waterford ICMSA News

The Health and Safety Act for farmers is outlined below by County Chairman, John Cusack:—

The increasing number of injuries and deaths resulting from accidents in the work place saw the Health, Safety and Welfare at Work Act being passed through the Dail in 1989 and for the first time all people at work, in whatever field, were covered by this Act. The basic requirements of the 1989 Act were:

'That a Safety Statement be prepared by every employer stating all the hazards which are in his place of work, the assessments of risks and most importantly, the control procedure which is put in place to safeguard people from these hazards.'

Employers are required under this legislation to provide the following:

- 1 — A safe place to work.
- 2 — Safe access and exit.
- 3 — Safe plant and machinery.
- 4 — Safe systems at work.
- 5 — Information and supervision.
- 6 — Personal protective equipment.
- 7 — Emergency procedures.
- 8 — Safety from hazardous articles and substances.
- 9 — Welfare facilities.
- 10 — The services of a competent person.

Similar responsibilities also apply to self-employed persons, which include farmers.

Every employer and self employed person must prepare a written safety statement. This must:

- identify the hazards and assess the risks
- set out the control measures being implemented to safeguard safety and health.
- In the case of employers it must set out the co-operation required from the staff and the names of persons who have specific health and safety responsibilities, e.g. checking fire safety equipment. This safety statement must be updated on a regular basis.

The Act is enforced by an Inspector who acts on behalf of the Health and Safety Authority. The Inspector has the power to:

- enter, inspect, examine and search any place of work and make any enquiries necessary
- require the production of records including the safety statement
- require any person to provide relevant information
- obtain samples and take measurements
- have equipment tested.

During an inspection, the Inspector can examine the safety statement and see how it is being implemented. If it is inadequate, the Inspector will order that it be revised within 30 days.

Where safety standards are not satisfactory, the Inspector can take either of the following actions.

Issue An Improvement Notice

This is where a hazard or a number of hazards are identified which do not present an immediate risk of serious injury. The notice states what improvements are required and gives a date for completing them.

Issue A Prohibition Notice

This is issued where there is an immediate risk of serious injury. The prohibition notice order that the activity causing the safety risk be stopped. A prohibition notice normally takes immediate effect.

Accidents causing a fatality are investigated by an Inspector. Under the Notification of Accidents and Dangerous Occurrences Regulations 1993, certain types of accidents and dangerous occurrences must be notified to the Health and Safety Authorities.

WHAT ARE THE PENALTIES?

A person convicted of an offence under the Act can be fined or imprisoned depending on the nature of the offence. On summary conviction the maximum fine is £1,000. For serious offences, such as non-compliance with the terms of a prohibition notice, conviction on indictment can lead to an unlimited fine or a two year prison sentence, or both.

An Inspector of the Health and Safety Authority prosecutes the case in court. The accused has the right to defend the case and the Judge makes the decision to convict or acquit and apply sentence.

It must be emphasised again that the aim of the Act is to ensure that safety, health and welfare is protected in all work places. Prosecution is reserved only for non-compliance with the Act.

FARMING LEADER

Minister Tackled On Premium Payment Performance

The payment of the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh under the 1993 Premium and Headage Scheme was nothing short of a disaster, according to Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, John Donovan.

Mr. Donovan said: "While last week's announcement from the Minister that his Department has made some 110,000 payments totalling £24 million was welcome, it did not tell the full story. All the payments announced by Minister Walsh last week are owned to farmers at a minimum since last January and a lot of the money owed as far back as last November. It is not acceptable that the Minister and his Department should leave farmers waiting for up to 5 months for their money."

The Aglish livestock

farmer called on Minister Walsh to immediately re-open all local Department of Agriculture Offices on a full-time basis. "Minister Walsh is consistently attempting to blame farmers for failing to respond to Department queries on their files which are holding up payment, while at the same time farmers are unable to contact either local or centralised Department Offices because the Minister has given an instruction to his Department staff to close offices in the afternoon and refuse to take telephone calls from farmers." This type of shabby treatment of farmers is a disgrace and would not be tolerated by any other sector of society. Indeed no other Government Minister would attempt to treat their clients in such a miserable fashion."

