## Good News For St. Joseph's Hospital

During a ministerial visit to St. Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan last Monday, it was formally announced by the Minister for Health, Brendan Howlin, T.D. that a £100,000 allocation is to be immediately made available for the planning and design of the first phase of the targetted development plan at St. Joseph's Geriatric Hospital, Dungarvan.

Accompanying the Minister on an inspection of the Dungarvan Hospital were Mr. Pat McLoughlin, acting

# Scene Set For Lismore Festival Of Early Music

The historic setting of the heritage town of Lismore will be the scene for the second West Waterford Festival of Early Music this coming June.

Following on from the festival's resounding success last year, a huge attendance of early music fans, prominent musicians from both near and far and even the Crown Prince of Utopia are expected to throng the sleepy streets of Lismore. Indeed, bookings are already exceeding the organisers' expectations with both Lismore and Ballyrafter Hotel almost booked out for the exciting event.

For three fun filled days, 10th to 12th June, Lismore will be literally time warped into the Middle Ages, featuring a variety of period ensembles from the Middle Ages, the Renaissance and the Baroque epoch, courtesy of the Lismore dramatic society and culminating in the historic pageant on Sunday, June 12, proceeding from the gates of Lismore Castle through the Main Street and the Mall to 17th Century Lismore Cathedral.

## SHOW MUST GO ON

Speaking at a press reception at the Lismore Bank of Ireland branch recently Festival Director Neil Twomey informed press members that a team of 'Town Criers' will be on hand over the weekend to keep the public abreast of the various happenings. "There will be early music in the pubs, daily lunch time concerts in the newly refurbished Lismore Hotel, street theatre and street music", declared Mr. Twomey adding that the fair on the Mall will give visitors the unique opportunity to browse at their leisure and avail of a wide variety of medieval food.

Handling the musical side of events is renowned Musical Director, Dr. Jan van

Putten who is also a professor of political science. Just weeks before this year's event Jan has sustained a broken hip but this has not prevented him from sticking to the old maxim - 'the show must go on' and the Dutchman has been totally immersed in finalising the musical end of the programme.

"While I have been busily engaged in organising the Early Music Ensembles," he said, "much hard work has been done finalising the fringe events. There are a great many this year and I feel that this will put the seal of success on the festival". Jan went on to say how grateful he was to Dean Cecil Weekes for putting the beautiful St. Carthage's Cathedral at the festival's disposal. "A number of other events will be taking place there during the day which I am confident will attract a large audience", he added.

## COMMUNITY EFFORT

The seeds of the very first West Waterford festival of early music were set last year by Jan who invited musicians from Cork, Dublin and Waterford to discuss the idea of a festival, ultimately culminating in the successful musical fête which attracted almost 4,000 visitors last year.

Enchanted by the fairytale aspect of magical Lismore with its natural surroundings, majestic Knockmealdown mountains, its heritage centre and its captivating castle and Cathedral, Jan found the setting to be the ideal venue for such a festival.

To mount such a festival is naturally a massive undertaking and without the dedicated work of the organising committee and the financial help of many sponsors, in particular the bank of Ireland and Bulmers, there would have been no festival this year.

"There are many backroom men and women who will

not get their names in print", said Neil Twomey, "but they will have put in hours of organisational work to get this festival off the ground". Organisation of the action filled event was mainly a community effort with all strata of the locality lending a hand. The aforementioned Lismore dramatic society have been involved for months in organising appropriate costumes, the Tidy Towns Committee, Waterford Development Partnership, Lismore Town Commissioners, local retailers, the heritage centre and Waterford Co. Council have all shown their massive interest in, and support of, the event which, they hope, will attract a huge crowd, thus boosting the tourism economy of West Waterford and surrounding environs.

## MAIN EVENTS

"Excellent Early Music groups from Galway, Dublin, Cork, Waterford and York in England will converge on Lismore for this event", promises Jan.

## FRIDAY

Following the official opening on Friday June 10th by Mike Murphy and the Crown Prince of Utopia on the steps of the heritage centre, a concert will be held in Lismore cathedral by the York Waits, a Renaissance Brass Band from York, England, playing music from the 15th, 16th, and early 17th centuries (£7). In the afternoon, they will also give a concert for school classes. At 11.30 p.m., 'nightwatchmen' will have a musical procession through the streets, marking the end of the first festival day.

