## Record Turnover For Waterford Foods



## The Credit Union And You

**Question** — What interest does a member pay on a Credit Union Loan.

**Answer** — Trust-in-lending, with no hidden costs, is the policy of the Credit Union movement.

By law a Credit Union may charge not more than 1% per month on the unpaid balance of the loan. This represents a cost of about £6.50 on a loan repaid in 12 equal monthly instalments.

Since interest is charged only on the loan balance outstanding, if you repay a loan in a shorter time the cost is even less. Always remember that a credit union loan is cash in the hand, giving you freedom of choice.

# Record Turnover For Waterford Foods

## STRONG MARKET POSITION

Commenting on the company's remarkable progress for the '93 period, Mr. O'Connor said that turnover for Waterford Foods had increased by 26% to £693.7 million while operation profit amounted to the noteworthy sum of £39.9 million representing an increase of 37% on 1992. "The progress made over the past years has placed Waterford in a strong position", he confidently added.

This substantial increase in turnover reflects Waterford Food's total commitment to high yielding performance. Already Waterford is the largest manufacturer of natural cheeses in Ireland, the leader in the Irish liquid milk market and a dominant force in fresh Irish dairy products with a growing export market and it is significantly expanding its presence in the foods ingredient on an international

scale. The company currently operates from 15 major processing facilities in Ireland, Great Britain and the United States, employing over 3,600 people.

The year was primarily one of integration and consolidation of the acquisitions made in '91 and '92. The reorganisation of the recently acquired liquid milk business in Great Britain was substantially completed during '93, while the acquisitions of Express Foods and Premier Dairies were also successfully integrated into the group.

In the case of the UK acquisition, Waterford Foods currently employs more than 1,500 people in its Manchester base. The 1,400 strong vehicle fleet with the Waterford logo can be seen all over the city and the business is well known and established. According to Mr. O'Connor, the performance of these acquisition companies in the various countries had been superb and are firmly on course for record returns in the coming year.

As regards Irish based companies, the manufactur-

ing facilities at Magheralin, Dungarvan and Virginia enjoy the prestigious ISO 9000 quality standard award with the Kilmeaden plant, [the largest cheese processing facility in Ireland and the UK], being the only dairy manufacturing company in Ireland to boast of ISO 9001 status.

## IMPRESSIVE INCREASES

As outlined in the financial report, Waterford experienced impressive increases right across the board in '93. The aforementioned 26% increase in turnover arose as a result of a full year's contribution from the profitable '92 acquisitions and growth. The divisional turnover for '93 show staggering increases of 37% for the dairy division, 19% for the consumer division and 9% for the trading division. Operating margins were 5.8% which shows an increase of 9% on 1992. Operating margins have increased substantially from 3% in 1987 and reflect the benefits arising from the emphasis being placed by the Group on higher value added products and effective cost management.

Operating cash flow, being profit on ordinary activities before taxation, depreciation and amortisation increased by 24% to £41.7 million. This reflects the ability of the business to generate worthwhile profits. On the share front, earnings per share were 11.1p for '93.

## BILLION MARK IN REACH

Despite increased domestic and overseas competition, the Dungarvan based company has gone from strength to strength owing to its winning policy of product differentiation which... "is a driving force

for profit growth," explained Group Finance Director Michael Dempsey who was speaking later during an interview with senior Board members.

The £1bn mark is now within the Group's grasp according to Mr. O'Connor, who disclosed that over the past four to five years Waterford Foods has been growing at a rate of 15% which makes him reasonably confident of reaching the magic billion within 2/3 years.

"Waterford Foods is encouraged by the opportunity available for further developments of its large scale", declared Mr. O'Connor, "it will pursue new initiatives in fresh dairy products, liquid milk, cheese business and dairy food ingredients". In all, the Group expects an upward curve in performance with a turnover figure for 1997 set at an impressive £1.4bn.

## New Initiatives To Combat Moneylending

On May 19, 1994 Michael Woods, Minister for Social Welfare, announced details of a number of new initiatives to combat illegal moneylending and to support community based money advice projects. Among the new projects which will now receive funding from the Department is a project for Dungarvan/West Waterford.

"Dungarvan Moneymatters" who drew up the original proposal for the project, welcomes this development. This locally based community group is now planning to provide a comprehensive money advice service under the terms of the scheme which has been announced by the Minister. The group also welcomes the appointment of Mr. Liam Edwards as National Co-ordinator of the various Money Advice schemes around the country and sees the latest initiatives as a major step forward in the fight against illegal moneylending.

# What To Look For In Bedders

Early June is here and you never quite got round to raising those bedding plants! So, it's down to the local nursery or garden centre to load the car with trays of this and that for the beds and borders.



But if you are paying for your display this year, what should you look out for to get the best buys? True, much is common sense:

Look for strong green examples and beware yellowing or wilting ones — a sign that watering and care has been lax.

Many plants may be starting to flower and have more buds forming, but watch for any that are too succulent — they may have come straight from the greenhouse and need hardening off in the opening. They will get a shock when you plant them out and may take longer to establish.

Once you have paid up, try to plant your bedding stock as quickly as possible, unless our fickle weather hits back with a cold snap.

If you have to keep them back, make sure they are well watered and sheltered — it may be worth knocking up a makeshift cold frame.

However, losing a few bedding plants can be tolerated even if we all wish they were a little cheaper, but what if you aim to buy something special — a specimen plant to fit into your garden display?

Then it becomes harder to make the right choice, though there are sensible guidelines to avoid wasting what can amount to several pounds on a poorly-reared specimen.

Try to spot any weedy or lanky growth — a sign of poor feeding, light and general care.

- Check for pests or diseases — curled or bitten leaves are a give away but look underneath too for aphids, red spider mite, the little brown 'bumps' indicating scale insect, or a white dust which is sure to be whitefly.
- Dry soil or compost and any weeds and moss are a sign of poor care at the nursery.
- Loose soil shows that the plant has not been potted and become established enough to take the further shock of being re-planted in your garden.
- The sign which does indicate that the plant is established and will be prepared for the move is a little bit of root showing through the drain holes.

Try to plant your purchase as soon as possible and keep it well watered until you do so and after you have put it into the ground.

Take care when buying pre-packaged plants, such as roses, sold from supermarket shelves or by mail order. Though often cheap and effective, it is difficult to check exactly what you are buying, so stick to reputable labels and shop chains — some have date stamping to guide you. Again, plant quickly as they may have lain on a shelf for some time.

## Lamb With A Taste Of China

### LAMB STIR FRY

#### Ingredients

450g/1lb lamb neck fillet  
2 tbsp soy sauce  
2 tsp chinese five-star spice  
1 tsp ground cumin  
1 tbsp oil  
100g/4oz mangetout, trimmed  
100g/4oz baby sweetcorn, chopped  
6 spring onions, trimmed and chopped  
100g/4oz button mushrooms, wiped and quartered  
100g/4oz broccolli spears, cut into small pieces  
225g/8oz beansprouts  
salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste

#### Method

Cut lamb into thin strips and place in a bowl with soy sauce, five-star spice, cumin and oil. Mix well. Cover and leave in a cool place for at least 2 hours. Heat a wok or large frying pan. Add lamb with marinade and fry, stirring continuously, until meat is sealed. Stir in mangetout, sweetcorn, spring onions, mushrooms and broccolli. Fry quickly until just starting to soften. Stir in beansprouts and when heated through, season to taste and serve immediately. Serves 4.