Strong Lamb Trade Continues

Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman, James Coughlan has said that the lamb trade continues to strengthen on both the home and export market with prices up all round.

Mr. Coughlan said that the French market was paying a solid 28 FF/kg in rungs last week, equivalent to 151p/lb. While some factories are quoting prices as low as 145p/lb., the IFA sheep farmer said that prices of up to 150p/lb. are widely available.

Mr. Coughlan added that factories were only damag-

ing themselves with producers by quoting lower prices than they were actually paying. "In order that factory quotes are meaningful, they must be representative of what factories are actually paying farmers for lambs."

On the mart trade, Mr. Coughlan said that was a very strong trade in Ennis-corthy last week with over 4,000 lambs on offer. "Prices ranged from £18 to £25 over the £/kilo, with the majority of lambs making £20 to £22 over the £/kilo.

Concern At Recommendations On Occupiers Liability

ICMSA President, Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, advised farmers to continue to restrict entry on their farms until such time as appropriate legislative changes are made to the law on Occupiers Liability.

Mr. O'Dwyer said he is very concerned that the recommendations of the Law Reform Commission do not go far enough towards reducing the level of farmer responsibility for accidents occurring to uninvited persons while on a farmers land.

In particular Mr. O'Dwyer is concerned at the recommended definition of the term 'visitor' which he says in effect would provide an opt out mechanism for trespassers.

"After the long wait for these recommendations, the outcome is quite disappointing. The Commission has really fudged its definition of visitor and consequently its definition of trespassers. ICMSA will not accept a lack of clarity in regard to trespassers. We will not accept that a person unlawfully entering farm land can make himself/herself lawful and thereby validate his/her claim for visitor status. We

will also not accept an obligation on farmers to give a special duty of care to people whom he never asked on to his farm, i.e. conservationists, pollution control, officers, hedge-cutters on behalf of E.S.B., An Post, etc.," said Mr. O'Dwyer.

He added that the ICMSA put a well thought out, clear proposal to the Law Reform Commission proposing two categories of entrant, invited and uninvited. He said the ICMSA left no ambiguity whatsoever for the legal profession to play around with.

"The Recommendations, if they are to be implemented, would prove a bonanza for the legal people and a nightmare for farmers and other property owners.

"Therefore I am stressing that farmers, in so far as is possible, should continue to restrict access to their properties, as it is our view that if these Recommendations are implemented, farmers could be more liable than they are at present," said Mr. O'Dwyer.

The ICMSA is now seeking an immediate meeting with the Minister for Equality and Law Reform, Mr. Mervyn Taylor.

Question By Deputy Deasy On Ardmore Harbour

Deputy Austin Deasy asked the Minister for the Marine, David Andrews, T.D., the plans, if any, he has to construct a new harbour with the aid of structural funds at Ardmore, Co. Waterford for fishery and recreational purposes.

The Minister in his reply said: "Under the National Development Plan a sum of £12 million is being made available by the government towards the improvement of facilities, including the ice plant network, at fishery harbours. In order to optimise the benefits of harbour investment projects, the Department is formulating a Fishery Harbour Development Plan to be implemented over the next six years. Given the total costs of the projects submitted to the Department for consideration and possible inclusion in the plan far exceed the monies available, only the projects considered most strategically or economically beneficial will be included in the final plan. No development works will be undertaken unless the costs can be justified by reference to the economic benefits arising.

On February 24, 1994, one of the Department's engineers met with a number of local interests in Ardmore and advised on the types of studies that would be required in advance of any development works. The engineer further advised that local interests should liaise and consult closely with Waterford County Council who are responsible for the harbour.

"It is desirable that any development which might be undertaken in the fishery interest be co-ordinated with other developments, such as recreational facilities, to ensure compatibility and to maximise the gain from carrying them out together."

Council To Raise Take-Away Issue At National Level

conducive to such unacceptable behaviour.