## SATURDAY

Following the success of last year, Noírin Ní Riain will be returning to St. Mary's Abbey, Glencairn on Saturday, June 11th, to perform a recital with the monks of Mount Mellera and the community of St. Mary's Abbey (£3). The main

evening concert will be given by the Dublin Consort of Viols, directed by Andrew Robinson, one of Ireland's foremost specialists of Early Music, with Rachael Talbot, soprano, and Jenny Robinson, recorder (£7). At Lismore hotel, Bonnie Shaljean will give a medieval and Renaissance music for harp concert. At 2 p.m., the instigator himself, Jan van Putten will play some earliest organ music in the Cathedral while later on at the Lismore Hotel venue music from 5 centuries, performed in period clothes on a variety of instruments will be performed by Galway Early Music.

## Sunday

The final night sees the East Cork Choral Society with orchestra and soloists under the baton of Colin Nicholls giving a performance of Handel's famous Judas Maccabaeus (£7). 3.30 p.m. will see the coronation of His Highness the crown Prince of Utopia in front of Lismore Cathedral, in co-operation with Lismore dramatic society, including a procession of the Crown Prince, the royal household, priests, monks, soldiers, artisans, farmers and hosts of musicians etc.

The price for an all-in-ticket is a reasonable £17.50 and this includes admission to all main concerts and a copy of the extensive programme book. If you require more information about the Festival or accommodation in the Blackwater area, tel. 058/54975 or fax/058/53009.

The advice from Festival Director Neil, to those who want to enjoy a fun-filled, musical weekend, is to head to Lismore on the 10th, 11th and 12th. "They won't be disappointed", he said, "and the committee are going to organise some sunny weather".

# Best Ways To Beat Weeds



It is one of the great ironies of gardening that you can labour long and hard to produce certain plants and fail, while weeds come up with no help at all.

Apart from making gardens look untidy, weeds also steal light and water from preferred plants and may even encourage pests and disease.

There are annual and perennial types: annuals spread by seeding beds and borders that we so lovingly prepare — control by striking before they seed.

Perennials are more insidious. In summer they will spread above and below ground with great speed but lay dormant underground in winter ready for next year — bindweed is one of the worst culprits.

It is usually perennials that, despite thorough destruction of tops in the hope of killing the roots, gardeners sometimes have to resort to chemicals.

However, the 'green' message is getting across to gardeners and they tend to avoid use of chemicals whenever possible.

Instead, tried and trusted, if more demanding, methods are back in favour:—

- **DISPOSAL** — it may sound basic advice, but never dispose of weeds on to the compost heap. Their seeds and roots have a habit of surviving to fight another day.
- **DIGGING** — this is where weed control really starts. The fleshy roots of troublesome perennials such as bindweed often show up at this stage. Remove as much as possible and burn or bin them. Surface weeds can be buried deep as you turn soil but you risk seeds coming to the surface next time, so it is better to dispose of these too.
- **HAND** — it can be backbreaking but the technique is easily the most effective when dealing with weeds which are easily and cleanly pulled out. It is also useful for teasing out intruders before they get a grip on the confined spaces of a rockery.
- **HOEING** — still one of the best weapons against weeds and, with the exception of the gardener's trusty fork and spade, this is the tool to spend money on — you will get your money's worth.

A hoe with a good edge can be used with great effect and accuracy to cut away weed greenery just below the surface, thereby starving the roots.

However, hoeing will need to be very effective to get the upper hand over the more invasive perennials.

**FLAME GUN** — once beloved by commercial growers and still used to clear overgrown derelict ground, this method did give way to chemicals. Though chemicals are not so much in favour, the risk of scorching away the good with the bad — not to mention your toes — make this a risky proposition in most gardens.

**MULCHING** — a layer of pulverised bark, shredded newspaper, stone chippings of another medium allows water and nutrients into the soil but starves weeds of light and easy growth as well as keeping moisture in.

# A Special Day For St. John's School

"Happy Birthday" will be the order of the day on Sunday next, May 29. St. John's School, Dungarvan, have chosen that date to celebrate their Silver Jubilee, and to honour the occasion, Bishop William Lee will offer Mass in St. Mary's Parish Church, Dungarvan at 3 p.m. The congregation will include pupils and past-pupils and their families, staff, Board of Management, local dignitaries and clergy, teachers from schools in the area, and, importantly, supporters and benefactors are invited to celebrate with the school.

In 1964, when the closure of St. Michael's Orphanage, Cappoquin was expected, many in the West Waterford Community felt that a special school should be established in the vacated buildings. Not least among the benefits of such a school would be the facility to educate 'special needs' children in the own locality on a daily basis — obviously preferable to sending them to Cork or Kilkenny to avail of residential placement.