# Damien Dillon Seeks Seat On Urban Council

Last week I indicated that I would outline a general policy for tackling the various problems that the U.D.C. have to resolve. I would suggest that this should be done with more openness and involvement of agencies, parties, clubs, partnerships and the community concerned. The town and surrounding area belongs to us all and it needs a co-ordinated drive on a united front to solve our communal problems. The council should not be a talking shop presiding over the council activities, the members should be a working committee with drive, aims and goals that will help to attain what is good for the area.

## UNEMPLOYMENT

While unemployment may not be an expressed part of the function of the U.D.C., it is at much too high a level to be ignored and must be a priority on the agenda of the next Council. If the figures being banded about are correct, almost

1,200 unemployed out of a working population of 5,000 this represents approximately 25% unemployed. My first suggestion is that we should, as far as is practical, keep the business of the U.D.C. and also the business that the U.D.C. generates, in the town. This should be further boosted with an awareness campaign to buy locally, backed up with statistics which I have little doubt will clearly indicate (what many of us already know) that there is a massive haemorrhage of spending by all of us outside the town. Minimising this would lead to a boost in the employment figures. If the present employment figures were to be increased annually by 5%, this would eliminate unemployment within 6 to 7 years. We need to create an atmosphere and conditions that will attract outside investment in the area of job creation and also to encourage expansion of the existing businesses and industries in the locality.

## HEALTH

It is incredible that a Minister can visit one of our

hospitals, condemn it almost out of hand, allocate the paltry sum of £100,000 towards the £2m necessary for its upgrading/renewal and get out of town unscathed, politically I mean. The Minister has created an opening for an approach to be made to the Department of Health. In the light of this, other facilities should be reviewed and a comprehensive package prepared for submission to the Department. The development of the recommendations of the Second Commission on the Status of Women together with the distress facilities already in place should be closely monitored to ensure that the Dungarvan area is properly serviced.

## HOUSING

Another Minister took a politically opportunistic foray into our midst recently, to congratulate himself on his own work. It is a pity that he was not around to witness the messy conditions that the residents had to endure during construction, nor did he spend any time examining the details and unfinished work. I also carried out the pilot scheme and was not allowed to complete the project. The open tender competitive procedure could have been set aside in favour of a further negotiated tender using the original local building contractor and local labour force, rather than using an outside firm. The housing stock should not be allowed to deteriorate to the extent that some of it has and there should be a review of conditions as regards maintenance, facilities and amenities at more regular intervals. Those who have aspirations to build their own houses in the urban area are being given no opportunity to do so and are compelled to buy from, mostly, out of town developers, or else build on one-off sites in the surrounding countryside. Consequently, a large proportion to the town's workforce had no say or vote because they reside outside the urban area. The Council has the power to provide a variety of sites for this type of development.

## ENVIRONMENT

It has emerged recently, to our surprise, that the U.D.C. has little or no control over developments on beaches, foreshores, etc. and that the control seems to lie with the Department of the Marine (in Dublin). This should certainly be a matter for the local Planning Departments, who would have a better understanding of the situation on the ground and would have a balanced view of what is good for the area in terms of mariculture exploitation and the needs of the community for amenity and leisure. This matter will need to be pursued and

proper controls put in place to prevent exploitation by one sector over another. Pollution control will only be possible on the completion of the sewerage system for the area and the construction of a full sewage treatment works. This would greatly enhance the harbour, Western bay and Abbeyside strand, all of which are rather neglected and in need of major improvement. Other environmental matters that need to be addressed are dereliction, traffic management, car parking, improved street lighting etc.

Next weeks "New Approach" will deal with Business Expansion, Culture and Recreation, New Industry, Tourism and Urban Renewal, all of which are crucial to the development of the area.

# What To Look For In Bedders

Early June is here and you never quite get round to raising those bedding plants! So, it's down to the local nursery or garden centre to load the car with trays of this and that for the beds and borders.



But if you are paying for your display this year, what should you look out for to get the best buys? True, much is common sense:

Look for strong green examples and beware yellowing or wilting ones — a sign that watering and care has been lax.

Many plants may be starting to flower and have more buds forming, but watch for any that are too succulent — they may have come straight from the greenhouse and need hardening off in the opening. They will get a shock when you plant them out and may take longer to establish.

Once you have paid up, try to plant your bedding stock as quickly as possible, unless our fickle weather hits back with a cold snap.

If you have to keep them back, make sure they are well watered and sheltered — it may be worth knocking up a makeshift cold frame.

However, losing a few bedding plants can be tolerated even if we all wish they were a little cheaper, but what if you aim to buy something special — a specimen plant to fit into your garden display?

Then it becomes harder to make the right choice, though there are sensible guidelines to avoid wasting what can amount to several pounds on a poorly-reared specimen.

Try to spot any weedy or lanky growth — a sign of poor feeding, light and general care.

- Check for pests or diseases — curled or bitten leaves are a give away but look underneath too for aphids, red spider mite, the little brown 'bumps' indicating scale insect, or a white dust which is sure to be whitefly.
- Dry soil or compost and any weeds and moss are a sign of poor care at the nursery.
- Loose soil shows that the plant has not been potted and become established enough to take the further shock of being re-planted in your garden.
- The sign which does indicate that the plant is established and will prepared for the move is a little bit of root showing through the drain holes.

Try to plant your purchase as soon as possible and keep it well watered until you do so and after you have put it into the ground.

Take care when buying pre-packaged plants, such as roses, sold from supermarket shelves or by mail order. Though often cheap and effective, it is difficult to check exactly what you are buying, so stick to reputable labels and shop chains — some have date stamping to guide you. Again, plant quickly as they may have lain on a shelf for some time.

## Lamb With A Taste Of China

### LAMB STIR FRY

#### Ingredients

450g/1lb lamb neck fillet  
2 tbsp soy sauce  
2 tsp chinese five-star spice  
1 tsp ground cumin  
1 tbsp oil  
100g/4oz mangetout, trimmed  
100g/4oz baby sweetcorn, chopped  
6 spring onions, trimmed and chopped  
100g/4oz button mushrooms, wiped and quartered  
100g/4oz broccolli spears, cut into small pieces  
225g/8oz beansprouts salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste

#### Method

Cut lamb into thin strips and place in a bowl with soy sauce, five-star spice, cumin and oil. Mix well. Cover and leave in a cool place for at least 2 hours. Heat a wok or large frying pan. Add lamb with marinade and fry, stirring continuously, until meat is sealed. Stir in mangetout, sweetcorn, spring onions, mushrooms and broccolli. Fry quickly until just starting to soften. Stir in beansprouts and when heated through, season to taste and serve immediately.

# Damien Dillon Seeks Seat On Urban Council

Last week I indicated that I would outline a general policy for tackling the various problems that the U.D.C. have to resolve. I would suggest that this should be done with more openness and involvement of agencies, parties, clubs, partnerships and the community concerned. The town and surrounding area belongs to us all and it needs a co-ordinated drive on a united front to solve our communal problems. The council should not be a talking shop presiding over the council activities, the members should be a working committee with drive, aims and goals that will help to attain what is good for the area.