"Therefore, I'm putting this motion forward to find out the national reaction to these opening hours", he concluded.

"NO ALCOHOL IN CHIPS"

On a discordant note, however, Cllr. Nuala Ryan (F.F.) stressed that chip shops were not to blame. "There is no alcohol in chips", she candidly declared, insisting rather that the unacceptable behaviour starts in public houses with people having had too much to drink.

Objecting to Cllr. Hallahan's motion on the grounds of the stipulated 12 midnight closure, Cllr. Billy Kyne (Labour) felt midnight would be an unreasonable early closure time for fast food outlets, - an idea which may well not be supported at a national level, he added.

UNFAIR TO BLAME CHIPPERS

Slamming that it was unfair to blame chippers for being the root of all late night violence, Cllr. Mario Flavin said that fast food outlets were only providing a service and if open until 12 midnight, the same could happen. The Fine Gael councillor pointed instead to the discos and called for a 1.30 a.m. closing hour on chippers before the discos end at 2 a.m. "I'm afraid that Cllr. Hallahan's proposal is so drastic as to be defeated", he added. Supporting Cllr. Flavin was Cllr. Paddy Power (Labour) who said he too did not blame the chippers, claiming that only a certain element of the population caused the trouble.

Also voicing his opinion on the matter was Cllr. Michael O'Riordan who felt that although the take-aways were not the kernel of the problem, he would, nevertheless, support Cllr. Hallahan's motion as the issue "should be debated at national level to get the feeling of other towns".

There followed a protracted discussion with various members extending differing opinions on the fast food outlet scenario.

U.D.C. Chairman, Cllr. Tony Wright (D.C.) described chippers as 'congregation places' adding that it was a 'proven fact', that trouble had erupted both outside and inside the premises of fast food outlets. "We must think of the people living beside chip shops", the Chairman urged.

NATIONAL OR LOCAL ISSUE?

Responding to the various criticisms of his colleagues, Cllr. Hallahan retorted he

was 'in no way blaming the chip shops for any late night violence' rather he was trying to eliminate the vandalism that occurs as a result of these places.

"I'm anxious to see if the issue is a national or a local problem, and if it is national, I would then hope that this council would take the first step", Cllr. Hallahan concluded. The motion was subsequently seconded by Cllr. O'Riordan.

Sticking, however, to the 1.30 a.m. take away closure as suggested by Cllr. Flavin, Cllr. Power proposed an amendment seconded by Cllr. Dixon that legislation be introduced by the Government limiting the opening hours of take-away fast food outlets to 1.30 a.m. on the same day".

On a subsequent vote, the amendment was declared carried by 6 votes to 3.

Expansion of RTE's Regional News Service

A major and innovative expansion of RTE's news coverage in the Region has been welcomed by the leaders of local Government throughout the South East as a significant breakthrough.

At a reception in Waterford on Tuesday, May 10, the man behind the development, RTE's director of News, Dr. Joe Mulholland, said it would bring a more comprehensive news service to the viewing public in the region than had previously been possible.

Dr. Mulholland explained that under the new service the Mount Leinster, serving the South East, switches out of the RTE national transmission system for an experimental three minute period within the 6.01 evening news bulletin. In that three minutes, viewers in the South East, see their own Regional news service, broadcast from the Waterford studio.

The Regional News transmits at 6.40 each day from Monday to Friday and is fronted by RTE's South Eastern Correspondent, Michael Ryan, with a new face to the service, journalist Michael Bance. The experiment will end on June 10 so that audience reaction can be assessed and a decision will be made on whether or not it should continue in next Autumn's transmission schedule.

Appearance Of Approach Roads — The standard of the approach roads was again somewhat inconsistent although some of the sections referred to last year had been upgraded. The Rosslare approach with its "welcome" display looked very well. The Tramore approach had reasonable grass verges, improving greatly towards the town. The stone wall along by the sea (opposite the Friary College) would look much better if the grass were removed from it. It was good to see the grass verges along the minor approaches also cut. The by-pass is beginning to

mature well with fine trees and well maintained grass margins.

