U.D.C. ELECTION

Close Battle Expected For Urban Seats

Weeks of intensive campaigning have now drawn to a close and tomorrow (Thursday) the voters of Dungarvan will trek to the polls in a local election for the first time in nine years to decide who will comprise the next nine-seat Urban Council.

Never before in the history of the State has a U.D.C. election been put on the political backburner for so long a period. Normally held every five years, the life of the Councils was extended to seven between 1960 and 1967, and again between 1967 to 1974. But not until now have the U.D.C. — and Town Commissioners — been allowed to remain in office for nine years.

but quite frankly it's difficult to see either party succeeding.

Labour field a very formidable trio this time round, and they would appear to hold the best chance of picking up an extra seat, although that will be an extremely difficult task too.

If there is a swing to parties of the Left it could, of course, become a reality and it would also enhance the prospects of both Democratic Left candidates Cllr. Tony Wright and his running mate Christy Power.

If there is any such thing as an election certainty then Cllr. Wright, the present Council chairman, would appear to be just that. But it remains to be seen if he will have sufficient surplus votes to win a seat for Power.

The seventeen-strong "field" is completed by five Independents, among them two outgoing councillors Michael O'Riordan and Mary Dixon. Cllr. O'Riordan was elected on the Fine Gael ticket in 1985 but his

much publicised row with the party was followed by his resignation and he is now seeking to return to the Council chamber "on his own".

In 1985 Cllr. O'Riordan polled a mightily impressive 348 first preferences and was elected on the first count. It's unlikely that he can repeat that performance, but he is certain nonetheless to garner a significant tally

Local Electronics Company Wins Award

Bi-Centenary Of Fr. Seamus O'Shea

On Sunday June 12th, the parishioners of Kilrossanty and Fews will commemorate the bi-centenary of the death of Fr. Seamus O'Shea, their longest serving and most revered Parish Priest.

Born near Kilcash at the foot of Sliabhnamon, Fr. O'Shea decided as a young man to study for the priesthood. The penal laws were in operation and consequentially, he had to go to one of the seminaries in Europe to study. His college fees were paid by a generous neighbour, Lady Veagh who supported other young students in the same way.

We do not know where Fr. Seamus served when first ordained. He was 46 years old when he arrived in Kilrossanty, following the death of his predecessor, Fr. Lonergan in 1756. While he lived here, we are told his place of residence was in Gortnaleacht, not far from the stepping stones at Ballygoula.

Fr. O'Shea's transport was a pony and saddle, and it is said that the pony, whom he called Noirín, was as clever as a human being.

One Sunday morning while making his way to say mass in Fews, he reached the stepping stones on the River Mahon in the

townsland of Lyre, [there were no bridges in those days], the river was in flood and so severe was the raging torrent, we are told that it was turning huge boulders and uprooting trees that came in it's path. It was dangerous to go near it, not to mention crossing it. When one considers that it had cascaded 500 feet over Mahon Falls, a short distance upstream, it would have lost little of it's velocity on reaching this crossing point, which is close to the present day headquarters of 'Lyre Productions'.

The faithful saggart, not wishing to leave his parishioners without Sunday mass, decided that he would try crossing. Putting his life in God's hands, he faced the little pony towards the raging flood, he spoke kindly to her and urged her on, his faith vindicated as both arrived on the opposite side safe and sound.

News of this incident soon spread throughout the parish. Some people said it was a miracle, that God in his mercy opened a road

through the flood for his faithful priest. Whatever the true story may be however, the incident left an indelible mark on the minds of the people who knew him and the story has passed down from generation to generation to the present day.

Fr. Seamus died in 1794 and is interred in the old graveyard in Kilrossanty. A simple stone marks his final resting place, the inscription, which is in Latin translates; "Beneath this tomb lies the body of Rev. James Shea, pastor of Kilrossanty and Fews who departed this life the 12th day of June 1794 aged 84 years. May he rest in peace".

For many years after his death, people came and took handfuls of clay from his grave to honour his piety. Whenever a funeral was leaving the parish for an outside graveyard such as Mothel or Cnoc Buide, the relatives of the dead person always put a handful of clay from Fr. O'Shea's grave into the coffin, such was the regard they had for their beloved pastor.

Traffic Warden's Unfair Dismissal Claim Fails

A local authority traffic warden, who received seven written and numerous verbal warnings about his behaviour over an eleven-year period before finally being sacked, has failed in his claim under the Unfair Dismissals Act against Dungarvan Urban Council.

In a ruling issued, on Tuesday by Ms. Moya Quinlan, chairperson of the Employment Appeals Tribunal, the claim of forty two year old James Donovan, Knocknacullen, Leamybrien, Co. Waterford was dismissed.

"The Tribunal has carefully considered the evidence of both parties and is satisfied that Donovan's dismissal was fair", Ms. Quinlan stated.

"Having regard to all the numerous complaints made against the claimant, the Tribunal feels that the respondent (Dungarvan U.D.C.) tolerated the situation as long as they could, and in the end Donovan frustrated his contract", she concluded.

Donovan's claim under the Unfair Dismissals Act was heard at a sitting of Ms. Quinlan's chairmanship in Dungarvan on March 7th last.

The hearing was told by Mr. Bertie White, Town Clerk, that James Donovan was appointed to the position of traffic warden with Dungarvan Urban Council on June 30th 1980 until his employment was terminated on September 13th 1993.

Mr. White disclosed that there had been difficulties with the claimant from 1982 onwards, and he outlined a number of incidents in which Donovan had verbally abused people during the course of his duties as traffic warden. As a result the U.D.C. had to send letters of apology to these people and warnings were given to Donovan.

The Town Clerk also told the hearing that on another occasion the traffic warden refused to accept the validity of a doctor's "on call" card and issued him with a ticket.