## UNEMPLOYMENT

While unemployment may not be an expressed part of the function of the U.D.C., it is at much too high a level to be ignored and must be a priority on the agenda of the next Council. If the figures being bandied about are correct, almost

1,200 unemployed out of a working population of 5,000 this represents approximately 25% unemployed. My first suggestion is that we should, as far as is practical, keep the business of the U.D.C. and also the business that the U.D.C. generates, in the town. This should be further boosted with an awareness campaign to buy locally, backed up with statistics which I have little doubt will clearly indicate (what many of us already know) that there is a massive haemorrhage of spending by all of us outside the town. Minimising this would lead to a boost in the employment figures. If the present employment figures were to be increased annually by 5%, this would eliminate unemployment within 6 to 7 years. We need to create an atmosphere and conditions that will attract outside investment in the area of job creation and also to encourage expansion of the existing businesses and industries in the locality.

## HEALTH

It is incredible that a Minister can visit one of our

hospitals, condemn it almost out of hand, allocate the paltry sum of £100,000 towards the £2m necessary for its upgrading/renewal and get out of town unscathed, politically I mean. The Minister has created an opening for an approach to be made to the Department of Health. In the light of this, other facilities should be reviewed and a comprehensive package prepared for submission to the Department. The development of the recommendations of the Second Commission on the Status of Women together with the distress facilities already in place should be closely monitored to ensure that the Dungarvan area is properly serviced.

## HOUSING

Another Minister took a politically opportunistic foray into our midst recently, to congratulate himself on his own work. It is a pity that he was not around to witness the messy conditions that the residents had to endure during construction, nor did he spend any time examining the details and unfinished work. I also carried out the pilot scheme and was not allowed to complete the project. The open tender competitive procedure could have been set aside in favour of a further negotiated tender using the original local building contractor and local labour force, rather than using an outside firm. The housing stock should not be allowed to deteriorate to the extent that some of it has and there should be a review of conditions as regards maintenance, facilities and amenities at more regular intervals. Those who have aspirations to build their own houses in the urban area are being given no opportunity to do so and are compelled to buy from, mostly, out of town developers, or else build on one-off sites in the surrounding countryside. Consequently, a large proportion to the town's workforce had no say or vote because they reside outside the urban area. The Council has the power to provide a variety of sites for this type of development.

## ENVIRONMENT

It has emerged recently, to our surprise, that the U.D.C. has little or no control over developments on beaches, foreshores, etc. and that the control seems to lie with the Department of the Marine (in Dublin). This should certainly be a matter for the local Planning Departments, who would have a better understanding of the situation on the ground and would have a balanced view of what is good for the area in terms of mariculture exploitation and the needs of the community for amenity and leisure. This matter will need to be pursued and

proper controls put in place to prevent exploitation by one sector over another. Pollution control will only be possible on the completion of the sewerage system for the area and the construction of a full sewage treatment works. This would greatly enhance the harbour, Western bay and Abbeyside strand, all of which are rather neglected and in need of major improvement. Other environmental matters that need to be addressed are dereliction, traffic management, car parking, improved street lighting etc.

Next weeks "New Approach" will deal with Business Expansion, Culture and Recreation, New Industry, Tourism and Urban Renewal, all of which are crucial to the development of the area.



# Deasy Raises Dungarvan Hospital Issue

The following answer has been given to Deputy Austin Deasy to questions he raised in the Dáil recently concerning St. Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan.

**Mr. Deasy:** Unlike some other Deputies, I appreciate what the Minister is doing for Dungarvan. Co. Waterford.

**Mr. Howlin:** Thank you. **Mr. Deasy:** Can the Minister give me more information about the 27 bed unit to which he referred on his reply? I have not seen any Press statement about the Minister's intentions in this area, but I presume it is proposed to transfer patients from the upper part of the premises to ground level as the upper part is quite dangerous, a fire hazard, and poses difficulties for staff and patients when they are

moving around? **Mr. Howlin:** I have looked at the facility and share the Deputy's concerns about it. This is why I immediately approved the planning of a new unit which would enable patients in the upper part of the premises to be transferred to a new 27 bed unit. The planning will cost approximately £100,000, which I have made available, and I hope to provide a capital allocation for construction as soon as possible.

**Mr. Deasy:** Can the Minister give an approximate time scale for the completion of this unit? I greatly appreciate what he proposes to do but can he say if the work will be completed in 1995 or 1996?

**Mr. Howlin:** I cannot give the Deputy a timescale until I have re-

ceived the complete proposals from the South Eastern Health Board. It has to put this development in context with the other capital demands it presents me with for next year. If the planning process is completed by then, I will be in a position once I have discussed my budgetary position with my Cabinet colleagues to know what exactly I can fund. I want the planning completed and the capital works underway as soon as possible. The question of when that happens will be decided in the context of the allocation of resources and priority demands.

**Mr. Deasy:** This means that the work might drag on and may not be completed within the next year or two.



## DES O'MALLEY — Euro Candidate

A call for EU structural funds to be targeted at rural communities so that hundreds of creamery buildings, closed through rationalisation, can be used to provide jobs, has been made by Progressive Democrat Euro-election candidate Desmond O'Malley.



# 16 Month Sentence For Abbeyside Man

An officer of the Southern Regional Fisheries Board spoke at last Wednesday's special sitting of Dungarvan District Court of the day he thought he was going to die when the balaclava-clad skipper of a Helvick Head-based fishing trawler pointed a rocket flare at him as he clung to the gunnels of the boat in an unsuccessful attempt to board it.

Inspector John Flynn said he feared for his life. "I said to myself, I am going to die, this is it".

Inspector Flynn was giving evidence during a marathon seven-hour special sitting of Dungarvan District Court, before Judge Terence Finn, where 28-year-old, part-time fisherman, John Healy, 29 McCarthyville, Abbeyside, Dungarvan faced 20 charges brought against him by the Southern Regional Fisheries Board and the Director of Public Prosecutions.

Healy, who pleaded not guilty, was charged by the D.P.P. on six counts of assaulting fishery officers off Helvick Head on July 28, 1993, by pointing a rocket flare at them. He also pleaded not guilty to producing, in a manner likely to unlawfully intimidate another person, an article capable of inflicting injury, and threatening to commit criminal damage to a fishery patrol boat.

The defendant further pleaded not guilty to a total of 12 charges brought by the Fisheries Board, alleging obstruction and impeding of the six fishery officers on the same occasion.

During the day-long hearing, the court was told how the defendant had bludgeoned the hands of Inspector John Flynn with

the rocket flare as he clung to the gunnels of Healy's trawler.

The fisher officer had to eventually release his hold and jump into the water, where he was rescued by two of his colleagues in a patrol boat.

Inspector Flynn told the court that two patrol boats, the Aisling and the Angela, with three fishery officers in each, left Ballinacourty at 11.30 on the morning of July 28 last year and headed towards Helvick Head. They passed a fishing trawler - the defendant's - fishing for mackerel, and exchanged salutes with Healy, who was the skipper. There were also two women on board.

They proceeded with their patrol in the Angela, but had Healy's trawler under observation at all times.

"We then received a radio message from the Aisling for assistance and headed towards Muggarts Bay, near Mine Head", Inspector Flynn went on. "There were two trawlers obstructing the Aisling."

He said that he then saw Healy's unmarked trawler bearing down on the patrol boats, with Healy and both women on board all wearing balaclavas over their faces. Healy then pointed the rocket flare at the crews of both patrol boats, and, using abusive and

threatening language, warned that no attempt should be made to board his boat.