A dedicated and hard-working committee was established in Cappoquin, as "St. John's Association," and, with the support of the late Dr. Michael O'Neill, Medical Officer of the Health Authority, the undertook the task of compiling statistical data on numbers of children in West Waterford and Youghal requiring Special Education. The Department of Education was receptive to the proposals of St. John's Association that a special school be established, but pointed out that Dungarvan was the centre of population, and therefore a suitable school should be built there.

Fund raising began and a site was sought, and on January 7, 1969 St. John's School was opened in temporary premises provided by the Presentation Community (and catered also by the St. Vincent de Paul Society). The first Principal was Peader Mac Carra, who is now the school's 'cigire', and he taught with Sr. Regina Carlton R.I.P. Appointees to the staff in those early days included

Anna Kirwan and Sheila Curran (both still teaching in the school), Sr. Regina Power, Tom Trihy and Marie Welford.

Noel Brennan was appointed Principal in 1975 and the school moved to new buildings in 1976 (on the Youghal Road site provided by the Presentation Sisters).

The success of St. John's School owes much to the hard work of the pioneering days. Regretfully, many of those involved have gone to their eternal reward — Canon Dan Byrne, Norman Walsh, Michael Culloo, Brigid Tyers, Michael Nagle, Dr. Michael O'Neill, Brigid O'Brien, Horace Dowd, Jessie Coward and Richie Walsh. The secret of their success was the establishment of local committees in each parish, who organised raffles, dances, benefit nights, etc., but above all an annual church-gate collection which is still an important event in the Association's year. Anne McGrath, Cappoquin and Mary O'Donovan (now retired in Ballyporeen), hon. treasurer and hon. secretary respectively for many years, both of whom did outstanding work for St. John's Association are eagerly awaiting next Sunday's Silver Jubilee celebrations.

Twenty-five years later, how is St. John's School progressing? There are 51 pupils, boys and girls, aged 5-8 years, from a large catchment area (including 6 from Youghal). They have a variety of special educational needs of a

mild nature, and many travel from Tallow, Knockanore, Lismore, Cappoquin, Clashmore, Aglish, Old Parish, Ardmore, Modeligo, Kilbrien, Ballinamult, Colligan, Leamybrien and Stradbally by special buses; the school also has many pupils from Dungarvan and Abbeyside.

To help meet individual needs the school has four teachers who are specialists. In addition there are part-time teachers of cookery / domestic, woodwork/crafts and physical education. There are also a childcare assistant, two classroom assistants, a cook who provides a hot meal daily at little cost to the pupils, a life-guard for swimming sessions, a cleaner and a caretaker. Speech and Language therapy is provided, where necessary, by the South Eastern Health Board therapist who attends one full day per week. The Dept. of Education Visiting Teacher Service also supports the school, especially when pupils have vision or hearing impairments. The school is run by a Board of Management which is chaired by J. D. Hally.

Prior to enrolment, pupils are fully assessed to pinpoint their special needs; this service is usually arranged through the local S.E.H.B. Medical Officer.

Small classes, a varied and interesting curriculum, and a warm and friendly environment all help to banish feelings of failure. Increased self-esteem, a re-

laxed atmosphere and a positive attitude help pupils to reach their potential while accepting their limitations.

While St. John's is a Dept. of Education School, it's success is heavily dependent on St. John's Association's huge financial contribution. The South Eastern Health Board also supports the school, as do the Urban District Council, Lions Club, local vintners and business community, and many clubs and societies. A welcome development in recent years has been a number of bequests and gifts from benefactors and friends.

So there's much to celebrate on Sunday, May 29. The pupils are busy learning hymns and readings. Many past pupils await a chance to meet their peers to swap stories from the 70's and 80's, and it promises to be a joyous occasion for everybody present. But it is also a time for the school to say "thank you very much" to its supporters and fundraisers, Health Board and education personnel, clergy and the teachers in Primary and Secondary schools, who continue to urge parents to avail of the special service.

Sunday's Mass will be an acknowledgement of the relationship between St. John's and the large community it serves — a relationship of mutual dependence and contribution. All who are interested in Special Education are welcome.

## The Credit Union And You

### QUESTION

Can anyone borrow from the Credit Union.

### ANSWER

No. Only members may borrow. They must be over 18 years of age and in good standing by their record of Share/Savings and loan repayments. Loans may be granted for any good purpose if:

- (i) You show that you have a need and
- (ii) Can prove your ability and intent to repay.