Other incidents related to the hearing by Mr. White included one in which the warden tried to stop a Waterford County Council refuse truck while it was in motion to issue a ticket, and another occasion when he accosted the Council caretaker.

Finally, after still further complaints Donovan was issued with a letter of dismissal on the grounds of his failure to carry out specific instructions, failure to carry out his duties as traffic warden satisfactorily, and his repeated

misconduct.

The claimant, however, had told the Tribunal that he was the first traffic warden to be appointed by Dungarvan Urban Council and that people resented the parking rules and regulations.

Donovan claimed that on December 20th 1991 he had been physically

assaulted by a Council employee. Also when a second traffic warden was appointed he felt he was being pushed out.

He said that while he had a few words from time to time with people he never physically assaulted anyone and had abided by the rules and regulations of the job.



Give Your Cacti Some Air

Cacti don't ask for much but we can get much more from them with just a little effort.

Many are kept indoors all year round, never dying but never really appearing to live either; superbly adapted to extremes of temperature they will do no more than exist if neglected.

But they can be transformed by exposure to sun and fresh air in summer from June onwards and may even flower regularly, rather than every seven years - a popular misconception.

Cacti fall broadly into 2 categories;

n Desert Cacti - with spines and spikes and usually producing rosette-style flowers.

n Forest Cacti - from the tropical Americas where they actually grow in trees.

Desert cacti like cool and dry conditions in winter - about 50°F is ideal and they can tolerate windowsills, except in the coldest winter nights.

Keep them virtually dry from October to March and then water regularly - over-watering in winter can cause rotting at the base and on extremities.

Windowsills are good for cacti in summer if there is sun and air, but outdoors is best, possibly grouped together in a dish to create a cacti garden.

It should be shallow with a drainage hole - most garden centres stock terracotta examples - and the bottom lined with a layer of gravel or shards of clay pots.

Unless you become a real enthusiast and mix your own, it is worth buying a proper cactus mixture for the potting medium - they are expensive plants to buy and commercial mixes have the blend of sand texture and nourishment that cacti prefer.

Avoid cramming plants too tightly together and cover bare compost between them with small stones or gravel, or both, to create a desert look.

This layer also minimises plant contact with the compost when wet, which can cause a cactus to rot. The display can be varied using other lovers of arid conditions such as succulents - notably Lithops [Living Stones] and Crassula [Money Tree].

The best way to water during the summer months if you continue to keep cacti indoors is to stand containers in a bowl of water - preferably from the rain butt - so they absorb moisture from below. Then allow them to dry out before the next watering.

Forest cacti are even more attractive and will produce their long showy blooms more readily than their tight-fisted desert cousins. Best known are the Christmas and Easter varieties - familiar during the appropriate seasons - though the rarer Orchid Cactus is even more flamboyant. All like being outdoors in a cool sheltered spot during summer, allowing them to rest before blooming again - fresh air encourages good displays year in, year out.

Waterford Beaches Lose Blue Flag

Three of the most popular beaches in County Waterford - Tramore, Ardmore and the Main Strand at Dunmore East are to relinquish their Blue Flag awards, following a recent announcement by Environmental Protection Minister John Browne who disclosed the list of the European Blue Flag winners for 1994.

Ireland was awarded a total of 55 Blue Flags out of 80 applications made. The awards are administered in Ireland by An Taisce and all entries are subject to stringent environmental requirements, aimed at cleaning up the community's beaches.

These European requirements include clean bathing water, litter control and involve measures such as the disposal of hazardous waste such as paints, solvents, anti-fouling agents and oil.

The reason behind the Waterford beaches' disappointing failure lies in their non-compliance with water quality criteria.

The good news however, is that Dunmore East, Clonea and Bonmahon have all qualified for the prestigious Blue Flag award which certainly help to attract many visitors and local swimmers during the summer trade.

Mix 'n' Match Pizza Ideas

PIZZA WITH MEAT TOPPINGS

Serves 2-4

Ingredients

Either:

175g (6oz) back bacon rashers, grilled and chopped

or:

225g (8oz) minced beef
1x5ml sp (1tsp) chilli powder

Dry fry together until brown

or:

225g (8oz) minced pork
1x15ml sp (1tsp) curry paste

Dry fry together until brown

or:

4 sausages
Grilled and sliced

1x23cm (9") pizza base
6x15ml tbsp tomato sauce (pre made sauce or made using tinned tomatoes)
Toppings

Pineapple pieces
Red and green pepper, seeded and chopped
Green chillies, seeded and sliced
Mushrooms, sliced
Sweetcorn
50g (2oz) Mozzarella or Cheddar cheese, grated



Spread tomato sauce on to the base of the pizza. Choose a meat topping and place on tomato sauce. Add toppings and sprinkle with cheese. Cook in a preheated oven for 10-15 minutes. Serve immediately with jacket potatoes and salad.

If you haven't read my article in last weeks paper or if my leaflet has not reached you yet the following will sound incomplete but will hopefully be indicative of my approach to the affairs of the Urban Council.

BUSINESS EXPANSION

The Chamber of Commerce have been making inroads into this area but they cannot operate in isolation from the Council. More integration of effort is needed and the co-ordinated joint efforts undertaken so far have been very successful, though mostly involving environmental matters. Disincentives to expansion such as P.R.S.I., Tax, Rates, Etc., need rationalisation. This word evokes thoughts of redundancies, but more labour intensive jobs and less over mechanisation and over computerisation would

serve us better. At the end of the day business expansion depends on the goodwill and loyalty of the whole community on an integrated basis rather than disparate attempts by individuals or smaller groupings.

CULTURE AND RECREATION

Each club, society, association, etc., has some need of support in one way or another. Every help should be forthcoming for the benefits that are provided for by these, usually voluntary, organisations and organisers. If we can keep our youth (and the not so youthful) engaged in legitimate hobbies and pursuits, it would lessen the vandalism and nuisance which has become so much more prevalent in recent times. As is evident many clubs are self suffi-

cient and motivated while others may need the security, backing or encouragement that the Council can provide and which, in fairness has been forthcoming, but could certainly be increased.