Inspector Flynn said he endeavoured to do so, but, as he grabbed hold of the gunnels on the side of the boat, Healy beat him severely on both hands with the rocket flare.

"Healy then put the flare towards my forehead and said 'you will die you f..... bastard'. A colleague told me to jump into the water and I had to, because my hands were in a mess".

He said that because of their fear that Healy would discharge the rocket, they decided to drop back. Had the defendant done so, he (witness) wouldn't be here today.

He said he had no doubt that the man wearing the balaclava who had attacked him was Healy.

He said he had applied for, and got, promotion to a post that will not necessitate his involvement in the sea patrols. "I never want to go to sea again, I never will" he added.

Inspector John Dunne, who was coxswain of the Angela that day, gave corroborative evidence.

Witness also positively identified Healy as the assailant.

The four other fishery officers, Inspector Edward Daley, and officers Michael Byron, Michael Hickey, and Anthony O'Dwyer, also gave evidence.

Two garda officers, Sgt. David Sheehan and Sgt. John Molloy, said they had arrived at Helvick after the confrontation was over.

They had seen a man on board a trawler wearing a balaclava, which they believed to be Healy.

Later that day he denied any personal involvement in an incident with the fishery officers.

The defendant, John Healy, acknowledged that he was out mackerel fishing that day in his father's boat accompanied by his sister and girlfriend. He gave a jovial salute to the fishery officers as they passed.

He subsequently realised he didn't have his asthmatic inhaler with him and got panicky. He hauled in his lines, headed to Helvick and tied up his boat at around 11.35 a.m.

He said he then went home, where he used his inhaler, but later returned to Helvick around 1.15 p.m. after heading on his V.H.F. radio that there had been "shennagagins" between fishermen and fishery officers.

Healy, who denied wearing a balaclava that day or having a rocket flare with which he threatened the fishery officers, said that when he tied up his boat at Helvick he left the key in the engine.

"I am not saying that other people took the boat out to sea and became involved with the officers", Healy went on. "All I am saying is that I wasn't there and that it wasn't me".

The defendant's father, Michael Healy, said he was at home when his son came in sometime before 12 noon suffering from an asthmatic attack. He could not have been in the fishing boat off Helvick at that time.


Judge Finn said he had no doubt whatever but that Healy was the man clad in the balaclava who threatened the officers with the rocket flare.

Describing Healy as a man who doesn't have regard for the forces of law and order in this country, Judge Finn convicted Healy on charges of impeding three of the officers and obstructing three others.

He sentenced the defendant to a total of nine months imprisonment, fined him £100, and ordered him to pay £416.40 costs.

Healy was also sentenced to a total of 16 months imprisonment - to run concurrently with the nine on the D.P.P. charges, together with a monetary penalty of £50.

Recognisances were fixed in the event of an appeal in the defendant's own surety of £2,000 and one independent bond of £3,000.

# Victory-At Last

### TALLOW 3-9 ROANMORE 2-8

A full account of the game appears elsewhere in this issue but it must be said that this game had many of the ingredients of a first-class contest. If the hurling standard fell short of those of the previous Sunday's Ballygunner Tallow encounter who cares. We won!

This game had great individual displays and some glorious scores but it was the team spirit of the Tallow lads which one admired most. The excitement tingled as Tallow lifted themselves from midway through the second half to that nail-biting finish when the Bridesiders' defiance saw them through.

There was Pat Murphy's leadership and invaluable scores, Stephen Curley's spriteliness, craft, experience and matchless skill. John Doyle was a dashing winger and no player bettered the outstanding Ger Sice at centre back. Reliable steadfast displays from Colin Cunningham and David Henley supplied the forwards with match-winning balls. I don't expect to see a better goal this year than Dermot Henley's blistering left-sided drive that left Ray Sheridan helpless and restored freshness to weary limbs.

The last five minutes were memorable and it was the backs, withstanding the increasingly frenzied Roanmore attacks who ensured a Tallow win with courageous tackling, blocking and clearing. John Geary, Jim O'Donoghue, Tim Sheehan and the rest defied the city lads best efforts. Yet the hero must be Martin Murphy with a marvellous late save when he stopped, controlled the ball before dashing through a forest of sticks to drive a mighty clearance beyond midfield to safety. In truth each player played a heroic part in

this very welcome victory over great rivals Roanmore and no fair-minded person could begrudge Tallow this well-deserved success.

#### THE POOR REFEREE

Is there any role in any sport as important or as thankless as the referees. He (when will we see a "she") is the sole controller of the game and arbiter of time and fact. A big responsibility this and in a game as fast as hurling he needs to be very fit in order to keep up with the play. God alone knows how many decisions he has to make in the course of a game, all affecting the outcome, and no matter how objective his judgment or impartial his handling of the game, one team (the defeated) usually lays much of the blame for its failure on the réiteoir bocht.

The tendency to blame someone else for our failures is only human and is rooted in our desire to shed our own culpability and to maintain our levels of self-esteem - it is always more attractive to find someone else, outside of our control, whom we can blame - the referee! Whatever else we usually are quite reluctant to admit our own short comings. We know what caused us to lose, even if he didn't actually wear the opposition's jersey!

God forgive us but there's scarcely one of us who hasn't, at one time or another, added to the referee's problems. Before the game we calmly assess the opposition and devise the game plan, but we also make certain that we study the man in the middle whose whistle controls the action. How many steps or catches can we take? Which type of foul will be punished most severely? I remember Mick White. No matter how serious the transgression if he cau-

tioned you while placing one hand on your shoulder you could rest content that he didn't intend to sent you off!

The Tallow advice given to teams is always to respect the referee and his decisions: silence (in the form of a shut mouth) being golden. His decision while not always to our liking couldn't deprive us of victory if we were good enough. The real difficulty lay in the heightened temperature or atmosphere of a keenly contested important game when the tolerance level is low, the level of patience brittle and our bias at its highest. Then the pious aspirations and intentions of the dressing room are quickly forgotten and all of weak human nature is revealed. I recall what this gentleman referee of some years ago, John Moloney of Bansa, said to me once: "You know on the big day fellas are only about 40% sane so I make allowances".

Referees are indispensable: our games couldn't go on without them but I wonder if we are really sincere in the manner of our recruitment and training. With the chronic shortage of referees anyone able to blow a whistle could launch his career. But it is the next step which is most important. As he sets out on his difficult road where can he get help? How can he become a better referee? To be specific who will come to his assistance? I, and dozens of others like me, had better keep quiet because I know that criticizing a referee is tantamount to suicide since he may not take kindly to what he would regard as an insult to his integrity and a biased assessment of his performance. His resentment would be revealed, I imagine, on the next occasion of one of our matches.

Is it not possible to provide some means for civilised and naturally beneficial communication between referees, players and officials. The increase in information and understanding couldn't but benefit all parties. What about fortnightly seminars under a competent sympathetic chairman during, say, January and February each year when it would be obligatory on club officials, at least, to attend?

Why not a streamlined system of recruitment and training? Soccer has one or

is that a reason why we shouldn't? What about initiating a summer school for referees - a week's duration - where the best advice would be available, a uniform interpretation and application of rules sought, and that modern electronic wonder, the video, used to the fullest advantage?