Applications for loans are made on a Loan Application Form. Each application is treated with confidence on its merits. It is credit union policy to meet the borrowing requirements of as many members as possible. Thus, for example, within its central principle of equity, a number of small loans may

be given priority over one or two big ones.

The applicant's record of saving and possible previous loan repayments as well as need and ability to repay are taken into account when considering this application.

All loans are made by cheque and a Promissory Note is completed for each.

A member who experiences difficulty in meeting repayments to the credit union should immediately explain the situation to the credit union where the member will be sympathetically received and have the loan renegotiated to suit the new circumstances.



In his deep love and commitment to his family and extending from this a life filled with unselfish Christian contribution to organisations and individuals in his native Ballysaggart. Not that his life was in any way confined to this locality. John Joe was known and respected over a wide area by young and old alike as was clearly evidenced by the large and representative gatherings on both Monday evening's removal and Tuesday's burial.

## Pinning down Heart Disease

NEXT weekend 26-29 May is Happy Heart Weekend. All over the country, volunteers will be selling Happy Heart Pins to raise funds for the Irish Heart Foundation.

The project, which is sponsored by Flora, is expected to raise over £300,000. This will be used to help in the fight against coronary heart disease.

### Number 1 Killer

Heart disease is still Ireland's number one killer. Last year, 45% of all deaths were heart related. That's twice as many deaths as claimed by all cancers combined.

The Irish Heart Foundation is involved in three main areas of

activity to combat heart disease: education, community service and research. The Foundation has drawn up a national strategy aiming at a 40% reduction in mortality from heart disease by the Year 2000.

Flora also supports the reduction of heart disease, and distributes relevant information and literature through the Flora programme for Heart Disease Prevention

### National Survey

The "Happy Heart Survey" on health behaviour in Ireland, recently published by the Irish Heart Foundation, highlighted the fact that only 10% of Irish people aged 30 to 69 use a polyunsaturated spread. Almost 50% use butter or dairy spreads, while 30% use low fat spreads.

The advice from the Irish Heart Foundation is that

where the overall diet is high in saturated fat, the balance of fats can be improved by using a polyunsaturated or mono-unsaturated spread.



McGrath also admitted having in his possession a lamp for the purpose of taking fish. He was fined £150 and O'Grady was fined £100. They were each ordered to pay £146 costs and witnesses expenses. Mr. Peter Reilly, solr. for the Southern Regional Fisheries Board, told Judge Michael Pattwell that on Wednesday evening at 6.30 p.m. while it was dark, three fishery officers were on patrol on the River Nire. They saw a light and approached it. They could see two men lamping the river. They waited until the men came to where they were, they approached and apprehended them, Mr. Reilly, said. They seized a gaff and a powerful battery lamp from McGrath. The two men accompanied the fishery officers to Ballymacarbry Garda Station where they gave their correct names and addresses, he said. The lamp and gaff would be forfeited, Mr. Reilly told the court. It was a straight forward case of poaching on the River Nire which was a valuable nursery river and a river for adult fish in the area. The defendants have no previous convictions, he said.

## RECENT DEATHS

### Late Mr. Maurice Power

Ballymacarbry and the Nire Valley were shocked on Thursday last, May 19 with the news of the death of one of its best known citizens, Mr. Maurice (Monnie) Power, Glenanore and late Lyre West, Ballymacarbry, which sad event took place at his residence.

Deceased was a member of an old and respected Nire Valley family. An outstanding footballer he was a member of the Sliabh gCua junior football team that won county honours when they beat Fenor in 1936, and six years later he was a member of the Nire team who won county junior honours in 1942 when they beat Dunhill in a replay. He spent many years in England and in the late 50's he returned to the Nire Valley to take up a job as an Agricultural Contractor. He also took the haulage of milk from the farmers to the Nire Valley Co-op. This job he continued until the closure of Knockmeal Co-op in 1976 when the supply of milk to creameries ended.

A thoughtful neighbour he never counted the cost but gave of himself wholeheartedly when a helping hand or encouragement was required. He was indeed the essence of good humour and established lasting friendships by virtue of his unassuming nature and kindness to all who were indeed fortunate to know him, and who now feel a deep sense of loss at his passing. He was brother of the late Fr. Declan Power, Cisterian Abbey, Roscrea. ## RESTORATION OF LAND LEAGUE BANNER

A Land League banner from Grange, South Tipperary, is to be restored by South Tipperary County Museum thanks to a £3,000 grant from the Carnegie U.K. Trust. The restoration is also being partly sponsored by Grange Community Council. The banner, which is currently in poor condition with vertical tears, fading and other damage, will be sent to a specialist in Dublin for cleaning. After the conservation work is finished in two or three months, the banner will be displayed in the County Museum.