NEW INDUSTRY

It has become quite evident in recent times that new industries are being located in areas where the infrastructure and buildings are already in existence, so that there is no loss in start up time. If a small (or any size) industry wished to locate here in the morning we would be unable or unready to accommodate it. We need to tackle this and, therefore, the I.D.A. should be pursued to provide either an advance factory or incubator units for small industries, crafts, etc. The Council, Chamber of Commerce and existing industrialists, acting in unison, would be a formidable force and would have sufficient expertise and argument to put a case to any Government Agency or Department to pursue such a development. Young entrepreneurs have little chance of starting a business unless they have wealth, track record and experience. This does not take account of someone with flair and ability and a good idea. We should now also look to the provision of a new industrial land bank as it seems that the original is now full.

TOURISM

The Dungarvan area is an ideal location and has great potential for development in tourism. Apart from its scenic beauty, it has an abundance of sporting facilities, on land and water, together with a variety of good accommodation, food and shops. But there are obvious blemishes which could have a big impact on visitors e.g. the condition of St. John's Castle and parts of the quay, the fact that we have no marina (although this is being worked on), a part-time Tourist Information Office which is hard to find, a silted up harbour, poor directional signs both inside and outside the town (currently being addressed), dereliction in places and some shoddy buildings. Tourism has been hailed nationally as a major growth area and has the capacity to generate jobs, it needs to be tapped.

URBAN RENEWAL

This, when it is defined and ratified by the Department of the Environment, should present Dungarvan with its best opportunity ever to rejuvenate and revitalise the town and the buildings in it. Apart from major developments, which hopefully will be given to

local firms, there should be scope for the small contractors and sub-contractors to increase their manning levels for the duration of the scheme. The council will probably need to make decisions regarding priority and allocation and will need all the experience and expertise available for these important decisions.

The foregoing is only a short and incomplete summary of what needs to be done and the underlying philosophy and approach that I consider necessary to improve our lot. As I have stated already I have a broad range of depth of experience in such matters. I, therefore, feel I have a contribution to make to the new Urban Council and I ask you for your assistance.

Minister O'Shea Announces £7m Funding For Food Research

Brian O'Shea, Minister for Food and Horticulture has appointed Mary Perks, Woodbine Hill, Kinsalebeg, Co. Waterford as the producer representative on the Food Research Committee which he has recently set up.

An additional £7m funding for research in the food area has been provided by

the Minister. Any research institution with a food project can apply for funding. The research committee he has appointed will assess research programmes and set priorities for funding to the most strategically important projects.

Minister O'Shea emphasised that the structural funds proposals include a provision for a programme of food research funding of £44m over the period 1994-1999. This announcement is the first step towards implementing this programme.

Minister O'Shea stated that this funding confirms the Government's commitment to research in the food area as a means of developing value added food products, of increasing the focus on consumer requirements, of maintaining competitiveness and of creating and maintaining jobs in the industry.



St. Anne's School Cappoquin PAST, PRESENT, FUTURE

6th year student of St. Anne's School, Cappoquin, Davina Hickey, reminisces on her early school days and the sad departure of Sr. Margaret Mary from the school at the end of this year.

As the end of my last school year approaches in St. Anne's and I look at what has happened and changed since my first day as a first year, I realise it's true what people say about school being the best day of our lives and that we should make the most of them.

My days here as a pupil have been interesting to say the least, and as in any story, I must go back to the beginning to tell you about them. It began when I walked through those big silver gates at the bottom of the avenue, on a September in 1980. I wasn't sure what I was heading for, but felt prepared for anything.

After all, I was wearing the official Brown Uniform, which I thought not only to be a sign of adolescence but also a symbol of authority. It wasn't long after that I realised it was the teachers who held all the authority.

I remember clearly the sixth years who were, shall I say, reigning at the time. They were what I would call big in every way, boys and girls. They seemed to make our four-foot something frames dwarf-like and any dreams that the boys in my class might have had at the time of being the next Sylvester Stallone, would have been shattered by a mere glimpse of them. This is just one of the most vivid memories I have of first year.

It was also in first year that I experienced my first and last taste of the study hall. Of course, on the day I was sent, there happened to be nobody else there and so I really was confined to a day of silence and study. Still, I tried to look upon it as a day off school!

When thinking back to the second year, I can never forget that we were in the pre-fabs for the year. Also, by this time, I had become familiar with each of the teachers and I had come to associate each of them with a particular phrase. When Mr. Dolan was interrupted during class, he'd simply say, "There's no need to talk, we know you're there." Mr. Murray always

shouted "This is just crazy" and Miss Jeffrey pleaded with us "Girls" to "Be Quiet," the girls in our class being very much in what you could call "the loud majority."

Once third year came, I think there was a noticeable difference, the Junior Cert was facing us at the end of the year, and we were no longer being referred to as baby first and second years, something which had tended to cause a slight dent in our young dignities. The day our results arrived was wet to match the tears some were shedding and the shouts "I've passed" seemed to echo everywhere.

This also marked the official ending of our Junior cycle of school. It was time to move on, and so from then on I decided to preoccupy myself with thoughts of the school tour and put the thoughts of the Leaving Cert in the back of the mind. Now that the former is over, I know it's one memory of my school days which I will never forget. It was a week away from home and parents, and the teachers weren't teachers, just our friends (believe it or not!) Apart from one or two mishaps it went without a hiccup and we all arrived home exhausted but content after an unbelievable time.