Referees need a higher profile and have got to be treated better than they often were in the past. For the most part they are taken for granted. They and their wives or companions (I think that's the word in favour nowadays) should receive favoured treatment by the authorities, given generous expenses and shown in other ways that they are fully appreciated by an association which couldn't exist without them.

# Euro Candidates Respond To IFA Election Agenda

An important meeting between Munster Euro Election candidates and leading IFA officers from throughout the constituency took place recently in the Hibernian Hotel, Mallow.

The IFA officers were led by IFA President John Donnelly who chaired the meeting and General Secretary Michael Berkery. IFA's Munster Vice-President John Dillon outlined the IFA Election Agenda of issues concerning farm families and rural communities for the candidates at the meeting.

Fianna Fail was represented by its three candidates Gerry Collins, T.D., Senator Brian Crowley and outgoing MEP Paddy Lane. Both of Fine Gael's candidates, outgoing MEP John Cushman and former MEP Tom Raftery, were also present. The Progressive Democrats candidate Dessie O'Malley, TD was also present, as were Jim Kemmy for the Labour Party, Independent candidate Pat Cox MEP and the Green Party candidate Dan Boyle.

The IFA agenda focussed mainly on: 1) the shortfall in the EU Structural Funds, 2) compensation for GATT cuts, 3) extension and reclassification of disadvantaged Areas, 4) European assistance for the restructuring of quotas and premium rights, 5) the need to overhaul the premium and headage payments system in order to cut out delays, and 6) the poor state of rural roads. The meeting followed a 'question and answers' type format chaired by the IFA President John Donnelly.

## PADDY LANE

On the cutbacks in Structural Funds, Mr. Paddy Lane said the Minister for Agriculture has given a definite commitment that there would be no shortfalls for headage or on-farm investment.

On CAP reform, Mr. Lane claimed there were going to be cutbacks in the Common

Agricultural Policy whether farmers liked it or not. Mr. Lane was asked by a member of the audience whether he could be relied upon to support IFA policy in future, given that he had failed to support IFA's opposition to CAP reform. In reply he said "I will be prepared to meet IFA at any time to discuss agricultural policy and will support any proposals that would be of advantage to Ireland."

On premium payments delays, Mr. Lane said he was in favour of payment within three months and had put forward a resolution in the European Parliament with Mark Killilea MEP along these lines. He also agreed with the principle of individual base areas from grain farmers.

## BRIAN CROWLEY

Senator Brian Crowley told the meeting that he wanted to see a policy of positive discrimination towards rural Ireland. He also expressed concern over the position of young farmers in terms of access to quotas and he criticised the "total inefficiency" of the premium payments system. He said, if elected, he would hold regular meetings with IFA and Munster farmers.

## GERRY COLLINS

Mr. Gerry Collins emphasised that no commitment could be given that the Exchequer would make up any shortfall to agriculture in the EU structural Funds, saying that this would depend on the performance of the economy.

On GATT compensation, Mr. Collins said that commitments had been given by the heads of government in Europe that any cuts arising from the GATT agreement and above CAP reform would be compensated. "This commitment must be honoured," he said.

On the need for a subsidised quota restructuring scheme, the Limerick West

TD said he had a strong commitment to a future for smaller and medium size producers. He had suggested to the Taoiseach that "Ireland should become more active in chasing any surplus quotas in Europe to bring back for our own farmers." However, Mr. Collins said that if quota trading was allowed then there was a danger of quota flowing out of the Province, as the Clare "Leader" study had illustrated.

## JOHN CUSHNAHAN

Fine Gael's John Cushman MEP said he was standing on the basis of his record "Not on the basis of promises but on the basis of promises kept." He pointed out that he had opposed the MacSharry proposals on CAP reform and had opposed the GATT agreement and had demonstrated with IFA on these issues. He had also kept all IFA County Executives throughout Munster informed of developments in Europe on a regular basis.

On the structural Funds cutbacks, Mr. Cushman supported an increase in Exchequer funding and said "agriculture should not suffer from Government mis-handling of the issues."

On subsidised quota restructuring, Mr. Cushman said he had campaigned in Europe for the ability to purchase quotas across borders and had taken up the issue of premium payment delays with Commissioner Steichen.

## TOM RAFTERY

Professor Tom Raftery maintained that milk production had the best prospect of keeping farmers on the land in Ireland and yet there wasn't enough quota in the country to sup-

port the existing number of producers.

On the issue of hormones, Professor Raftery said that naturally occurring hormones should again be permitted. He said "The European Commission banned hormones because they thought it would reduce production, instead it introduced black market products and hit consumption." On BST he said that if a product was safe, the consumer must be allowed to decide.

## DES O'MALLEY

The Progressive Democrat candidate Mr. Dessie O'Malley TD, said the serious shortfall in Structural Funds was entirely the fault of the Irish government. "I disagree with an across the board cut to cope with the shortfall and do not want the tax payers to make up the difference," he said. "The Government must make selective cuts, for example in the unnecessary upgrading of the Dublin to Belfast rail link and other flagship projects such as a peat power station in the midlands." He felt the country did not have a lot to show for the level of funding of some areas, for example FAS courses and the European Commission should take a great interest in the way funds are spent.

Mr. O'Malley said that the basic problems with premium payment delays was the long overdue computerisation of the system by the Department of Agriculture.

On pig feed, Mr. O'Malley said the Government must identify why Irish costs are out of line with the continent, possibly because of price cartels. "If a cost differential relating to transport remains, then there would be a case for European intervention along the lines of a feed equalisation scheme."

As regards the live export trade, Mr. O'Malley maintained that without live exports prices to farmers would be lower. In the past he had stopped a virtual monopoly from developing in the Irish beef industry and he would always favour genuine competition in the livestock sector.

## JIM KEMMY

Mr. Jim Kemmy TD, the Labour Party candidate said he was especially concerned about the situation of small farmers. As regards GATT, he said that if there were losses, then they must be compensated for on a phased basis. On the Structural Funds Mr. Kemmy

said he was disappointed with the shortfall but farmers should not suffer more than any other sector.

On the issue of occupiers' liability, Mr. Kemmy said he supported farmers entirely and was in favour of giving them maximum protection in any new legislation. He called for a pragmatic policy on live exports, saying "if they are going to keep farmers going, then they must be maintained." At the same time he would like to see products and markets developed in order to create employment.

## PAT COX

Independent candidate Pat Cox MEP agreed with IFA's proposals for subsidised quota restructuring and said the downward drift in dairy farming was through the failure to set a basic level for viability.

If individual base areas were introduced for grain farmers, Mr. Cox felt the eligible land restriction should be removed, because it was causing severe difficulties for growers.

On the issue of CAP reform and GATT, Mr. Cox said that cutbacks in beef and dairying were not just

an agricultural issue but a national issue because those sectors were of such special importance to Ireland. "Ireland should be entitled to special treatment," he said.

## DAN BOYLE

Finally the Green Party candidate Mr. Dan Boyle said that the Greens were the fourth largest party in the European Parliament and were serious about agriculture policy. They had opposed GATT and also disagreed with the treatment of set aside land laid down by the EU.

On rural roads, Mr. Boyle said EU Structural Funds should be spent connecting rural centres to each other.