Weed control was generally good except for a few unfortunate outbreaks such as at the base of the post and chains across the road from Causeway Park.



Minister Tackled On Premium Payment Performance

The payment of the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh under the 1993 Premium and Headage Scheme was nothing short of a disaster, according to Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, John Donovan.

Mr. Donovan said: "While last week's announcement from the Minister that his Department has made some 110,000 payments totalling £24 million was welcome, it did not tell the full story. All the payments announced by Minister Walsh last week are owned to farmers at a mini-

mum since last January and a lot of the money owed as far back as last November. It is not acceptable that the Minister and his Department should leave farmers waiting for up to 5 months for their money."

The Aglish livestock farmer called on Minister Walsh to immediately reopen all local Department of Agriculture Offices on a full-time basis. "Minister Walsh is consistently attempting to blame farmers for failing to respond to Department queries on their files which are holding up payment, while at the same time farmers are unable to contact either local or centralised Department Offices because the Minister has given an instruction to his Department staff to close offices in the afternoon and refuse to take telephone calls from farmers." This type of shabby treatment of farmers is a disgrace and would not be tolerated by any other sector of society. Indeed no other Government Minister would attempt to treat their clients in such a miserable fashion."



Sexual Attack On Dungarvan Teenager

Gardaí in Dungarvan investigating a sexual attack on a teenage girl in the early hours of Monday morning have appealed to the public for assistance in their efforts to track down the attacker or attackers.

The 19-year-old was walking home alone after attending a local disco when she was dragged into an unlit driveway at O'Connell Street and attacked at around 2.45 a.m. It's not certain if there were one or two people involved.

Passersby heard her cries for help and immediately alerted the gardaí, who

were on the scene within minutes. They found the young girl in an extremely distressed state. Her attacker(s) had fled the scene.

She was taken to the local garda station where she received medical treatment before being driven home by the gardaí. It is understood she had scratches and abrasions on different parts of her body.

In a search of the immediate area of the attack, gardaí recovered the girl's necklace and an item of her underclothing. These will now be forensically examined.

"Fortunately, the girl

wasn't seriously injured, but nonetheless she was in an extremely distressed and upset state following the incident", Inspector Michael Blake told the Leader.

"We regard this as a very serious incident and we need to apprehend whoever was involved", Inspector Blake said.

"We would appeal to anyone who was in the general area of O'Connell Street between 2.30 a.m. and 3 a.m. on Monday morning to come forward", he said.



GAA Has Become Power Structure

A chara,

In his farewell speech as President of the GAA, Peter Quinn rejected the notion that the GAA should confine itself to being simply a sporting organisation. For me, this sums up many of the problems of the organisation, both nationally and within Co. Waterford. Because of the role it has assumed as some kind of broad social and cultural movement, the GAA has, in fact, become a power structure in Irish society, running alongside, and frequently interwoven with, other national institutions such as the big political parties and the Catholic Church.

As a result, the GAA has repeatedly tended to lose sight of what is the primary — indeed, the only — interest of the vast majority of its members, i.e. the games themselves. Other sporting organisations have no broader agenda than promoting their own games and therefore many do this far better than the GAA. This is quite obvious with the game of soccer, which all over the country is run by dedicated officials whose only concern is the game itself. The general result is well-run competitions which provide regular weekly games for eight or more months of the year for all age groups.

The GAA responds to outside criticism and competitive threats from other sports in the time-honoured manner of all institutional power structures, i.e. with a negative sense of paranoia. Instead of attempting to compete with other sports by providing a better product, the GAA's typical response is to try to exclude them, as was the case with the old Ban on selected "foreign" games. The recent fiasco involving Roundwood GAA Club in Wicklow shows how strongly the old Ban mentality still survives in the upper levels of the organisation.

The power struggle currently dragging on within Waterford GAA circles demonstrates just how little the promotion of the games themselves means to some people. It also shows just how important it is to

create organisational structures which prevent certain groups from obtaining an entrenched power position. As we can see, once such a position is established, it becomes almost impossible for the forces of democracy to break it.