I think it would be impossible to finish this synopsis of my time here in St. Anne's without my mentioning one person and that is Sr. Margaret Mary. We've all had our ups and downs with her over the years. I know I've certainly had, but there aren't many who can say they won't miss her. She has been nothing but kind and always seemed to manage a smile even when she had every reason to be angry. When she leaves at the end of this year, it will be a sad closing of a chapter in the history of St. Anne's.

How is it that song goes again: "O the times they are a changin'," and at the end of this year they certainly will. When we finish our exams in June and walk out those big silver gates through which we came, many of us will never look back.

However, one thing I'm pretty sure is, that one day in the not too distant future, we will all be proud to say we were once pupils of St. Anne's.





COMERAGH MOUNTAINS PRESENT STERN TEST

The rugged hills of Comeragh overlooking the Nire Valley was the setting for a gruelling competition with a difference last week-end - a two day Mountain Marathon. This was the second year of Comeragh Mountain Challenge and no less than 84 teams from all over the Republic, England and Northern Ireland entered for the event. A number of Army teams from Kichham Barracks, Clonmel took part in the two day challenge, which combines the skills of orienteering, running and mountaineering. Last year's inaugural event was marred by bad weather which forced many to abandon the course. This year the Gods looked down on the marathoners with perfect weather. Competitors ran in pairs and each team had to complete a course ranging from 35 km in class B to 50km in the elite class over cross-country and mountainous terrain. Unlike a straight-forward running race the competitors had to navigate their way from start to finish with the aid of a map of the Comeraghs. This map was specially drawn up by army man and orienteering champion Comdt. Pat Hayes over a period of five years. Besides good running shoes or hiking boots the Mountain Marathoners had to carry with them backpacks containing a tent, sleeping bags, food and any equipment needed for an overnight camp out on the mountains. The starting point was Kichham Barracks,

Clonmel, the time 9 a.m. on Saturday morning. The competitors, who were handicapped into Elite, class A, class B and mixed, finished their first herculean leg of the race late that afternoon at a base camp beside the river Nire high upon the Comeragh Mountains. Over the course of the afternoon the land on one side of the river owned by former Ned Wall (Brick) Knockanafra, gradually became dotted with tents as the teams settled down for their over night stay. James Power and David Morrissey competing in the B class were the first team from Kichham Barracks to arrive at the camp in a time of seven and a half hours. Another duo from Kichham Barracks Nick Murphy and Guy Larkin, arrived at the base camp close behind the first Clonmel team. While they are experienced hill walkers and mountaineers, it was their first time to try a Mountain Marathon. The two soldiers, who were competing in the more difficult "A" class were not turned off by the toughness of the sport. After their night on the Mountains the Marathoners were ready to complete the second leg of the race covering a similar distance back to Clonmel. The overall elite winners of the competition were Mark Seddon and John Kewley from England in a time of 7.26 hours, Clonmel pair Guy Larkin and Nick Murphy were placed 21st in the "A" class completing the course in 13.38 hours.

FARMING LEADER

ICMSA Guide To Rural Development

John Quigley, Area Officer with ICMSA in the South East, said that ICMSA have launched a guide to rural development. The main areas covered in the guide include new opportunities for farmers, schemes and services for farmers, local development and training and education.

The guide is available on request from ICMSA European Commission Office, and AIB branches. Anyone interested in rural development will find it to be a useful reference document, concluded Mr. Quigley.

Meanwhile, the Chairman

of the ICMSA Sheep Committee, Mr. Eamonn O'Rourke, advised farmers not to panic sell lambs for fear of a further price drop. Mr. O'Rourke said that he expects prices to remain buoyant for the remainder of the year and therefore farmers should wait until lambs are fully fit before selling. He said bringing out large numbers of lambs for sale will only serve to put added pressure on the markets at this time.

Mr. O'Rourke based his market predictions for the remainder of the year on the knowledge that lamb num-

bers are down compared to 1993.

"Ewe numbers are down about 3% in Ireland but numbers are also down in France. In addition many ewe lambs have been held in flocks and have not produced lambs due to a change in the definition of the ewe for premium purposes. A future factor contributing to a reduction in the 1994 lamb crop was the extremely bad winter and spring which caused heavy losses of lambs," said Mr. O'Rourke.

He called on CBF to intensify its promotional cam-

paign for lambs on both the domestic and export market at a time when supplies of lamb to the market are continuing to increase.

He concluded by reiterating the ICMSA position that a carcass classification scheme for lambs should be implemented without delay so that farmers who invest in improving the quality of their lambs can be adequately rewarded.

Eamonn O'Rourke is from Foulksmills, Co. Wexford, and is National Chairman of the ICMSA Sheep Committee.

An additional £7m funding for research in the food area has been provided by the Minister. Any research institution with a food project can apply for funding. The research committee he has appointed will assess research programmes and set priorities for funding to the most strategically important projects.

Minister O'Shea emphasised that the structural

funds proposals include a provision for a programme of food research funding of £44m over the period 1994-1999. This announcement is the first step towards implementing this programme.

Minister O'Shea stated that this funding confirms the Government's commitment to research in the food area as a means of developing value added food products, of increasing the focus on consumer requirements, of maintaining competitiveness and of creating and maintaining jobs in the industry.

Sheep Farmers Advised Not to Panic Sell

The Chairman of the ICMSA Sheep Committee, Mr. Eamon O'Rourke, recently advised farmers not to panic sell lambs for fear of a further price drop. Mr. O'Rourke said that he expects prices to remain buoyant for the remainder of the year and therefore farmers should wait until lambs are fully fit before selling. He said bringing out large numbers of lambs for sale will only serve to put added pressure on the markets at this time.

REDUCE LAMB NUMBERS — STABILISE PRICE

Mr. O'Rourke based his market predictions for the remainder of the year, on the knowledge that lamb numbers are down compared to 1993.