At the end of the meeting, IFA General Secretary assured all the candidates that whoever was elected to represent Munster would have direct access to the permanent IFA office in Brussels which is run by the Association's Director of European Affairs, Mr. Michael Treacy. He said IFA would always be willing to assist Irish MEPs in working for the best deal on behalf of Irish farm families and people of rural Ireland generally.

## Rescued German Sailors Thank Abbeyside Sea Captain

Twelve noon Mass at Abbeyside Church on Sunday last, May 29 was certainly different from the usual religious sacrament. Firstly fourteen German naval ratings and two officers occupied some of the reserved seats at the top of the aisle. Also in the reserved area was the German Ambassador and some of his staff along with a number of the survivors of a German warship sunk in the Bay of Biscay on December 29, 1943. These survivors owe their lives to the fact that Mr. Donoghue as captain of the M. V. Kerlogue answered the distress call and entered the danger area the result of which he picked up 168 men in rough seas the consequence of a storm force wind. It was fitting that members of Captain Donoghue's family were also escorted to reserved seats.

The first reading was read in the Irish language and the second lesson was read in German. Prayers of the

Faithful were relevant to the theme of the Mass and a son Jim and daughter Rene of Captain Donoghue were the gift bearers for the Offertory Procession. Another feature was the fanfare from a solitary bugle played at the Consecration.

After Mass a procession from the Church followed the route to the grave of Captain Donoghue in Abbeyside graveyard where the boy scouts formed a guard of honour.

Amplification was provided by Hogan Sound over which a decade of the rosary — the first glorious mystery of the Resurrection was recited. The wreath laying ceremony followed and the first, bedecked with the German National colours, was laid on behalf of the survivors of the disaster. The second wreath was laid on behalf of the German Navy and the third was laid by Peter McGuire on behalf of the Maritime Institute of Ireland.

Mr. Wolfe Glubar, a sur-

vivor, reminisced on how the small coastal vessel changed course in rough seas and in a ten hour period rescued 168 war victims in a humanitarian operation that will be forever remembered in the history books.

Mr. Peter McGuire, President of the Maritime Institute of Ireland, thanked all those who had made the ceremony possible and in conclusion both the German and Irish National Anthems were played.


### TROOP MEETING



# Health Boards Unite On Student Nurse Recruitment

A new initiative to establish a centralised admission office for student general nurses has been launched by five of the country's health boards. A Joint Recruitment Bureau is to introduce a standardised entry procedure effective this autumn for nurse training schools controlled by the Eastern, Southern, South Eastern, Mid-Western, and North Western Health Boards. The Midland Health Board and North Eastern Health Board do not train general nurses.

The health boards have said that the Joint Recruitment Bureau will end the hardships imposed on thousands of applicants and parents up to now by multiple competitions at widely scattered venues throughout the country and will also reduce the amount of administrative work involved in filling the training places.

The initiative has the full backing of the Department of Health and of An Bord Altranais and a spokesperson for the JRB commented: "The establishment of the Bureau is a logical development of the increasing co-operation between

the health boards. It is difficult to be precise because of the multiple applications but we reckon that about 3,000 applicants come forward each year for approximately 240 places in the general nurse training schools involved.

### ONE APPLICATION

The new system will mean applicants will only have to make one application on which they will indicate the training schools of their choice, ranked in order of preference and they will be required to attend for one interview only which will be arranged as conveniently as possible to where they live.

We are confident that the merits of the new system will quickly become apparent and we are certain that it will be more satisfactory than the present arrangements."

The Mid-Western health Board will administer the Joint Recruitment Bureau on behalf of the participating Health Boards. Joint advertisements inviting applications will be placed in the national and local newspapers towards the end of July and full details will be issued to all candidates at that stage.

## FARMING LEADER

### Linseed Price And Increment For Grain Must Be Maintained

Mr. John O'Mahoney, Tallow, Chairman of the IFA's National Grain Committee, has called on the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh to resist Commission proposals to reduce linseed compensation from £204 per acre in 1993 to £192 per acre in 1994. Mr. O'Mahoney said: "the linseed acreage has increased dramatically in the last number of years from a low of 79

ha in 1989 to a high of 5,800 ha in 1993 which was over 3,000 ha greater than 1993 oilseed rape acreage."

He said: "Linseed growers have already suffered a price drop of £123 per acre or a 37% price decrease in 1993 and consequently Minister Walsh must fight to maintain the 1993 compensation payment of £204 per acre."

The Grain Chairman continued: "The monthly incre-

ment for intervention grain which in 1993 was £1.39 per tonne must also be maintained. Commission proposals to reduce this increment by nearly 20% to £1.13 per tonne must be resisted. There is absolutely no foundation for such a huge reduction and it just will not be acceptable to dried grain growers many of who lost substantially from storing grain in 1993."

## County Waterford ICMSA News

The County Chairman John Cusack, outlines below the key problems with the current method of compensation for animal disease:

(1) Where a farmer is operating a milk quota and using milk to feed calves, the milk fed to these calves is not taken into account. Insufficient account is taken of milk fed on-farm to calves and young stock.

(2) In the case of a farmer who fills his quota but whose Co-op finds itself in a super levy situation, the only option the farmer has is to feed large amounts of milk to calves and weanlings to avoid a super levy. No account is taken of this if his herd is affected by disease.

(3) The farmer who produces milk efficiently, but without the use of large amounts of concentrate, is discriminated against vis a vis the farmer who feeds his cows concentrates. The

farmers who operates a grass based system is downgraded when it comes to compensation as a judgement is made on the genetic capacity of the animals, which assumes that they are lower yielding and can be replaced at a lower cost than those fed on concentrates, which are assumed to be higher yielding.

(4) Those farmers unfortunate enough to farm in areas which have six month winters are totally discriminated against vis a vis the farmers farming in an area which has a three month winter.

The ICMSA has proposed the following:

H A basic flat rate increase of £200 for all dairy cows and in-calf heifers.

H Cows with four permanent teeth should receive an additional payment of £150 and cows with six permanent teeth should receive an additional payment of £100.

H Suckler cows should receive additional payments again based on the number of teeth in order to compensate for the higher replacement costs of younger cows:

H A special system of valuation for pedigree bulls:

H All pedigree females should receive an increase of £300 in addition to the flat rate increase of £200 per cow. Specialist pedigree breeders which animals of exceptional merit should have recourse to increased compensation.

H Beef and Store Cattle. A matrix of weight, breed and sex to provide rates of grants which, in addition to the salvage value, would provide about 85% - 90% of replacement costs on average.

H The increased grants should be back-dated to October 1993 to compensate those who replaced stock at a time when buying in prices were high.

## County Waterford ICMSA Executive Report

The County Waterford Executive of ICMSA held a meeting on Monday, May 23 last.

The main items discussed were the drop in milk price, subsidies i.e. beef premium, suckler cow, etc., and the Family Farm Award.

The County Chairman, John Cusack said that the executive were very disappointed that Waterford Co-op did not hold the milk price considering the high profits announced recently and the expense that farmers have had in purchasing extra feed over the long winter.

On the question of subsidies Tom Hickey P.R.O. said that the protest organised by Waterford ICMSA had highlighted the problem with the delays in payment. More payments were made in the last week but there are still some more outstanding.

The County Executive decided to hold the Family Farm Award this year. The County Waterford Family Farm Environmental Conservation and Safety Award has been organised by the Waterford Executive of ICMSA in conjunction with Teagasc.