The Museum Curator described the banner as a single layer of green poplin material which was adorned on one side with the slogan "Let Erin Remember The Days Of Old". Nationalist symbols of the Wolfhound, the rising sun, ruined church, round tower, high cross and Shamrocks were also featured and the makers name, W. O'Grady of Dublin, was inscribed at the bottom. Included on the reverse side of the banner are a harp, Shamrocks and the words 'Emmet Fife and Drum Band, Grange'.

The banner dates back to the days of the Land War circa 1879 and was linked with a local band in Grange. The banner was meant to have been present in Mitchelstown in 1887, the day the R.I.C. fired on a large crowd, killing three and wounding two. It has been in the Cleary family for many years and was exhibited at the 1943 Dr. Geoffrey Keating Commemoration before being donated to the Museum.



# Captain Donoghue Honoured

On Sunday next, May 29th, the people of Abbeyside and Dungarvan and the surrounding area will have an opportunity to honour the memory of the late Captain Tom Donoghue and his crew when a party of fourteen German naval ratings and two officers, members of the crews of six German mine-sweepers visiting Dun Laoghaire, will lay a wreath on his grave after 12 o'clock Mass in Abbeyside.

The wreath-laying ceremony is part of the commemoration of the 50th Anniversary of "The Kerlogue Rescue," when M.V. "Kerlogue" commanded by Dungarvan man Captain Donoghue rescued 167 German seamen in the Bay of Biscay on December 29th, 1943.

On 26th May a squadron

of six German mine-sweepers will visit Dun Laoghaire and on Friday 27th May at 7 p.m. the President of Ireland, Mary Robinson will open the exhibition "The Kerlogue Rescue" at the National Maritime Museum of Ireland, Haigh Terrace, Dun Laoghaire.

A number of the survivors and their spouses who are coming to Dun Laoghaire for the exhibition will visit the Curragh where they were interned from the time of their rescue until they were repatriated at the close of hostilities. The "Kerlogue Rescue" stands as one of the outstanding feats of heroism of the last war. It was carried out with superb seamanship, courage of a high order and with care and humanity. It upheld the finest traditions of seamen

and the sea.

In honouring Captain Donoghue and his crew we honour all seamen who served in Irish ships during the war years.

# FARMING LEADER

## County Waterford ICMSA News

The County Secretary, Anne Kirwan, said that ICMSA are advising farmers to continue to restrict entry on to their farms until such time as appropriate legislative changes are

made to the law on Occupiers Liability.

The Secretary said that ICMSA is very concerned that the Recommendations of the Law Reform Commission do not go far

enough towards reducing the level of farmer responsibility for accidents occurring to uninvited persons while on a farmers land.

In particular ICMSA is concerned at the recommended definition of the term 'visitor' which they say in effect would provide an ops out mechanism for trespassers.

"After the long wait for these recommendations, the outcome is quite disappointing. The Commission has really fudged its definition of visitor and consequently its definition of trespassers. ICMSA will not accept a lack of clarity in regard to trespassers. We will not accept that a person unlawfully entering farm land can make himself/herself lawful and thereby validate his/her claim for visitor status. We will also not accept an obligation on farmers to give a special duty of care to people whom he never asked on to his farm, i.e. conservationists, pollution control officers, hedgecutters on behalf of E.S.B, An Post, etc," said the County Secretary.

the recommendations to reduce the categories of possible entrants to two was welcome. However he said that the very broad definition of "visitor" meant that everyone who was not a "trespasser" was a visitor, and under some circumstances a trespasser could be owed the same duty of care as a genuine visitor.

"The duty of care owed to trespassers under the term "gross negligence" depends on the views of the court on the day, and as such could become a football between legal teams at the expense of property owners."

Mr. O'Dwyer reiterated the ICMSA proposal that entrants to property should be categorised as "invited" and "non-invited."

"These terms leave no room for ambiguity. ICMSA will not accept that farmers should have a duty of care for non-invited persons coming on to their properties. Farmers should not be open to be sued for damages by non-invited persons. Farmers should not be obliged to take costly insurance policies to safeguard themselves from the costs of such cases," he concluded.

"The Recommendations, if they are to be implemented, would prove a bonanza for the legal people and a nightmare for farmers and other property owners."

"Therefore, ICMSA are stressing that farmers, in so

far as is possible, should continue to restrict access to their properties, as it is our view that if these Recommendations are implemented farmers could be more liable than they are at present."