"Ewe numbers are down about 3% in Ireland but numbers are also down in France. In addition many ewe lambs have been held in flocks and have not produced lambs, due to a change in the definition of the ewe for premium purposes. A future factor contributing to a reduction in the 1994 lamb crop was the extremely bad winter and spring which caused heavy losses of lambs," said Mr. O'Rourke.

CBF PROMOTIONAL ACTIVITY

He called on CBF to intensify its promotional campaign for lambs on both the domestic and export market at a time when supplies of lamb to the market are continuing to increase.

He concluded by reiterating the ICMSA position that a carcass classification scheme for lambs should be implemented without delay so that farmers who invest in improving the quality of their lambs can be adequately rewarded.

Curran Calls For National EU Subsidised Milk Restructuring Scheme

Waterford IFA Dairy Committee Chairman, Gerald Curran, said recently that the proposed EU subsidised milk quota restructuring scheme must be introduced on a national basis, and not merely as a scheme to disadvantaged areas only.

Mr. Curran said that the commitment that IFA had secured in the Programme for Competitiveness and Work was for an unrestricted scheme which IFA wanted to apply throughout the country.

The Ring dairy farmer said that there was a very substantial requirement for subsidised quota restructuring amount for smaller producers outside the disadvantaged areas, where

most of Ireland's milk production is based.

"The reported agreement of the European Commission to a subsidised restructuring scheme within the disadvantaged areas is a step in the right direction, but the problem for smaller producers seeking viability is much greater than that. I am strongly urging the Minister for Agriculture to make direct representations to the European Commission to ensure that the real restructuring problems of smaller producers outside the disadvantaged areas are addressed by allowing them to avail of EU subsidies towards acquiring additional quota," Mr. Curran concluded.

Cathal Brugha Plaque Unveiled

The recently revamped and upgraded Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan was again the scene of an official ceremony last Friday night, June 3, as Most Rev. Bishop William Lee came to bless the refurbished estate houses and to meet the delighted residents of the reconstructed area which has become one of Dungarvan UDC's major success stories in recent years.

Arriving at 7p.m., the Bishop was received by UDC Chairman Cllr. Tony Wright, B. McNally, Acting Co. Manager, B. White, Town Clerk, outgoing members of the urban council, voluntary workers of the Community House, Fr. Paul Murphy, Chairman of Waterford Regional Youth Service and President of the National Youth Federation, distinguished guests and many others, including Mrs. McGuire, one of the oldest residents in the area.

Initiated in 1991, the refurbishment programme resulted in the total transformation of the estate from near dereliction to a modern housing scheme, "moulding beautifully into other well laid out public housing schemes, such as Byrneville to the north, Caseyville to the east, Lismore Avenue to the west", stated the UDC Chairman.

Among those reformed houses to be blessed was the Community House at no.12, Cathal Brugha Place, where a group of 20 voluntary workers work side by side with the residents under the wing of the Waterford Regional Youth Service.

INTERESTING HISTORY

Addressing the gathered crowd, Fr. Murphy outlined the interesting history of the house, recalling how some years ago, the service was anxious to secure a base for its operations in the West Waterford area. Following negotiations with the former Co. Manager, Dan Hurlley, the Youth service was offered the use of the premises at Cathal Brugha Place. The Youth Service moved in and set up a local area office for the region but, in addition, sought to put in place a range of services that, it felt, would be responsive to the needs of the local community.

The regional work has since been transferred to the Dungarvan Youth Resource Centre but the range of services begun in those early days has continued in what now became known as the Cathal Brugha Community House. "While one realises that a house is not necessarily a home", said Fr. Murphy, "Waterford Regional Youth Service has tried to make into something of a home for the Cathal Brugha community".

MODEL FOR COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Fr. Murphy then acknowledged the valuable support that it received during the early years from the Dun-

Chairman Tony Wright unveiled the impressive commemorative plaque to mark the history of Gallow's Hill.

Praising the estate residents for their cooperation and patience during the rehousing period of construction, the Chairman spoke of the proud history of the area and the proud people who live there.

Referring to the recently modernised estate, Cllr. Wright submitted, "what you see here today is the result of the combined efforts of public representatives, the council management, the Department of the Environment, the community groups, the builders, the residents and others". The Chairmen went on to say that the reformed estate "will need ongoing assistance from the local authority" and impressed upon the residents to keep the estate up to the high standard it enjoys today.

An exhibition of the various results of the community project's activities was later on public display and received a warm reception from those present. The local interest and apparent response the project has gleaned from the local community has come as a major boost to the organisers who give of their services voluntarily to deal with the many social issues and problems of the area.

Mrs. Teresa Wright was the very competent M.C. for the occasion and Canon G. Power led the gathering in a decade of the Rosary before the blessing.

Aquaculture Development In Dungarvan Harbour

Mr. Austin Flynn, M.C.C. has received the following reply from the Department of the Marine following a letter sent by him to David Andrews T.D., Minister for the Marine.

Dear Mr. Flynn
"I have been asked by the Minister for the Marine, Mr. David Andrews T.D. to respond to your urgent fax communication covering aquaculture development in Dungarvan Harbour.

The position is as follows:
It is the Department policy to encourage aquaculture development in harmony with other water users. All licensing proposals are assessed by the Department from the relevant technical and scientific considerations. In addition, a public consultation procedure applies whereby all applications for licensing are advertised in the local and national press. The licensing process also involves consultation with fisheries interests, together with tourism, environmental and wildlife interests. It is the Department's objective to ensure as far as possible that aquaculture and other marine activities/interests are developed together on a planned and well regulated basis.

Some forty shellfish operations have been licensed to date within the southern part of the harbour. All of these projects were licensed in accordance with the above procedure. Subsequent to li-

ensing a survey of the licensed areas was commissioned by B.I.M. at the request of the licensees. The purpose of the survey was to mark the boundaries of each licensed area prior to areas being marked for safety of navigation by the licensees in accordance with the conditions of licensing. This survey has recently been completed and licensees have been instructed by the Department to have sites marked as a matter of urgency.