All I can say about the present ructions in the County Board is that, when there were no ructions in the past, there was nothing else happening either — no success at intercounty level, nothing being done in the schools, no shelter at matches for the long-suffering spectators, and open sewers (at best) for "toilet facilities." If it takes ructions to tackle these problems, then I am all for it.

One group within the GAA in Waterford who seem to be genuinely dedicated to the games themselves are the officials of Bord na nOg and the club officials who have been doing truly excellent work at under-age level. It seems such a pity that players graduating from this level are then faced with a morass of disunity and incompetence. I had high hopes for the senior hurling team in 1992 (even before the under-age breakthroughs) but these hopes I have now abandoned.

For the time being I would recommend to all those mentors who are genuinely concerned with the games to put all their energies into the juvenile level. We will never gain senior success on the basis of one year's achievements in the under-age grades. We should set a target of at least one more minor and under-21 Munster titles in the next three years. Already we have seen this year with the under-21 footballers what can be achieved with good leadership and organisation. If we can build on the 1992 successes we might have the basis for a senior breakthrough in five years time. Perhaps even by then we will have a united County Board and a capable senior selection committee.

MUNSTER MINOR FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

Tremendous Display By Waterford Minors

WATERFORD 1-7 TIPPERARY 0-6

This was by any standards a tremendous performance by Waterford minor footballers and despite the closeness of the scoring, it was a game that was dominated by them for the greater part of the exciting hour and one that they fully deserved to win and qualify for a semi-final meeting with Clare at Tipperary Town on July 15. Our fifteen wides to Tipperary's four, gives a fair indication of the full measure of our superiority. Inaccuracy was our big worry and had the visitors snatched a score or two against the run of play, and which seemed possible on occasions, our misses would indeed have proven costly.

But overall it was a really great display of commitment and dedication in a game that was fast, very physical and played in underfoot conditions made difficult by three days of incessant rain.

Tipperary were very hotly fancied to win (we have not beaten them in this grade during the past ten years), they were the bigger team and had a number of top-class players, some of whom had played in the grade for the previous two seasons. All our side are on the 18 years age bracket and not one of them will be eligible for minor next year. This is a most unusual situation and it very rarely happens.

The big home crowd who travelled to Stradbally for the game got great value and roared themselves hoarse in support. Many among those remarked about the delightful experience of seeing Waterford win three Munster championship under-age football games on the trot.

PLAY

A slight breeze blew in from the ocean and favoured Tipperary who

went two points up in the early stages. Andy Moloney and Donal Duggan took their points well and we were moving up to the 17th minute before midfielder Tom Flynn (our under-age player of the year 1993) made no mistake and neither did Ciaran Curran a couple of minutes later, to shoot Waterford level on 0-2 apiece. Stephen Cunningham, playing on his own club territory, sent over a delightful score in the 23rd minute to put us in front for the first time.

Donal Duggan, who had an outstanding game for the visitors, brought the teams level with a pointed free in the 28th minute, but Stephen Cunningham sent over a left-footer to put us back in front in the 29th minute. Then came our greatest let-off of the match when Tipperary's Mark Ryan sent a low ball inches wide with our defence wide open. This was a relief and left us 0-4 to 0-3 ahead at the break.

EARLY POINT

Mark Ryan, who missed the goal, had the early second point which brought the teams level again. Water-

ford thundered back and Stuart Barry was inches wide of the Tipp goal. In the 10th minute of the half, Gavin Keane sent Waterford into the lead, again with a well-taken point and continuing to pressurise the Tipperary defence, Waterford sent over a couple of narrow wides before Derek Hayes jumped high for an incoming ball and fisted it to the net to extend our lead to four points in the 43rd minute. Tipperary were certainly not in a mood to surrender and kept fighting back to get on terms and took a step towards that end when substitute Colum Reaney pointed to leave just a score between the sides and with almost ten minutes remaining. Gary Mernagh reduced our lead still further with a splendid point in the 25th minute, but fortunately this was to be their final score of the match. Gavin Keane made no mistake with his 26th minute free and Ciaran Curran sent over our insurance point in the 28th minute to guarantee us a place in the Munster semi-final in two months time.