The ICMSA have sought an immediate meeting with the Minister for Equality and Law Reform, Mr. Mervyn Taylor.

### Factory Lamb Price Drop Criticised By IFA

The dropping of lamb prices by some processing plants has been criticised by James Coughlan, Chairman, Waterford IFA Sheep Committee.

With lamb supplies down 21% on last year farmers deserve a stronger marketing approach from our export plants.

"French market returns today do not justify the price drop of 5p/lb. which has been reported here this morning and will only lead to panic selling of unfinished lambs," said Mr. Coughlan.

"With less of our exports now going through the highly competitive Rungis Market, higher price levels can be maintained," he said.

## Dept. Figures Reveal Extent Of Premium Payment Failure By Minister Walsh

New information obtained by IFA from Government sources shows the real extent of unpaid premium and headage applications to farmers, which the Minister for Agriculture failed to reveal in response to intensive questioning in the Dail recently.

IFA President, John Donnelly, said that official Department of Agriculture information, obtained by IFA, "cuts through the smokescreen which Minister Walsh is using to cover up his failure to deliver on Premium and Headage payments to farmers. "The official date discloses the payment situation one week ago on May 10, the same day as Minister Walsh blatantly evaded pointed questions from T.D.'s in Dail Eireann," according to Mr. Donnelly.

"Using the official statistics, IFA estimates that up to 183,000 applications worth £113 million submitted by farmers under 1993 schemes still remain to be paid either in part or in full. Even excluding Extensifica-

tion Premiums, where the final number of eligible applicants and payment entitlements is not yet confirmed there are 131,000 applications still outstanding, involving £70 million."

The Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan, detailed that 37,205 farmers who applied for the Suckler Cow Premium are still owed £28.8 million. A total of 21,995 farmers who applied for the Special Beef Premium as long as January/February 1993 are still awaiting £13.8 million in premium entitlements.

In the June/July Beef Premium application 24,383 applicants are owed an estimated £12.7 million, while 27,689 November Beef Premium applicants are waiting for £16.9 million. The Department figures also disclose that on May 10 only 8,000 farmers had received extensification Premiums worth £2.7 million whereas IFA estimates that an additional 52,000 farmers are owed a further £34 million.

### REPS Scheme Welcomed With Reservations

The ICMSA has welcomed the New Rural Environment Protection Scheme (REPS), which was officially launched by the Minister for Agriculture, Food & Forestry, Mr. Walsh and the Minister for Rural Development, Mr. Hyland, in Wexford.

Chairman of the ICMSA Farm Services Committee, Mr. Maurice Harvey, who attended the launch, said he

was pleased at the thrust of the Scheme but expressed reservations about the level of restrictions it would impose on small, commercial farmers.

"I particularly welcome the provision in REPS to make the annual payments available up front. This was sought by ICMSA and will be a positive factor for farmers considering participation in the Scheme.

### I.C.M.S.A. Advises Farmers To Restrict Access To Land

The ICMSA President, Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, had advised farmers that their best course of action is to restrict entry on to their properties in as far as they can do so, in order to limit their liabilities.

"I am reluctant to offer this advice, but on further consideration of the recommendations from the Law Reform Commission on Occupiers Liability legislation there are too many grey areas in the recommendations, which in my opinion will lead to many difficulties for farmers and many court cases, before we get clear definitions and boundaries established.

"It is quite unsatisfactory that farmers should continue to be burdened with a duty of care for a wide range of people entering farm land. Therefore, farmers must give themselves whatever protection they can by not allowing free access to their farms," said Mr. O'Dwyer.

## TALLOW G.A.A. NOTES

While you were sustaining yourself on your weekly feast of reading, courtesy of the Dungarvan Leader, I was far from Tallow, Waterford and Ireland enjoying some days of Gallic hospitality. I missed the local derby Lismore v. Tallow a fixture about which there was a great deal of uncertainty. Would it be played on Friday, Saturday or the following Tuesday? Officially fixed for Sunday 15 May it soon became impossible for the Co. Board to adhere to this sensible and suitable date. You see there were some cosmetic fixtures programmed for Dungarvan on that Sunday which ruled out what was after all a mere senior hurling championship game, only of importance to the expendable officials and supporters of that little corner of the county where Lismore and Tallow nestle in quiet isolation. So what you do in that case is, you yield the big stick. The game must be played! A game already moved from Sunday's sacrosanct fixture list must by decree, go on, no matter what. What about Saturday evening at 6 p.m. between your first and second cup of tea. That's it, good enough for them; anyway it's better than playing at 6 or 7 a.m. before work.