With regard to proposed development within areas of the northern part of the harbour, the Department has on hands two proposals relating to shellfish cultivation. As a preliminary step in the licensing procedure the applications will be assessed from technical and scientific perspectives by the Department's Aquaculture Licence Betting Committee (a multi-disciplinary committee comprised of technical and scientific experts) at its next meeting on 10th June with a view to making a recommendation as to whether the new projects can proceed to the advertising stage.

In your letter you requested an assurance that applications for the northern side of the harbour will not proceed until local consultation on the matter has taken place. The required advertisement process will facilitate persons with genuine objections to air their

grievances or opposition to aquaculture development on the State foreshore prior to any decisions being taken on licensing. Any objections lodged by other harbour users or local residents will be rigorously assessed and taken into account fully prior to any decisions on licensing of projects.

As regards your concerns about unauthorised development on the foreshore I can advise that the department has written to the applicants concerned on foot of complaints lodged with the Department in the following terms:

"The placement of any structures on the foreshore in connection with aquaculture proposals may only be done under licence issued under the Foreshore Act, 1933. It is also unlawful to engage in aquaculture at any place save under and in accordance with a fish culture licence or aquaculture licence or an existing oyster bed licence or an oyster fishery order. Any unauthorised structures must be removed forthwith and the foreshore restored to its former condition".

The applicants have also been advised that the area will be subject to inspection by the Department to ensure that the regulatory requirements are being complied with.

I trust that this clarifies the position.

Skills And Féile

The Western Féile na nGael skills competition has come and gone unnoticed by some clubs. Yes, I know all clubs received notification of their Under 12 and Under 14 fixtures a long time ago and were also, at that time made aware that the final of this competition would take place on a certain date. That was it, take it or leave it. Most clubs, I feel sure in their anxiety to prepare for those under-age butter issues such as getting a panel together, buying hurley and sliotars (expensive exercise) and training, they couldn't be expected to remember when or where the Poc Fada or Féile skills would be held. Thus a competition where the essence of hurling's grandeur would be displayed passed off quietly with only a handful of competitors. Hardly a satisfactory situation, surely.

The Féile na nGael festival of Under 14 hurling was a marvellous concept. The brain-child of Séamus O Riain, illustrious Uachtarán of Cumann Lúthchleas Gael, it gave every county in Ireland the stimulus and opportunity to parade its best young hurlers before large crowds over a week-end of joyous celebration in the host county. The structure of the competition is such that even the weakest county in the land is represented. A true national competition. Its influence on county standards has been enormous.

In every other one of the unsuccessful or weak counties it has done and will continue to do immense good for the game and for the morale and spirit of those engaged in the promotion of hurling. Those latter, the un-

sung heroes of the G.A.A., (Abbey's Bernard Shields and Tommy Treacy come to mind) will continue to bend their best efforts towards nurturing iomáint and promoting it to the best of their ability but they need batteries recharged occasionally and the vast countrywide convocation of hurlers and camogie players in one county for a whole week-end is a sight to cheer, to encourage and to inspire. How I wish that all the Bernards and Tommys could be there.

But to return to the skills competition it is worth remembering that only the basic skills are included. Solo running of the headless chicken variety is excluded; you could watch some of that throughout the championships anyway, if you have a strong constitution. In theory any boy from any club, even the weakest in the land, can participate. That's if he knows that it's on and is properly prepared. Waterford has quite a good record in this competition stretching back to the seventies when Shane Ahearne did us proud. Less than a decade ago we had a more astonishing success. He was a fine young lad from Melleray and I bet you don't remember his name. Unrated Melleray's representative set about his task with great single mindedness and attention to detail once he had qualified. His meticulous preparation included help and advice from outside of his parish and assiduous practice. An indication of his high standard was his success with a difficult skill, the sideline cut. He was the only boy, in

the final, to send every puck between the uprights. His club, Melleray, wouldn't be included in a list of hurling strongholds. A place of peace and solitude and barren beauty yet it produced an All Ireland winner in 1986 was it?

Last year in the Skills Finals in Galway James Murray was just edged out: he was second. A great achievement but he was lucky because I got notification of the Western Final just 48 hours beforehand. There I was barely time to hold the club competition and that was a rushed affair. The final in Dungarvan attracted just five hurlers. Where were the other club representatives? Did they also not know about it - in time? Did anybody really care?

This year the final was over a full week before I heard about it. The boys here were saddened because we have some skilled lads who would love to measure themselves against their rivals. One lad in particular who loves hurling, was reduced to tears when the news broke. I wonder what he thought about us. What effect will it have on his hurling future? The officers of Bord na nÓg are sincere and accurate men.

Their job, however, is not merely the making of fixtures, the running of competitions and the notification of clubs. Their work has a broader dimension: the promotion of juvenile hurling (and football, too, of course). That means to cater for the hurling needs of West Waterford. A tall order admittedly but essential to the survival of the game.

In every corner of the West there are dozens of boys who would love to compete in the Skills Competition if only they knew about it and had a chance to prepare. Peter Power's work has laid the foundations in every parish. Now it needs to be built on and expanded. It should be a function of Bord na nÓg to further this process. To cherish all of our young boys equally and to actively promote the acquisition of skills by a greater number of them is a task which Bord na nÓg should undertake. If present structures don't equip the Bord for such an undertaking then there is an urgent need for restructuring in pursuit of this objective. Bord na nÓg has done good work of which we are all aware and appreciative. It is just that

more needs to be done, very soon, before it is too late. What do you think?







ABBEYSIDE RESIDENTS CONTEST URBAN COUNCIL ELECTIONS

Having completed most of the exhausting work of canvassing from door to door we thought it would be helpful if we asked our local candidates what policies they had developed during the pre-election period towards Abbeyside and its hinterlands.