For Waterford, all sixteen

players acquitted themselves very well and can feel justifiably proud of their contributions to yet another 1994 Munster championship victory.

Vital Games In Senior And Intermediate Hurling

Full Schedule Of J.H.C. Games Listed For Western Division

With Fraher Field now reopened and an additional venue available, the problem of fixtures will be somewhat lessened in the months ahead and the Board will be able to deal with the backlog caused by bad weather, etc., etc.

For a number of clubs, the point of no return will have been reached if they lose out over the coming weekend and a glance at our league table in hurling will show the precarious position in which a number of teams find themselves, even at this early stage.

With just a score of adult hurling championships listed between Western and County Boards, patrons will have quite a choice of venue, but the expectations are that the majority of hurling followers will opt for Fraher Field where last year's finalists, Lismore and Passage renew rivalry in what is listed as the feature game. Tallow and Ballygunner meet in the curtain raiser and with such a programme for the afternoon and a clash between Fourmilewater and Roanmore in the evening, the newly opened venue can be expected to return one of its biggest 'gates' of the season before the knockout stages are reached.

Passage, undefeated to-date and with the best winning sequence over the past few years, look to be the team they all must beat to win the 1994 title. They have been beaten only once in 14 matches and that was when losing by a single point (0-8 to 0-7). In fact they have been beaten only three times in their last 22 championship matches. They are top of the table at the moment and after their spirited and very skillful display against the 1992 champions, Ballygunner, at Walsh Park last weekend, they look like remaining there for the time being, at least. They are probably the most evenly balanced team in the championship at the moment and there isn't a weak link from goalkeeper Ray Barry to the corner forwards. Eamon and Sean Cullinane are their anchors in defence and surrounded by Ed. Quann, Seamus Keating and James and Pat Connors, very little will get through their rearguard. Paul Connors and Paul Fitzgerald, Martin Murphy, Mossie O'Keeffe, Anthony Fitzgerald, etc., are others who continue to impress since the club won the county intermediate title back in 1988.

For this clash, Lismore will be far weaker than when defeating Passage in the '93 county final. Sean Daly has now transferred to Desmonds in London, Billy Lee is now playing with Ballygiblin. Paddy O'Donnell, who will be going to Austria for work experience, Philly Hickey, Brendan Lawton and Michael O'Sullivan, now married and living in Ballina, Co. Mayo are unlikely to be available also, so the matter of defending their title, is going to pose a major problem for the champions. Passage, in the circumstances, must be given the vote here.

TALLOW v. BALLYGUNNER

The last occasion on which the sides met was back in 1991 and after a real thriller, Tallow came out winners by a couple of points (4-13 to 3-14), but fortunes have since changed and so have standards and Tallow, on the basis of their most recent displays, can hardly be fancied here.

The 'Gunnars, champions of 1992, are strongly in contention and breathing down the necks of Passage and must be given the vote here.

FOURMILEWATER v. ROANMORE

This is the evening match at Fraher Field and will bring into opposition two sides who have yet to win a match. Roanmore have played four and Fourmilewater have had two games. Roanmore have failed to score a goal in their last five matches (including the semi-final against Lismore last year), but they have scored a big number of points in their four matches to-date in the present championship. They might manage a win here, but this cannot be predicted with any great confidence. Roanmore cannot win enough points to be involved in the knockout stages, while Fourmilewater have a slim outside chance.

MOUNT SION v. DE LA SALLE

One of the pair seems certain to qualify for the knockout stages and the result of this meeting will help in deciding. They are on equal points, but Mount Sion have a game in hand.

When they last met 'Sion won by 2-15 to 3-8. It might be closer this time. Mount Sion will be slight favourites to take the points.