Mr. Hickey said that without the help of Teagasc and the sponsors it would be impossible to hold this Award.

## Call For Single Agency To Co-ordinate Rural Development

At the launch of the "ICMSA Guide To Rural Development" at the EU Commission offices in Dublin, the President of the ICMSA, Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, said the maze of agencies and organisations involved in servicing rural development and the lack of comprehensive information available on the subject to date, combine to act as deterrents to meaningful development.

Calling for the establishment of a single agency to service rural development at local level, Mr. O'Dwyer said that rural development has become a very popular term in EU and national policies and it vital to the survival of thousands of farmers and other individuals living in rural Ireland.

"To achieve real rural development, the various schemes must be co-ordinated in order that they are easily accessible to those who wish to participate. The ordinary family farmer must be able to easily find his or her way to the information and funds which are rightfully theirs.

"Rural Developments as it stands is a very broad and

complex subject to comprehend and most people agree that it was essential to bring together, in booklet form, details on all the agencies servicing rural development. The ICMSA is pleased to have been able to publish this practical guide which is a one-stop shop for anyone seeking information on rural development. We could not have succeeded in this venture without the support of our sponsors, the Kerry Group and the EU Commission and without the assistance we received from AIB and Irish Food Publishers.

"While the ICMSA Guide will play an important information role, a simplified organisational structure is also essential if rural development is to become a reality.

"Leader is an example of successful rural development. The Leader Groups throughout the country manage a wide variety of rural development activities and it is my view that the Leader principle should be a blueprint for a nationally co-ordinated approach to rural development.

# German Tribute To Captain Donoghue

Abbeyside Church was the scene of a fitting tribute last Sunday, May 29th, to the late Captain Tom Donoghue of the motorship 'Kerlogue' who rescued 168 German seamen from the Atlantic ocean on December 29, 1943.

Nine German crewmen of the World War II destroyers which were sunk by British cruisers on that illfated December day, returned to Co. Waterford to remember and honour the heroic Dungarvan born man who had saved their lives. Also present at the impressive ceremony at the late Captain's grave in Abbeyside parish churchyard were 16 German navy men, Peter Maguire of the Maritime Institute of Ireland, Capt. Donoghue's son Jim of Melbourn, Bishopstown, Cork his sister Mrs. Renee McIntyre who came specially from New York for the occasion and many other family relatives.

Speaking at the graveside, one of the survivors, Dieter Kluber, said he was deeply honoured and privileged to be present. Herr Kluber recalled how he and the rest of the German crew had drifted in the Bay of Biscay after their destroyer had been torpedoed.

"Death took a heavy toll,

but many more lives would have been lost but for Capt. Donoghue and his crew, who actually changed course to come and rescue us", Herr Kluber added. He further recalled how the brave Irish sea captain and his 9 man crew had to physically haul each and every German survivor from the

water with their bare hands.

Then together with two other survivors, Helmut Metzner and Rudi Schlicht, the trio laid a wreath on the Captain's grave. "Capt. Donoghue and his men ignored the dangers, the storm and the high seas, to save our lives. God bless Ireland and the Irish peo-

ple", concluded an emotional Herr Kluber.

A second wreath was laid by Commander Hans Peter Decker, on behalf of the German navy, who said the presence of the German navy was in recognition of Capt. Donoghue's bravery and that of his crew. "Our thanks go out sincerely to

all the people of Ireland", he added.

Another wreath was laid by Peter Maguire of the Maritime Institute who said Capt. Donoghue was a brave and honoured son of Abbeyside.

As the sun shone down on the crowd gathered in the small parish graveyard and

with the Irish and German flags flying, two buglers from Dungarvan Brass Band sounded the Last Post.

A plaque in honour of Captain Tom Donoghue and the Kerlogue Rescue is now on display in the National Maritime Museum of Ireland in Dun Laoghaire.

## Cathal Brugha Community House

Not every week do we hear of the 20 voluntary workers of Cathal Brugha Community House, yet this quietly dedicated group have made a huge contribution to the social structure and quality of life in this recently revamped Dungarvan estate.

The Cathal Brugha Community project is one of the most successful stories of Waterford Regional Youth Service which is the main co-ordinating body for youth work in Waterford City, county and South Tipperary. Established in 1987, at No. 12, Cathal Brugha Place, the community house is leased to the Waterford Regional Youth Service by the Dungarvan Urban District Council. In an area which has many problems of major unemployment, social issues and housing related problems, the various social issues are being addressed by the excellent

voluntary workers who are working side by side with the residents.

Presently there are 4/5 groups dealing with such matters as creche facilities which caters for the needs of the 3 to 5 age group. A youth group which caters for 22 young people in the 8 - 13 age group, two nights per week, carrying out an activity based programme with a high educational input. A young woman's group catering for the 15 - 20 year olds and another group which is a homework group which works with 5, 6, 7 year old children.

Speaking to Triona Foley of the Dungarvan Youth Resource Centre, St. Augustine Street (also under the wing of the Regional Youth Service) she told us all groups are catered for and various issues are dealt with in the group as they arise. If certain individuals want to raise a particular issue, their

needs are expertly catered for by the competent, caring voluntary workers. "We also deal with literacy and issue based work for young women", explained Triona who said the response from the estate residents and group participants alike had been extremely good.

Much of the important early groundwork, however, had been laid by Br. Noel of the Augustinians who had been a driving force in getting the Community House firmly established in the locality.

Br. Noel was later transferred to Drogheda but his enthusiasm and motivation will never be forgotten by Triona and the other voluntary workers who continue on with that same motivation and diligence, helping residents to overcome their problems and enhancing the fabric of society for many in the estate.

Next Friday, June 3rd at 7

p.m. Bishop William Lee will give a general blessing of the refurbished houses at Cathal Brugha Place where he will also visit the sick in their own homes. U.D.C. Chairman Tony Wright will be present to unveil a commemorative plaque erected by the New Line Youth group, to mark the history of Gallow's Hill. Also in attendance will be Rev. Paul Murphy, Chairman of Waterford Regional Youth Service and President of the National Youth Federation. One of the oldest residents in the area, Mrs. McGuire will also make a speech for the occasion and afterwards tea and refreshments will be served at the Cathal Brugha Community House. An exhibition of the various group work activities will be on public display and later local children can enjoy an open air disco. All are welcome to attend.



# Experimental Rules

When the 1994/95 National Leagues begin in October (hurling 9th and football 16th) new rules will be experimented with in both codes. These will

apply to National Leagues only and should counties wish to maintain these changes for the championship next year, motions will have to come from county conventions to Congress and receive a two-thirds majority.

### FOOTBALL

(1) A player who takes a handpass from a team mate shall not be permitted to play the ball away with the

hand(s);

(2) When a team is awarded a free for an aggressive foul, any player on that team will be permitted to take the free kick from the hands;

(3) All kick outs shall be taken from the 13 metre line.

### HURLING

(1) A player shall only take the ball in the hand once before playing it away;

(2) A player shall not be permitted to kick the ball from the hand(s).

## All-Ireland Tickets

Central Council decided last Saturday that because of the fact that the Cusack Stand will not be completed on schedule, the seating capacity of the grounds will be considerably reduced and as a result there will be a 25% cut across the board in the allocation to all counties and others entitled to tickets. In the following years the normal allocation will be increased. There will be a 10% cut in terrace tickets. This has nothing to do with the redevelopment work and is as a result of an order from the Dublin Fire Officer and is for safety reasons.