Paddy Power (Labour): said his main concern would be the environment. He would endeavour to ensure that the open spaces in the area would be retained. Abbeyside beaches are a

wonderful amenity for the people of Abbeyside and Dungarvan especially those with no cars and he would support a Social Employment Scheme for that amenity.

Frank Brown (Fianna Fail): stated that a Community Centre for all age groups would be a priority for him. Looking to the future it would be important to extend the graveyard at Abbeyside Church and the land adjacent to the Church would be ideal for this de-

velopment.

Dungarvan Chamber Of Commerce Sets Sail

As part of the Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce ongoing strategy to encourage tourists to stop in Dungarvan, the Chamber proposes to erect two advance signs on either side of the town, on the N25, in the form of a Facsimile of a 15 foot high Sailing Craft fitted with a cruising spinnaker.

The Chamber of Commerce, who were promoters of the "Welcome To Dungarvan" box hedging on the Waterford approach road, have decided to break from

the normal mundane "knives and forks" international signs for something more original and striking which reflects the nautical history of the town (Dungarvan Na Seana Bhaid Seolta — Dungarvan Of The Old Sailing Ships) and depicts Dungarvan's greatest leisure asset, our beautiful Harbour and Bay. With the exception of Youghal, Dungarvan is the only seaside town on the length of the N25 from Rosslare to Cork, which is the busiest tourist

road in the country. At present only 13 per cent of passing traffic, enters Dungarvan from the by-pass, and it is the Chamber's policy to improve dramatically on this figure.

An estimated 120,000 tourists visited Dungarvan last year. The Tourism Committee of the Chamber has plans to:

(a) Get our visitors to stay a little longer — an extra £10 per head spent by this number of visitors would generate an extra £1.2 mil-

lion which would sustain 40-50 extra permanent jobs or 150 seasonal jobs.

(b) Encourage more tourists off the by-pass into Dungarvan and more aggressively market what the town and West Waterford has to offer by way of tourist amenities.

The Advance Sign Project has been researched jointly by the Tourism and Development Committees of the Chamber of Commerce. The design is by Whelan Signs.


INTERNATIONAL VESTS



Referees

Over at Fraher Field on Saturday night, I was asked to name the number (not the names) of referees who had officiated at matches over the past month or so. The man said that according to the newspaper reports, only about seven or eight names appeared. He was making the point that because the same men referees are handling all our games, there must be a serious shortage of these officials. I didn't have to check the papers as I could recall having seen about half a dozen in all, in the matches which I saw over the past month or so. It all highlights the fact that there is a serious shortage of referees and nothing seems to be happening to improve the situation. No new referees are coming on stream and this is a very serious matter and if something is not done fairly soon to address the problem in a very serious way, the matter will reach crisis proportions sooner or later. Clubs, whose responsibility it is to encourage and supply referees, have ignored repeated requests from board officers. It is, therefore, time that something more positive is done to get more men on the job. Boards may have to do their own recruiting and organise training sessions, if the position is to improve even in the short term.

All day, to-day, Wednesday, the ten FAS football coaches will undergo a referee training course at Fraher field/Lawlor's Hotel, under the direction of county referee Pat Moore. I presume that the purpose of this course is to enable these coaches to become more familiar with the playing rules and, therefore, better able to pass the knowledge on to the pupils in the schools which they regularly visit. This is an excellent idea and out of it we may get one or two new referees. Maybe the idea could be taken up by the various boards.

All Ireland Football Sponsorship

An announcement on Thursday last revealed that a deal has been done with the Bank of Ireland to sponsor the provincial and All Ireland championships for a five year term. Every one of the 32 counties will benefit from the deal and regardless of how a county fares in the championship it will be given a grant from the fund. Of course, counties progressing in the championships will receive additional benefits, as is understandable. It was pointed out that it is the championship and not the counties which are being sponsored and, therefore, counties, who have already been sponsored, can continue to wear the logo of their sponsor. Details of the grants, etc., have yet to be worked out by Central Council and this will be done at their next meeting.

This agreement with the Bank of Ireland, is the biggest sponsorship deal in the sporting history of Ireland and it highlights, in a big way, the popularity of the game over all others. What is considered rather extraordinary is the fact that the Association failed to obtain sponsorship of the hurling All Ireland, as while a good number of interested businesses or firms showed a willingness to become involved with hurling, they were not prepared to pay the kind of money being asked. One very well-known Drinks Company did make a substantial offer, but this was not accepted after Central Council decided by 21 votes to 22 against a change of Association policy in regard to the promotion of alcoholic drink. The Waterford county board decided on a vote to support a proposition to accept the sponsorship from the drinks company.

It might not have been their best performance over the past eighteen months or so, but it might rightly be described as their sweetest victory since they won their marathon county final back in 1992. Nire, the reigning county champions, fielded the exact same team which defeated Dungarvan by a single point in the thrilling county final last November and the challengers lined out without seven of the side who played in the same final, Dermot Callaghan, Eddie Burke, John Ferncombe, Bobby Lyons, Dermot Dee, Martin Houlihan and Martin Kelly and in the circumstances, the champions entered the game as favourites.

Dungarvan fielding a number of newcomers showed a greater eagerness and were sharper than the champions, whose second class display here must put a big question mark around their chances of retaining their title. Over the hour they shot a total of 16 wides, some of them appalling while Dungarvan sent out 12 wides, many of them equally as bad. Both, I'm sure will take note of these lapses when analysing their performance, but for Dungarvan they will note too that they can be wasteful and still take the

points, which now puts them on course for a quarter or a semi-final place. A crowd of about 500/600 turned up to see the game which was quite enjoyable despite the poor shooting by both sets of forwards.