PORTLAW v. BALLYDUFF

This will be played at Fraher Field on Friday evening and will be very important for both. Portlaw are unbeaten and are fancied to qualify for the knockout stages, but will need to win here to make reasonably certain.

Ballyduff, after just one lapse of form, seem to be back in form again and will be difficult enough to beat here. The teams haven't met in a long time.

COLLIGAN v. DUNHILL

These, as far as I know, will be meeting for the first time in the senior championship and this adds interest to the contest. Dunhill seem to be doing better than most people had expected and are motoring along nicely with 5 points from 3 games while Colligan have yet to record a win. Dunhill will be favourites and expected to win this one at Stradbally on Saturday evening.

STRADBALLY v. DUNHILL

The teams will meet for their first time in the senior championship and the expectations are that Dungarvan, having shown good improvement when beating Saviours last week, will win. Stradbally have one point from their draw with Clonea.

INTERMEDIATE HURLING

We are now at the stage where all games are important and very few clubs can afford to lose, if they hope to remain in contention.

Some nice contests are in prospect over the weekend at a number of venues in what is termed the final round in the league section, but is not because a number of games had to be cancelled for one reason or other.

Erin's Own will be fancied to beat St. Mary's at Kilmac' but I for one would not bank on such a result.

Kilmacthomas face a big test when taking on Cappo-

quin and this will be an interesting game at Colligan on Sunday.

It will surprise many followers if Shamrocks fail to beat Tramore at the Leamybrien venue which hosts two matches in this grade on Sunday, the other being the clash between Ring and Ballydurn. A surprise win over Ballysaggart put Ballydurn back into contention again, so this will be a close one. Ring, who recently defeated Abbeyside, may just shade it.

Abbeyside and St. Mollers meet at Kilmacthomas on Sunday afternoon in a repeat of their 1993 clash at the same venue when Abbeyside won on a 2-7 to 0-4 scoreline. It will be different now and Abbeyside will be put to the pin of their collars to scrape through.

JUNIOR HURLING

The Comeragh Oil junior hurling championship is certainly producing its share of surprises, not least among them is the emergence of Tourin as a strong force in the junior championship proper.

Their game against the Geraldines will be one of the best in the grade on Sunday, with Kilgobinet expected to account for Modeligo and Clashmore favourites to beat Ballinameela, we will have excellent fare in the grade.

RESULTS

The Lawlor's Hotel senior hurling championship produced some good games over the weekend, but there were no real shocks.

Mount Sion had a deserved four points win over Roanmore who have now gone through four games in the present championship without scoring a goal. Dungarvan recorded their first win of the championship when beating Saviours and Ballyduff beat Stradbally, but only just. Clonea, as will be seen on our results list, had a very easy win against Colligan.

The game of the weekend was the splendid clash of the leaders, Passage and Ballygunner. The winners might have been flattered by their five points winning margin.

In intermediate hurling, Erin's Own recorded a win over Cappoquin and Tramore had no answer to St. Mary's. The junior hurling results also make interesting reading.

The arrangements for the reopening of Fraher Field went off without a hitch on Sunday last when a big crowd turned out to be part of the ceremonies and events which were organised to celebrate the historic occasion.

The seating (with back support) is of a higher quality than most stands around at the present.

There is a V.I.P. section in which the visiting dignitaries sat for the official opening ceremony which was performed by the Association President Jack Boothman who was visiting Waterford for the first time.

Nioclás MacCraith was M.C. for the opening and paid tribute to the County Chairman Eamon Murphy and the committees, etc., who played leading roles in the redevelopment of the historic grounds. Eamon O Murchu, also paid tribute to the committees responsible and named the principal officers of the Fraher Field Committee and Deise Development Draw Committee who worked so hard over the past year and more in working, planning and fundraising for the project. He also paid tribute to the 14,500 members who had contributed to the county draw last year.

The President, Jack Boothman showed that he knew a bit about the history of the grounds when he detailed some of the major events which took place there. He said the people of Portlairge could feel proud of having such a splendid venue, which was now fit to host important inter-county matches and he congratulated everyone responsible. He said he was