# Waterford Play Cork In Munster Junior Hurling Semi-Final

Waterford play their first hurling championship game of the current season when our juniors travel to Limerick on Sunday next to take on Cork in a game listed as a very attractive curtain-raiser to the eagerly awaited senior hurling championship clash between Cork and Limerick.

Because of the fact that a number of senior football players are included on the junior hurling panel, a number of scheduled senior football championship games will have to be put back until the following week-end.

Up to last year our record in the grade since junior inter-county hurling was reintroduced some years ago, was abysmal and apart from beating Kerry two years ago, we had failed to win a single game. Last year things were different and having beaten Kerry by a couple of points at Lismore, we drew with Tipperary at Thurles and beat them in a thrilling replay before a record crowd at Cappoquin. We were subsequently beaten by Clare in the Munster final at Thurles.

Normally this is not a grade which arouses a whole lot of excitement, but after a win at any stage the supporters get worked up and really behind the team as they did here in Waterford during an exciting campaign last year. Although we have played against Cork on a number of occasions since the provincial junior hurling championship was revived just eleven years ago, we have never beaten them in the grade.

Two weeks ago Cork defeated Limerick by 2-17 to 3-9 in the first round and were certainly not impressive although a few of their forwards, O'Donoghue, Sheehan, Murray and McCormack were all in fine scoring form and will likely prove to be a problem for our defence.

The panel of players have taken part in a number of practice and challenge games and were due to have a final run in Fraher Field on last night (Tuesday). I understand that the team was not due to be named until after training last night and if this is so, it is unlikely to be available in time for publication here.

The panel included a considerable number of the players who played in the Munster final and in other games last year. Pat Curran, Stradbally, who has loads of senior inter-county experience is certain to be the keeper and going on the line-out in recent challenge games, etc., the defence will

include Alan Ryan, John Byrne, Kilboginet, Fintan O'Brien, one of the stars of the 1993 campaign, Peter Queally, Pat Ryan (Ballysaggart), Liam Dalton and Paul Foley, Stradbally. Other players on the panel who are likely to be included in the line-out are Kevin Walsh, Michael Hubbard, Donnagh Cummins, John P. Fitzpatrick, Pat Bennett, Noel Kelly, Brian Henley, etc.

We did very well in the grade last year and obviously we will hope to success this year, even though Cork are our opponents and we have never beaten them in the grade. We should remember that we had never beaten Tipperary either, until we played them last year.

Cork will be the favourites and are entitled to the vote, they having had the benefit of a championship outing already, but it looks like being a season of surprises, if last weekend results are an indicator.

The situation now is that at the end of May, nine of the sixteen senior hurling teams are gone from the championships, even though all have matches left to play in the league section. It would be misleading to say that up to now it has been a good championship. The standards have been disappointing, in fact some of the games have been just awful. Some clubs have blamed this on the way the championships has been run, with too much chopping and changing of dates and venues and while this might have been a factor and to a certain extent responsible for lack of interest, it is hardly the reason why the standards were so poor.

There is now a break of two months before the hurling championship resumes and when the seventh and final round takes place on the weekend of July 24th. Only two of the eight scheduled fixtures can effect the championship. In the other cases the matches are between teams who are already knocked out. ## Minister Smith Praises Cathal Brugha Place

congratulated Cllr. Dec Goode on his 27 year membership of Dungarvan Urban Council who recently announced his non standing in the upcoming local elections.

### BACKGROUND

The Cathal Brugha project was funded under the terms of the Remedial Works Scheme operated by Minister Smith's Department at a cost of £1.2 million. First constructed in 1939, Cathal Brugha estate, comprising of sixty houses, was severely substandard and dilapidated before the commencement of a seven-house pilot scheme in 1991. Incidentally, the only man left alive to have worked on the original '39 scheme is Dick McAllister of Caseyville. On successful completion of the work by John Cunningham Building services Ltd, it was decided to go ahead with the refurbishment of the balance of the houses

with the approval of the Department of the Environment.

The refurbishment of the balance of the scheme was carried out by main contractors M/s Peter O'Loughlin Ltd., Waterford and represents a total transformation of the area, first developed over half a century ago. The architects who designed the new facelift were John F. Thompson and Partners, Limerick, and their work together with that of all the contractors was greeted warmly and much praised by the Minister, Chairman of the UDC and Acting Co. Manager Brian McNally throughout the ceremony.

### DILIGENT DUNGARVAN UDC

"This is now an estate of which all involved can be proud, with well insulated houses refurbished to a very high standard externally and internally provided with modern sanitary facilities", proclaimed the Minister who further revealed that to date, the £118 million capital funding provided for the Remedial Works Scheme has enabled excellent work to be carried out throughout the country on 'low-cost' and pre 1940 houses and also in certain run-down inner city flat complexes. In 1993 funding increased from £17.2 million to £20.7 for this year. This will enable work to continue on some 70 estates nationwide and has allowed the designation of 9 further estates for funding under the scheme.

In addition, funding under the bathroom programme which assists local authorities to provide bathroom facilities in those dwellings which lack them, has increased by over 60% from £2.5 million in 1993 to £4 million this year. On this subject, Minister Smith said he was "delighted that Dungarvan has now completed the installation of bathrooms in all of their dwellings and I must commend the UDC for their diligent use of funding from my Department in this regard".

### LOCAL PRIDE

Having witnessed at first

hand the fruits of the excellent work carried out in the Dungarvan estate, the Minister declared he was greatly impressed and that great credit was due to all concerned.

In his speech at the sun drenched venue, Cllr. Wright [DL] spoke of the important contribution to the social infrastructure of the estate made by the 15 voluntary workers who deal with all social issues and problems in an area which averages on 95% unemployment. At their community centre premises at 12, Cathal Brugha Place, these workers are organised into 4/5 different groups to care for the 3 to 5 age groups, 8 to 13 age groups, young woman's group and a homework group which caters for 5-6-7 year old children. The proud history of the Cathal Brugha estate has been enhanced by the sense of community spirit generated by these caring individuals Cllr. Wright added. He then went on to say that in housing estates, the fabric of society is as important as the house and stressed that such a policy, i.e. special community programme, would have long term effects. "I could not over emphasise the huge contribution these voluntary workers are making to the quality of life for many people in Cathal Brugha".

The Chairman then praised the Minister for his positive response to the council's application for funding for the badly needed project and added that the days when local residents were hampered by poor conditions and restricted to patch up jobs were 'now left behind'. The entire £1.2m project which includes such extra works as public lighting, roadways, paths, landscaping etc., was described as a 'reformed' estate by the UDC Chairman who then stressed the need however for ongoing assistance from the local authority.

Minister Smith also praised the youth leaders for their initiative in establishing a community centre. "It shows what can be done when the resources of the council and residents are harnessed for the good of all", he added.

Describing the Cathal Brugha development as a 'fine refurbishment scheme' in which the residents can take great pride, Minister Smith then urged both the local residents and the UDC to ensure that housing schemes do not, in the first place, deteriorate to the point where they need major refurbishment.

"The Urban Council must now take whatever steps are necessary to provide an adequate management and maintenance system for their estates and provide for increased levels of tenant involvement in this area", he stated.

In conclusion he then wished the residents of Cathal Brugha Place every happiness and success in the future.