Pat Crotty equalised for the Nire in the 8th minute before Morrie Ferncombe pointed a free to restore Dungarvan's lead in the 14th minute. Michael Guiry pointed a free to level the game, but another Morrie Ferncombe pointed free restored the lead for Dungarvan in the 19th minute. P.P. Ferncombe pointed a 22nd minute free to leave the score at 0-4 to 0-2 at halfway in favour of Dungarvan.

Only one senior hurling match is listed and this is not likely to arouse any great excitement as Dungarvan are now out of the running and only a small miracle could bring their opponents Ballyduff back into contention. I believe that these sides have not met since 1991 when Ballyduff won on a score of 2-9 to 1-4. That apart, Ballyduff have been showing the better form in the championship so far.

INTERMEDIATE HURLING

The County Board have fixed a number of intermediate hurling games which for one reason or another were called off earlier in the season and practically every one of these is of great importance to the participants

as can be seen from the league table. Matches called off last weekend because of the junior game against Cork were to be refixed for the coming weekend, but they will now go by the board because of our Munster semi-final game.

DOUBLE HEADER

Cappoquin venue will host the intermediate hurling double involving Abbeyside and Ballysaggart and the Shamrocks v. St. Marys game on Sunday afternoon. Abbeyside and Ballysaggart have met twice over the past couple of seasons and on both occasions Abbeyside came off winners. In the 1993 championship it was 3-12 to 4-5., but in the end it was closer than the four points might indicate.

So far this season the form in this championship has been very topsy-turvy and as a result it is quite unreliable. Ballysaggart, for instance, defeated Ring by five points and then Ring beat Abbeyside by four. Abbeyside defeated Ballydurn and then Ballydurn de-

feated Ballysaggart. At the moment, Abbeyside have a one point advantage on the league table. An open game, which either side can win.

A glance at the above table shows how open the I.H. championship is and how vitally important the games listed for the week-end are to seven of the sides who are in contention. Erin's Own are guaranteed a semi-final spot and all others with the exception of Kilmac' and Mollerans are there with a fighting chance.

Hurling v. Football

As far as I am aware there are no figures to tell us how many hurling balls were sold to clubs around the country in any given year, but if some estimates are reasonably accurate, the figure should be well in excess of a quarter of a million. This estimate is probably based on figures of club affiliations. In all there were 2,978 clubs affiliated to the Association last year. The official figures published by Croke Park were, Munster 743; Leinster 1107, Connacht 250; Ulster 583; Britain 133; U.S.A. and others 162; with an average of six or more teams entered by every club (including juvenile), there must be approximately 20,000 teams and about half of which would be hurling teams. Also there are the county, schools, colleges, etc., so the quarter of a million figure is conservative.

It is known that the number of footballs supplied to

G.A.A. units last year was 50,000 at a cost of about £35 a piece, this amounted to close on £2,000,000. So if one is to add the cost of hurleys, hurling balls as well as the huge amounts spent on equipment, jerseys, knicks, stockings, helmets and so on, we find that the G.A.A. is quite an outlet for many of the country's industries. As well, of course, it pays huge amounts to the Government in V.A.T.

Strange to relate, that of the two games, football seems to be the bigger money-spinner at almost all levels. The returns from the national football league last year was approximately twice that of hurling. Our share of the league showed us getting double for football. Also it is interesting to find that last year for the semi-finals and All Ireland final in football the gate receipts amounted to £1,767,432 while the corre-

sponding receipts for hurling were £1,325,772. (The total receipts from games under the auspices of Central Council were £3,472,129 which included Railway cups, club championship semi-finals and finals, etc.). At Killarney last year the football semi-final gate amounted to £262,217, while the senior and minor Munster finals at Thurles brought in eight thousand less £254,262.

Here in Waterford there is usually a break even situation between football and hurling. My reason for writing about the financial side of Association activities this week is to enlighten the many people who have the notion that hurling is away more popular than football throughout the country, and many of us who prefer hurling have to live with the fact. It will also stop people from wondering why our new sponsors opted for football as against hurling.

Overall this was a big disappointment as the majority of our players performed well below form and after about 20 minutes we seemed to be playing second fiddle to Cork who had the benefit of a first round match and looked far sharper and more eager. Our forwards in particular were completely off form and over the hour had only two points from play, the other three coming from frees and scored by Pat Bennett.

PLAY

Cork won the toss and played into the Ennis Road goal. Conditions were bad and incessant rain made things miserable for both sides.

Pat Bennett pointed a 7th minute free to open the scoring, but Cork hit back for the equaliser a minute later when Damien McCarthy sent over. of "number ones".

Cllr. Dixon polled 169 first preferences nine years ago and then had to engage in a marathon with F.F.'s Tom Veale before taking the ninth and last seat after twenty counts with a tally of 273. That was a mere four votes ahead of Veale.

The other Independents are local architect Damien Dillon, marathon man Dan Dineen, and the surprise nomination Joey O'Sullivan. All must be respected, but equally it follows as night follows day that not all five of the Independents can succeed.

There should also be a thrilling battle for the honour of "topping the poll" and this may well resolve itself into a three-man race between Fine Gael's Deputy Austin Deasy, Labour's Cllr. Billy Kyne and Democratic Left's Tony Wright.

That may not necessarily be to the advantage of any

of the three parties and if Fianna Fail can secure a successful vote-management they just might sneak that third seat.

The quota this time is likely to be in excess of 350 and could, conceivably, be closer to 400. It was 335 in 1985 when just two candidates, Cllr. Kyne (399) and Cllr. O'Riordan (348) sailed in on the first count.

Then, of course, there were no fewer than twenty four candidates and with seven less this time it's unlikely that it will take twenty counts to complete the tallying.

The counting of votes under Returning Officer Mr. Bertie White, Town Clerk, will get underway at the Sports Centre at Quanns at 9 o'clock on Friday morning. A first count is expected around lunchtime with the final outcome likely by late evening.