Whoever decided that a game vital to Tallow (and to Lismore) should be played at

teatime on a week-day has a lot to answer for. Doing that to clubs who respect the game of hurling and their supporters (without whom they wouldn't exist) is unacceptable and hurtful. To date bad weather has bedeviled the preparations of most clubs, has forced the abandonment of some fixtures and continues to threaten the cancellation of some more. Life in the hurling world is precarious enough without official insensitivity making it worse.

Why do we in the Gentle County insist on making a cock-up (Roddy Doyle wouldn't use so restrained a term) of situations that cry out for understanding and common sense. Remember hurling is already in dire straits with clubs having to struggle with the crippling costs of insurance, hurleys, sliotars and the major difficulties posed by shift-work, unemployment and emigration. If the official disregard for the sensibilities of those earnestly trying to maintain declining standards of that expensive game of hurling persists much longer it won't be long before a more serious problem looms, finding teams of quality. *Dá fhad é an lá, tagam an óiche.*



(2) is a singles/individual competition sponsored by Casey T.V. and Video.





## NIRE/BALLYCOTTON SUMMER ROAD RACE SERIES '94

On the evening of Thursday, May 26, runners from all over Cork county and beyond will converge on the tiny village of Ballyandreen to kick off the 1994 Ballycotton Summer series. Now in its fourteenth year, the four race series is regarded as an integral part of the southern running scene. Each of the 5 mile races take place on the fourth Thursday of May, June, July and August. After Ballyandreen, the remaining events will be in Shanagarry (June 23), Churchtown South (July 28) and Ballycotton (August 25).

This year again there will be a comprehensive list of prizes in each race, including spots. The overall awards will be based on the cumulative time over the four races, and the first fifty men and first fifteen women overall will receive a t-shirt (an increase on last year). Each runner completing the four events qualify for the special souvenir plaques, which are now highly prized.

Each of the events last year attracted record entries, with the total finishers in the four races reaching 1053, which was 50 up on 1993.

The entry fee for the first three races is just £1.50, with the final race at £2, of which 50p goes to charity. This year's series is again sponsored by Nike, who also sponsor the Ballycotton '10.'

Last year the Ballyandreen '5' attracted a total of 271 finishers, the biggest ever for a local five-miler. Incredible as it may seem, since the race commenced in 1981 there has been only one winner, namely Liam O'Brien. This must certainly be the longest winning streak in any one race in the country.

His consistency in the Ballyandreen '5' is also remarkable, with his fastest time at 24:13 and slowest at 24:36. His winning time last year was 24:14, just a second outside his record, and he finished 25 seconds in front of Garret Barry, the only one to beat him in a Ballycotton five-miler since August 1981. The first women last year was Mary Sweeney in 29:21. Although the course is not an easy one, a total of 84 runners finished under the half hour.

The Ballyandreen '5' starts at 8 p.m. with entries taken on the night from 6 p.m. Runners are asked to arrive as early as possible as parking and changing facilities are limited.



# Western Board Meeting

P. S. O Riain, Chairman, presided at last week's meeting of the Divisional Board which was held at Clonea Strand Hotel.

## WITHDRAWALS

A long discussion took place on the matter of withdrawals from the junior hurling championship after the Board Secretary reported that five clubs had now withdrawn their second string teams from the championship. This represented about half the number entered. The withdrawals — Cappoquin, Ballyduff, Tallow, Shamrocks and Stradbally. It was also noted that Kilrossanty have withdrawn in minor football.

The report on the withdrawals gave rise to a discussion on the state of hurling and the possible causes of clubs being unable to fulfil their full championship programme.

Some delegates also referred to the reduction in attendances at our games. Nioclás Mac Craith did not agree that standards were falling to the extent that many people believed and he said the record would show that attendances were up on previous years and our balance sheets proved this.

Christy O'Brien, Lismore took issue with Nioclás Mac Craith on this matter and instanced recent occasions where poor attendances were the order of the day at matches played at the Lismore venue.

The Chairman was critical of aspects of the way our

championships were played. He said that in very many cases championship matches were either changed or cancelled after they had been announced on the local papers and this was most confusing and annoying to the public on whom we are depending for our support. He informed the meeting that the Officer Board had discussed this and were now going to take a very hard line on agreeing to any changes whatsoever, after the fixtures programme had been published. He also told delegates about future policy in relation to postponements because players on the substitute panel for intercounty games were involved.

Pointing out that we still have eight teams left in the Munster championships, he said we would never finish the 1994 championships if we proceed as we have been with cancellations, etc. for petty reasons.

There were criticisms of the system which indicated a growing number of clubs in favour of abolishing the league system, in favour of a knockout, with a losers groups, etc.

The Chairman congratulated the minor and under-21 football teams on their recent victories and Pat Curran, Manager of the minor football team responded by thanking the Board for their co-operation in cancelling matches in order to facilitate the selectors, etc.

## REFEREES' REPORTS

Seven players who were sent off in matches since the last meeting were suspended for the minimum period of two weeks. One more serious matter was reported by referee Michael Curley, Tallow who handled the Tourin/Clashmore junior hurling game at Cappoquin. The report related to an incident which took place immediately after a Clashmore player had been sent off minutes before the finish. Both the Chairman and Secretary

who were present at the game, said it was a highly dangerous incident. Ollie Wilkinson, Tourin said that the incident, which was probably a reaction due to the frustration of the player sent off, was very much regretted by the Clashmore Club, whose officials afterwards apologised.

The meeting decided that the player will be given the opportunity of being heard in his own defence at the next meeting.

Relating to the particular match, both the Chairman and Secretary complimented the stand-in referee Michael Curley who obliged the Board when the appointed referee became unavailable. It was his first experience of refereeing and he did a splendid job.

## PROGRESS REPORT

The Secretary described as disappointing the progress made so far with

the championships and gave details of matches played. The minor football championship had made good progress and the quarter finals will be played on June 20, after the play-offs have been taken care of on June 6. The semi-finals will be ready by June 22.

It is proposed to start the minor hurling championship on August 3 and the under-21 hurling on August 1. July 18 is to be the starting date for the under-21 football championship.

# Splendid Display By Champions

This was by far the best display of hurling that we have seen since Fraher Field reopened, as the county champions, Lismore set out to prove to all and sundry, that they have no intention of surrendering their title this year, and indeed, should they continue to play to the kind of form that allowed them to completely overpower their county final opponents Passage here, it is difficult to see their crown being handed over to anyone.

Their total score of 5-16 was entirely from play and this must surely constitute a record for the county. Several of the scores were gems, but the goal which came from the stick of young Dave Bennett in the 48th minute when he doubled on a ball sent in from Dan Shanahan, was one of the best score seen at this or any other venue for a very long time. In all, Bennett contributed a personal total of 2-5 with fellow minor Shanahan scoring 2-2.

Really, Passage who were very strongly fancied to continue their unbeaten run in the championship to-date, had no answer to the fast, skillful and powerful hurling of the champions who were not at all flattered by their eight points half time lead. Their superiority

At the end of his visit, the Minister then revealed the welcome resource allocation news for a complete revamp and refurbishment programme of the facilities, commencing with the construction of new wards on the ground floor. It is envisaged that 36 bed units could well be on the cards.

## HISTORIC DAY

Speaking to the "Dungarvan Leader" Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab.) welcomed the Minister's intervention as a very positive response that would 'break the logjam of some 20 years'. The £100,000 commitment, he added, is the first significant step in the Health Board's technical services plan for Dungarvan which ultimately sees a phased development totalling £2m which would result in a major overhaul of the hos-

pital facilities.

The present facilities at St. Joseph's Geriatric Hospital have previously been described by the S.E.H.B. as 'appalling' owing to continued deterioration at the site.

Minister Howlin himself stated last Monday that he was not satisfied with the present hospital infrastructure at St. Joseph's which, he added, was 'not satisfactory to meet the needs of elderly people in this day and age.'

The long awaited announcement has caused great excitement for the people of Dungarvan and West Waterford in particular, the patients, families and staff of St. Joseph's who have long deserved the improved facilities this most recent allocation will bring.

the modern upgraded site it is today began in 1991 with a seven-house pilot scheme. On the completion of this work by John Cunningham Building Services Ltd., it was unanimously decided to go ahead with the refurbishment of the balance of the houses with the approval of the Department of the Environment.

This refurbishment work of the balance of the scheme, i.e. 53 houses, was carried out by main contractors M/s. Peter O'Loughlin Ltd., Waterford, while Limerick architects, John F. Thompson & Partners, designed the new face-lift.

Both Dungarvan Urban District Council and the local community have been loud in their praise of the Cathal Brugha revamp, with UDC Chairman, Tony Wright describing the job as "absolutely marvellous."

Preceding the ceremony will be a reception in the Council chamber of the Town Hall at 10.30 a.m., after which Minister Smith will visit the estate at 11.15 a.m. approximately, accompanied by the Chairman and members of the UDC, civic officials, local community and youth leaders.
